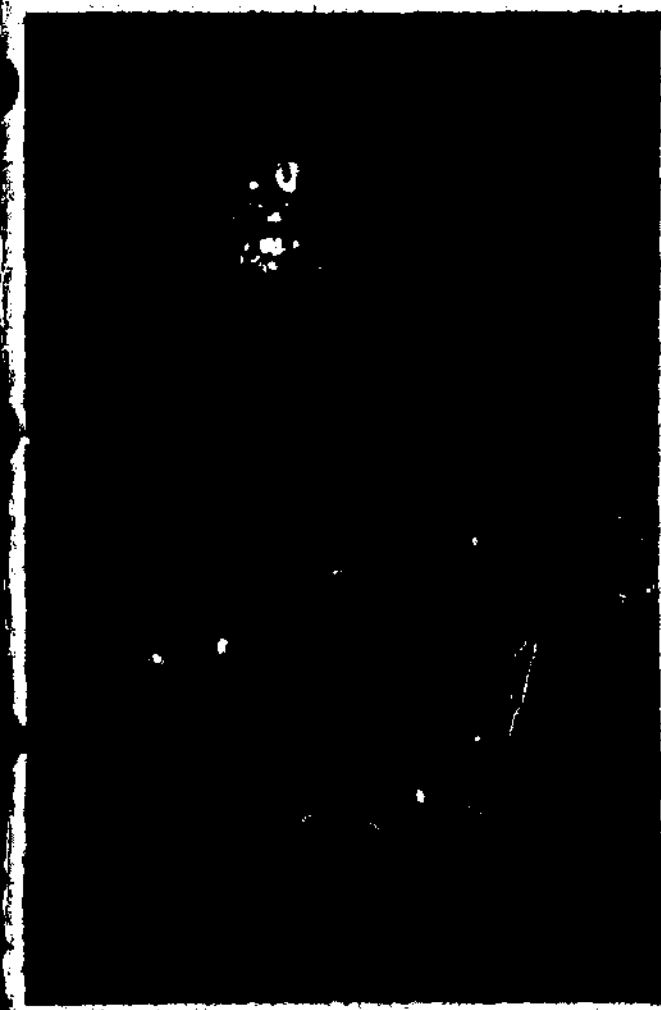
Dick Stanley states that as your District Judge, he will display and apply firm but fair

## State payroller would fail first grade quiz

SANTA FE — The state liquor office has a \$345-a-month inspector who is going to lose his job in May unless he learns to read and write sufficiently to take and pass a personnel examination.

He is Leo Candelaria, Demo chairman of the big Pct. 15, Albuquerque, who was employed in November.

### MUST GIVE UP

#### PRECINCT POST

State Liquor Chief Howard Babcock said he had notified Candelaria that he would have to give up the precinct party office if he is to continue on the payroll. The personnel law forbids state employees to hold party offices.

Babcock said Candelaria would be allowed to work until May, the maximum six months allowed without passing a personnel examination.

### OLD LAW REQUIRED

#### READING TEACHERS

The New Mexico legislature, incidentally, passed a law in 1899 requiring that all public school teachers be able to read and write in either the English or Spanish languages.

### CLINT AND LYNDON

#### PICK THE JUDGE

The appointment will be made by President Lyndon Johnson but the selection will be Sen. Clint Anderson's.

Rogers, a Republican, was the only federal judge of that party appointed to the bench from New Mexico since Orrie Phillips of Raton was named to circuit court back in the 1920's.

### SAME PATTERN

#### FOR THE HOUSE

Reapportionment of the state house of representatives was finally accomplished on exactly the same pattern used in the reapportionment of 1949 and 1955 without blowing \$45,000 on a futile special meeting of the legislature.

In 1949 and 1955 and again at the present the legislature membership was changed by giving more members to Albuquerque and few of the other larger counties and retaining at least one member for each of the counties.

The legislature attempted a fancy approach with twelve fractional members but the court wouldn't buy it and the conclusion was the same as the earlier reapportionment.

## Carrizozo school in good condition

Carrizozo Municipal Schools have shown a slight decrease in enrollment every year since the closing of Red Canyon military site, up to 1963-64. The report, by Supt. J. T. Clegg to be submitted to the Board of Education at their January meeting tonight, shows enrollment of 370, compared with last spring enrollment of 368.

This school board meeting starts at 7:30 p.m. in the superintendent's office. The public is invited to attend.

The present teaching staff is composed of 18 1/2 teachers, two principals and the superintendent. Eleven are women, seven of these have AB Degrees, three MA Degrees, one substandard (less than AB Degree). Five of the men teachers have AB Degrees, six have MA Degrees.

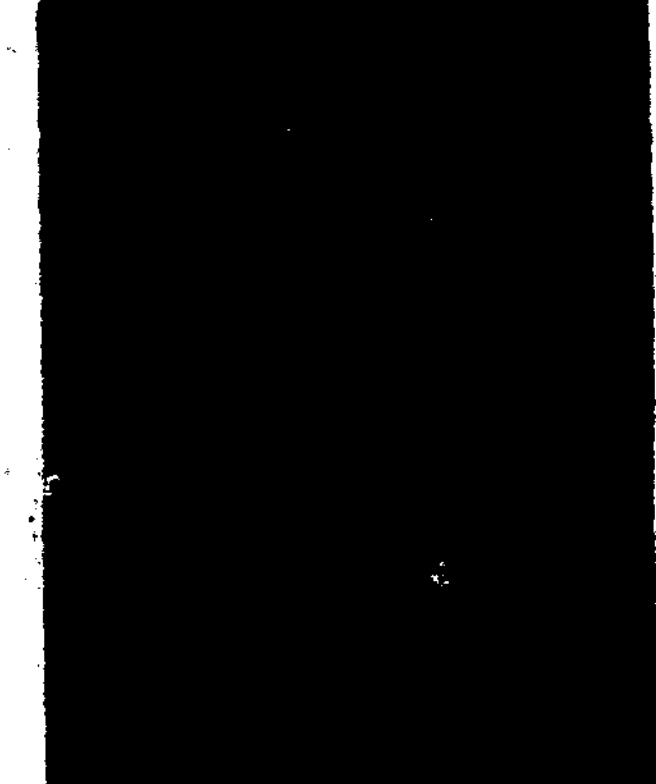

## Court house bonds advertised for sale

## Leandro Vega, Jr. files for sheriff subject to Republican primay May 3

The first Lincoln County resident to make an official announcement of his candidacy for public office in the 1964 elections is Leandro Vega, Jr., 33, a Carrizozo resident, who said he will file for the office of Sheriff, subject to the Republican primary, May 5.

Vega is now serving as chief deputy sheriff under Sheriff Glen Bradley, a position he has held since Bradley took office in 1961. When Bradley was re-elected in 1962, Vega was retained as chief deputy. Vega is also a member of the New Mexico Sheriffs Police Association.

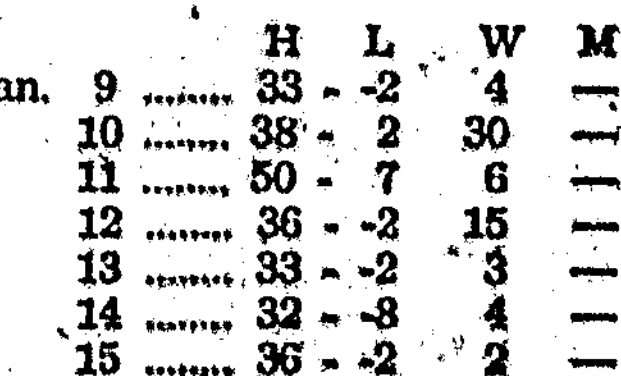

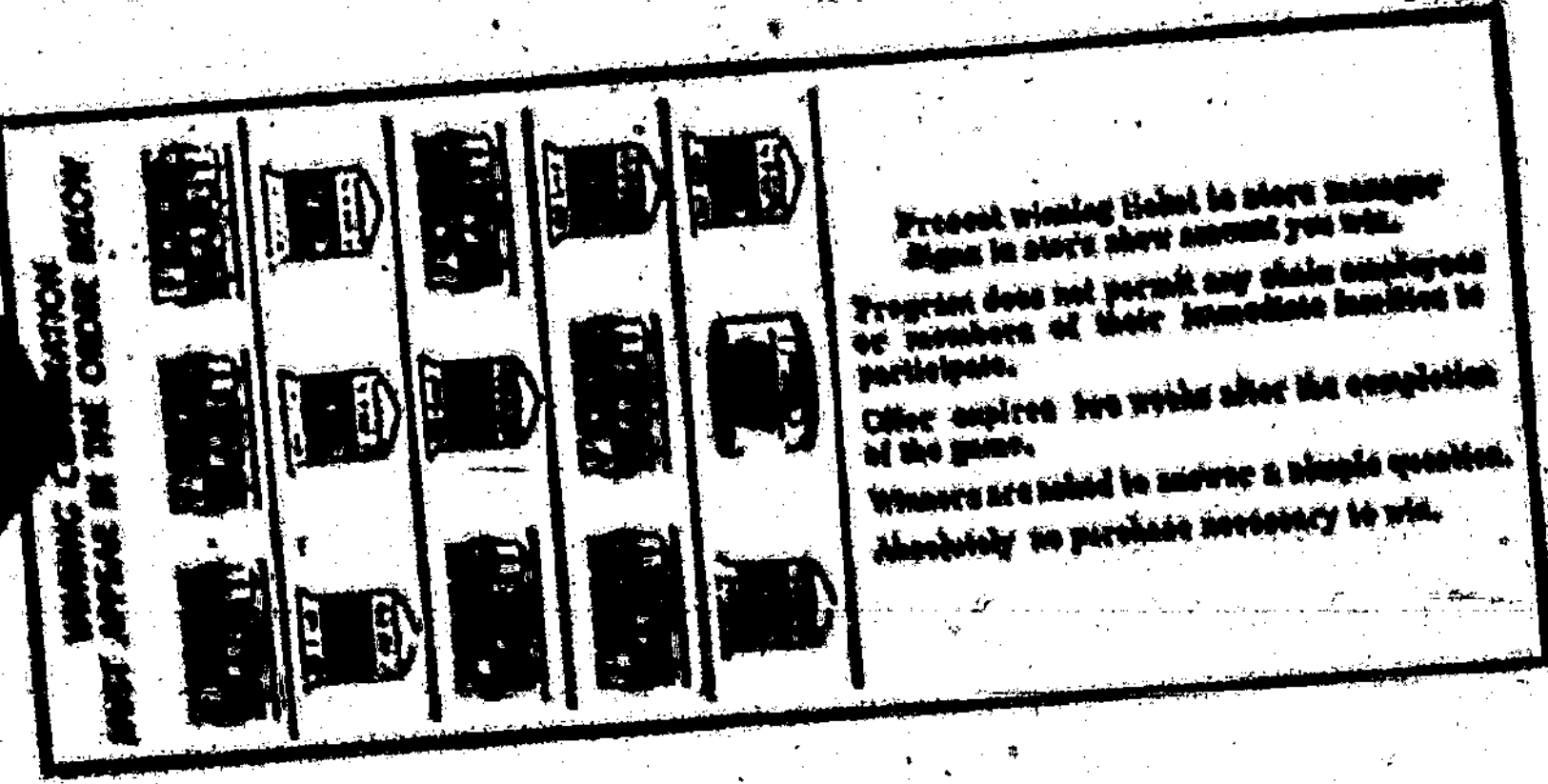
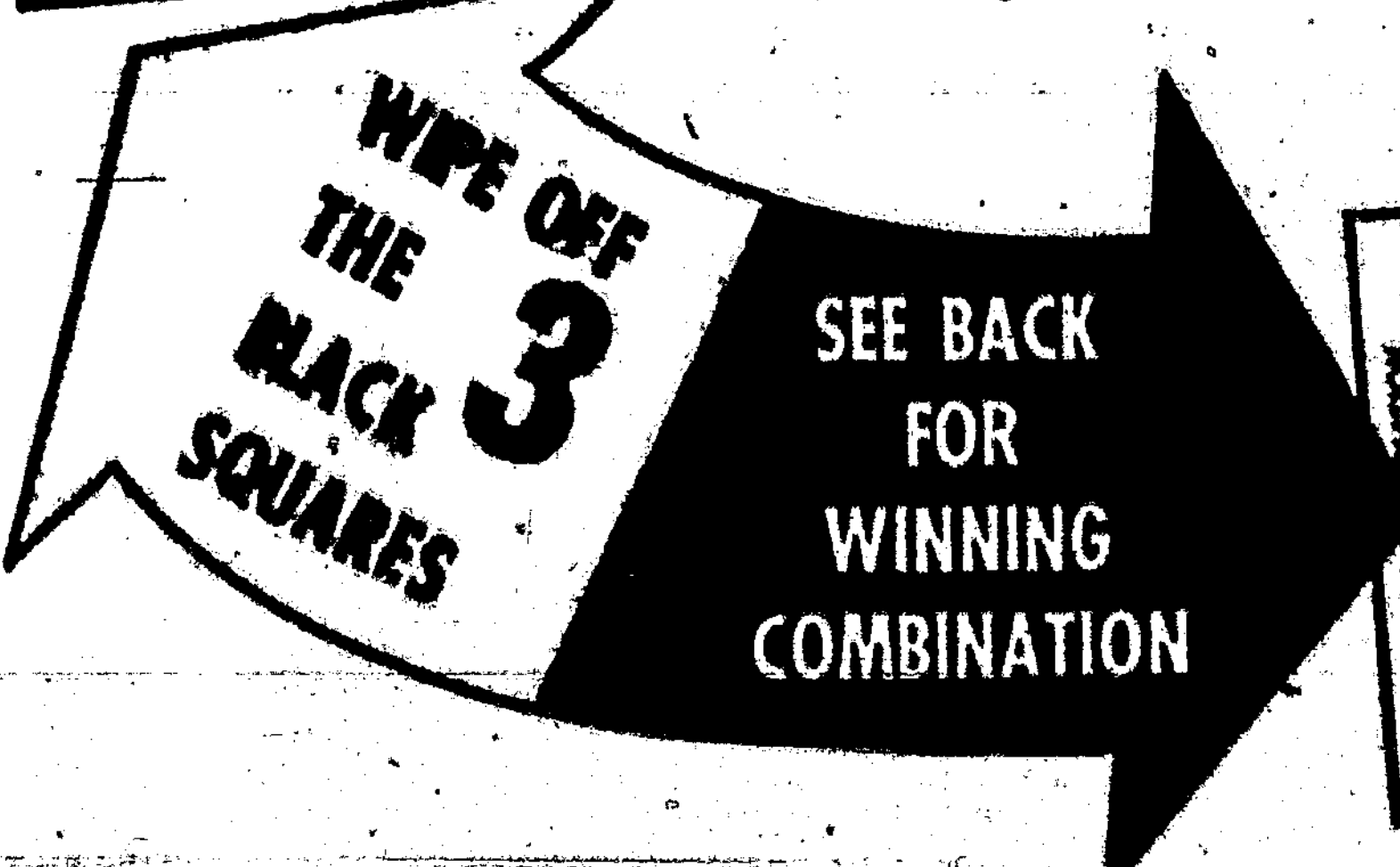

### Ways to Keep plants attractive

Those potted plants you received for Christmas will keep their good looks for a long time if you give them the right treatment.

The poinsettia — red, pink or white will remain attractive for several weeks if you maintain the right temperature and moisture conditions. Keep the plant in an area free of draft where the temperature stays about 60 or 70 degrees; temperatures above or below may cause the leaves and bracts to drop. Place the poinsettia close enough to a window that it will receive some light, but don't put it so near that it becomes chilled. The Mobile Dental Clinic sponsored by the Carrizozo Woman's Club will be in Carrizozo soon, watch for it.

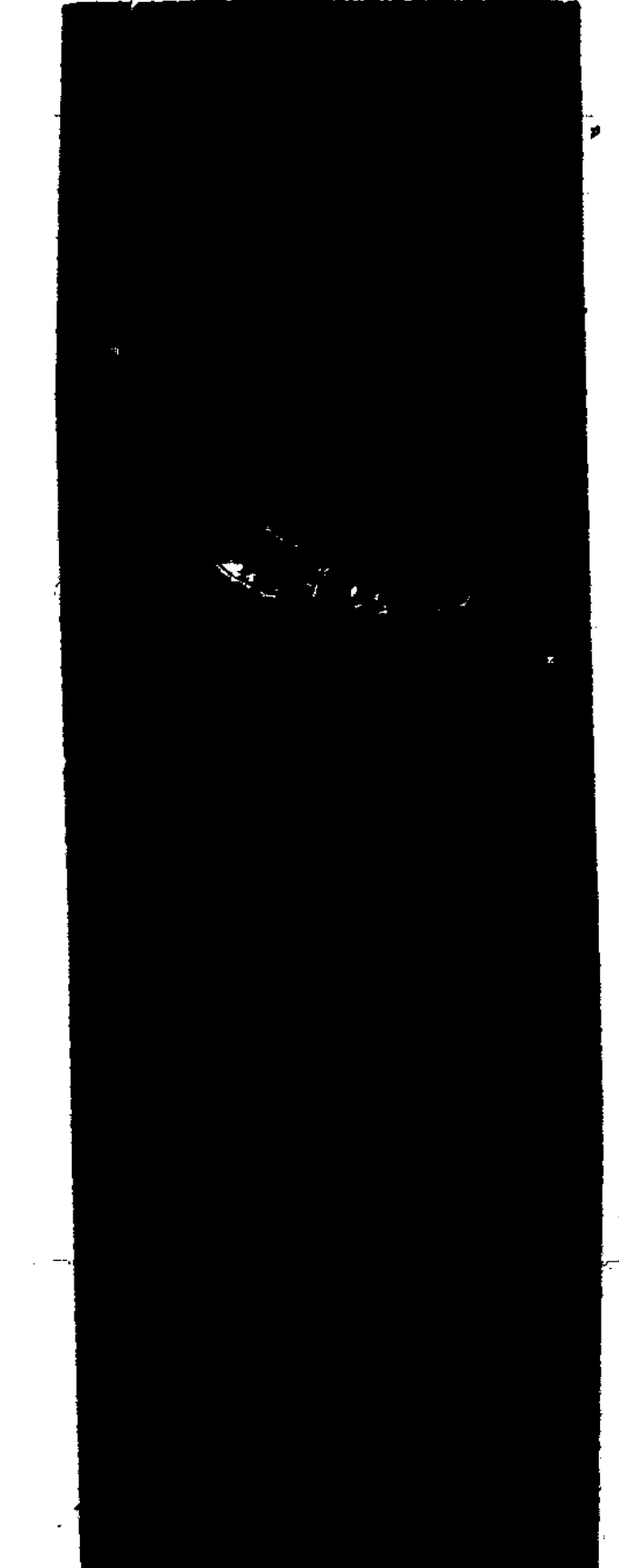
Children who will start to school next year will be eligible for this dental health clinic, and their parents should make applications for this service at the County Health office, Jan. 16-17.

blooms, chrysanthemums need plenty of water and as much light as possible, place the plants near a window with a southern exposure where the temperature is 60 degrees at night and 65-70 degrees during the day.

The cyclamen, an attractive flower with unusual foliage, prefers cool temperatures, good lighting, and plenty of water. For continued flowering, place the cyclamen near a window where the temperatures are about 50 degrees at night and 60-65 during the day. Check the pot often and keep the soil moisture at a wet or too dry — neither too wet or too dry.

Like the cyclamen, the Christmas pepper with its bright red fruit and dark green foliage, should be kept near a window where it can receive light and cool temperatures. Keep the soil moist at all times.

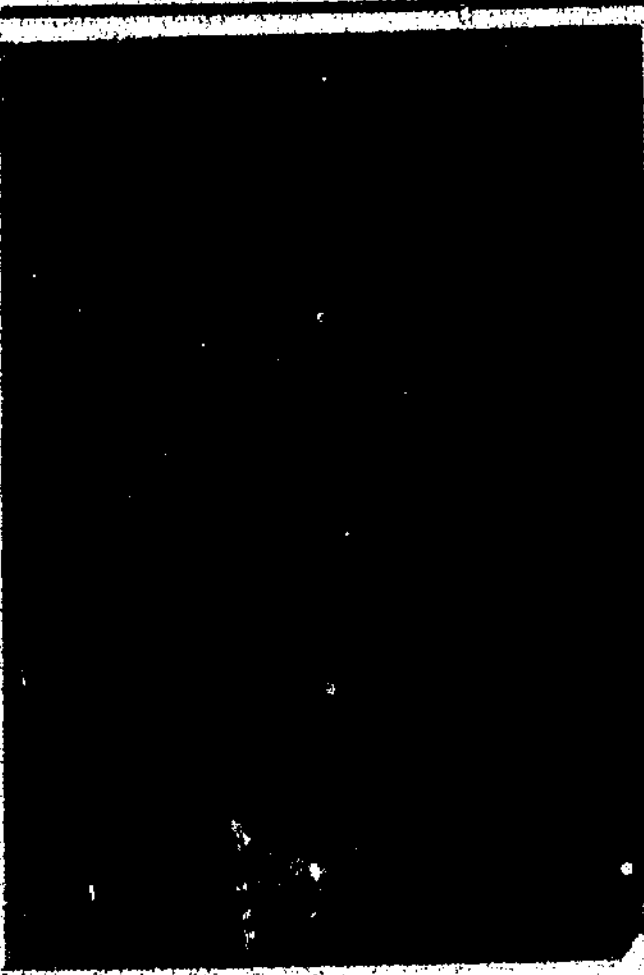

## SAUCE FOR THE GOOSE ISN'T SAUCE FOR A GANDER

I have my stuff scattered all over the room—here in Franklin, La., researching a Charlton Publications assignment on General Lew Wallace, governor of the New Mexico Territory from 1878 to 1881, and famous as the author of the memorable BEN-HUR, which was written and published—part in Lincoln Co.—while he administered duties in the strife-torn Territory, a country now very dear to me.

It's pouring down rain in this Cajun Country—some call it Coon-Ass, which I am largely in favor of—and I look out the window with an air of nostalgia upon the black, slimy, muddy mess of rain-soaked soil that millions of years ago had a place on this planet far to the north, before the rampunctuous Mississippi lifted it as sediment to this region and formed a marshy situation, undesirable to anyone except a downright Coon-Ass, for souls like me to make an unpleasant passage.

When I look and I see and I observe and think, I cuss and I moan and I groan, and I become nearer to signing a contract for an assignment in far away Argentina.

But anyway, out of that heap of old research material which I have caused to be mailed for my convenience into this strange land to do up a magazine article on request, I came upon an old letter, and I wish to quote it here. Lincoln County, as we all know, captured a large portion of General Wallace's attention while he was governor of the Territory.

Here it is, a letter from Susan E. Wallace (General Wallace's wife) to Henry L. Wallace, dated May 11, 1879:

"My Dear—General Sherman was right. We should have another war with Old Mexico to make her take back New Mexico. I did not think anything could make me think well of Santa Fe, but this hideous spot does. (This letter was datelined, Fort Stanton.)

"We are at the post-trader's, and I am the only feminine creature except an old hen. The cook who fries the bacon is a Mexican giant with long, straggling black hair, and when not frying he stands in the Colocous of Rhodes pose and gazes at us. They sent miles away for a chicken, and the famished thing—all bone and fibre. I remarked

to 'General H.' (commandant), this country was not made for civilized men. He replied, 'I have held that opinion a long while.' It should be a buffalo-range for the Indians, who can find the springs curiously hidden on the tops of mountains.

"A horrible dust-storm is blowing gravel against the window, beating it like hail. (From the substance of the letter, I'm most certain the General's wife would have liked to use the word HELL.) I taste the alkali dust; my clothes are gritty, and the last box in the bottom of my trunk is grimy with sand. Yet I have heard of this as the garden spot of the territory. Garden! There has been no rain in six months, and what can grow in soil made of fire-clay, alkali, and sand? I have some faith in mines, because nothing is made in vain, and there is nothing else here. Saying this to Mrs. D., she triumphantly asked, 'What is the desert of Sahara made for?'

"We journeyed across a plain lying in the midst of a stone wilderness; in every direction mountains grim and fixed as walls of adamant, seeming immovable as the throne of God. No water, 'the eye of the earth' glancing up towards heaven; no waving branches beckoning like friendly hands to shade and shelter; no bee or bird, not even a grasshopper's chirp. The earth was still as the sky before the winds were made.

"Lincoln County reign of terror is not over, and we hold our lives at the mercy of desperadoes and outlaws, chief among them 'Billy the Kid,' whose boast is that he has killed a man for every year of his life. Once he was captured, and escaped after overpowering his guard, and now he swears when he has killed the sheriff and the judge who passed sentence upon him, and Governor Wallace, he will surrender and be hanged. I mean to ride into the plaza at Santa Fe, hitch my horse in front of the palace, and put a bullet through Lew Wallace."

"These are his words. 'One of my friends warned me to close the shutters at evening, so the bright light of the student's lamp might not make such a shining mark of the governor writing till late on BEN-HUR. 'Billy' (whose name is Bonney) has a gang of admirers and followers, and they dash up to a ballroom, shoot out the

candles, and gallop away and nobody hurt.

"This way of living does not suit me; some men find an unaccountable fascination in the danger and outlawry of the frontier far beyond my understanding. Sweet home was never sweeter to my thought than now in this wilderness without the manna.

"When the manuscript is ready we will go to New York with it, and how glad I should be to think there will be no return to the 'most desirable of all the territories'—a phrase continually sounded in our ears."

**THE LONG AND SHORT OF IT IS** . . . Mrs. Wallace returned to her home in Crawfordsville, Indiana, soon, and the General wrote her a letter. It had a different tone. Here it is, in part: "I am well; how one can be anything else in this climate I do not know. The air is so clear and pure, the sunlight so delicious; no fear of cloudy tomorrow; when one dies away another as bright and as shining come on, I wish you could fill your lungs with this sweet air."

Only a man who could deliver such words and recognize such a Territory could have written the immortal work, BEN-HUR!

## MOVE CALLED POLITICAL

# Dr. Shankel criticizes Fort Stanton plan

A Roswell doctor Saturday criticized a plan to move state tuberculosis patients from Fort Stanton to an abandoned Army Nike-Hercules missile site near Roswell and to utilize facilities at Fort Stanton for retarded children.

In a letter to the Journal Dr. L. Willard Shankel said that the proposal is "solely political, senseless, not in the best interests of the state, and has been presented to the public in such a way as to involve much misinformation and deception."

The idea has been under study by Gov. Jack M. Campbell and several of his advisors. Proponents of the plan have said it would allow the state to handle 125 retarded children now on the waiting list at Los Lunas as well as 125 retarded from the State Hospital at Las Vegas. The Nike-Hercules site was made available to the state by the federal government some time ago.

Dr. Shankel said that he was familiar with the Fort Stanton operation, having served there for the past six years as a consultant psychiatrist. He said he was also well acquainted with the missile site, "having looked into this for another use two years ago." He spoke of the site as being "in the boonocks 25 miles south of Roswell."

Criticizes Campbell  
Dr. Shankel criticized Campbell's handling of the matter as "unnecessarily preemptive and high-handed."

He said that the present Fort Stanton hospital is well run and efficient. He praised the medical director, Dr. H. Crawford Jernigan, and declared that the care of tuberculosis is vital and important.

He denied statements that the tuberculosis patients are not using all available space, saying that unused buildings are decaying, elderly frame structures left over from federal days. These, he said, "are utterly unfit for patient use."

**Necessary Construction**  
"The governor well knows that it was necessary three years ago to construct a new wing to the hospital to furnish adequate patient space."

Dr. Shankel was highly critical of the Nike site as a tuberculosis hospital.

"This is a group of four main buildings," he said, "designed for housing, feeding and administration of a missile company of about 90 men. There are two barracks buildings, a small mess hall and an office building. Under the state hospital regulations, no more than 30 patients could be accommodated in the barracks buildings, and that poorly. This would not allow adequate space for nurses' stations, utility rooms, linen and drug rooms, and the like, for

this number of patients; such facilities would have to be added with new construction."

**Space Need**  
He added that the kitchen and dining room would be inadequate and would involve new construction. Space, he said, would also be needed for X-ray, laboratory and other facilities.

He said that in order to duplicate present facilities at Fort Stanton and to meet future needs at least 195 beds would have to be constructed at a cost estimated at \$1,950,000.

Other points he made: The missile site is hot and dusty, "not at all suitable for patients with pulmonary diseases."

Farming out patients to general hospitals in the state would be foolishness.

Further hospitalization of Indian patients at Fort Stanton should not be stopped.

**Dedicated Staff**  
There is an able and dedicated staff at Fort Stanton and many

would not leave the Lincoln mountain country.

It would be impossible to reduce the average cost of daily patient care at the Nike missile site. He said that Ben Mason of the state finance office had spoken of such reduction costs.

Dr. Shankel said that the Chaves County Medical Society has unanimously moved to declare the proposal "hasty and ill-considered."

And he concluded "and I, as a member of the society, feel that it is imperative that the citizens of the state know that this move — which I consider only as an attempt by Gov. Campbell to ensure his re-election by 'playing politics' with our state institutions — would undoubtedly wreck one of the state's major medical assets."

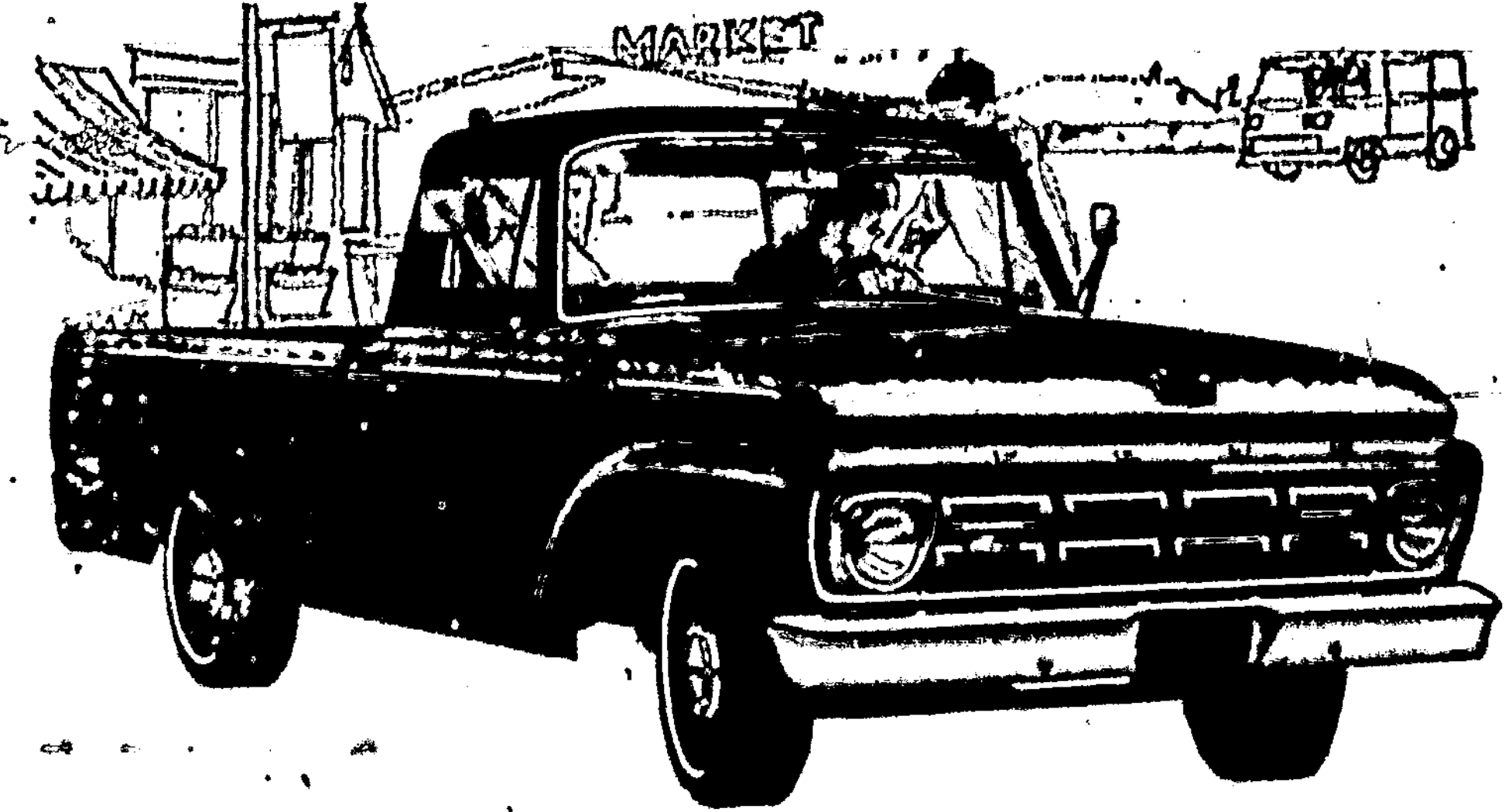

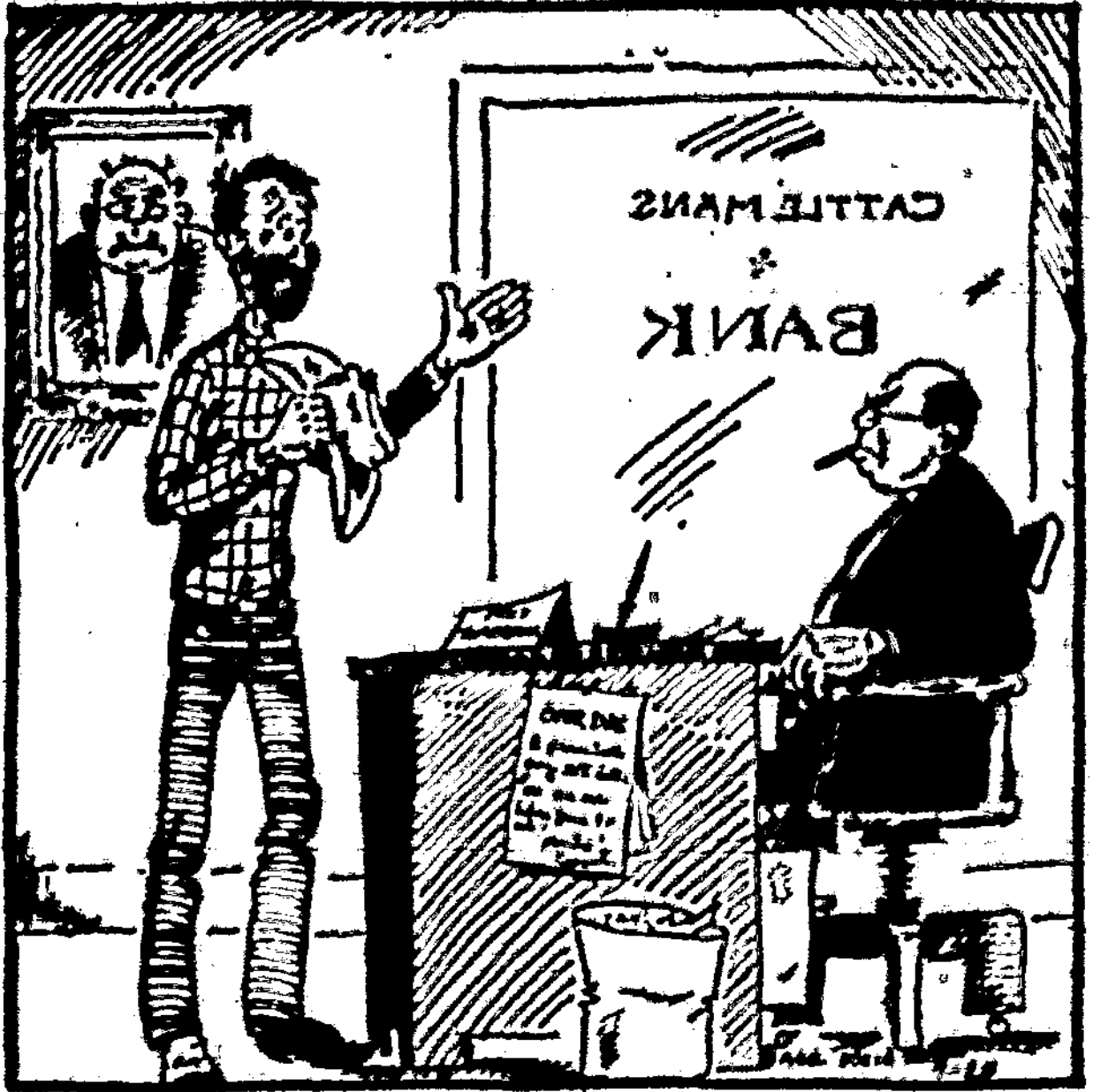

## Blue Sky Money

The Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce had a good turnout at its meeting last week and enthusiasm generated can pay off for Zozo in time to come. No definite conclusions were reached about industrial development.

The problem of industrial development needs enthusiasm and almost perpetual optimism. All degrees of progress show up in the state. Small factories going or starting up in Socorro, Deming, Lordsburg, other towns spending development money with no immediate results.

The answers aren't easy. About the best a town can do is pursue a moderate course, one that can be sustained from year to year, one where fringe benefits such as tourists coming to Lincoln County are possible, one that is managed by permanent personnel that will be around town in coming years. The C of C cannot operate any sort of industrial development on \$20 per member dues, so one recourse is for the Town to bear the cost. Presuming that the Town would see fit to employ a person to work part time at development business and part time at town business — the next council could stop whatever had been started.

We thoroughly believe in spending a moderate amount of blue sky money. It's not a lot different from advertising — if the product is good and enough people are contacted, sales result. The same can be true for the good product we are considering. Lincoln County.

## Part Of Education

The News has been plugging for more vocational education during the past year and now help is coming. The 88th Congress has passed a \$1.6 billion Vocational Education Act which will jump spending along these lines from \$47 million a year to an average of \$200 million.

A question with us is — will come of that money dribble down to schools the size of those in Lincoln County.

There never has been a surplus of printers, electricians in New York are on a 25-hour week, and we read that plumbers, TV repairmen, and the like are in equally short supply.

High school educational planning should include preparing boys and girls, those expecting to seek employment right out of high school, for a trade commensurate with their ability.

Colleges and universities are cutting standards which preclude students in lower grade brackets from gaining admittance. This isn't so good but they have to draw the line somewhere because of crowded facilities. In any case the facts

might as well be made known to students in prep schools which may help them in charting future careers.

More labor figures — 80 per cent of the nation's school population annually joins the labor force without a college education. More reason for vocational education.

One reason for the lack of vocational education in high schools is the high cost of equipment. Maybe part of the \$1.6 billion will help supply this need.

First the three R's in heavy doses . . . with a liberal follow-up of vocational education.

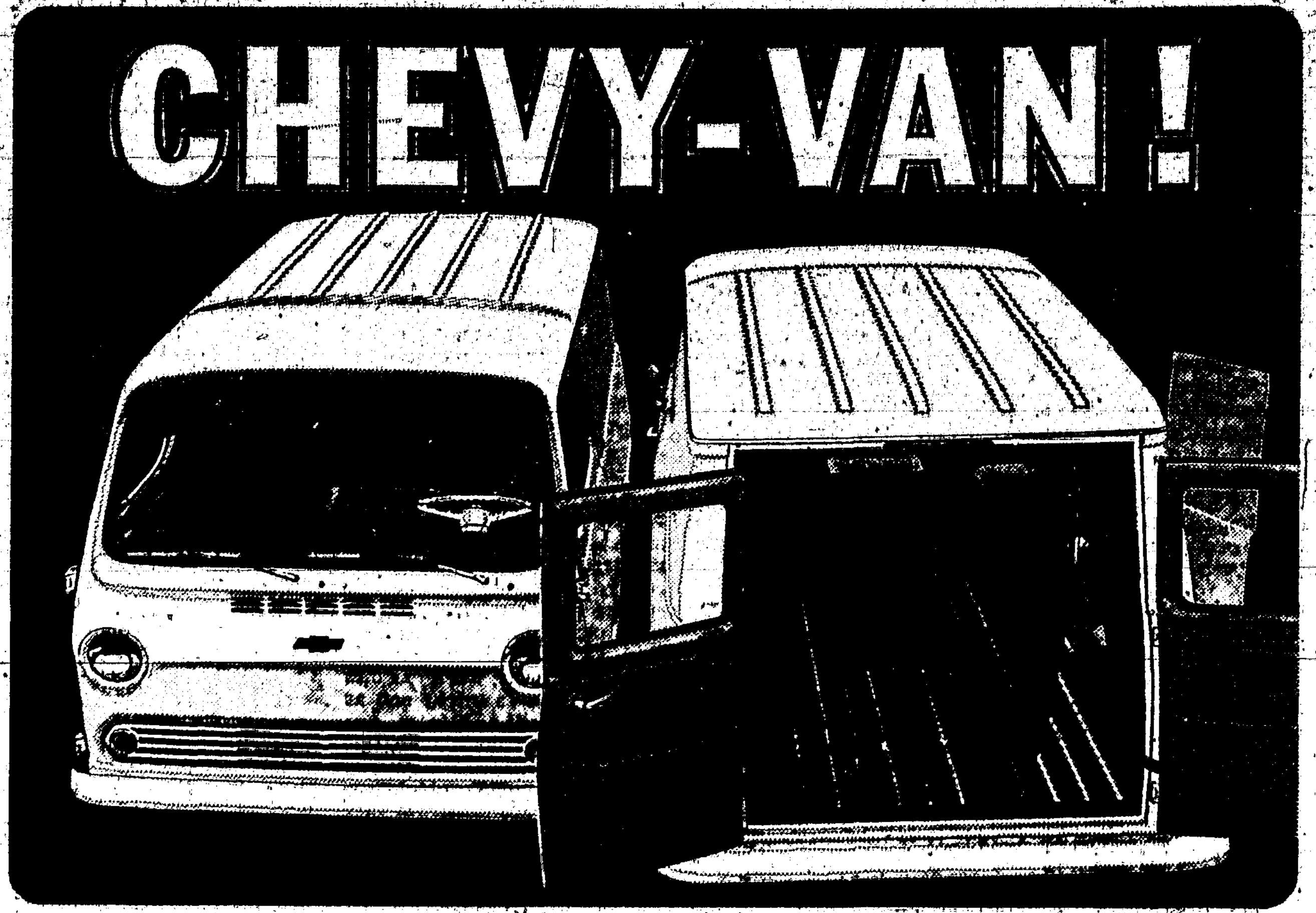

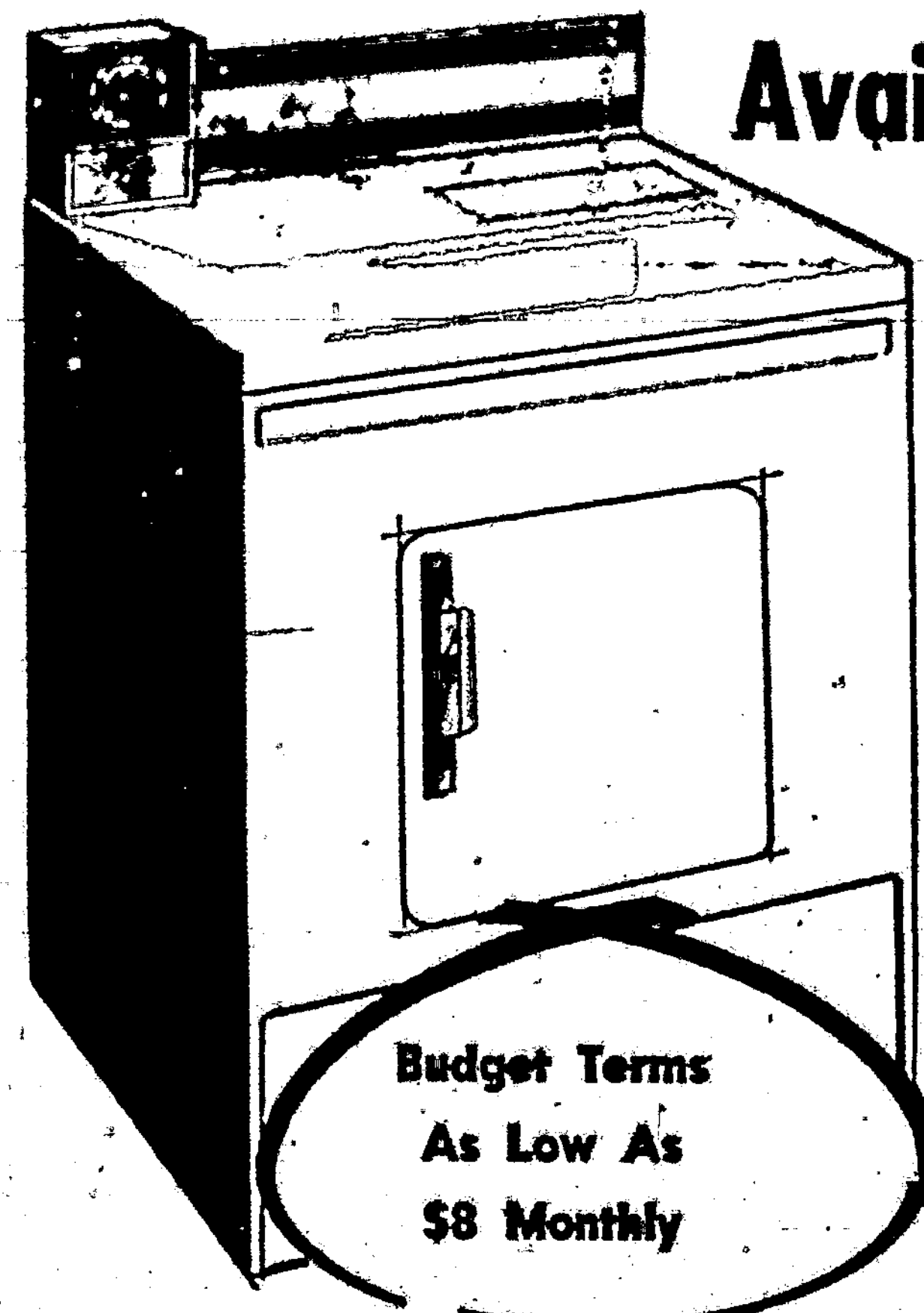

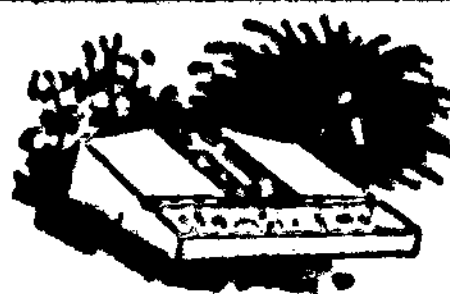

Our friend of many years, Albert Carter of Tularosa and Nogal was here for a good visit. Albert grew up in Ancho and went to school here.

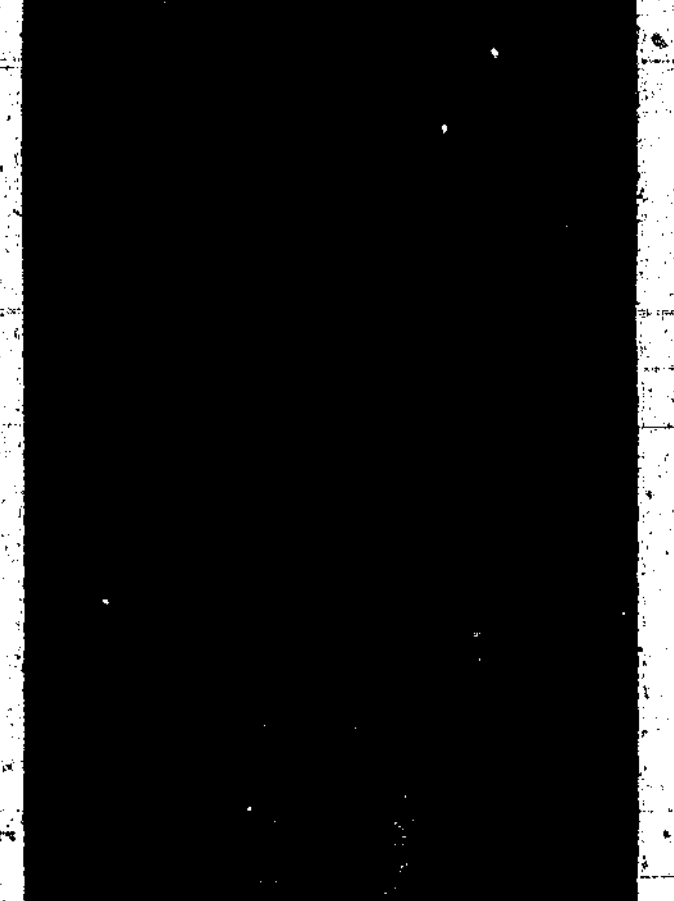

## FARM NEWS

**FEEDER'S DAY AND CATTLE SHORT COURSE PLANNED**

A feeder's day for sheep and cattle growers will be held at New Mexico State University on February 24, followed by a Cattle Growers Short Course, February 25-26.

The feeder's day will cover recent research at the University's Experiment Station on sheep and cattle.

The two-day short course, sponsored by the New Mexico Cattle Growers Association and New Mexico State University, will cover range nutrition, including information on the use of protein and mineral supplements with methods of feeding supplements and the amounts to feed.

### GET SPRAYER READY FOR SPRAYING SEASON

Get your sprayer ready now for the spraying season this year. Clean sprayer tank, check pump, strainer and motor. If any parts are needed you have enough time to order them. Last minute repairs often do not allow you time enough to order parts. A few days delay can mean the difference between a dollar per box and four dollars per box on apples.

With proper care your sprayer will be ready to use next spring when you need it.

### TIPS FOR REMOVING HOLIDAY STAINS

More than any other time of the year, food seems doubly important for holiday festivities. Everyone eats too much and sleeps too little. It's really holiday time.

But "after the ball is over" party reminders appear in various places as "holiday" stains. Some are easy to remove, others are real problems, and a few may be impossible to remove. The sooner you can treat a stain, the better.

When preparing to remove a stain, you should know the kind of fabric and the type of stain, greasy, non-greasy or a combination of both. You should know if the fabric is washable or nonwashable. There are many new fabrics made of numerous synthetic fibers and blends of fibers. If there is any doubt in your mind about using a stain remover on the fabric, it will be better to take the garment or article to a commercial cleaner as soon as possible.

treating washable fabrics to remove the stains you may have encountered recently:  
**Meat juice** — Soak in cool water and then wash in hot suds.  
**Gravy and white sauce** — Soak in cool water and then wash in hot suds.  
**Paint** — If fresh, use lots of suds. Otherwise, apply turpentine or Kerosene and then wash in hot suds.  
**Candle wax** — scrap off excess wax with a table knife. Place stained spot between white blotters and press with hot iron. Then rub spot gently with turpentine and wash in warm suds.  
**Glue** — Soak in warm suds until dissolved; then launder in fresh warm suds.  
**Ballpoint ink** — Use carbon tetrachloride to remove the stains. Soak in warm soap or detergent suds, then wash and rinse in clear water. If discoloration remains on white or bleached material, use a milk bleach and launder again.  
**Soft drinks** — Sponge with equal parts of alcohol and glycerine or lukewarm water and alcohol. Launder in lukewarm soapy water.

### MAKING WILL IS NORMAL PART OF LIVING

### death toll goes down

New Mexico's 1963 traffic death toll, averaging one a day, was a substantial reduction from 1962.

The 365 persons killed in traffic last year was 72 under the 1962 total and only nine above the low record of 356 in 1961 during the 12-year period from 1951. New Mexico's worst year in traffic was 1959, when 456 persons were killed.

State Police Chief K. K. Miller noted that in December, usually one of the worst months for traffic deaths, 28 persons were killed in traffic compared with 48 in December 1962.

"Factors that contribute to the reduction, noted by Miller, included the work of Gov. Jack M. Campbell's Traffic Safety Commission, public acceptance of traffic enforcement programs, an uninterrupted system of suspensions and revocations of operators' licenses, news media, local law officials.

The traffic toll in Lincoln County for 1963 was at a low with eight reported dead for that year, compared to 11 for 1962.

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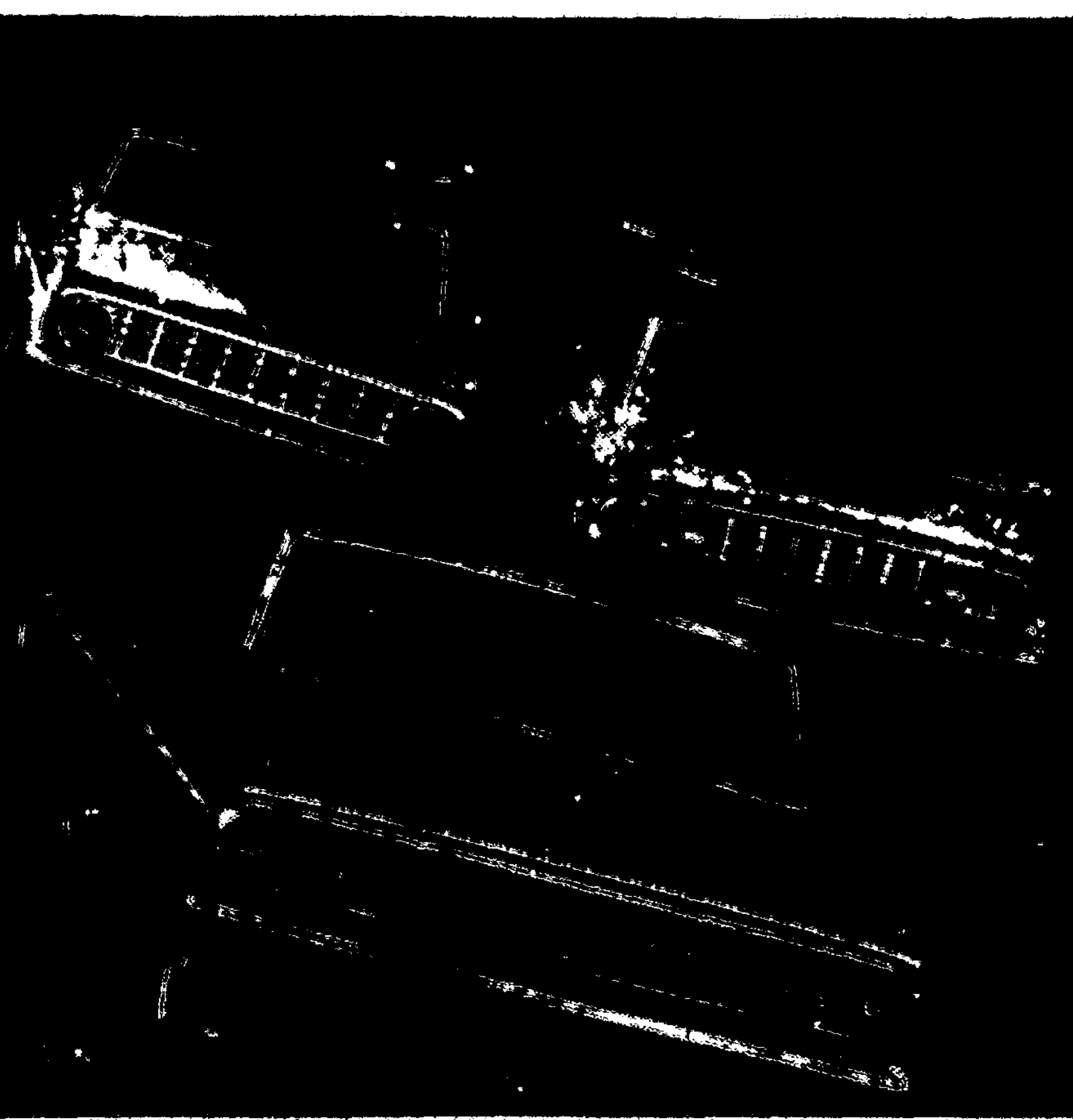

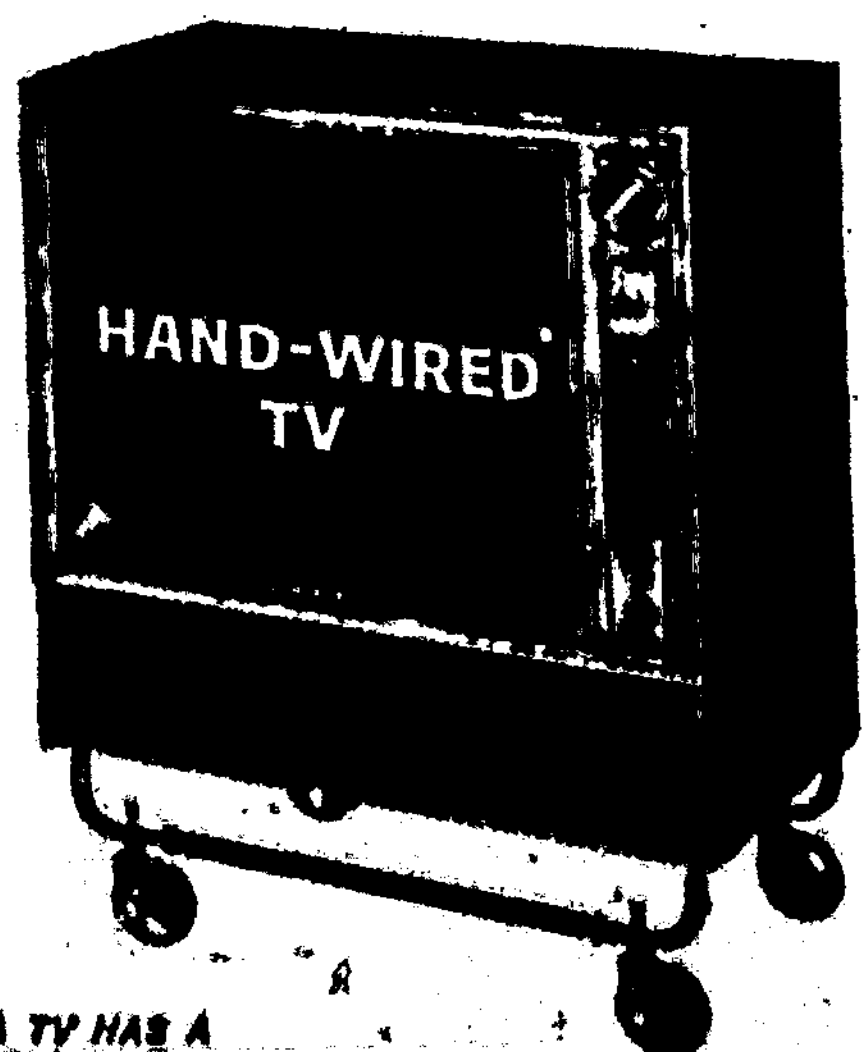

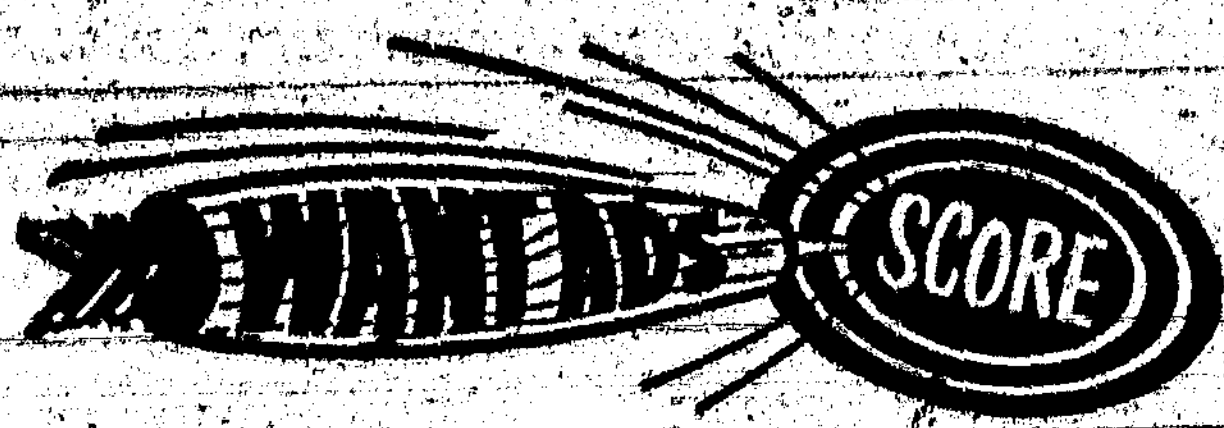
