




Grizzlies are winners in southwestern football league

Zozo Grizzlies fake Dexter Demons, 47-7

Dexter — Carrizozo's Grizzlies, as mean and burly as their namesakes, used a bruising ground attack, a good passing game and an alert defensive wall here Friday afternoon to belt the Dexter Demons, 47-7, and clinch the District 2-C crown.

The Grizzlies won their fifth league title in six years in a convincing fashion—rolling for a net 405 yards on the ground and adding 93 in the air. It might have been worse, had not Carrizozo been assessed 173 yards in penalties.

The loss was the first in six games for Coach Pat Casey's Demons and ruined his chances for a second straight District 2-C title. He won the crown last year at Melrose.

Dexter, here Friday, was simply out-classed by the bigger and more experienced Grizzlies. Carrizozo took an early 13-0 lead, led at halftime, 20-7, and after a scoreless third quarter broke the game wide open with a tremendous 27-point final quarter surge.

Eddie Lovato and Faustino Gallegos, the 1-2 punch in Carrizozo's arsenal, rushed for 158 and 154 yards respectively to pace the Grizzlies attack while teammate Tommy Ortiz, a 215-

pound freshman, quarterback Mike Voss and Jimmy Lovato chipped in with 37, 31 and 33 yards performances.

State opponent to be decided Saturday

The Carrizozo Grizzlies have already wrapped up the title in the Southern League (2-C) with their win over Dexter, McCurdy Mission in the western sub-district and Academy for Boys, Albuquerque, in the eastern sub-district play this Saturday. The winner will play Carrizozo for the Class C state championship.

The championship game will not be played in Carrizozo because it was held in the southern part of the state last year.

The Academy for Boys has won five, no losses. McCurdy won three in their sub-district.

The Grizzlies have a toughie before the championship game when Hatch comes to Carrizozo November 1, Hatch beat T. or C. last week, a team that has been going real good.

Voss also hit on 5 of 8 aerial tosses for 93 yards.

But the passing leader in the game was Dexter's Billy Kuykendall who hit on 8 of 23 tries for 144 yards. Big rusher for the Demons was Mike Grant who rushed for 63 yards on 16 car- (Continued on page five)

State attacks Ruidoso school spending

While investigation of money management at the La Joya school in Socorro county was continuing with the possibility of producing criminal charges, the state took on another school board, Ruidoso, for \$3,000 of unauthorized spending.

Finance Officer John Gott has refused approval of payment of \$1590 for desks purchased from American School Supply without competitive bidding, and has consented to approve only half of a \$1440 due the Colonial Refining and Chemical Co. for supplies purchased without bids and which have already been used.



Where Education Failed

It took New Mexico right at fifty years to obtain statehood from a territorial status. The problems of distance from point-to-point within the territory and distance from anywhere else were terrific. The fact that most United States officials considered New Mexico one big pile of rocks, inhabited by Indians, Spanish, Mexicans, outlaws of all colors, and some Anglos did not help get serious consideration for making a state out of the Territory of New Mexico.

This heritage has not been especially good for New Mexico in one very important way... that of education. Our educational needs were different fifty years ago, they are more exacting than the average state in 1963.

We say education has failed in New Mexico over a long period of years. The big welfare load in New Mexico, the many government projects particularly in the northern part of the state intended to prop up a sagging economy, the thousands of young boys and girls who come out of high school each year without a background of education that fits them for the computer age we're in... these are the reasons education has failed.

It takes both vision and imagination to outline a successful program of study for twelve grades and expect that, on completion of the 12th year, the youngster can successfully compete in college, successfully compete for jobs where a high degree of skill is required, successfully manage their own business, or even understand that the United States has been the land of opportunity since the founding of this democracy.

Education in New Mexico has not even begun to breakdown the language barrier, one of the state's greatest learning handicaps, nor are any steps being taken now, or even thought of, to our knowledge, that might help our youngsters over this learning hurdle.

There has been concentration on science, all to the good, but at the same time no effort has been made to teach a trade or a craft to those students who cannot expect to achieve a scientific career - and that includes a lot of our young people.

The hassle is terrific over school money each year. We'd say the greatest waste is in school funds, because the return on this investment is so inadequate. It is fairly easy for school patrons, and tax payers, to get their money's worth when buying 10 pounds of potatoes. Too bad that education cannot be sacked up like premium russets and shipped into the state... our top educators hardly know the difference between spuds and knowledge a senior should have.

Cures For Tension

You can hardly turn the pages of a business magazine these days without finding at least one article cautioning executives about the evil effects of tension. Since there are many executives, cowboy, city, farm, and woody type in Lincoln County we are taking time to list some common remedies for

the most common tensions.





(Continued from page one) Santa Fe, changed his registration to Democrat in 1959 to hold his job in the bureau under Gov. John Burroughs but continued with the Republican Mechem administration 1961-62, and with the Demos this year.

FIRST TO EMPLOY REPUBLICAN HELP

Gov. Jack Campbell has given more recognition to Republicans than any other Democratic governor of modern times.

Burroughs, last Demo governor before Campbell, wouldn't tolerate Republicans and that was generally true of the others for the past three decades.

There are a considerable number of Republicans holding small jobs under the shelter of the new personnel law, but there are others in the administration brought in or retained by Campbell, and some hairy-chested party men among them.

LEE CHAMBERD IN PLUM POST

Lee Chamberd, formerly Los Alamos Republican chairman and the party nominee for the corporation commission in 1960, was retained on the public service commission in a \$10,200 post that has been treated in the past as a plum for the party in power. Chamberd is an excellent official.

C. L. Mears who was a campaign officer for the Republicans for three elections and worked under Republican Gov. Ed Mechem as purchasing agent, bureau of revenue officer and reform school superintendent at Springer has been retained in the Springer job that pays \$10,800 along with a lot of extras, and that was also often treated as a patronage plum in the past. Mears is another high class administrator.

OTHER PARTY HEADS BOARDS

Heading Governor Campbell's board of Springer is Alvin Stoetgen, Republican nominee for governor in 1954 and still as Republican as Barry Goldwater. Chairman of Governor Campbell's critical personnel board is Republican John Hallihan, a former statehouse officer under Mechem.

The minority place on the state tax commission which is often filled by a turn-coat member of the out party is held this time by Ernest Everly, a former Republican candidate for the U. S. Senate.

A new Republican named to the welfare board is Dr. Frank Nordstrom of Farmington, a candidate for the state board of education last year on the GOP ticket.

GOOD POLITICS FOR ED MECHEM

Campbell has some so-called Republicans such as are usually named to boards requiring minority representation in Alva Simpson of the game commission and Jim Coury of the police board who helped defeat the Republicans last year, but he has gone far beyond other Demos in appointing and retaining serious representatives of the other party.

Republican Ed Mechem conducted bi-partisan administrations in each of his four terms as governor.

Since Mechem did have four terms and no other governor ever had more than two, Campbell may think it is a good idea.

THICK PADDING SHIELDS WALKER

Capitol politicians have been talking a lot about Fabian Chavez and Calvin Horn crowding Land Commissioner Johnny Walker for Demo nomination for Congress.

Walker can take considerable crowding considering the padding he enjoys as a state official. He has a hundred on his land office payroll, many of them effective politicians. Two close buddies, Murray Morgan and Columbus Ferguson, control the corporation commission staff of seventy, also loaded with experienced politicians.

Walker's land office puts up the money for the dozen workers on the state forestry office staff.

He is a member of the oil conservation commission that employs 55 and of the oil and gas accounting commission with 20 payrollists.

What's happening on State Hiway 377

By Louise Coe Runnels Let's pretend you are in Ruidoso leaving for points north on State Highway 37. You are in the fastest growing part of Lincoln County, with the worst roads. Five minutes out of Ruidoso are two airports, subdivisions on both sides of the road and the U. S. Forest Ranger station. Next is the beginning of another subdivision development at the foot of Alto Hill. On top of Alto Hill and in Gavilan Canyon along Highway 37 are still other subdivisions, A Dairy and Chinchilla farm are near by. At Alto Land is being subdivided and prospects are bright for a new huge dam, and more business here where Highway 37 meanders on its narrow way. West of Alto off Highway 37 is the road being improved for a few miles by the State and Forest service to the most fabulous skiing and sight seeing area in the Southwest. Just past Alto still going north you find more subdivisions. Being built a short distance along this Highway on high Mesa is a famous horse establishment. Near Angus as you go along you see three chinchilla farms. And at Angus another subdivision and new houses. Nearly in the Nazarene Camp with more than 100 cabins a chicken farm is along the road and there at Bonito Creek the road forks. Highway 37 goes northwest and Highway 48, which is paved goes on to Captain and Highway 380. From this point State Highway 37 is dirt road but you are on your way to the county seat,



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Carrizozo. However, off the road is a grocery store and motels and more land for sale, also the Bonito Dam and mining properties are of great interest to the public. Going on along state Highway 37 to Carrizozo is the popular site of the Ranchman's Camp meeting area and Nogal Lake. At Nogal the pavement begins and joins paved Highway 380 a short distance from Nogal. State Highway 37 should be paved instead of graded once a year. With a new Courthouse and a speedy scenic paved road to get there from Ruidoso, Alto and Angus, we'll be going along with our growing Lincoln County.

AMHA is supporting Congressional bills

Congressional bills of vital interest to the nation's fourth largest industry—the tourist business—are supported by the American Motor Hotel Association to which the N. M. Motor Hotel Innkeepers and Resort Association belong.

Millie Wallace of Capitán is the second vice-president of the state association. The Freilighuysen bill (H. R. 6457) opposes construction of service facilities on the Interstate Highway System. The AMHA will support the bill, but has passed a resolution calling for more adequate signing along the interstate system.

Other bills being supported by the association are the Smathers sponsored bill (S 1372) which creates a special tax commission to assume the responsibility of interpreting tax laws passed by Congress, a function now of the Internal Revenue service which presently both interprets and enforces the law.
