## Grizzlies go all the way . . . for championship

Santa Cruz — The Carrizozo Grizzlies left no doubt about who is the best Class C team in the state after beating McCurdy Mission last Friday for the state championship, 42-0. The Grizzlies defense was rugged, with only minor lapses the defensive line has played that way all season. McCurdy Mission ended up with a minus 16 yards rushing for the game. The Carrizozo offense was terrific on land and in the air.

Halfback Faustino Gallegos ran for three touchdowns and made a kick good for a PAT. Quarterback Mike Voss turned in a spectacular scoring play when he returned one of eight Bobcats punts 71 yards. Three blocks keyed the long first quarter run. Gallegos, fifth highest prep scorer in the state going into this game, tallied touch-





downs on runs of 1, 11 and 9 yards.

Carrizozo leaped out front early in the first period when fullback Eddie Lovato shook off three men and went over standing up from the 16.

Middle guard Chuck Benbow was a standout for Carrizozo whose season ended 9-1. In the past five years the Grizzlies have won 41, lost six. Won three state championships, placed 2nd one year, and tied for district champions another year.

When Carrizozo needed yards Tommy "Crusher" Ortiz, 215 pound freshman fullback, was a constant gainer. Bucking the line and carrying 2-3-4 of the Bobcats with him was Tommy's meat.

Bobcat Quarterback Eugene Velasquez couldn't get anything started because of the fast charging Carrizozo forward wall.

There were eight seniors in this championship playoff. Voss, Gallegos, McDaniel, Aragon

(didn't play because of injury). Benbow, Burns, Harkey, and Scott were the boys suited up for the last time in Grizzly uniforms.

To start off the 1944 football season Coach Bernard Laabs expects to have 11 good boys, from there on he will have to make substitutions and bench strength.

The loss left McCurdy Mission with a 7-2 mark.

The Grizzlies did not need or have opportunity to use a couple of their best plays very often. The sideline pass play, almost bread and butter for Zozo this year, was used one time. The way Mike Voss threads the needle on this type of pass is something a lot of college passers cannot do so well. Punt and kickoff return has been a specialty with Voss and Gallegos handing off to each other before taking off down the field.



## Abilino Sisneros is hunting victim from accidental shot in the head

Abilino Sisneros, age 15, died Sunday, Nov. 10 after being accidentally shot through the head while hunting north and east of Corona. He lived in Alamogordo and was a student in high school. He is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Jose C. Sisneros. The remains were taken to Alamogordo, Monday, where funeral arrangements are pending. Hampton-Holland Funeral Home.

Sheriff Glen Bradley and

Patrolman Jess Brooks investigated, and a coroner's jury was convened.

In another accident at Corona a young man, a former student from Estancia High School, shot himself in the foot Saturday, Nov. 9, first day of deer season on the Boñey Madril ranch. He was taken to Vaughn and later hospitalized at the Santa Fe hospital in Albuquerque.

**VENISON** — Meat from a young animal should "age" for a week, from an older animal for two to three weeks at about 28 degrees F. The meat may be cooked like tender cuts of beef. To tenderize meat from an older animal, marinate in buttermilk. Fat should be cut off and replaced with other fat such as salt pork or beef suet. Venison may be served rare, medium or well done. For a special touch baste the roast with red wine. Never overcook venison!

**VENISON STEW** — One lb. venison short ribs; 1 pkg. carrots, sliced; 1 can peas; 4 medium potatoes, diced; 2 medium onions; 3 bay leaves; 2 tsp. allspice; 2 cans (8 oz. tomato sauce); salt and pepper; 4 to 6 qt. kettle. Brown short ribs in kettle that soup is to be cooked in. After ribs are brown, add water to suit yourself. Slice onions and put into kettle. Add allspice and bay leaves. Add salt and pepper to taste. Cook 1 hour, then add tomato sauce, peas, carrots, potatoes and cook for 2 hours or more. Serves 8 to 10.



### SAVE LEAVES FOR NEXT YEAR'S COMPOST

Don't burn those autumn leaves! They're just the thing for a compost pile. Many homeowners throw away valuable materials that could be saved for use in improving their soil, says County Agent, Ralph Dunlap with the Cooperative Extension Service of NMSU. Leaves, grass clippings, old tomato plants, and vines can be turned into fertilizer for next summer's gardens.

Such materials, after they have wintered in compost, make excellent organic matter, Com-

post, spread around trees and shrubs or worked into the soil in flower and vegetable gardens makes the earth rich and porous. It loosens the ground so that roots can develop naturally, and air, moisture, and plant food can penetrate easily.

Here's how you go about making a compost pile.

Select a spot at the back of your lot, yet within reach of your garden hose. (That's because the pile should be kept moist.) Use ordinary wire fencing or boards to enclose an area 3 to 8 feet high and 3 to 5 feet square.

Dump leaves, lawn clippings and garden trash into the bin in layers 6 to 12 inches thick. To each layer add some commercial fertilizer (whatever you use on your lawn) and ½ layer

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of soil. Moisten the leaves as they are added. Keep building up the pile as you accumulate material. Top with 1 to 2 inches of garden soil.

Remember to keep the compost pile damp. If the pile is kept reasonably moist and has a cap of garden soil, it should have no odor. And, by May or June, last year's leftovers will be ready to perform springtime magic in your yard and garden.

### COUNTY AGENT TELLS HOW TO BANISH BATS

How do you get rid of bats? This question is asked frequently because of reports of rabid bats, says County Agent Ralph

Dunlap with the Cooperative Extension Service of NMSU.

Expel the boarders and bat-proof the building if possible, the County Agent advises. Kill the bats only as a last resort. Bats are tiny mammals and friendly for the most part. They usually do not attack humans; what's more they help keep insect pests such as mosquitoes under control.

Bats roost in dark sheltered places during the day and dart out at dusk to feed on night-flying insects. They may congregate in large colonies in attics, spaces between building walls, or in unused areas in upper stories of houses.

Best way to banish bats is to drive them out with a chemical

repellent, then keep them out by sealing all possible entrances with sheet metal or ¼ inch mesh hardware cloth.

Watch the bat-infested building for several evenings so that all entrances and exits used by the little mammals can be marked. Next step is locating the roost and treating the area with 3 to 5 pounds of a moth-repellent chemical. Either paradichlorobenzene or naphthalene can be used. The flakes should be sprinkled liberally over the entire roosting area.

The bats find the odor of the chemicals so objectionable that they will usually leave the roost in a short time, even in broad daylight. More than one treatment may be needed as bats are pretty persistent, especially if they are well established.

## Village of Penasco gets \$26,500 loan to improve its water system

\$26,500 loan to the Penasco Mutual Domestic Water Consumers Association, Inc., for enlargement, improvement and rehabilitation of their present water system was approved today by the Farmers Home Administration, according to Drew Cloud, State Director.

Penasco is located in Taos County, 24 miles southeast of Taos on State Road 75, and is a village of approximately 800 residents. The Penasco water system was installed in 1953 by a grant from the New Mexico State Health Department and has been enlarged three times.

At present the system consists of three wells, two of which are owned by the association, and one is leased from the school system. The total capacity of the three wells is approximately 30 gallons per minute. The distribution system consists of approximately 7000 feet of pipe, serving 89 users and including two fire plugs for protection of the entire village.

Plans included in the enlargement and rehabilitation of the system include: Cleaning out one well, deepening the second from 60 to 150 feet in order to obtain better water, and obtaining a long-time lease on the well owned by the school system; rebuild one-quarter mile of the present line; add 1300 feet of new line; clean, repair and move the present 15,000 gallon storage tank to a higher location to increase pressure - which is so low at present that sometimes not even drinking water is available to the users; purchase and install an additional 10,000 gallon storage tank; install two more fire plugs, and install meters for all water users. It is planned that the enlarged system will serve more than 100 users.





During his three and one-half years on General Lucius D. Clay's staff, he played a leading role in developing food and agriculture policies in Western Germany. Before leaving Germany, Lynn had the responsibility for supplying food for the Berlin air-lift. In addition, he supervised the German administration of food rationing, distribution, and allocation of imported food. During the post-war years, he has been at the forefront in Farm Bureau's efforts in Washington, D. C.



## Bill Edgar of Capitan nominated for outstanding Lincoln Co. rancher

The Board of Supervisors of the Upper Hondo Soil and Water Conservation District has nominated Mr. William J. Edgar as the Outstanding Rancher for the 1963 J. D. Coggins Award.

Mr. Edgar became a resident of New Mexico in 1939 when he and his parents moved from Arizona to Pine Lodge, New Mexico. Prior to 1939 he was associated with his father in the ranching business in Arizona.

Bill entered the Army in 1941 and went through Officer Candidate school. He was commissioned and served in a Tank Destroyer outfit in the European Theatre until discharged with the rank of Major in 1946.

While in the Army, he was married and upon his return to civilian life he acquired his present ranch approximately 10 miles north of Capitan. Proper range use, based on Blue grama grass, was initiated as the first practice toward ranch improvement followed by purchase of top quality range bulls, careful selection of replacement heifers, and severe culling of old cows. Thus the quality of calves was increased sharply. Currently the calves sold off the Edgar Ranch bring the top going price at an average of 400 to 425 pounds.

Then, with technical assistance from the Soil Conservation Service and cost-sharing under the Great Plains Conservation Program, he began work on his basic conservation plan. First on the agenda were pipe-

lines and steel storage tanks. Thousands of cattle once watered along the old perennial stream in Carrizo Draw through Bill's place and literally "beat out" the surrounding range. All drinking tubs were placed well away from the Carrizo allowing a build-up in range conditions there. Adequate water storage was obtained by the use of steel storage tanks placed so water could be pipelined away from them. Drinking tubs were set where the range could be utilized evenly to the best feasibility advantage.

When purchased, Bill's ranch was fenced into two pastures. Now there are eight. All cross-fencing was thoroughly planned in advance and installed as planned, resulting in a livestock handling system and grazing units ideally suited to the operation.

Fences, corrals, steel storage tanks, etc., are built with the best available materials and constructed very solidly resulting in a long life and minimum maintenance. The major potential range pest on most of the ranch is Cholla Cactus. Approximately 3,600 acres of the worst infested have been cleared. The Board of Supervisors of the Upper Hondo Soil and Water Conservation District feels that Bill Edgar is an outstanding conservation rancher in any company and would make a worthy recipient of the J. D. Coggins Award.

One pleaded guilty to two counts and was fined \$100 on each count and was assessed \$7.50 court costs for each count. The other eight pleaded guilty to one count each and were fined \$100 each and \$7.50 court costs each.

The arrest was made by the Game Department and Jess Brooks of the State Police.

The sheriff's department discussed the accident with assistant D. A. Lila Garza and it was decided that charges of careless handling of firearms will be filed against Parra.

Investigating officers were Jess Brooks of the State Police, sheriff Glen Bradley and Game Department officials. Sisneros was the first hunting casualty reported in this area.

# CIVIL RIGHTS BILL OF 1963

A package of legislation called "The Civil Rights Act of 1963" now is pending in the United States Congress.

The title is a misnomer. This bill is but ten per cent. civil rights. The rest—90 per cent—is an extension of Federal executive power created at the expense of individuals, States, and municipalities. The bill is, in fact, the blueprint for a controlled system of life; it would establish new principles of law of drastic and far-reaching implications.

Under the bill's principal provisions: Consider the cloak of "Civil Rights"—if this bill becomes law—the Federal government henceforth will dictate to whom you may sell or rent your home.

If you are the proprietor of an establishment that offers goods and services for use or hire—not just public accommo-

dates, hotels, restaurants and such but any kind of business that offers anything to the public—then, under this bill, your business would be subject to Federal Control.

In like manner, the bill covers all "contractors and subcontractors" in every program or activity where direct or indirect financial aid is rendered by the government. It will apply to you: if you borrow money from or deposit money in a government-insured bank; if you have an FHA, VA or Small Business Administration loan; if you are a realtor or developer; if you are a farmer who has financial dealings with the Farm Credit Administration, the Commodity Credit Corporation, or the Soil Conservation Service; or if you have Federal Crop Insurance, or deal with the REA or participate in any agricultural program involving Federal funds.



## EMPLOYERS & EMPLOYEES

Under this Act, all employers who participate in any of these programs can be told by a Federal FEPC whom they shall hire, fire, promote and demote, and how they shall handle their employees.

Under this Act Federal inspectors would be empowered to rule that racial or religious imbalance exists in a business. Thereafter, that business could not employ or promote the people it might prefer but only such "racial" or "religious" individuals as the Federal inspectors designated. His ruler could require that "racial" or "religious" balance be obtained and specify the job classifications: to common laborers, to skilled laborers, to the clerical staff, to supervisory employees, and to vice presidents, all alike. A Federal agency would be prosecutor, judge, jury and executioner.

## ENFORCEMENT

Enforcement of the Federal Inspector's findings would be simple: failure to comply would mean the end of all participation in Federal programs. Your loan could be called; you could be blacklisted for further loans from banks or financial institutions insured by the government; and you could be prevented from taking part in any activity that had to do with Federal financing. In certain injunctive situations, an employer could be jailed without the protection of a jury trial. And that is only part of it.



## PROFESSIONAL AND SMALL BUSINESS

"The Civil Rights Act of 1963" would also bring under Federal control individuals and businesses who are thought to be constitutionally subject to such regulations. Under the bill's Title II, any person who pays a business license to a State or municipality could be included.

Thus, the Act brings under Federal supervision almost every profession and every business—lawyers, realtors, small establishments, doctors, restaurants, gasoline stations, theaters, hotels, motels and lodging houses. The smallest "soda fountain" would be covered.



## SCHOOLS

The bill goes even farther. If this Act should become law, between 100 and 200 statutes now in effect would be amended. Everyone who has dealings with Federal educational programs, for instance, would be subject to new requirements. Under the provisions of the Act, the United States Commissioner of Education could influence the transfer of children from one school to another—back and forth—until racial balance and religious balance existed. (The correction of "racial imbalance" is of such importance to the sponsors that the phrase appears eight times in a single brief section of the bill.)

Under the authority proposed in connection with Federal financing, school lunch programs, research programs, the building of schools, Hill-Burton hospitals—all such programs and organizations would be subject to new Federal controls.



## VOTERS

Not is that all. The bill boldly seeks for the Justice Department unprecedented powers to gain Federal control of the electoral machinery.

In 1961, the United States Commission on Civil Rights recommended—contrary to express provisions in the Constitution—that the Federal government impose new control over the qualification and registration of voters. "The Civil Rights Act of 1963" would implement these recommendations.

It follows, then, if this Act were made law, a politically-minded Attorney General could go into an area where the voters might be close and swing the election. How how it would work? The language of the bill allows the Attorney General, at his own discretion, to file a "discrimination" suit and, without proof of his allegations, register some thousands of voters. The ballot, then, could be used and counted and the election won, even though the Attorney General's action, later, were determined by the Courts to have been invalid.



## UNIONS

The bill goes on: In giving the Federal government new control over the hiring, firing, promoting, demoting and payment of employees, the Act also would give Federal Commissioners new powers to destroy not only the senile system of unions, but also an employee's rights within the company for which he works. This is so because the Act gives full and unlimited power to Federal inspectors to determine who shall be hired, promoted, demoted or discharged—where a charge is made that racial and/or religious imbalances ("discrimination") exist.



## EVERYONE

A careful reading of this Civil Rights Act of 1963, we believe, will convince the impartial citizen that the bill is not a mere proposal, but an emotional and racist appeal to "civil rights," to destroy aged citizens of the South, and to cast off constitutional restrictions upon Federal power. The bill would nationalize and immediately affect every parent of school-age children, every businessman, every professional man, every home-owner, and every wage earner in the United States.

Many of the provisions of the Act, in our view, violate the Constitution of the United States. They are also contrary to existing decisions of the Supreme Court of the United States. But, we can correct what the Supreme Court would hold, if Congress were to make "a legislative finding" in the areas mentioned—that is, if "The Civil Rights Act of 1963" were passed by Congress.

THE SO CALLED "SOFTENING AMENDMENTS" PROPOSED BY ATTORNEY GENERAL KENNEDY DO NOT ACTUALLY CHANGE THE EFFECTS OF THE BILL.

If you do not want such controls to apply to you, if you do not want your personal liberties snatched from you in the areas covered by the bill, if you want to preserve liberty under the law, then write to your Senators both of them and to your Congressman, today. Ask them, earnestly, to vote against this legislation. Tell them the truth, that 90 per cent of "The

Civil Rights Act of 1963" is not Civil Rights at all, but Federal control. Do this and you will stop this grab for power. Fail to do it, and the legal foundation will be laid for the most revolutionary change in our country's history. You have "civil rights" too. Put them to use in a fight against this bill!

AN ORDINANCE CREATING AND PROVIDING FOR THE MAINTENANCE AND DISPOSITION OF A SPECIAL STREET IMPROVEMENT FUND, TO BE DESIGNATED "SPECIAL STREET IMPROVEMENT FUND NO. 1," AS AUTHORIZED BY CHAPTER 14, ARTICLE 46, NEW MEXICO STATUTES ANNOTATED, 1953, AND LAWS AMENDATORY THEREOF AND SUPPLEMENTAL THERETO; PRESCRIBING CERTAIN DETAILS IN CONNECTION THEREWITH; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, the Town of Carrizozo levies a tax of one cent per gallon on gasoline and motor fuel sold within the Town of Carrizozo pursuant to the provisions of Ordinance No. 44, passed, adopted, signed and approved on the 4th day of June, 1940, as amended by Ordinance No. 51, passed and adopted on the 5th day of September, 1944 (now cited as Title V, Chapter 10, Gasoline Excise Tax of the Carrizozo, New Mexico Municipal Code); and

WHEREAS, the Town of Carrizozo has never heretofore pledged any portion derived from said gasoline and motor fuel tax, except to the extent above set forth, with the result that the proceeds derived therefrom may be lawfully and irrevocably pledged as hereinafter provided; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of the Town of Carrizozo, in the County of Lincoln and State of New Mexico, has made and adopted on the 7th day of May, 1963, a provisional order for the grading, graveling, paving, curbing, guttering, macadamizing, draining, and otherwise improving of certain streets, and parts thereof, with intersections, in the Town of Carrizozo, New Mexico, said improvements having sometimes been designated as "Carrizozo, New Mexico, Street Improvement District No. 1," and by Ordinance No. 84, passed, adopted, signed and approved on the 5th day of September, 1963, has levied assessments against the property specially benefited by said improvements, all such improvements being made and such assessments levied in accordance with the statutes of the State of New Mexico providing thereof; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees has determined, and does hereby determine, to call its street improvement bonds pursuant to the contract dated January 8, 1963, which the Town has entered into with Stern Brothers and Co., of Albuquerque, New Mexico, and associates, (except to the extent modified by any provision herein to the contrary); and

WHEREAS, it is the desire of the Town that bonds for said Carrizozo, New Mexico, Street Improvement District No. 1 be secured by a pledge of said gasoline and motor fuel tax moneys while said bonds are outstanding but not to exceed the maximum period of eleven years as authorized by Chapter 14, Article 46, New Mexico Statutes Annotated, 1953, and laws amendatory thereof and supplemental thereto, the lien of said bonds on said gasoline and motor fuel tax moneys to be subordinate to the liens of said outstanding bonds.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE TOWN OF CARRIZOZO, LINCOLN COUNTY, NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. That Special Street Improvement Fund No. 1 as authorized by Section 14-46-7, New Mexico Statutes Annotated 1953, and laws amendatory thereof and supplemental thereto, be, and the same hereby is declared to be, created on the first day of November, 1963.

Section 2. That beginning on the first day of November, 1963, and continuing until the Town's special assessment, negotiable, coupon bonds, designated as "Carrizozo, New Mexico, Street Improvement District No. 1, Street Improvement Bonds, Issue of November, 1963", both principal and interest, are redeemed in full, but not exceeding eleven years from the first day of November, 1963, whichever occurs earlier, there shall be placed in and credited to said fund that portion of the proceeds of municipal taxes levied or collected by the Town on the sale of gasoline and motor fuel, which deposits shall be made at least semiannually and shall be sums sufficient in amount so that the principal of and interest on said Carrizozo, New Mexico, Street Improvement District No. 1, Street Improvement Bonds, Issue of November 1, 1963, shall be paid promptly as the same become due and so that the bonds may be repurchased and redeemed prior to maturity, at the rate hereinafter required pursuant to Section 4 of this ordinance, firstly, to the extent available with the special assessments levied and collected in connection with the property in said Carrizozo, New Mexico, Street

Improvement District No. 1, and secondly, to the extent necessary with such moneys deposited in said Special Street Improvement Fund No. 1; provided, that no such semiannual payment from said gasoline and motor fuel tax receipts into said fund is necessary so long as collections of principal and interest on assessments are sufficient to enable said repurchase and prior redemption required by said Section 4 of this ordinance. Also, in no event is any deposit required to be made in said fund, any provision herein to the contrary notwithstanding, so long as the moneys in said fund, if any, are at least equal to the amount of the principal of and the interest on said bonds, then outstanding, both accrued and not accrued, to maturity.

Section 3. That for the period of eleven years from the 1st day of November, 1963, all of the proceeds in said Special Street Improvement Fund No. 1 are hereby exclusively and irrevocably pledged and shall be used solely as additional security for the full and prompt payment of the interest on and principal of said bonds, as the same become due, and for their repurchase and prior redemption, as hereinabove provided.

Section 4. That, except as said sums are needed to prevent any delinquency in the payment of said interest and principal, as the same become due, for said eleven-year period, said Special Street Improvement Fund No. 1 and all of the proceeds therein are hereby irrevocably pledged and shall be used to the extent necessary for the immediate repurchase and prior redemption of said bonds by the Town so that the Town shall repurchase and redeem successively on or before the second, semiannual, bond interest payment date, and on or before the same month and day in each of the succeeding years, in addition to all accrued interest, in regular numerical order, the designated portion of the then outstanding principal amount of the bonds, as nearly as practicable consistent with the denomination thereof, as follows:

Section 5. That the moneys herein required to be placed in said fund from the proceeds of said gasoline and motor fuel tax shall constitute and hereby are irrevocably pledged as a first and prior lien on all of said proceeds, to Special Street Improvement Fund No. 1, that there shall be created no lien or liens on said proceeds on a parity with the lien hereby created; and that nothing herein contained shall be so construed as to prevent said Town from creating a lien on said tax proceeds inferior and subordinate to the lien hereby created.

Section 6. That for all disbursements, from said fund, the Town of Carrizozo shall be subrogated for the benefit of said Special Street Improvement Fund No. 1 to all the rights and remedies of the holder or holders of said bonds. All of said bonds so repurchased and redeemed prior to their scheduled maturity date with moneys from said fund shall be held by the Treasurer of said Town in lieu of cash expended therefor; and when collection is made of said special assessments, principal and interest and any penalties, and after said bonds, both principal and interest, have been redeemed in full, the receipts from said assessments shall be credited back to said Special Street Improvement Fund No. 1.

Section 7. That while any of said bonds are outstanding, the moneys placed in said fund shall not be withdrawn from said fund, and shall not be used in any other manner for any purpose, except as herein provided; and it shall be unlawful during that time so to withdraw, or cause to be so withdrawn, any of the proceeds of said fund for any purpose, except as herein provided; provided, however, that the Town may withdraw from said fund any moneys of the sums pledged hereby which exceed the aggregate principal and interest requirements of said bonds then

outstanding, both accrued and not accrued, to maturity, upon obtaining the written approval of the Department of Finance and Administration of the State of New Mexico of such withdrawal.

Section 8. That so long as any of the bonds issued for Carrizozo, New Mexico, Street Improvement District No. 1 are outstanding, the Town of Carrizozo will not reduce said gasoline and motor fuel tax nor in any manner divert moneys collected therefrom, and so as to render impossible the placing in said Special Street Improvement Fund No. 1 the sums hereinafore provided.

Section 9. That all disbursements made pursuant to the obligations created herein and by the contract created and formalized by this ordinance shall be made solely from said special assessments or said Special Street Improvement Fund No. 1, or both, and from no other source, and said obligations of the Town, and the contracting parties may not look to any general or other fund for the performance of such obligations, except as herein provided.

Section 10. That after the principal of and interest on said bonds have been paid in full, said fund shall be maintained as a revolving fund in the financing of street improvement projects within said Town; provided however, that the Town may thereafter terminate said fund and place the moneys therein in its general fund, or use such moneys in any lawful manner.

Section 11. That any holder of any one or more of said bonds or any of the coupons representing interest thereon, may either at law or in equity, by suit, action, mandamus or other appropriate proceeding in any court of competent jurisdiction, protect the lien and pledge created by this ordinance on any of the revenues of said fund, and may by suit, action, mandamus or other appropriate proceeding or proceedings, enforce and compel the performance of any duty imposed upon said Town by the provisions of this ordinance.

Section 12. That the Town of Carrizozo through its duly authorized officials, shall promptly collect said gasoline and motor fuel tax monthly. The portion of the moneys so credited to said fund shall constitute a trust fund and shall be deposited, pending their use for the redemption or repurchase of bonds, in a bank in N. Mex. qualified to accept trust funds under the laws governing the acceptance of trust funds.

Section 13. That the officers of the Town of Carrizozo be, and they hereby are, authorized and directed to take all action necessary or appropriate to effectuate the provisions of this ordinance.

Section 14. That after said bonds for Street Improvement District No. 1 have been issued, this ordinance shall be irrevocable until said bonds, both principal and interest, shall be fully paid, satisfied and discharged.

Section 15. That this ordinance may be amended or supplemented by an ordinance or ordinances adopted by the Board of Trustees in accordance with the laws of the State of New Mexico, and without the receipt by the Town of any additional consideration, with the written consent of the holders of seventy-five per centum (75%) of the Town's bonds designated "Carrizozo, N. Mex. Street Improvement District No. 1 Street Improvement Bonds, Issue of November, 1963," and outstanding at the time of the adoption of such amendatory or supplemental ordinance; providing, however, that no such ordinance shall have the effect of permitting:

- (a) An extension of the period of the pledge authorized by this ordinance; or
(b) Reduction in the amount herein required to be placed in said fund; or
(c) The creation of a lien upon a pledge of revenue in said fund, ranking prior to the lien or pledge created by this ordinance; or
(d) A reduction of the principal amount of bonds required for consent to such amendatory or supplemental ordinance or ordinances.

Section 16. That if any section, paragraph, clause or provision of this ordinance shall for any reason be held to be invalid or unenforceable, the invalidity or unenforceability of such section, paragraph, clause or provision shall not affect any of the remaining provisions of this ordinance.

Section 17. That all ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed to the extent only of such inconsistency. This repealer shall not be construed to revive any ordinance or part of any ordinance heretofore repealed.

Section 18. That because of the fact the Town does not now have adequate streets, this ordinance is necessary for the pro-

tection of the public health, peace and safety of the inhabitants of the Town of Carrizozo, Lincoln County, New Mexico, and that this ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency measure on the ground of urgent public need; and therefore, immediately upon its final passage, shall be recorded in the book of ordinances of said Town kept for that purpose, authenticated by the signatures of the Mayor and Town Clerk, shall be published in the Lincoln County News, a legal newspaper, published and of general circulation in said Town, and this ordinance shall be in full force and effect five days after publication.

ORDINANCE NO. 85

AN ORDINANCE RATIFYING, APPROVING AND CONFIRMING ACTION DIRECTED TOWARD THE IMPROVEMENT OF CERTAIN STREETS IN CARRIZOZO, NEW MEXICO, STREET IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT NO. 1, AND THE ISSUANCE OF STREET IMPROVEMENT BONDS; PROVIDING FOR THE COLLECTION OF SPECIAL ASSESSMENTS; PROVIDING FOR THE COLLECTION OF SUCH IN CASE OF DELINQUENCY; PROVIDING FOR THE ISSUANCE OF STREET IMPROVEMENT BONDS; PRESCRIBING DETAILS IN CONNECTION THEREWITH; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of the Town of Carrizozo, in the County of Lincoln and State of New Mexico, has heretofore, pursuant to the requisite preliminary proceedings, provided for the grading, graveling, paving, curbing, guttering, macadamizing, draining, and otherwise improving of certain streets and parts thereof, with intersections, in the Town of Carrizozo, New Mexico, specified in the assessment ordinance, being Ordinance No. 84 of said Town, passed, adopted, signed and approved on the 5th day of September, but more particularly described hereafter, said improvements and the area assessed thereof having been sometimes designated as "Street Improvement District No. 1," and by said proceedings and ordinance has levied valid assessments to defray the total cost thereof in the total amount of \$178,410.66 against the property specially benefited by said improvements (said sum being the entire cost of the District, including incidental costs, etc.), all in accordance with the statutes of the State of New Mexico providing thereof; and

WHEREAS, the streets and alleys and parts thereof so improved, for which improvements assessments were levied are as follows:

- SIXTH STREET: From the east line of "F" Ave. to the southwesterly right-of-way line of U. S. Highway 350 (31')
SEVENTH STREET: From the east line of "F" Ave. to the west line of "H" Ave. (31')
EIGHTH STREET: From the east line of "B" Ave. to the west line of "E" Ave. (31')
NINTH STREET: From the east line of "E" Ave. to the west line of "C" Ave. (31')
TENTH STREET: From the east line of "E" Ave. to the west line of "E" Ave. (31')
ELEVENTH STREET: From the east line of "D" Ave. to the west line of "E" Ave. (31')
TWELFTH STREET: From the east line of "D" Ave. to the west line of "E" Ave. (31')
THIRD AVENUE: From the south line of Eighth Street to the northwesterly line of Twelfth Street. (31')
FOURTH AVENUE: From the south line of Eighth Street to the northwesterly line of Central Ave. (45')
FIFTH AVENUE: From the south line of Eighth Street to the northwesterly line of Central Ave. (45')

WHEREAS, a portion of said assessments, i.e., \$32,495.47, has been paid in cash; and

WHEREAS, there remain valid special assessments in the amount of \$145,915.19 payable in twenty substantially equal semiannual installments of principal until paid in full, with interest in all cases on the unpaid and deferred installments of principal from the date of publication of said Ordinance No. 84 after its passage and approval, i.e., from the 12th day of September, 1963 at the rate of seven per centum (7%) per annum, both principal and interest being payable semiannually at the office of the Town Treasurer on the first days of April and October in each year, commencing the first day of April, 1964; and the Town of Carrizozo desires to issue its special assessment, negotiable, coupon bonds in the amount of \$145,666.62 to pay in part the cost and expense of constructing and making said improvements, pursuant to provisions of Sections 14-37-16 to 14-37-22, both inclusive, and 14-41-3, New Mexico Statutes Annotated, 1953, and all laws supplemental thereto; and

WHEREAS, there has been filed in the office of the County Clerk of Lincoln County, New Mexico, on the 23rd day of October, 1963, a claim of lien for the amount due and assessed and remaining unpaid, as aforesaid, which claim of lien now remains of record in the office of said County Clerk; and

- FIFTH AVENUE: From the southwesterly line of Central Ave. to the northwesterly line of Thirteenth Street. (45')
SIXTH AVENUE: From the south line of Twelfth Street to the northwesterly line of Thirteenth Street. (31')
"D" AVENUE: From the north line of Twelfth Street to the south line of Tenth Street. (31')
"O" AVENUE: From the north line of Tenth Street to the south line of Eighth Street. (45')
"Q" AVENUE: From the northwesterly line of Central Ave. to the southwesterly right-of-way line of U. S. Highway 380. (45')
"R" AVENUE: From the south line of Fifth Street to the north line of Eighth Street. (31')
"Q" AVENUE: From the southwesterly line of U. S. Highway 380 to the north line of Eighth Street. (31')
"U" AVENUE: From the south line of Sixth Street to the north line of Eighth Street. (31')
CITY PARK: From the south line of Sixth Street to the north line of Eighth Street and a loop around the park. (20' to 31')

WHEREAS, a portion of said assessments, i.e., \$32,495.47, has been paid in cash; and

WHEREAS, there remain valid special assessments in the amount of \$145,915.19 payable in twenty substantially equal semiannual installments of principal until paid in full, with interest in all cases on the unpaid and deferred installments of principal from the date of publication of said Ordinance No. 84 after its passage and approval, i.e., from the 12th day of September, 1963 at the rate of seven per centum (7%) per annum, both principal and interest being payable semiannually at the office of the Town Treasurer on the first days of April and October in each year, commencing the first day of April, 1964; and the Town of Carrizozo desires to issue its special assessment, negotiable, coupon bonds in the amount of \$145,666.62 to pay in part the cost and expense of constructing and making said improvements, pursuant to provisions of Sections 14-37-16 to 14-37-22, both inclusive, and 14-41-3, New Mexico Statutes Annotated, 1953, and all laws supplemental thereto; and

WHEREAS, there has been filed in the office of the County Clerk of Lincoln County, New Mexico, on the 23rd day of October, 1963, a claim of lien for the amount due and assessed and remaining unpaid, as aforesaid, which claim of lien now remains of record in the office of said County Clerk; and

WHEREAS, the Town of Carrizozo has created "Special Street Improvement Fund No. 1," by Ordinance No. 85, passed, adopted, signed and approved this 5th day of November, 1963.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE TOWN OF CARRIZOZO, LINCOLN COUNTY, NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. That all action, proceedings, matters and things (not inconsistent with the provisions of this ordinance), heretofore taken, had and done by the Town of Carrizozo concerning the grading, graveling, paving, macadamizing, draining, curbing, guttering, and otherwise improving of certain streets and parts thereof, with intersections, in what has sometimes been designated as "Street Improvement District No. 1" within and for said Town, the levying and perfecting of special assessments to meet a part of the cost thereof, and the issuance of its Town of Carrizozo, New Mexico, Street Improvement Bonds, Issue of November 1, 1963 for that purpose, be and the same hereby is, ratified, approved, and confirmed, including, without limiting the generality of the foregoing, the levy of assessments against all Town property listed in the aforesaid claim of lien, the sale of said bonds, bearing interest as hereinafter provided, to Stern Brothers & Co., Albuquerque, New Mexico, and associates, at a price equal to the principal amount of each bond less a discount of 1.9% of the principal amount of each bond, together with accrued interest to the date of delivery.

Section 2. That the Town of Carrizozo be, and it hereby is, authorized, empowered and directed, and it shall be its duty to receive, collect and enforce the payment of all assessments made and levied for said improvements, and all installments thereof, all interest thereon, and all penalties accrued, as provided by law and in the same manner and at the same time or times as prescribed by Ordinance No. 84 of said Town, duly passed, adopted, signed and approved on the 5th day of September, 1963, and by this ordinance, and to pay and disburse said payments, the installments thereof, the interest thereon, and penalties thereto, to any person or persons lawfully entitled thereto.

Section 3. That the Treasurer of the Town of Carrizozo be, and he hereby is, authorized, empowered and directed, and it shall be his duty to receive and collect all assessments levied to pay the cost of said improvements, the installments thereof, the interest thereon, and the penalties accrued at the time and in the manner heretofore specified, and to pay and to receive the same in accordance with the laws of the State of New Mexico and all the ordinances and resolutions of said Town heretofore or to be hereafter adopted. All moneys received from such assessments from and after the 17th day of October, 1963 (which remain payable in installments as provided in said Ordinance No. 84) shall be placed in a separate fund to be designated "Street Improvement District No. 1, Street Improvement Bonds, Issue of November 1, 1963, Special Assessments Interest and Bond Retirement Fund", herein sometimes merely designated as the "Bond Fund", and shall be used as soon as they are available for the purpose of paying the principal of and interest on the street improvement bonds hereinafter mentioned, and for no other purpose whatsoever, and as security for such payment said fund is hereby exclusively pledged, except as otherwise specifically provided. The moneys, if any, whether represented by cash or securities, in the Special Street Improvement Fund No. 1, created by said Ordinance No. 85, herein sometimes designated merely as the "Security Fund", shall be used to pay interest on and the principal of said bonds or for their repurchase and prior redemption as therein provided, and for no other purpose except as therein otherwise provided. The Town Treasurer shall be, and he hereby is, authorized, empowered and directed, and it shall be his duty to receive and collect all of the receipts of municipal taxes levied and collected from the sale of gasoline and motor fuel, to place said moneys in the Security Fund, to the extent heretofore provided, to disburse therefrom said moneys for the payment of the interest on and principal of the bonds hereinafter authorized, as the same become due, if necessary, and to otherwise maintain and manage said fund in the manner heretofore specified. The moneys in the Bond Fund and the moneys, if any, in the Security Fund shall each constitute a trust fund and shall be deposited in the bank qualified to accept trust funds under the laws governing the acceptance of trust funds. The fees, if any, of the trustee shall be paid from moneys in each of said funds. Nothing herein contained shall be construed as repealing or amending any provision of said Ordinance No. 85, by which the Security Fund has been declared to be created.

Section 4. That if the owner of any lot or parcel of land assessed for said improvements shall be delinquent for a period of sixty (60) days in the payment of any assessment installment due, either principal or interest, or both, it shall be the duty of the Board of Trustees to cause Stern Brothers & Co., Albuquerque, New Mexico, as representatives of the original purchasers of the bonds herein authorized to be issued, as representative of the bondholders from time to time, and such delinquent person to be immediately notified of such delinquency, in writing, and if such delinquency shall not be paid within ten days after such notice shall have been given, the said Board, at its own expense, shall forthwith foreclose the special assessment lien against the property or properties wherein the delinquency exists in the method now or hereafter provided by statute for the foreclosure of mortgages on real estate, or otherwise as provided by law, and at such sale said property shall be bought in by the Town for not less than the amount of the balance due on the assessment, principal, interest, penalty, and costs. If there be no other purchaser therefor, if said foreclosure is not promptly filed and prosecuted, then any bondholder may file and prosecute said foreclosure action in the name of said Town or may proceed against the Town as heretofore provided. All the net proceeds of collecting any delinquent assessment shall be deposited in the Bond Fund and in any event in an amount not less than the principal amount of said assessment and accrued interest thereon to the date of its collection.

Section 5. That if any property shall be offered for sale for the nonpayment of any assessment, installment thereof or interest or penalty thereon, and no person or persons shall bid for said property, then the Town shall have the power, and it shall be its duty, to bid for said property from any funds available therefor, as aforesaid, and

to take and receive in its corporate name any certificates or deeds to said property for the benefit of the owner or owners of the street improvement bonds hereinafter specified. The Town shall have the power to lease or sell said property, and all of the net proceeds of any such lease or sale shall be deposited in the Bond Fund.

Section 6. That for the purpose of defraying the entire cost and expense of making said improvements, except to the extent funds are available therefor from that part of said assessments which have been heretofore paid and to the extent other funds are available therefor, there be issued in the name of the Town of Carrizozo special assessment, negotiable, coupon bonds designated as the "Town of Carrizozo, New Mexico, Street Improvement District No. 1, Street Improvement Bonds, Issue of November 1, 1963", in the aggregate principal amount of \$145,666.62, consisting of 146 bonds, numbered consecutively from 1 to 146, both inclusive, which bonds shall bear date as of the first day of November, 1963, shall be in the denomination of \$1,000.00 each, except for bond numbered one, which shall be in the amount of \$666.62, shall be payable in regular numerical order on the first day of November, 1973, and shall bear interest payable May 1, 1964 and semiannually thereafter on the first days of November and May in each year at the rates hereinafter designated, as evidenced from the bond date until maturity by coupons designated "A" attached to each of said bonds, and as additionally evidenced from the bond date until and including the dates hereinafter indicated as the "Final Interest Payment Date" by a second set of coupons designated "B" attached to said bonds, as follows:

Section 7. That all of said bonds shall be subject to prior redemption in regular numerical order at the option of the Town on any interest payment date prior to maturity, at a price equal to the principal amount thereof with accrued interest to the redemption date. After any assessment installment payment date, as specified in said assessment ordinance, i.e., Ordinance No. 84, if the moneys in the Bond Fund exceed the interest becoming due on the bonds of their succeeding interest payment date which is prior to the bond maturity date, i.e., prior to the first day of November, 1973, the Treasurer shall forthwith call a number of the bonds to the extent such excess moneys are sufficient therefor. Notice of prior redemption shall be given by the Town Treasurer in the name of the Town of Carrizozo by at least one publication of such notice in a legal newspaper of general circulation in said Town at least fifteen days prior to the redemption date, and copy of such notice shall be sent by registered mail at least fifteen days prior to the redemption date to Stern Brothers & Co., Albuquerque, New Mexico. Such notice shall specify the number or numbers of the bonds to be so redeemed (if less than all are to be redeemed) and the date fixed for redemption, and shall further state that on a redemption date there will come and be due and payable upon each bond so to be redeemed at the office of Treasurer of the Town of Carrizozo.

Section 8. That if any property shall be offered for sale for the nonpayment of any assessment, installment thereof or interest or penalty thereon, and no person or persons shall bid for said property, then the Town shall have the power, and it shall be its duty, to bid for said property from any funds available therefor, as aforesaid, and

Section 9. That if any property shall be offered for sale for the nonpayment of any assessment, installment thereof or interest or penalty thereon, and no person or persons shall bid for said property, then the Town shall have the power, and it shall be its duty, to bid for said property from any funds available therefor, as aforesaid, and

Section 10. That if any property shall be offered for sale for the nonpayment of any assessment, installment thereof or interest or penalty thereon, and no person or persons shall bid for said property, then the Town shall have the power, and it shall be its duty, to bid for said property from any funds available therefor, as aforesaid, and

Section 11. Section 7. That all of said bonds shall be subject to prior redemption in regular numerical order at the option of the Town on any interest payment date prior to maturity, at a price equal to the principal amount thereof with accrued interest to the redemption date. After any assessment installment payment date, as specified in said assessment ordinance, i.e., Ordinance No. 84, if the moneys in the Bond Fund exceed the interest becoming due on the bonds of their succeeding interest payment date which is prior to the bond maturity date, i.e., prior to the first day of November, 1973, the Treasurer shall forthwith call a number of the bonds to the extent such excess moneys are sufficient therefor. Notice of prior redemption shall be given by the Town Treasurer in the name of the Town of Carrizozo by at least one publication of such notice in a legal newspaper of general circulation in said Town at least fifteen days prior to the redemption date, and copy of such notice shall be sent by registered mail at least fifteen days prior to the redemption date to Stern Brothers & Co., Albuquerque, New Mexico. Such notice shall specify the number or numbers of the bonds to be so redeemed (if less than all are to be redeemed) and the date fixed for redemption, and shall further state that on a redemption date there will come and be due and payable upon each bond so to be redeemed at the office of Treasurer of the Town of Carrizozo.

Section 8. That if any property shall be offered for sale for the nonpayment of any assessment, installment thereof or interest or penalty thereon, and no person or persons shall bid for said property, then the Town shall have the power, and it shall be its duty, to bid for said property from any funds available therefor, as aforesaid, and

That if any property shall be offered for sale for the nonpayment of any assessment, installment thereof or interest or penalty thereon, and no person or persons shall bid for said property, then the Town shall have the power, and it shall be its duty, to bid for said property from any funds available therefor, as aforesaid, and

zozo the principal amount thereof with accrued interest to the redemption date, and that from and after such date interest will cease to accrue. Notice having been given in the manner hereinbefore provided, the bond or bonds so called for redemption shall become due and payable on the redemption date so designated; and upon presentation thereof at the office of the Town Treasurer, together with all appurtenant coupons maturing subsequent to the redemption date, the Town of Carrizozo will pay the bond or bonds so called for redemption.

Section 8. That the bonds herein authorized to be issued may be refunded in accordance with and under the conditions imposed by the laws of the State of New Mexico and said Town in force at the effective date of this ordinance and not otherwise; provided, however, that none of said bonds shall be called for prior redemption for the purpose of refunding them, and that none of said bonds shall be refunded unless there is not, and unless it is certain that there will not be a sufficient amount of money in the Bond Fund and the Security Fund to pay such bonds and the interest thereon, as such become due.

Section 9. That said bonds shall be fully negotiable and shall have all the qualities of negotiable paper, subject to the payment provisions stated therein, and the holder or holders thereof shall possess all the rights enjoyed by holders of negotiable instruments under the provisions of the Uniform Commercial Code.

Section 10. That each bond shall be signed and executed by the Mayor of the Town of Carrizozo and shall be attested, subscribed and executed by the Town Clerk of the Town of Carrizozo; the official corporate seal of the Town shall be manually affixed on each bond; and each bond shall be signed, executed and countersigned by the Town Treasurer. The interest accruing to maturity on said bonds shall be evidenced by interest coupons thereto attached, payable to bearer, bearing the facsimile signature of the Town Treasurer, and when said bonds are executed, said coupons shall constitute the binding obligations of said Town for said interest. The bonds and coupons bearing the manual and facsimile signatures of the officers in office at the time of the signing thereof shall be the valid and binding obligations of the Town of Carrizozo, notwithstanding that before the delivery thereof and payment therefor, any or all of the persons whose signatures appear thereon shall have ceased to fill their respective offices. Each, the Mayor of the Town of Carrizozo, the Town Clerk and the Town Treasurer, at the time of the execution of the bonds and a Signature Certificate, may adopt as and for his own manual or facsimile signature the manual or facsimile signature of his predecessor in office in the event that such manual or facsimile signature appears upon any of the coupons pertaining to the bonds herein authorized to be issued.

Section 11. That the bonds and the interest thereon shall be payable solely (except as hereinafter provided) from the Bond Fund, consisting of moneys collected from the assessments levied to pay for said improvements, provided that any proceeds from the sale of the bonds remaining after the payment of the cost and expense of making said improvements shall be used therefor; but said bonds shall be additionally secured and the payment of the principal thereof and the interest thereon shall be supplemented by the gasoline and motor fuel tax moneys in said Security Fund, which fund is and shall continue to be irrevocably pledged for a period not exceeding eleven years from the date of said bonds for the full and prompt payment of the interest on and principal of said bonds, as more specifically hereafter provided.

Section 12. That the obligations created by the aforesaid payment provisions shall not be construed or held to make said bonds general obligations of the Town, and the owner or owners, or holder or holders, of said bonds shall have no claim on any general or other fund for the payment thereof, except as hereafter provided. The bonds issued pursuant to this ordinance shall not be a debt of the Town, nor shall it thereby pledge its full faith and credit for their payment. The payment of the bonds is not secured by an encumbrance, mortgage, or other pledge of property of the Town except for such special assessments and other moneys specifically pledged for the payment of bonds. No property of the Town, subject to said exceptions, shall be liable to be forfeited or taken in payment of the bonds.

Section 13. That said bonds and the coupons thereto attached shall be in substantially the following form:

Pursuant to the ordinance authorizing said bonds, reference to which is made for further details, the principal of and the interest on the bonds of the series of which this is one, except as hereinafter stated, shall be paid exclusively from, and as security for such payment there is pledged, a special fund designated the "Town of Carrizozo, New Mexico Street Improvement District No. 1, Street Improvement Bonds, Issue of November 1, 1963, Special Assessments Interest and Bond Retirement Fund", sometimes designated the "Bond Fund", containing the receipts derived by said Town from special assessments levied against the property specially benefited by said improvements to pay therefor and remaining unpaid from and after the 17th day of October, 1963, and containing the proceeds, if any, from the sale of the bonds of this issue remaining after the payment of the cost and expense of making said improvements (excepting any portion thereof to be defrayed by other than the proceeds of the special assessments); provided, however, that the payment of the interest on and principal of all of the bonds is additionally secured by an irrevocable pledge for not to exceed eleven years from the date of the bonds of those gasoline and motor fuel tax moneys provided to be deposited in a special fund and designated the "Special Street Improvement Fund, No. 1", sometimes designated the "Security Fund".

Said special assessments made and levied to defray said cost, with accruing interest thereon, constitute a lien upon and against the property upon which such assessments were made and levied from and after the 17th day of September, 1963, the date of the publication of the ordinance levying such as-

sessments, which lien is superior to the lien of any mortgage or other encumbrance and is equal to and on a parity with the lien for general taxes, and such lien shall continue until said assessments are paid, notwithstanding any sale of the property for or on account of a general tax.

It is hereby certified, recited and declared that for the payment of this bond, the Town of Carrizozo agrees

(a) to act as the agency for collection of such special assessment liens heretofore created, and in so doing, to act as trustee for the benefits of the holder or holders of the issue of bonds of which this bond is one;

(b) to prepare such financial statements as are required by law;

(c) to sell the property or properties wherein a delinquency exists or to foreclose the special assessment liens against such property; and

(d) to maintain and manage said Bond Fund and said Security Fund in the manner heretofore provided.

It is hereby also certified, recited and declared that the proceedings with reference to making such improvements, levying the assessments to pay therefor, and issuing said bonds, have been regularly had and taken in compliance with law; that all acts, conditions and things essential to the validity of this bond exist, have happened and have been done in due time, form and manner as required by law; that the total amount of special improvement bonds of said Town, issued and delivered, for said improvements and incidental expenses, including this bond, does not exceed the amount authorized by law nor the unpaid special assessments levied to cover the cost of said improvements; and that all prerequisites to the filing of the assessment lien against the property benefited by the improvements and of the personal liability of the owner or owners of such property therefor have been performed.

cept of the purchase price. The funds realized from the sale of the bonds shall be applied solely to defray the cost and expense of making said improvements; provided, however, that after said cost and expenses are paid (excepting any portion to be paid with other than special assessment proceeds) any funds remaining from the sale of said bonds shall be deposited in the Bond Fund and used for the purposes thereof, specified herein above in section 3 of this ordinance; and provided further, that all moneys received as accrued interest at the time of delivery of any of said bonds, if any, shall be deposited into the Bond Fund to apply on the payment of interest next due on said bonds. The purchasers of said bonds, however, shall in no manner be responsible for the application by said Town or any of its officers of any of the funds derived from the sale thereof or of any other funds herein designated.

Section 15. That so long as any of the bonds remain outstanding, said Town will keep or cause to be kept true and accurate books of records and accounts showing full and true entries covering the collection and disposition of said special assessments and said moneys derived from said gasoline and motor fuel tax, as well as any delinquencies, and the collection thereof; covering deposits and disbursements in the Bond Fund and the Security Fund; covering the redemption of said bonds, both principal and interest; and covering disbursements to defray the costs of said improvements, including incidental expenses; and said Town will permit an inspection and examination of all books and accounts at all reasonable times by any representative of any of the original purchasers of said bonds. In addition, said Town will at least once a year, at its regular annual audit, cause an audit to be made relating to said books and accounts by an accountant to be employed by the Town at its own expense, and a copy of said audit will be furnished by the Town without charge, immediately after its completion, to said Stern Brothers & Co., Albuquerque, New Mexico, as representative of the bondholders from time to time.

Section 16. That the officers of the Town be, and they hereby are, authorized and directed to take all action necessary or appropriate to effectuate the provisions of this ordinance, including, without limiting the generality of the foregoing, the printing of said bonds and the execution of such certificates as may reasonably be required by the purchasers thereof, relating, among other matters, to the signing of the bonds, the tenure and identity of the municipal officials, the amount certified on the assessment roll, together with the cash payments, the accuracy of property descriptions, the delivery of the bonds, and the absence of litigation pending or threatened affecting the validity of the bonds, if such is in accordance with the facts.

Section 17. That any holder of any one or more of said bonds, or any of the coupons representing interest thereon, may, either at law or in equity, by suit, action, mandamus or other appropriate proceeding in any court of competent jurisdiction, protect the liens created by this ordinance on the proceeds of said assessments and gasoline and motor fuel tax levies; and may by suit, action, mandamus, or other appropriate proceedings enforce and compel the performance of any duty imposed upon the Town by the provisions of this ordinance, or any ordinance heretofore adopted concerning said Street Improvement District No. 1, including, without limiting the generality of the foregoing, the segregation of special assessments and gasoline and motor fuel tax proceeds and revenues, the proper application thereof, and the appointment of a receiver. The failure of any bondholder so to proceed shall not relieve the Town or any of its officers, agents or employees of any liability for failure to perform any such duty.

Section 18. That said Town hereby convenants that, subject to the constitutional limitation, so long as any of the bonds herein authorized remain unpaid, both as to principal and interest, and so long as any of said assessment levied against land owned by the Town of Carrizozo, any other municipality, the United States of America, or any county thereof, remain unpaid as to principal, interest or any penalties, said Town will levy a tax pursuant to Section 14-41-5, New Mexico Statutes Annotated, 1963, and all laws amendatory thereof and supplemental thereto, sufficient to pay any such assessment, if necessary to assure the payment thereof.

Section 19. That all ordinances or resolutions, or parts thereof, in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance, are hereby repealed to the extent only of such inconsistency. This

repealer shall not be construed to revive any ordinance or resolution, or part thereof, heretofore repealed, and this ordinance shall be irrevocable until said bonds and the interest thereon shall be fully paid, certified and discharged, as herein provided.

Section 20. That this ordinance may be amended or supplemented by an ordinance or ordinances adopted by the Board of Trustees in accordance with the laws of the State of New Mexico, and without the receipt by the Town of any additional consideration, with the written consent of the holders of seventy-five per centum (75%) of the bonds authorized by this ordinance and outstanding at the time of the adoption of such amendatory or supplemental ordinance, provided, however, that no such ordinance shall have the effect of permitting:

- (a) An extension of the maturity of any bond authorized by this ordinance; or
- (b) A reduction in the principal amount of any bond or the rate of interest thereon; or
- (c) The creation of a lien upon or a pledge of property, revenues or funds, ranking prior to the liens or pledges created by this ordinance; or
- (d) A reduction of the principal amount of bonds required for consent to such amendatory or supplemental ordinance.

Section 21. That if any section, paragraph, clause or provision of this ordinance shall, for any reason, be held to be invalid or unenforceable, the invalidity or unenforceability of such section, paragraph, clause or provision shall in no manner affect any remaining provisions of this ordinance.

Section 22. That because of the fact that the Town does not now have adequate streets and it is necessary to defray forthwith the cost of improvements thereto, this ordinance is necessary for the preservation of the public health, peace and safety of the inhabitants of the Town of Carrizozo, Lincoln County, New Mexico, and it is hereby declared to be an emergency measure on the ground of urgent public need; and, therefore, immediately upon its final passage, this ordinance shall be recorded in the book of ordinances in said Town kept for that purpose; authenticated by the signatures of the Mayor and Town Clerk, shall be published by one insertion in the Lincoln County News, a legal paper published and of general circulation in the Town of Carrizozo, and this ordinance shall be in full force and effective five days after such publication.



Maj. Hardin of Albuquerque who seldom does anything politically that isn't approved by our Clint has thrown in with Horn, Hardin, prominent Albuquerque business figure, hosted a luncheon for Horn at the Albuquerque country club last Tuesday which gave new substance to the Horn campaign.

When old pro politico Filo Sedillo of Valencia started maneuvering for Miles the administration people were caught off guard.

Gene Lusk of Carlsbad who commonly speaks for Gov. Jack Campbell and John Bingham of Silver City who speaks for Senator Anderson tried to stall the Miles election but couldn't do it.

Anderson had said only a few weeks before that he and Campbell and the two Demo congressmen had agreed that no chairman would be picked until after the party convention next year.

There aren't hard feelings about the Miles election.

It was just another incident of Sedillo showing the party wheels that he also has a voice in party management.

He did it once before when he had county chairman designated as the members making up the party's state executive committee.

The vote was 23-9 to pass the compromise re-apportionment bill by the Senate with only one significant change — making an automatic appeal only in case of an adverse judgment from the district court. The bill was returned to the House for OK.

The bill sets up a weighted voting system in the House of Representatives. A total of 700 votes may be cast, the largest number that may be cast by any one representative is 10 votes.

The Lincoln County representative vote is good for a count of five (5) under the weighted system. Harding County, smallest in the state, representative's vote amount to one (1), of the 7700 possible.

In the several fields where representatives from smaller counties will operate on an equal basis, committee work is most important, voice vote on the floor of the House, debating time the same.
