The Carrizozo telephone system will be converted to dial operation, June 21, Raymond Gabehart, local manager for Mountain States Telephone announced today,

Construction of a new telephone building should start about the middle of February and installation of the intricate dial equipment should begin the latter part of April. Gabehart said that the conversion of the telephone system from manual to dial will cost approximately one quarter of a million dollars. The new building to be constructed will be located on E. Avenue, one half block north of the present telephone office. It will be of concrete block fronting 46 feet on E Street and extending 36 feet back.

Gabehart stated that beginning March 16 all telephones in the area will be equipped with dials by a crew of telephone men brought in for this purpose. He said that they must visit each home and business to install the dials on those telephones without them, and to check the operation of those able starting date early this telephones which currently have week with completion around dials but which are not useable. At the same time, the wires leading from the telephone poles into the homes will be examined and frayed ones replaced. Other telephone equipment in or near the premises will be checked at the same time.

Gabehart said that all telephones in the community will be assigned new numbers consisting of seven digits. The first 3 of which will be 648. Concurrent with the conversion to dial will be the inauguration of direct distance dialing (DDD) and will make it possible for telephone users in the area to dial their own long distance calls anywhere in the nation as quickly and easily as dialing a neighbor across the street.

As the date for conversion draws closer, each telephone subscriber will be contacted individually and given instructions on the operation of the new system. Most of these contacts will be by telephone and some may be in person, Gabehart concluded.

# Town Council talks to FAA official, airport possibilities better after tour

Lewis Million of the Federal Aviation Agency met with the Carrizozo Town Council Tuesday and told them that funds under the Federal Airport Act are available for New Mexico airports, but such funds might not remain available long.

In years past the FAA has turned back funds allotted to New Mexico which were then used in other states. This year several projects are developing which will probably use up all of New Mexico's allotment.

The FAA will definitely terminate its lease on the ground now used for the Corona emergency landing field on June 30. The equipment there is satisfactory

in every way for use in Carrizozo under a Maximum Secondary Classification, Such an airport would be as large as Carrizozo should need for several 'years to come.

Mr. Million and council members toured several possible sites and this situation looked much better after the tour was complete.

The Maximum Secondary Classification includes a runway about 4,000 feet long, with quartering runway possibly shorter. Clearance at sach end of the runway is necessary back about 1,000 feet on each end. The maximum width needed is 1200feet for the major runway.

# 1963 SALES VS. ASSESSED AMOUNT ON REAL ESTATE Compiled by Dan D. Swearingin in Ruldoso Area

The following pertinent facts are respectfully called to the attention of the County Commissioners and County Assessor:

### Procedure

I have tabulated 344 actual sales of real estate in the area, of these 253 cases were found on the assessment rolls of the County. Personal property has been excluded, where found in the sale or assessment. The assessment was divided by the sales S. M. Ortiz, Bernie Laabs, and J. F. A. Highest assessment was a vacant lot that cold for \$199.50 and assessed at \$165.00. In the Village of Ruldoso, the actual tax paid under 1963 tax rate -59.698 - would be \$9.85.

B. Lowest over-all assessment was 20 acres of raw land that sold for \$20,000 and was accessed at \$33.00. The tax rate in 3-Out for 1963 is 27.459. The total tax for the year would be 9c. Inside the Village of Ruldoso, the tax would be 20c.

From all of our reading and years of experience in advertising . . . the most recent release from the Department of Development, which uses the governor's activities as subject matter, violates and ignores most of the rules on how to influence people and/or further the development of New Mexico, This release is a 46-page 814x11 size booklet.

David Ogilvy in "Confessions of an advertising man" has this jingle.

"When the client moans and sighs.

Make his logo twice the BIZE.

It he still should prove refractory, Show a picture of the fac-

Only in the gravest cases Should you show the clients' faces.

Further advice from Ogilvy, 'Don't show enlarged close-ups of the human face; they seem to repel readers".

This new Dept, of Devp. booklet, "1963 Year of Action", has an even dozen pictures of Gov. Jack M. Campbell, several of them enlarged.

 Further ignorance of simplest. advertising rules is demonstrated in use of lengthy paragrups. Short words, short sentences, short paragraphs are a basic first in writing advertising copy. Lack of color is another miss.

Without a doubt the gravest mistake in preparation of this copy was selection of the subject matter. New Mexico abounds in "copy" that will interest a great majority of people in all of the 50 states and most foreign countries.

Such as, "Success starts with planning", "Care and protection of water", "For the mentally ill", "State support strengthened" — these subjects do abcolutely nothing to help bring people with money to our state.

There are people with advertising knowhow in the State of New Mexico, apparently none in the Department of Development, There are people and places in the state of New Mexico whose pictures would prove of great interest to strangers in foreign places — "the governor ain't that pretty".

# Will Of The People

Carrizozo, county seat of Lincoin County.in the Land of Enchantment, looks now, and has looked for the past 50 years pretty much like the people of Carrizozo want it to look. The only future changes that will be brought will be those desired by most of the people, now residents of Carrizoso.

In the year 1963 it was not too hard for Carrizoso people to make up their mind about several things. All they had to do was vote, after some cussing and discussing—on new paying which is now being enjoyed by all residents—on a new school

Future improvements will come as Carrizozo people decide it's time . . . let's do it. The editor can write yards of copy, hone of which will do much\_ good if people don't favor action. The Chamber of Commerce can campaign with all its might, but no results unless their campaign is favored by most people of the town.

At present the Town Council and a number of property owners are stewing about old buildings falling on neighbor's property, being fire traps, and general hazards. Many of these buildings are old enough to have become landmarks in their neighborhood, and in spite of a fallen in roof and trashy appearance, they are not looked on with special disfavor. 


