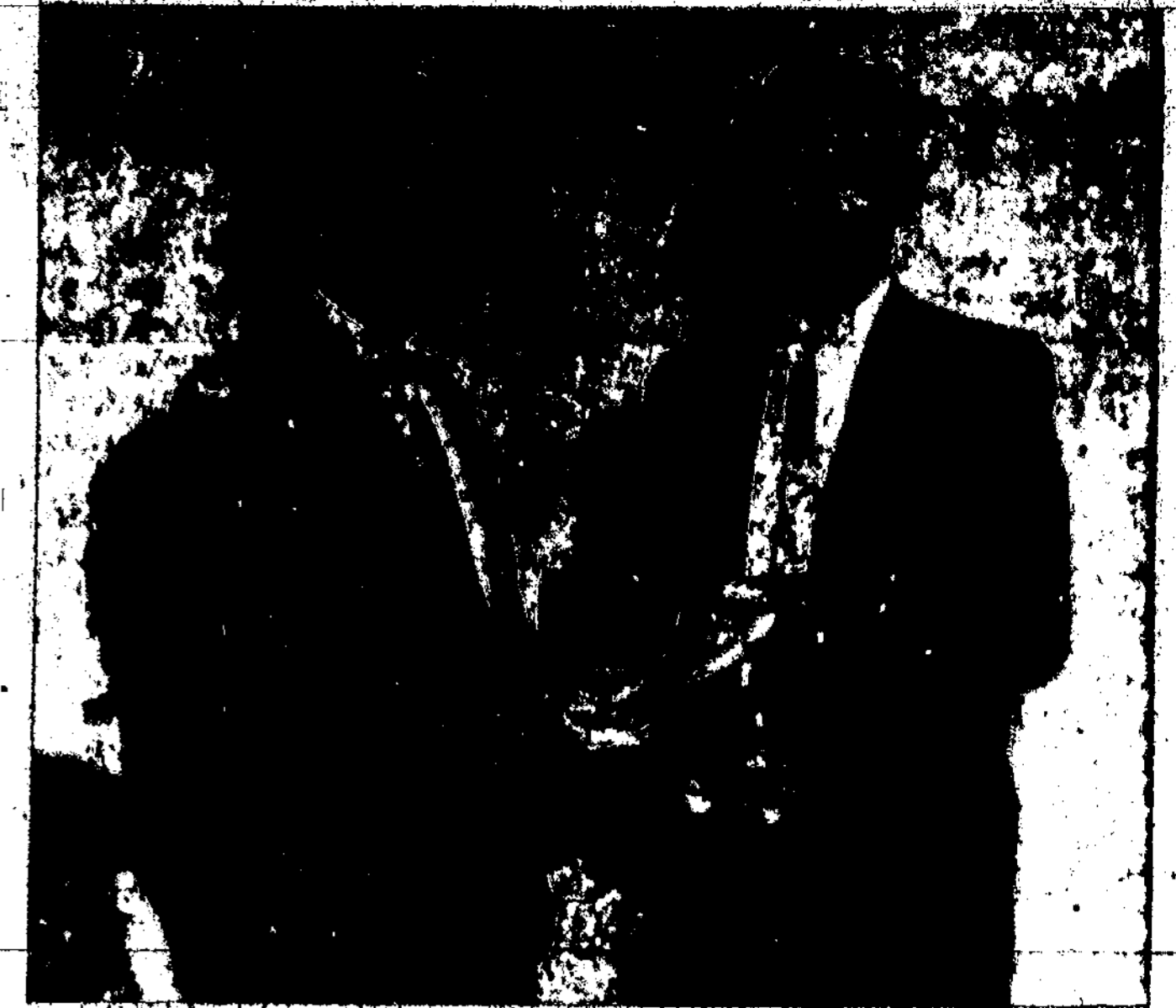

Excellent conservation program brings award

Alex Hindi buys 17, 588 acres

SANTA FE — The State Land Office has sold 17,588 acres of state grazing land to a Duran, N. M. rancher for \$140,704.

The land was bought by Alex Hindi, who has been leasing the land from the state and included tracts in Lincoln, Torrance and Guadalupe counties. Hindi had also made a total of \$112,811 in improvements on the three parcels of land. He was the only bidder in sales held by the land office Thursday and Friday.

The appraised value of the land, according to the land office, was \$8 per acre.

The land consists of: 5869 acres in one tract and 490 acres in another tract in Lincoln, Torrance and Guadalupe counties.

Bryan Hightower was selected to receive the 1964 Bankers Award for outstanding soil conservation achievements in the Carrizozo Soil and Water Conservation District. An engraved plaque was presented by John-son Stearns of the Lincoln County Branch at a dinner held September 17.

This is the first program of this nature in the Carrizozo District. The purpose of the Award is to recognize outstanding work in soil conservation. The program was sponsored by the Citizens State Bank in co-operation with the Board of Supervisors of the Carrizozo SWCD.

The basis for selecting the outstanding conservation rancher is the conservation program on an individual ranch over a period of years. Bryan Hightower is well known for the excellent care he has taken of his land. He has been conscious of the importance of protecting our natural resources and has practiced conservation ever since he has owned land. A few of the practices applied on the Hightower ranch in the last six years are as follows:

Brush control - approximately 8000 acres; Erosion control dam - 15 ; Tanks 3; Range rippling 280 acres; Range seeding 1435 acres; Stockwater pipelines 13460 L. F.

In addition to these, proper range use and good range management have been the basis of his operation.

Attending the banquet were the SCS supervisors and wives. Truman Spencer, retiring chairman, said we're making a lot of new people but no new land. There's no work to being a supervisor, just a lot of cussing' but it's been wonderful working with the board of supervisors.

Jennings Jarvis, administrative officer for the state soil conservation committee, was guest speaker.

Pest control committee busy

Lincoln County Rep. W. C. Shreevogost has been serving on the draft committee of the Pest Control Compact. This compact originated at the western conference of state governors and now includes all states in the nation.

There is an insurance fund in the compact which can be used by states that are doing everything possible to control pests, but lack adequate funds to complete the job. A state cannot designate itself as needing funds, another state must make such designation.

Rep. Shreevogost cited the screwworm control as a job well done by the Pest Control Compact, cotton people in the south, forest people in Colorado have pest problems and are getting help through the compact. The hazards are that pests will spread from one state to another.

Rep. Vern Vivian of Wyoming is chairman of the committee which has 15 members, five of them active legislators.

Three meetings have been held. The next will be in Chicago in December. Rep Shreevogost will represent the legislative branch of State of New Mexico at this meeting.

Barry's decline imperils Ed

SANTA FE — Declining enthusiasm for Goldwater in New Mexico has raised a serious question about the safety of Sen. Ed Mechem in the only contest of real significance in the state election this year.

There is a discernable falling away of Goldwater support in New Mexico and discouragement in his workers is seen at every hand from the daily barrage of bad news about their candidate, and Mechem is tied to Goldwater in every detail.

LANDSLIDE VOTE WOULD CINCH JOE

Last summer it appeared that Goldwater would come close to breaking even in New Mexico and that Mechem would run a little better because of his personal following and probably be elected.

Now it seems that he will have to run quiet a bit better than Goldwater to get in ahead of Demo Joe Montoya.

He probably couldn't overcome a Johnson landslide such as the state gave Dwight Eisenhower in 1952, a majority of 40,630, or even the Eisenhower lead of 26,000 in 1952.

ED RAN AHEAD OF DICK NIXON

In 1960 Republican Dick Nixon lost the state to John Kennedy by 2,300 and Mechem by running a little ahead of the presidential candidate was elected governor by 1,800.

Prospects at this point six weeks in front of the election

don't indicate such a close finish in the presidential race in the state. Johnson should run better here than Kennedy. Of course, that's a September estimation of the November election.

A MARKED CHOICE IN SENATE RACE

The Mechem-Montoya race offers the voters a "choice" even more pronounced than that of Goldwater and Johnson. They are oceans apart.

The state has had both of them in public office so long that all should know by this time which they prefer, and the term is for a long six years.

However, some Democrats who don't like Montoya don't seem to think it is so long. They've been telling that they can throw the Republican Mechem out after a term but would have Montoya for life if he ever got in.

MECHEM MISSES DENNIS CHAVEZ

This is Mechem's first run without the sympathetic Sen. Dennis Chavez standing in the wings.

The powerful Democrat whom Mechem succeeded in the Senate gave Mechem valuable help in his several campaigns for governor and was conspicuously active for him in 1950 and 1956.

Some of the Chavez people are still with Mechem this year but in nothing like the numbers the old senator could command.

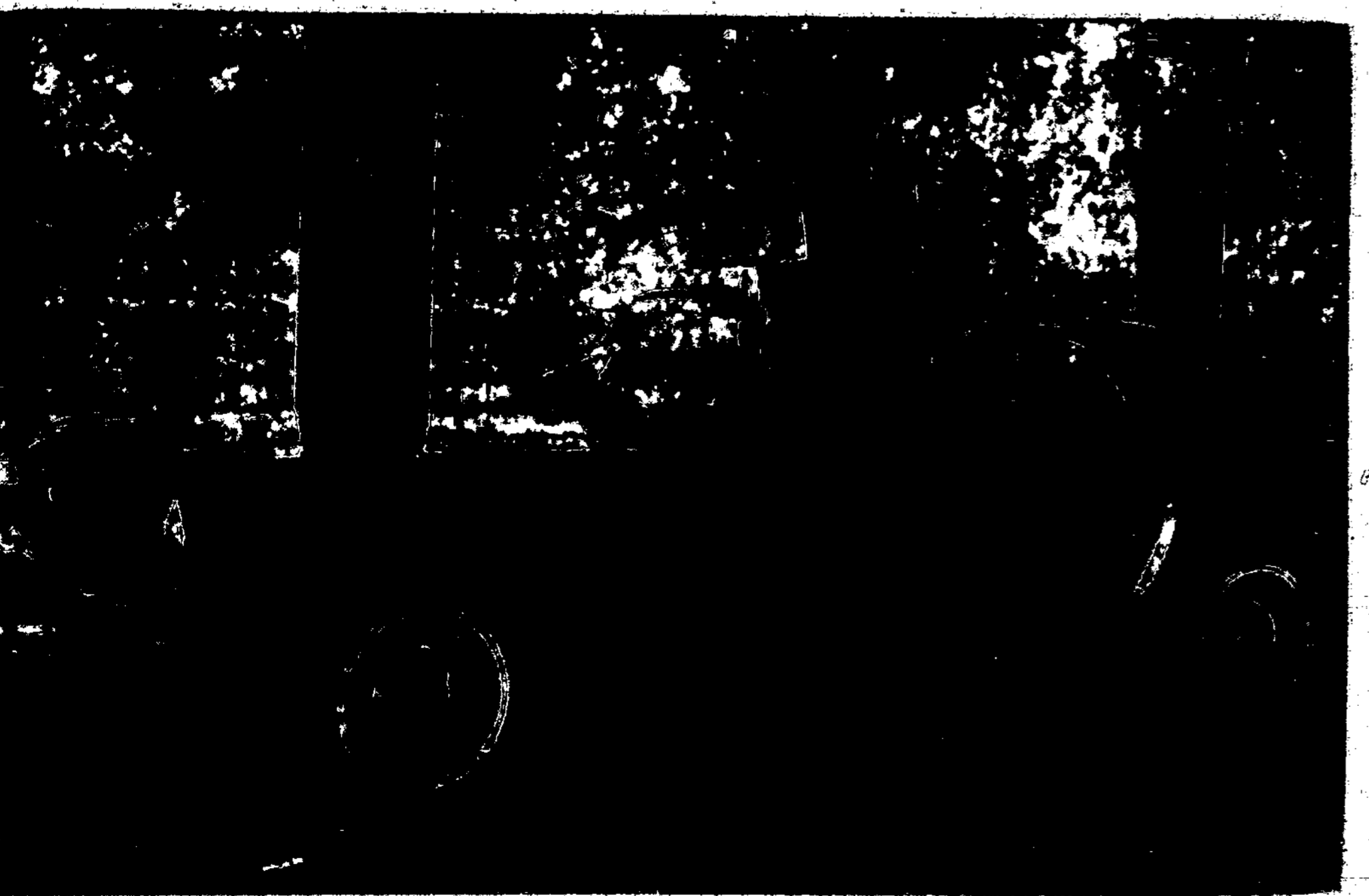
No fine for killing bear out-of-season but negligence in reporting costs

In Justice of Peace Friday Sherrill's court Monday David Hillman Hawks was fined \$25 and \$7.50 court cost for his negligence in not reporting to the Game Department the fact that he had killed a bear. Hawks has been in Rudoso, where the incident occurred, for two years and works for S. B. Boykin Bonanza Homes.

Hawks was represented by attorney H. Elfred Jones and told the following story about the bear: He had no experience with bears previous, has five children, the oldest six year. About June 15 this year the bear started coming around the house, he and his family saw the bear lots of time. The bear would tear up garbage, got braver and came in the yard where he damaged their bar-b-q oven. Hawks estimated the bear to weigh 400 pounds.

On a more recent occasion the bear looked in the house window, scared the youngsters. About four days later Mr. Hawks drove in from work at Clovis, heard the bear at the garbage pail and decided it was time to get rid of him. He got some shells out of a shed, sat down on his pickup and shot the bear. Next day he got three friends, loaded the bear in his pickup and hauled it off and dumped in a canyon. Mr. Hawks said he realizes now he should have contacted the Game Department.

Judge Sherrill, in making the fine, stated he was not fining Hawks for killing the bear, but for his negligence in not notifying the Department who were as close as his phone.

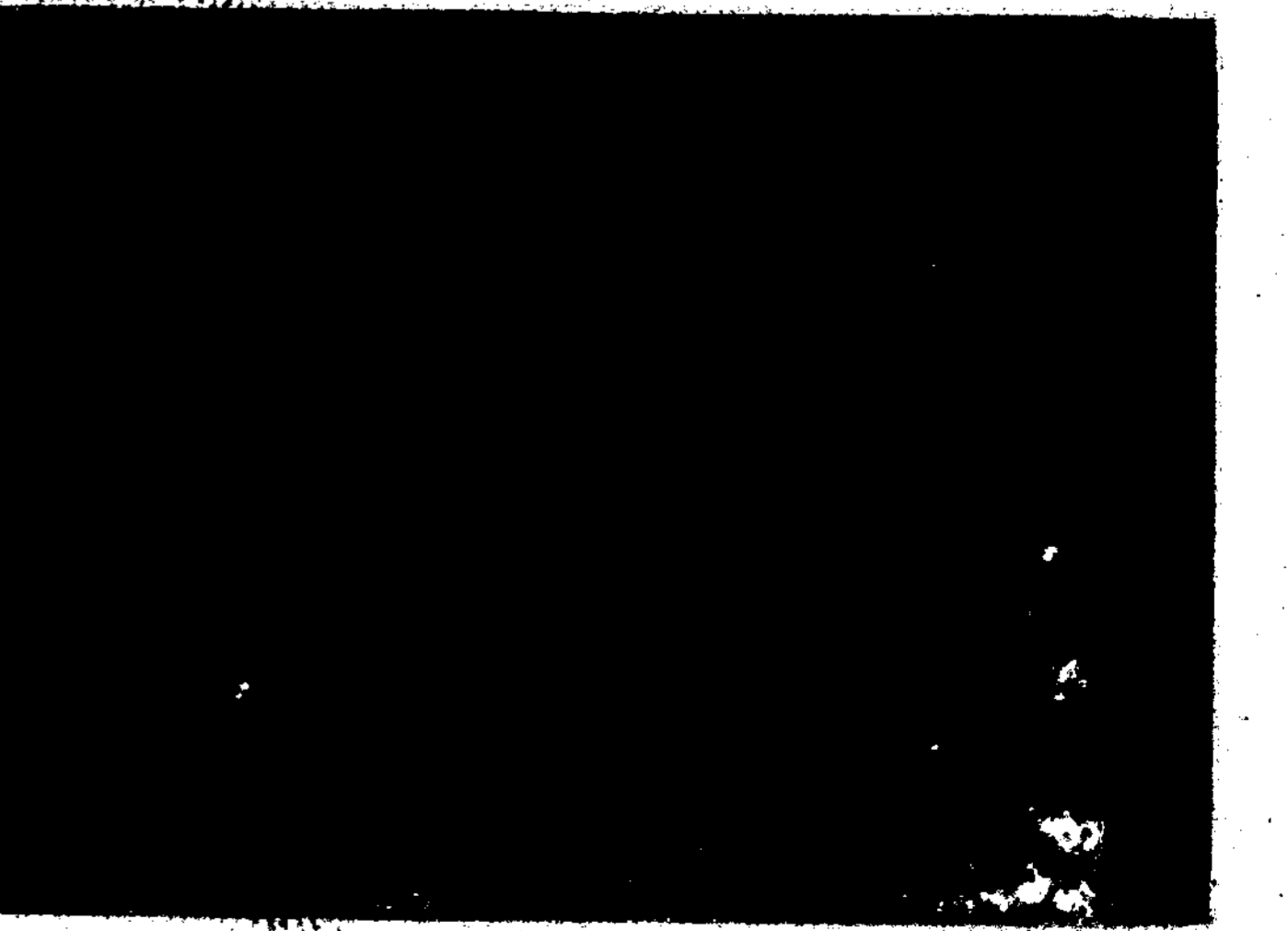
