

### Zozo and Capitan people hear of need for Lincoln courthouse addition

Attendance at the scheduled meetings on the proposed courthouse addition held in Carrizozo last week and in Capitan Tuesday night was very moderate, but the people present expressed a healthy interest in the discussions.

The county commissioners expressed their opinion as being that any money spent on repair of the old structure was just spending good money after bad. They have repaired the roof three times in recent years, then the roofers would come back and stop the leaks, then it would leak again as soon as the next rain came along.

Window casings were replaced in the hope that sand and dust would be kept out, with the result that more sand and dust than ever comes in now. It was impossible to get a tight fit in the old building.

Edward Penfield, former county clerk, told the Capitan meeting that all deeds are predicated on records going back 100 years. If these records are lost any property owner in the county would have only "quater's rights" as proof of his claim. It would take maybe 20 years, and untold sums of money to clear up titles in the county.

Of the several features of the old building, besides the general deterioration, that do not conform to state building codes are the stairs to the second story which are much too narrow, all storage space in use not being fire proof, and the fall does not meet federal requirements, or even local requirements.

It has been calculated that the courthouse addition would have room for records accumulated up to 40 years in the future. This particular feature of the new building is still under discussion, only preliminary plans have been drawn, and the possibility exists that more space for storage of records will be included in the building.

Lincoln County has been gaining in valuation about \$1 million per year. The total assessed valuation will be around \$20 million by the time of the bond vote. The county is assessed at 20% of its actual worth, which makes Lincoln County worth \$100 million in real figures. The best figure on cost to tax payers is \$2.46 per \$1,000 of assessed value, based on the 1960 acres, assessed at \$1 per acre, was sub-divided and is now on the tax rolls at \$100 per lot, 4 lots to the acre.

Attending a druggists' meeting in Honolulu at the same time at state expense was Pharmacy Board Secretary J. H. Darsey of Albuquerque.

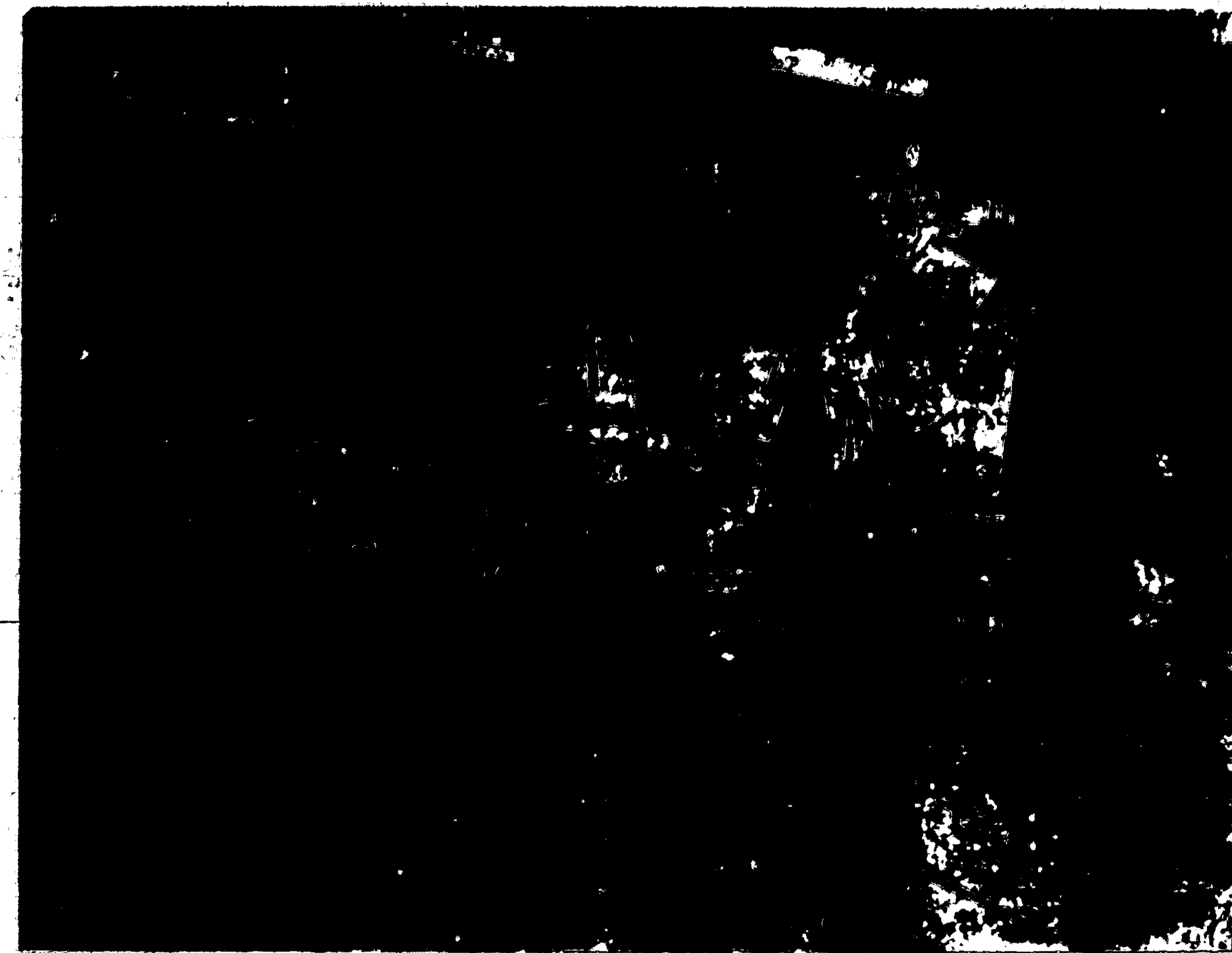
### ROAD MEN CHECK BOSSES' POLITICS

## Mr. Zip is handling a lot of mail fast

The nationwide program of improved mail service has made great changes in the operation of the Carrizozo postoffice. The program is commonly known as the Zip Code, with each town having a code number.

Carrizozo got involved because of the geographical location and the transportation facilities through the Lincoln Co. seat.

Where the postoffice used to handle possible 25 to 30 sacks

of mail a day, and employees worked from 7:00 a.m. to 5:30 p.m., now the local postoffice handles 135 to 140 sacks of incoming and outgoing mail and the hours are from 3:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m.

Three additional people have been employed, making a total of five clerks and the postmaster, Roy Harman.

Twelve sectional centers have been established in New Mexico, including Carrizozo. All of these

sectional centers have been tied together in such a manner that mail can move from any point in the state over night.

Mail comes in to Carrizozo by Trains 39 and 40 at night, and by trucks from the sectional centers at 3:30 in the morning. Outgoing mail leaves by truck at 8:40 in the evening, some letter mail by train at noon.

Mr. Zip is prominent in the picture, along with Postmaster Roy Harman and Fred Chavez.

In the foreground are some of the numerous racks that have been added, a total of 30 pouch racks and 25 additional sack racks have pretty well filled the floor space.

Tuesday the screen (mail boxes) was shifted to gain more space inside. Space was real limited at the start of the Zip mailing, but this is being corrected and other improvements are anticipated in the future. (News Photo)

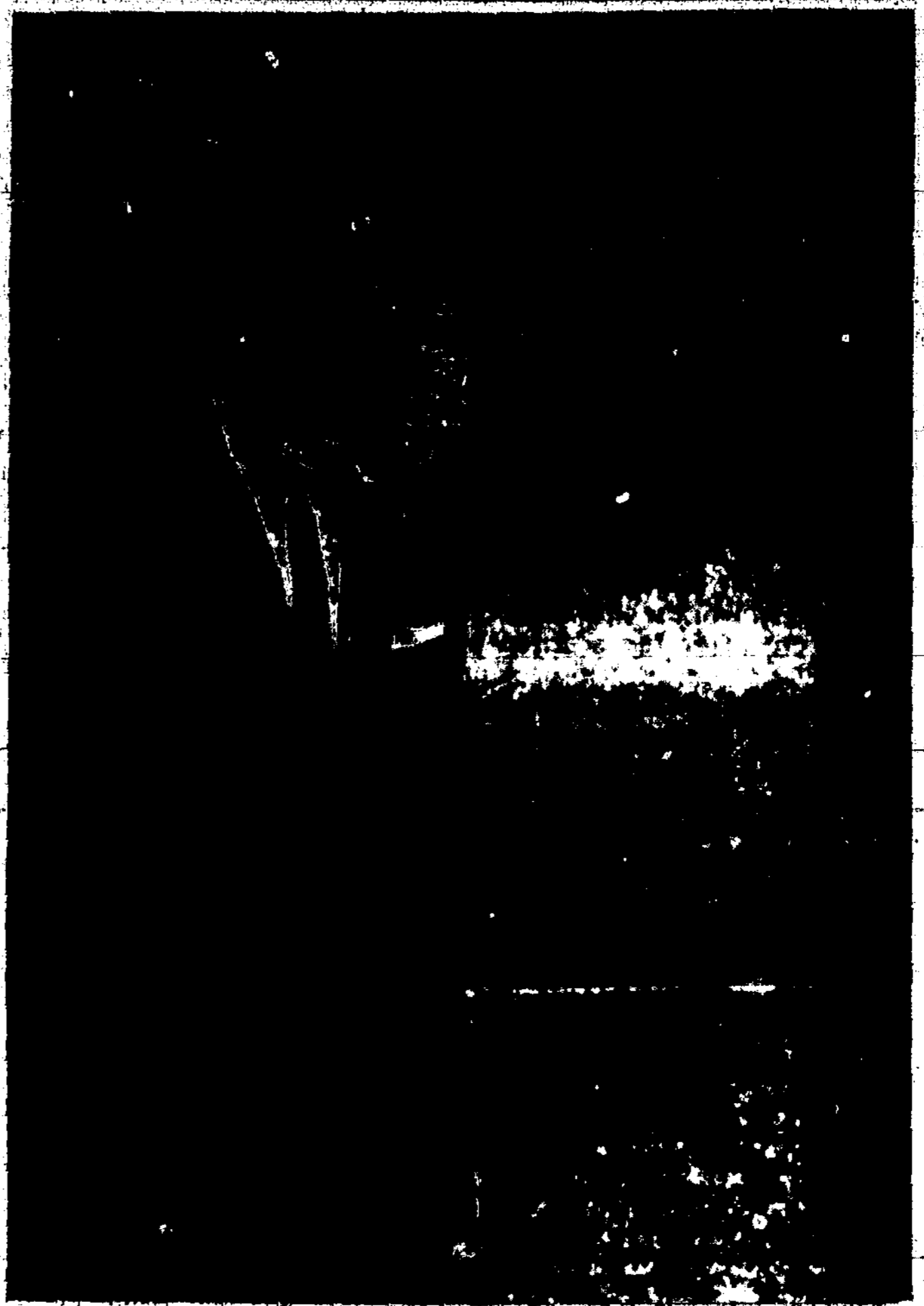
As the bride and groom cut their cake, Mrs. Leota Pflingsten sang, "I Love You Truly", accompanied by Mrs. Emma Gene Hall.

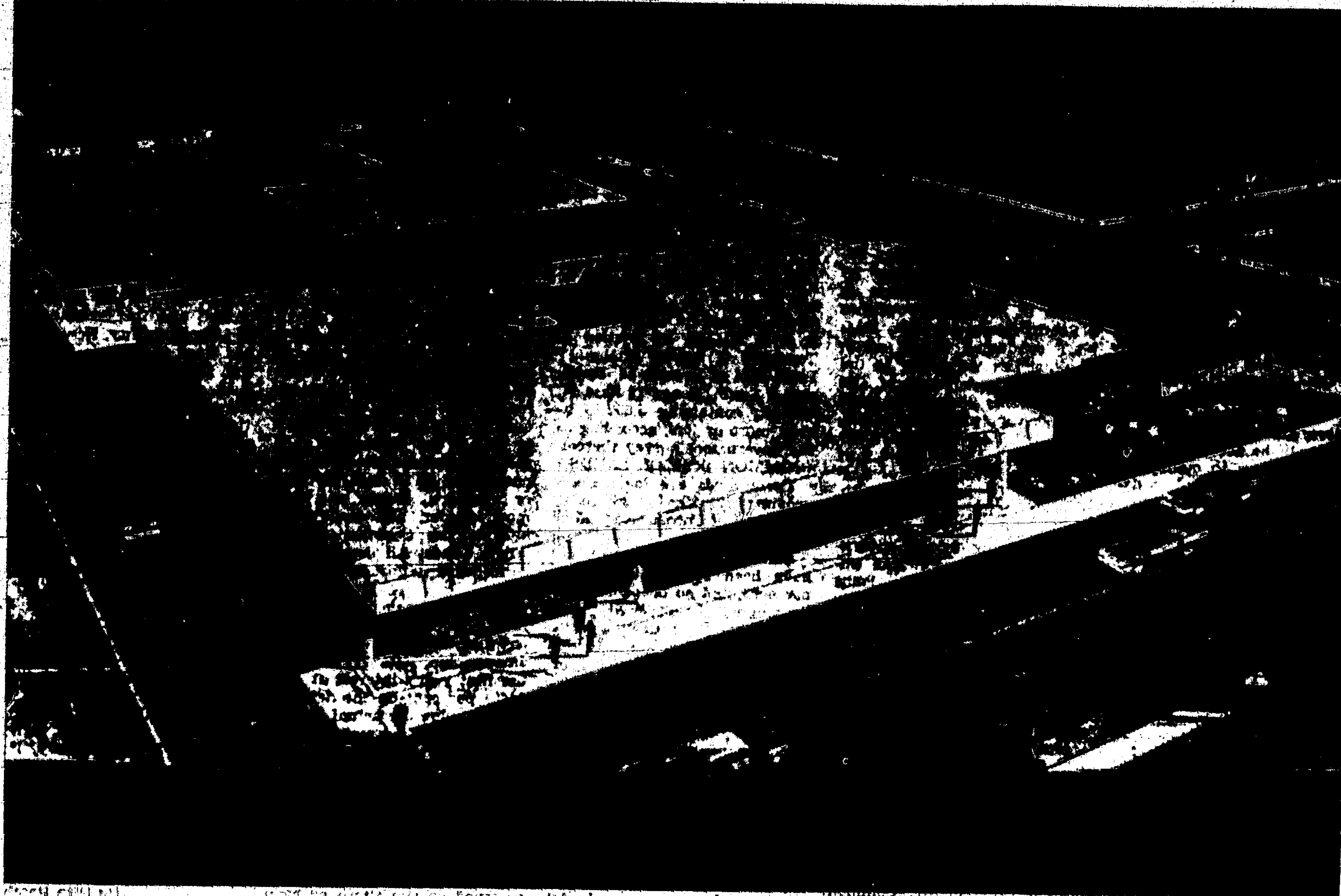

In selecting a prize winning exhibit it may be necessary to look over a bushel or more of carrots, beets, or others of the root crops. You may have to spend some time selecting tomatoes, peppers, eggplants, cabbage or other crops to get identical specimens.

Individual specimens must be uniform in size, shape and color. They must be properly labeled, true to variety name, and free from insect and disease blemish. They must have a good "eye appeal," being clean and fresh looking.

The size should be medium or a good market size. Do not select overgrown or small sizes. Some premium lists include classes for the largest turnip, rutabaga, tomato, or other crop, so in this class the largest size selection should be made.

"A page for independent thought"

## For Lincoln County

It's probably fair to say that most residents of Lincoln County are proud of the country that is their home-land, and equally proud of the particular area that is their own personal property. It follows that these same people want all parts of their country to show off well, besides doing service for the county.

This is easily proven by the many churches and schools of the county, all in pretty good shape and being improved as the years go by. One look at the beautiful mountains and grass lands in enough to give a feeling of pride to people who know and love the southwest.

A good many years have passed since county property owners were called on to show some of their pride by opening their pocketbook just a trifle. The year was 1948. At this time two propositions were presented to the voters, a hospital in Ruidoso and another in Carrizozo. General obligation bonds in the amount of \$72,000 were for the Ruidoso hospital, the only obligation the county has now which will be paid off in 1968. The vote for Carrizozo hospital was 670 for, 173 against, 523 for the Ruidoso hospital, 289 against.

In 1948 Vernon Petty was elected mayor of Carrizozo, John J. Christman became mayor of Ruidoso, and Theophile Laramie was elected mayor of Capitan. Capitan also carried a water bond issue 104 to 22 in this election.

Bon Sanchez announced as candidate for tax assessor and Benton McGinnis for county clerk. The sheriff's office bought several .38 caliber revolvers from the war assets administration.

Carrizozo had a business men's club in those days, and heard Donald McKay of the Southwestern Art Colony of Ruidoso give a talk on services available through the art colony.

Jack Harkey was driving a new Pontiac. A Baptist revival was going on at Corona with

Rev. John Smith doing the preaching and Roddy Coffman leading the songs.

In those good old days Tommy Knight, Walter Wilson and Charles Wilson were home from college for the Easter vacation. Sally Ortiz came out as candidate for sheriff.

The year is now 1963 and things have not changed a lot. Won't be long until candidates will be announcing for county office. Corona Baptists had a revival not long ago. Boys are still coming home from college at vacation time.

The thought for Lincoln County property owners to bear in mind is that their courthouse has aged another 15 years making it a ripe 53 and time to do something about this ancient structure.

It would seem likely that all Carrizoanos would be jumping and rooting for a new courthouse — but such is not the case, if the turnout at the meeting held here last week is any indication. Small crowd, all interested but nothing like you might expect.

Probably Carrizozo people are about like the rest of the county, they really don't know about the need, as do people who are around this building all the time and who are paying the upkeep bills on the old building. When they find out that the "need is real" they will probably figure their part of the cost is not too much for them to pay.

A span of 15 years is rather short, and in that length of time several revivals will be held, a lot of mayors will have served the incorporated towns in the county, water problems will be solved in several ways, politics will still be politics, and the courthouse addition can be a valuable asset to the county, all paid for in just a short span of 15 years.

### WILL THE LINCOLN COUNTY MINE BOOMING PREDICTION COME TRUE?

A few short months ago Larry Bailey walked into a Roswell bowling alley and made a casual remark to me: "Kit, they have found a mighty rich vein — 90 per cent horn silver!" My breath sucked in, and I almost fell over, being somewhat of a prospector myself.

Larry still bore signs of having spent several hours in the saddle, and was somewhat worn and haggard. Dust covered his boots that had been gathered from the skirts of Old Baldy, northwest of Ruidoso. He had been in the region with some prospectors who for several months had been poking around, digging a little here and there and running many sam-

ples. In this column I made the prediction that a mine boom was likely which would parallel — if not, indeed, surpass that of the rip-roaring White Oaks mining days. And everybody recalls one way or the other what a rich field that was. It had been found by a lone bandit — it is said, who traded his find for a couple of bucks, a jug of red eye, and a six-gun and rode out of the country. In a few short years millions were mined from the nearby hills of the present-day White Oaks, which had been the bandit's discovery.

A few days ago the Associated Press of Salt Lake City, Utah, dated-lined this account: "Millionaire Charles A. Steen, formerly known as a uranium tycoon, Saturday night (August 17) revealed important new discoveries of gold and silver in Utah and New Mexico. He announced the merge of several mining corporations in which he is the major stockholder. They are New Park Mining Co., East Utah Mining Co. and Grand Deposit Mining Co."

The account placed the gold findings in Utah. And the silver was located in New Mexico. Steen, in the report, declared the report on the silver was late as he wanted to avoid a "claims race."

**ORDINANCE NO. 84**  
AN ORDINANCE CONFIRMING THE PROCEEDINGS TAKEN IN PROVIDING FOR IMPROVING CERTAIN STREETS IN TOWN OF CARRIZOZO, NEW MEXICO, STREET IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT NO. 1, PROVIDING FOR THE PAYMENT OF THE COSTS AND EXPENSES OF SAID IMPROVEMENTS; PROVIDING FOR THE FILING OF A CLAIM OF LIEN; ASSESSING THE COST OF SAID IMPROVEMENTS AGAINST THE LOTS AND PARCELS OF LAND BENEFITED BY SAID IMPROVEMENTS; DESCRIBING THE MANNER FOR THE COLLECTION AND PAYMENT OF SAID ASSESSMENTS; PROVIDING PENALTY FOR DELINQUENT PAYMENTS; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of the Town of Carrizozo, in the County of Lincoln and State of New Mexico, has heretofore, pursuant to the requisite preliminary proceedings, provided for the grading, graveling, paving, macadamizing, draining, curbing, guttering, and otherwise improving of certain streets and parts thereof, with intersections, in said Town, all in accordance with the provisions of law relating thereto, said improvements being sometimes designated "Street Improvement District No. 1"; and

WHEREAS, the streets and parts thereof, with intersections, to be improved in said Town are as provisionally ordered in the resolution passed and approved the 7th day of May, 1963, except as modified by the resolution passed and approved on the 20th day of June, 1963, disposing of protests made at the provisional order hearing; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to said proceedings, the Board of Trustees duly and validly proceeded to advertise for the doing of the work therefor, and the Town formally entered into a contract on the 29th day of July, 1963, for the doing of such work and the furnishing of all necessary materials with the lowest bidder, Wylie Paving Co. of Albuquerque, New Mexico; and

WHEREAS, thereafter the Board of Trustees determined, and does hereby determine, that the total cost of such improvements, including the cost of intersections, and including all advertising, appraising, engineering, legal, printing and other incidental costs, is the sum of \$178,410.66; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees has determined, and does hereby determine, that said total cost of such improvements, including advertising, appraising, engineering, legal, printing and other incidental costs, shall be paid for by the property specially benefited by said improvements in accordance with the law, except for the sum of \$ None, which is available to defray a portion of said cost for sources other than assessments; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees has determined, and does hereby determine, that there shall be assessed to each lot or parcel of land abutting said streets, and specially benefited, its proportionate share of the balance of said cost, to-wit, the sum of \$178,410.66, calculated on a frontage (i.e., front foot) basis; provided, that an equitable adjustment has been made for assessments levied against any irregular lots or lands and for any tract or parcel of land not specially benefited by any improvement, so that the assessments according to benefits are equitable, equal and uniform; and

WHEREAS, said assessments in no event exceed the estimated benefits to the property assessed nor that portion of the total costs of the improvements payable in assessments as heretofore determined; and

WHEREAS, after the making of said contract and the determination of the portion of the costs of such work to be paid by the property specially benefited, the Board of Trustees, together with the municipal engineer, made out an assessment roll containing, among other things, the names of the last-known owners of the property to be assessed, or if not known that the name is unknown, a description of each tract or parcel of land to be assessed, and the amount of the assessment thereon; and

such assessments, and by all parties aggrieved by such assessments, to said assessment roll, including, without limiting the generality of the foregoing, the regularity of the proceedings in making any assessment therein, and the correctness of such assessment or of the amount levied on any particular tract or parcel of land to be assessed, would be heard by said Board of Trustees; and

WHEREAS, said Board of Trustees caused said roll to be filed in the records in the office of the Clerk of said Town on the 16th day of August, 1963; and said Clerk by publication in a newspaper and by mail gave the requisite notice of the time and place of such hearing, of the filing of said assessment roll in his office, of the date of filing the same, of the right of any such persons so to object specifically in writing, and of the waiver of any objection in the absence of such objection; and

WHEREAS, at the time and place so designated for hearing such objections, as from time to time adjourned, said Board of Trustees met to hear and determine all objections so filed by any interested party, and confirmed said assessment roll by resolution duly adopted on the 5th day of September, 1963; and

WHEREAS, all protests and objections, both written and oral, were heard and considered by the Board of Trustees and were found to be without merit and overruled; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees nevertheless concluded that it was necessary and equitable that the assessment roll be corrected and revised and such correction and revision was made by said resolution, pursuant to Section 14-37-20, New Mexico Statutes Annotated, 1953; and

WHEREAS, it is incumbent upon the Board of Trustees to provide herein when said assessments shall become due and delinquent, the rate of interest payable thereon, and the penalties payable after delinquency.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE TOWN OF CARRIZOZO, NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. That all action heretofore taken (not inconsistent with the provisions of this ordinance) by the Town of Carrizozo and the officers of said Town directed toward the grading, graveling, paving, macadamizing, draining, curbing, guttering, and otherwise improving of certain streets and parts thereof, with intersections, hereinabove specified, said improvements being sometimes designated as "Carrizozo, New Mexico, Street Improvement District No. 1," and toward performing all prerequisites to levying special assessments and to fixing the assessment lien against the property in said District, be, and the same hereby is ratified, approved and confirmed.

Section 2. That for the purpose of paying the costs and expenses of the said improvements there be, and there hereby is, levied and assessed against the lots and parcels of land in said District, being all those specially benefited by said improvements, in the Town of Carrizozo, Lincoln County, New Mexico, and described in the assessment roll for said District, as filed in the office of the Town Clerk on the 16th day of August, 1963, and as modified and confirmed by resolution duly adopted by said Board of Trustees on the 16th day of August, 1963, the amounts and assessments shown in said roll.

Section 3. That said assessments shall be due and payable at the office of the Town Treasurer within thirty days after the date of publication of this ordinance becomes effective, i.e., within thirty-five days after the date of its publication in one issue of the Lincoln County News, a newspaper published in and of general circulation in the Town, without interest and without demand; provided, that all or any part of such assessments may, at the election of the owner, be paid in installments, with interest, as hereinafter provided. Failure to pay the whole assessment within said period of thirty days shall be conclusively considered and held an election on the part of all persons interested, whether under disability or otherwise, to pay the unpaid assessment in such installments. In case of such election to pay in installments, the unpaid assessments shall be payable in twenty substantially equal semiannual installments of principal, until paid in full, with interest in all cases on the unpaid and deferred installments of principal from the date of publication of this ordinance after passage and approval, at the rate of seven per centum (7%) per annum, both principal and interest being payable semiannually at the office of the Town Treasurer on the first days of April and October in each year, commencing the first day of April, 1964. Failure to pay any installment when due, shall cause the whole

of the unpaid principal to become due and payable immediately, at the option of the Town, the exercise of said option to be indicated by the commencement of foreclosure proceedings; and the whole amount of the unpaid principal and accrued interest shall, after such delinquency, whether said option is or is not exercised, bear penalty at the rate of one per centum (1%) per month, until the day of sale or until paid, but at any time prior to the day of the sale, the owner may pay the amount of all delinquent installments originally becoming due on or before the date of said payment, with interest thereon, and all penalties accrued, and shall thereupon be restored to the right thereafter to pay in installments the same manner as if default had not been suffered. The owner of any property not in default as to any installment or payment may, at any time, pay the whole or any semiannual installment of interest accruing thereon to the next interest payment date.

Section 4. That the amounts assessed as aforesaid shall be a lien upon said lots and parcels of land from the date of publication of this ordinance, co-equal with the lien of other taxes and prior and superior to all other liens, claims and titles. The sale of any such lot or parcel of land for general or other taxes shall not relieve such lot or parcel of land from such assessment or the lien therefor.

Section 5. That in case any such lot or parcel of land so assessed is delinquent in the payment of such assessment or any installment of principal or interest, the Board of Trustees shall forthwith cause Stern Brothers & Co., Albuquerque, New Mexico, or any person, partnership or corporation hereafter designated in writing by that firm or its successor, as representative of the holder or holders of the bonds to be hereafter authorized to be issued by ordinance for the purpose of defraying a portion of the cost of the improvements in said Street Improvement District No. 1, and the owner of such delinquent property, if known, to be immediately notified in writing of such delinquency, by first-class mail, postage prepaid, addressed to the addresser's last-known address; and if such delinquency shall not be paid within ten days after such notice shall have been given by deposit in the United States mail, then said Board of Trustees, at its own expense, shall forthwith foreclose the special assessment lien against the property or properties wherein the delinquency exists in the method now or hereafter provided by statute for the foreclosure of mortgages on real estate, or as otherwise provided by law, and at such sale, if there be no other purchaser therefor, such property shall be bought by the Town for not less than the amount of the balance due on the assessment, principal, interest, penalty and costs. If said foreclosure be not promptly filed and prosecuted, then any bondholder may file and prosecute said foreclosure action in the name of said Town. Any bondholder may also proceed against the Town to protect and enforce the rights of the bondholders under this ordinance by suit, action, or special proceedings in equity or at law, either for the appointment of a receiver or for the specific performance of any provision contained herein or in an award of execution of any power herein granted for the enforcement of any proper, legal, or equitable remedy as such bondholder or bondholders may deem most effectual to protect and enforce the rights aforesaid. All such proceedings at law or in equity shall be instituted, had, and maintained for the equal benefit of all holders of the bonds and coupons then outstanding. The failure of the bondholders to foreclose such delinquent assessments, or so to proceed against the Town, or both, shall not relieve the Town or any of its officers, agents or employees of any liability for its failure so to foreclose such delinquent assessments.

Section 6. That it shall be the duty of the Town Clerk to make out, sign, attest with the seal of the Town, and file for record within sixty days after the publication of this ordinance, but after the termination of the thirty-day period hereinabove provided for in Section 3 of this ordinance, in the office of the County Clerk of Lincoln County, a claim of lien for the amount due and assessed against each lot and parcel of land, as above specified, and then remaining unpaid; and all purchases, mortgages, and encumbrances of said lots and parcels of land shall take the same subject to such lien. When said assessments and the installments thereof, and the interest thereon, and any penalties, have been paid in full, it shall be the duty of said Town Clerk to release and discharge the said lien and liability.

Section 7. That said claim of lien to be so filed for record

shall be in substantially the following form:

WHEREAS, the Town regularly and formally entered into a contract, in compliance with law, on the 29th day of July, 1963, for the construction of said improvements with the lowest bidder, Wylie Paving Co. of Albuquerque, New Mexico; and

WHEREAS, the Town has determined that the total cost to the Town for the acquisition of such improvements, including all engineering, legal and incidental expenses, is the sum of \$ \_\_\_\_\_; and

WHEREAS, the Town of Carrizozo, by Ordinance No. \_\_\_\_\_, passed, adopted, signed and approved on the \_\_\_\_\_ day of \_\_\_\_\_, 1963, levied and assessed against the property benefited by said improvements and against the owners thereof, certain amounts, as hereinafter described, totaling the sum of \$ \_\_\_\_\_; and

WHEREAS, said Ordinance No. \_\_\_\_\_ provided that the assessments hereinbefore fixed should be due and payable within thirty days after said ordinance became effective, without interest and without demand; provided, that all or any part of such assessments might, at the election of the owner, be paid in twenty substantially equal semiannual installments of principal until paid in full; and

WHEREAS, the unpaid assessments shall bear interest at the rate of seven per centum (7%) per annum from the date of publication of said ordinance, i.e., the \_\_\_\_\_ day of \_\_\_\_\_, 1963, both principal and interest being payable semiannually on the first days of April and October in each year, commencing on the first day of April, 1964, at the office of the Town Treasurer.

mount of the tax imposed by this ordinance, as amended, is segregated as set out above, if the taxpayer collects from the customer more than the amount of the tax imposed by this ordinance, as amended, then such amount collected in excess shall be considered as a part of the gross receipts and subject to the tax imposed by this ordinance, as amended.

"gross proceeds of sales" means the sum or value proceeding or accruing from the sale of tangible personal property, including the proceeds from the sale of any property handled on consignment by the taxpayer and including any services that are a part of such sales, but not including the taxes imposed by this ordinance, as amended, unless such taxes are not segregated from such sums or value proceeding or accruing, whether received in money or otherwise, including all receipts, cash, credits, and property of any kind or nature and also the amount for which credit is allowed by the seller to the purchaser, without any deduction therefrom on account of the cost of the property sold, the cost of materials used, labor or service cost, interest paid, losses, or any other expenses whatsoever; provided that, even though the amount of the tax imposed by this ordinance, as amended, is segregated as set out above, if the taxpayer collects from the customer more than the amount of the tax imposed by this ordinance, as amended, then such amount collected in excess of the amount of such tax shall be considered as a part of the gross proceeds of sales and subject to the tax imposed by this ordinance, as amended; provided further, that cash discounts allowed and taken on sales shall not be included, and gross proceeds of sales shall not include the sale price of property returned by customers when the full sale price thereof is refunded either in cash or by credit.

F. "business" includes all activities or acts engaged in, personal, professional, and corporate, or caused to be engaged in with the object of gain, benefit or advantage either direct or indirect.

G. "engaging" when used with reference to engaging or continuing in a business or profession, includes the exercise of corporate or franchise power, but it does not include occasional and isolated sales, or transactions by a person who does not hold himself out as engaged in business.

H. "retail" means, except as herein otherwise provided, the sales of tangible personal property for consumption and not for resale in the form of tangible personal property, and "retailer" means every person engaged in the business of making sales at retail.

I. "consumption" means any use of tangible personal property, goods, wares and merchandise in such manner that the same shall never again enter trade channels as a commodity or article of merchandise; and "consumer" means any person buying tangible personal property, goods, wares and merchandise for use in such manner that the same shall not hereafter enter trade channels as a commodity or article of merchandise for sale, and shall include persons, firms and corporations engaged in the business of contracting as contemplated by Section 3-C of this ordinance.

J. "wholesaler" or "jobber" means any person who sells tangible personal property for resale and not for consumption by the purchaser.

K. "tax" means the sales tax.

of the gross receipts of the business of every person engaging or continuing in the business of selling at retail of goods, wares, materials, equipment, machinery and commodities; including airplane parts and equipment; alcohol and all alcoholic liquors and beverages for consumption and not for resale and including receipts from rentals or leasing of tangible personal property, including airplanes, but not including scheduled airline companies; provided that the gross receipts of all livestock, feeds for livestock or poultry and all seeds, roots, bulbs, plants, fertilizer, insecticides, fungicides, weedicides applied to land shall be deductible before computing the tax due under this section; and, provided that sales of coal in carload lots shall, for the purpose of this ordinance, as amended, be considered as wholesale sales. Provided, that coal sold to a licensed retail coal dealer and hauled from the mine by truck for the purpose of resale shall be considered as in carload lots for the purpose of this section; provided, that a person engaged in selling at retail new or secondhand airplanes, agricultural implements and tractors or new and secondhand vehicles not subject to registration shall pay a tax of one-half percent upon the gross receipts of sales of such commodities; and further provided that allowances for trade-ins on the purchase of tangible personal property shall be deductible before computing the tax due under this section; provided that in consideration of the provisions of Section 64-11-15 New Mexico Statutes Annotated, 1933 Compilation, the sales of new and second hand vehicles of a type required to be registered in this state shall be exempt from the tax. No person, firm or corporation shall hereafter charge or collect in excess of one percent for the purpose of this ordinance. In addition to the one percent tax provided by this section there is imposed on each retailer a tax computed at the rate of one-sixteenth of one percent of the gross receipts attributable to sales of goods which were not purchased by him for resale from a wholesaler as defined in Section 2 of this ordinance.

B. ELECTRIC, GAS TRANSMISSION AND TRANSPORTATION BUSINESS. At an amount equal to one percent of the gross receipts derived from such businesses of every person engaging or continuing in the following businesses:

(1) furnishing to consumers, electricity, or electrical power, natural or artificial gas, water for domestic, commercial and industrial purposes;

(2) transmitting messages or conversation originating within the corporate limits of the Town of Carrizozo by telegraph, telephone or radio, to another point within the corporate limits of the Town of Carrizozo;

(3) transporting for hire persons or property by railroad, motor vehicle, air transportation, pipeline or by any other means, and including all express shipping car, parlor car, collect on delivery and any other special or extra service in connection therewith; provided that no tax shall be imposed on the gross receipts arising from the transportation of timber or timber products owned by the taxpayer or owned by a corporation owning at least ninety percent of the capital stock of the taxpayer; and

(4) all other transportation services of any kind including street railways, buses, taxicabs, driverless cars and any service for which a franchise, permit or license is required from any government agency as a condition to the use of the streets or highways in this town, but not including the transportation of property by the actual owner thereof;

(5) provided, that no tax shall be imposed on the gross receipts arising from messages transmitted by wire or other means, transporting for hire persons, or property by railroad, motor vehicle, air transportation, or by any other means from one point within a municipality to another point outside the municipality.

C. CONTRACTORS. Upon the business of contracting, rental of contracting equipment or construction and sale of residential buildings, the tax shall be as follows:

(1) At an amount equal to one-half (1/2) of one (1) percent of the gross receipts of the business of every person engaging or continuing in the business of contracting for the construction, re-construction, repair or improvement of any building, dwelling or edifice, as original contractor, sub-contractor, or independent contractor, or engaging or continuing in the business of contracting for the construction, repair or improvement of highways, bridges, transmission lines, dams, canals, public or private excavation for the laying of pipeline, erection and repair of oil storage tanks, water tanks,

construction of railroads, railroad terminals, the drilling of wells, oil wells, sinking of shafts or driving of tunnels, in mines, tanking, land clearing, cutting timber, and general excavation dirt work, or in any other similar work or performance in which each person, firm or corporation convenients, bargains or agrees to perform said work for a stipulated sum of money, or thing of value or at a cost plus a percentage or additional sum; provided however, that a contractor cutting and sawing timber, which will be further processed by a lumber or saw mill before use, the cutting and sawing thereof shall be considered as manufacturing and preparing for commercial use and shall not be taxed under this ordinance.

(2) The rental of contractors' teams, with or without drivers, and of contractors' machinery and equipment, with or without operators shall be considered a sale of service and the income therefrom shall be taxable at the rate of one (1) percent without deduction.

(3) At an amount equal to one-half (1/2) of one (1) percent of the gross receipts of the business of every person engaging or continuing in the business of the construction and sale of residential homes, either as original contractor, sub-contractor, independent contractor or builder thereof.

Residential homes, as used in this paragraph, shall be deemed to include any single family dwelling, or multiple dwelling containing not more than three apartments, primarily intended to be used as a dwelling place by the occupants thereof.

D. AMUSEMENT ENTERPRISES. The tax shall be computed at an amount equal to one percent (1%) of the gross receipts of the business of every person engaging or continuing in the business of conducting any amusement enterprise, including theaters, picture shows, radio broadcasting stations, location businesses, sales or punchboard operations, carnivals, circuses, amusement parks, menageries, dog shows, horse shows, fairs, races, rodeos, games, dance halls, pool or billiard halls, or any business charging admission for any exhibition for amusement, education or instruction; provided that any religious, fraternal, educational or other non-profit organization not regularly engaged in such enterprises shall be exempt from taxation on the gross receipts of such operations conducted exclusively by them and for their sole benefit, and upon the gross income received by them as sponsors of such enterprise. All persons conducting dog shows, traveling circuses, horse shows, rodeos, and amusement enterprises of all kinds shall be subject to and pay the tax on the gross receipts of any and all concessions operated in connection therewith.

E. PROFESSIONAL SERVICES. The tax shall be computed at an amount equal to one percent (1%) of the gross receipts of any person engaging or continuing in the practice of any profession, or of any business in which the service rendered is of a professional, technical or scientific nature and is paid for on a fee basis or by a consideration in the nature of a retailer.

F. BUSINESS SERVICES. The tax shall be computed at an amount equal to one percent (1%) of the gross receipts of any person engaging or continuing in any of the following or similar businesses: laundries, abstractors, undertaking establishments, barber shops, beauty parlors, hotels, camp grounds, rooming and boarding houses, bath and bath houses, restaurants, filling stations, retail oil stations, fire service stations, storage garages, repair establishments of all kinds, tailors, cleaning or pressing of clothes or other articles, publication of newspapers (but the gross receipts of the business of publishing newspapers or magazines shall include only the amounts received for the sale of advertising space, billboards, and any other price or fee basis; provided that thrashing or cleaning of agricultural products, including the ginning of cotton, and the processing or manufacturing of lumber for a wholesaler or retailer shall be considered as manufacturing and preparing for commercial use and shall be excluded from the provisions of this ordinance. None of the income received by hotels, camp grounds and rooming houses from lodgers, guests or roomers, shall be considered as real estate rentals, irrespective of the duration of the habitation or occupancy of such lodger, guest or roomer.

G. REAL ESTATE AGENTS AND STOCKBROKERS. The tax shall be computed at an amount equal to one percent (1%) of the gross receipts of every person engaging or continuing in the business of selling real estate or in the business of buying and selling stock, bonds or other securities for a principal, but the gross receipts of such

person shall include only the total amount of the commission for such business.

H. FACTORS, AGENTS, BROKERS, MANUFACTURERS REPRESENTATIVES. (a) The tax shall be computed at an amount equal to one percent (1%) of the gross receipts of the business of every person engaging or continuing in the business of acting as factor, agent or broker selling on a commission basis, and where title to the goods, wares or merchandise sold does not vest in such person at any time during the transaction; provided that a factor, agent or broker who buys and sells merchandise for his own account shall so far as all such transactions are concerned, be considered as a wholesaler, or retailer, as the case may be, and be subject to tax only as a retailer.

(b) Manufacturers representatives shall be exempt from the tax applicable under this subsection.

Section 4. EXCEPTION OF CERTAIN SALES TO UNITED STATES, STATE AGENCIES, SCHOOLS, COLLEGES, HOSPITALS, AND RELIGIOUS OR CHARITABLE ORGANIZATIONS NOT FOR PROFIT. None of the taxes levied by this ordinance, as amended, shall be construed to apply to:

A. sales of tangible personal property, other than metalliferous mineral ores, whether refined or unrefined, made to the government of the United States, its departments or agencies;

B. sales of tangible personal property, other than metalliferous mineral ores, whether refined or unrefined, made to the State of New Mexico or any of its political subdivisions; and

C. sales of tangible personal property, other than metalliferous mineral ores, whether refined or unrefined, made to non-profit schools, colleges, hospitals, religious or charitable organizations in the conduct of their regular hospital, religious, charitable or non-profit function.

Section 5. EXEMPTION FOR INSTRUMENTALITIES OF ARMED FORCES OF THE UNITED STATES-EXCEPTIONS. No sales taxes of the Town of Carrizozo, direct or indirect, shall be imposed upon the sale, use, delivery or storage of articles of merchandise to or by any instrumentality of the armed forces of the United States engaged in resale activities, but this paragraph does not affect those sales taxes which are specifically authorized by Acts of Congress of the United States, and those sales taxes levied on spirituous liquors and wine as they are defined in section 61-101, New Mexico Statutes Annotated, 1941 Compilation (46-1-1).

Section 6. CHARGE AND TIME SALES.

A. In the case of charge and time sales or transaction the amount thereof may, at the taxpayer's option, be included in the gross proceeds of sales or gross receipts only as and when payments are received by the seller. Conditional sales and lease contracts shall be treated as time sales, and if the taxpayer so elects, the tax shall be paid only upon the amounts received under such contract; provided, that in the event the seller, or lessor, who has so elected, transfers his interest in any such contract to some third person he shall pay the tax upon the full sale price of the commodity involved, unless a record is kept of payments thereafter made on such contracts in such manner that the Bureau of Revenue can at all times ascertain from the records of the seller the amount paid thereon by the purchaser. The taxpayer shall indicate his election hereunder in such form as the Bureau of Revenue shall prescribe.

B. It shall be unlawful for any person engaged in any business or profession to directly advertise that any tax imposed by this ordinance is not considered as an element of the price of property sold or service rendered.

Section 7. DETERMINING GROSS RECEIPTS WHERE SALE PRICE NOT INDICATIVE OF TRUE VALUE. In determining the gross receipts from sales as regards sales from one to another of affiliated companies or persons, or under such circumstances where the relation between buyer and seller is such that the amount of the sale price is not indicative of the true value of the subject-matter of the sale, the Bureau of Revenue shall prescribe uniform rules and regulations for determining the gross receipts of such sales upon which the taxes imposed by this ordinance under the appropriate classification, shall be levied, which value shall correspond as nearly as possible to the gross proceeds from the sale of similar products of like quality or character by other businesses where no common interest exists between the buyer and seller, but otherwise under similar circumstances and conditions.

Section 8. TUNES PAID TO

UNITED STATES AS TAXES EXCEPTED FROM GROSS RECEIPTS. In all computations of the tax levied by this ordinance there shall be excepted from the gross receipts or gross proceeds of sales of any business all sums paid by the taxpayers to the United States as taxes on the product produced or sold, or on such business; provided that this exception shall not include any stamp or income tax in any form. The word "stamp" as used in this section shall mean any impression made by order of the state or federal government, on paper, which must be affixed to any article or commodity produced or sold, which is subject to the provisions of this ordinance to signify payment of a tax thereon.

Section 9. PRESUMPTION TO PREVENT EVASION-REBUTTED BY RESALE CERTIFICATE-RESALE CERTIFICATE-RETAIL SALE. For the purpose of preventing evasion of taxes imposed by this ordinance, as amended, the presumption shall be that the receipts of all sales of tangible personal property shall be the measure of the tax imposed under Section 3 of this ordinance, as amended, at the rate of one percent (1%). This presumption may be rebutted by the presentation of a resale certificate executed by the purchaser containing such information, and in such form as may be prescribed by the Bureau of Revenue, accompanied by the sales tickets hereinafter mentioned. A resale certificate shall be accepted by the seller only from recognized retail dealers, restaurants, wholesalers, distributors, jobbers, or manufacturers of tangible personal property, including alcoholic liquors and beverages. Such resale certificates shall, when accepted by a seller, be by him preserved as a matter of record and shall be accessible at all reasonable hours to the Bureau of Revenue or its authorized agents for inspection and examination. Each credit, case or C.O.D. sale to a recognized retail dealer, restaurant, wholesaler, distributor, jobber or manufacturer of tangible personal property, including alcoholic liquors and beverages, shall be considered for the purpose of this ordinance, as amended, to be a retail sale, and taxable at the retail rate, unless the sales ticket or evidence of each sale shall show the name and address of the purchaser, the description of the merchandise purchased and date of delivery. Any person who executes a false resale certificate shall be deemed guilty of violation of this ordinance, as amended, and shall be punished as provided by Section 17 of this ordinance, as amended.

Section 10. SPECIFIC EXEMPTIONS. There are exempted from the taxes imposed by this ordinance, as amended, the following:

(1) the sale of live poultry and the unprocessed products of the farm, ranch, grove or garden when made by the grower or producer thereof, and duly organized non-profit cooperative market associations, the members of which are bona fide growers or producers, shall be considered to be growers or producers, for the purpose of this section; the sale of livestock on the hoof when made by the grower or producer or trapper thereof, and persons engaged in the sole business of buying and selling wool or mohair shall be considered to be growers or producers for the purposes of this section. This section is not to be construed to include the business of commercial dairying, selling its products at retail;

(2) premiums collected by insurance companies;

(3) income received in the form of ordinary wages or salaries;

(4) the proceeds of the sale of school books where the price is fixed by the state;

(5) gross receipts of hospitals, infirmaries or sanitariums;

(6) income received in the form of interest on money loaned, or in the form of dividends from stocks, bonds, securities or from real estate rentals, and the proceeds from the sale of stocks, bonds and other securities;

(7) proceeds from the sale and circulation of newspapers, provided, however, that this exemption shall not apply to the sale of advertising space in such publications;

(8) proceeds from the sale of gasoline or motor fuel on which a tax for the sale or use thereof is imposed by the laws of this state, provided, however, that this exemption is extended only to the tax imposed by Section 3-A and H of this ordinance, as amended; provided further, that this exemption shall not apply to the proceeds of the sale of gasoline or motor fuel on which

a refund is claimed under the provisions of Section 64-26-31 and 64-26-32, New Mexico Statutes Annotated, 1933 Compilation (being Laws 1931, Chapter 31, Sections 1 and 2, as amended) or any act amendatory thereto;

(9) the sale of water for irrigation purposes;

(10) gross receipts from the dormitories and dining halls of state educational institutions;

(11) the gross receipts of the business of every person engaged or continuing in the business of severing oil, natural gas or carbon dioxide from the soil taxed under the provisions of the Oil and Gas Emergency School Tax Act;

(12) facilities and services provided by state and national banks and building and loan associations;

(13) income from tuition payments received by public, parochial or private non-profit schools, colleges and universities;

(14) sales of meals, food and drinks on common carriers operating through the Town of Carrizozo;

(15) gross receipts arising from messages transmitted by wire or other means, transporting for hire persons or property by railroad, motor bus, truck, or air transportation between a point within the municipality and a point outside the municipality.

Section 11. DEDUCTING COSTS OF ADMINISTRATION AND ENFORCEMENT. There is hereby appropriated out of the Town of Carrizozo General Sales Tax Fund an amount not to exceed five (5%) percent of all moneys collected under this ordinance, as amended, equal to the amount determined by the Commissioner of the Bureau of Revenue of the State of New Mexico to be needed for costs of administration and enforcement of this ordinance, as amended.

Section 12. TRANSFER OF FUNDS. All sums remain in the Town of Carrizozo, General Sales Tax Fund shall be transferred by the state treasurer on the order of the Commissioner of the Bureau of Revenue as soon as is allowable by the Emergency School Tax Act, as amended, to the Treasurer of the Town of Carrizozo less administrative costs deducted therefrom, which remittance the Town Treasurer is hereby directed to deposit in the General Fund of the Town of Carrizozo.

Section 13. DUTY OF ADMINISTRATION AND ENFORCEMENT. The duty of administering, enforcing and interpreting this ordinance, as amended and the collection of taxes as may be required shall be the duty of the Bureau of Revenue of the State of New Mexico or such other administrative agent as may be designated by the State Legislature from time to time. This ordinance, as amended, shall be enforced and the tax collected in the same manner and at the same time as the State Emergency School Tax is collected.

Section 14. EXCESS OR ERRONEOUS PAYMENT. If under this ordinance, the taxpayer had paid an amount in excess of that properly due from him, or has paid an amount not due from him by reason of no tax liability, and the excess payment or erroneous payment was paid by reason of a mistake of fact, as distinguished from a mistake of law, the amount of the excess or erroneous payment shall be credited by the bureau of revenue against any municipal sales tax thereafter due from the taxpayer. If the credit, or any part of the credit, cannot be utilized by the taxpayer, as provided in this section, then the credit or unused balance of the credit may, upon application by the taxpayer, be refunded on certificate which certificate states that the commissioner of revenue finds the refund is proper; provided, however, no claim or application for credit or refund shall be filed more than eight months after payment, and failure to file a claim or application with the bureau within that time shall constitute a waiver of claim against the municipality on account of the questioned payment. Refunds will be made only as and when funds of the municipality sufficient to meet the refund are in the hands of the bureau of revenue.

Section 15. CIVIL PENALTIES.

A. In addition to his liability for any tax due, a taxpayer is subject to civil penalties when he:

(1) fails to file a required quarterly return within the required time; or

(2) remits less than the amount due with his quarterly return; or

(3) without reasonable cause, fails to make a required monthly deposit; or

(4) without reasonable cause, remits less than the amount due as a monthly deposit.

B. For acts or omissions set

out in Subsection A of this section, the following civil penalties shall be assessed and collected by the bureau:

(1) interest on the unpaid balance at the rate of one-half of one percent a month from the time the tax was due until paid; and

(2) ten percent of the unpaid balance if the insufficient remittance or failure to make a monthly deposit or file a quarterly return is due to negligence of the taxpayer; or

(3) fifty percent of the unpaid balance if the insufficient remittance or failure to make a monthly deposit or file a quarterly return is due to an intent to evade the tax liability.

Section 16. PREVENTING SUIT BEFORE COLLECTION-PERMITTING SUIT AFTER PAYMENT UNDER PROTEST-LIMITATIONS - JUDGMENTS-APPEALS. - No injunction or writ of mandamus, or other legal or equitable process shall issue in any suit, action or proceeding in any court of this state, against any officer of the state, to prevent or enjoin the collection of any tax, penalty or interest under this ordinance, but after payment of any such tax, penalty or interest under protest, which protest shall be duly verified by oath and shall set forth the grounds of objection to the legality of the tax, the taxpayer may bring action against the bureau of revenue and the municipality in the district court of Santa Fe County for the recovery of any tax, interest or penalty so paid under protest. No such action shall be instituted more than four months after such payment under protest is made, and failure to bring suit within said four months shall constitute a waiver of said protest and of all claims against the municipality of any illegality in the tax so paid. No grounds of illegality of the tax shall be considered by the court other than those set forth in the protest filed at the time payment is made; provided, however, that any payments of tax made under protest subsequent to the original protested item and prior to the institution of the action within the aforesaid four months, may be included or incorporated in a prior protest shall be held subject to the determination of said suit if the protest so provided and is made on the identical legal grounds, and no waiver or protest shall result although the period of four months may have elapsed before the action is finally determined. Appeals from the final judgment of the district court may be taken to the Supreme Court by either party in the same manner as appeals in civil cases are taken.

If in any such action judgment is rendered for the plaintiff, the amount of the judgment shall first be credited on any taxes due from plaintiff under this act and on any penalties or interest due on such taxes, and the balance of the judgment shall be paid to plaintiff. In any such judgment, interest shall be allowed at the rate of two per cent (2%) per year upon the amount found to have been illegally collected. Such judgment and interest shall be paid out of the suspense fund hereinafter provided.

Section 17. DUTY TO DELIVER CERTIFIED COPIES OF ORDINANCE. Upon passage of this ordinance, as amended, by the Board of Trustees of the Town of Carrizozo, it shall be the duty of the Town Clerk of the Town of Carrizozo to deliver to the State Tax Commission and to the Commissioner of the Bureau of Revenue of the State of New Mexico a certified copy of this ordinance, as amended.

Section 18. SEVERABILITY. The provisions of this ordinance, as amended, are severable. If any provision of this ordinance, as amended, or application thereof to any person or circumstance is held invalid, the remainder of the ordinance, as amended, and the application of such provision to other persons or circumstances shall not be affected thereby.

Section 19. PENALTY FOR VIOLATION. Any person convicted of violating the provisions of this ordinance, as amended, shall be punished by a fine of not less than Twenty-Five (\$25) Dollars nor more than Three Hundred (\$300) Dollars or by imprisonment for a period of not more than ninety (90) days, and each day this ordinance, as amended, is violated shall constitute a separate offense.

Section 20. EFFECTIVE DATE. The tax to be collected under this ordinance, as amended, shall be imposed and collected on or after September 1, 1943.

Section 21. REPEALING CLAUSE. All ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed; provided, however, that the date of repeal of such ordinance shall coincide with the first date of allowable collection under this ordinance and not until such time.

Section 22. EMERGENCY. This ordinance, as amended, is hereby declared to be an emergency measure on the ground of urgent public need. It is therefore to become effective immediately upon its passage and publication as provided by law.

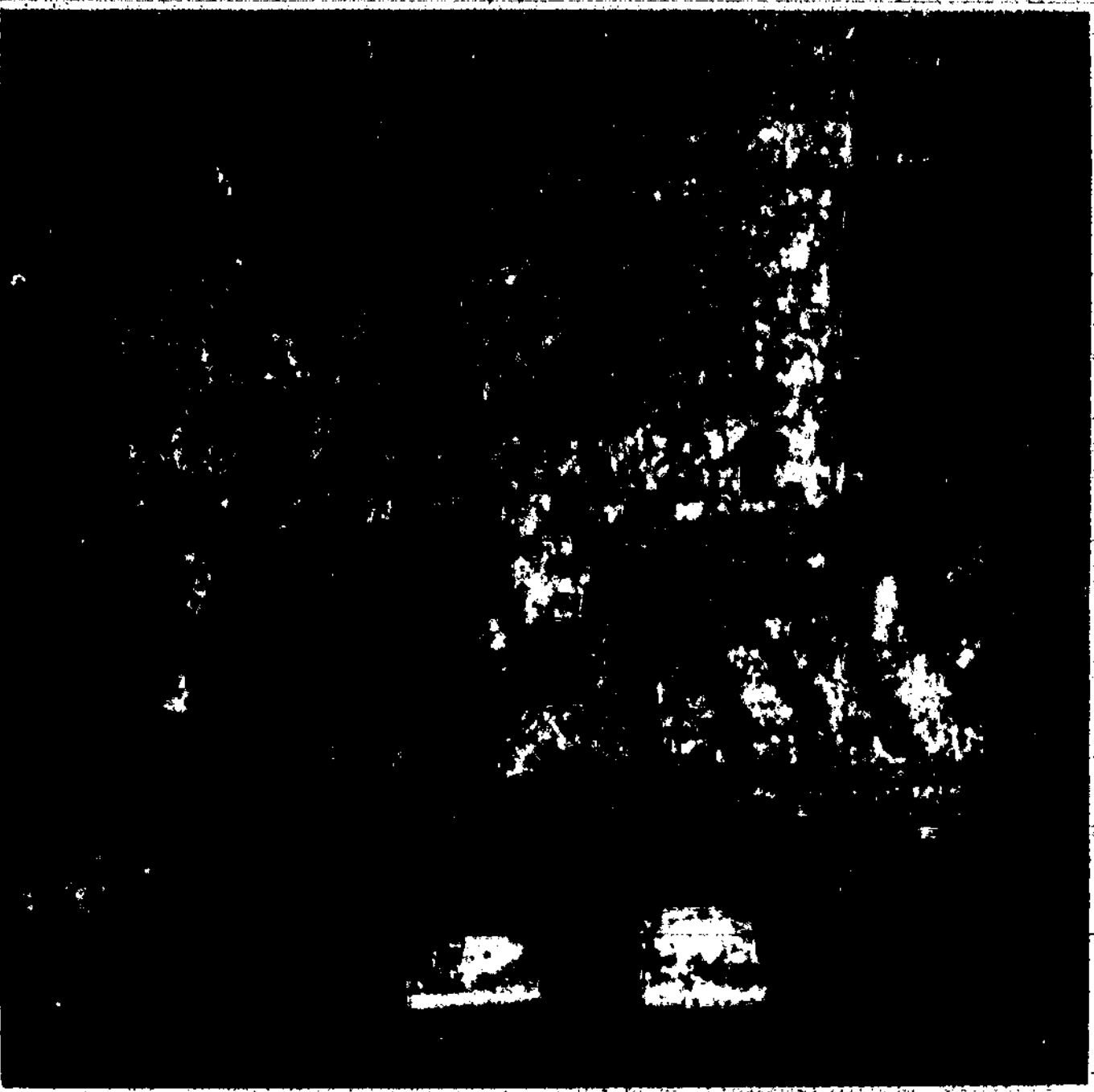

## Ft. Stanton summer school session activity ends with fall semester

School work displayed of the ceramics, plaster of paris reliefs, free hand drawing, bead stringing, scatter painting, weaving, and the latest art form the east coast, decoupage.

Mrs. Hattie Lacy, school teacher at Fort Stanton, was selected teacher of the year in 1959. The special talent of Mrs. Lacy's is the gift to find the hidden talents of her students, this fact, definitely shown in the work displayed by her students. Fort Stanton not only heals the students of TB, to return to their respective communities and take their rightful place again in society but trains them early in their formative years, for come, their future vocation: or for some a trend of their future vocation. There are exceptions, of course, and Harold Black of Hobbs is one. Harold will graduate next spring but has finished his high school work under the supervision of Mrs. Lacy. He will be accepted for college entrance with these credits. Harold does free hand drawing and did not know of his talent until Mrs. Lacy brought this talent from within himself. As of now, Harold wants to further his career in the fine arts with business accounting as his minor.

The bead stringing consisting of Macaroni, Colored with water colors and crayons, were colored and strung by the first graders. They also wove beads necklaces of the Navajo Indian designs.

The plaster of paris reliefs, the ceramic molds for leaves, which were made from real leaves of this particular section of the country, were made and colored by the sixth grade science class.

The Students have taken cigar boxes, glasses and glass jars painted and designed them with the latest decoupage art and then varnished them to preserve the art. The material the students used were water colors, crayons, ceramic glazes, wood stains and spray paint.

Harold Black is the 8th student to graduate from the Fort Stanton school. Tommy Salabiye was the first to graduate in 1953. Three graduated this spring Elizabeth Loera and John Martinez from high school and Corrine Morales from the 8th grade. Students participating in the activity were Antonio Lopez, Corrine Lucero, Frank Morales, Elizabeth Dena, Sally Medina, Edward Costales, Billy Sanchez, Corrine Morales, Harold Black and Patsy Montoya.

Of the many children admitted in the last three years approximately 1% have been "repeaters." This is most remarkable but not surprising as Fort Stanton Tuberculosis Hospital is under the directorship of Dr. H. C. Jernigan, who ranks 15th in the nation in his knowledge and treatment of tuberculosis. Dr. Jernigan is assisted by Dr. W. F. Rosenblatt, who is in charge of the children's section of the hospital.

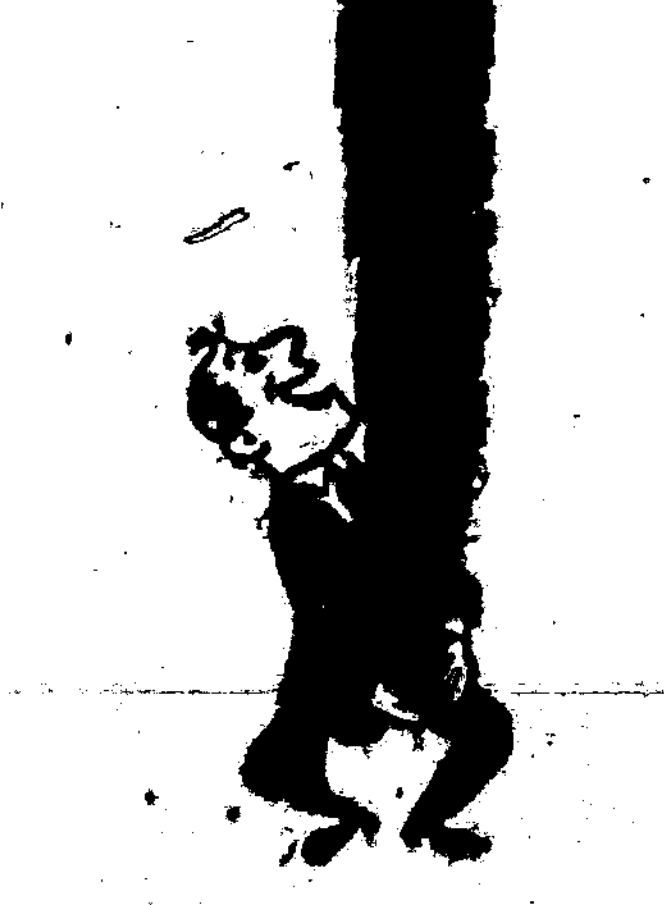

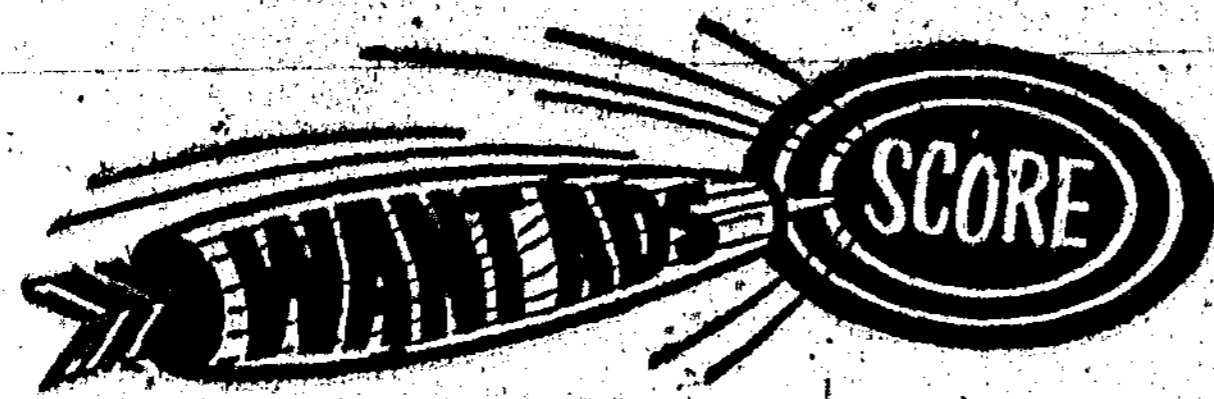

after practically counting himself out last month.

He would run as the favorite over those presently considered likely candidates. State Sen. Fabian Chavez of Santa Fe, Lt. Gov. Mack Easley of Hobbs, State Demo Chairman Calvin Horn.

### WALKER RESERVES SENATE POSSIBILITY

Walker in telling that he was still planning a run for the House added a mild shocker. He said he might shift over to the U. S. Senate race if conditions were right.

U. S. Rep. Joe Montoya is claiming exclusive domain in that area but has been the subject of extremely widespread defeatist comment. By Demos and others viewing his chances against Republican Ed Mechem.

### ELECTION DISTRICTS NOT FOR JUDGES

District Judge Caswell Neal who has demanded an election district for each member of the state house of representatives is lucky that district judges don't have to run in local districts.

The Republican Neal who lives in Carlsbad and conducts the district court there was elected in 1962 in the Fifth District consisting of Eddy, Lea and Chaves counties.

Neal lost his own county of Eddy to William Osborn of Roswell by 1,823 but won the election with a margin of 2,192 in Osborn's home county of Chaves.

Lea county also went against Neal by 306 but not enough to keep him from winning the district election by 67 votes.

### THE ONLY STATE WITHOUT DISTRICTS

Speaking of districts, New Mexico is the only state in the nation that elects its two U. S. representatives at large. All other states have geographic districts.

From 1942 when New Mexico got its second member of the House until 1958 when Tom Morris of Tucumcari went to Washington, Santa Fe had both representatives except for three years when Clint Anderson of Albuquerque was in the House.

### LEADERS IGNORING COURT HOLDING

Legislature leaders have set out on a course to redistribute the seats of the house in a manner that is practically defiant of Judge Caswell Neal's findings in the recent reapportionment law suit brought by Albuquerque.

Each of the several plans being considered by the legislature leaders retains at least one representative for each county, a practice Judge Neal held three times to be illegal.

### SHORT MEETING TO COST \$80,000

The special session for reapportioning the house will be held in November at a cost of about \$80,000 if it lasts no longer than 15 days.

It could be entirely wasted if the court won't accept the proposal. In that case the court itself would write the formula for the apportionment of the house seats, then probably appeal and legal entanglement could develop a chaotic situation that might result in no legislature at all for the state.

### SPECIAL SESSIONS A PERIL TO PARTY

The 1962 special session of the legislature which was called to provide money for the schools but wound up by adding several million spending and did nothing about raising the money for it ran 13 days and cost about \$45,000.

After the special session in November Gov. Jack Campbell has another one scheduled for January or February to consider appropriations.

Since the legislature is heavily dominated by Democrats the special meetings will be held at some peril to the party.
