GOVERNOR CAN'T UNDERSTAND HOW COUNTY CAN VOTE REPUBLICAN

200 county Demos attend campaign dinner

The Lincoln County Democratic campaign banquet held in the Capitol Monday night was counted a success in every way by co-chairmen Hollis Cummins and Welcom Armstrong. Attendance was estimated at over 200 persons.

County chairman Ken Fuller gave the welcome and introduced Lloyd Davis, Jr. of Ruidoso as master of ceremonies. The pledge of allegiance was led by Frankie Silva.

Introduction of distinguished guests by chairman Fuller were as follows: E. S. Walker, candidate for congress; Judge George Zimmerman, candidate for judge, third judicial district; Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd Davis, Jr.; Fern Duha, county vice chairman; Gov. Jack Campbell; Mrs. Ken Fuller; Phoebe Mae Taylor, candidate for county treasurer; R. C. Nunez, candidate for county commissioner, and Mrs. Nunez; Rev. William Brown; Corporation Commissioner, G. Lumbus Ferguson, candidate for Y. Falls, candidate for corporation commissioner; George Dannenbaum, candidate for land commissioner; Dick Stanley, candidate for district judge.

Chairman Fuller was reminiscient about the "Rhythm Rascals" of Corona, a musical group active when Fuller was in high school. The six musicians were playing for a Halloween dance, all costumed as ladies, one with blond wig. It was Fuller's job to hold the bass drum in place, he got tired and had a young teacher to take his place. The prankish drummer lit the blond wig and Fuller remembers the teacher snatching the hot wig off — George Dannenbaum now of Grants, was the teacher.

Gov. Campbell started his remarks by saying that in the next few days "Mac and I" will announce we are available for re-election and added that his address would be impromptu.

"I have never understood why Lincoln and Chaves counties, with three-fourths of voters registered Democrats, always vote Republican. It's a mystery to me. Your Republican senator and representatives have been real critical of my budget. Your senator is the loudest, thought a good personal friend.

The Governor continued, "I have great appreciation for your county chairman, Ken is a very unassuming guy. He contacts me when he needs to, and tells me what he thinks needs to be done, also what should be done. Two counties have Republican reputations, Lincoln and Mora. Mora County has more people on welfare and is the most distressed in the state. I don't want to see Lincoln get in that shape. Are you going to develop down here or be known as another Republican County.

My thanks to the ladies of the PTA for the fine dinner. If my budget request for \$265 for average weighted membership is cut it's going to mean Capitol school will use all of its surplus and end up \$37,000 in the red at end of next school year. (The Governor got his figures crossed at this point. If the \$265 figure were cut to \$262 weighted it would mean a loss of \$1,800 to Carrizozo, and about the same to Capitan.) You PTA members should let your senator and representative know what your school needs.

A few days ago I received a letter from special interest groups, after presenting my

budget. They took my budget apart. These special interest groups include: Farm Bureau, bankers, cattle growers, oil and gas, wool growers, cotton ginners, automotive, tax payers, petroleum industry, food industry, dairy industry.

LATE BULLETIN

Harry Wugalter, public school finance officer, called Supt. J. T. Clegg in Carrizozo late Tuesday with the information that the \$265 for average weighted membership came out of the appropriation committee with 14-13 vote in favor. Lincoln County Representative W. G. Shreevogost voted "for" the \$265.

They say I'm not being nearly conservative enough. Should have \$7 1/2 million surplus. Should cut costs with no regard to need or priorities.

My budget was set after lengthy hearings. It's not perfect, but the special interest group approach is not the way to determine what New Mexico needs.

The question is — how are we going to decide on future development. The difference in approach to this budget problem is a complete difference in philosophy. New Mexico is finally beginning to catch up, after a long period of being stagnant. My position is this — if we maintain this growth, we must invest in the future. If our state stagnates again we will not have enough money to pull it out.

They didn't raise taxes the way I thought they should. If we fall back again we will have

to raise taxes again. We must invest in education and tourism, primarily.

Please note, farm, livestock, and wool industries make this county. Two of these groups met with me about the Fort Stanton range experiment station. 25,000 acres of land have not been used. This presents a great opportunity, which would cost \$70,000 to \$100,000. I agreed with these groups and put the money in my budget. I am wondering if these groups feel it a unwise investment.

The country is at a peak of prosperity and by reason of the pending tax cut people are not qualified for jobs that are available. We've got to adjust our thinking to the changes.

New Mexico has the most favorable tax climate if any state in the southwest. We have the greatest accumulation of brain-power. The key — how well we develop our program of education, particularly vocational.

I don't believe government dollars are the answer to development. The attitude of the people will provide a climate where private capital will move in.

My plans for Fort Stanton — to use the facilities to their maximum. If legislature approves severance bonds, will ask doctors about use of facilities. See what is best. Have requested a forest camp for 50-60 boys, think it will be approved.

Hinges On Budget

Gov. Jack Campbell made it clear, in talk after his speech in Capitan, that chances for a range experiment station at Ft. Stanton were slim if his budget was not accepted.

Fiscal Facts

Personal income all that's left

There has been a barrage of tax increases in recent years.

The sales tax was jumped 50 per cent last year for \$21 million a year new money.

The income tax was increased 70 per cent three years ago for some \$7 million new money.

The cigaret tax was increased 60 per cent for \$3 million new money.

Property taxes have gone up 36 per cent in the past ten years.

The people in and outside the Legislature who are trying to reduce the Campbell spending proposal think that the 30-odd million a year of new money recently provided should be enough to meet the quality standards desired by the governor without going into another round of tax increases.

They contend that salaries and other spending items proposed in the Campbell budget cannot be reduced in the future for adjustment to short money conditions.

If there must be more money from taxes the income tax is about the only source for any sizeable sum.

Request to remove hazard poses problem

The Carrizozo Town Council at their regular meeting last Tuesday heard a request that the building now labeled "Plaza Hotel" be torn down because it constitutes a fire hazard to adjacent buildings.

The Plaza has not been occupied for some time, present owners plan no repairs or maintenance. One of the older buildings in town, it is of no obvious value to anyone.

The Council discussed several angles of his request but took no action at their meeting.

According to R. E. Lemon this was originally built by some people name Burrell who had a little ranch up in the mountains and moved down to Carrizozo. It was known as the Burrell House, meals were served and overnight accommodations available. Must have been built around 1907.

Later it was known as the Adams House, then serving as a hotel. Mike Dorring owned the property at one time. The present owner is Juan Zabara of Roswell.

Chapter 6, "Condemnation of buildings" in the Municipal Code of Carrizozo, clearly states that

the Board of Trustees shall have the power, expressed by Resolution duly adopted, to require the removal from the Corporate Limits of any building or structure so ruined, damaged or dilapidated as to be a menace to the public comfort, health, peace or safety.

Chapter 6 further states that should such owner fail to act after due notice, the municipality shall have the power to remove such building or structure at the cost and expense of the owner, and the reasonable cost of such removal shall constitute a lien against such property so removed, and said lien shall be foreclosed in the manner prescribed by State Law.

The Council understands that there are more than just this property to consider, further that the Town likely would have a foreclosure, meaning that the town would, in the end, own the property and have to bear the cost of tearing down this building and others that it might condemn.

Quite a few buildings in the town condition as the Plaza, can be removed by town employees at nominal cost. Some would be more expensive.

Missing youths Mrs. W. F. Ball found unharmed recovering fine

Five youth who were lost almost 24 hours in a dark cave, were rescued by the Lincoln County sheriff's department Monday afternoon.

Sheriff Bradley and deputy Leandri Vega led the three boys and two girls out of the cave near Fort Stanton, unharmed.

The group included Kathy Bradshaw, Vickie Perdue, both 16, Glenn Derrick and Bruce Rousseau, both 17, and Tim Ley, a visitor from Lakewood, Colo.

The youth were out for a Sunday ride when they decided to explore the cave. Once inside they lost their only light and decided to stay put for fear of becoming "lost" deeper in the dark passage. They told rescuers they sang and stamped their feet during the night.

Rousseau and Ley decided Monday morning that they could find their way out. They did and went for help at Fort Stanton.

Convention nominees virtually sure of taking office come January '65

PPAYROLLERS CONVENTION SANTA FE — Thirty two county chairmen and several hundred public employees will dominate the Democratic state convention here this week with power to speak for a million New Mexicans.

Several Democratic candidates for state office were named at the convention coming out of the party convention will be virtually assured of taking office next year.

BESTOW OFFICES ON FAVORITES The chairman and the job holders at the eve of the convention were prepared to bestow another term on Gov. Jack Campbell, Lt. Gov. Mack Eastley, State Secretary Albert Miller, Treasurer Joe Grant, U. S. Rep.

Tom Morris and to give the party senatorial nomination to U. S. Rep. Joe Montoya without being tested in a popular primary.

Only one real scrap has developed for the 13 nominations that will be considered by the convention, that for the No. 2 congressional seat that Joe Montoya is leaving.

SOME REGREY 1943 VOTE

Several Demo legislators who voted last year to repeal the direct primary and go back to the nomination system to assure the Senate nomination for Montoya, have been talking that they regret their action.

All law enforcement officers from Carrizozo and surrounding areas are being invited by Sheriff Bradley to attend this school.

Three Carrizozo high school seniors have earned awards for outstanding achievements in home economics this school year.

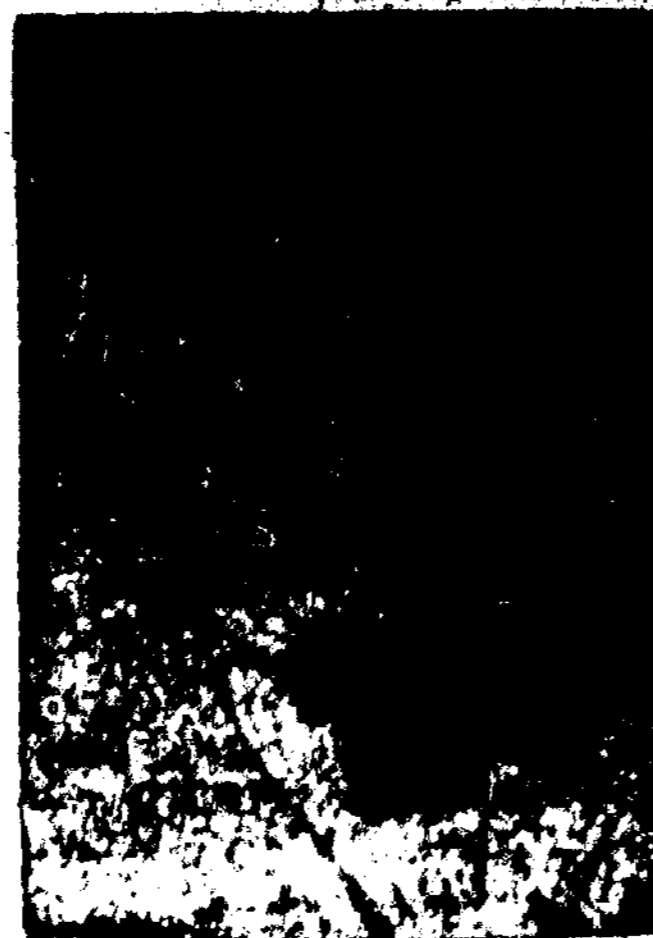

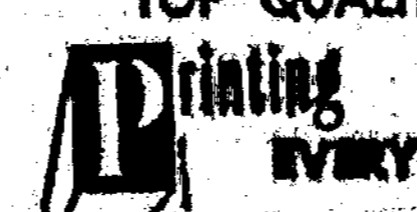
THREE FROM CARRIZOZO ON ACHIEVEMENT ROSTER

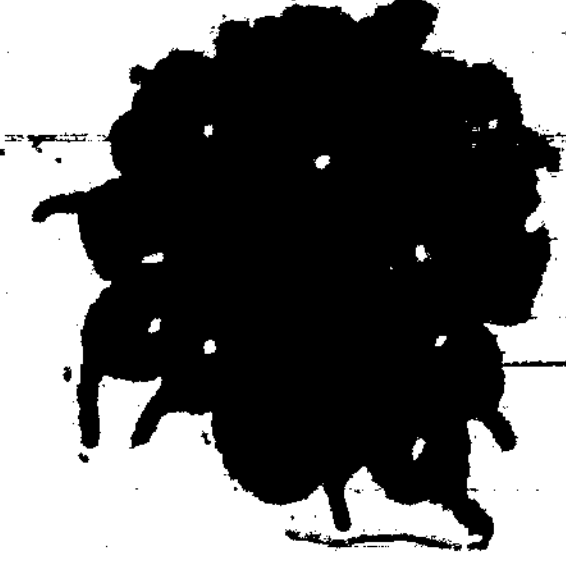

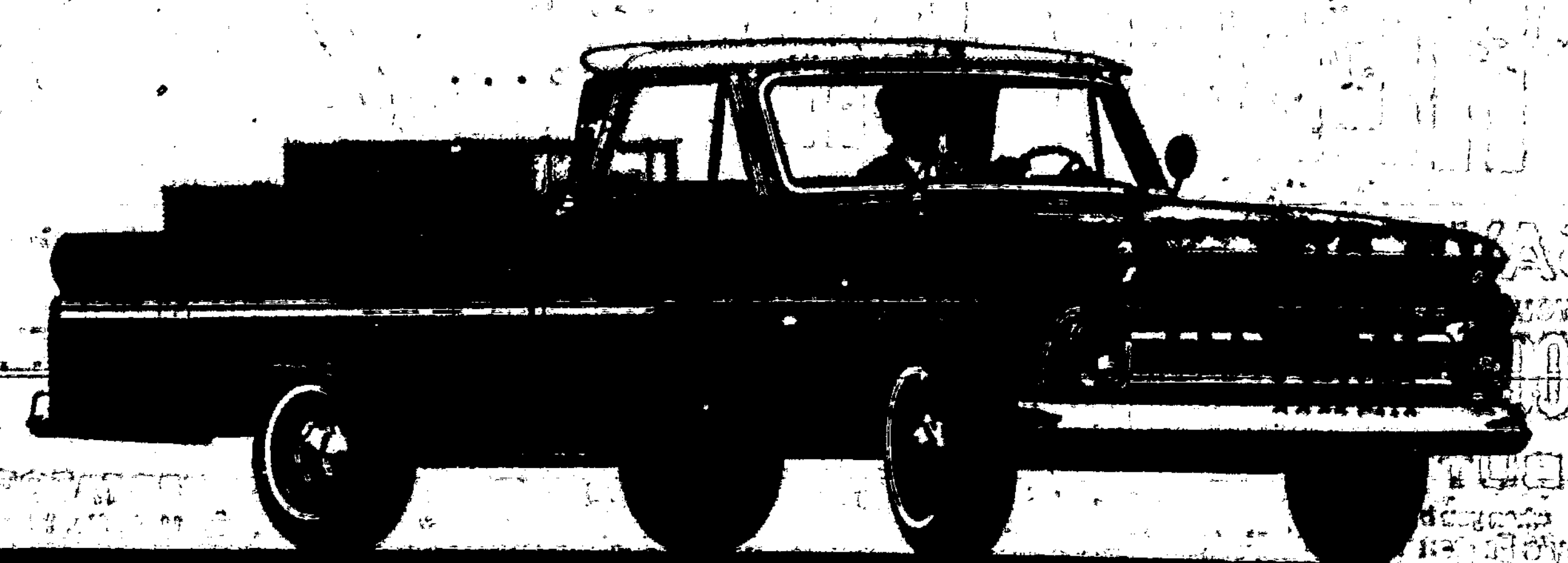
