

Special legislative session not down to basic issues

Should each county be represented in the reapportionment of New Mexico — should the matter of reapportionment in New Mexico be carried to the U. S. Supreme Court — those are the basic issues confronting the House of Representatives meeting in special session in Santa Fe this week and next.

To date bickering and clashes between individuals has been an outstanding feature of this session.

Lincoln County Rep. W. G. Shreengost, reporting from Santa Fe Tuesday night, said that representation for the smaller counties (in population) did not look good at that time.

As reported in the daily press Wednesday Rep. Mat Chacon, D-Rio Arriba, said seven or eight cases on reapportionment from other states are pending before the U. S. Supreme Court which may hear arguments on them within a month, rulings may be issued next spring.

Chacon stated further that the widely-publicized Tennessee Baker vs. Carr case did not produce definitive guidelines on reapportionment from the U. S. Supreme Court. New Mexico should have the opportunity of getting a ruling on its apportionment case from a high court if an appeal is necessary. (See editorial on page six).

Progress is made on court house

A lot of people are busy doing preliminary planning and work to start construction of a new Lincoln County court house in Carrizozo. Bond representative, architects, soil testing people, well driller, and tax agent attended an all-day meeting in the court house annex Monday with county commissioners, Charles A. Jones, Roman Nunez, and Kenneth Nosker to help court house plans along.

Timing is real important because \$525,000.00 is involved. The best timing will be to have the money available for use on or near the day the first payments become due to the contractor. As a part of this scheduling it was suggested by the

architectural firm of Voll and Buffington, which has contract with the county and a present schedule of payments due them each month, that the firm borrow money to cover payments due the firm, the county to pay them both principal and interest when bond money becomes available. This is advantageous to the county because sale of the bonds can be held off until about 60 days prior to first payment that must be made to the contractor. Interest on the bank loan to the architectural firm will be much less than the interest on the court house bonds.

The bond money will be invested in government securities should the bond sale be held.

Russ Ming, representing Stern Bros. of Albuquerque, told the commissioners that early January would be as good a time as any for the bond sale. The bond company likes a two-week or more spread of time so they have some option and may put the bonds on the market when the market is good, at least for the period.

Present scheduling includes completion of detailed architectural planning by middle of January. Bond sale will be held in January. Construction bids called and opened about February 15. The contractor will have 10 days to start work. Bond money will become available in late March or early April and first payment to the contractor due probably before April 10.

Russ Ming was gathering information on Lincoln County Tuesday to use in preparation of prospectus which goes out to all prospective bond buyers.

Amount of money for construction is \$464,380.00, balance to be used for office equipment and furnishings. C. O. McKinney, tax agent for El Paso Natural Gas Company, said that the county would need all of both amounts. That the present county budget did not allow room for purchase of any equipment.

County commissioners are not especially eager but they have instructed Clerk Alice King to start on the immense stack of paper work necessary to get Hill-Burton aid for the health department of Lincoln County. Commissioners opinion is that the county will not save a nickel, but that the health department may end up better equipped. County funds will match dollars with Hill-Burton.

Testing of colla under the court house site will get underway immediately. Probably 10 holes will be drilled to depths of 20 feet, with some possible variance, and coll samples taken to be analyzed before type of foundation is made definite. J. H. Bunch, representing Texas Testing Lab, Alamogordo, will handle the tests. Who will drill the 200 feet of hole will be decided later with the possibility that special equipment may have to be brought in from Lubbock.

The county clerk will write the State Highway Department immediately informing them of the courthouse project and the amount of footage between the court house and U. S. Highway 54.

Council hot over tractor on paving

The Carrizozo Town Council meeting in regular session Tuesday night had considerable number of details on hand necessary to close out the Carrizozo Paving District No. 1.

Already a cat tractor with lugs has crossed the new paving and this party came in for a round of abuse from council members. State laws prohibit such a machine on paved surfaces but so far as was known no town ordinance exists which makes this action illegal, but it was considered real poor judgment and the town will have its engineer check the lugged paving to see if damages warrant further action by the Town.

The bond company requires passage of another set of ordinances before any of the paving bond money will become available. One member of the council being absent, the ordinance could not be passed Tuesday night. A special meeting will be called for this purpose.

Drainage of water down "E" and off onto 5th Avenue was discussed, as well as at one other corner. J. H. Hoffman lost four trees in the paving project and has billed the Town for \$150 per tree, stating that he don't expect to live long enough to grow them back. At this time the trees were removed to make room for paving, the Town was advised by its engineer that the trees were on 8th Street right-of-way. If Hoffman can prove to the Town that the four trees were on his property, the Town will give some attention to making payment for this loss.

Freak accident takes life of Capitan youth

The Capitan junior class presented its annual play, "Hill-billy Weddin", Nov. 1, in the Capitan school gym, and expected to put this play on at Fort Stanton Monday night.

Pam Hall was driving a pickup truck loaded with stage props and Lynn Brunson and Johnny Campbell riding in the pickup bed to hold the props. About a mile west of the Fort Stanton road a gust of wind caught the props blowing them out of the pickup and Lynn Brunson was thrown to the road, killed instantly from the force of the fall.

State policemen Ken Wilson and Frank Knoblock, and from the sheriff's department Clyde Atwood and Leandro Vega, Jr., made the investigation. The pickup was reported to have been moving about 35 MPH.

Pam Hall drove to Fort Stanton following the accident and got Dr. W. F. Rosenblatt and the Fort ambulance. Brunson was dead by the time they got back to the scene of the accident.


Obituary


The Carrizozo Grizzlies, under Coach Bernard Laabs, have won 40 games and lost 6 in the last five years.







A vote on appropriation of \$25,000 to defend the apportionment case on appeal was defeated by a vote of 31-30.

New Mexico may not win its first for state and county rights — but at least it can make the fight and really get in the battle. If you believe that Lincoln County is entitled to one representative, be he Democrat or Republican, instead of being attached to another county as a voting district — write your opinions right now to Rep. W. G. Shreevegoat, State Capitol, Santa Fe, New Mexico. Your backing can mean a lot in this fight against a lot of federal power and some larger counties in our own state.

THE WORD OF GOD AND THE HOLY SPIRIT

"For our gospel came not unto you in word only, but also in power, and in the Holy Ghost, and in much assurance; as ye knew what manner of men we were among you for your sakes." 1 Thess. 1:5.

The gospel, the New Testament teaching, came "in the Holy Spirit." This agrees perfectly with other scriptural declarations (Gal. 1:11, 12; 1 Cor. 2:9,10). These scriptures affirm the fulfillment of Christ's promise to the apostles before he died and before the Holy Spirit came as heaven's final representative to man: "When he, the Spirit of truth, is come, he will guide you into all truth: . . ." (John 16:13,14)

The purpose of the Holy Scripture is stated in inspired language: "Every scripture inspired of God" is to "make . . . wise unto salvation through faith in Christ Jesus," and "is also profitable for teaching, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness: that the man of God may be complete, (finished completely unto every good work)." 2 Tim. 3:14-17.

Any theory about the Holy Spirit that eliminates the word from conversion (salvation) is false according to these and dozens of other scriptures. God does not have two ways of accomplishing salvation. He does not make his man complete by one or the other of two processes. In other words, he does not make one of his men complete with the word and another complete by a direct operation of the Holy Spirit without the word. Rather, God inspires the word (inspires it—gives it life) with the Holy Spirit; thus the Holy Spirit working through the word converts and saves. Rom. 1:16.

The word of God and the Holy Spirit are inseparable in conversion. They are identical in their action upon the heart of the convert to Christ. Thus they do not have separate action to perform upon the heart of the man who is being saved.

 people stated they did not have the money now to install indoor plumbing.

Two separate bids will be called on gasoline and diesel fuel used by the Town. The diesel fuel to be delivered to tank owned by Town, gasoline to be delivered from the wholesaler pump. The utility manager will continue to buy oil in quantities as needed. There has been no problem of loss of diesel fuel but theft of gasoline from city tank and vehicles has been bad. Taking delivery at the wholesaler pump will eliminate some of this. The wholesaler will be required to keep track of vehicles, mileage, and name of person getting the gasoline. All bids will be less city, state and federal tax.

A Chamber of Commerce delegation consisting of Ray Gabehart, president, Gladney Stubbs, Margaret Sleasner, Frank McBride, and J. H. Fulmer, Jr., met with the council to request funds for Christmas lighting on town streets.

Discussion got off on recreation funds. At present three members are serving (inactive) on the five-man recreation committee which calls for one council member, superintendent of schools, and three members at large.

The C. of C. committee asked the Town to go along on the expenditure of \$1,500, which money would be used early next year for street decorations during the 1964 holiday season. The Town of Carrizozo has a prior water right, but has to pay 20c per thousand gallons freight to get the water into town. The Town of Carrizozo will ask for a rate around 10c per thousand and at the same time give Alamogordo some entitlement to use Carrizozo's water right in case of need.
