## Legislature denied 'sap' citizens the right to vote in primary election

PEOPLE DENIED PRIMARY VOTE

**SANTA FE** — The Legislature raised the price of liquor, took a \$23 million tax bite out of the sap citizens and then denied them the right to vote in primary nomination of party candidates.

The repeal of the direct primary for selecting state level candidates is causing more harsh criticism of the legislature than the huge tax increase.

The primary repeal was pushed through to ease the nomination of U. S. Rep. Joe Montoya for the senate next year against Ed Mechem and was supported by Gov. Jack Campbell and others in office who saw in it a means for their own easy re-nomination.

HYBRID PLAN GIVES POLITICOS CONTROL

Even the legislature couldn't stand an extremely restrictive pre-primary convention bill offered by Sen. Clint Anderson through State Sen. Ed Mead of Albuquerque, and in substituting for it came up with a convention-primary hybrid that is about as good as possible for that kind of thing but which still takes away from the people the right to express themselves on the candidates.

The state party conventions that will pick the candidates for the later primary election will be made up of delegates that will inevitably be selected and controlled by county chairmen with the saps on the outside obliged to take what is given them.

CONVENTION PLAN FOR STATE ONLY

The convention system will apply to state level candidates only. District and county candidates will continue to be nominated in direct primary election as before.

The conventions will vote on candidates for each office until one gets a majority. He will get first place on the primary ballot.

Others who received as much as 20 per cent of the convention vote at any time during the balloting may have their names on the ballot under the first place candidates.

A nearly impossible provision is included for candidates other than those named by the conventions. They could get on by securing petitions signed by 3 per cent of the voters of their party in each of 10 counties. It would be three per cent of the number that voted for the party candidate for the same office in previous general election.

REFORM PROVISIONS WRITTEN IN LAW

The new law tries to correct some of the abuses present in a similar system that was used in New Mexico in 1952 and '54 and then thrown out because of public disgust.

It prohibits county convention delegations voting by the unit rule. That means casting the whole county vote for the candidate the majority of the delegation favors.

It prohibits proxy voting. That means that a convention vote may be cast only by the official delegate himself.

It prohibits changing votes after they have been officially cast. This was a device used to rig the 1952 and '54 conventions.

PICKING DELEGATES MAJOR WEAKNESS

The system breaks down in the selection of delegates to the conventions. They will be picked in so-called precinct and county primaries which are easily rigged by local politicians to get the delegates they want.

A tiny portion of the people participate in precinct primaries, and outsiders who attempt it are often denied a voice.

It is at the delegate picking level that the system falls into the hands of a few politicos.

There has been much comment that a complete reversion to the old smoke-filled-room type of plain convention would be more palatable than the system which pretends to be half convention and half primary. (Continued on back page)

## Entry blanks for biennial due

James Taylor Forrest, Director of the Fine Arts Museum of New Mexico, has announced that the deadline for the receipt of registration blanks for the 1963 Biennial Exhibition For New Mexico Artists is March 25. Entries for this exhibition must be delivered to the Museum no later than April 8.

This exhibition is open to all resident New Mexico artists, 18 years old and over. All media in painting, original prints, drawings, and sculpture are eligible. Each artist may submit one entry only in each of the three categories. These works must have been completed within the last two years and not previously exhibited at the Fine Arts Museum. Paintings are limited to a maximum size of 49" x 50" without frame and sculpture must not exceed 150 pounds.

The following prizes will be awarded by the jury for this exhibition: Painting, all media, First, \$150; Second, \$75; Third, \$50. Sculpture, First, \$100; Second, \$50. Prints/Drawings, First, \$75; Second, \$50.

The 1963 Biennial Exhibition For New Mexico Artists will be open on June 9, with a public reception from 3:00 to 5:00 p.m. sponsored by the Women's Board of the Museum.

RUNAWAY TRUCKS CAUSE DAMAGE

### Planting for the future

New young ponderosa pine trees, 100,000 of them, are being planted this spring by personnel of the Lincoln National Forest.

The plantations, on the Mayhill and Sacramento Range Districts, are being set out to start tree growth once again on fire scars left by the Allen Canyon Fire and other major fires of the recent past. Hand planting is underway in the Mayhill area now, and next week a planting machine will be put in service. With this machine, a Whitfield Planter, pulled by a small tractor, it is expected that a team of three men will plant more seedling trees in a day than would be possible for ten men using hand tools.

As explained by a spokesman for the Lincoln National Forest, the tree planting operation is expected to expand within the next year or two until all the old fire scars on the forest have been treated to return them to tree cover. Establishing tree growth on these bare areas will not only provide timber for future sawmills, but will also improve watershed conditions, reduce soil erosion, and improve conditions for wildlife and domestic stock.

Young trees being planted this year are two year old seedlings raised in the Forest Service Nursery at Halcy, Nebraska. They were delivered in a "Trellis" operation by the Forest Service Twin Beech Airplane. This meant a total elapsed time from the nursery to the planting area of eight hours, as compared with at least ten days by other means of transportation. The baby trees thus will have a greatly improved chance of surviving the shock of moving and adjusting to their new home.

The spokesman continued with the explanation that the Forest Service airplane used in this "Trellis" operation was the same Twin Beech, familiar to National Forest users thru its use as a jump plane by the Smokejumpers, for aerial re-education to control erosion on recent burns, as a spray plane on areas of insect outbreaks, and in some instances as an aerial tanker dropping fire retardants.

### Improvement of U.S. 380 is discussed

ROSWELL — A request for the latest traffic count on U.S. 380 east of Roswell, jointly from the Tatum and Roswell Chambers of Commerce, from the State Highway Commission will kick off a local campaign for improvement of this highway, known as the "gateway to the playground area of Ruidoso."

Tatum, Roswell and Ruidoso people met here for a luncheon Monday to decide on a course of action.

District Highway Commissioner John Cuddeith will be advised of the area's interest in improving the highway, said Bill Deane, chairman of the Roswell Chamber highway committee.

Allen Church of Tatum was spokesman for a delegation from that town. He said of U.S. 380: "The surface is as uneven as any road I have traveled. It's narrow and dangerous."

A. E. Hunt, Ruidoso Chamber of Commerce manager represented Ruidoso interests in the project.

Deane said that nothing has been scheduled for the highway, that three projects on U.S. 70 in the Ruidoso area are scheduled in the near future, near Tularosa, east of Escondido Hill and in the Ruidoso area proper.

A future trip to a Highway Commission meeting in Santa Fe to state the area's case for 380 was tentatively outlined.

Underwood is a former mayor of Lovington where he practiced law from 1951 through 1959. He was associated briefly in 1950 and 1951 with the law firm of Garland and Sanders, Las Cruces. After World War II he served as judge advocate of the General Court Martial in the Presidia at San Francisco.

Underwood and his wife, Katherine, have two children, Jack Jr., 21, who is in the Army, and John, 15.







## Baca location sold to Texans

Sale of the famous Baca Location Ranch in Sandoval and Rio Arriba counties was formally announced in Albuquerque at an informal luncheon attended by about 100 prominent businessmen and ranchers on January 23. The 100,000 acre spread of deeded land has been owned by the Bond family since 1915 when it was purchased by Frank and George Bond. The announcement was made by George Savage of Albuquerque, trustee of the Bond Estate.

Buyers of the ranch are J.P. "Pat" Dunigan and Associates of Abilene, Texas. Dunigan is president of the Dungan Tool & Supply at Abilene and has oil and gas interests. Price of the huge tract was not disclosed. Nor were immediate plans for the future announced, although Dunigan said that they would be, "in the public interest." King Brothers of Stanley, New Mexico, currently hold a two-year grass lease on the Baca and New Mexico Timber Co. has a long term lease on the timber rights.

Legislation was introduced in Congress last year which would pave the way for the government to purchase the ranch, make a National Park out of the Valle Grande part and turn the rest over to the Forest Service. Dunigan said that his purchase did not preclude the Government from negotiating for a portion of the Baca. Senator Clinton F. Anderson said that the Senate Interior Committee would hold hearings on the proposed legislation just as

if the land had not changed hands.

The Baca is a tract 12 1/2 x 12 1/2 miles square, with 25,000 acres of grass and meadow, 38,000 acres in Ponderosa Pine and about 37,000 acres in Spruce. The Baca spreads over a 156-square mile area. Contained within the Baca's boundaries is most of Jemez Crater which is the world's largest extinct volcano crater, measuring 16 miles from rim to rim. Elevations range from the floor of Valle Grande at 8,300 ft. to the top of Redondo Peak, 11,254 ft.

Sant Fe National Forest surrounds the Baca on three sides (north, south, and west) and is bounded on the east by Los Alamos Federal Reservation and Pyute Cliff Dwellings National



We wouldn't want to think that any particular pressure group controlled the vote of our legislators, be it school, liquor, labor, etc. Nor would we expect them to be right every time, just to maintain a batting average of voting for the best interests of New Mexico, and Lincoln County when possible.

Joe and Bill have a fine record, in our way of thinking.

## Tumbleweeds Tumbling

Monday morning the News office was visited by a large tumbleweed. Friendly enough sort of weed and we don't mean to belittle them because they provide cover for a lot of country that would simply up and move to the next county without something to hold the sandy soil in place.

It's just the tumbling time of year in Lincoln County. A few March breezes come along in the normal course of real bad weather haunting other sections of the country.

Won't be long until the winds of March will shimmy down and people's spirits will soar with the budding of spring. About this time the budding of some cleanup spark would make the coming of spring memorable. (Spring begins this very day, March 21.)

Carrizozo does not need wait for a major event, like paving, to spark cleanup. Some could be done now, this year and next year. Just needs the right push to fire people up for elbow and back work.

Such things as broken down street signs, litter around vacant houses, old vehicles, few uncompleted fire hazards, old jobs, acres of vacant lots, are just waiting for spring, and people who have pride in their town, enough to get some cleanup underway.

## Get Their Teeth In

The world is full of do-gooders and do-nothings... which is which can be a problem of personal opinion.

A Youth Conservation Corps is being pushed by Sen. Humphrey (with 34 other Democrats and one Republican according to our report) and a Domestic Peace Corps has its backers. The plight of the nation's young people and the plain accusation that American Youth has become a criminal class, helps back up need for such corps — but don't believe all you read. Youth Conservation and Domestic Peace Corp have a lot of "do-good" publicity value as well as being valuable political tools.

A paragraph taken from the National PTA Congress Bulletin adds a bit of fuel to the fire: "It's always gratifying to read the reports of national chairmen and state presidents in the annual proceedings of the National Congress of Parents and Teachers, for they present a broad and vivid panorama of a year's PTA activity at all levels — local, state, and national. (A national officer once reported that she stayed up till the wee hours of the morning reading her copy of Proceedings, so thrilled was she with the story of PTA achievement it unfolded.)"

The intent of PTA is obviously to do good — but are they, when you consider the need for federal intervention for the good of youth.

It would seem that if PTA is worth the salt served at any of its suppers, our parents and teachers should be in the best position to know and to do something about cutting down on youthful crimes. We have here the phenomenon of glowing success accounts, "It's a great organization," "all needs of all children are the joint responsibility of all PTA members" — on one side and a message on the plight of the nation's young people filed with the President which makes one wonder how to classify the PTA accounts.

"Do-good" business is not the prime responsibility of Congress. "Do Nothing" is not the announced intent of PTA. Somewhere along the line do-gooders and do-nothings got all scrambled up.

Dear Ed: Been out of the Canyon for a day or two, had to go to town to get a couple of New Tires. We are glad that the sheepherders convention in Santa Fe is over with. Sixty days is about all that these poor old herders can stand, and I know that it is about forty days longer than the tax payers can take. For all that they did while in session 20 days would have been long. Figure it yourself, at twenty dollars a day or so. How many of them were up there, quite a sum of money. The prize take was the bill that they passed to govern the sale of land. Did they do anything about the State Land Commissioner selling the school land in the State. The thing I wonder about what the schools will be doing when all of this school land is sold and the money squandered for Oil tankers and steam ships also to pay high priced politicians in Santa Fe from seven thousand to twenty five thousand dollars a year on many jobs that should have been done away with years ago.

An interesting paragraph in March Forbes magazine tells about the biggest one-man corner tried in wheat. In 1897 and 1898 a young unknown named Joseph Leiter, son of a real-estate millionaire, took on E. D. Armour, GS, founder of Armour & Co. To keep Armour from covering his December wheat contracts at Chicago, Leiter shipped wheat to Europe, 700,000 bushels in one day. Apparently hopelessly short, Armour scoured the country for wheat, hired ice breakers to keep Duluth harbor open, built a new Chicago warehouse in one month, and got out of what appeared to be a bad spot.

A farmer of Sugar Creek, Ohio, William H. Stauffer, does not agree with national Farm Bureau policy. After speaking at 18 soil and water conservation districts in Indiana and Illinois, Stauffer wrote F. B. President Schuman, "They did not all agree with me." Stauffer wrote, "But I found that none agreed with your extreme stand. Most of them feel that you are not doing the total farm scene any good. I discovered that there is a growing feeling that the American Farm Bureau does not really represent their thinking and interests... The attitude you are taking relative to 'supply management' plays right into the hand of industry, which is interested in keeping farmers divided so it can continue to cash in on them. The American Farm Bureau Federation is the voice of big commercial agriculture as well as big business, and does not really respect the interest of the family farm."

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

1954 CONVENTION GAVE FREE RIDES

When practically the same system was used in 1954 John Simms was nominated for governor without an opponent (and then became the first governor to be denied a second term in thirty years).

The convention also gave Sen. Clint Anderson a free ride without opposition; also Congressman John J. Dempsey and Tony Fernandez, Dick Robinson for attorney general, Johnny Walker for land commissioner, Dan Sadler and Jim McGhee for supreme court justice.
