Most everyone wants paving in Carrizozo

Protest group wants someone else to pay

A group of people met Monday night at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Vincent Rell to talk over their objections to Carrizozo Paving District No. 1, and plan ways and means to defeat the issue.

Attending this meeting were: C. E. Degner, J. P. Turner, Roy Shafer, Kino Ortiz, C. A. Snow, Henry Hoffman, M. V. Jones, T. A. Spencer, Jr., Herman McKibben, Earlene Tubbs, Mr. and Mrs. Rell, and Paul Payton, invited to report on the meeting.

J. P. Turner acted as moderator. He stated that everyone here is interested in the welfare of Carrizozo. We would like to see it paved, but such a program would work a hardship on some property owners, for instance the girl who washes dishes at the hospital has a \$300 paving assessment. The paving goes by many vacant lots, cost is more than the lots are worth. Different plans could be worked out, town could get loan or outright grant same as Santa Rosa, Socorro, Catron County, Estancia, Tularosa, Clayton, and Farmington have done. This method should be explored.

C. E. Degner spoke of the late Dennis Chavez saying he would get funds for a new courthouse even up to \$250,000 to match a like amount from the county. Degner attended a meeting in Albuquerque, attended by 15 government agencies, met the man who handles water, paving and other such grants, was told to get the town council busy, a direct grant on water or paving up to 50% was available. Council did nothing.

Turner said that expresses all our sentiments. Don't give up paving, but go after the grant money.

Hoffman asked about cost of paving reported in Socorro, 181 front feet for \$75 according to Degner. Shafer said that Santa Rosa got \$134,000.

Snow said, Alamo got it, why don't we. My objection is the approach, not properly planned, estimates are too high. I'm for paving and betterment of the community.

Roy Shafer said, all here are for progress, but opposed to the manner.

Hoffman, it's a burden on a few, the council will hook others with some project the next time.

Mrs. Rell asked, how many empty houses in town, answer about 100.

Degner wrote Mechem about state money, highway department came down, all council did not show for meeting, later got \$31,000.

Kino Ortiz said, my business is based on social security and welfare checks, lots of people want paving but it will bankrupt some.

Mrs. Rell, we couldn't pay for it if we had too.

Spencer, said he was speaking for three people, representing the old McDonald estate. The maximum benefit does not mean that, it means the maximum they can charge. Haven't been able to sell lots, not going to take money out of my business to throw it after that money. Paving won't make lots sell. They are gambling when they say town will grow, I'm not opposed to the program.

Turner, other towns are getting money. Shafer said Vaughn paved every street from gas tax. Snow, I'm for paving if we can get it in the right way. Jones, I don't want to pay 8% when we can get it for 4%.

Spencer, they are going to take out some curb and gutter and streets less than two years old. Shafer said that Frank English and I got \$15,000 20 years ago which paid for paving we have now. Mrs. Rell asked, is it right to buy equipment with gas tax money, answer, yes it is.

Kino Ortiz passed out protest letters. Payton stated that the paving would cost \$150,000. Five years in their opinion, if they were on the council, he has sure signs the council on the paving. That the paving would be paid for by the town. He stated that he had every right to try to beat the paving, but they sure had obligated themselves by their statement to do something for the town. Mavericks coming for three big days

The second annual Little Maverick Rodeo, sponsored by the Lincoln County Rodeo Association, will start kicking up dust at 1:00 p.m. Friday June 7, the first of three big rodeo days in Carrizozo.

A great deal of work has been done on the new Joe Sargent Memorial Arena, so that it has all the comforts any one-some cow could expect - and there will be plenty of bulls around for the Maverick Rodeo. The welcome mat is out all over the town of Carrizozo where people have been getting ready for this first rodeo event for several weeks.

Of the several special features of the Little Maverick one of the most interesting to all cowboys and cowgirls is the fact that all entry fees will be added to purses paid. Trophy buckles will be given to the hip-point cowboy and cowgirl, and all-around-cowboy and cowgirl.

A rodeo queen will be selected. Contestants must enter at least one rodeo event. The queen of the Little Maverick Rodeo will have a good start campaigning for Smokey Bear Stampede queen and a trip to the state fair. The best dressed cowboy and cowgirl, age 10 and under, will receive trophies.

\$15,000 a year for housekeeping

\$2,500 A MONTH SPENDING MONEY

SANTA FE - The governor has a little raise in his pocket money account, the sum moving from \$29,000 to \$30,000 a year.

By law the governor gets \$2,500 a month which he can keep or spend in any way he chooses and is required to account to no one.

It is the only non-audited spending in the state government.

\$62,500 A YEAR FOR THE OFFICE

The money is in addition to the governor's \$17,500 pay and the \$15,000 a year he gets for paying the housekeeping bills at the executive residence.

It adds up to \$62,500 a year for the chief executive, a sum from which a careful spender could put aside a considerable amount.

The state paid for the governor's Cadillac and the state police pay for his chauffeur who drives the Campbell children to school and is generally helpful to the first family.

And the governor has first call on the plush state-owned Queenair plane and its state pilot.

CAMPBELL HAS PRESS AGENT

Gov. Jack Campbell altogether is getting, or will be getting, a \$6,000 a year more for his office than the preceding Gov. Ed. Mechem.

The appropriation for the office is up from \$94,000 a year to \$100,000. The chief difference is that Campbell has added a press agent.

The salary of the governor and that of all the office staff comes out of the \$100,000. Also the governor's \$30,000 spending money.

LOOT GUV GETS \$3400 A YEAR

The appropriation for Lt. Gov. MacI Easley's office is \$3,600 a year, up from \$2,000.

The officer doesn't receive any pay except what he gets from the legislature for presiding in the senate, \$40 a day, and for sitting in as acting governor.

He has an office in the capitol but there is seldom anyone in it.

Appropriations for lieutenant governors are a fairly recent innovation. For a long time they didn't get anything and didn't seem to need anything.

JOHNNY WALKER IN THE DOUGH

Land Commissioner Johnny Walker is approaching the 1964 Demo primary with the double objective of getting the Joe Montoya congressional place for himself and the land office nomination for his chief field man, Sheepearter Hays.

It is a big undertaking that many think could upset both Walker and Hays, but Walker has some big ammunition for the double-barrel run.

The legislature increased his spending authority from \$800,000 a year to \$973,531.

MURRAY MORGAN READY TO HELP

Of course the land commissioner wouldn't spend that dough to buy a couple of nominations but shrewd operators have a way of making money like that operate for them in elections. It's mostly in hiring people who can be helpful.

And there is that old team work with Murray Morgan who is now a corporation commissioner and should be able to throw the commissioner's political troops for Walker and Hays.

HEAVY INTEREST IN LAND OFFICE

The land office job is stirring more early activity than any other.

Highway Commissioner Chaim John Sudderth looks like he might have taken on early lead for the place.

Sen. Pete Shurbet of Harding is interested in the place.

Wade Miles, of Tucuman, son of the former governor and land commissioner, has been seeking for the run.

Johnny Romero of Gallup, widely known and respected Demo, would join the crowd if his prospects looked good.

Former Land Commissioner Guy Shepard of Farmington tried it in 1960 and may go again.

HONOLULU, BOSTON REPLACE SEATTLE

The legislative Council has set up a program for ten legislators to attend conventions in Honolulu and Boston this summer at a cost of about \$6,600.

The legislative Finance Committee has authorized all of its seven members and two staffers to fly out to Honolulu but so far only three have accepted.

There is something better than \$650 of sap money for each who chooses to go.

Last year it was the World's Fair at Seattle that attracted a dozen or so legislators at the sap citizens' expense.

A Town Council

Barry Goldwater, commencement speaker at NMMI Sunday, was not giving out with a lot of radical ideas, but more hitting on basic truths for the cadets seated in front of him. "Human nature is unchanging", was one of his remarks and this certainly applies to the line of thought in the News editor's mind.

An early recollection goes back to a small town council that decreed there would be no dancing in town. A local business man didn't agree with this edict, he was about to have a grand opening of a new building and wanted a dance as a part of the celebration. Don't know how he buffeted the local law but he did, the dance was held and several small lads present for the fun . . . one of them this editor.

We remember the agony, like it happened yesterday, of another town council getting their courage up to start a paving project, took better than a year to get started. They did, the sparks flew plus some fur, but the paving went over and a good 95 percent were happy after the job was done.

Human nature doesn't change, neither do town councils . . . which means they have to deal with perverse attitudes, as well as try to suit their own thinking to the desires of large groups of people and the task is certainly not easy.

A town council has the primary duty of sunning the town in the best manner possible. A thankless and payless job most of the time. Thanks for a job well done are few and far between, that's human nature. The only possible pay could be the feeling that the town has done well during their years in office.

Running a town means keeping dogs out of neighbors flower beds, solving fence problems between angry neighbors, removing fly, mosquito, fire, accident hazards, removing trees from around power lines, filling holes in city streets — all of these more or less trivial and time-consuming things . . . in addition to planning and pacing a better town.

We know a couple of hard-working brothers in business who couldn't have their way with town affairs so they withdrew their help completely. The results were normal . . . this small town went right ahead with its plans and the loss was hardly felt.

The idea of paving for Carrizozo was not new when the present town council was voted into office. Should this council change its thinking now to suit large property owners, to suit out-of-town residents, to suit others who wouldn't spend a nickel of their own money for the good of the town?

That's the problem of human nature confronting Carrizozo town council this week. Who is to say what is best for Carrizozo? This homo town council was elected by comfortable majorities — we'll stay with them.

A Great Humanitarian

Pope John XXIII said, "Men have come and gone, but I always remained an optimist, because that is my nature, even when I hear near me deep concern over the fate of mankind." Now Pope John is gone and the world is the loser.


