## Two undefeated teams clash Friday

Carrizozo Grizzlie Home Coming and Parade Will be Friday, October 4

Two undefeated teams tangle in Carrizozo this Friday night with only slight odds given the heavier Grizzly team. Capitán comes to Zozoland with wins over Ruidoso, Cloudercroft and Estancia, to play a Grizzly team that is enjoying the benefits of what could be the best line in the league and in Carrizozo history.

Coach Melvin Romero said that Johnnie Walker was out of play for the rest of the season, a serious loss to Capitán. Walker played right guard, has been replaced by Steve Montoya. It is doubtful that Paul Guebara will be ready for the Zozo game.

Romero figures his Tigers are outweighed at least 10 pounds per man but is conceding nothing on speed. The Tigers were still hurting on penalties in the Estancia game.

In last Friday's game with Estancia, won by Capitán 21-6, the Tigers scored twice in the first period. First score came on a 30-yard pass play from Crawford to Campbell who was in the end zone. The second score came a few minutes later when Chambers went over tackle from five yards out. Crawford ran over for a TD that was called back in the first quarter.

Estancia scored in the third period on a pass from Garcia to Baldonado, the PAT failed for both teams.

In the third period, Zamora scored for Capitán but the play was called back due to back-field in-motion.

In the Cloudercroft game Jackie Walker took a Crawford pass on the 50 and ran all the way in for the TD. This combination will certainly be one to watch in the game here Friday.

### 29 Grizzlies see action in game with Vaughn

The Carrizozo Grizzlies defeated Vaughn 48-0 last Friday at Vaughn. Fullback Faustino Gallegos ran for four TD's, had another called back on a clipping penalty, gained 164 yards rushing and took one pass for 37 yards, — pretty good night for Gallegos.

According to Coach Bernie Laabs, Vaughn was undermanned, having 11 fair boys and no bench strength. They had good men at one tackle and end, but these boys couldn't do it all. The Zozo bench was cleared for most of the second half. QB, Mike Voss guided the Grizzlies for the first half then turned the chores to his brother, 135-pound Dusty Voss.

Jim Lovato came through with a 25-yard TD run and made his own extra point.

Joe Moore followed Lavato's run with a 45-yard punt return for the TD. Tom Ortiz ran for the extra point. In the 4th quarter Moore passed 22 yards to Mike Ortiz for the final score of the game.

## Insurance company buys water bonds

## A. C. Kelly charged with manslaughter

### Sheriff's Office

A preliminary hearing was held in Ruidoso Monday for A. C. Kelly, charged with voluntary manslaughter. Judge Harold Graham of Ruidoso was disqualified and Justice of the Peace R. L. Sherrill of Carrizozo was appointed to preside over the hearing.

On June 5, Kelly and Rene Stallings both of Ruidoso were involved in a fight and Kelly was charged and fined in the Ruidoso City court for fighting. Stallings was admitted to an Albuquerque hospital shortly thereafter, was later transferred to the Ruidoso hospital where he passed away August 21.

An autopsy performed by Dr. A. S. Brauw pathologist of Roswell resulted in the voluntary manslaughter charges filed against Kelly.

Mr. Kusiek of Roswell represented Kelly at the hearing. He was bound over for District Court on \$5000 bond.

Dan Sosa district attorney of Las Cruces and L. Garza assistant D. A. were also present at the hearing.

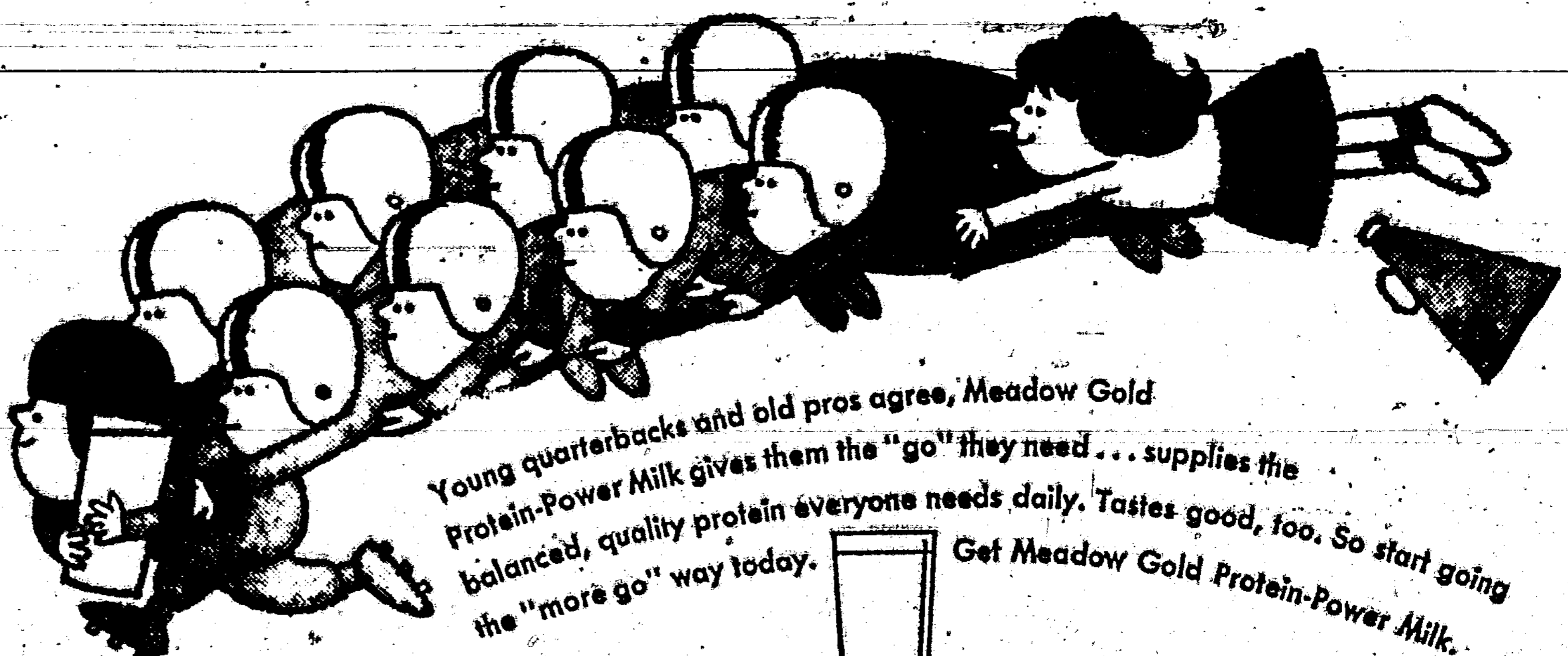

# FARM NEWS

Did anyone find a lost trophy from the Lincoln Fair? The Lamb Carcass Trophy is missing. This trophy is of little value to anyone but the winner of this contest. If you find it turn it in to the County Agent's Office in Carrizozo or at any store in Capitan.

At the Calf and Lamb Carcass Contest held Thursday, ten calves and 35 lambs judged at the Lincoln County Fair were evaluated on their carcass quality. The top steer carcass was owned by Lois Dunlap and it had a rib eye of 13.60 square inches, and 3/5 of an inch of fat over the rib eye. This steer was bred by H. O. Smith of Capitan.

The champion lamb carcass was shown by Joe Cooper. This lamb had 2.79 square inches of rib eye and .18 inches of fat over the rib eye. Research has shown that the animal with the larger rib eye has more lean meat and that the fat over the rib eye indicates the amount of fat in the rest of the carcass.

In washable fabrics, apply liquid detergent to the spot. Work it in with your fingers or a soft brush. Rinse thoroughly in hot water. If stains remain, apply a grease solvent. Many solvents are flammable, and toxic if fumes are inhaled.

Remove oily stains from non-washable fabrics by sponging with a little warm water and placing on a pad of absorbent material; or place the fabric on a blotter and press it with a warm iron. If the material is white, use absorbent powder such as white talcum, or corn starch. Rub the powder in lightly, then shake or brush it off. Repeat the process until the oil disappears.

Stubborn stains in non-washable fabrics usually can be removed by treatment with a greasy solvent. Non-oily stains in washable fabrics usually are removed by soaking for at least half an hour in lukewarm water. Work in detergent and

rinse well. Treat persistent stains with dilute bleach.

For non-washable fabrics and non-oily stains run a stream of tepid water through the stain. If that doesn't work, apply liquid detergent and rinse thoroughly. Be careful to wet as small an area as possible. If some stain still remains use a solution of sodium perborate bleach and rinse again.

## Zozo dist. report on conservation

This report covers the activities of the Carrizozo Soil and Water Conservation District from January 1, 1963 to June 30, 1963. Hereafter the annual report will be submitted on a fiscal year basis.

The Carrizozo SWCD was organized October 11, 1945. There are a total of 902,820 acres in the District with 70 ranches. There are no operating units classified as 'farms'. At present there are 55 District Co-operators and 42 have basic conservation plans.

The District affairs are managed by a Board of Supervisors elected by the landowners within the District boundaries. The present Board consists of the following:

The Board of Supervisors meet the first Wednesday of each month. Landowners are invited to attend.

The objective of the District is to promote soil conservation. The Board encourages proper use of range land. Equipment is made available to District Co-operators to construct conservation measures which contribute to proper use and better range management. The Board also encourages use of a written conservation plan to provide orderly application of conservation measures. All activities are on a voluntary basis.

The Carrizozo SWCD has a Memorandum of Understanding with the Soil Conservation Service, USDA, for technical assistance and with the Bureau of

Land, Management and State Department of Forestry. They cooperate with ASCS and Extension Service. These agencies assist the District obtain their objectives. The Board of Supervisors wish to express their appreciation to these agencies for their assistance and to the Co-operators in the District for their support of the District Conservation Program.

A financial statement as of June 30, 1963 is attached and made a part of this report.

# Ken Fuller, County Demo chairman, writes about county reapportionment

Corona, New Mexico  
September 9, 1963

Dear Paul:  
Wednesday night you asked me for my thoughts concerning the Reapportionment of our House of Representatives in New Mexico, I could say "damn it" - that would summarize, in part, my thoughts, but that is not explanatory so I will try to express it otherwise.

I believe we could label the prospects of no or a part of a representative as "while our sparsely settled county legislators at least dozed". Facts convince us that 10 bills were offered in the last session of legislature. Perhaps none of these bills were perfect, few are. Neither will we feel Judge Neal's ruling, that each county must have approximately 1,400 voting population to have a representative, perfect. Then too, will come geographical division of representative districts. This division geographically could completely wreck any counties' representation should district lines include or exclude heavily populated areas not included in present representative's district. God help the poor candidate who has to go into an adjacent county to get the last 1/8 of himself elected by some given geographic portion of his given district. Then too, anything like give true representation of his supporters, he will likely have to vote 5/8 for, 1/8 against. It appears to me ballots for that portion of a county that must be added to a neighboring county to form a representative district, will also have to be altered to cover the situation or have separate ballots for this office. There will be many headaches.

Please don't misunderstand me; when elections are over, I believe it behooves each of us to get behind our elected officials and push for best results possible with materials we elect. When primary elections roll around again, then comes the duty of each political party to put out the best candidates obtainable for each office and may the best candidate win.

I'm sure Albuquerque is happy and quite proud of prospective results of last seasons' failure to act along lines using the Federal Congressional System of apportionment for representatives. Can't help wondering if they foresaw results and encouraged failure to accept any offered means of solving our problem.

I am hopeful our recently appointed Constitutional Revision Commission may, in due time, come up with something helpful to our dozen counties who will no longer have a representative under Judge Neal's ruling.

There is also the chance that our legislators may in special session take some action, not exactly along lines laid down by Judge Neal, by providing a representative or more for each county. Action along these lines would probably call for a ruling by the Supreme Court as to its legality.

Gone are the days when an average citizen, such as I, can interpret laws, etc. We get bills passed containing words, words, words - stretching on through infinity saying nothing, and at times running out of the English language borrowing terms in Latin, etc.

Our county without a representative reminds me of the story of the bull who learned to talk. He was asked his opinion of "artificial insemination". His reply was, "I consider it as insemination without representation".

Yours for a representative and not a fractional part thereof for each county; thereafter, add representatives in accordance with voting population.

## Resource analysis is most complete

New Mexico Institute of Mining and Technology through its resident scientists and former students and research personnel, is making a major contribution to a half-million dollar analysis of New Mexico's natural, industrial and human resources. Officially called the State Resources Development Plan, the over-all study is the most comprehensive yet launched by any state seeking to provide itself with guidelines for development of its resources.

The Socorro school's part in the over-all study is significant - out of proportion to the school's size, says State Planning officer, John W. Flynn.

Tech's Bureau of Mines Director, Mr. A. J. Thompson, and Dr. William Berthoff, Mineral Economist, will head a \$35,000

commodity study of the mineral resources of New Mexico. A commodity study is an economic analysis involving production, reserves, problems, outlook and other information needed to facilitate economic development.

Former Tech Physicist, Steve Reynolds, who is now the State Engineer, will direct a \$52,600 inventory and analysis of the state's water resources including problems, outlook and potential. Key researchers on the State Engineer's staff are former Tech students Dr. Zane Spiegel, Hydrologist, and Francis West, Hydrogeologist. Des Linford, Technical Editor for the State Engineer, was formerly Director of Publications at New Mexico Tech.

The State Oil Conservation Commission will also contribute a valuable study by presenting a commodity analysis of New Mexico's oil and gas resources. Tech graduates Dan Nutter, Chief Engineer, and James Kaptana, Engineer, will conduct this study.

A former Tech student now in the State Office, Ed Imhoff Resources Planner, is the technical coordinator of the state Resource Development Plan.

Governor Jack M. Campbell said the extensive participation of Tech-trained personnel is a fine example of the impact that a school of science can have upon our state development.

"We are counting very heavily, not only upon our civic leaders and business men, but also upon our scientists, especially scientists who know New Mexico, to provide us the guidelines for the future. I shall continue to call upon those men to serve their communities in both civic and research projects," said the Governor.

## Land acquisition for out-door recreation offered

According to an Associated Press story, the National Parks Sub-Committee of the House Interior and Insular Affairs Committee is working on a billion dollar program for acquisition of land for recreational purposes. The bill would authorize appropriations of \$60 million a year for eight years to get the program started. State contributions would boost the investment in the program to the billion dollar figure.

According to the story revenues estimated at \$150,000 annually would come from: (1) Entrance, admission and other

user fees at federal land and water recreation areas; (2) Proceeds from the sale of federal surplus non-military real property, and (3) taxes on motor boat fuel. Both land user groups such as lumbermen, farmers and ranchers and recreation groups such as the National Wildlife Federation have proposed amendments to the bill. This is just one of the many proposals being circulated to increase recreational use of our outdoors.

radar picket destroyer USS Rogers a Pacific Fleet unit currently undergoing an extensive yard period at Charleston, S. C.

The Rogers departed her normal part of operations, San Diego, California early last month.

Enroute to Charleston the Rogers visited six Central and South American Ports, Mensarillo, Mexico; San Jose, Guatemala; Balboa, Canal Zone; Cartagera, Columbia; Kingsten, Jamaica; Belsse, British Honduras for the fourth of July; and Mayport, Fla.

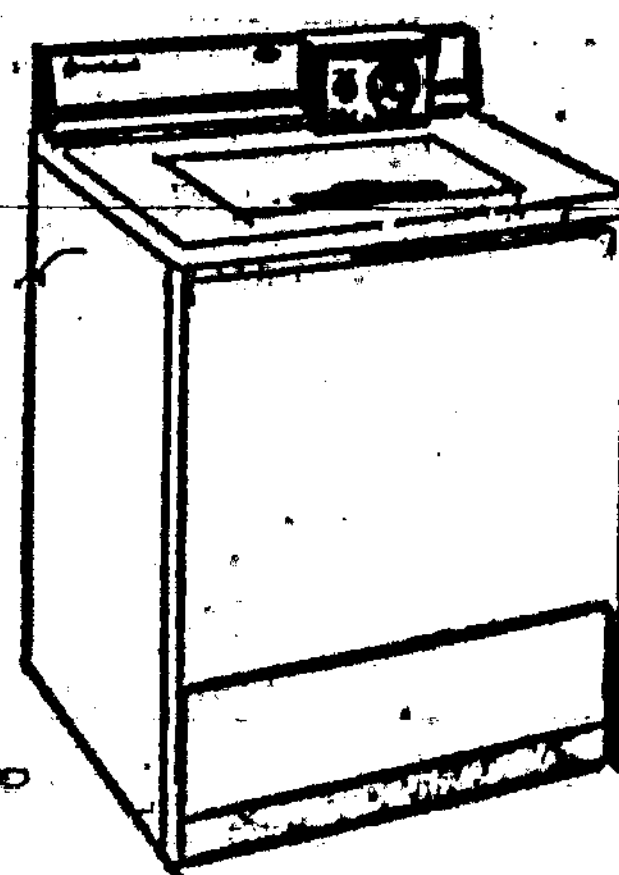

One cannot be saved by the blood of Christ outside of the church for which his blood was shed (Eph. 5:26).

Santa Fe — Statehouse Demos are passing the word that our Clint the Senator wants Land Commissioner Johnny Walker for the Joe Montoya place in Congress, and that's important.

Senator Anderson has been running Demo affairs for several years. He made some kind of political history late in 1961 when he flat vetoed John Burroughs out of the governor's race and followed up to arrange the nomination for Jack Campbell.

He can arrange for candidates to have all the cash they need, or he can cut them off cold.

If it is true that Anderson has picked Walker for Congress it reasonably follows that he must have picked Sheepherder Hays for land commissioner.

Walker won't run for Congress unless he is assured of Hays nomination. Hays, whose little used name is Guyton, is contending with Highway Commissioner Chairman John Sudderth for the land office place.

**PROTECTS JOE FROM TROUBLE**  
Anderson's purported favor for Walker for Congress could be prompted in the hope of keeping Walker off Joe Montoya's back in the Senate race.

Walker said publicly a couple of weeks ago that he was considering both the House and the Senate.

Montoya is suffering widespread defeatist talk among Democrats and is still a long way from a clear field in getting the nomination without serious opposition.

# EDITORIAL

"A page for independent thought"

## The Biggest Gyp

There are tourist traps and there are honest points of interest and recreation for tourists. Just as a matter of pride we prefer that tourist traps be held to a minimum in our piece of country. In our book of travels a good sample of a "trap" is seven falls in Colorado.

The biggest and most widely used gyp in our country is Bonito Lake where it costs a dollar for entry. The scenery is fine when the lake is full, and worth a dollar of any tourist's money — with the water drawn down, which happens every year at the height of the tourist season, the lake is not pretty in any way — no consideration given to fish caught.

During the last fiscal year 14,033 fish were deposited in Bonito Lake, this figure released by Phil Freeman, S. E. Area Supervisor for Dept. of Game and Fish.

Do a little simple pencil work. Say 5,000 fishermen at Bonito the first few weeks of open season, each fisher caught three fish and the season's deposit is gone leaving the lake barren for a couple of months — and the \$1.00 charge still in force. This is a gyp, not entirely of the Fish and Game Department position of being accessory to the fact.

Two solutions present themselves. Remove the charge, or deposit more fish. More fish is not probably leaving only the honest way out — that of removing the charge.

## In The Next 500 Years

We read with considerable interest about the by-pass fracas now going on in the state and would just as soon not get involved with the By-Pass Association or the Highway Department except as their actions affect Lincoln County . . . for the following reasons:

This By-Pass Association is hot right now, because its home base, Santa Rosa is scared of a by-pass and help is coming in from other towns in the same predicament. The situation at Santa Rosa will be worked out in time, and the By-Pass Association will have had its fling and death will occur for this Association, though it may be lingering.

During the brief life of the By-Pass Association the Bureau of Public Roads, a government agency, is continuing its normal course of building roads that go as straight as possible from point to point on the map, towns, mountains, rivers are only obstacles to be dealt with as the approaches are made. The Bureau of Public Roads, being a government agency, will still be in business and its policies about the same, long years after the present generation of feverish Santa Rosa citizens have lost their fire and their by-pass problems largely forgotten.

To fight a government agency you first need an organization financed and organized to continue the fight at least 500 years. Any period shorter than that and you will lose the battle. The Santa Rosa people and their helpers are not organized in a manner to win their battle and we haven't much time for

fighting a losing battle. We believe there are other points of attack where bureaucracy can be attacked with greater chance of success.

## Character Of An "It"

In all the lengthy history of mankind there has existed a certain type that confuses psychologists, physiologists, as well as anthropologists. This particular type has much to do with the formation of our earthly sphere today and in future centuries, mankind is sure to wonder how certain deposits of tin and aluminum came to be located along what appear to have been paths used by man in his travels during the year 1963.

At the conclusion of a long period of studying this phenomenon of natural history, Professor Paul has reached several conclusions of record with reference to certain traits of the partially developed humanus.

The mother complex is a strong element throughout this study. Definite results were found that in types of inferior development there were early handicaps from such a short period of breast feeding, when infants were shifted to a bottle and nipple arrangement before leaving the hospital, and from the nipple to a can shortly after reaching home.

Such infants grow to partial maturity with definite sissy (an effeminate boy or man) characteristics. They have a compulsion to take out their spite over such an upbringing, which they fail to understand, by flinging things, anything—particularly cans.

Being of doubtful virility, they frequently attempt to demonstrate a degree of manhood by attempting to out-throw each other. A sad commentary, with a high frequency rating, is the number of homothallic individuals who are living as your neighbors today, but could turn dangerous at any moment when overtaken by the "throw urge."

In 493 case records, of the 1,000 in the study, it was found that taste buds were not well defined. Any liquid seems to suit their palate, with strong leanings toward the flavor of sewerage slightly fermented. It was found that H2-O as a liquid is almost totally unacceptable, largely because it is not available in cans. These partially formed mentalities will buy liquid in a can, without seeming regard to quality.

The study is being carried on with only slight hope of solutions being found. Being inheritable, the population explosion is producing more of these "part-man, part-jacks, part-it" types at an exceedingly high rate. Rabbits could hardly do better in a good season.

Help in compiling case histories is solicited freely. Whenever you may see a person of any age gender (masculine, feminine, or neuter in outward appearance) who is throwing such objects as cans (beer cans most frequently used) you can start compiling your first case history by making note of the car license which—when you get enough—can also be used in playing a unique game of scrabble.

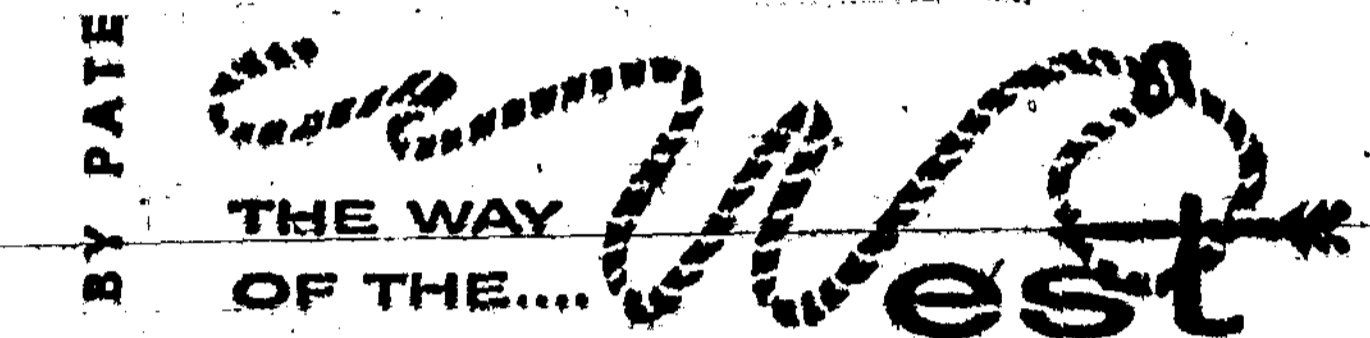

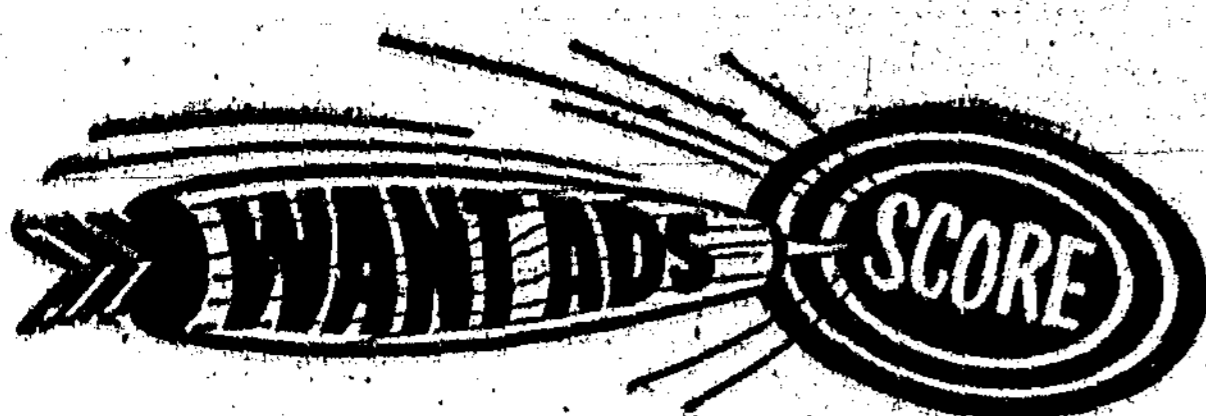

Caswell Neal which is due for serious consideration in the legislature that meets Oct. 28 would jump twelve little counties which presently have twelve representatives into five districts with five representatives.

They are Hidalgo and Luna which would be brought together for the election of one representative; Socorro and Catron one member; Union, Mora and Harding, one member, and Guadalupe, Torrance and DeBaca, a one-member district.

SEVEN OTHERS ON MINUS SIDE

In addition to the twelve losing representation by being tied into districts seven other counties would be reduced in their number of house members.

Roosevelt, Grant, Quay, Taos and Colfax would go from two members to one, and Rio Arriba and San Miguel would be cut from three members to two each.

The proposed seating plan would cut the nine counties of predominant Spanish-American population from 17 members to about 13, counting the fractions they would get in multi-county districts.

HARD TO PASS IN LEGISLATURE

So many counties would suffer losses in the plan that there seems little chance of it winning easy approval.

However, if the legislature does not adopt the proposal or something very close to it the judge has said that the court would do the apportioning which would be certain to be stricter and harder to live with than the one worked out in the legislature office.

NINE COUNTIES GET MORE SEATS

Only nine counties would gain under the formula which increases the house membership from 66 to 72.

Albuquerque would go from nine to 20 and Dona Ana from three to five.

Chaves, Eddy, Lea and San Juan would advance from three to four each. Curry, Otero, and Valencia would advance from two to three each.

Others would remain unchanged. Low Alamos and Sandoval with one each, and McKinley and Santa Fe with three each.

SEBASTIAN PICK GALLE ARMJO

Gov. Jack Campbell's selection of Caesar Sebastian to succeed Finance Director John Gott at the first of the year didn't set well with Auditor Alex Armijo. Sebastian sponsored Rich Glasco against Armijo in the primary last year. Already on the state payroll is Louis Beckchi who also ran against Armijo in the primary. He's getting \$700 a month from Joe Nease's public service commission.
