Double trouble hits Demos

SANTA FE — Democrats are confronted with serious party trouble in Albuquerque and San Miguel that came up just as it appeared that they were in for one of the smoothest election years they ever enjoyed.

This Saturday's showdown for the San Miguel chairmanship stands to leave the party divided however it goes.

And it could be real serious if Dist. Atty. Tony Martinez and Rep. Chief Gonzalez defeat Chairman Apples Duran after the whole state organization, from the governor down, stood with Duran at a testimonial dinner last week.

SEAT CHAIRMAN IN CONVENTION

The party split also opened in Albuquerque last week when forces led by Charlie Davis, side of the late Sen. Dennis Chavez and Victor Salazar, second floor governor of the Mabry administration, humbled Chairman Henry Kiker and his Grass Roots backers.

They seized control of a county convention and defeated a Kikerbacked movement calling for repeal of the guaranteed profit liquor law.

Kiker and his Grass Rooters had defeated the same faction in the May primary when they carried the county for Fabian Chavez for Congress by more the 4,000 over Johnny Walker who was backed by Davis and Salazar.

There is not much hope of the two groups getting together for the November test with the Republicans.

NORTHSIDE TROUBLE TAKEN TO BOLACK

The Republicans' heads are still bleeding from wounds of the June state convention when Goldwater backers showed up with a majority and took everything for themselves.

Spanish-American leaders from the northern counties who didn't get a glimpse of attention from the Goldwater chiefs have been taking their injured feelings to former Gov. Tom Bolack, and he's sympathetic.

There are indications that Bolack may demand recognition of the northside Republicans which could bring on a serious break in the party.

CANDIDATE RUNS SANTA FE MOTEL

Shepherd Hays who resigned a job in the land office when he became a candidate for land commissioner is operating the Adobe Motel in Santa Fe while waiting for the campaign to open. Hays owns a third of the motel and his buddy Land Commissioner Johnny Walker who is running for Congress has the other two thirds. Boston Witt, candidate for attorney general, is continuing on the AG's payroll as first assistant. . . . All the other Demo candidates are incumbents running for re-election.

Miller concerned with summer driving

Chief K. K. Miller of the New Mexico State Police is concerned about the summer traffic ac-

cident picture in our state. Already the number of accidents has increased by 29 compared with last year's figures. At the end of May in 1963 there were 111 accidents recorded. At the end of May in 1964 there were 140 accidents recorded in the Traffic Safety Department in Santa Fe.

Extra caution must be taken to reduce accidents over the summer months. Last year 173 people were killed in traffic accidents in our state during the months of June, July and August. This amount represents about 40% of the total fatal traffic deaths for 1962.

"We should develop an awareness of our summer traffic," the chief stated. Summer brings people to the outdoors. All must drive varying distances to enjoy our summer attractions, hiking, fishing, hunting and picnicing areas. The New Mexico State Police would like for this drive to be accident free.

"We don't want your name on the fatality list, so I have some suggestions for you, Mr. Motorist, to prevent your name, your family or other motorists, you may meet from being a Statistic in our fatal accident files," the chief added.

1. First schedule your trip, both to and from, so that you give yourself plenty of traveling time.
2. Make sure both you and your vehicle are in the best condition for the trip. Avoid overexertion, intoxicating liquors, fatigue, lack of sleep, from affecting your trip.
3. Police your own driving. Drive every second of every mile as if a New Mexico State Policeman was in the car with you.
4. Enjoy yourself during your outing.

It is possible that with an increasing awareness of summer accidents, many people will be saved on our highways during this summer.

How many will depend on each motorist "Waking up" to his accident potential during each time he drives his car.

"A page for independent thought"

A chance for gain

Whether or not nominating Senator Goldwater as Republican candidate for president is a national calamity or good for the country is a hot issue this week.

The calamity thinkers see Goldwater's vote against civil rights as labeling the candidate with the obligation to prevent enforcement of civil rights, now law of the land.

The good-for-the-country thinkers see in Goldwater a chance to cast a vote against creeping socialism and other things they do not like in big government.

Few people give Goldwater much chance of being president, or any other Republican candidate for that matter.

There seems so little any individual, from the man in the street to the president himself, can do to stem the tide of mushrooming bureaucracy. Reams of editorial copy fill

newspapers each day, decrying the need for pruning the big government tree, with hardly one answer to this burning problem, worth repeating.

The civil rights law has added another mountain of regulations, enforcement officers, and problems to an always expanding government.

What can an individual do to stem the tide? Not much, until a lot more voters decide they want less regulation in their lives.

We predict... that should Goldwater become the presidential candidate, a surprising number of individuals will take this opportunity to cast a protest vote and that the direction of government in our country will shift slightly as a result of this vote.

The Pilgrimage to Moslem Mecca

Abqaiq, Saudi Arabia — I haven't been to Mecca, and don't intend to make an attempt while in the Kingdom. If you have such ideas, just read this and don't try it!

The last known trial was that of three daring Americans who somehow finagled a passage through the gates of the wall surrounding the metropolis, in 1958. There have been no known recorded successes!

The three courageous didn't reach the city proper before they were captured. After three horrible months spent in a squalid jail while a fight was made for their lives, a release was obtained under specific conditions they quit the Kingdom within the 24 hour period.

An attractive sign outside the city clearly defines that non-Moslems are not "allowed" within the bounds, during the pilgrimage, or at any other time. This has been adhered to since Prophet Muhammad of the early 7th century. This makes the Islam religious site more inductive, than ever!

Therefore for a research on the pilgrimage to Mecca, the fifth pillar of the Islam faith, I have drawn upon several sources, some of which have been difficult to obtain and certainly not available to the general reading public.

Many exciting revelations on the subject came from Harry J. Ingham, a Texas Panhandle native, a soldier of fortune who has spent many years in the Middle and Far East, of which a portion of the time was in Jidda, the Saudi Arabia diplomatic center near Mecca where the colorful Moslem pilgrimage annually commences. These accounts were a part of the enjoyable time we spent over wonderful dinners in the exquisite dining hall of the Arabian American Oil Company in Abqaiq, the oil development center of the Rub al-Khali desert.

The entire compilation has been in a peacemal fashion; its collection almost as exciting as the subject itself. The pilgrimage to Mecca is called "hajj." It is an act set aside as the fifth pillar only if the Moslem has a means to perform it. The most devout Moslem may live a lifetime without making the journey; but even the poorest make at least one attempt in their life, even though it may not be successful.

It has been tabulated that 350 million Moslems are in the East, Middle and Far East. Thus it doesn't take a dreamer to visualize the multitudes who make the pilgrimage. The journey is according to the Koran and commences in a period beginning with the month of Shawwal, the month following Ramadhan, which is the period of fasting (treated before). Also during the following month of Dhu al-Hijjah, the last month of the Moslem year. The Moslem calendar is lunar and therefore the time varies according to our dating, and never falls on the same period.

A pilgrim may perform the preliminary ceremonies at any time during this period; but the ceremonial climax of the hijj must be enacted on the last two days, the 9th and 10th of Dhu al-Hijjah. This is the time when hundreds of thousands of Moslems all over the land gather in Mecca.

The pilgrimage begins at the pilgrim's house. He utters a particular prayer to commence the journey, and at a designated point along the road, he clips his nails, shaves or cuts the hair, discards headgear, and exchanges shoes for sandals, as neither the head nor the feet may be covered, according to the Koran. The prescribed dress consists of two long pieces of seamless cloth, one draped about the waist; the other placed on the shoulder. It is believed these garments make all men, rich or poor, great or small, equal during the ceremony.

The Moslem in "Ihram," a state known as purity, is forbidden any pleasures of the flesh, usage of perfumes (which seemingly would be most difficult for an Arab), to wear garments with seams, to clip nails or cut hair, to hunt (although fishing is allowed), or to cut or uproot or destroy any flora of any type that is growing in the sacred territory.

As the pilgrim drapes the seamless garment about his person, he utters in prayer, "O God, I have dedicated myself to Thee and I intend to make the pilgrimage."

Shortly thereafter he makes another utterance, "Tabaika," which means "Here I am before Thee." He makes this cry often while on the journey. Such procedure ushers the pilgrim on his way.

Most pilgrims enter the country at the Red Sea port Jidda, easily understood to be a very

stick. He may even salute the stone, and then kiss the saluting hand.

The Arabians claim to have traced their ancestry, and believe it extends to the patriarch, Abraham, of Biblical times. They believe that Abraham and Ishmael built the Ka'bah.

In the courtyard is found the Station of Abraham, which is thought to have contained the stone upon which they stood while erecting the shrine.

Nearby is the well of Zamzam, water of which saved the life of Ishmael as a child. Chapter 16 and 17 of Genesis relate these chapter happenings is believed to be the present site of Mecca; and the designated ceremonies all take place largely around this site.

On the 9th day of Dhu al-Hijjah is the standing on 'Arafat, which climaxes the pilgrimage. This is a plain about 12 miles outside the city. This part of the ceremony is enacted before the Standing on 'Arafat, in a village known as Mina, which in conjunction with 'Arafat is associated with the Adam and Eve tradition. In Mina it is thought that Adam made the wish to see Eve, who was then in Jidda. His wish was granted, and he saw Eve at 'Arafat.

In Mina, after certain ceremonies and demonstrations, each pilgrim sacrifices a sheep, a goat, or a camel, in commemoration of God's sparing Abraham the sacrifice of his son, who is Isaac of the Biblical story, but is called Ishmael by the Arabs. The meat of the sacrifices must be distributed to the poor of the surrounding cities.

Within the most sacred place is the Ka'bah, a stone building cubical in shape and about 45 feet high. It is in the great courtyard of the Sacred Mosque. It is shrouded in a beautiful black silk, embroidered with ornamental Arabic characters. In the southeast corner of the Ka'bah is found the sacred Black stone, fascinating indeed. It is believed to have been sent down from heaven by God in the ancient times. It is about 12 inches in diameter, black, with a distinctive reddish hue. It is circled by a silver collar. The stone has been worn as slick as glass by the many kisses thrust upon it through the ages! Everyone makes an attempt to kiss the stone. Should the crowd be too thick, the pilgrim pokes a stick through an opening, and then kisses the

Finally the pilgrim bids the sacred territory a farewell, as it is avowed as "the noblest spot on earth, which God has chosen." Pilgrims are granted the choice of visiting the tomb of the Prophet as a part of the pilgrimage. It is not obligatory. The tomb is located in the huge Mosque of Medina, the holiest shrine of Islam.

THE LONG AND SHORT OF IT IS... There's not much of a LONG AND SHORT to this accounting, except please don't become adventuresome enough to dare an entry to Mecca, unless first becoming a Moslem!

Fire Department gets \$5,000.00
