## FARM NEWS

Lincoln County 4-H Award Night will be held November 7

at the IOOF hall in Carrizozo. The program will start at 7:30. Completion pins will be given to the 4-H members completing their projects in 1964.

Don't forget the fun apples for dunking at a Halloween party. Candied and caramel apples on sticks will make your house a popular spot for trick-or-treaters.

Crisp, tangy and delicious all fit the description of an apple. Autumn is the time of year when you'll find an abundance of these fruit favorites at the market.

What can be used to deodorize a home freezer after the meat has spoiled due to electrical failure?

Unfortunately, odors from spoiled foods stay with you for quite a while. Of course, the first thing to do is to wash the cabinets thoroughly and rinse well. You may use either baking soda or a detergent. It is very difficult to get these odors out. Usually the cabinet needs to be left open to air thoroughly. Sometimes, if the spoiled food has not been allowed to stay too long before cleaning, washing with a solution of vinegar and water may help. You may use distilled vinegar which is white vinegar you find anywhere.

Irrigate your orchard this winter. The apples grow roots year around and unless they have adequate water they can be injured by the cold temperatures. Winter injury is found next spring when bark on the tree splits and the tree lacks vigor. Plan to irrigate in mid-November, late December and early February.

Livestock should be taken off the pasture before they eat all of the fall growth because of winter kill when sod is grazed too closely.

Three or four inches of growth on the grass hold snow which provides moisture for

Droppings should be scattered by harrowing before winter. If the droppings are left unscattered, unpalatable grass grows up around them. Most irrigated pastures need fertilizer. By putting the first application of nitrogen on in early spring, rapid growth will be promoted so the pasture can be grazed sooner. A winter irrigation may be needed to keep the pasture important on sandy or other droughty soils.

A pasture that comes through the winter in good condition and is managed well is able to carry more livestock the following summer.

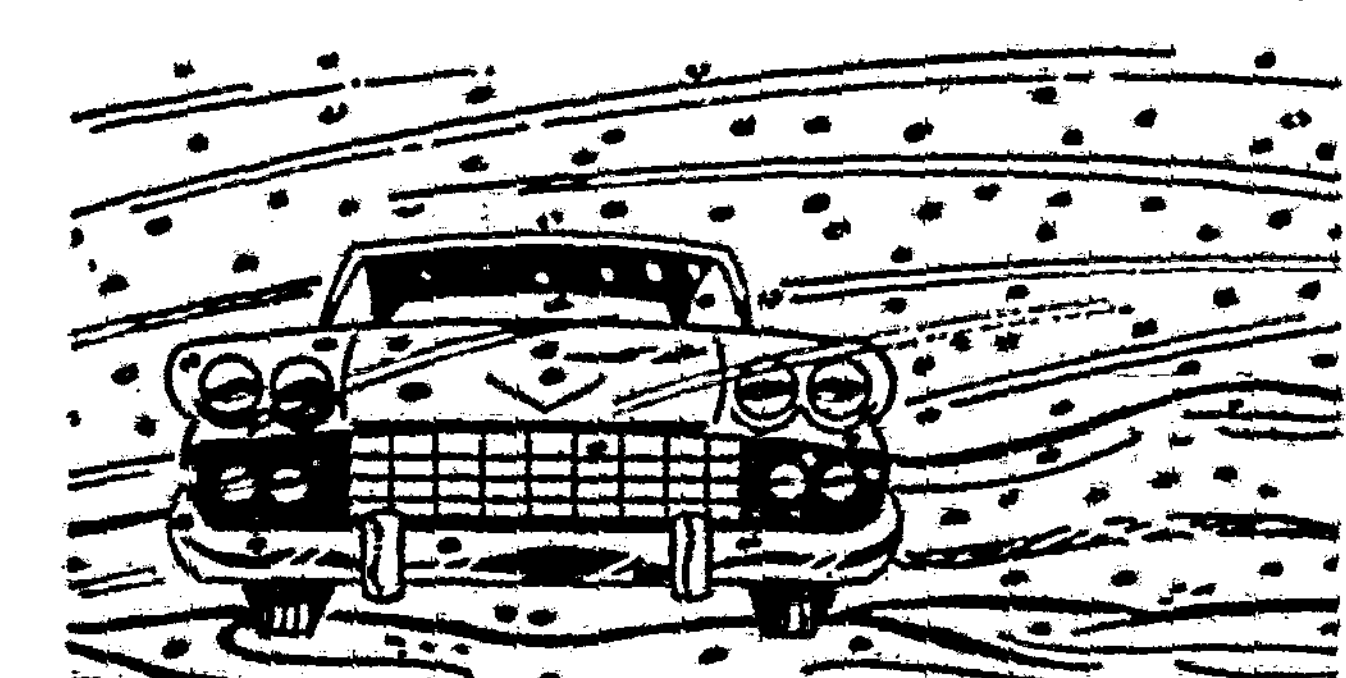

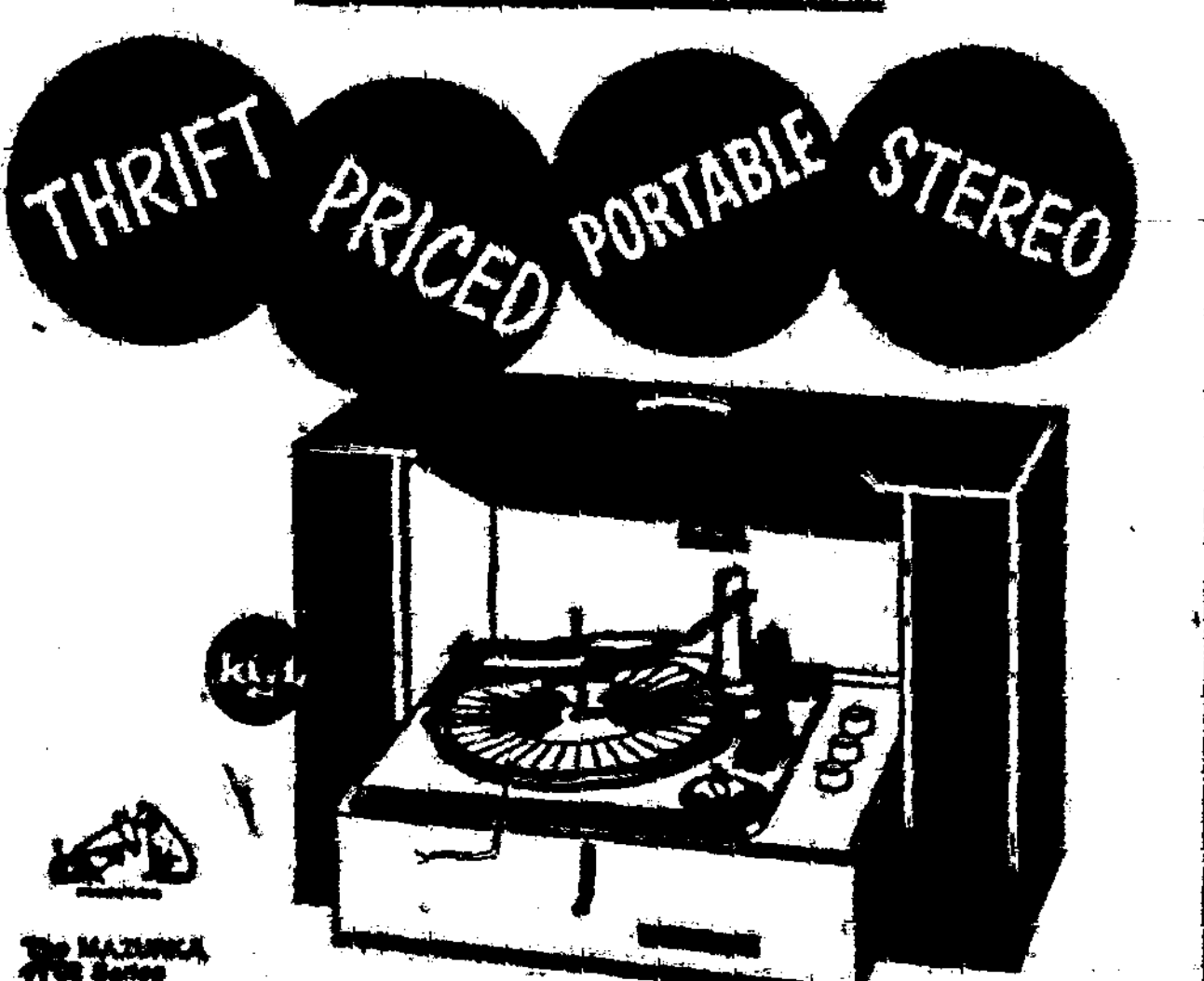

# EDITORIAL

"A page for independent thought"

## A mighty cold poker!

There are a number of observations that can be made about the election of 1964. Our thoughts since early Tuesday evening when the Johnson landslide became apparent have been going along these lines.

At the time of Goldwater's victory in the Republican convention we were surprised, and this surprise was traced back to the Republican state convention held in Albuquerque. A shrewd, sharp organization did both jobs — which did not mean that a majority of American people were ready to turn away from socialism.

It has been our opinion for a number of years that any form of "turn back" from the road of big government was a long time in the future. The 1964 election only serves as proof of such thinking. It does more than that — by the end of eight years of Johnson-Humphrey in office we will have more, much more of everything the majority of Americans want — inflation, bureaus, foreign aid, the things you expect a couple of big brothers to provide.

This turnback may not happen in our lifetime, or even in the next two decades. Bigness keeps on begetting bigness until the monster can not live with-

out a lot of feed. A turnback along the lines of individual freedom from the burden of big government will not happen until the wage earner — the class that includes the biggest majority of our voters — is hurt bad in the pocket-book. Either through excessive harassment or taxation, or through a major depression. We think it possible for Johnson and team to keep up a head of inflated steam for many years to come.

By the time the Republicans fight out the battle between their party liberals and conservatives it's going to take a candidate of real stature to lead them to enough unity to win a national election. This man is not prominent today.

The time to strike is when the iron is hot — the Goldwater crew campaigned with a mighty cold poker. Our frank opinion is that their entire approach to the campaign was poorly aimed. We even condemn a number of state Republicans for their lack of constructive campaigning.

In the meantime all a person can do is till the soil in his own back yard and we expect to work at that project. A bumper crop was harvested locally on November 3, 1964.

## Great on victory - calm in defeat

The Carrizozo Grizzly football team plays for the championship this Friday. We ask only that they accentuate the positive and eliminate the negative — to the best of their ability. We know that our Grizzlies, under Coach Bernie Laabs, can do this much.

Football is learning in a great measure. The satisfaction the individual player gains on the football field is the confident feeling of doing more than the job required, and doing it well. The winning teams are skilled as are all of Bernie Laabs' teams, but they have something more — and that is a burning desire to put out a little more, more than the man on the other side of the line.

We've seen every Grizzly game this year, and not once

during the season did they perform like the team did at Hatch — before inexperience and mistakes caught up with them. The Grizzlies can reach perfection again, as a team, and with some early season cripples back in the lineup, they can play perfect ball for a full game.

Bernie Laabs is a coach that likes to win, but he wears it well. Laabs hates to lose, he doesn't send the boys out to play that kind of ball. We saw Bernie in defeat last Friday and there was a real sport.

A winning team sends the "work hard" spirit all through the school, one reason we, like Laabs, believe in playing to win. The Zoo Grizzlies are a great team — this Friday they will prove it to New Mexico.

Miss Romero is the daughter of Isabel Romero of Capitan.

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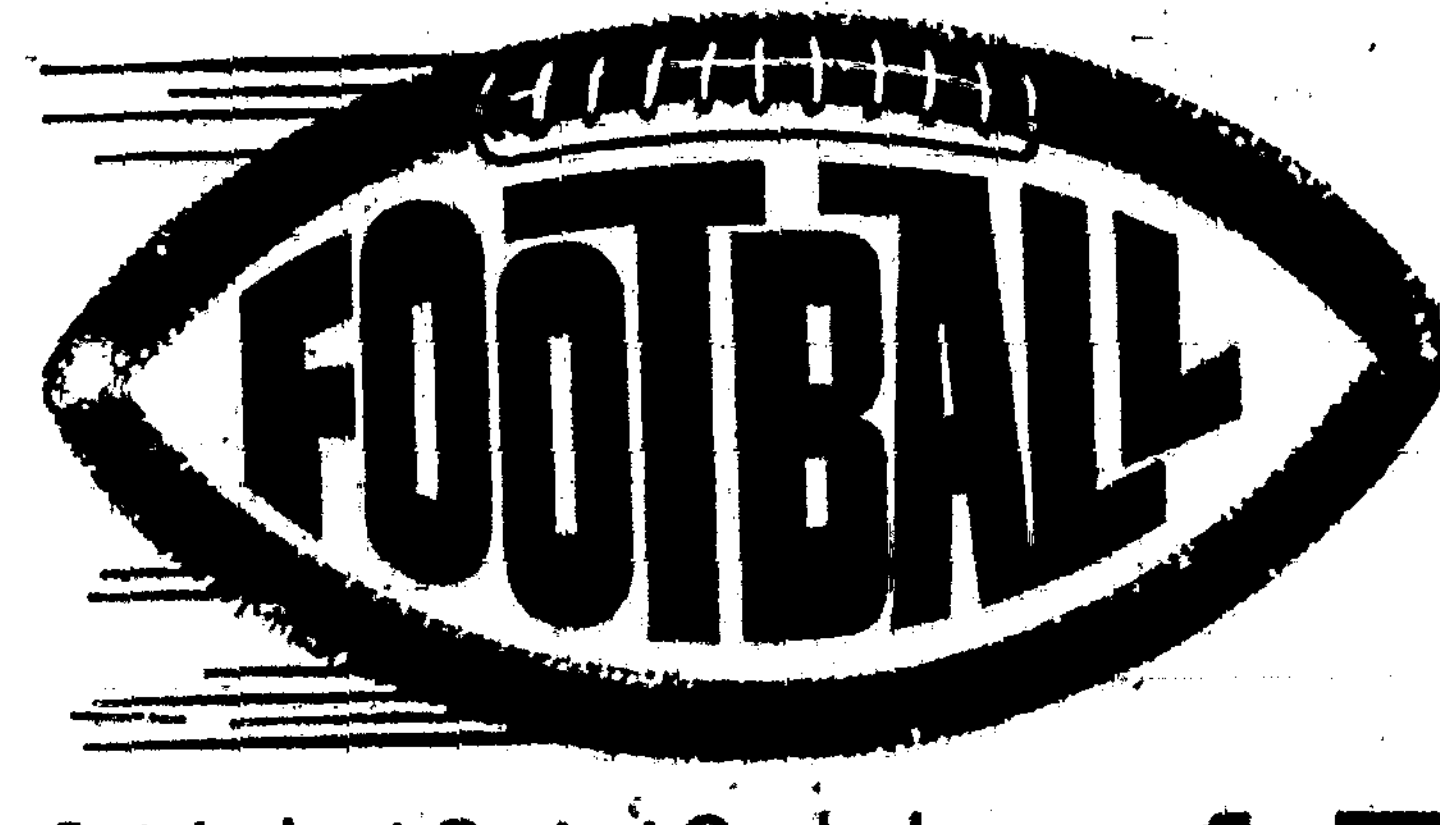
