## Fabian Chavez refuses to leave political stage

SANTA FE — Fabian Chavez refuses to limp off the scene like a lame duck should.

The Santa Fe senator and majority leader got beat in a run for Congress and popped back with a bid for the Demo state chairmanship on terms that made headlines but also made it impossible for him to hold the post.

When that died down he was ready with an investigation of the state police with his State Judicial System Study Committee which was still in the works as this was written.

FOUR OF SEVEN ARE LAME DUCKS  
The committee has spent all but \$12,500 of its \$30,000 appropriation and four of the seven members are lame ducks not returning to the legislature, but the probe is still possible.

Chavez, chairman of the committee, was prodded toward the investigation when the committee's lawyer, Philip Manly, was denied admittance to three days of secret board hearings on the conduct of Patrolmen Freddie Martinez and Lee Gallegos.

Both were suspended from the force for mishandling bond money.

HARD TO YIELD THE HEADLINES  
Chavez is dying hard after three years of being the idol of the press as justice of the peace reformer, fighter of the liquor interests, and poor boy candidate for Congress.

Gov. Jack Campbell encouraged him for the state chairmanship but other Demo leaders, including Gov. Clint the Senator, don't want him and would like to see him fade away.

CHAVEZ OFFERS HARD TERMS  
Chavez said he would accept the party state chairmanship if he could continue his fight for repeal of the liquor price-fixing law and operate independent of all but the State Democratic Central Committee.

He didn't want to check with Sen. Clint Anderson and Rep. Joe Montoya on every move he made and wanted to take the money that was made from the Joe Montoya dinner and put it in the party account. It is presently held for the Montoya campaign.

(That was the dinner Harry Truman was supposed to address but cancelled at a late hour.)

EARL HARTLEY FOR CHAIRMAN  
The expiring state senator continues popular but will inevitably recede from the public scene when he no longer has a public position.

There is a plan in consideration by the party leaders to give the state chairmanship to Atty. Gen. Earl Hartley who is on a term that expires at the end of the year.

If he took it he would probably resign as AG and the governor would appoint Boston Witt who is the Demo nominee for the place.

MCCULLOCH SET THE PRECEDENT  
He could take the appointment and still serve two terms according to precedent of twenty years ago.

Atty. Gen. Ted Chase resigned and was replaced by C. C. McCulloch who went on to serve (Continued on back page)

## LFC asks help corralling itinerant dogies in N.M.

The Legislative Finance Committee, of which Rep. W. G. Shreevogost is a member, at its monthly meeting in Santa Fe May 19 requested that the Cattle Sanitary Board, through its chairman, W. O. Culbertson, ask assistance from the New Mexico Cattle Growers Association, for information and ideas on how to improve collection of taxes on itinerant cattle in New Mexico.

Shreevogost said it was called to the attention of the LFC that an estimated 300,000 to

500,000 cattle move in and out of our state each year without being placed on tax rolls. Although many of the cattle are in New Mexico for as long as six months, it has been impossible for county assessors to collect on them.

The present law is adequate but enforcement is practically impossible. It is felt that the Cattle Growers can be of great assistance in improving this collection of which 8 mills goes to the Cattle Sanitary Board and the balance goes to county and state treasury.

## Dr. John H. Knox elected chairman of Ft. Stanton research committee

The Fort Stanton Research Advisory Committee meeting here this week elected officers and recommended research for the Fort Stanton Cooperative Range Research Station.

Dr. John H. Knox, head of the department of animal husbandry at N. M. State University, was named chairman of the committee and Carlton Herbel, research agronomist with the Agricultural Research Service, USDA, at University Park, was named secretary.

Dr. Philip J. Leyendecker, dean and director of the College of Agriculture and Home Economics at NMSU, and Dr. Marvin Wilson, associate director of NMSU's Agricultural Experiment Station, were named ex-officio chairmen.

The committee recommended long-range research on multiple use of the station's 26,000 acres. Research will include the relationship of livestock grazing, wildlife, and recreational uses.

The station's land is cooperatively administered by the Bureau of Land Management, with research administered by N. M. State University's Agricultural

Experiment Station. The BLM, the State Department of Game of Fish, and NMSU will share in financing the research.

More specifically, the recommended research includes grazing management for cattle and sheep, methods of watering livestock, watershed management, studies of deer, antelope, game birds, predators, rabbits and rodents.

The committee recommended development of educational facilities to handle youth groups, student groups, ranchers, and technicians who could see, firsthand, results of research at the station.

The committee, which Dr. Leyendecker said "represents as completely as possible the agencies dealing with range use," includes Morris A. Trostad, Santa Fe, and William Campbell, representing BLM; Ralph Bonnell, Glencoe, representing the N. M. Farm and Livestock Bureau; Dr. Carlton Herbel, Las Cruces, and Dr. J. L. Gardner, Tucson, Arizona, representing ARS; Frank J. Smith, Albuquerque, representing the U.S. Forest Service; Hurlan Ray, Las Cruces, representing the Soil

organized which organization has helped bring about considerable improvement in that town. All people here are progressive, it was a great thrill helping organize, said Nicholas.

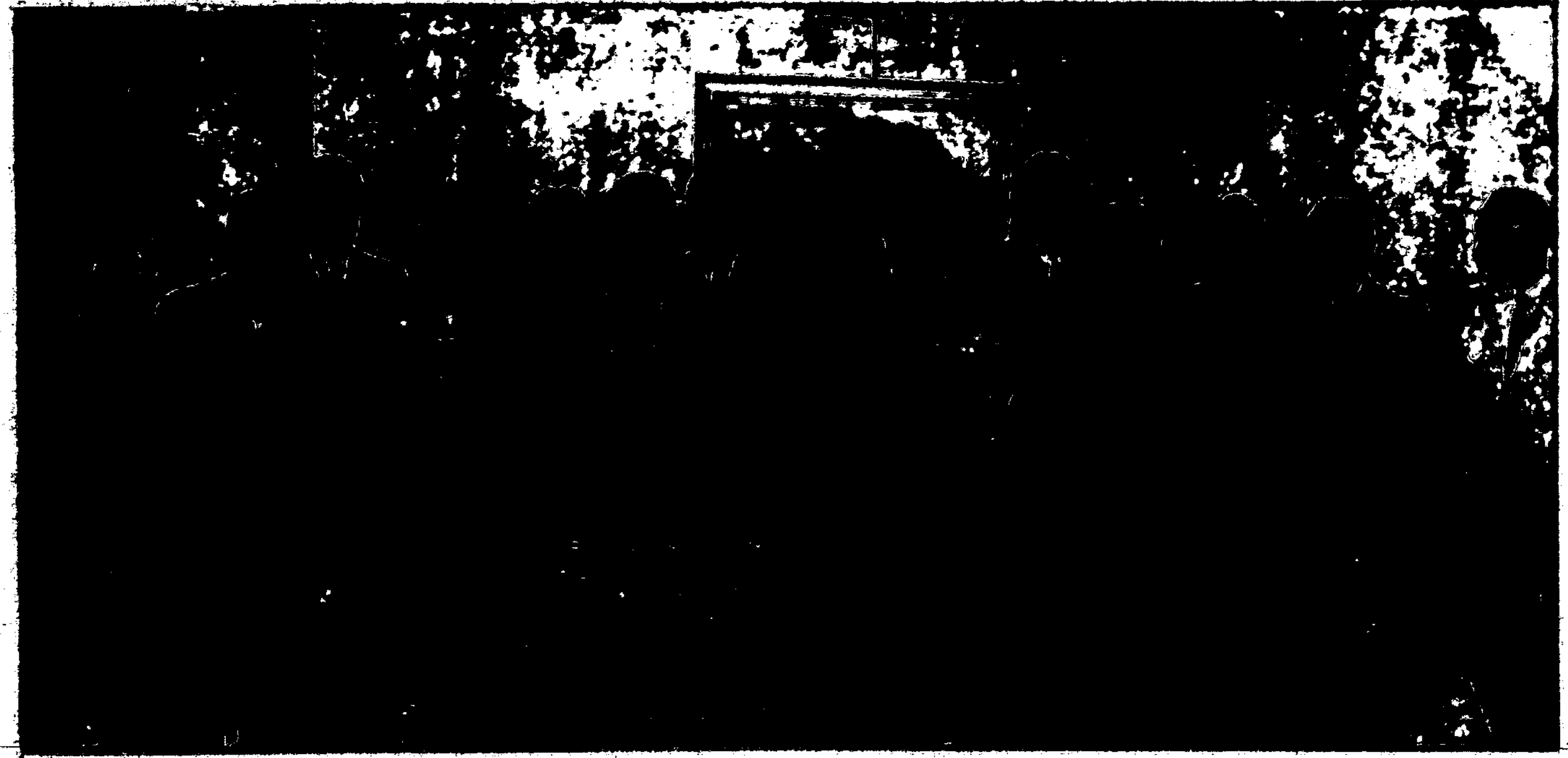
Past state president, Doyle Balko told the new organization that the only obligation you have is to make your community a better place to live, and in the process you make yourselves better citizens.

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# EDITORIAL . . .

"A page for independent thought"

## A measurement of learning

A complex subject, is the measurement of learning — one that has been on our mind for years. Being related to economics, political as well as scholastic factor makes such a measurement doubly complex.

Most commodities are graded so that when you buy a pound of beef, beans, or butter you know you are getting your money's worth by present market standards. Education is graded, A—B—C—D, but does this mean that your student will measure up to the state or national standards in the learning market. Not necessarily true, and the bad spot may be impossible to locate because it could have happened early in your student's learning career.

At the start of both a college and printing career this editor had the job of printing Every Pupil Scholarship Tests. They proved to be a good job for the college print shop, and maybe a little about the learning involved. Such tests gave no help at all about how to salvage a wasted year of poor teaching.

We suffered the indignity of enrolling in Rhetoric and Comp. AP. That course was for those students whose background in rhetoric was not up to college freshmen standards. Any number of college students, in later

years, have told us they might as well have skipped high school English because they had to start all over again in college.

Once knew of a geography class where five passed the course 15 failed — only one answer here, poor teaching. Another instance is an entire class allowed to slide through the 7th and 8th grades by a slack teacher. The scholastic attainment of this class through high school was very common.

A measurement of learning is difficult to obtain — yet what could be more important to student, teacher or parent. Or more important to the tax payers of the state who are paying the budget which increases year by year.

If the state were as particular about the proportions of learning its school money buys, as about the proportions of cement mix its road money buys — our school tax money would be much better spent.

It is the period of music training that many times, less interesting, and more demanding. Many music passages require monotonous repetition until they are fully learned. Students become impatient, restless and discouraged. Being normal, the grade school and junior high school band members (even high school level in some cases) is little concerned with a high standard of music performance.

However, if no effort were made to improve his playing, eventually the student himself would realize the lack of progress, and develop a dislike for band. The student in music (especially during the grade and junior high school days) needs, and deserves, encouragement, support, praise and a firm dependable discipline pattern that will uphold him when the going gets rough.
