
Coach Melvin Romero has 5 starters back for the 1964 football season and expects a squad of around 50 boys out for practice with the start of school,

Public defenders may occupy court houses

PUBLIC DEFENDERS SEEN FOR STATE

SANTA FE - Public defenders, the opposite number to prosecuting attorneys, may occupy courthouse offices next year as a result of the state supreme court ruling directing that legal counsel be available for criminal defendants at every stage of prosecution.

Lawyers in and out of the state government and some legislators have been talking up the defender operation to meet the problem of providing lawyers for indigent defendants at preliminary hearings in JP courts and at other stages of

Those discussing the proposal think public defenders should be established at first in only the more populous judicial dis-

REPublicans Frar ALBUQUERQUE VOTE

Some Republicans are itching to start a campaign fight over state office leases in a proposed 18-story building in Albuquerque but are afraid they might offend the big Albuquerque Gov. Jack Campbell has pres-

sed through some twenty leases for office space in the building for state boards and agencies which are presently paying \$161,000 rent and would pay \$297,000 in the new structure. Among leases is one for the

Cattle Sanitary Board which is presently paying \$8,232 for 4,800 feet of office space and would pay \$11,480 a year for 2870 feet in the new building. The board voted unanimously against taking the lease but agreed to sign up the next day after a visit with the governor.

The building is proposed by

the National Building Corp. of Nashville for completion in early 1967.

Mrs. Lupe (Priscilla) Otero, 43, of Corona died about 11:00 p.m. Friday of multiple injuries received in a head-on collision 5.7 miles east of Tularosa on U.S. 70.

State Police Officer Andrew Benavidez said a 1960 Rambler driven by El Paso Police Lieut. Glenn Oliver Gray was traveling east, when due to the rain his car ran off the road to the right, went into a spin and ran head-on into the 1961 Chevrolet driven by Lupe Otero, both vehicles ending in the north

Gray is in serious condition and his two daughters, 14 and 10. were both killed.

Other passengers in the Otero car were 8-year-old Andres Otero who received a fractured leg and jaw, and his 10-year-old brother, David, who reportedly escaped injuries.


