NOGAL CAMP RUNS FOR JULY 15 THROUGH 19

Brown and Landes selected as camp meeting speakers

The Ranchmen's Camp Meeting held on Nogal Mesa near Capitan, New Mexico, each year will open on the evening of July 15, 1964. Supper will be served on that date at 6:00 p.m. and the first preaching service will be held at 7:00 p.m.

The interdenominational camp meeting program has been an annual event on Nogal Mesa since the summer of 1941 and persons of all denominations are cordially invited to be present for all or part of the services. The meeting will close on July 19, 1964, with the final service at 7:00 p.m.

The speakers this year will be James H. Landes of Abilene, Texas and Stanley C. Brown of Long Beach, California, these men are affiliated with two of the greatest Protestant Churches of our nation and their sermons will be of great inspiration.

Jimmy Landes is now serving as president of one of the church-connected universities located in Abilene, Texas. He was born in Lewisville, Arkansas, where he attended high school and completed his college and seminary work in colleges and universities located in the states of Arkansas and Texas. He was ordained in 1939 and served pastorates in Eagle Lake, Texas and Bryan, Texas, before going to Wichita Falls, Texas, where he stayed for a period of 18 years. He has accepted wide responsibility not only within his own denomination but also in civic work including work for the YMCA, Salvation Army, American Red Cross, Boy's Club of America, Community Chest, USO, Men-

of Rocky Mountain College in Billings, Montana, where he was also instructor of Bible. He has also served pastorates in Phoenix, Arizona and is presently pastor of an active congregation in Long Beach, Calif. He is a frequent Bible lecturer and preacher for local church missions and leadership training schools. In 1962, he was preacher for the Grand Canyon Easter Sunrise Service.

Nogal Mesa Camp Meeting grounds are reached by Forest Service Road, turning south from U. S. 385 approximately 8 miles west of Capitan, or approximately 15 miles east of Carrizozo. The road is marked with highway signs and although unpaved is a good graded road across the mesa to the Nogal Mesa Camp Grounds. Campers should come prepared to provide their own sleeping accommodations but all meals are served by the Camp Meeting staff at the Chuck Hall without charge except voluntary contributions.

State Democrats glad to have Barry in race

STATE DEMOCRATS WELCOME BARRY

SANTA FE — Statehouse Democrats are happy — or are doing well at pretending to be happy — about the likely choice of Barry Goldwater as the Republicans' man for president.

They are telling that the nomination of Goldwater would assure the re-election of President Lyndon Johnson and also the election of the state Democratic ticket.

There are many indications around that suggest they are right on the national election guessing but perhaps wrong on Goldwater's part in the New Mexico election.

STRONGER HERE THAN OTHERS

It doesn't take a very bold prognosticator to say that Goldwater would run better in New Mexico than any other Republican in the field because it will never be known if it's right or wrong, but there is such evidence that he would.

The Arizona senator has inspired New Mexico support far beyond that of any first term Republican candidate for president in modern times.

Goldwater had 80 per cent of the state party convention and got 14 delegates and 14 alternate delegates.

MORE SUPPORT THAN IKE HAD

When Gen. Dwight Eisenhower first sought the Republican nomination in 1952 the state party was divided on Ike and Sen. Bob Taft and sent a delegation to the national convention with some for Ike and more for Taft.

The New Mexico delegations were divided in 1948 and '44 when Gov. Tom Dewey of New York was the nominee, and in 1940 when Wendell Willkie got the nomination.

DEMOCRATS LEAD GOLDWATER GROUP

The Goldwater crowd that took charge of the New Mexico Republican convention was mostly from the traditionally Democratic eastside and was led by Anderson Carter of Lovington, recently a prominent Democratic legislator, who worked with the assistance of Lewis Cox of Roswell, recently a prominent Democratic state senator.

The big New Mexico Goldwater organization is made up lar-

gely of Democrats and former Democrats who like Goldwater's conservative style but don't give a hoot about Gov. William Scranton of Pennsylvania or any other who has been mentioned in the Republican prospect list.

HISPANIC VOTERS NOT INTERESTED

The common observation that Goldwater has no following among the state's Spanish-American group (28.3 per cent of the New Mexico population) is equally true of Scranton or any of the other Republicans, except the wealthy Gov. Nelson Rockefeller of New York who has declared himself out.

The fact is that Senator Goldwater would run in New Mexico with a better organization behind him than even that of 1952 when Eisenhower carried the state by 11,000.

This is no guess that the state will go Republican in November, but it does appear that there would be more Republican votes with Goldwater heading the ticket than with any of the other candidates.

U.S. SENATE RACE RIDES ON BARRY

How Goldwater would run in New Mexico is extremely important to Republican Sen. Ed Mechem and his Demo challenger Joe Montoya.

There is widely held opinion that a lop-sided New Mexico vote for President Johnson would sweep in Montoya and all the other Democrats.

A Republican presidential victory in New Mexico or even a close race, these observers believe, would make Mechem a favorite to win.

BIG JOB HOLDER SEEKS BIGGER ONE

Labor Commissioner John Otero who makes \$11,040 a year is trying to get Dick Pino's Employment Security Commission job at \$14,500 a year.

Otero was first in with an application for the ESC post when it became known that Pino was an applicant for the Albuquerque postmaster ship. Otero is originally from Tucuman and was in professional union work in Albuquerque when Gov. Jack Campbell tapped him for the labor commissioner post.

He was unknown in politics when he was appointed and is (Continued on back page)

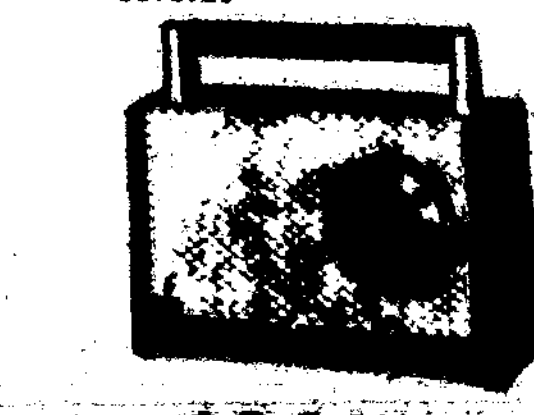

"Nope," answered the old man. "I missed the wall."

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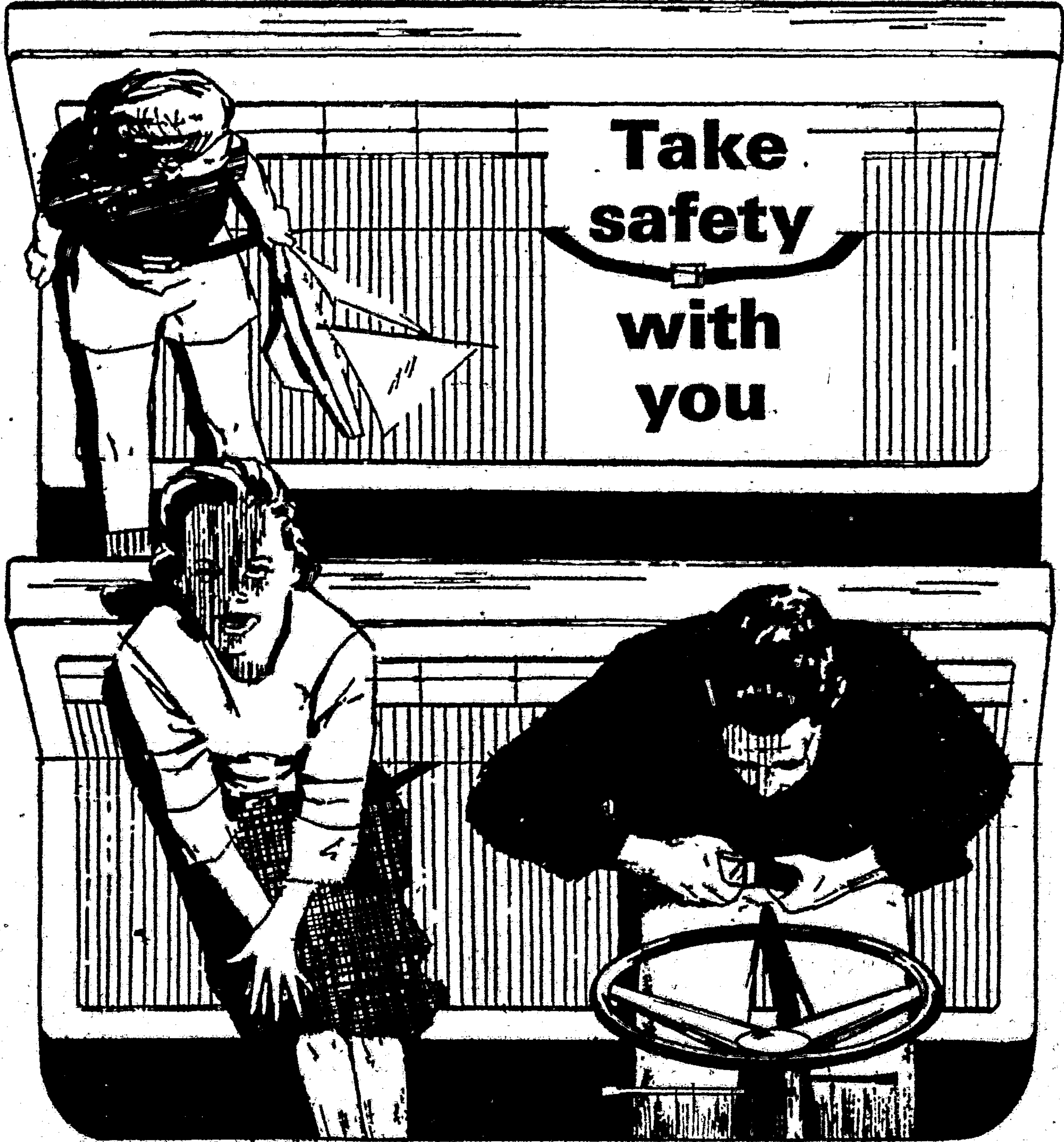

A nationally known women's leader, Mrs. Abbie Clements of Louisville, Kentucky, confessed in a major address that she as a Negro, even now, never knows what to expect when she travels.

The most difficult thing she has faced in more than 30 years of travel and church work, she said, was the "uncertainty" of never knowing exactly whether doors would be open or closed to her.

Mrs. Luther F. Berhenke of Midland, Michigan, was elected to a three-year term as president of the organization, succeeding Mrs. Donald E. Zimmerman of LaGrange, Ill.

Dr. Eugene Carson Blake, State Clerk (chief executive officer) of the denomination, addressed the women on the last day of their meeting. Other speakers included Dr. Ernest Gordon, Dean of the Chapel at Princeton University, and Dr. Paul Fruyter, director of the Menninger Foundation's Education Department.

The women also heard extensive reports on two targets they set for themselves three years ago. One was to get more knowledge about Africa, the second was to investigate and act upon the problems of youth in today's world.

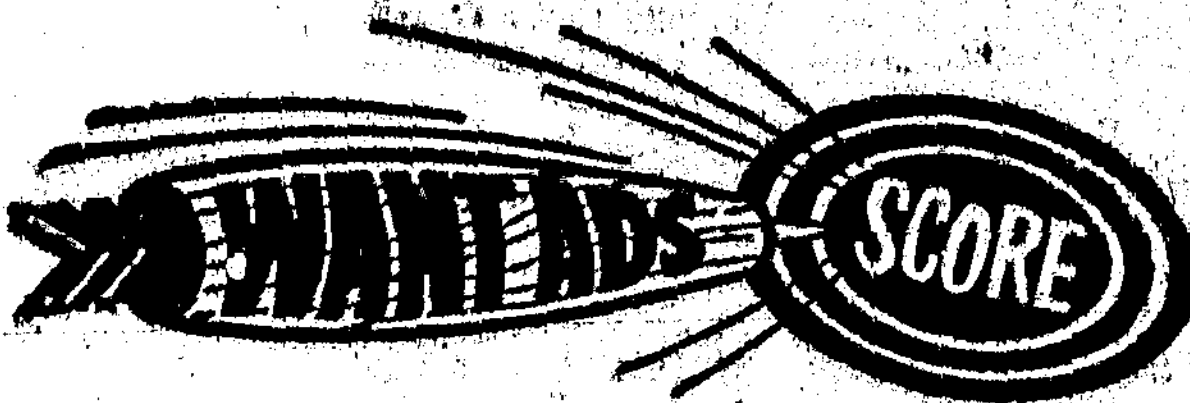
