Carrizozo budget hearing is June 17

Lincoln County budget hearings will be held at the court house in Carrizozo June 17 at 9 a.m. The Town of Carrizozo hearing will be held the same day in the Municipal Building at 2 p.m. The Carrizozo budget hearing is scheduled June 18 at 3 p.m.

Ruidoso — Representatives of the local government division of the state department of finance and administration will meet in Ruidoso with village officials at 9 a.m. June 18 for a budget hearing.

The Ruidoso Village budget was approved by trustees at their meeting May 30. State officials will hold budget hearings in Ruidoso Downs the same day at 11 a.m. The Ruidoso Downs budget had not yet been approved by trustees this past week.

History of Ancho tells of rise and fall

In the summer of 1901, railroad grading and bridge gangs were working to bring the railroad into Ancho. Later in the year, steel was laid. With the completion of the railroad line, things really began to boom.

By 1902 there were gypsum testing plants, small saw mills used in connection with the plants, and construction was begun on a plaster mill, the Gypsum Products Company.

Early in 1906 the Ancho brick plant was started and subsequently developed into its major operation. From this plant came Ancho No. 1 brick and tile. Wells were drilled up the valley for the water supply, and this proved to be the best water north of Alamogordo until the pipe line was laid, bringing in Bonita water.

The first raw materials for the brick plant were hauled from the upper valley in dump wagons pulled by a steam tractor. Later a narrow gauge tramline was built and material was hauled by small gasoline-powered tractors.

With both the plaster mill and the brick plant in operation, Ancho was a very prosperous town. The top wage of the day was \$1.75 and the men were paid with "due bills" negotiable at that time by G. F. Graves, who also served as postmaster.

As the brick kilns were fired with wood, this created additional means of livelihood for Ancho settlers in the selling of cordwood. This was chopped and hauled in with teams of horses, mules, or burros. It was the job of the storekeeper, Mr. Graves, to measure the cordwood.

Following the earthquake and fire in San Francisco in 1906 several hundred tons of plaster was shipped to that site to help in the rebuilding of the city. Special blocks for the large smoke stack at the smelter in Douglas, Arizona, were supplied by the brick plant as were the fire clay lining blocks which were used for their chambers.

In 1917 the brick plant was sold to the Phelps Dodge Corp. who built a large and modern plant. It remained in operation until 1921 when work was suspended, and years later was placed in receivership. The property was sold in 1927.

The first automobile in Ancho was a 1905 Oldsmobile roadster, driven up from El Paso by Mr. Grant A. Bush in 1907. The Warren brothers soon after brought in an Elmer, giving Ancho the distinction of two "horrible carriages" in the early 1900's.



In 1938 the Straley Store and postoffice was moved to the east end of Ancho. It remained at this site until April of 1963 when the store was closed and the postoffice moved to its present location in the House of Old Things.

In 1926 the oldest Straley daughter, Sadie, died in El Paso. In May of 1937 both Mr. and Mrs. T. J. Straley passed on.

At the time of his death, Mr. Straley had served for 21 years as postmaster of Ancho.

John C. "Cappy" Straley, the youngest Straley brother, was appointed postmaster in 1937, until his death in 1953, for a period of 16 years.

1953 was a sad year for the Straleys as death claimed Harry, the oldest brother, in June; Reba passed away in July; and Tom and Cappy both passed away in October. In 1957 after being bed-ridden for three years, Myrtle passed away. Of the nine Straley children who came to New Mexico in 1912, the three remaining still make their home in Ancho — C. S., George, and Lucy.

Lucy, or Jackie as she is called by her numerous friends, was appointed postmaster in 1953 and holds that position today. It has always been Jackie's hope that someday she would have the opportunity to let others share in the numerous keepsakes mementoes, and collections entrusted to her by relatives and friends. Her dream will be realized this week when the formal opening and dedication of "The House of Old Things" will be held. For a glimpse of the past, see the House of Old Things.
