The local Rotary and Lions Club are sponsoring the boys, all members of the junior class. Selection was based on scholastic average, 2.5 or higher.



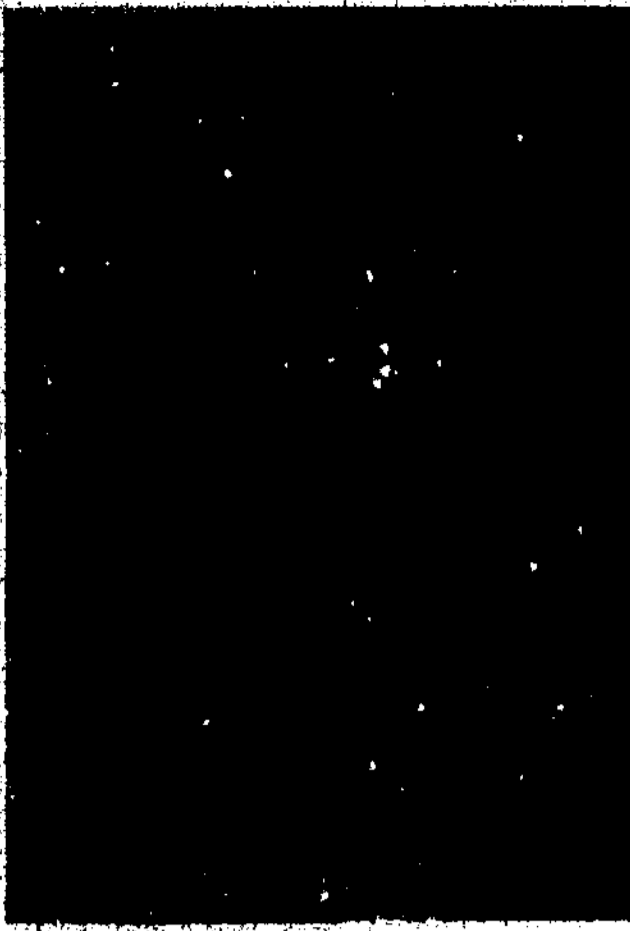

Principals V. J. Marx and John McCollaun accompanied the group.



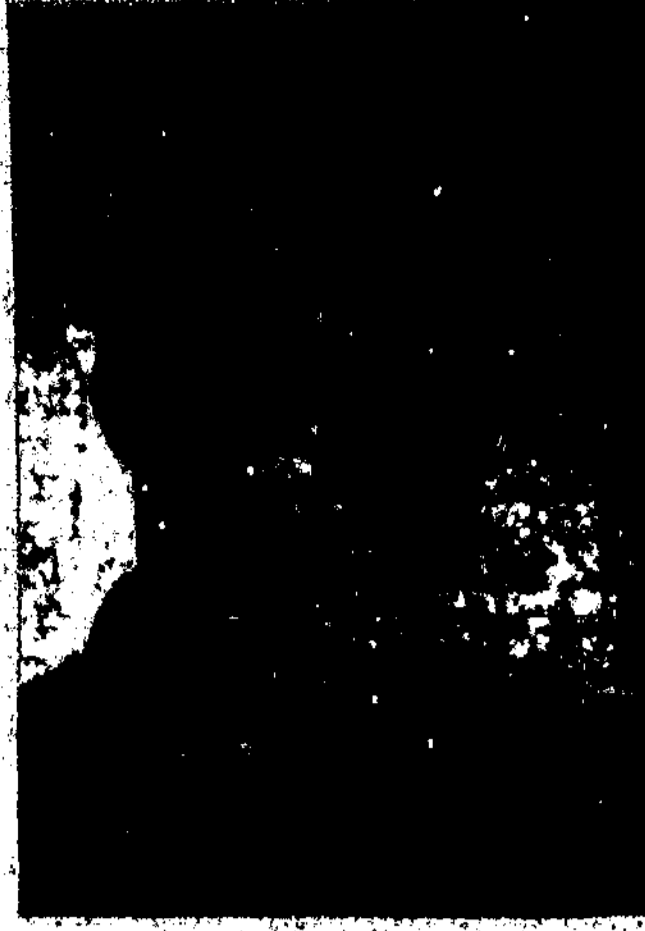

Record turnout at polls in Lincoln Co. towns

Weather was beautiful Tuesday, some hot contests in several towns which brought out a good vote all around Lincoln County and a record turnout in Ruidoso and Carrigoso.

Chevo Baca topped the three trustee candidate in Carrigoso with 290 votes, T. B. Smoot received 202 and these two will go on the council in May. Jeta Voss received 168 votes for councilman, Vernon Petty, the lone candidate for mayor, received 322 votes.

Friday Sherrill won the police magistrate race with 169 votes over Tony Beltran with 119 and Ellis French with 78. A total of 393 votes were cast in Carrigoso which is counted as a record ballot.

Sherry Stoneman wins Ruidoso had a record turnout in a hot mayor race, 503 votes cast. Sherry Stoneman won the race with 268 votes over Lloyd Davis, Jr. with 210.

Guy Robertson scored the highest in the trustee race with 255 votes, Dale Dodds followed close with 240, Buz Whitlock 251, and Charles Rumbaugh 183.

For Municipal Judge Harold Graham received 248 votes to 124 for Doc Savage.

The water bond issue at Ruidoso carried, 198 for, 104 against.

E. E. Miller is mayor At Ruidoso Downs E. E. Miller tallied 120 votes for mayor over W. S. Bunt with 62 and D. D. Jennings with 15.

There were four trustee candidates for 4-year term, Lucas Gallegos received 115 votes, Zeke Scott 108, Rufus Sanchez 82 and J. A. Crockett 73. H. N. Shira won the race for two year term with 113 votes over Bill Leftwich with 67.

Alton Gray received 120 votes for municipal judge, his opponent 34.

Yandell and Simmons win At Corona a total of 117 votes were cast, considered a good vote. Bill Kessler, only mayor candidate, received 62 votes.

In the runoff for councilmen, for four year terms, Ernest Yandell, incumbent, topped the voting with 63, followed by O. S. Simmons with 65, John E. Tracey received 44 votes, Myron (Cotton) Yancey 33.

Johnnie Annaratone wins At Capitan the race was for councilmen for two year term. Johnnie Annaratone came out three votes ahead with 39 over Bert Cheney with 36.

Gerald Dean, Sr. only mayor candidate received 75 votes, J. P. Randle 63 and Fred Pfingsten 69 for four year terms as councilmen. K. A. Huey, police magistrate candidate received 67 votes, 85 votes were cast.

Shop burns at Hondo school

HONDO — Fire of undetermined origin Monday afternoon destroyed the shop building at Hondo High School with the loss estimated at \$6,500.

Fernin Montes, superintendent, said that there was little hope of saving the building after it caught fire because of high winds. The Xenix and Ruidoso fire department were called, but the Ruidoso firemen were turned back when it became obvious that the old barracks building could not be saved, Montes said.

Welding and woodworking equipment were destroyed in the blaze that burned out of control for two hours. It started at 3:00 p.m.

"I don't know what we will do for the rest of the year," Montes said. He said that the building probably will be rebuilt for the fall school term, this time out of cement blocks.

In 1942 he entered military service and served overseas in North Africa with the 12th Theological Center. He participated in campaigns in French Morocco, Algeria, Tunisia, Sicily, Naples, France, Holland, and Rome-Area.

Form Bureau district meeting is April 15

Presenting the program will be Mrs. Theima Inman and Bill Dingwiddie. Mrs. Walt Wilson, women's committee chairman for Lincoln County Farm and Livestock Bureau announced today.

(NOTE — The Lincoln County News editor was invited by letter to attend the meeting of the State TB Hospital at Fort Stanton April 3-4. Having an interest in this Lincoln County institution, we accepted. The meeting started at 3:00 p.m. Friday and lasted (with night recess) until 1:30 p.m. Saturday. Fourteen pages of notes were taken, the following is a summary of the meeting. Edna Steinman of the Albuquerque Journal was the other newspaper person present.)

The meeting was opened by Dr. Eugene Mann, Portales, and some preliminary business dispatched including a statement by Dr. Mann that he had been careful to notify the press of the area of the meeting.

Three letters written, signed by two employees of the TB Hospital, Mr. and Mrs. Doane Nelson, had been sent to the Albuquerque Journal. The letters were severely critical of the hospital operation. Miss Edna Steinman was sent to the hospital to interview Mr. and Mrs. Nelson and made a check of her own. She found only minor items that could be considered bad. This was shortly before the scheduled board meeting and Miss Steinman was invited to present her findings, together with the letters to the board.

The content of the letters made charges of excessive drinking in the hospital, bootlegging, poor sanitation, love affairs on part of patients, all-night gambling, five people do the work of one, lack of car check on part of security guard at gate, sick patients neglected, inhuman restraint of patients, in general that everything at the hospital was wrong.

The Nelsons have been at the hospital about five months, coming to New Mexico from Minnesota where they had worked, short of a year, at Nopeming TB Hospital. Three days before the board meeting a note had been left in the pickup driven by Mrs. Nelson which stated, "Nelsons: Forget what you know and get out. Something bad might happen to you if you don't." That evening while Mr. Nelson was at the hospital, Mrs. Nelson heard a noise in the back part of her house, went to see, a man was there, he allegedly struck her, then fled. Later investigation by State Policeman Darrel Austin of Capitan and Wood of Pecosho found evidence that door had been forced open, no skin breaks on Mrs. Nelson where she might have been hit, no fingerprints or footprints. Mr. Nelson said she knew who hit her. On questioning she did not know. The case is still open.

Policeman Darrel Austin, Dr. H. C. Jernigan, medical director, and Supt. George W. Bryan all three stated that neither Mr. or Mrs. Nelson had ever registered a complaint of any kind with them.

After talking to members of the hospital staff, the TB Board interviewed Mr. and Mrs. Nelson, Nelson, a hospital aide, stated he had found a patient with liquor, reported to registered nurse Mrs. Dorothy McCorkle, no effort was made to find out where the liquor came from. Earlier statements from Mrs. McCorkle made plain that she did not like Nelson, did not trust him. He was later transferred from her ward.

Nelson stated that an Indian in Ward 4X had not drawn a sober breath since he, Nelson,

had been there. Patients come in from furloughs so drunk they can't stand up. Have seen neck of whiskey bottle in janitor supplies, but never saw him give liquor to patient. Nelson stated the bootleg price of liquor was \$5.00 a half pint.

Liquor has been a serious problem at the Fort. In later testimony from the staff, the moves being made to combat use of liquor inside the hospital were outlined. Hospital Superintendent George Bryan stated he had the choice of hiring a private detective agency or doing their own control work. He chose to have the hospital do its own policing. A security patrol had been organized, there had been four personnel changes in the last eight months in this area, that where there had been one night marshal, now there were four in the security department.

State Policeman Darrel Austin stated that security at the hospital was the best now it had ever been. Both the state police and sheriff department were frequently called, and got the best of cooperation.

Visitors bringing in liquor is one of the problems. Stopping every car and making a check for liquor was discussed. This is a serious problem, according to Policeman Austin. He did not advise the hospital staff to start such a practice.

Patients getting drunk on furlough is practically beyond the control of the staff. Alcoholics with TB are accepted as patients.

The "Whiskey Trail" is well known to a great many Capitan residents. When the Fort Stanton Hospital housed Merchant Marine patients they would walk to town about 3 1/2 miles across country, and not always make it back down the trail, according to several stories of those times. The trail now has been moved slightly, blacktopped and is known as Highway 300.

Nelson stated, in the interview, that a poker game was going on in Ward 4X at 7:00 a.m., apparently an all-night game. There were 10 to 12 in the game (7 makes a full table). Hospital staff members expressed the opinion that gambling had been going on and would continue, their main effort was to stop money from being used openly, beyond that they could not do much. The patients would use tabs, matches or some other form of payoff. Mrs. Grace Schneider, head nurse, agreed with Dr. W. F. Roseblatt, she knew of no gambling or card playing after 11:00 p.m.

There was some talk of the female patients having boyfriends, nothing more serious than an embrace, which was not taken seriously. One female patient had been discharged before the Nelsons arrived, for more serious affairs.

The matter of sanitation policies, as expressed by the Nelsons, were seriously questioned by Dr. Louis Levin of Albuquerque, member of the board. The Nelsons obviously did not know what they were talking about on several counts. Mrs. Nelson stated she was scared of taking TB virus (the word is bacilli) home on her clothes, the hospital should have a clothes-change room. Dr. Levin told Mrs. Nelson such was impossible, she was a misplaced expert passing judgment on things she was not qualified on.

According to the Nelsons

there were no problems of any kind at Nopeming hospital in Minnesota. Cited at Ft. Stanton were two sick patients, both now deceased, who had not received proper care and one restrained in a harmful manner. Mrs. Schneider said that one of the patient's wives was with him most of the time, was aware of the reason for the restraint, and was exceptionally grateful to the hospital for the care extended to this patient.

One of the new security measures now in force is the assignment of custodians to definite sections of the hospital, which is expected to help trace down some of the liquor problems.

The starting wage at Fort Stanton is \$184 per month for most of the help. They serve one year on probation then are eligible to eight steps of \$12 increase, based on merit. The Nelsons stated that hospital help was running over each other, five doing the work of one. Such a statement would be hard to prove right or wrong at a hearing, except for the generally that everyone could work harder. The per-patient-cost at the hospital is much in line with other such institutions, one of the lowest, not the highest. A lot of this sort of figuring depends on the number of patients in a hospital.

The Nelsons gave their resignation to the Board. Chairman Mann told them it should be given to Supt. Bryan.

Comments of the board following the interview with the Nelsons are as follows, quoted almost word for word: Dr. Louis Levin — a lot is already being done. We can tighten up, and take a look where we've been.

Lawrence Goodell of Roswell — We have to trust someone, but you can't completely ignore the complaint of fairly intelligent people. I feel the administration should and will do what they can to correct any situation and report at the next meeting.

Supt. George Bryan — It's a constant program of improvement, speaking particularly of security, every day it gets a little better. Dan Nine is now acting as Sergeant of the security patrol, uniforms will be here soon.

Mrs. Lena Mae Pfeiffer of Tatum agreed that a report by the staff should be made at the next meeting.

Dr. Eugene Mann of Portales outlined seven points which should be covered: 1) Controls at the gate, 2) Strong policy on employees having liquor, 3) Patient orientation, 4) Employee work load, 5) Child ward care, 6) New employee orientation, 7) Sanitation policies. They were adopted by motion of the board of directors.

On January 7 Hilda Rovellin and Alida Nelson, both RN's, made the annual inspection and a license was approved and issued for 220 bed TB hospital without reservation.

Considerable important business was transacted at this meeting which will be detailed in the Lincoln County News next week.

State lawyer changes his mind about Palmer

SANTA FE — Oliver Payne, one of three statehouse lawyers who filed a case to keep Norman Palmer from running against Joe Montoya for the Demo nomination for U. S. senator, told reporters at the time Palmer first filed that he needed only a percentage of petition signers who voted for the Democratic candidate in the last senatorial election, a condition that would have saved Palmer through with plenty of signers to spare.

Atty. Gen. Earl Hartley said that Payne, who is regarded as the intellectual lawyer of the AG's staff, had spoken hastily without studying the law.

MANY OBJECTIONS TO PALMER RUN

Payne, Hartley and Asst. Gen. Norman Thayer, popped back with the contention that the Demo applicant needed a percentage of both Democrats and Republicans, also that he wasn't old enough to be senator and hadn't been a Democrat long enough to run, both latter allegations erroneous.

They also demanded that he pay the cost of trying to get supreme court permission to run and charged that petition signers hadn't been Democrats long enough to qualify as petitioners, that some signatures were not in ink, that signers did not write their precinct numbers after their names, and half

a dozen other allegations which pointed up the frightfulness of trying to run in the New Mexico primary without the approval of party leaders.

McKnight-Harris vows at Sacred Heart Church

USS SEMINOLE (FHTNC)

— David H. Green, seaman, US N, son of Mr. and Mrs. E. H. Green of Ruidoso is participating aboard the attack cargo ship USS Seminole in a coordinated U. S. — National Chinese amphibious exercise called "Operation Backpack" being conducted off the coast of Taiwan.

Backpack is an exercise to test the amphibious capabilities and readiness of the forces of the Seventh Fleet and the Nationalist Chinese Navy. The ex-

ercise, with over 40,000 men and units participating, will culminate in an amphibious assault on beaches of southern Taiwan and will demonstrate the effectiveness of the United States Seventh Fleet to rapidly move a significant combat force to a troubled area in order to assist an ally.

Prior to the assault, aircraft of the Seventh Fleet will soften beach defenses. In addition, support ships will conduct anti-

submarine warfare exercises and the area surrounding the beachhead will be cleared of any obstructions and mines.

"Backpack" is similar to those exercises conducted periodically by units of the Seventh Fleet with SEATO and other allied nations in the Far East to improve their proficiency in coordinated amphibious warfare operations and to maintain working relations with allied nations.

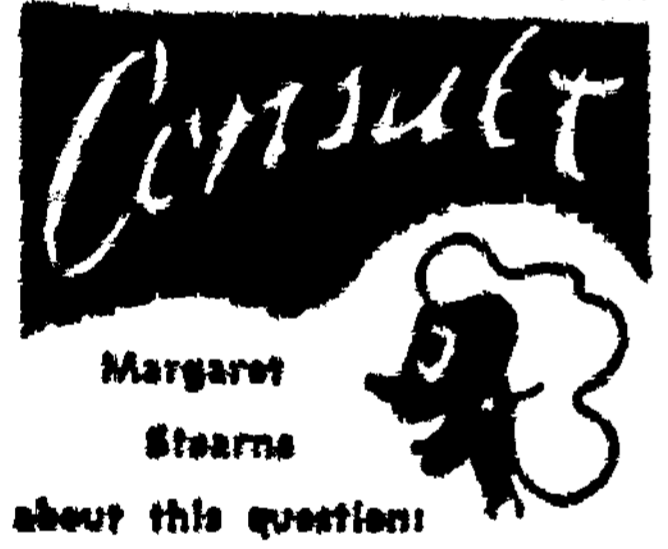

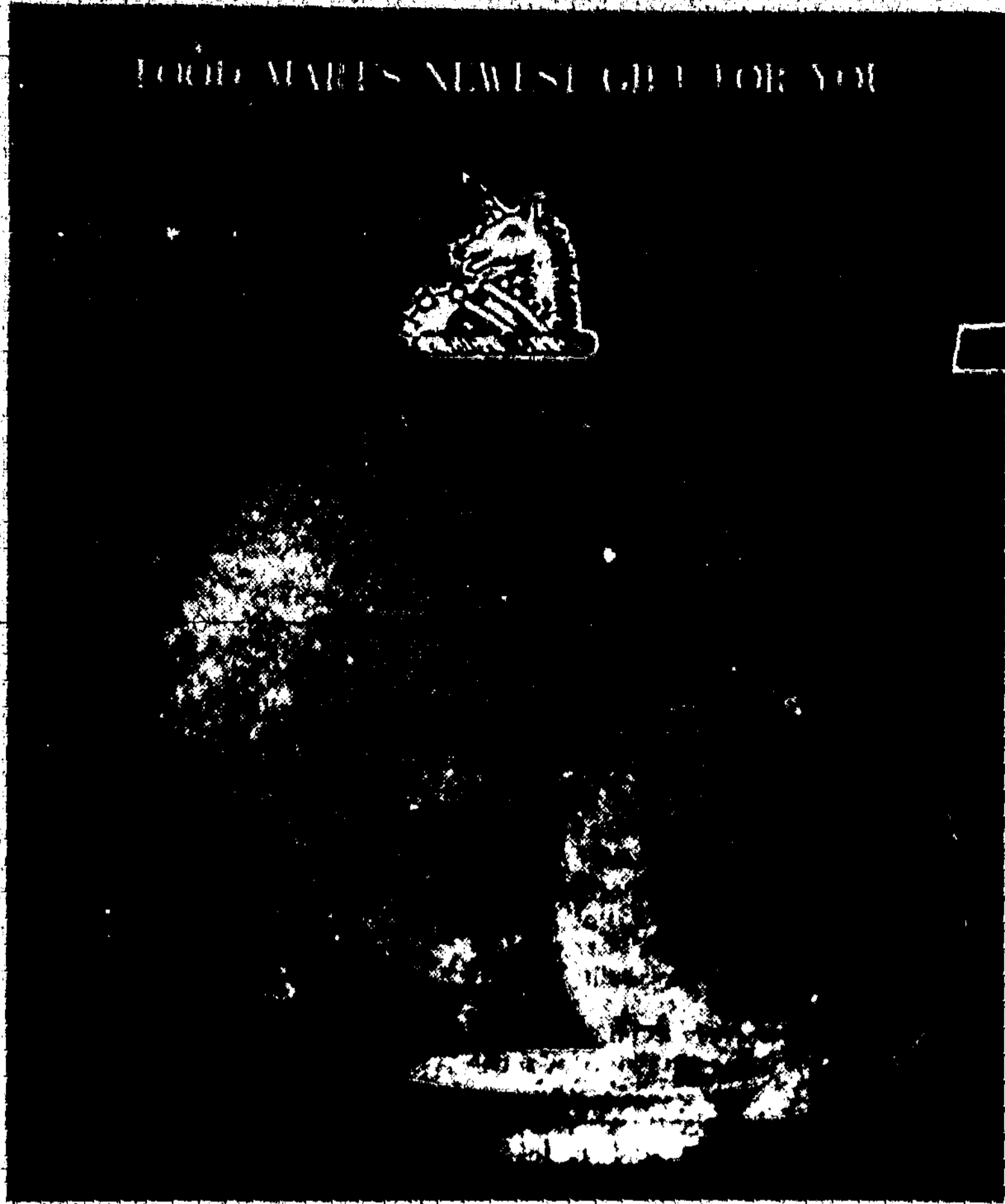

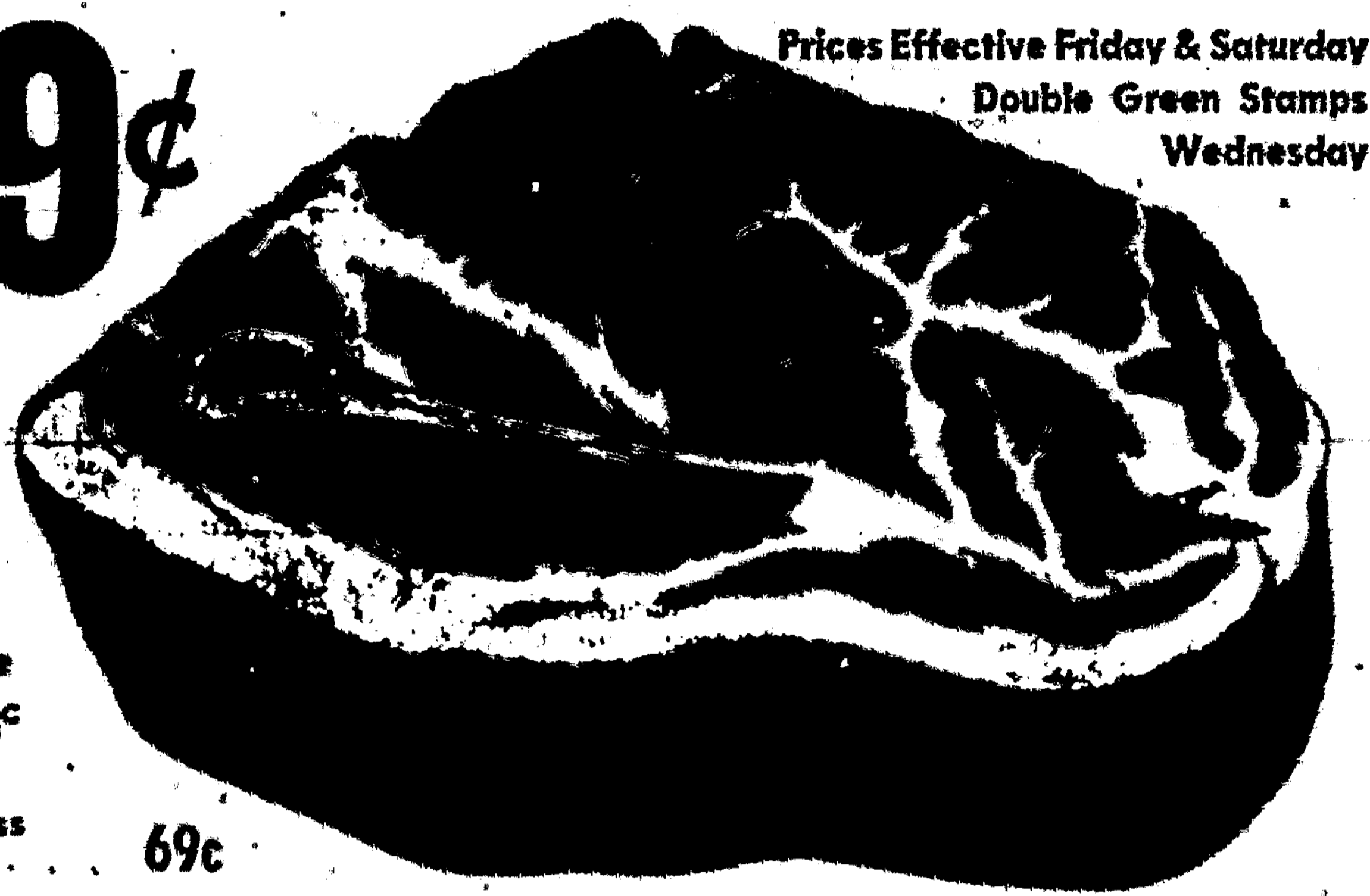

Mrs. Mary Johnson has been official census taker ever since she retired from her position as secretary to the superintendent. It is very important that we have a very accurate census report each year. We need an accurate accounting of all handicapped children the same as we do those who attend school regularly.

The census law calls for the listing of all children who will be five years of age by next January 1, 1965, as well as the children who will be six years of age by January 1.

All children and unmarried youth, whether they attend school or not should be counted on the census if they have not reached their 18th birthday prior to January 1, 1965.

Mrs. Johnson will take the census of all children attending school from school records. A census form will be sent home by the students for you to complete for the younger children in your home.

If you have no children in school and have a 5 or 6 year old youngster, please call Mrs. Johnson, phone 172-J, or call the superintendent's office, at 90, and give us the census information.

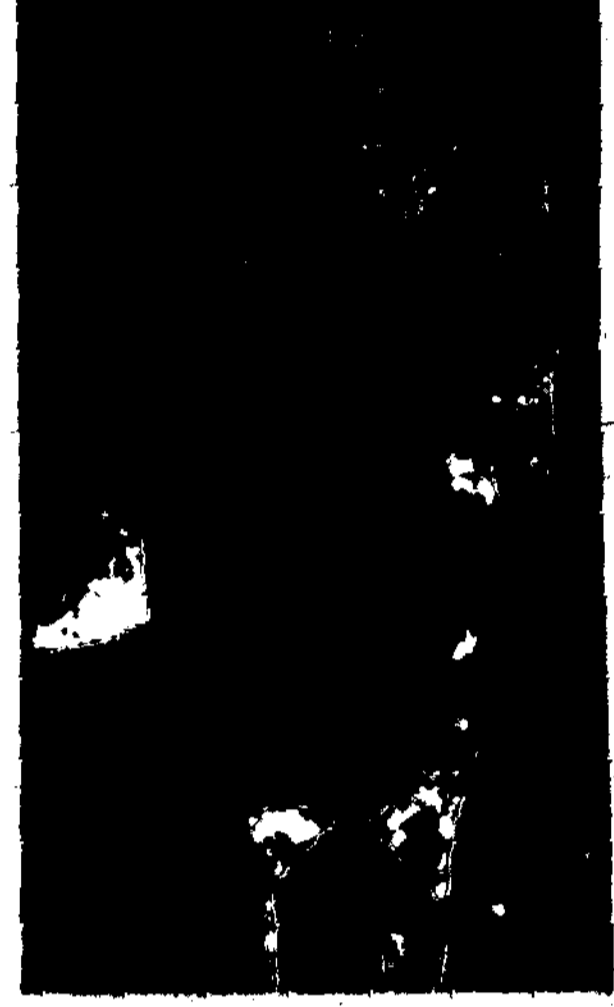
It is most essential that we complete this census by May 1. May we solicit cooperation in this matter. This information is very vital to the welfare of your school.

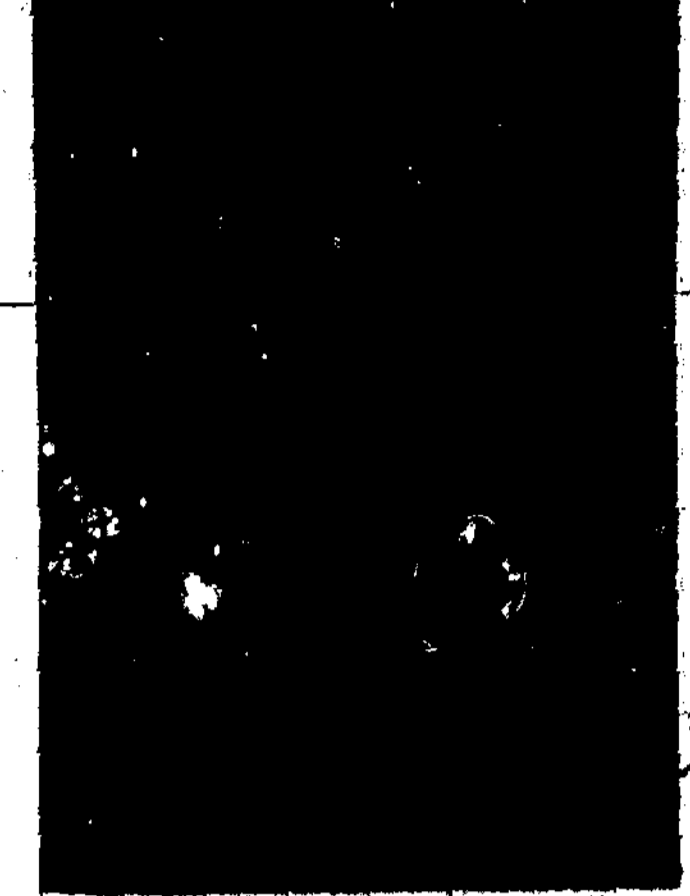

In 1962 Chairman Miera favored the same Martinez for district judge over a non-Spanish opponent, Dick Traub, and Martinez carried the county 1270 to 134.

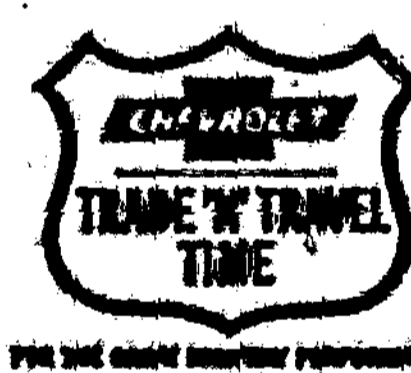

WOOL BUYERS LIKE A UNIFORM LOT

I went to Roswell last Friday to watch the wool sale. I saw some grease wool that sold at 3 to 4 cents per pound above last year, and some sold below last year. Generally prices are about the same as last year. While watching the sale I noted that the buyers like a uniform lot. In one lot of fine medium wool there were two coarse fleeces and one heavy greasy fleece in the four show bags. These fleeces very likely cost from 1 to 2 cents in the bid. Too much needle grass is objectionable in the wool. I also heard several buyers comments on the poorly tied fleeces.

NEW FRUIT SPRAY GUIDE AVAILABLE

The 1964 Apple and Pear Spray Guide for New Mexico is a 23-page bulletin containing information for the control of insects attacking pears and apples.

It contains sections on cultural practices and their effect on pest control, general suggestions and do's and don'ts in orchard spraying, dormant and delayed-dormant sprays, and petal-fall and summer cover sprays.

Insecticide recommendations appear in the tabular form as does rates of application and the correct time to apply the insecticide. A discussion of each of the major insect pests and plant diseases for apples and pears is also given.

New sections found in the guide this year include a table of waiting period for the various chemicals, a table of compatibility and safety information and an orchard spray record form.

The bulletin may be obtained at the County Extension Agent's office in the Courthouse in Carrizozo.

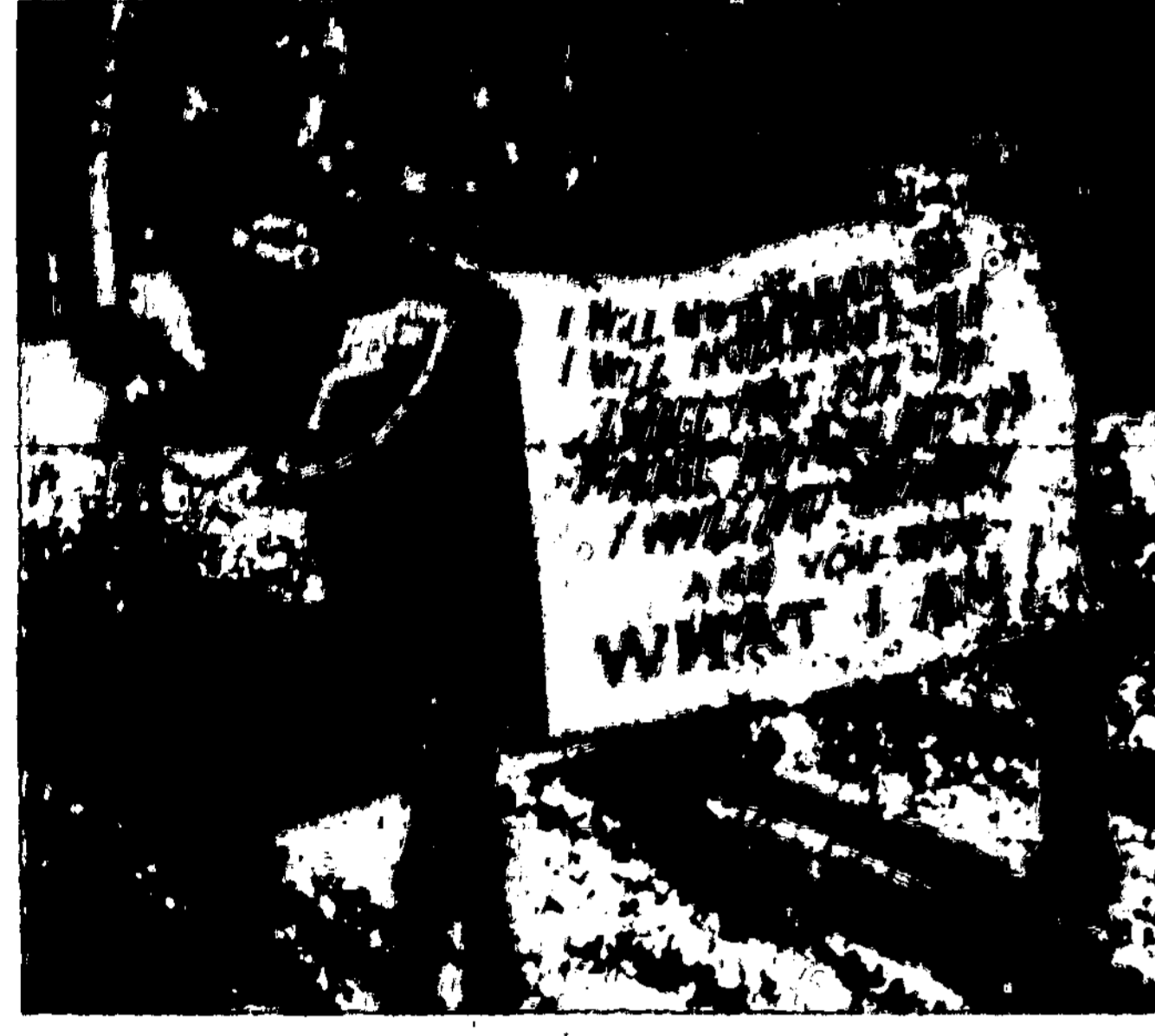

Garbage hauling poses problem

Carrizozo Town Council meeting Tuesday night faced several problems, a few put off for the new board, but action is necessary immediately on replacing the fire damaged garbage truck and the council instructed utility manager, Wayne Withers, to draw up specifications and a call for bids will be issued immediately.

A settlement was made with the insurance co. by Mayor Jete Voss, on authority of the council. The insurance company will take the damaged truck and pay the Town 45 per cent of its original cost, \$3,054.90, which check should arrive this week.

Minutes of several special meetings were read. On March 6 the council met to study availability of state and federal funds for an airport. Bob White, director of the state aviation agency, was present at the meeting and made the suggestion that the Town should try to attract a good airplane mechanic which would increase traffic at the airport.

The council decided to accept the Cedarvale surplus equipment and the motion for acceptance was made and accepted. The need for airport land was figured at 180 acres, now the property of Dr. J. P. Turner.

The lights on the old baseball diamond will be taken down. Roy Helms will do the work.

Bills were read, Carrizozo used 1,707,600 gallons of Bocoito water in February, costing \$241.52. In March 1,744,600 gallons was used, price to City of Alamogordo \$353.32. Bills were allowed. Occupation license discussed, some still considered out of line, all accepted but one linen supply company.

Question of whether a construction company doing work for any branch of government, such as school or county, should have to pay for a building permit was discussed. Some question remains. H. Elford Jones said that the intent of the ordinance was to charge the property owner for building permit, in these cases it would be the county or school district and such was not legal. Occupation license money will be paid on school and courthouse by contractor doing the job.

Applications for deputy town clerk were received from Erminia Narvaz, Eunice Cooper and Robert Luna. All good application, all put off for the new board. A well written application for job at swimming pool was received from Charles Schlarb. Pat Aguilar applied for job as manager or lifeguard at the pool. No action on these.
