Swimming pool prices 20-35-50 for summer

Carrizozo trustees meeting in regular session Tuesday night discussed prices at the Zozo pool, lowered the bottom price a nickel and came up with a schedule of 20c for youngsters 12 and under; 35c for ages 13-18 and 50c for those over 18 years.

Other business was mostly unsettled. The Town does not know what to do about fire alarms and police calls after the dial system goes in. Use of tape answering service might solve the problem. A person would call in, locate a fire or disturbance and the message would be recorded on tape. When the fire call was made the siren would automatically ring and firemen going to the station would locate the fire from the taped message. The town marshal would get the location of disturbances and police calls by the same method. Some investigation will be made of how other dial towns are handling this problem, with the aim of getting something done by June 21 when dial takes over.

Zozo C of C has meeting tonight
The Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce will have a meeting June 4 (tonight) at the City Hall, beginning at 7:30 p.m.

Mayor Vernon Petty designated Fred English and Arrell Posey to be responsible for answering questions and problems concerning the swimming pool and parks. Chevo Baca and Buster Smoot will do the same for streets and water system.

Some dead grass in park, some that is late greening up reported by Wayne Withers. Lots of big ball games going on there and the park is serving its function in a fine way. Withers asked OK on repair of backhoe, around \$200 job, and requested four new tires for pickup, both granted.

The Town will proceed with purchase of needed airport land from Dr. J. P. Turner at \$80 an acre, using \$6,500 grant from State Aviation Agency for this purpose. Further progress on the airport is pending OK from the Federal government of their part of the funds to be used.

Nothing done about request to fence in city equipment. Withers and Smoot will get cost estimate. Question of how to keep Carrizozo's \$230,000 worth of streets clean and in good shape was answered by instructing Withers to use prisoners.

Bids will be requested on gasoline used by town. The Trustees wondered why the Town should have to pay a 6c state tax when the state pays no tax of any kind to the town.

Insurance on Mrs. Mae Jordans' property canceled, possibly she thinks, because of fire hazard adjacent to her property. Mrs. Jordan wants help from town. Discussed by trustees, no action.

Bills were paid at first of meeting. Attending besides the Trustees were Choncho Morales, Friday Sherrill, Elfred Jones, Nellie Lee Baker, and Pat Aguilar.

Plans being made for openhouse in August at new Carrizozo school

Wednesday afternoon a group of adults and several children toured the new high school building under the guidance of Supt. J. T. Clegg.

The interior is almost completed and is very modern in every respect, from the tiled pink and blue restrooms, to the walk-in freezer and eye-level ovens in the kitchen.

The band room has no windows for acoustical reasons and also for the consideration of patients in the hospital located just north of the school.

Windows throughout the building are small, but give adequate light combined with the new lighting system.

In addition to the library, which will house more than 3000 new books, there is a work room for students who prefer reading in privacy, and a room where all returned books will be repaired before they are put in their proper place on the shelves. A part-time librarian will be employed to keep the library open for the public after school hours.

The carpeting has not yet arrived, but will be laid in the band room, the living room of the home ec department, which will also be the teachers lounge, and the library, as soon as it arrives. The new equipment will be installed as it is delivered to the school.

Plans are being made for open house, which will be held some time in August just before the beginning of the new school year.

Rare opportunity for Republicans at state convention in Albuquerque

SANTA FE — The Republicans will have the opportunity to seize a strong advantage at their June 13 convention by blasting the extremely unpopular pre-primary convention system and the guaranteed-profits-on-liquor law, but don't count on them doing it.

The liquor law which has been protested by Democratic legislatures for 25 years has been unpopular all along, but Republicans have never opposed it in their platforms, apparently afraid to risk offending the 1,400 liquor license holders even though such a plank might please half a million consumers.

PARTY LEADERSHIP AGAINST PRIMARY

And the Republican leadership is inclined to favor the convention system of nominating candidates over the direct primary although the people voted 54,000 to 14,000 in favor of the primary when the question was up for referendum action in 1950.

There is strong evidence that much of the surprisingly big vote rolled up by Fabian Chavez for Congress was attributable to his hard but futile fight to break the liquor law in the 1963 legislature.

And there is substantial evidence that many voted for Chavez in resentment of the repeal of the district primary and the stacking of the convention against Chavez by the Demo leadership.

COULD BE FIRST MAKE DEMOS FOLLOW

The Republican meeting is more than a month in front of the July 18 Democratic convention which offers the minority party a chance to take the lead on the unpopular issues.

If the Republicans took the stand for liquor reform and return to the primary the Demos would either have to say "me too", which would be humiliating, or remain silent on the issues which might get them in trouble.

USE SAYS' MONEY FOR CONVENTION

The state highway commission at its latest meeting authorized Chief Engineer T. B. White to spend \$3,000 of state money to prepare for a June, 1965, Santa Fe meeting of the Western Association of State Highway Officials.

White said he would use the money for printing and mailing and to defray the cost of employees assigned to pre-convention work.

The use of state money for such a purpose is probably illegal.

The WASHCO conventions have some very serious technical sessions for some of those attending and grand hoopla for others. Last year's meeting was in Seattle, site of the World's Fair, and Las Vegas, Nev. is a popular convention city for the association.

EMPLOYEE GROUP NIXED BY AG

Last year when highway e-

quipment, stamps, office supplies and manpower were used by an association of highway department employees to assist the campaign of a member for a place on the board of the Public Employees Retirement Assn. the attorney general held that it was illegal and required Chief Engineer White to personally reimburse the road fund more than \$500.

That was a violation by an association of employees. Only the highway brass belong to WASHCO which will make it interesting to see what the attorney general does this time.

SMALLEY FAVORED FOR SENATE POST

There is sentiment among state senate conservatives to make Ike Smalley of Deming the majority floor leader succeeding Fabian Chavez of Santa Fe.

Smalley, who is often referred to as the ablest member of the legislature, is too independent to serve as merely the administration's man in the leadership position.

He was in a conservative group in the February special session that was often opposed to the Campbell program and that was usually a vote or two short of majority. They seem to have a majority now.

The administration people want Bill Gallagher of Colfax for leader and falling him would take Fincher Neal of Carlsbad. Gallagher is already campaigning.

LEO MURPHY TALKED AGAIN

Welfare Director Leo Murphy who was third in the 1962 Demo primary run for governor but emerged as a popular figure is getting quite a bit of attention as a 1966 candidate to succeed Campbell, assuming he is re-elected.

Murphy lost his greatest political asset when his friend John F. Kennedy was assassinated in Dallas, President Kennedy named Murphy to two national boards while he was a primary candidate in 1962 which helped but wasn't enough to get him over. Murphy is also out of participation in the Municipal League which he had headed as mayor of Santa Fe and which was helpful in the 1962 campaign.

BRUCE KING TOP AMONG PROSPECTS

Speaker Bruce King of southern Santa Fe county, a genuine country boy, is presently the most popular prospect for the 1966 Demo nomination for governor, but that's a long time ahead.

The development of a new Democratic organization in Albuquerque headed by Chairman Henry Kiker and supported by the liberal Grass Roots organization suggests there will probably be a major candidate out of Albuquerque of a type far removed from the earthly Bruce King and Leo Murphy. It could be Kiker who is the son of the former supreme court justice and district judge.

Best rodeo hands in the country competed in Joe Sargent Arena

The rodeo sponsored by the Lincoln County Rodeo Association, in the Joe Sargent Memorial Arena last weekend drew a large number of the best ropers, bronc and bull riders in the country. The action was fine in the arena.

Crowds were average, good Friday night, rainy and cold Saturday and Sunday and attendance was down. The Jaycees reported a fine business on hamburgers and coffee at their stand.

Bob Lee of Roswell racked up the top money of \$500 and the all-around cowboy trophy given by Gene Hensley.

Government waste?

The Dallas Morning News of Sunday, June 2, 1963, on its editorial page printed the following information.

"A freshman congressman, Gene Snyder, R-Ky., was recently challenged to show how the budget might be cut. He replied by citing 68 examples of ridiculous expenditures over the past year or two, suggesting that many more similar cases might be found in the current budget. The list is long, but here are a few typical gems:

"Purchase of 1,000 TV sets for \$400,000 to be used in under-developed countries where there is no electric power.

"Donation of a \$3,100,000 yacht to the millionaire emperor of Ethiopia.

"A grant of \$1,250,000 for the study of relations between an infant monkey and its mother.

"\$10,000 for a tour of U. S. defense plants by officials of Communist Poland.

"\$18,000 to find out why patients break appointments at pediatric clinics.

"\$61,935 to establish a colony of baboons and \$13,816 for another monkey colony.

"\$9,775 to produce a 'stereotactic' atlas of the beagle brain.

"\$11,500 to study blood group genetics of Southampton Island Eskimos.

"\$20,092 to study diseases of a gaint snail.

"\$13,937 to find out what information is contained in echoes.

"\$20,091 to study how synthetic detergents travel in percolating water.

"\$8,205 to study the 'social role' of aging wild horses.

"Although the exact amount of money involved could not be determined in the following cases, they are of equal interest:

"Government officials in Kenya have used our foreign-aid money to purchase extra wives.

"We have bought suits for Greek undertakers.

"Superhighways have been built in countries with few, if any cars.

"In Lebanon, we built a stock-breeding farm with nine stalls for every bull.

"In Indonesia, millions of dollars in U. S. aid were used to buy U. S. gold.

C. L. Hendrick, Flying H Ranch owner died Friday at age 61 in El Paso

Clement Lorenzo Hendricks, 61, prominent southeastern New Mexico rancher who owned the Flying H Ranch near Hope in Chavez County, died Friday night in El Paso, Texas, where he was residing temporarily. He apparently died of a heart attack.

Mr. Hendricks was born Oct. 10, 1902, in Oklahoma. He was the son of the late A. C. Hendricks, who died in a plane crash in 1947, and Mrs. Myrtle S. Hendricks, who survives him and resides at the Flying H Ranch.

Mr. Hendricks and his father bought the Flying H Ranch, located in the eastern foothills of the Sacramento Mountains, from S. S. Ward of Artesia in 1929. It was at this time that Mr. Hendricks moved to New Mexico to make his home.

After his father's death, Mr. Hendricks took over management of the Flying H and later took over ownership of the ranch. He was in partnership with his son Leland, and daughter, Mrs. Bill Brainerd of Roswell. Leland resides on the 130-section ranch and manages it.

1958 and 1959, Mr. Hendricks won the Sheridan Park Hotel trophy for his Grand Championship in the California Wool Show, marking the only times that a trophy had ever been given for range fleece.

He was a past New Mexico State University regent, and had carried out sheep breed-

ing research in conjunction with the university to develop high grade wool. He raised cattle as well as sheep and had about 700 acres of irrigated land on which he grew fodder and apples.

Mr. Hendricks was a member of the Catholic Church, Knights of Columbus, New Mexico Wool Growers' Association and New Mexico Cattlemen's Association.

Survivors besides his mother include his widow, Mrs. Pearl Hendricks of the home; his son Leland; his daughter, Mrs. Bill Brainerd, Roswell; a sister, Mrs. Cleo Duggar, Carrizozo; a niece, Mrs. Bill Liakos, El Paso, and 12 grandchildren.

Mr. Hendrick's father owned several General Telephone Companies in the Littlefield, Texas area. He also formerly owned the Red and White Stores which were sold to Furr's Food Market.

Mr. Hendricks was reared near Dimmit, Texas. He received his education at Memphis, Tenn.

Funeral services were conducted Monday at St. Peter's Catholic Church in Roswell with Requiem High Mass celebrated by the Rev. Father Joyce Finnigan, OFM, rector of the immaculate Conception Catholic Church of Dexter as celebrant.

Burial was in South Park Cemetery with ranch employees, close neighbors and former business associates serving as pallbearers.

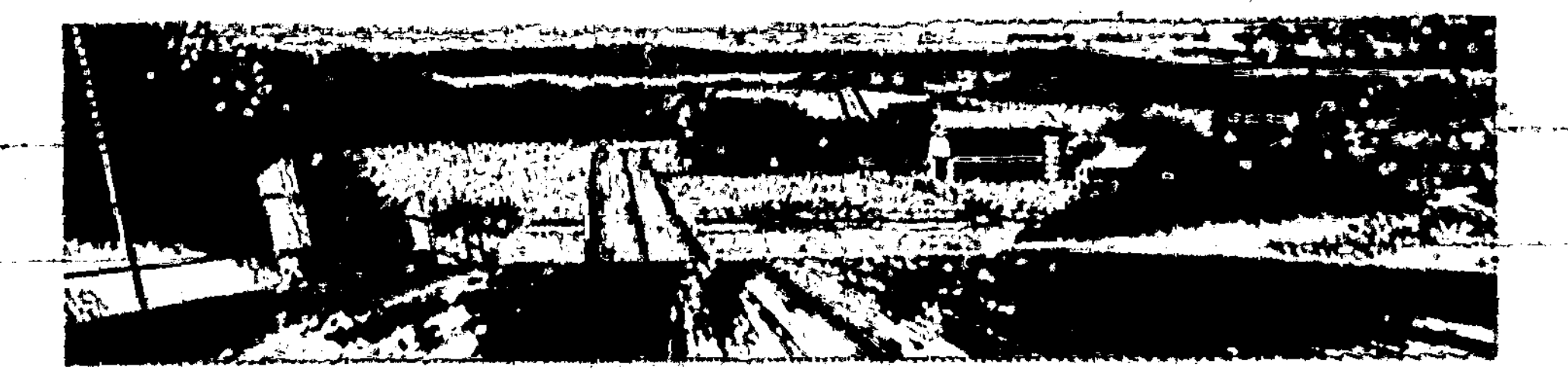

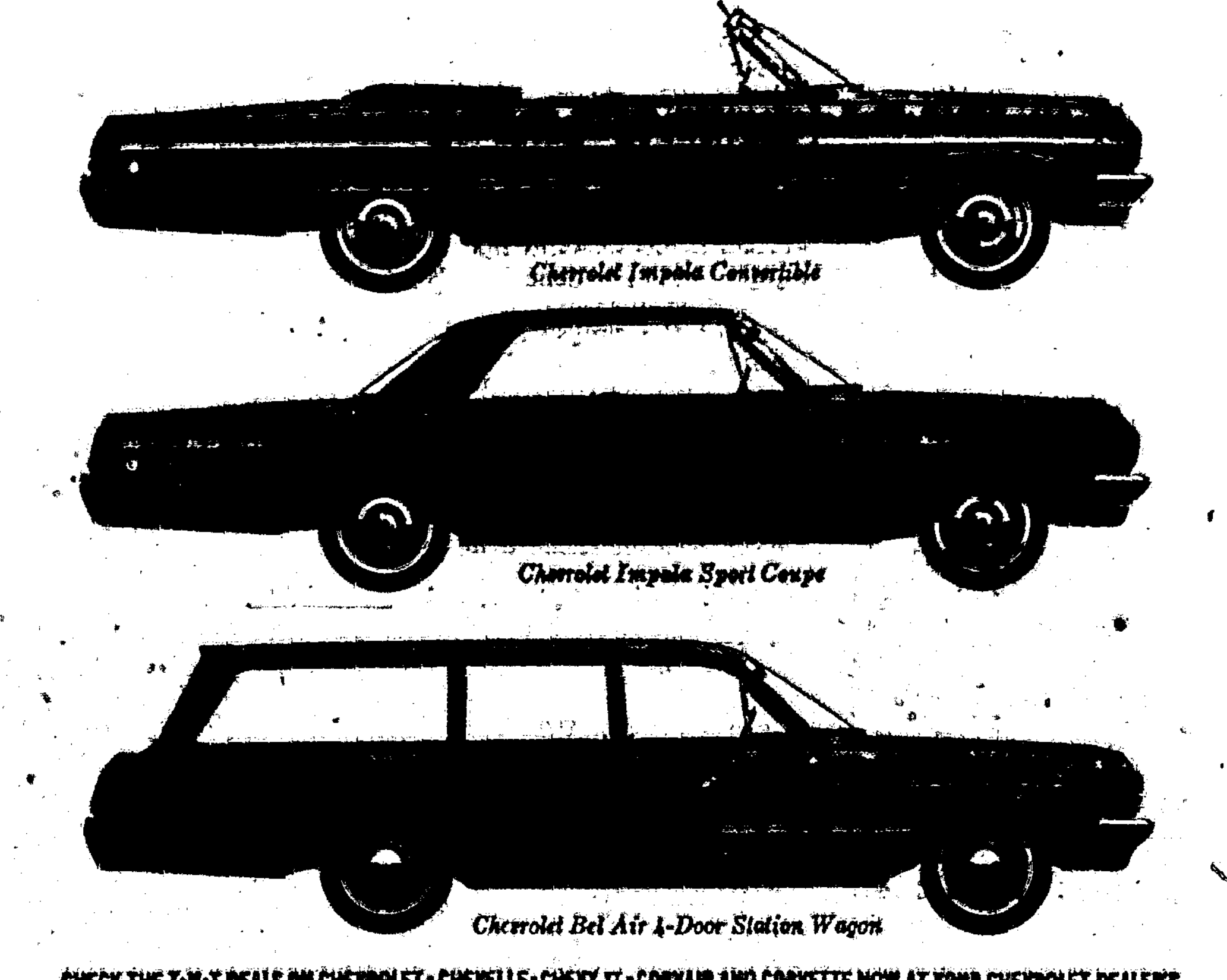

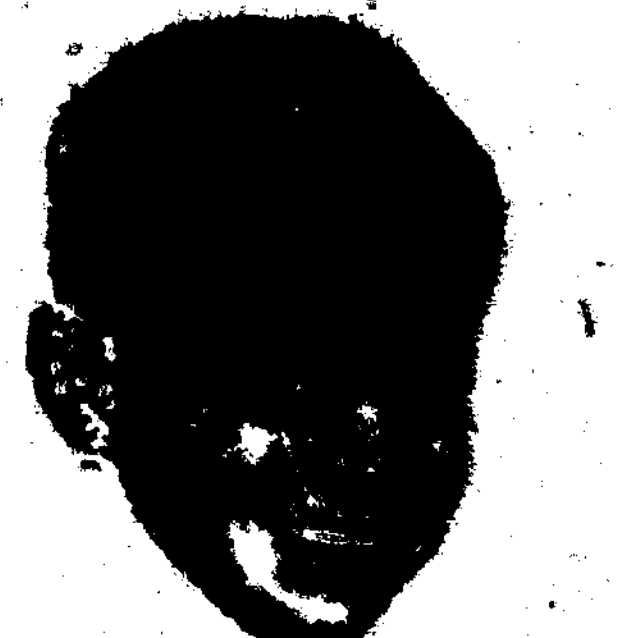
