Under the plan being studied Fort Stanton would be used to house about 125 retarded persons either now on the Los Lunas Hospital and Training School waiting list or in the Los Lunas institution and about 125 other retarded patients now housed at the State Hospital in Las Vegas.

FORT STANTON AT PRESENT HAS 160 PATIENTS

The tuberculouis sanatorium now has only about 160 patients, It has a capacity for 250 to 300 mentally retarded patients.

Gov/Jack M. Campbell said the move could save the state \$25 to \$3 million that would eventually be needed otherwise in additional buildings at Los. Little

The state also is considering establishment of a Boys School forestry camp on land near Fort Stanton sanatorium. The sametorium is near Lincoln National Forest, Negotiations have been held with federal representatives.

U. S. Forest Service officials have agreed to cooperate in providing projects for boys at the proposed forestry camp, The casses would be one-half rails from the sensiories.

NEEDED FOR CHANGES

Gov. Campbell has not decided whether to place the project in his call for the special session of the legislature to be held early next year.

Legislative action would be needed to effect the changes. Gov. Campbell said directors

The Flying "W" Diamond Ranch ioins Plains Conservation program

"W" Diamond Ranch owned by Ed Tinsley and operated by Ellis Schildknecht of Capitan, became the 19th Great Plains Conservation Program participant in the Upper Hondo Soil and Water Conservation District on Oct. 18, 1963, when the contract was signed by Mr. Tinsley. The ranch, a cow-calf operation, is located approximately four miles north of Capitan.

Several erosion control structures. Cholla cactus control on the entire ranch, and stockwater development along with proper grass management are practices included in the ranch plan. Mr. Tinstey expects to complete the contract in a three year period.

The objective of the Great Plains Conservation Program is to assist ranchers and farmers in developing and carrying out, on a voluntary basis, a plan of operations that will bring about great stability through grazing and cropping systems and the application of enduring soil and water conservation practices. To carry out this program, Public Law 1021, 84th Congress, provides for assurance of continuing cost-share assistance to ranchers and farmers who present a satisfactory plan for their entire unit including a time schedule for establishing conservation practices.

Any land owner in Lincoln County desiring further information regarding the Great Plains Program or assistance in preparing a conservation plan for his ranch or farm is invited to visit the Soil and Conservation Service office in Capitan.

Beautiful country in own backyard

Right in your own backyard lies some of the most beautiful country in the southwest, Tow-. ering mountains push their way above the tree line and into the clouds. Mountain streams alkali free-tumble over worn rocks working their way into verdant valleys.

Open mountain pastures dotted with yellow, orange, red and violet wild flowers lie scattered below pine covered ridges.

This is the country that we will traverse in our first "Trip of the Week." The first tour is an easy one and can be made in a day or broken down into a weekend outing. Capitan and Lincoln are our targets, Both areas are rampant with the history of the southwest. This is the country of Pat Garrett and Billy the Kid; of great cattle barons like John Chisum; and of the Lincoln County War.

The suggested route for this trip begins where Highway 70 swings out of Tularosa and begins its climb into the mountains, Along the way it passes through the huge Mescalero Apache reservation and finally drops into the mountain resort village of Ruidoso, Turn left at the function of U.S. 70 and N. M. 37 following Highway 37 up the winding main street of the village.

The road ambles over mountain ridges then finally smoothes out into the highlands covered with wildflowers, pinon and cat-

Capitan, our first destination. lies 15 miles from Ruldoso, It's a typical small western town and if cowboys are just the thing the children are dying to see there are usually several sitting in front of the general

It's also known as the home of Smokey the Bear, that indefatigable campaigner against forest fires, Just across the street from the general store a log museum sits smuggly in a small grove of trees. Take a few minutes to wander through the interesting little museum dedicated to Smokey and the prevention of forest fires.

After seeing the museum, pack the kids, mother and the dog into the car and head east again to the town of Lincolnwhich comehow seems to have gotten lost in the passage of time. Abandoned adobe houses dot the rolling landscape which looks like a set from Gunsmoke or any of the dozen of so westerns which galloped across bir. Minowo vast wasteland before the doctors and nurses cut into the picture.

The best way to see Lincoln is to park your car and walk. Don't miss the Old Lincoln County Courthouse built in 1874 and the proud owner of a tempestuous and brawling past. The old courthouse was originally a store, but the Lincoln County War took its toll and in 1880 the building was bought by the county after the owners filed for bankruptcy.

Pat Garrett, the slayer of Billy the Kid, held forth as sheriff of Lincoln County from 1880 to 1882 and during that time the courthouse was his headquarters. William H. Bonney, better known as Billy the Kid, made at least two escapes frme the old courthouse, one time killing two guards in the process. Garrett later killed the Kid at Fort Sumner and was in turn killed himself under mysterious circumstances near Organ, N. M.

The town was founded in the 1850's and has been known as La Placita del Rio Bonito (The Little Town by the Pretty River) and later as Rio Bonito, It took the name Lincoln when it became the county seat.

Incidentally, in 1890, Lincoln County was the largest county in the U.S. with an area larger than Connecticut, Deleware, Massachusetts, Rhode Island and Vermont combined.

Other interesting buildings in Lincoln include the Torreon (a circular rock fort for Indian defense); the Wortley Hotel; the Tunstall Store Museum (his murder started the Lincoln County War); and generally all of the old houses still privately owned which border the town's main street like maternal grandmothers.

For your return to Alamogordo take the same route you came in on or follow Highway 350 (don't turn left in Capitan) to Carrisono. The route to Carri-2000 runs through scenic rolling pinon covered hills then down to flat grazing land in the shadow of Carrisono Peak (there's gold mining country behind the peak, but then that's another story).

West of Carrisono the vast black leve beds or Mal Pale stretch north and south where they were spewed out by a nottoo-old volcano. In Carrisono, take Highway

54 south to Tulkeron and Alman

nords a fact 45 minute to one hour drive. Lincoln National Forest proc-

tically surrounds the area so no problem arises as far as camping is concerned. "Under a root" accomodations ranging from antique to plush may be found throughout the area with the biggest concentration in Ruidoso. Restaurants and cafes also

Sears, Roebuck and Co. will spend \$60 million on newspaper advertising

CHICAGO - Sears, Roebuck and Co. expects to spend more than \$60 million for newspaper advertising this year, the company has announced.

George H. Struthers, vice president in charge of merchandising, gave this estimate based on preliminary report and forecasts for the remainder of 1963 from more than 750 Sears retail stores across the nation. At the same time, he report-

ed actual expenditures in 1962 established a new record of \$58 million for newspaper advertising. This was \$5 million more consecutive year that Sears stores. newspaper advertising has topped \$50 million,

Struthers noted that in 1962 the company's retail stores purchased 286,5 million lines of white space in 921 daily and weekly newspapers - located in every state except Alaska, where Sears has no retail stores. Linage increased 7.9 per cent over 1961, he said, while

the cost of space increased 9.4

The \$58 million represented 71.2 per cent of Sears total retail media expense of \$81.4 mlllion. Advertising through circulars, magazines, radio and television and miscellaneous media. accounted for the remainder. Sears continuing expansion program has resulted in a steady increase in the use of newspaper advertising. Struthers pointed out. The number of Sears stores has increased from 625 in 1948 to a total of 748 at the end of 1962. 

MERIT STUDENTS

Should register

All 1965 graduates of Carri-2020 High School who wish to enter the 1964-65 National Merit Scholarship competition should register now at the school office, V. J. Marr, principal, onnounced today.

The National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test will be given in the school at 9. a.m., Tuesday, March 10, 1964,

Students who will complete secondary school in 1965 and enter college in the same calendar year art eligible for scholarship consideration in the 1964-65 Merit Program.

To receive consideration, the student must take the test when it is offered in his school. Farticipating students pay a \$1 fee on the day of the test. Any interested student who is unable to pay the fee should consult V. J. Marr.

Aswrds in the Merit Program are granted on the basis of intellectual merit, but student financial needs determine the amount of individual stipends. The stipends are renewable each year without further testing.

A-student's performance on the qualifying test also provides him with information that is useful in career planning or in selecting courses in high school and college, Marr stated.

After the test, each participating student receives a Handbook for Merit Program Participants, prepared by Science Research Associates, the festing agency. The Handbook is designed to help students understand their individual test results, to make comparisons with scores of high school students across the country, and to use this information in making educational and vocational plans. Thus, Marr said, students can learn more about their educational strengths and weaknesses, whether or not they plan to attend college.

In addition to the awards made by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation, about 175 business corporations, foundations, colleges, professional associations, unions, trusts, and individuals give scholarships through the Merit Program. A considerable number of other scholarship agencies utilize the service of NMSC in awarding their scholarships.

NMSC was established in 1965 through grants from the Ford Foundation and the Carnegie additional Ford Foundation grant to extend the Merit Program through 1970 was announced in 1962 In the period 1956-63, about 7500 students have received

Merit Scholarship awards and thousands of other high-scoring students have been assisted in obtaining financial aid from other sources.

It is again time to remind property ewners to render their taxes for 1964. Many have already attended to this when they were in Carrixece to pay their taxes --- which saves time and werry in remembering dates when the Assesser will be in their locality. A 5% penalty is charged after March 1st, 1964. Also veterans do not receive their exemptions if they fall to bring their Elighblity Certificates when rendering property taxes and sign for the Exemption on the Tax Schedule --- and have their Certificates signed,

Fair rendering of property by every property ewner-would make our taxes lower - and make us proud we are taking a part in helping to run our County . Gevernment and schools.

We should render our house held furniture even though we do not ewn a house but have our own furniture - Value furniture according to the price - If you do not have now furniture value it at 1/3 of the cost, A new house and new furniture should be rendered a little different; a new home at 1/3 the cost and furniture at 1/18 of the house cost, Grazing lands are to be valued at \$1.62 or \$1.75 am acre according to location. Irrigated lands should be put on the tax roll at \$64.00 an acre. Lots should be valued at \$100.00 and up. Machinery, equipment, fonces, pipe Need, (plastic & other) wind mills, pumps and livestock should be put on our Tax Rolls, ---Liverteck should be rendered at 98% of the hard, this includes elk, race horses, pige, saddle heroes, cours, bulls, goats and shoop.

It is real important to check your Tax Schedule, and your proporties to see what you are being taxed on and know if your charges have been made. This is especially important for Ruidese recidents. - We don't want to pay in 1964 for property you sold in 1963 --- at the same time new owners want this in their names so tax problems wen't cause trouble.



POST-SEASON TIPS GIVEN TO HUNTERS

Now that the hunting seasons are past, most hunters will lay away their equipment for another year. Here are some tips for sportsmen:

1. Clean and oil guns and store them in a dry, sale place. 2. Keep ammunition in a cool, dry place, away from excessive heat or moisture and out of the reach of children.

3. Clean and store boots, Remove mud and dirt from leather footwear. Then, treat leather with preservative, Store leather in cool, dry place since dampnéss will cause mildew. Store rubber boots in a cool, dry place too. Wire boot hangers are especially good for rubber since hanging boots by the foot permits free air circulation. Hangers are available at sporting goods stores or can be made by bending a wire coat hanger.

MORE DEPENDENT ON FARMER AND RANCHER

Who has ever heard an American storekeeper say, 'There's no milk or bread today, come back next week?" We take for granted that there will always be bread, meat, fruits, vegetables and dairy products in the food stores.

We show great faith in the American farmer to provide us with our daily needs, but little understanding of how the farmer makes this possible.

Farm and city have never been closer together. In this age of specialization, each depends more on the other. The farmer and rancher depends on the city and town worker for tractora, gasoline, fertilizer, credit, newspaper, kitchen stoves and a host of other products.

Without these city-produced goods, the farmer's life would be dreary and his work much less productive. Many more farm workers would be needed to supply our food and fiber.

Today's efficient agriculture has been called a "miracle," but it took perspiration, imagination and cooperation to make it so. The combined efforts of millions create modern agriculture in field and barns, in processing plants and in offic-

As more of us come to the cities and towns, we are more dependent on the farmer who stays on the land to feed us. Farm-City Week is a time when these facts will be reviewed. We in New Mexico should pay special attention to them,

. HOW TO REMOVE CANDLE ... WAX FROM FURNITURE

To remove candle wax from wood furniture, first pick off all the wax you can with your fingers. Then scrape very gently with a duli knife. Finally remove the last traces of wax by rubbing briskly with a dry soft cloth.

Wax will harden and be easier to remove if you hold an ice cube on it for a moment. Wipe up any melted ice at

CATTLE LICE CAN BE A BIG PROBLEM UNLESS TREATED

Cattle lice may not be much of a problem in the warm months but they can cause a lot of trouble in the winter because livestock are usually in closer association and chance of spreading the lice from infested animals to the ones without lice is better.

By the time the lice are easily seen, much of the damage has been done so the time to treat for lice is now — when they are

still in the egg stage. Common sprays for beel cattle are Malathion, Lindane, Co-Ral, Korlan, Toxaphene and Delnay. Usually these are applied as sprays or chips. It may be necessary to apply twice, usually two or three weeks after the first treatment to kill new lice as eggs hatch. Usually two treatments will control lice on beef cattle for the winter unless new animals are placed in the Otero Co. Elec. Coop. 22.20 herd or feedlots. FEEDER CATTLE PRICES EXPECTED TO INCREASE New Mexico ranchers should

expect some increase in feeder. cattle prices after January 1. Feedlot operators are expected to be in the market with

larger purchases than in recent months, according to Charles H. Greene, livestock marketing specialist at the NMSU. A slight increase in slaughter

cattle price is expected in March and April The market is expected to drop some in the summer and level off with fall prices about the same as in summer.

There is a general upswing in the number of beef cattle. The percent increase in beef cattle numbers is about the same as the percent increase in population, But because of the greater numbers of cattle on feed, the amount of meat produced is increasing slightly faster than the population increase.

"Feeders who have put cattle on feed the past three months should have a better market for their finished cattle than feeders putting cattle on feed the next three months," Greene said. 'This is because there are fewer cattle on feed now for the spring market than there will be for the summer market."

Greene noted that generally beef consumption in the U.S. has increased about one percent each year in recent years with a similar increase in the price of

formula for action is simply to find out what people want, promise it to them and go to work to get it for them, always keeping in mind, of course, the Communist cause.

Here in the United States, the primary objective of the Communist Party is to overthrow the capitalistic society and create a Soviet America. Elsewhere, it is merely to gain control. To do this, the Communists use various methods. Among them are mass agitation and fronts. These are tactics used day by day to achieve a long-range goal such as gaining control of an area or country,

Any person can become a part

of the Communist Party line or front because these Communists often seem to be working for the betterment of the country and their goals seem worthy and progressive. A reform movement of any kind could be a Communist front, This worthy movement is merely a disguise; the true objective is to further the Communist cause. "Our party is a revolutionary party. It aims not simply to ease conditions a bit under capitalism for the worker, but to abolish capitalism altogether." That was William Z, Foster speaking, He was formerly National Chairman of the Communist Party of the United States.

This contradictory statement can be explained by the example of a Communist effort in the United States to outlaw mass destruction weapons or the testing of them. This seems like an excellent idea to help insure world peace. No one likes the threat of a nuclear war and a movement to decrease the threat is very appealing. However, the real interest of the Communists promoting this cause is not world peace as we think of it, Rather, it is a way to allow Russia to become militarily stronger than the United States or other countries. Although the Communists may proclaim that they are striving for "peace," remember that their definition of peace is entirely different from ours. To the Communists, "peace" means advancing their aggressive aims without being interfered.

By announcing a worthy objective like this, the movement can attract many followers, most of whom have no idea they are part of a Communist front. The organization of a front is very complex, and the core is a

small dedicated group of Communists. They recruit fellow travellers, who are pro-Communist, but are not members of the Party, and together they plan the front.

Next in the recruiting line are the sympathizers who do not agree with some aspects of Communism. Sometimes they will support a front and sometimes not. If not, then they must be convinced to do so.

Finally the unsuspecting non-Communists are contacted efther by telephone or in person. They are asked to support a "worthy cause and do not realize that they will become a part of the Communist front. Prominent and respected persons are also recruited and this in turn collects more followers. Thus, many truly patriotic American citizens may be unconsciously aiding the Communist cause, unless they do some investigating.


Mass agitation is still another way to stir up people and maneuver them in the direction of the Communist Party line, The Communists will take advantage of any problem or situation and emphasize it all out of proportion to gain support. For instance, by "working" for equal rights of a certain group of people, the Communists can gain the support of this group as well as support from those who feel this movement is necessary. This agitation can cause no end of trouble and contraversy.

These are the weapons used by the Communists to further their cause propagands, infil. tration, subversion. These will be discussed later. Communism has set traps out everywhere. and if we are not careful, we may slip into one.







With smaller papers, the advertiser can select his area for coverage without paying for waste circulation. Plus he gets the "pass-on" value of the weeklies which are kept and shown to neighbors or mailed to friends.

Selection of the 1,800 coastto-coast rural and community papers used depend on: paid circulation; press-run of at least 1,500 copies; a minimum of six pages; 50 to 60 percent community news; photos of local people and events; healthy classified ad section, but not dominating; local chain store, department store or supermarket advertising; radio and tv logs or listings, plus movie ads - indicating the paper is around for omre than one day: an editorial page, publisher's or editor's column or series - this is evidence of a paper's attempt to render community service, performing its traditional role as spokesman for law, justice and right - and a minimum or complete absence of syndicated. publicity-service boiler-plate,
