## 12th annual Mexican Fiesta at Hondo Apr. 17-18

Students of the Hondo High School have been applauded by the hundreds of people who have seen them in their colorful performances during the last eleven fiestas. The dancers acquired national recognition by being 1961 participants at the famous Tucson Festival of Arts and the National Folk Festival in Nashville, Tennessee in 1959. They have appeared before cheering audiences of happy admirers in many towns in our own state of New Mexico.

This year's fiesta will undoubtedly be the most beautiful ever as these talented dancers will perform several regional dances of Mexico brought to this area by Mrs. F. S. Montes after spending two weeks in Saltillo, Mexico where she was able to instruct by Mrs. Soledad Luna, a dancing teacher of that Mexican town. These dances have been a definite

challenge to the abilities of the students who have worked in earnest and have learned the intricate steps almost to perfection. Just as Mexican native costumes draw upon every color of the rainbow, so their dances and songs reach into every human emotion. The gay and lively tones of Mexican music makes it understood and loved by every audience in every land. Music and dance are the natural language of the nation. Mexican seem born to it.

Now, straight from the heart of Saltillo, the Hondo Fiesta Dancers bring you several Mexican dances, authentically reproduced. An unforgettable adventure in pleasure will be the 12th Annual Mexican Fiesta in Hondo with its lively guitar music by the Montes trio and the magical dances fantastically colorful performed by students beautifully costumed and

bringing forth irresistible gaiety.

Some of the dances are as follows: from Aguascalientes comes the ritual of the ancient Aztec and Maya in the dance, Los Matlachines. This dance has a definite Indian accent. More than 300 dances are still national institutions, aside from thousands more that have given Mexico the worldwide reputation of having more dances than any other nation. The famed Jarabe Tapatio known to most Americans as the "hat" dance, and now the national dance of Mexico, is and has always been one of the greatest favorites.

Besides the national Jarabe, the Hondo dancers will bring the audience two other jarabes. The Jarabe Patateo is a beautiful dance from the state of Coahuila. This dance reveals a joyful excitement of a true master-

SANTA FE — New Mexico's two U. S. representatives have been voting with the National Farmers Union which has no formal organization in New Mexico more than with the American Farm Bureau Federation which presently has an enrollment of 8,608 New Mexico families.

Ratings recently released by the two organizations show that Rep. Joe Montoya voted with NFU 80 per cent of the time on 30 key roll calls during the 87th Congress and was scored 55 per cent by the Farm Bureau on 11 roll calls.

Rep. Tom Morris had the same 80 per cent score with NFU and 64 per cent with the Farm Bureau.

### VOTES RATED BEFORE MECHEM

Sen. Clint Anderson was scored 67 per cent by the Farmers Union and 55 per cent by the Farm Bureau.

Sen. Ed Mechem was not a member of the 87th Congress, 1961-62.

The NFU advocates federal control of farm production and prices and the Bureau's stated object is to preserve the market price system in agriculture.

### MONTOYA 100 PCT. WITH UNION LABOR

The AFL-CIO Committee on Political Education rates Montoya at 100 per cent on 11 major roll calls on labor legislation. Morris was given an 82 per cent rating.

In the Senate Anderson's score was 91 per cent for labor. Mechem's 1963 voting was scored by Americans for Democratic Action, zero, and Americans for Constitutional Action, 85 per cent.

Americans for Constitutional Action gave Anderson a score of nine per cent and the ADA put him at 91 per cent.

The ADA is an extremely liberal organization and ACA is its opposite.

### STATE SPENDS MORE ON JOBS SURVEY

Last year the state paid \$2,500 to Public Administration Service of Chicago to make a study evaluating the jobs in the bureau of revenue with the result that 110 were recommended for lower pay and 38 for higher pay.

Nothing was done about it and the February legislature appropriated \$80,054 for salary increases for all bureau employees.

Latest step in the job examination is the employment of Milton Scudder, personnel director in the Republican Ed Mechem administration, to study the jobs some more at \$600 a month.

### EL RITO BOARD WILL HIRE TWO

The state is wrestling with the question of putting a local Spanish-speaking president at the head of Northern New Mexico State School at El Rito or bringing in a vocational education expert from the outside.

C. H. Robinson who heads a nearly all-Spanish staff of 50 at the state supported junior-senior high school is retiring at the end of June and will be replaced by a \$12,000 president to head up a new program to make El Rito a job training high school.

The El Rito board will also hire a \$10,000 job placement officer.

### POLITICOS LIKE EL RITO JOBS

Rio Arriba politicians are trying to hang on to control of the school jobs. State Treasurer Joe Grant, a figure in Rio Arriba politics for 35 years, is chairman of the El Rito board.

Gov. Jack Campbell has stated a serious desire to salvage something from the nearly useless school that serves as a local junior-senior high school for a couple of hundred youngsters and has student boarding facilities, all on state money.

The February legislature appropriated \$300,000 for job-training programs in the schools which El Rito could share if it gets acceptable program underway.

The school has \$403,000 for next year in addition to what it may get from the vocational money.

### PALMER HURTS EITHER WAY

Capitol politicians were debating this week whether it would have been better for Joe Montoya to let Norman Palmer run against him for Demo nomination for the U. S. Senate or for him to be thrown out of the race as he was by the supreme court.

Montoya seems to have been damaged in public opinion by the extreme efforts that his people made to keep Palmer out but this is probably less damaging than what he might have suffered in letting him run.

Palmer got a lot of publicity and won much sympathy during the time he was trying to get on the ballot. He was in a fair way to run up a considerable vote had his name been on the voting machines.

### OTHER PERILS FOR MONTOYA

A run against Palmer was also dangerous for Montoya in the possibility that it would have involved him in the Fabian Chavez-Johnny Walker fight for Congress.

As it is, Montoya has been able to avoid direct involvement although he is generally believed to be with Walker.
