Crackdown on vehicle licensing

A letter received from Benny E. Sanchez, commissioner of the Department of Motor Vehicles, states that N. M. Statutes require registration of all house-trailers, which must also bear current registration plates, at all times and not only when moved on the state's highways. House-trailers that do not bear current 1963 license plates are in violation of Section 64-3-2, sub-section G, unless the trailers are mounted on permanent foundation, in which case they should be on the property tax rolls and subject to assessment as property by county treasurers.

Road blocks are being set up to see that all drivers of motor vehicles have in their possession a valid and current drivers license, also to determine if the license plates and stickers on the vehicle are the same as those appearing on the certificate of registration.

The sheriff's department and the state police will start checking in Lincoln County on October 21. Owners of vehicles or trailers not properly licensed will be issued a citation.

Ancho goes 100% for courthouse

Capitan to vote on natural gas distribution system

The Village of Capitan is holding a municipal election on Tuesday, October 15, to authorize the construction of a natural gas distribution system within the Village. It is estimated that when the system is in operation average fuel bills can be reduced by approximately 35%. If approved, the gas system will be completely self-supporting and no tax money will be involved. Any surplus earnings of the system can be transferred to the Village's General Fund to be used for general purposes or other Village improvements.

Connections to the system will be voluntary. Anyone not wishing to connect cannot be forced to do so.

Annual Trinity site tour to be held

The annual public tour to Trinity, site of the world's first atomic bomb explosion, is listed in the "Guide" section of the October 4 issue of LIFE Magazine. The tour is this Sunday (Oct. 13).

The site, deep inside the usually-closed confines of White Sands Missile Range, will be accessible to residents of Socorro, Elgin, and Albuquerque via the Stallion Site Gate, off Highway 280 about 15 miles east of San Antonio, N. M. Residents of Alamogordo, and southeast communities, can enter via the Oscura Range Camp gate on U.S. 54.

Tuesday, October 8, 1963, was voting day in Lincoln County.

The day was clear, temperature moderate, typical of New Mexico's fine fall weather. No reason for anyone to avoid the trip to the polls set up in twelve precincts of Lincoln County to vote on \$525,000 worth of courthouse bonds.

The one clean slate was at Ancho, about 20 miles north of the county seat town, where all of the 26 voters marked the "Yes" square to lead the vote 634 for the issue to 343 against. As you read the complete tabulation of precinct voting several kinds of analysis can be made, none of which really matters. The majority was 271 votes which is a real vote of confidence in the judgment of the three county commissioners, Charles A. Jones of Capitan, Roman Nunez of Picacho, and Kenneth Nosker of Glencoe, who thought the people of the county ought to have the opportunity to vote on a new courthouse.

The old structure has been in service for 53 years, upkeep and maintenance costs have mounted over the years to a breaking point, no fireproof or disaster-proof facilities for records were built into either the old courthouse or the annex, most county offices are crowded for space, jail facilities in real poor shape — these and other reasons prompted the commissioners to put the matter up to the people of Lincoln County.

The ballots will be certified Thursday by the commissioners with the possibility that some

may be thrown out, probably as many on one side as on the other so that the final decision will remain unchanged — a resounding vote in favor of the new courthouse.

Voll & Buffington, Roswell architects who did the preliminary planning, stated Wednesday that detailed planning should be complete by February 1, 1964, and contract letting held that month.

A detailed study will be made of the actual needs, for space, storage, and facilities of the various offices prior to making the final drawings. Suggestions are invited. If you have a suggestion about what material to use for the outer wall, or other, put your suggestion in writing and send it to the county commissioners.

Murder suspect caught near Rio

A 23-hour long road-block was set up near Carrizozo Saturday at 11:00 p.m. in search of a hitchhiker wanted for questioning in the death of Billy Gene Carver 28, of Duncan, Arizona.

Carver's body was discovered by state police in his pickup parked on a country road just east of US 85 Saturday night. Carver had been shot in the head three times with a revolver.

The road block was discontinued Sunday at 10:00 p.m. when word was received that the suspect was seen in another county.

Frank Knoblock of Carrizozo and Kenneth Schokey of Ruidoso both with the state police were called to Fort Greg Tuesday afternoon to assist in the search.

The suspect Benjamin Jones of Chandler, Ariz., was caught by three men employed by the Reclamation Service 10 miles south of Fort Greg on the east side of the Rio Grande River, Wednesday at 9:30 a.m.

Agriculture credit clinic at Capitan

An agricultural credit clinic will be conducted at the Capitan school on Thursday night, October 17, at 7:30 p.m. Farmers, ranchers and businessmen connected with agriculture are invited to attend this meeting which has been planned to provide information on use of long-term credit. The clinic is being sponsored as a community service by the Federal Land Bank Association of Roswell. According to Vonnie Jasper, manager of the local association, all phases of long-term credit will be discussed with emphasis on how credit can be used to increase farm income and living standards.

This will be the fourth of a series of four meetings being held this week throughout Chaves, Lincoln, Lea, Baca and Eddy counties, the area served by the local credit association. Jasper said today, "Changes that are taking place in agriculture are constantly demanding larger use of credit as a tool of production. Many folks who do not plan to use credit themselves can benefit by coming to the clinic to gain information whereby they might be better able to assist a son, a daughter, or a neighbor to become established in farming and ranching."

Jasper said that he will be assisted by local members in each community and the board of directors of the Federal Land Bank Association of Roswell. The directors are J. P. McKnight of Picacho, president; Marvin J. McClish of McDonald, vice president; Kenneth M. Davis of Carlsbad; T. W. Ball of Lovington; Roy Skipworth of Fort Sumner; Herman L. Green of Artesia and Emory J. Yaden of Lovington.

Refreshments will be served at the meeting.

Bear Creek, stakes 300 claims.

Bear Creek Mining Company, Kennecott Copper Corporation's wholly-owned domestic exploration subsidiary, has staked over 300 mining claims in the Sierra Blanca Mountains approximately 15 miles southwest of Carrizozo.

The claims lie in the Bonito Mining District and are centered around the south fork of the Rio Bonito.

Claim staking will be followed by geologic study and appraisal. The land reclamation is part of Bear Creek's continuing search for mineral deposits in the southwestern United States.

Speed limit and stop signs erected, council says start issuing citations

With approximately four miles of paved streets, which eliminated a lot of bumpy roads and driving hazards, the Town Council has instructed Marshall Choncho Morales to see that all speed limits and stop signs within the town limits are observed. They asked that citations be issued immediately in case of violations and that no warnings be given.

The speed limit on most town streets is 25 MPH, ranging down to 10 MPH on the park drives and up to 30 MPH in sections of U. S. 54. Fifteen new stop signs were put up the first of the week.

The council heard a delegation from the Woman's Club asking that outdoor toilet facilities be eliminated. The council will cooperate by preparing an ordinance which will require the immediate elimination of such facilities north of the tracks and all others by April 1, 1964. This ordinance is considered necessary as a public health measure.

Serious consideration was given to the problem of occupation licenses. The council agreed that since part have paid, all should pay on the same basis, the fee now being \$1.00 per \$1,000 of gross income.

Maintaining the newly paved streets is something the town will have to consider. Before running into so much water line trouble the council had planned to buy a street sweeper. Now such action will be put off until the council can see that the money is available.

A call for bids on a new six-cylinder pickup for the utility manager will be issued immediately. The bids will be confined to Ford and Chevrolet, both makes serviced in Carrizozo.

The town as a unit, and the councilmen individually have been sued, with service being made on the mayor, for \$26,000 damages alleging business interruption, matter not discussed, and street too narrow, by Al Seay over the new paving in front of his business place.

Elfred Jones, town attorney, will file a motion on behalf of the council (all excepting Buster Smoot) asking the court for a hearing on the motions, and asking for dismissal of suit against the council as individuals.

Some discussion of the width of Central Avenue (U. S. 54 through town) should it become a four-lane highway some day. The new courthouse will need to be located to allow for this possible future construction.

The national convention of the U.S. 54 Association was held in Tucuman last week where Howard Williams, owner of motels in Alamogordo and Carrizozo, was elected president. A. J. Zimmerman was named secretary-treasurer.

Contract awarded for postal modernization

Modernization of the post office at Carrizozo was further advanced today with the announcement by Postmaster General John A. Gronowski that a contract has been awarded to John W. and Minnie L. Harkey of Carrizozo to provide additional space and needed improvements, and to rent the building to the Post Office Department.

"Although we are continuing to build new post offices where they are needed," Mr. Gronowski said, "we are constantly re-assessing our lease construction program to determine whether present buildings can be altered or remodeled to take care of our expanding volume of mail. In this instance it was determined that a modernization program would be more economical to the Government and still satisfy the needs of the Postal Service in this area."

The construction program is being concentrated in those areas where the need is urgent and suitable space cannot be

obtained except through new construction.

"We now have about 45,000 post offices throughout the country handling a volume of 65 billion pieces of mail a year. By 1970 it is expected to rise to 90 billion. It is clear, therefore, that we must redouble our efforts, not only in expanding our capacity but also in devising new postal techniques to meet the demands of our growing population."

Under the Department's Lease Construction program the Harkeys will remodel the building at 5th and Tularosa Avenue and rent it to the Department for five years.

The Department's capital investment is limited substantially to postal equipment, while the building remains under private ownership with the owner paying local real estate taxes. "This formula," Mr. Gronowski said, "utilizes the resources and investment funds of private enterprise for needed postal buildings."

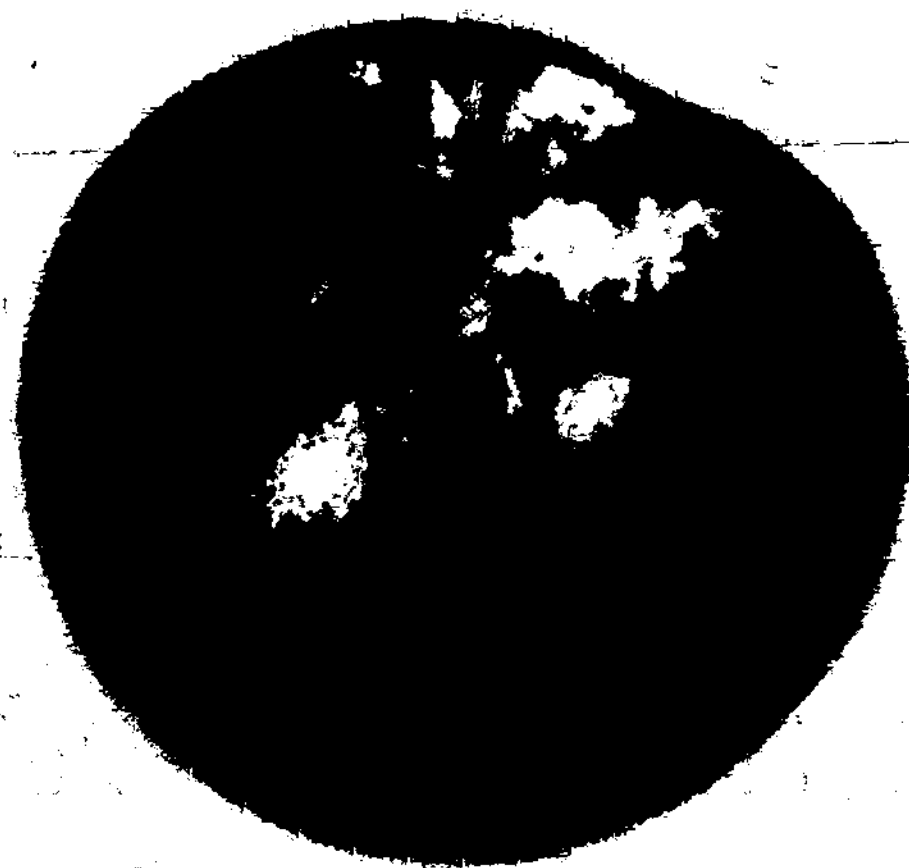

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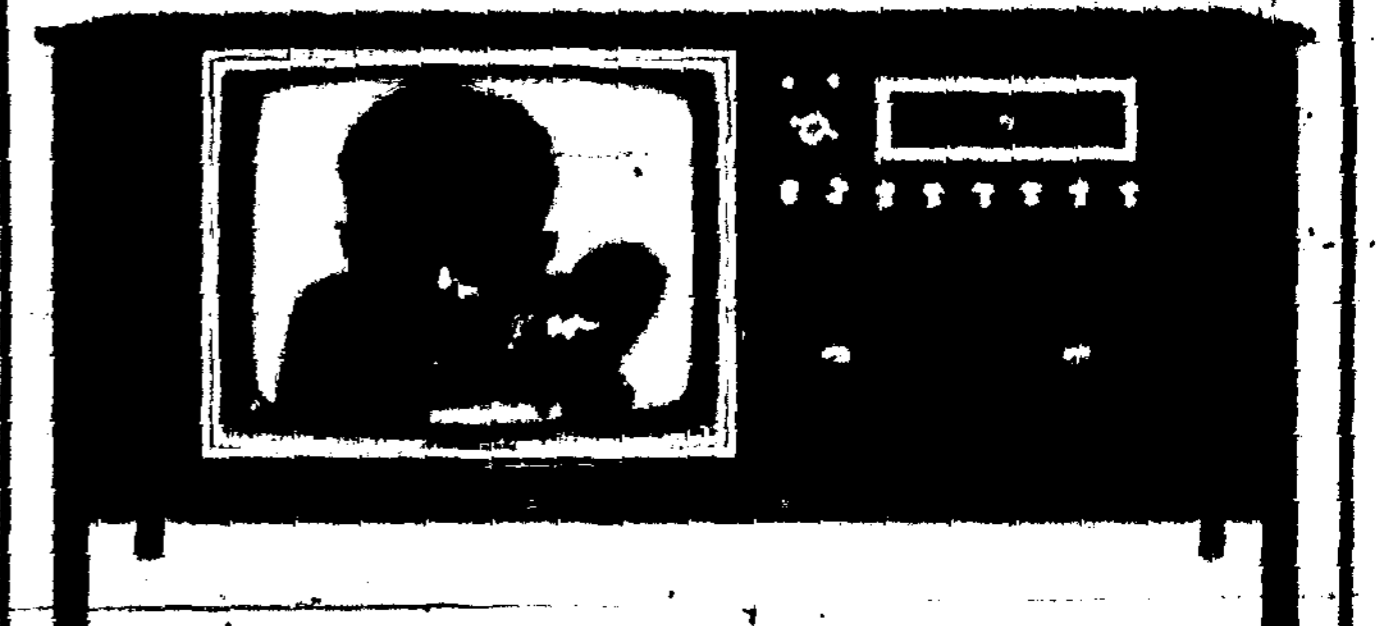

New Paving - New Crosswalks

Laws that are not, or can not, be enforced are not good laws. The same holds true for crosswalks that are not used.

"E" Avenue in Carrizozo has new paving, traffic can move a little faster if anything (at least until stop signs are put in; but students coming from Carrizozo school follow exactly the same paths crossing "E" to town.

These paths were never in the crosswalks and before new crosswalks are painted on the new paving some thought could be given to the footprints now being made in crossing "E" Avenue.

One Sack Of Beans

At the way-far-out end of government perfection is a grey cloud called perfection. In this perfect state there would be one school board in New Mexico, only one large county encompassing the entire state, only one government for the many municipalities of the state, one set of road maintenance equipment, one large sack of beans for welfare use, one hospital board for all state hospitals.

On this cloud, people would not have to worry about governing themselves. Names would not be important because all local needs would be calculated by IBM systems where the tenacious memory of the electronic brain could recall in any instant the number of any person in the state, plus anything he might need, and more important — the taxes he can pay.

This grey cloud may sound far-fetched. It is not. Day by day in every way we move closer and closer... reapportionment of the House of Representatives in New Mexico is a big jump toward the grey cloud of perfection.

We have an awareness of the necessity for reapportionment, have written "that the inflation should be taken out of the smaller counties". We certainly do not believe that representation should be taken away from the smaller counties. Will Harrison states it this way, "The federal octopus is dragging New Mexico toward an absurd legislative structure in which two county groups would have three senators and one representative each. Twelve counties would have only a half or a third of a representative, and in fact there are four among them which would probably never have as much as a third of a member in

the house.

It all comes from the Supreme Court of the United States decision in the case of Baker vs. Carr, Caswell S. Neal, District Judge, who is sitting in judgment of the case brought on behalf of all citizens of Bernalillo County in connection with present apportionment of the House of Representatives, had this to say, "While I realize that the case of Baker vs. Carr and the decisions which followed it are the supreme law of the land, at this time, and realize that it is my duty and obligation as a Judge to accept these decisions and to enforce them, I cannot do so, without expressing my own personal opinion, that these decisions are pure judicial legislation of a type which in recent years, has invaded the rights of the states and the people thereof, to the extent that unless the power of the Supreme Court is in some manner curbed, as the power of the Executive and Legislative Branches of the Federal Government is curbed, by the Constitution, a complete

The special session of legislature has been called to consider reapportionment. This would leave the reapportionment up to Judge Neal who would most certainly do his duty.

We highly favor each county retaining at least one complete representative with no halves or thirds serving the smaller counties — let Bernalillo County have its full quota. The only possible route to this end will be legal, an appeal of civil action No. 33273, or the filing of a new case on behalf of the smaller counties. Such action would likely end up in the Supreme Court of the United States. In the mean time the Legislative Branches of the federal government (Anderson, Mechem, Morris, Montoya) could be alerted with the chance — fully worth fighting for — that some states rights might be saved.

Other states are involved in this same fight. The State of New Mexico is the youngest, and best able to lead this fight for government by the people.

Sosa pays contempt fine with five minutes to spare

Las Cruces, Sept. 27 — At 11:55 a.m. today Dist. Atty. Dan Sosa paid the district court clerk \$250 and thus came within five minutes of going to jail.

Sosa was held in contempt of court Thursday by Dist. Judge George Zimmerman and ordered to pay \$250 plus serve a five-day jail sentence. The judge added, however, that if the fine was paid by noon Friday he would suspend the jail term.

The district attorney met with Zimmerman later and gave him a transcript of the court proceedings in an attempt to have the action cancelled. Zimmerman did not change his ruling, Sosa said Thursday evening that he would appeal the action, apparently to the State Supreme Court.

Following is a significant portion of the transcript of Thursday's action.

Sosa — May it please the court, I am not going to agree that the defendant can be arraigned before your honor on this particular type of case. I am not going to agree to the arraignment because that would

vest you with jurisdiction and I know of one particular reason for not allowing DWI cases before your honor.

Court — Is there a bond posted?

R. Wilson Martin (attorney) — \$300 bond is posted, if the court please. Of course I think the DA is saying, in effect, that the state can't get a fair trial before your honor.

Sosa — That is correct, on a DWI case.

Passes Sentence

Martin — I hardly think that is a dignified remark to make, that your honor, District Judge George L. Zimmerman, can't give a fair trial in a DWI case. I can't see any reason why the arraignment wouldn't be just as proper before your honor as before District Judge Scoggin.

Court — Mr. Sosa, I am going to give you five minutes to reconsider the remark you have just made.

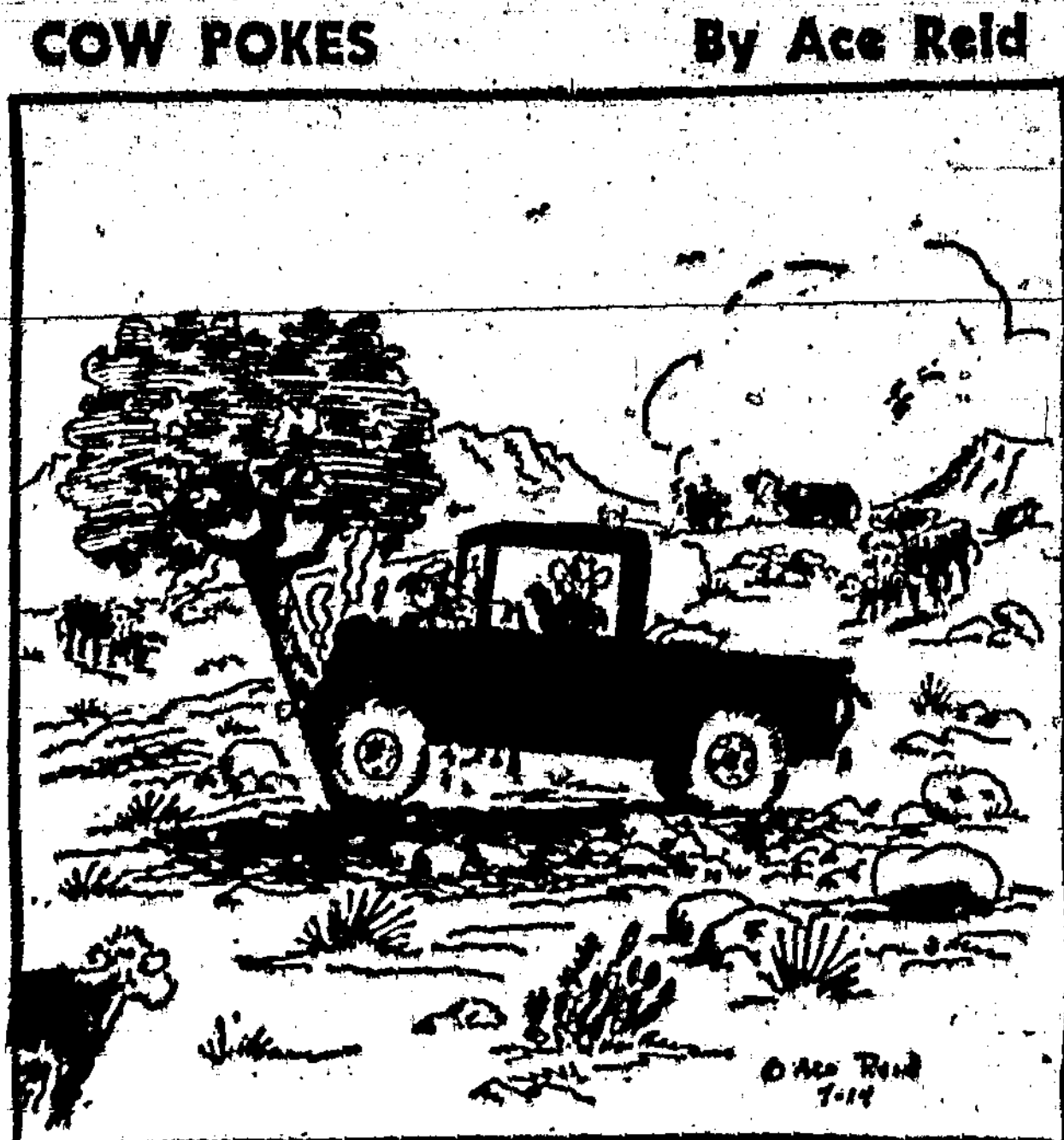
Sosa didn't take it back and the judge passed sentence.

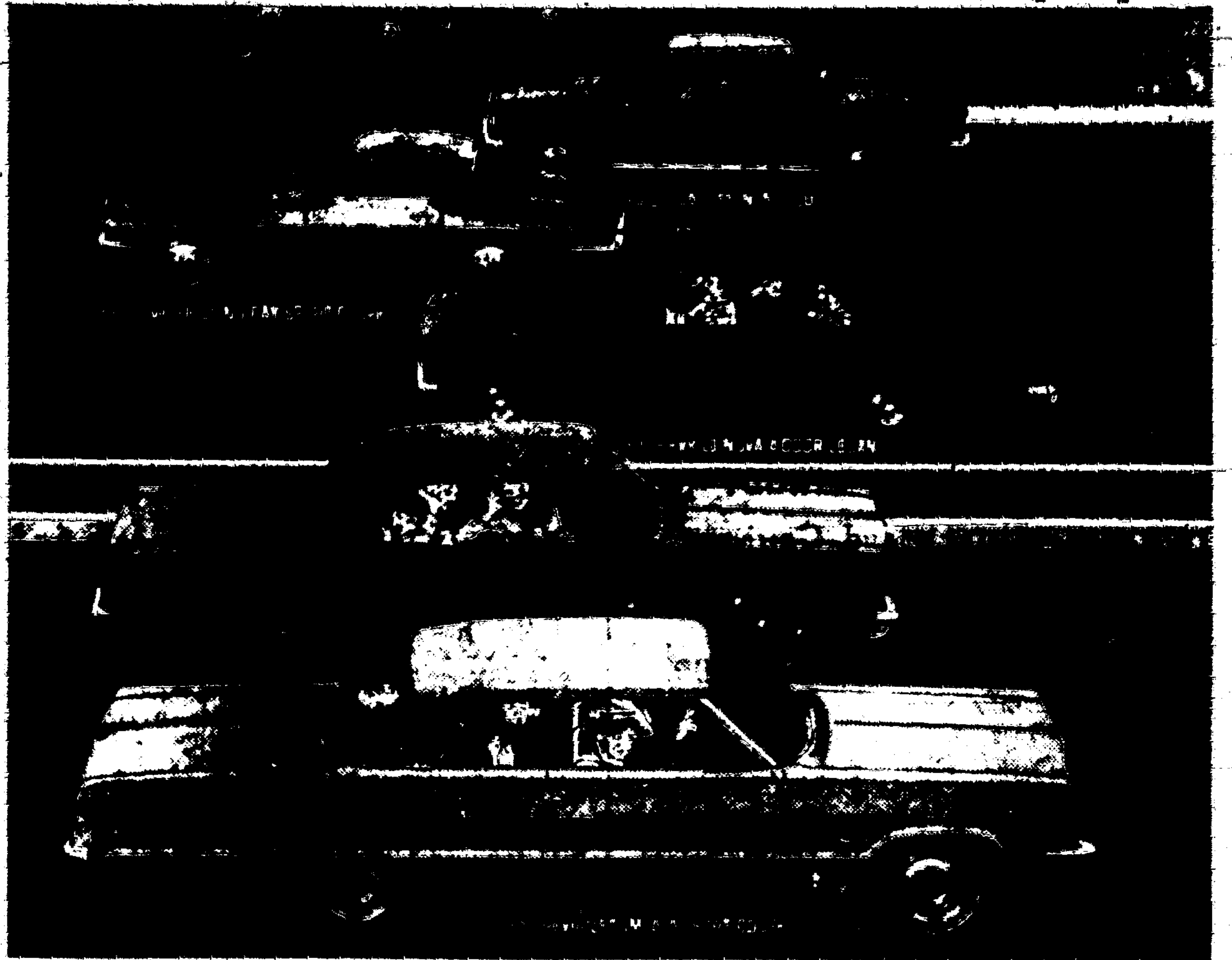

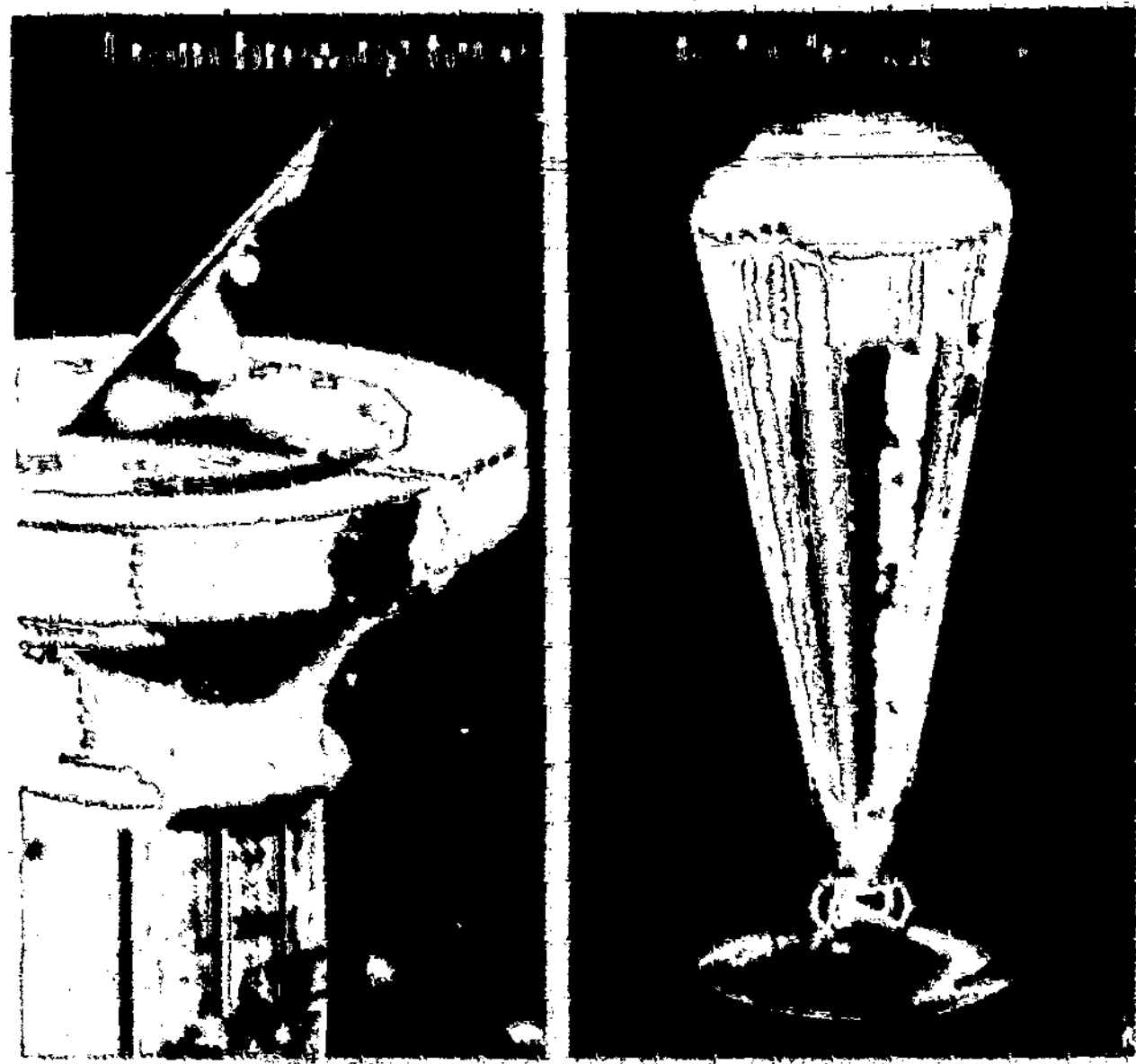

SANTA FE — Federal funds of more than \$1.2 million on \$7.9 million worth of water pollution control projects have been allocated by the Governor's Advisory Council on Water Pollution Control.

The council recommended the allocations Friday for 16 sewer construction projects.

The recommendations go to the State Health Board for final approval.

The federal appropriation has not yet been made by Congress, but it is expected \$1,260,718.81 will be available for New Mexico, including a \$120,000 carry-over from last year.

The greatest share of the federal money will go for four Albuquerque projects.
