## Capitan and Ruidoso agree to form natural gas distribution association

The Village of Ruidoso trustees and the Village of Capitan trustees, in a recent joint meeting at Ruidoso voted on a resolution enabling the creation of a Natural Gas Distribution Association.

Mayor Warren Tucker opened the meeting with all Ruidoso trustees present. Visitors included Darrel Fowler of Stein Brothers Investment Brokers, Joe Hawkins of the Ruidoso Gas Company, and Ruidoso attorney Richard Parsons. Capitan trustees present were Joe Cheney, mayor; Miles Williams, Bill Randle and Gerald Dean.

Mayor Tucker stated that the reason for the special meeting was to consider a resolution enabling the creation of a Natural Gas Distribution Association.

Darrel Fowler gave background information on the statutes pertaining to forming a Natural Gas District.

(W. G. Shrecongost, State Representative from Lincoln County, introduced in the last legislature enabling legislation

which was passed and allows the formation of such associations.)

Fowler stated that the forming of the distribution association would in essence keep down the cost of a distribution system of natural gas for each respective village.

Village attorney John Thompson stated that the principal of the association would be to make available a transmission system of benefit to both villages. He stated that the association would be similar to the Eagle Creek Inter-Community Water Users Association.

Mayor Tucker made a motion that Mayor Cheney of Capitan be named chairman of the joint meeting; the motion was passed. Mayor Cheney, acting as chairman, then called for a resolution creating a Natural Gas Distribution Association.

All trustees representing both Ruidoso and Capitan voted yes with the exception of Ruidoso trustee Bill McCarty.

## Town gasoline usage eyeballed by councilmen

Carrizozo Town Council meeting in regular session Tuesday night worked hard on a great multitude of town affairs. The matter of keeping track of some 500 gallons of gasoline, used by the town each month, was a carry-over item from a previous meeting. At present no records are kept and it is impossible to know what vehicles are using how much, or how much may be lost by leakage and theft.

To solve the situation the town will look into prices of underground tanks with the idea of installing a 550 gallon tank equipped with an electric pump. Then, maybe include the use of purchase orders for each vehicle.

Bills were submitted closely, there not being pending further information. Two building permits approved, 4-Whack \$20,000 for addition, John Hickey \$300 for canopy at post office. One companion license approved, Henry I. Moore, operating the City-Cool Service.

Some of the town councilmen of Otero County Electric, was present to discuss street lighting and other electrical problems. The best means now for residents who want a street light repaired is to contact Marshal Choncho Morales who will make up a list, submitting copies to both the Town and the Electric Co-op.

Otero Electric is in the process of completely rewiring the town, which job will continue without letup until complete, maybe six months or more. As light poles are replaced new mercury vapor lamps are installed, also new light will be installed at all intersections (several now dark).

The outages that occur as part of town rewiring stop the clocks that operate town facilities. Members told the council he would reset town clocks each Friday.

Ray Gabehart, president of Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce, C. E. Burns, member of the board of directors, attended the meeting to talk to the council about Christmas decorations.

The Town had pledged \$300 for Christmas trees which will line Carrizozo streets by this weekend, and at the November meeting the Chamber of Commerce had asked the Town to consider putting \$1,500 into decorations which would be bought the first quarter of 1964 for use next Christmas. Several members of the council expressed their appreciation of the hard work on the part of the C. of C., and were pleased with the present Christmas decoration project.

The Council, by unanimous vote, agreed to make \$1,500 available for Christmas decorations. It is expected that these new decorations will be used at least three years, maybe longer. If additional money is needed, the C. of C. agreed to raise such on its own.

Discussion switched to airport facilities. The report received by council members was that government facilities might be made available soon — problem at Carrizozo is not having any

The Thanksgiving turkey weekend is past, air has turned a bit nippy, Christmas trees going up all along Carrizozo streets, (people invited to decorate them), store windows are bright with gift suggestions, Christmas ads in the newspaper, letters to Santa coming along — it won't be long until Santa Claus, a real friend of all young people, will be coming to town.

The first free show, sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce, was a big success. Something like 144 bottles of various drinks consumed and the free Coke cards are just now getting around town.

There will be two full-length shows, "Rebel Without a Cause," this Saturday in the fire hall, one at 10:00 a.m. and another at 1:00 p.m. A week from Saturday "The Blob" will be shown.

The Christmas trees along Carrizozo streets are coming along fine. Ray Gabehart, Chamber of Commerce president and the man who has ram-rodded the Christmas tree project, says they will all be in place by this weekend.

## 1928 supreme court ruling protects counties

SANTA FE — Legislators talking about consolidating little counties apparently aren't familiar with a 1928 state supreme court ruling which said in effect that the legislature does not have the authority to abolish or consolidate counties.

Rep. David Cargo of Albuquerque, the legislator who brought the law suit that resulted in 12 small counties having only fractional members of the house, recently made a public statement that the next session of the legislature would consider consolidation of small counties to meet the fractional member problem.

### TRIED TO KILL CATRON COUNTY

Cargo, a lawyer who should know better, was talking without consideration of the 1928 ruling.

The legislature of 1927 passed a law abolishing Catron county and created Rio Grande county composed of the areas of Catron and Socorro counties.

Another law, passed later in the same session, changed the name of Rio Grande to Socorro. It was a legal device intended to abolish Catron and give it to Socorro with a procedure that legislators thought was within the law.

### TWELVE COUNTIES ON THE LIST

A list suit brought by Atty. Gen. Bob Dow against Treasurer Warren Gehman brought the ruling that seems to say that the legislature cannot abolish counties, or therefore consolidate counties.

Union, Guadalupe, Lincoln, Luna, Hidalgo, Torrance, Harding, Catron, Sierra, Socorro, DeBaca and Mora.

### CHANGED NAME OF GUADALUPE

The legislature has pulled several legal tricks with counties.

In 1923 the name of San Miguel was momentarily changed to Jefferson and then back to San Miguel to accomplish a complicated legal purpose. The same year Quay was changed to Washington and back to Quay.

No legal trick was the 1903 change of the name of Guadalupe county to Leonard Wood. It lasted for two years and the old name was restored.

### GOLDWATER FANS SET ADRIFF

The political upheaval following the president's assassination has practically eliminated Sen. Barry Goldwater of Arizona as a strong prospect for the Republican nomination for president, leaving adrift hundreds of New Mexicans, both Republicans and Democrats, who had thrown in behind him.

Former legislator Anderson Carter of Lovington who changed his registration from Democrat to Republican had been working almost full time for Goldwater for several months.

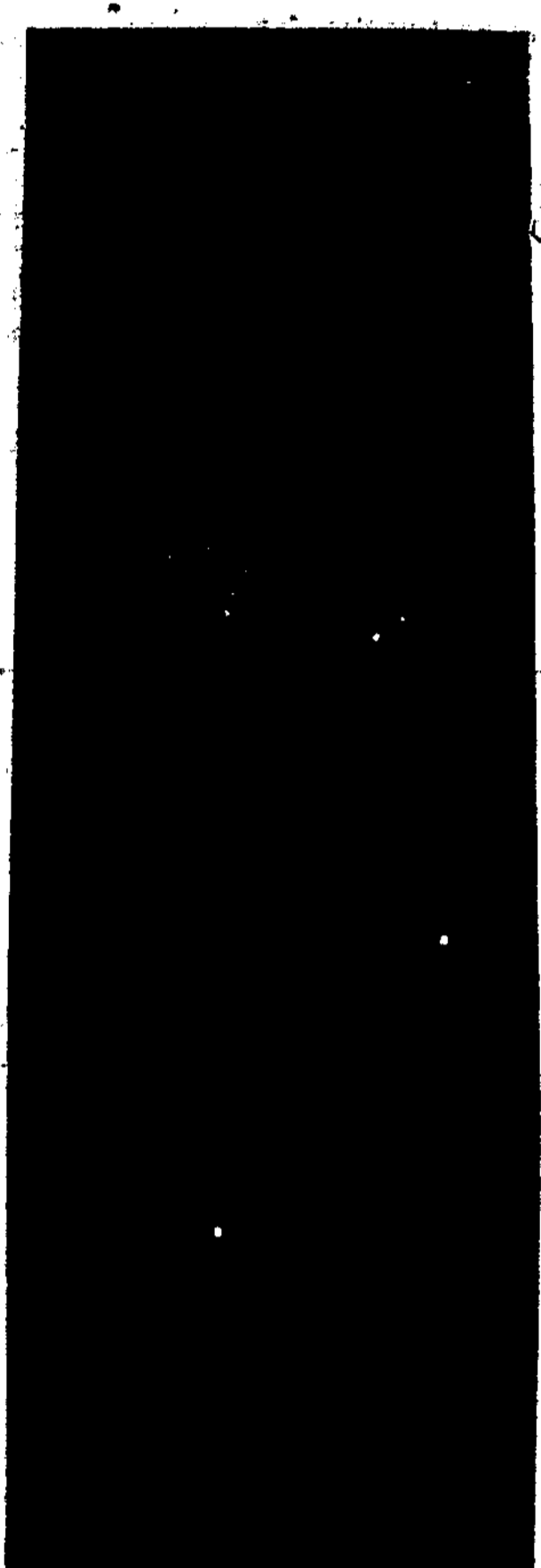

## FARM NEWS

**JOHN COOPER LEAVES TO ATTEND 4-H CONGRESS**  
John Cooper leaves this week to attend the National 4-H Congress in Chicago. Santa Fe Railways pay his expenses. He will be among 1500 other 4-H members attending from 49 states.

Although the 4-H Congress does not open officially until Sunday, the New Mexico boys and girls will arrive in Chicago late Saturday afternoon, Nov. 30, as will most of the other delegates. A special "get-acquainted" party is planned for Saturday night in the Conrad Hilton Hotel, headquarters for the Congress delegates. Special church services are scheduled for Sunday morning.

Tours of the Chicago area are planned throughout the week for the boys and girls. Among the places they will visit are the Art Institute, the International Harvester Plant, the Chicago Museum of Natural History, and the Museum of Science and Industry.

Other highlights of the week will be a visit to the International Livestock Exposition, the annual "Friendship Party" at Chicago's famous Aragon Ballroom, and the National 4-H Style Revue, when state 4-H style revue champions model their champion ensembles. Another annual event of Congress is the "pop concert" by the Chicago Symphony Orchestra, continuing a Congress tradition.

Extension Conference "Keeping Up to Date" will be the theme of the annual Extension Conference at New Mexico State University, December 3-5. The conference, attended by men and women county agents and extension specialists, will feature latest technical subject-matter information in agriculture and home economics, according to John W. Gaume, County agent leader at New Mexico State and chairman of the conference planning committee.

Arthur Fiedler, director of the Boston Pops Orchestra, will conduct the Chicago Orchestra and two 4-H soloists will be featured.

Special breakfasts, luncheons and banquets have been planned throughout the week for the 4-Hers and top entertainers will be featured on these programs. At these sessions, the boys and girls will have a chance to meet representatives of the businesses and organizations which sponsor the trips to Congress.

### NEW DEADLINE FOR WOOL INCENTIVE PAYMENTS

January 31, 1964 is the deadline date for all woolgrowers to file their application for incentive payments for wool or lambs sold between April 1, 1963, and December 31, 1963. All account sales receipts should be filed with your County ASCS office before the deadline date. Failure to file may result in loss of the incentive payment for this marketing year.

The new deadline is being set at January 31st as the marketing year is being placed on a calendar year basis. The change to the calendar year basis shortens only the 1963 marketing year to a nine-month period.

Mohair incentive payments will be made on the same marketing year basis as those for wool and unshorn lambs.

### THAWED FOODS DON'T DETERIORATE FASTER THAN NONFROZEN FOODS

The homemaker who stores thawed food in her refrigerator is taking no more risk than if she stores comparable foods that haven't been frozen.

Researchers for the U. S. Department of Agriculture have found that both thawed foods and unfrozen foods deteriorate at about the same rate. The condition or quality of the foods when first frozen and the refrigerator temperature were controlling factors.

The researchers made a survey of past studies involving meat, fish, and poultry. The survey indicated that most scientists found freezing and thawing had no significant effect on the rate of spoilage in the thawed stage.

Then the USDA scientists did come studies of their own involving whole and minced chicken. This research, based on bacterial counts and odor tests, showed that shelf life at chill temperatures was about the same for fresh and frozen thawed chicken.

### APPLY FERTILIZER AT RIGHT TIME FOR BETTER RESULTS

Are you applying enough fertilizer? Leave a check strip on tree without fertilizer. Then check later to see if the fertilizer is doing any good. Often not enough fertilizer is applied at the proper time. Check strips can tell you the difference between the different rates of application.

### RATS CAN EAT UP YOUR FARM PROFITS

Would you keep animals that eat and spoil your grain, carry disease to your livestock and family, kill small animals and chickens, but don't return one penny to your farm income? That's what you're doing if you allow rats on your farm. "Just fifty rats can eat enough grain annually to feed a dairy cow for one year," "one rat can eat about two-thirds as much mash as a hen. And they waste and contaminate many times more food than they eat."

Rats destroy property by gnawing, burrowing, and nesting. Grain bags, paper cartons, and wood containers are damaged worst, but even concrete, brick, metal, and wood are gnawed. Rats start fires by chewing electric wire insulation and ruin electrical appliances by short-circuiting open switches. They use inflammable materials to build nests. Rat burrows seriously weaken foundations and bottom floors.

Rats carry contagious abortion distemper, mange, and rabies. All told, over 35 known rat-borne diseases threaten animals and people.

Gnawing and destroying property — biting and killing and spreading disease — constantly eating your produce and food? Can you afford to keep such an animal on your farm?

"Future Challenges for Extension" will be the title of an address by Dr. Phillip J. Leyendecker, director of the Cooperative Extension Service in New Mexico, at the opening of the conference.

Extension specialists will preside over subject-matter discussions in their respective fields.

Guest speakers include C. Hurlon Ray, Soil Conservation Service, Albuquerque; Drew Clouid, State director, Farmers Home Administration, Albuquerque; Ray S. Wolf, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, Albuquerque; V. Loretta Cowden, Federal Extension Service, Washington, D. C.; and Bernie Bracher, program director, Station KRQD-TV, El Paso.

Winter Thinking

Except for small batches of skiers, people on the move for southern climes, and a normal flow of travelers through the country - tourist business is quiet until around Memorial Day of 1964.

The cold winter months are time for planning, how to best attract tourists into the state, how to keep them reasonably happy and entertained when they are here, and how to extend their stay in the several counties of the state.

The tourist business came to mind while reading about Texas State Highway Department's air-conditioned Tourist Bureau centers. We have visited a couple of these and found them good, very good. They are open to help travelers from 7 to 7 in the summer. Travelers only have to ask to get the full treatment in a courteous and complete manner.

We have some bad deals in New Mexico state politics and one of them is the Department of Development which suffers a chronic ulcer from frequent change of heads, lack of direction, and party politics.

There is little good to say about the Department under Mechem. Under Campbell it suffers belly pains even worse. Most recent release from the N. M. Department of Development was "Study No. 1, The Executive Branch of State Government, By Gov. Jack M. Campbell." This study says nothing of interest to New Mexico residents, and is a total loss where tourist business is concerned, yet it came from the Department of Development - our one agency which should be interested in tourists.

The Department of Development has one going concern

(but nothing to the credit of the Department) which is the New Mexico magazine that was gathered up when the Department was set up.

Instead of being a political football... this Department of Development could do a lot of things for the State. Changes need to be made and probably the plums are too juicy for the politicians.

A planned program some 10 years ahead is necessary, planned and continuous help to communities is vital, a program within our means that will put New Mexico advantages in front of people, particularly in the east.

The first thing that has to be done is take this Department out of politics - right there the State of New Mexico is a whipped pup.

\$1,500 Worth Of Faith

A lot or a little, depending on your angle of view - the way this particular \$1,500 was spent amounts to a lot of faith.

The Carrizozo Town Council voted unanimously Tuesday to provide \$1,500 for Christmas decorations for the Town... this money will be spent the early part of next year for the 1964 Christmas season. The Chamber of Commerce will accept the money and plan the street decorations.

The Council was not reluctant, just hesitant for good reasons. The Chamber of Commerce in Carrizozo has been most notable for its ups and downs - most recently up, way up. The question was - what will the C of C be doing next year etc. The Council had "faith" and now it's up to the C of C to make good. We think they will, and in a way that will be real pleasing next Christmas.

Kif Carson writes about 'Wyatt Earp'

A Book Review

Author Ed Bartholomew opens the text of his brand new Western American volume, "Wyatt Earp, The Untold Story," with a setting in the modest Earp home of Colton, California. The pages commence with the old frontier gentleman on a March day of 1882, mourning the death of his son. He scribbles an entry into the family Bible: "Died: Morgan S. Earp, son of N. P. and V. A. Earp, his wife. Departed this life on the 18th day of March, in the year of our Lord, 1882."

At the time, the Old Earp was beginning to show signs of discouragement in coping with the "fighting Earps," and swore he'd stop it for once and for all, as he slammed shut the covers of the Holy Book, and emphatically asserted, "From this day on, we will recognize no other Earp except my family and their descendants."

It is from this point the author then introduces other occupants of the old sire's household, the two bullet-riddled Earp sons who are refuged there until wounds heal. He also then tells the location of the other sons, including Wyatt.

From this introductory acquaintance the reader is carried through the early part of Wyatt's life, by deep research which covers the Wyatt Earp period from 1848 until 1880, when Wyatt left Kansas. The 328 pages, with 21 chapters, of fine print are brimming full of straight facts direct from the horse's mouth, which probably have never before appeared in the print of one volume. Ed has stopped at nothing to present the reader and student of Western Americana with a clear insight to Wyatt's life, and background.

A chapter by chapter bibliography is a part of the volume, showing the exhaustive sources of the work. "Wyatt Earp, The Untold Story," 1848 to 1880, published by the Frontier Book Company, Toyahvale, Texas, (\$6.00), will have a sequel - Book Two, to be published. This volume will include the time from 1879, and well through the 1920s. No student or reader of Old West subjects would care to miss the two volumes.

The author has other previous works, to his credit: Among them: "Western Hard-Cases; Kill or be Killed; Black Jack Ketchum; Etc." All by a man who spent much of his time along the unbeaten paths of research for material for a true picture of the days of the Old West.

Law regulates cutting of Christmas trees

Section 62-1-13 of the Christmas tree tag law states that no person shall cut or remove for sale any evergreen tree, branch, bough or bush, without the written consent of the owner, whether the land is publicly or privately owned. The written consent shall contain a legal description of the land where the tree was cut.

Trees cut to be offered for sale for the purpose of Christmas decoration shall bear a tag purchased from the department of state forestry. Once attached to the tree, the tag shall not be removed except by the ultimate consumer or user.
