Rotary Club to sponsor Dale Carnegie course

Governor orders record resumed

SANTA FE — Gov. Jack Campbell has ordered Purchasing Agent Dante Valo to resume maintenance of a public record of purchases made by the state after Valo had said first that it couldn't be done because he didn't have the required equipment, and then that he couldn't do it because there wasn't enough money in his budget.

The record is one that has been kept for some twenty years showing the accumulative totals of sales to the state by each vendor.

Campbell boiled over when it was suggested in some quarters that his administration was trying to hide the information on who got the nearly \$20 million that went through the purchasing office this year.

NEW BUILDINGS ARE NOT NEEDED

Protests from the Santa Fe city council about the appearance of a proposed new legislative and executive office building, and beefs from legislators about the conduct of the \$6 million capital expansion program, recalls that neither of the two structures in the plan are urgently needed.

The \$4 million legislative building will be mostly taken up by facilities for the legislature which at most is in session only about three months every two years.

New offices for the governor and secretary of state in the new building are not urgently needed.

CROWDED AGENCIES GETTING NO HELP

The new \$10 million state library building will be nice for the library people but it doesn't make any particular difference to the public whether the facility is in a fine new structure or in shabby rented quarters at present.

The state is in desperate need of office space for many of its essential tax collecting and regulatory agencies which are presently housed in rented quarters throughout Santa Fe, and which will not be materially benefitted by the \$6 million.

SAME ARCHITECT FOR COURT JOB

Santa Fe architect Willard Kruger who is under fire from the Santa Fe city council for the looks of the new legislative building has been chosen, with-

out competition, for another building program that the supreme court building commission is undertaking.

In this one they are planning on spending about half a million for enlargement of the court building on land of the J. O. Seth estate immediately east of the present structure.

It will be paid for by an additional \$250 fee on the filing of law suits in district courts. The fee is presently \$1250. The state will pay \$83,000 for the Seth property.

86 NEW JOBS FROM THIN AIR

Motor Vehicle Commissioner Benny Sanchez has a new agency operating with 86 pay-rollers that came out of thin air.

The legislature early this year gave the commissioner the right to use the fees formerly paid license agents, cities and private business firms for automobile plate sales, driver license sales and brake and light sticker services.

The new field administrative division is operating on a budget of \$773,000 a year and growing.

It sets up full time state employees for automobile license and title service and also for driver license and brake and light service.

The money being spent is all from fees charged motorists with no direct appropriation for the division from the legislature.

Jess Nelson of (ugh) Truth or Consequences, the immediate past president of the state bar association, announced a month ago that he would run against Justice Cleve Compton for the supreme court but hasn't been heard from since. There's guessing around the capitol that he won't file.

Bernalillo Co. Commissioner Gary Cornelius said last summer that he was figuring on going for the Demo nomination for lieutenant governor and last week shifted to the land commissioner race after Lt. Gov. Mack Easley gave up his congressional aspirations and decided to try for another term. Cornelius joins State Sen. Pete Shrubet of Harding and Sheep-

THE GOSPEL PAUL PREACHED

"But though we, or an angel from heaven, preach any other gospel unto you than that which we have preached unto you, let him be accursed." (Gal. 1:8). These are striking words.

Paul wrote this text because of some disturbing news he had received. The churches in Galatia were turned away from the gospel he had preached (Gal. 1:6). By turning to "another gospel" than what he had preached they had fallen under the hypnotic spell of false teachers. Out of the many so-called gospels in the world today, only the one Paul preached has any saving power or value (Rom. 1:16).

The gospel preached was a divine gospel (Gal. 1:11,12). It was not human in origin or character. It sprang from no earthly source.

The gospel Paul preached was an exclusive gospel (Gal. 1:6). To mix anything else with it, and then call it "The gospel of Christ," would be a misnomer. Any effort to improve the gospel that Paul preached is a mistake. One faith necessitates one gospel (Eph. 4:4); for faith comes by hearing the gospel that Paul preached is a mistake. One faith necessitates one gospel (Eph. 4:4); for faith comes by hearing the gospel Rom. 10:17).

The gospel Paul preached was a sufficient gospel. It is sufficient to save every soul of man (Rom. 1:16). To add to it, or to take from it, can only destroy its efficiency. That was why Paul was pleading with the Galatian Christians to return to his gospel, and away from everything else. The gospel Paul preached was a final gospel. He received it from heaven. Until heaven revokes it it must not be superseded (Gal. 1:9). It will be the standard used by the Lord to judge you and me in the last day (Rom. 2:16).

The gospel Paul preached is an obeyable gospel (Gal. 5:7). If Paul's gospel is God's power to save, it is obvious that it can save only those who obey it (Rom. 6:17; Heb. 5:8,9).

neros to attend a District meeting of the N. M. School Boards Assn. 

It Confuses Us

A note from Columbus Ferguson, State Corporation Commissioner, leaves us in a state of wonderment about the duties of this commission. Prior to this letter we had thought that the prime duties of the commission was to hear protests — not to be garnering them.

Ferguson writes: "Although those interstate railroad companies are not required to give official notice of consolidation of a mail train and a passenger train, to the regulatory agency of any state, we feel that New Mexico is entitled to protest such action and instigate a delay. A protest, under the terms of the Interstate Commerce Act, can be lodged by any member of the State Corporation Commission, I will say for one that such a protest most certainly will be entered".

No official protest has been contemplated by the Town of Carrizozo, that we have learned about. Possibly the Town should notify Commissioner Ferguson that his services are not needed in this instance.

News, and other paper that preceeded, the longest. She doesn't know about other people but she has been a reader of this Lincoln County newspaper since 1913.

S. Vidaurri arrived in Carrizozo the same year Mrs. Stearns started reading the News, and probably he was a reader too. Mr. Vidaurri had been living in Alamogordo, smaller than Carrizozo at that time. He remembers that only two places had lights, the eating house and depot, and these lights were the kerosene variety.

John Allen Hightower has been helping a chain gang, two D9 Cats pulling anchor chain to clear out trees up near Magdalena. The chain gang also clears out numerous bobcats which seem to populate the area. Honor Society requirement cited

Many students and parents are interested in the qualifications and requirements for student membership in the National Honor Society. For the information of all interested parties, we reproduce below the membership requirements as taken from the Constitution of the local chapter. Candidates shall have spent at least one semester in Carrizozo High School, and shall be members of the sophomore, junior or senior classes. Candidates eligible to election to the chapter shall have a scholarship average of B, or 85%, or its equivalent.

This scholastic level of achievement shall remain fixed, and shall be for admission to candidacy for membership in this chapter. All students who can rise in scholarship to, or above such standard level, shall be admitted to candidacy for election to membership. Their eligibility shall then be considered on their Service, Leadership and Character. The election of members of this chapter of the National Honor Society shall be by a chapter council, consisting of the principal and members of the faculty, in no case shall there be fewer than four teachers, who are to be chosen by the principal.

Any member of the faculty may propose to the council the names of students eligible for membership in the chapter. Any member who falls below the standards which were the bases of his election shall be properly warned. If during the next regular marking period of the school, the member fails to meet the standards used as bases for his election to the Society his case shall be passed upon by the faculty council. A National Honor Society member must maintain the standards for membership in order to retain his membership. A member will be allowed only one warning period. Once a member is dismissed from membership, he is never again eligible for membership in the National Honor Society.


