

Hiram Dow puts recollections on tape, is pin-pointing renowned locations

Hiram Dow of Roswell, the youngest lawyer ever to be admitted to the New Mexico bar, and now the third oldest practicing lawyer in the country, has two projects going which will add much to the vivid history of Old Lincoln County which comprised a large part of southeastern New Mexico. Mr. Dow is in the process of putting on tape his recollections of the pioneers of the country, and is pin-pointing on a map the locations of all the better-known and most historic ranches and homesteads of southeastern New Mexico in territorial days.

Mr. Dow attended the Coe Room dedication in Lincoln recently and enjoyed reminiscing with Col. E. L. Lusk, Mr. and Mrs. Wilbur Coe and other old-timers present.

A lot of history is entangled in the documents and pictures shown with Mr. Dow in this News photo. Mr. Dow's wife, Ella Lea, was the daughter of Capt. J. C. Lea (small picture on right), J. Smith Lea, who was Sheriff John Poe's bookkeeper (left picture) was a distant cousin of Mrs. Dow and Sophie Poe.

Sheriff John Poe succeeded Pat Garret as sheriff of Lincoln County. He joined Garret as a detective for the cattle association and deputy to track down

Billy the Kid at Ft. Sumner. Since Poe was unknown in New Mexico, he was the advance scout, going from one bar to another until he found where Billy was staying.

A set of guns in the case next to one pictured, were carried by John Poe when he was at Pete Maxwell's house where Pat Garret was waiting and where he shot Billy the Kid to death. Poe was so close to Billy he almost brushed against him, that was when Billy the Kid said, "Quien es?" (meaning, "Who is it?"). Poe thought he might have to shoot it out right there on the front porch.

Sophie Poe gave many of these mementoes to Col. Pierson who was then commandant of NMMI. Col. Pierson gave them to Hiram Dow for safe keeping. Dow was a member of NMMI board of regents.

In the case are Sophie Poe's scrap book which includes inspirational poems, valentines, and topical news stories. The scrap book is open to the account of killing of two of Sheriff Poe's best deputies, Jasper Corn and Johnny Hurley, by a gunman named Aragon. Also in the case is Sophie Poe's book, "Backboard Days", now out of print and a real collectors item, which tells of her life in the frontier, especially Old Lincoln County.

Joe Montoya becomes good-guy candidate

SANTA FE — Senate-running Joe Montoya has become a good-guy candidate with the suggestion that people who don't like him for the job should give their money to the other candidate, Republican Sen. Ed Mechem.

Montoya appealed for contributions to his campaign in a widely mailed letter that said: "If you should not favor my election, I would urge you to work for the candidate of your choice and give him your financial support."

Mechem is the only other candidate. The envelopes bearing Montoya's letter were signed in the usual franking place but they also bore 5-cent stamps.

DEMOS CONCERNED ABOUT CAMPAIGN

New Mexico Democrats are concerned about a harder race than they anticipated before the Republican convention.

The San Francisco convention revealed a much stronger Goldwater organization than had been suspected.

It caught state Democrats without a coordinated state campaign program and brought all the candidates together in a secret unity meeting in Santa Fe last Sunday.

TOO MUCH LOAD FOR CHAIRMAN

A closely organized campaign as usually conducted by the Democrats was considered early this summer to be too much of a burden for state Chairman John Morris, who has just turned eighty, and most of the candidates decided to go alone while not anticipating much trouble from the Republicans.

It resulted in at least four independent campaign organizations, each with its own money and management.

Joe Montoya for the Senate with Fred Stanley in charge; Gov. Jack Campbell with Duke Mayhark running the campaign; Johnny Walker for Congress with Corporation Commissioner Murray Morgan masterminding.

There was also the indication that U. S. Rep. Tom Morris would have his own organization operating under Mike Gallegos of the Morris staff.

ALL AGREE ON HARMONY

Publication of the multi-column campaign and the plight of the little candidates without organizations of their own brought all the candidates into an unannounced huddle at state headquarters in Santa Fe last Sunday.

They agree to work closely through the party organization and to provide the money needed for general party purpose which would include something for the minor candidates.

STATEHOUSE IN A HURRY

State Personnel Director Harold Bibb is up from \$750 a month to \$850 in little more than a year. Blackie Gonzales, \$630-a-month member of the state auditor's staff resigned this month after being told by Auditor Alex Armijo that he would have to quit the state or a business enterprise that he conducted in Santa Fe. Santa Fe County Commissioner Armando Larragante has sold his liquor license to Fayless Drug of Santa Fe for \$15,000.

Statehouse politicians are pointing to Tom Wheaton, of Taos as the most independent Demo county chairman of the north. He's not on the public payroll, has no kids on the payroll, and bucked the organization in supporting Emmett Hart for attorney general and Fabian Chavez for Congress in the May primary.

Congress-running Johnny Walker is confident. His Santa Fe residence is for sale.

FIRST COMPLAINT ON INCOME TAX

Two criminal complaints brought against Elmer Garcia of Santa Fe for not paying state income tax for 1961 and '62 are believed to be the first ever filed under the 31-year-old law.

The income tax charges are tied in with charges brought against Garcia that accuse him of bribing delinquent tax officer Ambrosio Duran in the 1961-62 period.

The state has made many audits and investigations relating to the income tax but there is no record of criminal action being brought against anyone under the 1933 law before the Garcia complaints were filed.

The offense is a felony subject to imprisonment for more than a year.

RETIREMENT TALK SOUNDS GENUINE

Sen. Clint Anderson's talk of retiring from the Senate at a time just before he came under serious surgery has set politicians guessing on the likely successor if he should quit.

Most think it would be Gov. Jack Campbell who could resign like former Gov. Ed Mechem and have himself appointed by the lieutenant governor who would step up to the governorship.

Also discussed are U. S. Rep. Tom Morris, Senator Anderson's son Sherburne Anderson of Albuquerque, Ralph Trigg of Albuquerque, Robert McKinney of Santa Fe.

Anderson is on a term that expires in 1966. If he should retire it would probably be some time before the election in 1966, if the state has a Democratic governor.

Central Electric Co-op observes 15th year

The 1964 annual meeting of the Central New Mexico Electric Cooperative will be held Wednesday, August 5, at the Mountainair high school gym. Registration will begin at 10:00 a.m. and the meeting will be called to order at 11:00 a.m. by the president, Mr. Donald Martin.

The welcome address will be by Mr. John E. Hall, attorney. Reading of minutes, etc., will be by Nolan Vickrey, secretary.

The voting, report of election, entertainment, and drawing of door prizes will be in the afternoon.

A free chuck wagon dinner will be served at the noon hour.

B. F. Sumner, manager of the Central New Mexico Electric Cooperative, states in his annual report that this is the 15th year since the first section of line was energized, and there were 368 miles of line serving less than 400 consumers. At the present time there are 2,350 miles of line serving 3,362 consumers.

Mr. Sumner says much credit is due to the members, the original board of trustees which consisted of Mr. Ben Roberts, president, Corona; Mr. James Garner, Carrizozo; A. E. Hunt-singer, Vaughn; Alex Hindi, Duran; Archie Straghan (deceased), Vaughn; B. C. Berryman, Cedarvale; and Mrs. Frances Lovelace, Corona; and succeeding boards and employees.

Power is supplied to the cooperative by the Plains Generation and Transmission Cooperation of Algodones.

The system is made up of 2,350 miles of line in nine counties with six substations for delivery of power at these load centers: Moriarty, Estancia, Mountainair, Corona, Duran and Vaughn.

Bill Winchester and Harold Porterfield are linemen in the Corona area.

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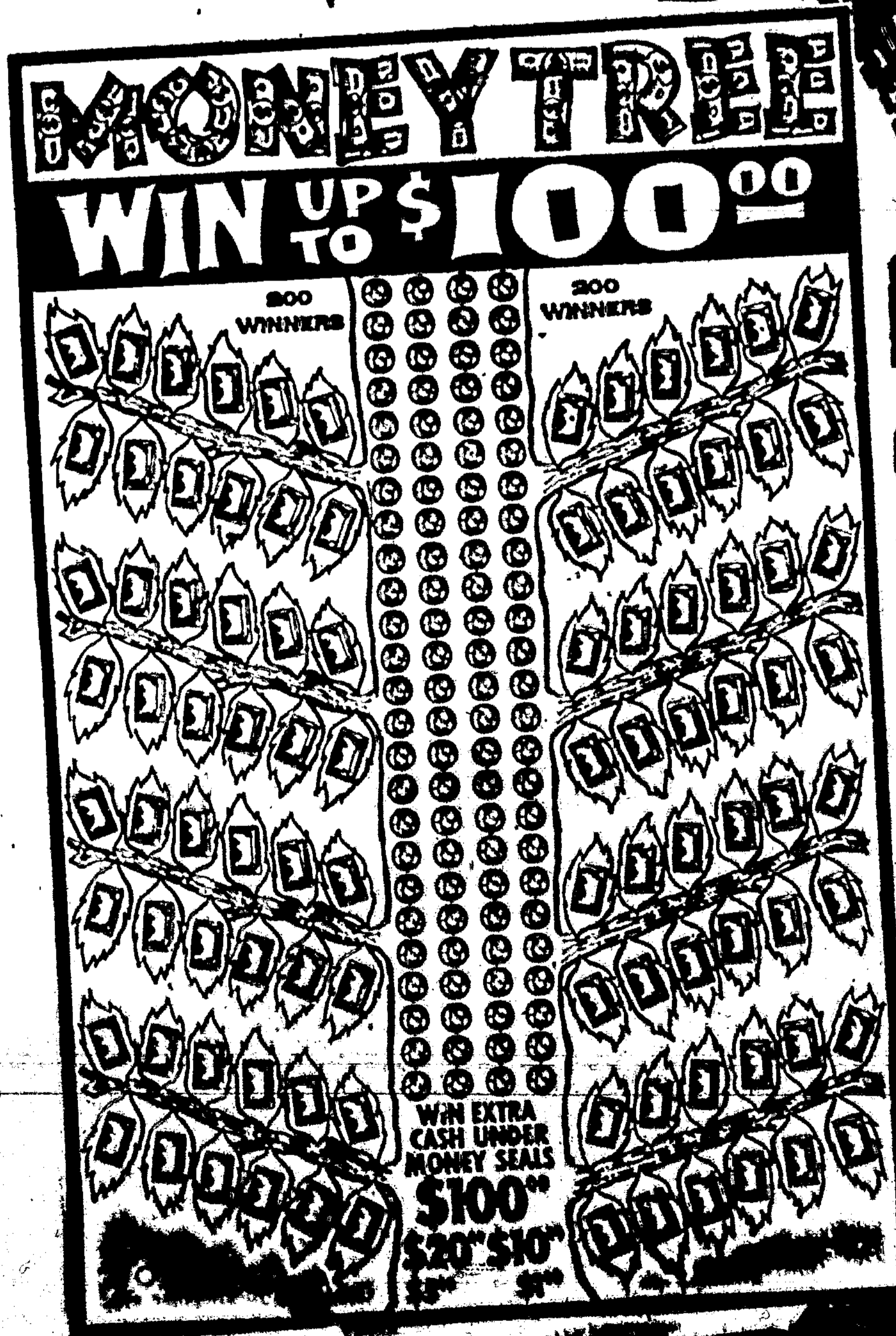

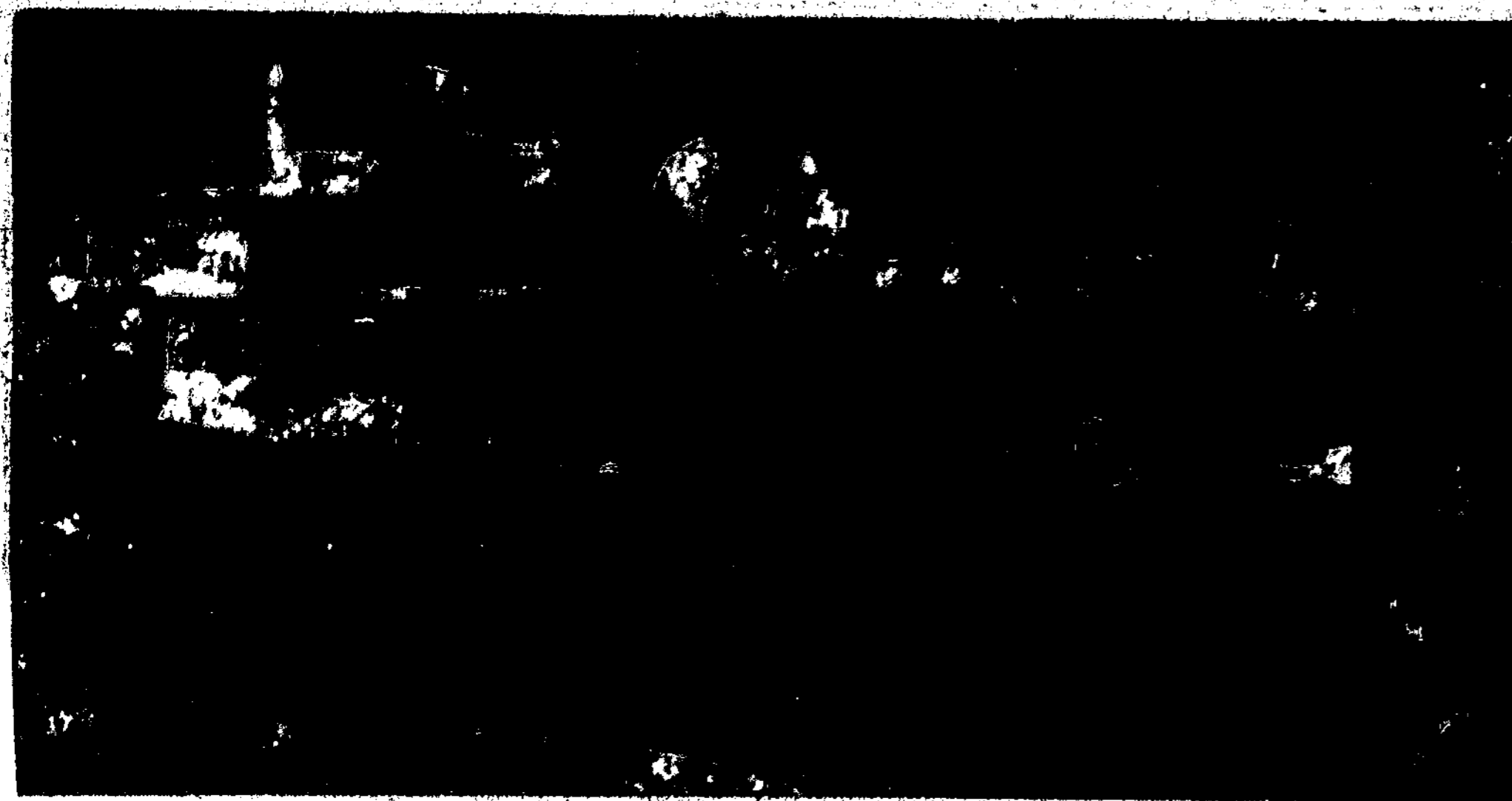

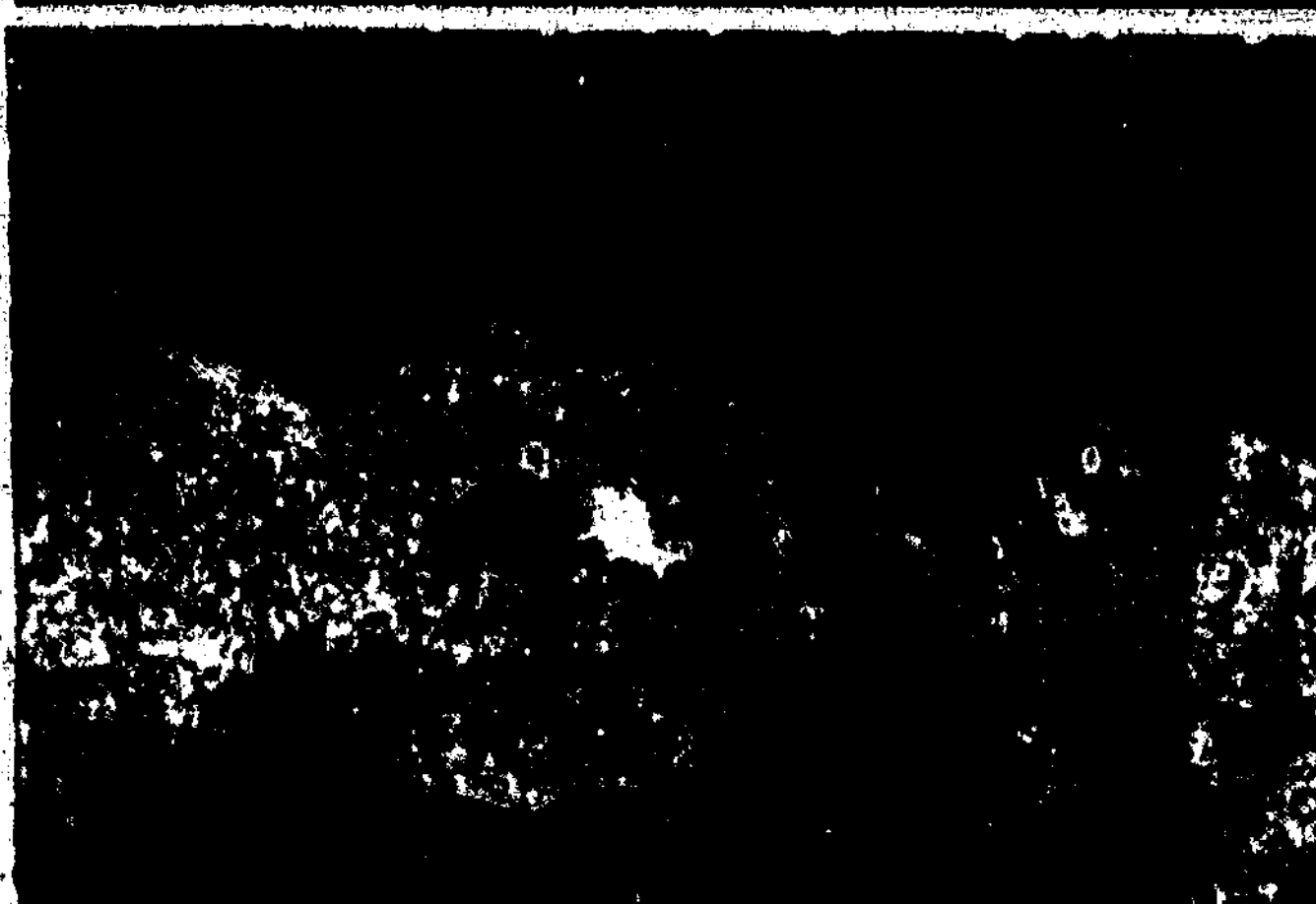

After Billy?

Lincoln County will be reliving some of its history this week in the finest tradition of the old west which was typified by actions of our best known characters, Billy the Kid, Bowdre, Olinger, Bell, Garrett, Brady, Buckshot Roberts, Tunstall, McSween and many others.

To say that these men believed in "action" would be over simplification. To say that their actions were all lawless is equally wrong. After viewing the crime and disturbance scene in this nation in the year 1964, it could be truthfully said that the action of the people in the Lincoln County War days disturbed only a small minority, violent as they were, in comparison to riots now going on in the east.

"Action" is a word that fits the west, where the main problem is that of keeping up with expansion, partially brought about by normal growth, partially by people wanting to get

away from crowded and poor living conditions in the east, and partially just taking advantage of the many opportunities that have been here since the Lincoln War.

Like Gene Mann, recent Captain speaker, said, "Complaining is not the way, better we do something about the poor conditions in the place we live." First . . . we've got to open our eyes and see. Look on each side of the path we follow each day. Take stock of the natural beauty of our surroundings and the man-made trash that obscures this view.

Once our eyes are opened we'll find there are many things that would appeal to strangers (tourists) and many ways to beautify surroundings and improve conditions for our own benefit — besides the attraction of names in history books, and early-day action that made this section of the country famous.

Officials indicate the letter is probably authentic. But no one knows how a letter addressed to the frontier sheriff who killed Billy the Kid ended up in Los Angeles 83 years after it was written.
