Mrs. Lupe (Priscilla) Otero killed

Friday in head-on collision on US70

Mrs. Lupe (Priscilla) Otero, 43, of Corona died about 11:00 p.m. Friday of multiple injuries received in a head-on collision 5.7 miles east of Tularosa on U.S. 70.

State Police Officer Andrew Benavidez said a 1960 Rambler driven by El Paso Police Lieut. Glenn Oliver Gray was traveling east, when due to the rain his car ran off the road to the right, went into a spin and ran head-on into the 1961 Chevrolet driven by Lupe Otero, both vehicles ending in the north ditch.

Gray is in serious condition and his two daughters, 14 and 10, were both killed.

Other passengers in the Otero car were 8-year-old Andres Otero who received a fractured leg and jaw, and his 10-year-old brother, David, who reportedly escaped injuries.

Mr. Otero was admitted to the Alamogordo hospital with a fractured right arm and facial lacerations, not believed to be serious.

Funeral services were held the first of the week in Roswell for Mrs. Otero. The Otero's other son, Carlos, who was just recently discharged from the Service, was at home in Corona at the time of the accident.

"A page for independent thought"

About the press

It takes a smart person to separate "smear writing" from "honest reporting". The casual reader of only one daily newspaper, maybe one magazine is not getting a full and honest report of many situations, particularly politics.

The nomination of Barry Goldwater by Republicans set off a wave of "anti" publicity both at home and abroad. The foreign part of this publicity was particularly abusive and objectionable.

Foreign correspondents probably never heard of Lincoln County, or even New Mexico.

They are concentrated in Washington and New York, and their opinions come largely from bureaucratic types who follow only an administration line — there are two sides.

We simply do not need help from England, or any other country, in the selection of our president. Nor should Washington reports be responsible for molding voter opinion.

It's a tall task — to be well informed on national issues. The least one can do is keep an open mind and attempt to sort out honest reporting from obvious lies.

Are you satisfied?

The early-day publisher of the Denver Post, Fred Bonfils, contended, "There is no hope for a satisfied man." Bonfils surely used "man" to mean both men and women . . . and since men and women make up a town, the truth does not have to be stretched to say, "There is no hope for a satisfied town."

We do not mean one should go around knocking the home town, complaining can get to be a habit and accomplish little. On the other hand, one should be able to see where there is room for improvement, and push for action along these lines.

The county seat of Lincoln County "summers" in pretty good shape. Just enough extra activity, travelers and work-

ers, to make for pretty good business. What the winter will bring (moisture would help) is a different story.

A professional baby-sitter said this week, "All but one of my baby families have moved away." Some of these families moved for good reasons, others because of lack of suitable housing and other reasons.

The recent closure of three small business places does not mean that business is not here, but the vacancies have cut down on some available service.

First there must be leadership, and the leadership should be optimistic enough to feel that a hard winter can be softened some, and dissatisfied enough to realize that improvements can be made.

Three cheers for state

A news release this week lets us know that New Mexico State University will start a new department next fall — Journalism and Mass Communications — and we're glad.

The intent of Harvey C. Jacobs, head of the new department, is to make it a place where journalists can be prepared, and also a service center for all communications media in New Mexico.

Competent journalists are not prepared in college . . . but

such departments do a valuable service in directing young people in to the field of journalism and other media.

The field of mass communication is vital today, and becoming more important all the time. As the world becomes more complex the worth of honest reporting increases in value. We have a high regard for the outlook and background of young people in the southwest, they are needed in journalism.

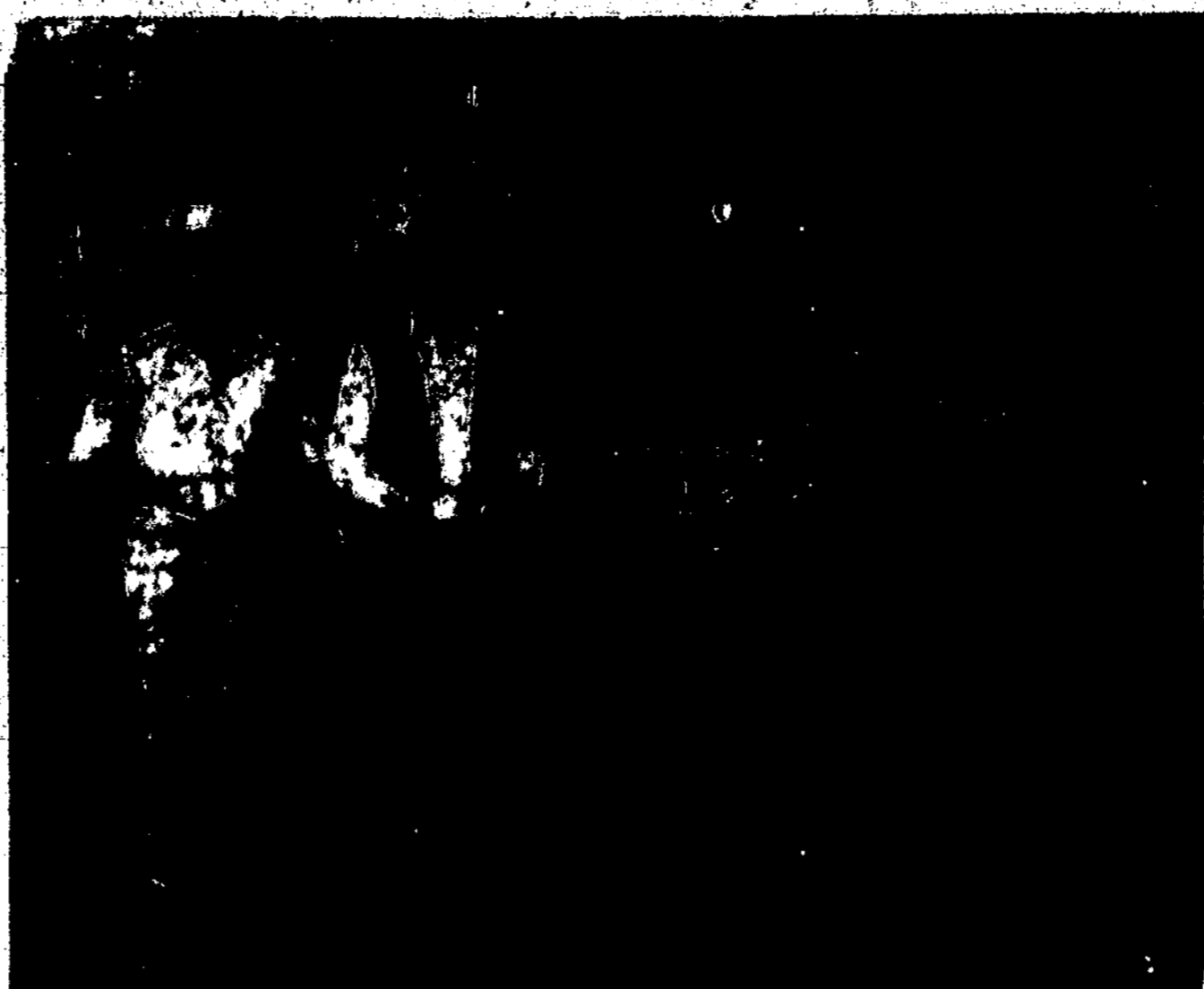
