New Corona Postoffice dedication on Monday

Corona's new post office will be dedicated at 10:00 a.m. on Oct. 5. Postmaster Fuller announced today.

The new facility is part of the Post Office Department's lease construction program.

"The fact that Corona has been chosen for a new post office," Postmaster Fuller said, "reflects credit on our growing contribution to the economy and life of the nation."

Meanwhile, for the local postal dedication, the Postmaster announced that the following

are among the guests expected to attend: Frank W. Anderson, of the Regional Office in Denver, Congressman Joseph M. Montoya and Richard A. King, Real Estate Officer of Albuquerque.

"Our patrons will derive more enjoyment from doing business here, their mail will be handled more efficiently and this building and its up-to-date equipment will enable our postal employees to work under the best of conditions," the Postmaster commented.

Trouble pockets harass Gov. Campbell

SANTA FE — Gov. Jack Campbell who had appeared among the safest of the Democratic candidates is suffering pockets of trouble all over the state that probably can't beat him but might shock him a little when the votes are counted.

A significant number of Democratic party leaders have been indiscreetly confiding their displeasure with the governor.

Generally they complain of not getting the recognition they think they deserve, and some are seriously sore about not getting the job patronage out of Campbell that they had become accustomed to from other Democratic governors.

New Mexico movement for John F. Kennedy, who went to South America for the Labor Department and returned to union employment in Washington, is back in the state campaign for Joe Montoya for the Senate. Robles was a New Mexico delegate to the Los Angeles convention that nominated Kennedy.

ATOMIC WORKERS CONCERN CLINT

Sen. Clint Anderson in his fight to apportion the membership of state legislatures on a population base said it was needed to give New Mexico's atomic workers a fair voice in the state government.

Los Alamos which has most of New Mexico's atomic workers would lose 25.34 per cent of its representation in the legislature if the system is changed to a population formula.

Area between schools calls for careful driving

The street area between the new school building, the grade school and the high school building is an area which calls for close supervision and very careful driving on the part of all car drivers.

In order to better protect the students (both large and small) as they cross back and forth across the street the following precautions have been taken:

1. Ten M.P.H. signs are placed at the intersections of the street between the two buildings from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.
2. The area immediately between the two buildings has been marked off and designated as STUDENT crossing area.
3. Stop signs are placed in the middle of the street, warning drivers to stop if students are anywhere in the large cross-walk area.
4. Stop signs are also painted

on the street, which serve as an extra precaution, protecting the pedestrian against oncoming traffic even though the portable stop signs are not there.

A vote of appreciation is due the driving public for the precaution and care that most of you are using when driving in this particular area.

May we suggest that you avoid driving in this restricted area if possible. It is the desire of your Board of Education and the Administration to make this area as safe as is humanly possible.

We all are enjoying the added educational facilities which have been made possible through the new building. Now let us all be safety minded enough in our driving to avoid the risk of the loss or injury of a single child.

4-H Clubs score at state

Lincoln County 4-H members did very well at the State Fair in Albuquerque. Pete Gnatkowski placed third in dairy showmanship and had the first place senior-Jersey calf in the Junior Division. Johnny Davis had the champion Columbia ram and cow in the open classes. Dan Knight had the champion Rambouillet ram with Lois and Wayne Dunlap having the champion Rambouillet ewe.

Pete Gnatkowski took several firsts with his Angora goats. In the wool breed division of the lamb carcass Barbara Knight placed first and fourth and Lois Dunlap placed second. In the Junior wool show the Cooper Brothers had the champion fleece with Wayne and Lois Dunlap taking a second place in the half blood class.

A Rambouillet lamb shown by Wayne Dunlap topped the Lincoln County Fair lamb carcass contest with a 3.36 square inches of rib eye and 20 inches of fat on a 49 pound carcass. This is .86 more than the goal of 250 square inches of rib eye per 50 pound carcass set up by the sheep industry. The lamb graded choice and had an acceptable fat cover throughout. This rib eye was better than the lambs in the state carcass contest where the top lamb had 3.07 square inches of rib eye and 30 inches of fat on a 54 pound carcass. Other placings in the lamb carcass contest were: Second Joel Barham, third Jim Bookey, fourth Carrol Cooper, fifth and sixth Joe Cooper. The placings for the Black Face or Crosses in the lamb carcass contest were: First Lois Dunlap, second and third John W. Cooper, fourth Bill Mac-

Velgh, fifth Jim Bookey, sixth Hall placed first, second and third Punk Cooper, fourth Pam Hall, fifth Buddy Hall, sixth of the Lincoln County Fair Zana Jud Cooper.

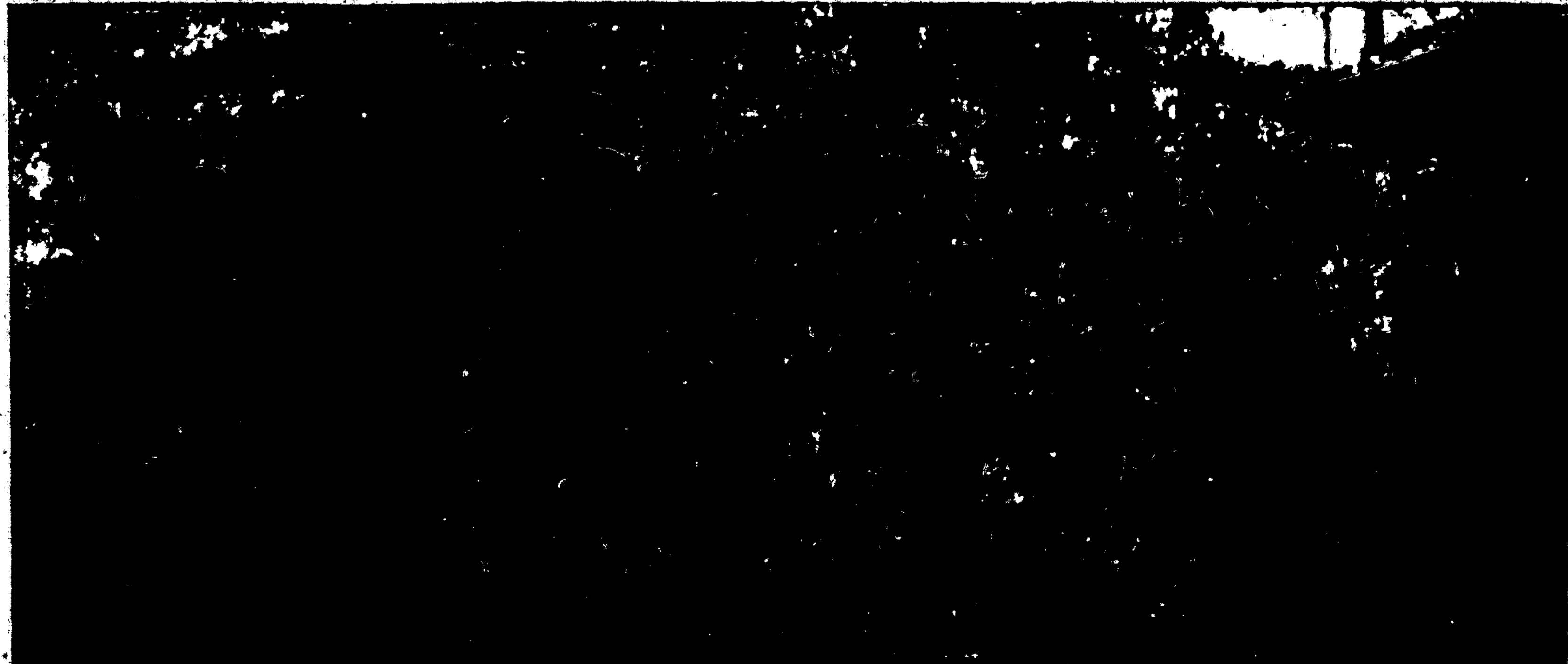
Rumors are generally false, such is the case about the rumor that the City of Alamogordo was going to close Nogal Lake to fishing. It isn't true. The News called Mayor Richard Garner of Alamogordo this morning who said the city had no intent of closing at all. Soon as water is built up in Bonito Lake more water will be diverted to Nogal.

The News reporter informed Mayor Garner that Nogal Lake had a lot more crawdads than fish. He said they would try to eradicate the crawdads soon as they get more water.

When asked for other news, the Mayor said that Alamogordo had just issued permits for construction of 168 new apartments, 16 different buildings in two and three apartment units, Mauldine and Associates are backing the project using FHA money and about \$250,000 of their own. Work will start October 15 on the \$2 1/2 million project.

Mayor Garner said that Bonito Lake is to be included in a national catalog of recreation places, following a survey now being made by the state.

"A page for independent thought"

The jobless are here

After a summer of extra workers in the area and a period going back through several construction jobs that created extra work and business in town, things are getting back to normal in the Lincoln County-seat town. Business-wise that is not quite as much trade as any merchant in town can handle without increasing his work staff even one person.

We could use more jobs around town, the workers are here.

Probably this does not bother the person who has a job on one of the government bases in the area, or a job with the state or county, but they ought to be aware of the cost of supporting people who do not have jobs, the sagging enrollment at school, and the general population trend which has been going the wrong way for two or three decades.

Maybe even these facts do not bother enough people to get them stirred up, and in turn get the town council stirred up enough to start some action. Maybe the sentiment for an improved job situation is not here. We feel sure that the town council will not "turn a tap"

toward providing more jobs unless pushed in that direction — and pushed hard by a lot of people.

Industrial development is a tough nut, almost like buying a piece of blue sky. Yet, it's working for a lot of towns in New Mexico and Carrizozo people ought to be confident enough in their basic credentials (railroad, highway junction, climate, water, school, hospital, park and swimming pool) to present these credentials in the places where industrial development (we mean jobs) come from.

How do you ignite a fire in the pants of people who lack enthusiasm, lack the faith, or are too lazy to make a move to provide jobs in the home town? How do you get the one group of men (the council) that has the power and access to the money to do more than just gossip about the situation.

It's going to take a lot of people who think there ought to be more jobs in Carrizozo, more families, more children, more people at work — pushing and asking that something be done.

There's nothing hopeless about Carrizozo except the attitude of too many people.

Is it possible a man could have too many home companions, such as dogs and wives? Complex problems do arise.

There is the hard-working bread winner coming home from work, he walks in the front gate and is met by man's best friend, the noble dog, two to be specific.

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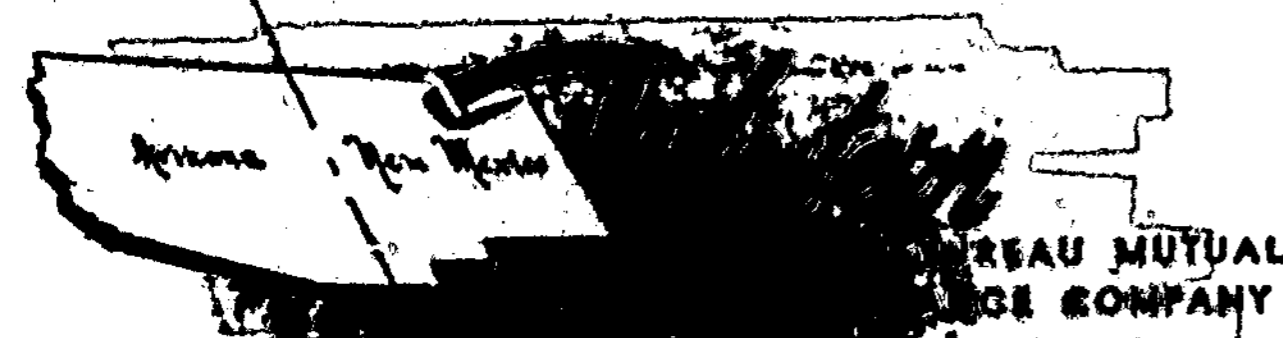

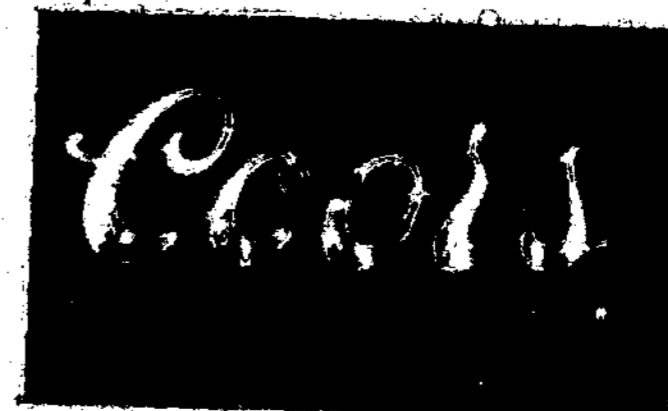
