## Town Council talks to FAA official, airport possibilities better after tour

Lewis Millon of the Federal Aviation Agency met with the Carrizozo Town Council Tuesday and told them that funds under the Federal Airport Act are available for New Mexico airports, but such funds might not remain available long. In years past the FAA has turned back funds allotted to New Mexico which were then used in other states. This year several projects are developing which will probably use up all of New Mexico's allotment. The FAA will definitely terminate its lease on the ground now used for the Corona emergency landing field on June 30. The equipment there is satisfactory in every way for use in Carrizozo under a Maximum Secondary Classification. Such an airport would be as large as Carrizozo should need for several years to come. Mr. Millon and council members toured several possible sites and this situation looked much better after the tour was complete. The Maximum Secondary Classification includes a runway about 4,000 feet long, with quartering runways possibly shorter. Clearance at each end of the runway is necessary back about 1,000 feet on each end. The maximum width needed is 1200 feet for the major runway.

### Seay vs Town case to Supreme Court

A notice was filed with the District Court in Carrizozo Tuesday that Albert Seay, plaintiff, appeals to the Supreme Court of the State of New Mexico from the final judgment entered in this action on Dec. 3, 1963, and from the denial in open court on Jan. 20, 1964, of plaintiff's motion filed therein on Dec. 13, 1963, pursuant to District Court Rules. The original suit was an objection to the paving in front of Seay's business property. Following the notice filed Tuesday, the appeal must be perfected which includes considerable legal business.

### 1963 SALES VS. ASSESSED AMOUNT ON REAL ESTATE

Compiled by Dan D. Swearingin in Ruidoso Area  
The following pertinent facts are respectfully called to the attention of the County Commissioners and County Assessor:

**Procedure**  
I have tabulated 344 actual sales of real estate in the area, of these 253 cases were found on the assessment rolls of the County. Personal property has been excluded, where found in the sale or assessment. The assessment was divided by the sales price, to determine the sales assessment relationship. As an example: A \$10,000 sale, with a \$1,000 assessment — 1,000/10,000 equals 10%. The percentages were tabulated under the following headings:

B. Lowest over-all assessment was 20 acres of raw land that sold for \$20,000 and was assessed at \$33.00. The tax rate in 3-Out for 1963 is 27.459. The total tax for the year would be 9c. Inside the Village of Ruidoso, the tax would be 20c.

Recommendations			
Lincoln County needs some system of assessing property. The present program can be best described as a complete lack of any working system.			
Bernillo County has used a good system for several years. This system assesses property at a certain % of sales price. In view of the present average assessments, as shown by this study, 15% is recommended for Lincoln County.			
The Ruidoso Board of Realtors and Multiple Listing Service feel that the present assessing program must be corrected to eliminate, insofar as is humanly possible, the wide divergences found in this study.

## A Payroller Convention

SANTA FE — Auditor Alex Armijo was alone among state officials in forbidding his employees to serve as delegates to the state Demo convention Feb. 22.

Other officials went the opposite direction and the Santa Fe meeting stands to look like a statehouse picnic with county delegations loaded with capital payrollers.

Atty. Gen. Earl Hartley's ruling that cleared state employees to attend the party conventions as delegates went a long way toward breaking down the political activity portions of the 1963 state personnel law.

**WORKERS SUBJECT TO BOSS CONTROL**  
The law was intended not only to keep state workers out of party offices but also to protect them from being abused by

politicians. A payroller attending a convention as a delegate is likely to be only a mouthpiece for his boss.

The federal ban on workers getting into politics which was pushed through Congress by New Mexico's Sen. Carl Hatch was inspired by the old practice of loading national political conventions with federal employees serving as delegates.

**CHAVEZ, WALKER HORN SCRAMBLE**  
The scrambling race that Demo congressional hopefuls Johnny Walker, Calvin Horn and Fabian Chavez are making for the Feb. 22 convention suggests that they may have forgotten that none will be nominated until the May primary. ### BLUEBERRY SAUCE

Tino won a unanimous victory for the post at the Credit's Annual Luncheon Meeting held at the Desert Inn, Santa Fe, New Mexico, on Thursday, January 30. Four other directors were re-elected. Over 200 shareholders attended the meeting.

Members, who must be shareholders, meeting at the Desert Inn included those from the State Education Dept., the State Land Office, Corporation Commission, Motor Vehicle Department, Bureau of Revenue, and the State Tax Commission. Presiding over the Luncheon Meeting was the Chairman of the Board, Fanny Trujillo, from Santa Fe, Welfare Department. 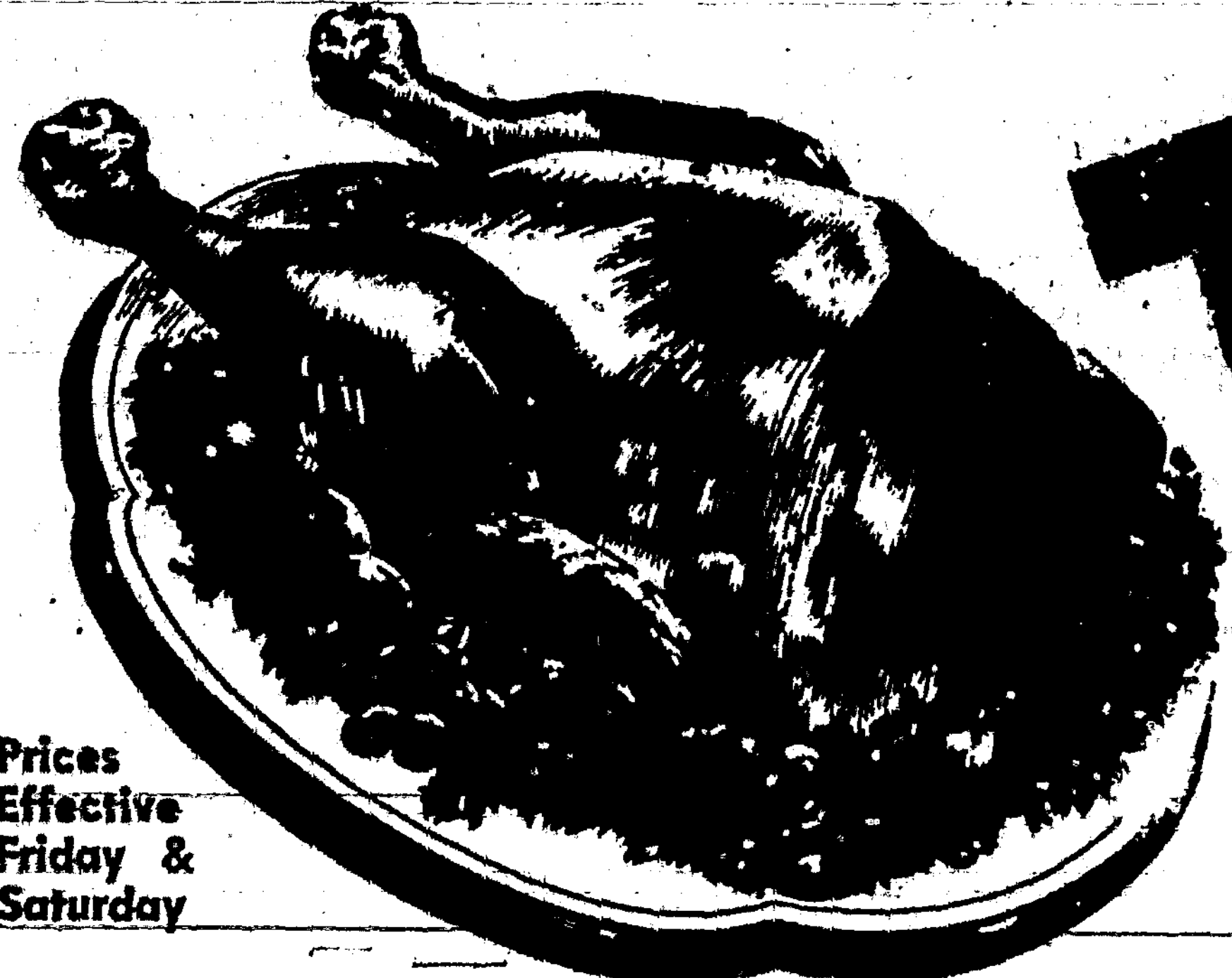

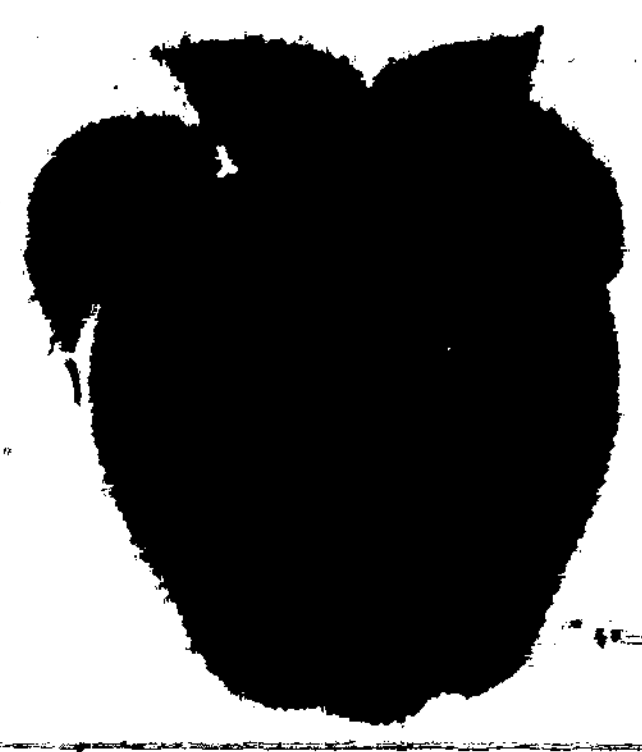

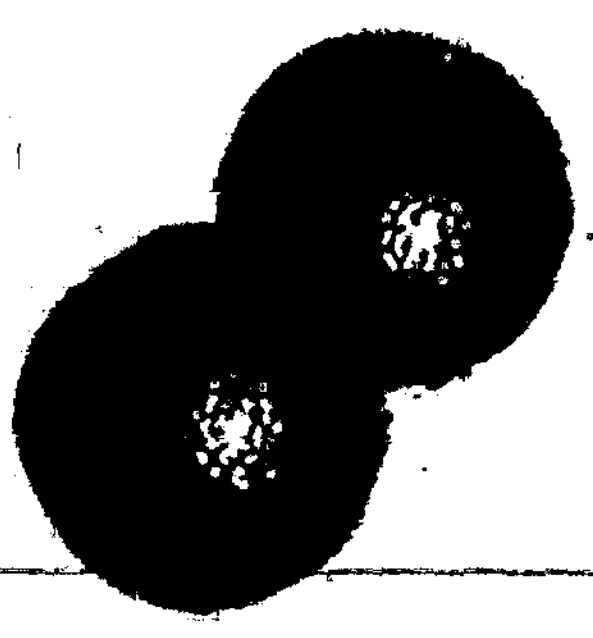

"A page for independent thought"

## He Ain't That Pretty

The Lincoln County News is completely enthusiastic about the State of New Mexico having a Department of Development, and though not especially enthusiastic, we realize that the State must have a governor under present laws.

From all of our reading and years of experience in advertising... the most recent release from the Department of Development, which uses the governor's activities as subject matter, violates and ignores most of the rules on how to influence people and/or further the development of New Mexico.

David Ogilvy in "Confessions of an advertising man" has this jingle:

"When the client moans and sighs, Make his logo twice the size. It he still should prove refractory, Show a picture of the factory. Only in the gravest cases Should you show the clients' faces."

Further advice from Ogilvy, "Don't show enlarged close-ups of the human face; they seem to repel readers."

This new Dept. of Devp. booklet, "1963 Year of Action", has an even dozen pictures of Gov. Jack M. Campbell, several of them enlarged.

Further ignorance of simplest advertising rules is demonstrated in use of lengthy paragraphs. Short words, short sentences, short paragraphs are a basic first in writing advertising copy. Lack of color is another mis.

Without a doubt the gravest mistake in preparation of this copy was selection of the subject matter. New Mexico abounds in "copy" that will interest a great majority of people in all of the 50 states and most foreign countries.

Such as, "Success starts with planning", "Care and protection of water", "For the mentally ill", "State support strengthened" — these subjects do absolutely nothing to help bring people with money to our state.

There are people with advertising knowhow in the State of New Mexico, apparently none in the Department of Development. There are people and places in the state of New Mexico whose pictures would prove of great interest to strangers in foreign places — "the governor ain't that pretty".

## Will Of The People

Carrizozo, county seat of Lincoln County in the Land of Enchantment, looks now, and has looked for the past 50 years pretty much like the people of Carrizozo want it to look. The only future changes that will be brought will be those desired by most of the people, now residents of Carrizozo.

In the year 1963 it was not too hard for Carrizozo people to make up their mind about several things. All they had to do was vote, after some counseling and discussing — on new paving which is now being enjoyed by all residents — on a new school

which is now going up, on a new courthouse which is coming along.

Future improvements will come as Carrizozo people decide it's time... let's do it. The editor can write yards of copy, none of which will do much good if people don't favor action. The Chamber of Commerce can campaign with all its might, but no results unless their campaign is favored by most people of the town.

At present the Town Council and a number of property owners are stewing about old buildings falling on neighbor's property, being fire traps, and general hazards. Many of these buildings are old enough to have become landmarks in their neighborhood, and in spite of a fallen in roof and trashy appearance, they are not looked on with special distavor. Fact is, people have passed them so long they don't even notice the junk heap next door.

This old and hazardous building situation is a real problem. Some of the traps should be removed, and when people of Carrizozo get ready they probably will be removed.

If the waste basket has not been rewarded, I would be glad to come pick them up and take them off your hands.

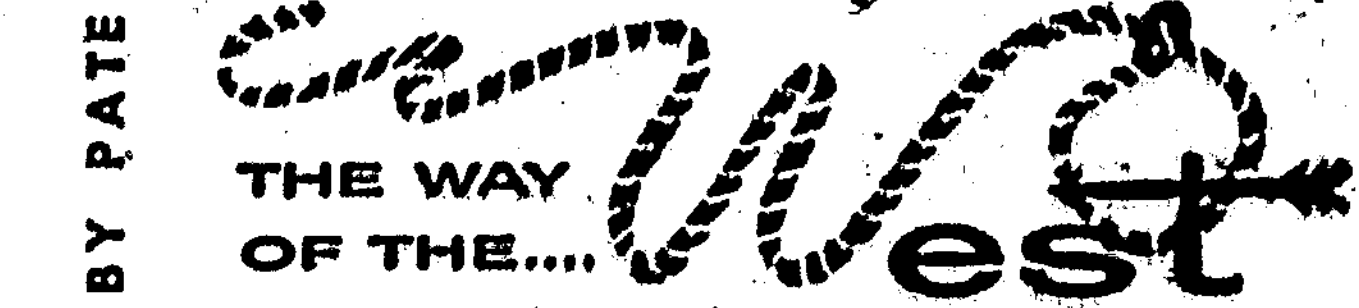

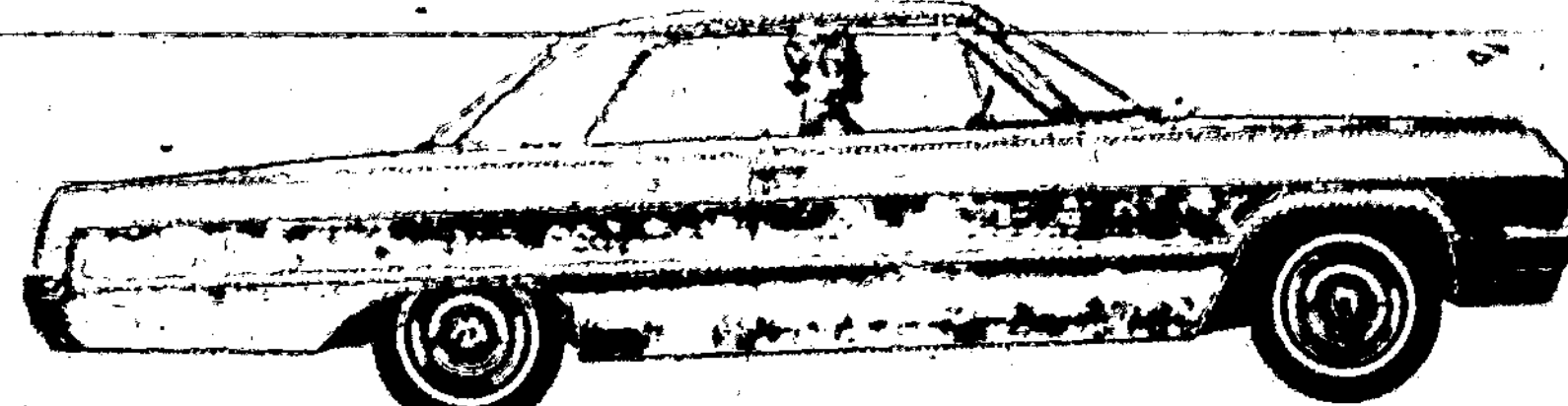

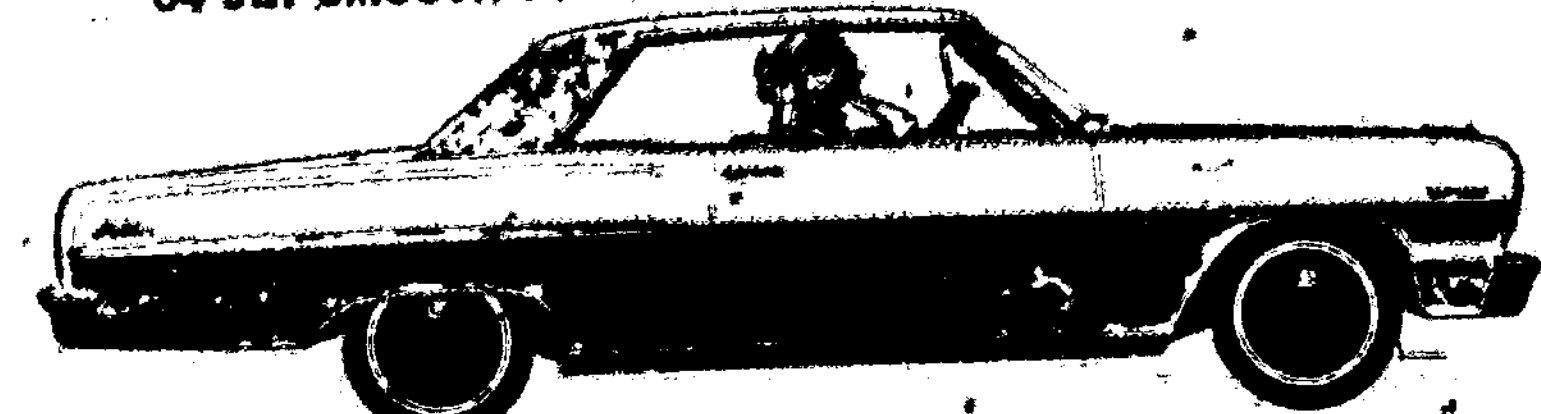
John Poe Dies Suddenly
