## Council puts OK on preliminary paving plan

The lengthy work of preparing plans for Carrizozo Paving District No. 1 arrived at a point of completion Tuesday night as they come up for final passage by the town council — and were passed by unanimous vote.

No property owner in Carrizozo should lack for information as to the exact amount of cost and benefits of the paving. Owners (around 200), lots, blocks, addition, front footage, estimates are listed in a document mated cost, and maximum befiled with the town clerk and open to inspection. There are 551 assessments.

Total cost of the paving project is \$231,314.58. Total cost to

the town is \$201,227.38 if the project is completed this year. The state will provide \$30,087.20 as their part of paving Highway 54 and Avenue E which connects US54 and 380.

Following publication of the notice, three times May 16, 21, 30 in the Lincoln County News the protest hearing will be held June 7, at 7:00 p.m. in the town hall.

Construction could start in the last half of July and completion expected in 120 days. There will be an 8 inch base under state financed streets (State money actually is going into the general pot to partially finance all paving), width 15 feet

A 6-inch base will support rest of paving, most 31-foot width.

The Mann Engineering Company of Roswell has prepared the plans, specifications and assessment rolls, all subject to changed following the hearing.

It was learned Tuesday when two town officials met with the county commissioners that the county is much interested in the paving project. The Carrizozo officials were told that the county expects to hire an architect and get started on a new courthouse. Their thinking is that some set of commissioners has to do the job, if it isn't done the county stands to lose everything, for as much as

a 20 year period. Without the paving the county would not be near so interested in bringing the courthouse issue to a vote. County valuation this year is over \$20 million.

In other action at the Tuesday meeting the council read applications for swimming pool manager, none selected at that time. A Carrizozo resident complained about an outside plumbing facility being too close to his kitchen. Some work is being done on the elimination of such hazards.

The new swimming pool park area will be fertilized, cost close to \$200 for the town. Some complaints about livestock in

town received. Keeping livestock in town is not prohibited by ordinance, so long as the livestock does not run at large, and lots are kept clean.

The town will attempt to get some hazardous buildings torn down, starting with the Allen Brooks lots where a house has recently been moved off.

Attending the meeting were Mayor Jete Voss, Councilmen Fred English, Leandro Vega, and Buster Smoot, Edward Penfield, clerk; Alfred Jones, attorney; and Wayne Withers, utility manager.

Dick Cox, representing Mann Engineering presented the paving district plans.

## Grizzlies do well at Rose Festival

We felt the Grizzlies did their best job of the season at Tularosa Saturday.

Herman Sanchez turned in an outstanding 880 run, finishing 2nd to Kazhe of Tulle. Kazhe's time was 2:08.6, Herman ran 2:09.1.

Bobby Ortiz picked up a 2nd in the javelin throw at 163' 6 1/2", 1 ft behind a boy from Hatch.

Bill Wrye (at 5' 7") tied with Calhoun of Eunice for 2nd in the high jump. Both finished behind Rocha of Canutillo, Texas, who went to 6' 2".

Faustino Gallegos tied with 3 others for 3rd in the pole vault. Faustino vaulted 10' and missed 10' 6".

Gerald Posey took 4th in the high hurdles in 17.2, this is the season high for Gerald Calhoun of Eunice with 14.7.

Our mile relay team, (Potty, J. Lovato, Benbow and Sanchez) took 5th in this event due to some other teams being disqualified. Our time 3:55.4 best time of the season.

Our mile medley relay (M. Vozz, E. Lovato, J. Lovato and Gallegos) would have taken 5th in 3:59.6 except for handing off out of the handoff zone. Result disqualification.

Our 440 relay did 48.5 best yet and the 880 turned in a 1:39.5, season high. By this weekend we hope to do even better.

Bob Calhoun of Eunice took five first place awards in the district track meet held in Carrizozo Saturday, with a little help from Eunice's relay teams, and Coulter in the shotput, Eunice is in good shape for the state track meet coming up this Friday and Saturday.

Calhoun won the broadjump, tied with Wrye of Zozo in the high jump and given first because of fewer misses, 100 yard dash, 120 high hurdles, 180 low hurdles.

## Campbell shoots off head of steam

### GOVERNOR MAKES LOOSE CHARGE

Governor Campbell, usually restrained in his political statements, got steamed up with party fervor at the recent Demo dinner in Albuquerque and accused the recent Governor McChem administration of issuing tax deeds to Republican officials without due process.

He said later that he referred to a deed issued to Katherine Nail of Albuquerque. Miss Nail is not a Republican official. She did serve for a few months three years ago as vice chairwoman of the Bernalillo county Young Republican organization, but has been in no party office since.

### BURROUGHS MAN JOINS PAYROLL

SANTA FE — Don Hammond state liquor director in the closing months of the Gov. John Burroughs administration, has taken time out from his bar and restaurant to be a \$600-a-month traveling man for the state motor vehicle department.

### WRONG PEOPLE GOT LICENSES

Hammond, a state policeman, was brought in as liquor chief in October, 1960 when Kern Aldridge for fired for issuing three liquor licenses in Farmington. Those who got the permits dealt with the wrong people or something.

Hammond canceled the licenses and in the closing weeks of the administration issued a new license to the Petroleum Club Inn, Inc. at Farmington.

Immediately upon leaving the liquor office when the new administration came in at the first of 1961 he purchased the popular Maria's Mexican Kitchen and Bar in Santa Fe.

George Franklin, liquor director in 1961, reinstated the original three licenses in Farmington issued by Aldridge.

### VAIO, SANCHEZ ALSO RETURNED

Hammond is one of several figures from the Burroughs administration who have joined Gov. Jack Campbell in the statehouse.

Others are Purchasing Agent Dante Vaio, Motor Vehicle Commissioner Benny Sanchez, Howard Rosenthal of the Bank Examiners, Gasoline Tax Director Charlie Bassett, Employment Security Director Dick Pino, and several in the highway department.

### DIDN'T DO IT, SAYS APODACA

Justice of the Peace Happy Apodaca of Las Cruces has told attorney general investigators that he did not offer a state policeman \$2 kick-back for traffic cases referred to his court.

Capt. Archie White of Las Cruces several weeks ago notified police headquarters here that a state patrolman had been approached on the \$2 deal and the AG investigation followed. Apodaca was named by the police officer.

### WASTING MONEY ON AMENDMENT

An amendment to legalize absentee voting is being offered again at the next election after being defeated nine times.

The constitutional change, which is almost impossible to pass because of the extreme requirements for amending that portion of the constitution, is proposed by almost every ses-

sion of the legislature as a sop to womens groups and others and costs several thousand dollars for printing and advertising.

The portion of the constitution involved, which deals with the rights of Spanish speaking people, can be changed only by a vote of three fourths of those participating in the election and at least two thirds in every county.

### JOHNNY WALKER SEES CHAIRMAN

Land Commissioner Johnny Walker has been talking with Demo county chairman about his chief field man, Sheepherder Hays, for the party nomination for land commissioner next year and just incidentally about his own prospects for U. S. Rep. Joe Montoya's place in the House. Montoya is supposed to run for the Senate against Republican Ed McChem.

### SOME AGAINST ABSENT VOTING

It has never come close to passing and leaves New Mexico as the only place in the country where people can't vote when they're away from home.

New Mexico had absentee balloting for a while before it was challenged and thrown out by the supreme court. During that time it set off one of the worst election scandals the state ever experienced.

Hundreds of absentee votes were rigged in McKinley county to throw the election to the Republican candidates of 1932 and those responsible got caught.

Many who recall the McKinley scandal still vote against the proposal and so do quite a few others who think citizens should think enough of their right to vote to stay home on election day.



## Responsibilities under draft law

The draft has been extended for four years, until July 1, 1967. This means that the young men of the country must continue to expect to serve in the military forces. This series of articles outlines the basic responsibilities and rights of young men under the draft law.

### The Military Obligation

At age 17, a young man (with his parents' consent) may choose among a wide variety of ways to begin the discharge of his current active duty and reserve military obligation. He may enlist in the regular forces for 3 to 6 years. He may enter a number of reserve or National Guard programs. He may volunteer, with parental consent, for induction for two years.

Even after he registers for the draft at age 18, he has a head of him at the present time 5 or more years in which to choose his own time and method of discharging the military obligation. As he gains more education, these opportunities widen to include various military programs leading toward a commission.

But if he does not make his own choice, at around age 23 he may expect induction if he is qualified and not deferred or exempt. And even though he may not be qualified, or is deferred or exempt when his normal turn to serve comes, he may still be put in Class I-A if at any time up to his 35th birthday he loses the deferment or exemption, or the cause of his disqualification is removed.

If he should be reclassified into Class I-A after he would normally be inducted and before age 26 he would probably be the oldest man available in his local board and, if qualified, would be the first to be called.

Because of the need for manpower in the Armed Forces, about 6 out of ten men who became 26 in 1962 had entered service voluntarily or by induction. Those who had not were almost all disqualified men. A few were those who were continuously deferred or exempt through age 26.

Government manpower experts estimate that well over half of all men who reach age 26 through the next 4 years will be required to enter service to maintain active and reserve strengths. Disqualification and deferment and exemption will account for the remainder.

Virtually no qualified and available man can expect to reach age 26 without entering service over the next 4 years.





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

## Against The Balance

This world today seems to lay much importance on the "delicate balance" of power between nations. News is managed by top government officials because the "delicate balance" might be upset. We continue to pour millions and billions of dollars into certain foreign aid projects to keep the balance just right. Certain sections of the country, and certain politicians get concessions, all costing money, because of the "delicate balance" of politics.

We believe that future historians will find many flaws in such a way of life, and that government leadership during such a period will be counted as weak. As a way of life the "delicate balance" theory is not true to natural laws, and is a risky routine for a nation.

Keeping the "delicate balance" means not to offend any country, or leader of a nation, to the point where they might quit talking and start fighting — all the time letting their infiltrate our borders, ferment troubles the full length of the American continent, and around the world, which in the long run can cause more trouble than "blunt words" spoken now.

The bomb, is the big weight of argument back of the "delicate balance" theory of negotiation. A lot of fancy phrases and words can be coined about this theory, when it's still pretty much man against man. For instance, your neighbor packs a gun, and so you do in self defense. You don't go around provoking people but still you are not running scared because people are soon running over you.

It's like that with Russia and no world court, no allowances for Cuba, no amounts of foreign aid can offset the fact that if Russia thought it to her advantage to resort to atomic warfare today, we'd be in for war.

The "delicate balance", so popular with our government, is not for Americans — its main advantage lies with our enemies and they are taking full advantage of this weakness on the part of U. S. leadership.

Governments are people, people are human and they differ only little in their sins and virtues from the days when Alexander the Great conquered a major portion of the world.

Caution, good judgment, and frequently good nature are valuable assets in government . . . but voicing to every trifle made up by the numerous troublesome governments is bad for a government founded on the pillar of rock.

A stout character and belief in American virtues (some old fashioned maybe) will fit a man much better to lead government than the cleverness necessary to maintain a continued delicate balance.

# FARM NEWS

By County Agent Ralph Dunlap

Screwworms have been found in Grant, Hidalgo and Luna Counties, during April. If you have a wound infested with worms, get a sample and send them in. You can get sample bottles at the County Agents' office, in Carrizozo. Remember an early report will help you and your neighbors do a better job of controlling this pest.

Mustard poisoning has been reported in some areas of Lincoln County. Mustard weed when eaten in large quantities causes a paralyzed or woody tongue, and the animal can't swallow. This is generally when the mustard plant is flowering.

The only remedy at present is to put the animals affected in a pen and feed them through a hose, put into the stomach. Put some cotton seed meal and/or sugar in the water as the animal becomes dehydrated. Give them from 5 to 10 gallons of

water at a time. They will usually recover in about a week.

If you have another pasture that does not have too much mustard, put the livestock in that pasture. The first symptoms are a staggered walk and lack of vigor.

Winners of the Wool Judging Contest, held last Friday, were Punk Cooper, Joe Cooper, Jud Cooper, and Louise Harrington, in the senior division. In the Junior division, Lynda Harrington, Jimmy Booky, Barry Bizzell and Roy Hamilton, were the 4 high individuals. These 4-Hers will represent Lincoln County at the state contest in Artesia on May 4.

Lincoln County 4-H members placed in the red ribbon group in the Senior and Junior Divisions, at the State Wool Judging Contest, Saturday. The Lincoln County Team, in the Senior Division was, John Cooper, Joe Cooper, Jud Cooper, and Louise Harrington. The Junior Team was Lynda Harrington, Jimmy Booky, Barry Bizzell and Roy Hamilton. Lynda Harrington was third high individual in the Junior Division.

The apple crop in the Hondo Valley area looks good. There has been freeze damage in some areas, especially above Glencoe, in the Upper Bonita, along with spotted areas around San Patricia. Apple prospects look better today than the last two years.

Wind has caused poor pollination and there will be some drop for this reason. A poor fruit set has been noted in some orchards where the entire orchard is Red Delicious, which is self sterile and requires cross pollination.

Spent last Thursday with Dr. Nour, applying Sevin, a thinner, at 12 to 20 days after full bloom. The results will be interesting to see.

Mites were noted in orchards last week. Be sure to check your orchard for mites. Apply a miticide in the next spray, if needed.

## STORE WINTER CLOTHES PROPERLY THIS SUMMER

Give your family's winter clothes a trouble-free vacation by storing them where they will be safe from summer damage!

First, be sure that each garment is completely clean and free of spots and stains before you store it. Make sure, too, that garments are moth-free.

Washing or drycleaning kills moths in all stages of growth. Brushing and sunning garments also rids them of moths, as well as moth eggs and larvae (the larvae do the damage). Brush thoroughly, especially in seams, folds and pockets.

Remove plastic buttons, buckles and other plastic ornaments before storing the garments and avoid using plastic hangers. The plastic may cause a stain or melt into the fabric. Damage from plastic is more likely when garments are stored in a warm, dry place, such as an attic-in summer, or when paradichlorobenzene crystals or naphthalene flakes or crystals are put in with the clothes to protect them from moth damage. However, these "anti-moth" chemicals can be used safely if plastic does not come in contact with the clothes.

Store the garments in tightly-wrapped paper packages, airtight boxes or chests, or garment bags. Even if garments are moth-free when they are put away, they can become moth-infested during the summer unless they are properly stored. For added safety, put clothes in a cool, dry place. Moths cause the most damage when infested clothes are kept in a warm, damp atmosphere.

Cedar chests are old favorites for winter clothes storage, she notes. Cedar oil vapor does kill small moth larvae but not older, larger ones; therefore, all woolen must be free of larvae before they are put in a cedar chest. As a cedar chest gets older, there is less cedar-oil vapor. One that is several years old may give no more protection than any other airtight container.

For added protection against moths, you may want to spray the clean garments with DDT, methoxychlor, chlordane, Strobane, or Berthane before storage. The Extension worker says. These insecticides are sold in pressurized spray containers or as liquid oil solutions to be applied with a sprayer. Be sure to follow directions and observe the cautions given on the container label. Check to see if the garments should be washed or dry cleaned again before they are worn.

Another often-used protection is "moth-balls"—paradichlorobenzene crystals or naphthalene flakes or crystals, which are put in with the clothing when it is stored. As these chemicals evaporate, they produce vapor—the vapor, not the mere odor of the chemicals, kills or repels moths. Usually, directions on the container suggest the amount to use.

Caution, good judgment, and frequently good nature are valuable assets in government. . . but veering to every trifle made up by the numerous trouble-some governments is bad for a government founded on the pilgrim rock.

A stout character and belief in American virtues (some old fashioned maybe) will fit a man much better to lead government than the cleverness necessary to maintain a continued delicate balance.



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# FARM NEWS

By County Agent Ralph Dunlap

Screwworms have been found in Grant, Hidalgo, and Luna Counties, during April. If you have a wound infested with worms, get a sample and send them in. You can get sample bottles at the County Agents office, in Carrizozo. Remember an early report will help you and your neighbors do a better job of controlling this pest.

Mustard poisoning has been reported in some areas of Lincoln County. Mustard weed when eaten in large quantities causes a paralyzed or woody tongue, and the animal can't swallow. This is generally when the mustard plant is flowering. The only remedy at present is to put the animals affected in a pen and feed them through a hose, put into the stomach. Put some cotton seed meal and/or sugar in the water as the animal becomes dehydrated. Give them from 5 to 10 gallons of

water at a time. They will usually recover in about a week. If you have another pasture that does not have too much mustard, put the livestock in that pasture. The first symptoms are a staggered walk and lack of vigor.

Winners of the Wool Judging Contest, held last Friday, were Funk Cooper, Joe Cooper, Jud Cooper, and Louise Harrington, in the senior division. The Lincoln County Team, in the Senior Division was, John Cooper, Joe Cooper, Jud Cooper, and Louise Harrington. The Junior Team was Lynda Harrington, Jimmy Booky, Barry Bizzell and Roy Hamilton. Lynda Harrington was third high individual in the Junior Division.

The apple crop in the Hondo Valley area looks good. There has been freeze damage in some areas, especially above Glencoe, in the upper Bonita, along with spotted areas around San Patricia. Apple prospects look better today than the last two years. Wind has caused poor pollination and there will be some drop for this reason. A poor fruit set has been noted in some orchards where the entire orchard is Red Delicious, which is self sterile and requires cross pollination. I spent last Thursday with Dr. Nour, applying Sevin, a thinner, at 12 to 20 days after full bloom. The results will be interesting to see.

Mites were noted in orchards last week. Be sure to check your orchard for mites. Apply a miticide in the next spray, if needed.

## STORE WINTER CLOTHES PROPERLY THIS SUMMER

Give your family's winter clothes a trouble-free vacation by storing them where they will be safe from summer damage! First, be sure that each garment is completely clean and free of spots and stains before you store it. Make sure, too, that garments are moth-free. Washing or drycleaning kills moths in all stages of growth. Brushing and sunning garments also rids them of moths, as well as moth eggs and larvae (the larvae do the damage). Brush thoroughly, especially in seams, folds and pockets.

Remove plastic buttons, buckles and other plastic ornaments before storing the garments and avoid using plastic hangers. The plastic may cause a stain or melt into the fabric. Damage from plastic is more likely when garments are stored in a warm, dry place, such as an attic-in summer, or when paradichlorobenzene crystals or naphthalene flakes or crystals are put in with the clothes to protect them from moth damage. However, these "anti-moth" chemicals can be used safely if plastic does not come in contact with the clothes.

Store the garments in tightly-wrapped paper packages, airtight boxes or chests, or garment bags. Even if garments are moth-free when they are put away, they can become moth-infested during the summer unless they are properly stored. For added safety, put clothes in a cool, dry place. Moths cause the most damage when infested clothes are kept in a warm, damp atmosphere.

Cedar chests are old favorites for winter clothes storage, she notes. Cedar oil vapor does kill small moth larvae but not older, larger ones; therefore, all woolens must be free of larvae before they are put in a cedar chest. As a cedar chest gets older, there is less cedar-oil vapor. One that is several years old may give no more protection than any other airtight container.

For added protection against moths, you may want to spray the clean garments with DDT, methoxychlor, chlordane, Strobane, or Berthane before storage, the Extension worker says. These insecticides are sold in pressurized spray containers or as liquid oil solutions to be applied with a sprayer. Be sure to follow directions and observe the cautions given on the container label. Check to see if the garments should be washed or dry cleaned again before they are worn.

Another often-used protection is "moth-balls"—paradichlorobenzene crystals or naphthalene flakes or crystals, which are put in with the clothing when it is stored. As these chemicals evaporate, they produce vapor—the vapor, not the mere odor of the chemicals, kills or repels moths. Usually, directions on the container suggest the amount to use.
