Sale of \$210,000 in general obligation building bonds was held June 27 at the superintendent's office in Carrizozo. The bonds are dated as of the first day of June, 1963, in denominations of \$1,000 each, will mature serially in regular numerical order, without option of prior redemption. In the option of counsel, the bonds are exempt from all present federal income taxes.

The total interest cost is the amount for the 10-year life of the bonds.

Plans for the new school construction in Carrizozo are, on the architect drawing board now and are expected to be approved during the latter part of July. Call for bids on construction should follow shortly.

The estimated actual valuation of Carrizozo municipal school district is \$12,712,748. The assessed valuation (1962, 33% of actual) is \$4,195,207.

Bonds outstanding \$40,000 issued 6-10-53. New issue, \$210,000, total bonded indebtedness \$250,000.

The Carrizozo school district has always promptly met the payment of both principal and interest on all previous issues. Carrizozo and Lincoln County have the same clear record.

Taxes collected by the Assessor's office have gone from \$443,678 in 1957 to \$603,004 in 1961.

Even liquor licenses were approved, Yucca, Cactus, Rollands, Johnsons and Vegas. Two occupation licenses approved. Marvin Rowen asked about swimming pool job and was advised to make a written application.

The town, ice making compressor has been put out of commission by parties unknown. Estimated cost of repair about \$500. This will be gone into more thoroughly at a later date.

Bills were allowed, part of this action being the reading of a letter printed here.

Disagreement develops on location of Highway 70 in Honda Valley

A report to the Lincoln County News from the Honda Valley brings out the fact that people of the area are not in agreement on the location of a new road from Hondo toward Ruidoso. The stretch of road under discussion is between Picaño Hill and Biscuit Hill. The State Highway Department planned to let the contract for this present fiscal year.

A number of meetings have been held by a group calling themselves the Highway 70 Safety Committee. The trouble seems to be that most of the people having business places on the highway were not included in this committee or invited to the meetings.

A meeting was held at the San Patricio grade school Monday night. Several people, not members of the committee, were present and voiced objections to the methods being used

by the Safety Committee who have a very small stake in the Valley. Result was, the meeting broke up with nothing settled.

The people living along the highway want it known that they are 100% behind the highway department engineers in their design work and do not want to interfere in any way with the workings of the highway department. They are going to fight for the highway to go as originally routed. It is thought by this group of people that all the Safety Committee can possibly accomplish is to stall the highway construction for four or five years.

Another meeting will be held in the near future at which time it is hoped John Sudderth, highway commissioner, will be present as well as all people who are interested in the location of this stretch of highway in Lincoln County.

Study to be made of county coal resources

Twenty persons, representing Alamogordo, Captain, Carrizozo and Ruidoso, heard a life-time coal mine operator from the coal producing states of the western and northwestern United States describe the possibilities of mining coal profitably in the area from White Oaks in Carrizozo in a meeting June 26, at Holiday House in Ruidoso.

Elmer W. Welch, now a resident of Phoenix, has been engaged with Dr. Les A. Glines and Mrs. Glines, and wife J. E. Woods, all of Alamogordo, for several months in the study of the potential coal producing areas, quality and possible profits therefrom in the entire Lincoln County region. Welch,

the coal mine operator, was introduced by S. B. Boykins of Ruidoso.

Welch had several very old prospectuses on coal mining in White Oaks and Captain regions dating back as far as 1919, which showed profitable mining had been done then.

Another cost to supply a 50 to 100 million kilowatt power plant should be located. It was estimated there are at least 75 million tons of coal on 5000 acres scattered between Captain and White Oaks. The depth, thickness of strata, and cost of getting the coal out is a question. Building a power plant near the coal sets down the transportation cost.

If the coal-power plant project should turn out to be feasible it could mean an additional \$2 million in tax money for the county, plus the possibility of 250 to 500 additional families being employed.

Welch said El Paso Electric Co., in planning for construction of a giant generating plant to serve the growing power needs of the Southwest, would be a possible customer for the coal if it could be produced at a reasonable figure "delivered to their boilers." After determining if sufficient coal of the right quality—and Welch said he believed the quality was the best for this purpose—the power company then needed to determine if there was sufficient

water available for its huge generating plant.

Welch urged the group to join with him in financing an engineering study of the coal potential in this county, which might lead to securing the industrial potential of the power plant. He said he knew of no other market for the coal but the proposed power plant—and that the entire venture was a gamble, but one that could return great economic benefits to the entire area if the two were realized.

The group, in a round table discussion, decided to hold a further meeting soon to determine if financing could be arranged for the engineering study.

Moral power in such ancestry as ours

(Address by Mrs. Alberta Miller, Secretary of State for New Mexico, at the dedication of the House of Old Things in Ancho.)

It is with a full heart and deep gratitude that I was asked to speak at this "Dedication of My House of Old Things" and to pay tribute to our forebears, and early citizens of New Mexico who left our state with such a rich heritage.

By their stalwart natures these first settlers taught us: "there is a solidarity in human nature, making those that follow a unity with those that proceed."

"There are riches of moral power in such ancestry as ours," and to me: most of our finest history in New Mexico transpired here in Lincoln County.

Originally the little settlement was called "Las Placitas" (in Spanish Plaza, or "Little Town"). Later, it was known as "Rio Bonito" the Spanish for "Pretty River." These names deriving, as you well know, from the two forks in the Rio Bonito. The north fork "Rio Bonito" and the south fork the "Rio Doño." Later the little town was named in memory of Abraham Lincoln, the Great Emancipator. Union men were in the middle in the Territorial Legislature when Lincoln County received its name, and the town of Lincoln became the county seat of Lincoln County. Historically, not sentimentally,

ly, New Mexico had no ties with Abraham Lincoln, but one of his adherents "Judge Kirby Benedict" of Santa Fe was one of the original "Lincoln County" men in the Territory, and had a hand in drafting the bill that named the new subdivision after the martyred President.

Much history is written on these grounds at Ancho that was fabulous, glamorous and adventuresome. The fables and sagas written in books about the early pioneers, the cowboys stading night-herd (fearing the stampeding cattle) the famous gunmen, like Little Joe the Wrangler, Billy the Kid and other outlaws have been recorded in movies and songs: the Lincoln County Gold Rush in the late Seventies, that almost overshadowed the important cattle industry. Tributes to the fine business men who fought for their heritage, through the Lincoln County Wars have had world-wide coverage, and are among the many splendid names that have made New Mexico the fine state that it is today. "The Fabulous Frontier" written by our distinguished citizen, William A. Keleher is truly a roll-call of honor, with historical facts about all of the old timers of Ancho who left this state the heritage of their courage and convictions. As Mr. Keleher stated: "there are many who deserve a place in the hall of fame of Old Lincoln County." Among them were the famous writers: Emerson Huff and the beloved Eugene Manlove Rhodes who wrote so ably depicting the New Mexico scene. Perhaps they too had the

feeling of the lovely poetess "Elizabeth Barrett Browning" who wrote: "If We Tried To Sink The Past Beneath Our Feet, Be Sure The Future Would Not Stand."

We also can agree with other great thinkers such as Daniel Webster who wrote: "Those Who Do Not Look Upon Themselves As A Link Connecting The Past With The Future, Do Not Perform Their Duty To The World."

Also - from the Holy Bible we read in Job, Chapter 8 - Verse 8, "For Enquire, I Pray Thee, of The Former Age, and Prefer Thyself To The Search of The Fathers." Again, in Deuteronomy 32:7, "Remember the Days of Old, Consider The years of Many Generations; Ask Thy Father, and He Will Show Thee; Thy Elders, and They Will Tell Thee." There are many, many more, but at this time, I would like to pay tribute to the many old-timers and others now living in Lincoln County, who are keeping alive the tradition and heritage of New Mexico; especially the forethought and planning of Mrs. Jackie Silvers who had the vision to preserve many things of the past in the "House of Old Things." Surely, Burke had such as she and her helpers in mind when he wrote: "He Alone Deserves to be Remembered by His Children, Who treasure up and preserve the memory of his fathers."

This unique and well thought out place should bring this community fame as a "Splendid Tourist Attraction" in New Mexico, and I wish you the greatest success!

As a conclusion and final tribute to the older generation who left this heritage, I will quote excerpts from fine old poets who penned these lines;

Off, in The Stilly Night Ere slumbers chain has bound me,

Fond memories bring the light of other days around me, Beneath these rugged trees and leafy shade -

Where heaves the turf, in many a mould'ring heap - Each in his narrow cell forever laid,

The stalwart forefathers of this hamlet sleep. Off, did the harvest to their sickle yield,

The furrow oft their plow has broke.

How found did they drive their team afield,

How bow'd the woods beneath their sturdy stroke!

Far from the maddening crowd's ignoble strife,

Their sober wishes never learned to stray,

Along the cool, sequester'd vale of life,

They kept the noiseless tenor of their way.

And under the wide and starry sky,

Gladly they lived and gladly died.

Speaking here today has been a most enjoyable experience and now, my best wishes and love to all of you!



Communities With only One Zip Code Number? Our five-digit ZIP Code is 87011. Postmaster Mary Lee Talley announced today, "Everyone in Claunch will use this ZIP Code on all their correspondence to speed mail deliveries and reduce the chance of mis-sent mail." Postmaster Mary Lee Talley said, ZIP Code, the Post Office Department's revolutionary new system of improved mail dispatch and delivery, goes into effect nationally on July 1. Postmaster Mary Lee Talley stressed the importance of all citizens of Claunch learning this city's ZIP Code and using it in their return address on all correspondence. In answering mail, she said ZIP Codes taken from return addresses on incoming mail addressing," Mrs. Mary Lee Talley said. She cited this example of the proper use of ZIP Code: Mary Lee Talley, Postmaster, U. S. Post Office, Claunch, N. M. 87011. The new ZIP Code plan, Mrs. Mary Lee Talley said, for the first time will permit the Post Office Dept. to short-cut repeated address reading. "The address on mail must often be read as many as eight or ten times by postal employees, to get it to the proper destination," Mrs. Mary Lee Talley said. "Each handling slows the process of mail dispatch and adds to the opportunity for human error. "With ZIP Code, a clerk needs only to glance at the code to know immediately to what national area, state and post office the letter is destined, and to speed it on its way, cutting up to 24 hours off the time between deposit and delivery," Mrs. Mary Lee Talley said that when ZIP Code is in full swing, the United States will have "the most modern system of mail distribution and delivery in existence."



To buy or not to buy—that is the question. At least that is what people in Las Cruces have been saying.

The problem is that Las Cruces seem to believe that they should do all their shopping in El Paso where they can save a few cents on every little purchase. Of course, by the time they've paid for their trip down and back—the two or three dollars savings hasn't amounted to very much...

Yes, it is true that prices on some things are outrageous and that selection of goods are poor. It doesn't mean that Las Cruces is without faults; many merchants here think that the word service is something that went out with the gold standard but there are just that many more who are giving the best selection of goods at the lowest price they can afford to sell at.

This brings us to the final point. Why do people know that there is some pretty fair bargains right here in town. The answer is pretty simple—just pick up an El Paso newspaper and look at the advertising. The word doesn't get around by the grapevine; El Paso merchants have learned one important lesson that some firms here have yet to learn—even though it is costing them money in potential sales...

So, it's a two-way street. People who live here should start facing up to the need for spending their money where they make it and merchants should start thinking about a fair selection at a fair price and getting the word around through advertising. It works! Just try it.

We enjoyed the hospitality and speakers; Joseph F. Halpin, Records Administrator, State of N. M. Records Center and Archives spoke to us Saturday morning about the Disposition of Records in N. M. which is to be done in all counties...

Our Record Center is ours for convenience in storing records to which you do not often refer.

Governor Jack Campbell was present Saturday night for a speech. He was happy to see the good crowd and asked all officials to be good servants to the public and make our Court Houses a friendly place and a helpful place.

For entertainment, Clayton's Chamber of Commerce, Lucille Alexander, and Al Cass made possible a gilded tour of Clayton. We went through Ft. Jordan, a most interesting museum — Enjoyed a barbecue and western dance at the Armory building. At the Clayton High School a luncheon was served us on Monday. Monday night a banquet and dance, the music

furnished by an orchestra. At the assessors meeting we discussed airplanes, trailer houses, livestock, tax deeds, unit systems, family exemptions, bill boards, and the 4-year term of officers.

The majority thought airplanes should be licensed. Trailer houses, should be put on the tax roll if they have the wheels off and are on a foundation or walled up.

Livestock, attorney John Shaver contends, should be put on the tax roll at the time they are purchased. Tax deeds being sold to the State for resale for taxes may be placed again in the care of the Co. Treasurers and Assessors. The Unit System will eventually be used everywhere, but counties are slow adopting them. Family exemptions are being studied by attorney John Shaver for possible changes. Bill Boards are to be placed on the tax roll. Officials, at our meeting asked for the 4-year term to again be put before the Legislature to be passed.

The prominent political figure has been made executive director of the \$490,000 Toas Housing Authority and covered by a heavy bond.

A shortage of about \$5,800 was charged against Martinez in the county treasurer's office and carried in the county audits as the Martinez shortage for several years before it was paid off by a bonding company.

REPUSS FIND PLACE FOR BOB ANDERSON

Republicans are planning to put Robert O. Anderson of Roswell in as national committee man succeeding Albert Mitchell who is ready to retire after some twenty years service.

Party leaders are anxious to keep the rich prominent Anderson in the public eye as a prospect for the 1966 run for the Sen. Clint Anderson place in the Senate.

The decision to give the national committee place to Anderson means that he won't be running against U. S. Rep Tom Morris for Congress next year. That candidate is yet to be brought out.

The party is well settled on Ed Mechem for the Senate, Tom Bolack for governor, Dr.

Jack Redman for the Montoya place in Congress at the head of the ticket next year.

GOVERNOR AGAINST GAG ON BROKERS

Gov. Jack Campbell said the other day that he would ask the State Investment Council to remove the gag it put on unhappy brokers at the June meeting.

Campbell, who is a voting member of the council but not present at the June meeting, said he considered the resolution improper which held that any broker complaining about the division of council business among the four eligible state brokers would be cut off entirely from council business.

Council business is given 40 per cent to the Quinn brokerage firm, 22 per cent each to the Hogle and Hutton firms, and 16 per cent to Raucher Pierce, all of Albuquerque. The short orders had been complaining bitterly until the gag resolution was passed.

GOVERNMENT LOAN FOR FATS LEONARD

Fats Leonard, prominent figure in the Gov. John Burroughs administration and former member of the state highway commission, has been approved for a \$240,000 Small Business Administration loan.

He is in the truck and tire business in Albuquerque.

FRIENDS PROD KING TO TAKE ON JACK

Rep. Bruce King of Santa Fe, speaker of the house of representatives, is being prodded by friends to try for Demo nomination for governor against Jack Campbell in next year's convention and primary.

Former Governor Burroughs is hearing the same thing every day from people who were with him in his 1959-60 term.

State Sen. Ed Mead of Albuquerque who ran against Campbell in the 1962 primary says that he has also been asked to make the run.

N. M. trout farm doing a splashing business

Bert Pfingsten and C. R. McConnell, partners in the Spring Ranch Trout Farm at Hondo, are old hands at the business of taking care of fish and game. A dream of theirs for many years has been the establishment of a private trout farm and within the past year they have seen this dream come true.

Spring Ranch is true to its name. One of the best springs in Lincoln County sends out a steady stream of fresh water which is piped through a chain of ponds inhabited by rainbow trout in all stages of growth.

Trout eggs are shipped in by air, express from Soap Lake, Washington. These are carefully incubated and as the fish grow they are shifted from one pond to another until they reach a growth of 12 to 14 inches, when they are ready for catching in the big pond. The eggs cost \$3.50 per 1,000.

The annual production of trout is around 40,000. The feed is not cheap, and is one of the major costs in producing trout.

The Lincoln County News editor and Ellsworth (Kansas) Messenger editor and his two

boys tried this fishing spot last week — it was a real thrill for the boys and the dads had fun too. A person can catch fish in Lincoln County's two lakes by hitting a hot-biting period or staying a full day. If a person likes to eat trout and likes the fun of catching them, you can't beat Spring Ranch.

You can go to this fishing place and catch your limit, for a small fee, using any kind of bait you choose, spinners, fly fishing, or just plain corn. It doesn't take long either because the McConnell-Pfingsten fish

are a wee bit on the hungry side — they bite right now.


We had a red Daredevil out in the water, got a strike, missed it, and before the lure was pulled in another trout was on the hook.

Trout put on about an inch a month, according to McConnell who spends his full time in management of the operation. They get feed several times a day, instead of one big feeding.

McConnell is a former information and education officer of the N. M. Game and Fish Department, and has done con-

siderable work in the fish hatchery field. Pfingsten is in the orchard and livestock business up and down the Hondo Valley, in addition to being a partner in the trout farm.

Business has been good so far and the trout farm is just getting started. As the word gets around about the fun of catching a good mess of trout, Spring Ranch Trout Farm will do even better. It's a new industry for Lincoln County, one that fits right in with the natural beauty and enchantment of the country.






