### Range study

### at Ft. Stanton

Recommendations for range management research at Fort Stanton, for the coming year will be developed during a two-day meeting this week by the Fort Stanton Research Advisory Committee.

The meeting will bring together 15 to 20 representatives of the Bureau of Land Management, New Mexico State University, Forest Service, Agricultural Research Service, New Mexico, Farm and Livestock Bureau, Soil Conservation Service, New Mexico Game and Fish Department, New Mexico Wool Growers Association and the New Mexico Cattle Growers Association.

The committee toured the Ft. Stanton area Tuesday and met in Las Cruces, the next day to work out details of the research program for the coming year.

## Camilla Lindsey and Ronnie Brunson are top scholars at Corona High

The valedictorian of the Class of 1964 at Corona is Miss Camilla Lindsey with a 3.78 grade average. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Lindsey of Lincoln Station.

The salutatorian is Ronnie Brunson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Willis Brunson of Cedarvale. Ronnie's grade average was 3.58.

Camilla has received a tuition scholarship from Eastern University at Portales, and a \$200 scholarship at Lubbock Christian College.

Ronnie has received a tuition scholarship at South Plains Junior College, Loveland, Texas, and also at N. M. State University. He has a \$150 scholarship at Lubbock Christian.

Erin, Bob Buchanan stated he expects eight or nine of the Corona graduating class to attend college.

Dr. Eugene Mann of Portales, chairman of the board, called the meeting to order. Present were Mrs. Lena Mae Pfeiffer of Tatum, Dr. Louis Levin of Albuquerque, Dr. H. C. Jernigan, medical director, George Bryan, superintendent, Mrs. Grace Schneider, head nurse, Dr. W. F. Rosenblatt, and Pat Salas, secretary.

Newspapers represented were the Albuquerque Journal, Edna Steinman reporter, and the Lincoln County News, Paul Payton reporter.

The matter of patient social security was first on the medical director's report. If a patient is either a minor or incompetent by medical direction, the institute acts as director, if a beneficiary dies money goes to heirs, if a patient is transferred money can be transferred at the direction of the federal government.

The statistical report given by Dr. Jernigan cited the daily average number of patients as being 174. Percentage of occupancy is 79.09. Total number of active and temporarily inactive patients on out-patients chemotherapy program as of April 1 was 623. Cost of the out-patient program is \$15,000 per year.

The hospital remains hard pressed to secure the service of a third physician. Dr. Rogers, recently resigned at Los Lunas, will look into the job at Fort Stanton. Dr. Lee Wollard, who has been on the staff temporarily, left Fort Stanton to enter private practice at Roswell.

The last item on the medical director's report covered the 7 items adopted at the last meeting, as avenues where improvement might be made.

Supt. George Bryan said that Dan Nine, with 25 years of security and police experience, is now sergeant in charge of the security patrol. There are six members of the patrol, working a five-day, eight-hour day. Two men are on duty Saturday and Sunday during the heavy visitation period.

Visitors are welcome at Fort Stanton, as always, the security patrol will make note of who is on the grounds, and what patients or employees are leaving.

The progress in tightening up control at the gate has helped solve the liquor situation in the hospital. No employees have been caught with liquor come have been under suspicion. Two employees have been released for other reasons, one has resigned. Dr. Jernigan said he would not discharge an active TB patient because of a liquor problem.

From information collected before the round of criticism in April, some figures have been compiled, relative to the liquor problem. Of 110 adult male patients; 24 did no drinking prior to admission, 21 drank lightly, 23 moderate, 26 were heavy drinkers, one AA. Ten of the heavy drinkers had quit liquor.

The one female on the board of directors, Mrs. Pfeiffer, thought the females were being neglected and should be surveyed too.

The patient orientation program was reviewed. At the time of entry into the hospital the patient's history is taken, physical examination given. After the patient has become familiar with hospital routine he or she has conference with doctors who explain kind of treatment. Patients have a booklet, "Feed, Relax, Recover," which gives considerable information about the hospital. This booklet is in great demand for use in other institutions.

One of the best means of patient orientation is learning from older patients.

Fort Stanton Hospital is very much in line in patient-worker ratio with the national average. There are 178 patients, 175 employees, the national average workload is 1.2. The maintenance situation at Ft. Stanton is unique in the way that the state has an agreement with the federal government that buildings must be maintained, the

Meeting in a new board room, near completion, the directors of the Ft. Stanton TB Hospital gave unanimous approval to several points of improvement, largely a continuation of policies in effect before the hospital received criticism from two employees at the April meeting of the board.

No major changes have been made in care of children's ward. Routine corrections are constantly being made. The children are not sick and the big job is one of baby sitting, and observing simple rules of sanitation.

Male attendants are needed as well as nurses, salary starts at \$184 per month. The new employee orientation at Ft. Stanton is a "learn while you work" program with a general briefing given at the start, lesson on oxygen care, nurses help with classes and teaching, doctors hold classes movies are shown on fire, evacuation, skin testing, effect of TP medicine.

Some changes have been made in recent months in manner of pest control. The hospital formerly subscribed to national pest control service, which ran the pests out of their homes and left the problem of killing and removing them with the hospital. Now the hospital is doing its own pest control. The kitchen is closed each night, and fog sprayed in. Attendants come in at 4:00 a.m. to wipe equipment and remove pests. The best ingredients obtainable are used in cleaning solution, brooms are not used. Rooms are vacuumed, scrubbed then polished.

This report given by Dr. Jernigan, Supt. Bryan, Nurse Schneider and Dr. Rosenblatt was accepted by the board of directors.

Dr. Levin will make a report at the National TB Association meeting on the out-patient program at Fort Stanton.

This concluded the business of the board on Friday. On Saturday morning an operating budget of \$1,147,651 was approved for the coming year.

The budget will be submitted to the Dept. of Finance and Administration for final approval.

Ben Mason, head of the budget division of the Dept. of Finance and Administration, commended the administration for the size of the cash carryover, \$111,249.

Operation of the hospital is divided into four functions, and the budget of each for the coming year is: administration, \$35,322; dietary, \$201,414; maintenance, \$348,162; and medical, \$562,753.

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

### Openhouse May 16 at Walker AFB

WALKER AIR FORCE BASE — On Saturday, May 16, Walker Air Force Base will open its gates to the public at 10:00 a.m. in observance of Armed Forces Day.

Many aircraft, some missiles and much supporting equipment will be on display on the Walker flightline to show the public where some of its tax dollars go to maintain "Power for Peace."

One of the larger aircraft to be shown will be the Douglas C-124A "Glogemaster II", the great four-engined, "three-story" transport used by the Air Force as a cargo carrier. Because of its great bulk, it is often referred to as the "aluminum cloud."

Various base facilities, such as the Community Center and Chapel will be open for visitors. There will also be military ceremonies and entertainment for visitors. The display and program will close at 5:00 p.m.

SANTA FE — State Sen. Fabian Chavez jarred the jaw teeth of the Democratic ruling clique when he ran within three thousand votes of beating most all the established power and political money in the party.

Land Commissioner Johnny Walker salvaged the nomination for Congress with important help in odd places that suggested the influence of Gov. Jack Campbell, U. S. Rep. Joe Montoya and Sen. Clint Anderson.

### PAYROLL CHAIRMAN DELIVER BIG VOTE

Sandoval county which does not have a non-Spanish officer in the courthouse or legislature voted 1293 for Walker, 571 for Chavez.

The county is the seat of the Joe Montoya clan. The Democratic chairman is Ruben Miera who is on the state payroll at \$10,200.

McKinley Demos came up with a surprising 500 lead for Walker under the leadership of County Chairman Ernie Garcia who is also on the state payroll.

### VOTE HELD DOWN IN SAN MIGUEL

Chavez got out of San Miguel with a 600 margin over Walker which might have been three times as much had not the county chairman, Apples Duran, called for support of a slate including Walker for Congress.

Apples used a printed form complete with pictures of the candidates to make sure none misunderstood. He is also on the state payroll.

### VALENCIA VOTES AGAINST CHAVEZ

Another odd county was Demo Chairman Filo Sevilla's Valencia.

It doesn't have a gringo officer in the courthouse but voted 2273 for Walker, 2031 for Chavez. Senator Anderson has a long record of demonstrated influence in the northern counties including Rio Arriba where Chairman Emilio Naranjo campaigned diligently against Chavez but couldn't keep him from winning by 1300. 
## Honor Society inducts seven

Mr. H. L. Jacobson of the U. S. Weather Bureau in Albuquerque gave a few pointers as to when to predict frost. If daytime temperature is under 70 F. and the 8:00 p.m. temperature is under 45 F. you can expect frost especially when clear and there is no wind. Also for every 1000 feet rise in elevation the average temperature normally is 5 1/2 F. lower.

The wind is causing a heavy blast of the fruit blossoms but with the heavy bloom indications are now for a full crop. For the best size the apples

should be 4 to 6 inches apart or have 30 to 40 leaves per apple.

Dr. Mohsen Nour will be doing some experiments on thinning apples in the Hondo Valley this year. May 7, he will make the first of his visits.

When reading agricultural publications you often notice the term "parts per million" (ppm) used to express concentration of presence of substance in solution.

Does this mean a little or a lot? This depends on the material being discussed and tolerances for that substance. Whether used in discussion of agricultural chemicals or water analysis, the term has the same meaning. We might read the tolerance of DDT is 7ppm. Some examples of how large is a part per million are 1/2 pound of solid from acre area to 7 in. plow depth; only 1 in. in nearly 16

miles is one ppm; a 1-gram needle in a 1-ton haystack or 1 minute in about two years.

These quantities might seem very small and perhaps insignificant. They do illustrate how exacting today's tolerances of chemicals are and how safe food is that meets these tolerances.

Clover mites, the tiny red bug that climbs through the window, can be controlled with a spray containing Diazinon or Kelthane. Treat at least twice at weekly intervals. Leave a three foot bare area around the house to discourage the mites

from getting near the house. Ants a problem? Use chlordane or dieldrin around window openings where ants can enter. This will control the ants which usually live under sidewalks or in the foundation.



The apple prospect in the upper valley was reduced by a freeze last weekend. The heavy winds of the past two weeks has reduced the apple crop on the Red Delicious in some areas. An accurate estimate of the total damage cannot be made until May 20th or after. By this time the apples will have set and the crop can be estimated.

Mites are starting to show up in some of the orchards. Before your next spray check for mites which are first found on the water sprouts near the center of the tree—the "bronzed" leaf also indicates mite infestation. For mite control use Trithion, Tedion, Kelthane or Ethion. Sulfur will show the mite build-up but will not control an infestation. Keep the mite under control now — not later.

Diagnosing diseases that are not present and "curing" them with remedies that are worthless is the game of phony "tree experts" who ply their trade door-to-door.

Homeowners with great affection for their shade trees often are easy prey for the tree or garden racketeers.

The swindlers will usually come to the door, announce that "your trees are on the verge of being destroyed by insects or disease," and then sell the homeowner on his worthless treatment.

People naturally are very proud of their trees, and they become horrified when someone who presents himself as an expert says the trees are diseased or infested with insects.

Avoid these swindlers by dealing with people who are established businessmen in your area; beware of secret formulas, or miracle sprays of any sort; and check with your county agent, or merchants bureau before handing over cash to suspicious operators.

Is much vitamin C lost if the fresh juice is refrigerated without a cover?

Vitamin C retention in chilled orange juice is excellent, whether covered or uncovered. How-

ever, a noticeable flavor change occurs in the uncovered juice. The temperature, contact with atmospheric oxygen, and the composition of the food are different in air bubbling up through boiling water around a green leafy vegetable vs. air contact on the juice at the surface of the fruit jar in the refrigerator. Vitamin C retention in citrus is entirely different from Vitamin C retention in other foods.

What are the greatest nutritional problems of adults in this country?

Overweight or obesity is currently the major adult nutritional problem. Failure to reduce the quantity of food intake necessary during the teens to compensate for decrease in activities as an adult can easily lead to undesirable weight gain. Obesity is the result of a form of malnutrition. Over-nutrition can be even more damaging than slight under-nutrition.

 This is another one where the Spanish-American candidate would have won by twice as much had the party organization left him alone.

**HENRY KIKER STRONGER MAN**

The moneyless Santa Fe candidate shocked the leaders with a 4,000 lead in Albuquerque which hadn't been anticipated by even Chavez or his campaign leaders.

It raised the stock of lawyer Henry Kiker, the Albuquerque Demo, chairman who also served as state campaign manager for Chavez, to the point that some were asking: Who's the big Democrat, Our Clint or Henry Kiker.

Kiker's performance in a county that last election turned down every Spanish name Democrat on the ticket — nine of them — was no one time flash.

**COUNTY LEADER IN 1962 WINS**

He was county chairman in 1962 when Albuquerque supported Jack Campbell for governor and went against Republican Ed Mechem for the first time in six elections.

He was also an officer in Campbell's primary campaign in Albuquerque in 1962 when he beat home-towner Ed Mead by 4,000 in the county.

**LEAVE HIM OR KEEP HIM**

Demos are now confronted with the decision of keeping Kiker as Albuquerque chairman when his term expires this May 25 after he had done all he could to defeat the party nominee for Congress and Boston Witt the nominee for attorney general.

Or throw him out and possibly lose all the big following that he seemed to command.

Kiker, son of the former supreme court justice, H. A. Kiker,

has made it known that he will stand for re-election.

**DANGEROUS EITHER WAY**

The decision is a dangerous one. Kiker is disliked and distrusted by Walker, Witt, Senate-running Joe Montoya, and most all of the old entrenched crowd and he has demonstrated independence of all of them, particularly Montoya.

He also flirted with grand treason in going contrary to the wishes of Sen. Clint Anderson in last week's election.

**KIKER, CHAVEZ STRONG PAIR**

The old crowd can't keep him without fear of harboring a revolutionary in camp, and they can't drive him out without risking a serious breach in the party.

Kiker also has a following in Los Alamos which voted for Chavez and Hart. And obviously he is aligned about as closely as possible with Chavez who could set off an uprising among his followers with an incident like throwing Kiker out of the Albuquerque chairmanship.

**FILO SEDILLO STRONG MAN**

Valencia Demo Chairman Filo Sedillo, old master of northside politics, crushed an uprising against him led by Sen. Tibo Chavez of Belen to show as perhaps the strongest Spanish-American local leader in the state. . . . Rio Arriba Chairman Emilio Naranjo who was widely regarded as the champ vote controller in 1962 didn't do so well this time. His major tormentor, Rep. Mat Chacon, won the county senate place and he was unable to hold Rio Arriba for Johnny Walker for Congress. . . . Sandoval Chairman Ruben Miera is consistently successful in Demo primaries, largely by the device of never letting opposition develop. . . . San Miguel Chairman Apples Duran was away from home most of the year on a Santa Fe job and was unable to hold his flock for Walker.
