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STATE OF ARKANSAS GOVERNOR CANDIDATE

Rockefeller is Republican speaker

Republicans from all over the state of New Mexico will gather in Ruidoso Downs this Sunday, September 20, for a rally that is expected to draw the largest crowd ever to attend a political event in Lincoln County.

Winthrop Rockefeller, Republican candidate opposing Democratic incumbent Orval Faubus for governor of the state of Arkansas is the featured speaker at the meeting in Ruidoso Downs.

Rockefeller will arrive in Roswell Saturday night by private plane where he will be the overnight guest of Robert O. Anderson. The party will drive to Ruidoso Downs Sunday with

Republican leaders including Anderson.

Rockefeller will be at the Ice-O-Rama building next to the Chaparral at 1:00 p.m. At 4:00 p.m. the rally will move to Denton baseball field for a barbecue. Rockefeller's address will be at 6:00 p.m. back in the Ice-O-Rama building.

Much speculation is going on over the nation and especially in Arkansas as to whether or not Rockefeller can beat Faubus. Rockefeller was appointed as chairman of the Arkansas Industrial Development Commission in 1955 by Gov. Faubus. The A. I. D. C. became the hottest state developer in the country and the image of Arkansas hillbillies was changed to a state that was on the move. Rockefeller has a farm that is a showplace in Arkansas, visited by 125,000 Arkansans every year. He is also the owner of Winrock Center in Albuquerque, N. M.

New Mexico Republicans will probably know more about the race in Arkansas following the Sunday meeting.

Sen. Ed Mechem will lead a

large delegation of state and county candidates to the rally in Ruidoso Downs. On his way to this rally Sen. Mechem will stop in Capitan at 1:00 p.m. to present a flag to the Smokey Bear Museum. Mrs. Ralph Solether will represent the museum at the presentation.

The Republican Women's organization of Lincoln County is planning a baked goods auction at the Republican Rally. Those attending will have a chance to bid on home made cakes, pies and cookies.

Governor candidate expected Friday

Republican governor candidate Merle Tucker will visit in Lincoln County Friday, September 18, and be on hand for the rally at Ruidoso Downs Sunday. Tucker is expected here Friday morning, will immediately contact Carrizozo precinct chairman Glen Bradley and then tour the business area. Local Republicans are invited to be on hand for his visit.

Goldwater to be in Albuquerque

ALBUQUERQUE (Special) — U. S. Senator and presidential nominee Barry Goldwater will appear in Albuquerque, N. M. on September 22 during a swing through the southwest. Anderson, state Republican coordinator for Goldwater-Miller, announced today.

Arriving in mid afternoon, the senator will be escorted from the Albuquerque Sunspot to university stadium where 15,000 persons are expected to hear him make a 25-minute address. The program will get underway at the stadium at 1:45 p.m. In case of rain the Senator will appear at the civic auditorium in Albuquerque.

Goldwater flies from Amarillo to Albuquerque and will go on to an appearance at Midland-Odessa, Texas.

Auto agency is new capitol giant

SANTA FE — The state Motor Vehicle Department which operated in the 1959-60 year with an appropriation of \$700,000 is presently on a spending schedule of about \$2.8 million a year and handling the same responsibilities as those of five years ago.

The operation which until a few years ago was one of the smaller divisions of the Bureau of Revenue has grown bigger than the bureau in spending and personnel.

There are more than 350 on the payroll.

COLLECTS MONEY AND SPENDS IT

It is the only agency in the state government that is operating on fees collected without legislative control on how much can be spent.

It has replaced the Bureau of Revenue as the statehouse catch-all in political patronage.

GROWING BIGGER AS FEES GROW

In the 1962-63 business year the department spent approximately \$1,147,000.

During the year that ended last June 30, the 1963-64 business year the spending was approximately \$2 million.

The present spending is at the rate of about \$2.8 million a year.

SAME FUNCTIONS FOR 20 YEARS

The department is still handling the same functions as required by law for the past 20 years:

Automobile licensing, handling of automobile titles and automobile brake and light stickers, enforcement of the automobile liability insurance laws, and driver licenses.

The change came about in the abolishment of local commission agents and their replacement throughout the state by full-time employees.

The cost is covered by new service fees authorized by the 1963 legislature and endorsed by Gov. Jack Campbell.

ONLY THE GOVERNOR CAN LIMIT SPENDING

The department operates with a limited appropriation from the legislature and is permitted to spend the fees collected with only the approval of the governor's finance officer required.

The fees this year will run close to \$1.5 million which will be available in addition to the \$1.3 million given the department by the legislature.

THREE INCREASES IN MAY AND JUNE

The department's spending authority has been jumped as the fee collection increases.

Last May an increase of \$773,000 was approved, another the same month of \$137,000 and (Continued on back page)

Bear killer's jury trial set for September 21

The trial of Dave Hawks Ruidoso carpenter, who was charged August 1, with killing a bear during closed season, by Dwight Bowden, State Game conservationist and Nanda Mauldin and Joe Dunlap of the State Game and Fish Department, has been set for a jury trial in the District court at Carrizozo on September 21, at 9:30 a.m.

Hawk's case was heard September 5, by Justice of the Peace R. L. Sherrill, where on advise of his attorney H. Elfred Jones, Hawks plead not guilty and was arraigned to the District court for a jury trial.

Haws contends he killed the bear on his own property to protect his wife and five small children.

"A page for independent thought"

Drama in total war

The platform of the Democratic party promises "to carry the war on poverty forward as a total war." It is our intent in this column of independent thought to give every help to this party in their all-out war, knowing as we do that wars are a dreadful thing, which have, through all of history, wrought much hardship on people, and knowing that the Johnson administration is on the lookout for earthy solutions of its earthy world-wide problem.

This administration is a great one for putting on a show, even in war times. Some of us are used to drama in three acts but not Johnson and we're afraid, as he goes to war on poverty, that he will do as the preacher in church preaching to the lone cowboy — unload the whole darn load. Such as the Economic Opportunity Act, the Appalachian Redevelopment Act, the Equal Pay Act, the Manpower Development and Training Act, and a full dozen more are keeping the people up after hours to get their money's worth out of their tickets. It wouldn't be near so bad but they want us to have a new ticket, each at a higher price for every one of the acts and we didn't bring that much money.

Probably a "first" of helps for the great dramatist and his administrative staff, is a suggested scale of poverty. Take Lincoln County as a good sample. Those people in Ruidoso are only poverty stricken about nine months out of the year and don't need "full help" from Johnson. They should be classed as only 70 per cent poor. Go on down in the country around Pico where they can eat apples in the summer and butcher a sheep in the winter, these people are mighty well off and in spite of not having many loose jobs they couldn't be classed as more than 60% poverty stricken.

Up there in Ken Fuller's neck of the woods things are pretty tough around Corona but then there aren't so many people, and fewer people don't get near

as hungry as a lot of people. They couldn't possibly be more than 50% poverty stricken. Buck this way toward Ancho there's hardly any poverty at all because that spot is where the Jicarilla gold is which brought so many people through the last depression.

Probably the most jarring note in the county is the area just outside of Carrizozo where jackrabbits are so scarce a man can't even stir a rabbit stew. Crockett finally had to get out of the goat-business things were too tough. Of course, some of this desolation seeps into town and makes people request another "Act", especially when Otero County dust is blowing 50 MPH through the cracks in the windows. This area would be classed at 80 per cent poverty stricken if it were not for the fact that the bean and cheese warehouse is here and once a month we eat well.

There is always a bright side to every dark cloud and in this county it is Mayor Gerald Dean's town of Capitan where there just isn't much poverty. Take a look at the stomachs on guys like Gerald, Grady, Sid, Miles, and Johnnie and you know they have been eating well.

We sure hope Johnson gets the message that poverty is worse in some places than in others right here in Lincoln County. We've got a little more of everything than any other place in the world, but that is not the way to judge poverty as Johnson well knows. In Lincoln County people stir up a pot of tax cuts, mix in some '64 inflation, strain out the fiscal responsibility, and eat well once a day, feeling pretty good as we push back from the table knowing that Johnson will provide medicine, more social security more unemployment insurance, training and retraining, more commodities, more housing and more handouts on every hand.

Why should we worry... our only worry is that the gags between acts are all old... we heard them ten years ago. War is hell without a laugh once in a while.

on June 20 another of \$74,000. The Legislature Finance Committee staff recently completed a long report on the department operation and spending but it was suspended until the legislature meets next January.

BENNY SANCHEZ MAKES OWN RULES
The motor vehicle commissioner is Benny Sanchez who is possessed of rather remarkable administrative abilities which have often carried him far beyond the limitations of the law.

He went so far in the inauguration of new practices in 1959 and '60 that extensive new legislation was required from the 1961 legislature to legalize what he had done.

This time he is charging a 10-cent fee on brake and light stickers that is not authorized by law.

SOUTHERN UNION RETURNS \$205,000
The state Public Service Commission which is supposed to regulate public utilities has come around to requiring new reports from gas companies after Southern Union was caught with \$205,000 collected from Curry county farmers that it wasn't supposed to have.

The money was ordered returned to 170 farmers who had been assessed charges of around \$1,500 each for the cost of a pipeline after the line had already been paid for by the farmers.

CLINT SUPPORTS SUPREME COURT
Sen. Clint Anderson who was recently quoted in Washington as favoring every county having a state senator changed directions a couple of days later and joined the fight against any restriction on the federal courts in dealing with state legislature memberships.

This came after the state's two Democratic representatives, Joe Montoya and Tom Morris, voted for the radical Tuck bill which would flat keep the court out of the legislative membership matters.

The Dirksen measure that Anderson is opposing in the Senate is much milder. It would merely delay federal action on state legislatures for a period while a federal constitution amendment is considered.

It is the first time the Democratic trio has been so widely divided. Anderson usually calls the shots for all three.

NEW LEGISLATURE IN PROSPECT HERE
Unless Congress does something to check the courts or the federal constitution is changed New Mexico and all the other states stand to have their entire legislative membership based on population. The present practice here is one senator for each county. Albuquerque would have nearly a dozen in the formula laid down by the supreme court.
