Grizzly players honored

Carrizozo Grizzly football team coached by Bernie Laabe, received a fine tribute after winning the State Class C championship by several of the players being named to all-state team and the coach being named as Coach of the Year.

Quarterback Zozo beat Dexter (30-7) was selected as the other player of the year. Five of the Grizzly squad were All-State selections in the United Press poll. Besides Armstrong, they were end Gerald Posey, guard Bob Herrera, center Herman Sanchez and back Mike Ortiz. Other first team selections were Joe Black of Cloudcroft, Phil Custer of Albuquerque Academy and Joe Clavel of Roy, all backs, Tackle John Mahoney of Roy, and Dexter guard James Bell complete the first team.

This is the second straight year that Laabe has been selected as Coach of the Year, it is his second straight pennant winner and marked the fifth time in six years this Grizzly team has gained the state finals. They won four times. Since Laabe has been at Carrizozo the Grizzlies have won 52 and lost only seven. Only one of the losses was in a conference contest.

Bruce King's star on the rise again

SANTA FE — The opening of the legislature season has brought Speaker Bruce King back into prominence as a Democratic prospect for governor in 1966.

King, a rancher with a Will Rogers turn of wit, is sure to be re-elected speaker when the legislature gathers here Dec. 11 for a pre-session conference, and may be expected to use the office as a launching pad for the governor run.

Gov. Jack Campbell took off from the speaker's desk, and before him Speaker Mack Easley was on his way to the governor's office before being tripped by Campbell in a race for the speaker post.

CLINT AND JOE NOY WITH HIM

King, a resident of Santa Fe county, wants to run and has a wide following which unhappily for him does not include Sen. Clint Anderson and Sen. Joe Montoya who will have much to say in picking the next Demo nominee for governor.

Some observers think the Anderson protege Ralph Trigg of Albuquerque will be trying for governor. He's a member of the Albuquerque city commission.

State Welfare Director Leo Murphy of Santa Fe who tried for the nomination in 1962 is still interested, and Sen. Ed Mechem of Albuquerque another who tried in 1962, hasn't ruled himself out.

There has been some Santa Fe talk about running, exploring Sen. Fabian Chavez for governor as a possible name pretty far out.

STARTING PLACE FOR HIGH OFFICE

The legislature is the training ground for high office in New Mexico.

The latest to go up is U. S. Rep. Johnny Walker who was a state representative 1949-52. In Washington he joined two other former legislators, Joe Montoya and Congressman Tom Morris.

Every governor since 1947 had been in the legislature, Tom Mabry, Ed Mechem, John Simms, John Byrrougths and Campbell.

UPSTART REDMAN HAD GOOD RACE

Dr. Jack Redman who is treated by old guard Republicans like an upstart intruder, ran 7,218 ahead of Sen. Ed Mechem and 22,942 ahead of Barry Goldwater in his losing run for Congress against Johnny Walker.

Redman lost by 10,083 while other Republicans were going down by as much as 74,000.

Redman's vote of 154,780 was more than any of the winning Demo candidates received in the 1962 off-year election. Tom Morris was the highest in that one with 152,684.

Redman will be running again in 1966 whether the old dinosaur Republicans like it or not.

DEMO OFFICIALS ON SECOND TERM

The next election should be a better one for the Republicans with most of the present Democratic officials on second terms.

Not eligible to run again are Gov. Jack Campbell, Lt. Gov. Mack Easley, Secretary Alberto Miller, Auditor Alex Armijo, Treasurer Joe Grant.

Only Atty. Gen. Boston Witt and Land Commissioner Sheep Hays in the executive department will be eligible to run in the next election.

HATED CONVENTION STILL ON BOOK

The final count on the referendum to throw out the pre-primary convention law that was enacted in 1963 to give Joe Montoya the nomination for the

senate was 85,513 for repeal and 29,716 for keeping the thing.

The repeal failed because the majority was short of the constitutional requirements, and there is a strong possibility that the legislature will not repeal the law.

Our Clint the senator who sent in the convention law in the first place would like to keep it even if the saps are three to one against it.

TWO BIG JOBS OPEN IN CAPITOL

There are two \$14,000 jobs begging at the statehouse which might interest some county chairmen with nothing to do.

The Employment Security Commission director post has been filled by an acting non-politico since last summer when Dick Pino resigned to become Albuquerque postmaster, and Charlie Brunacini is quitting next month as Bureau of Revenue director.

Gov. Jack Campbell says he doesn't have anybody in mind for either place.

LONG DISTANCE SERVICE FREE

People at the statehouse with a new central telephone service can dial any telephone in the state without cost or a record of the call being made.

The state pays a flat rate for the service with the costs divided among the agencies according to the number of telephone instruments they have.

FARM NEWS

The Agriculture census will start next week in Lincoln County. Mrs. John Carnell of Corona, crew leader for the Lincoln and Otero counties, she plans to get the agriculture census through as soon as possible. The census enumerators will need to know your production of livestock, fruit and other items along with your cost of production.

A cooperative work plan for the Fort Stanton Research Project in 1965 was announced by the Bureau of Land Management of the U. S. Department of the Interior and the Agricultural Experiment Station of New Mexico State University.

According to the joint announcement the Bureau will supply funds and personnel to assist the station in determining the best practices for livestock grazing and wildlife management in that area of the state.

The New Mexico Game and Fish Department will also contribute funds for research in the project. The Soil Conservation Service will assist in soil surveys and range condition classifications.

In 1965, the Agricultural Experiment Station of NMSU will carry out the following objects on the Fort Stanton range:

1. Sample soils and vegetation on protected and grazed range for comparison.
2. Establish stations at various distances, and directions from water so that grazing patterns may be studied.
3. Compare past history of ranch costs and returns on nearby ranches with those on Fort Stanton.
4. Study the effects of wildlife on undesirable plants as well as on desirable plants.

The BLM will construct five miles of woven-wire fence, restore three earthen reservoirs to usable condition, construct one cattle guard, and provide some of the plastic pipes needed for distribution of livestock in one pasture.

Personnel of the NMSU Experiment Station, the BLM, and the State Game and Fish Department will be stationed at the Fort Stanton project. Results of research will be published by the NMSU Agricultural Experiment Station.

Douglas Bryant, Extension Horticulturist, NMSU, explains that pine, spruce, Arizona Cypress, and Juniper usually drop at least a portion of one year's growth of needles during September and October.

In March place the 3-year old needles turn yellowish and then fall off. The red pine usually drops its 4-year old needles, while white and yellow pines normally keep only 1 or 2 year's growth of needles. Don't worry if your evergreens have dropped or are still dropping needles. The needles which are lost are those nearest the center of the tree. The younger, green needles are at the ends of the branches.

While this shedding operation is in progress the trees often appear to be dead or dying. However, as soon as a hard wind or heavy rain comes the old needles are knocked to the

ground and the tree again appears normal.

Unusual summer seasons of drought may upset this natural process and cause more than the normal number of needles to drop, as seen this fall. In these cases if the tree keeps the current year's needles in a green healthy condition, it will continue to grow next year, and there is no cause for alarm.

"A page for independent thought"

Extra effort makes the difference

The difference between a cluster of houses and a town is a little extra effort.

Driving nearly 2,000 miles gives one a lot of time for thought on a great many subjects, thoughts prompted by the country side, the towns along the way, the look of the houses, and the appearance of the business district.

The old home town this winter grew up in started going down with the failure of two banks back in the twenties. It looks terrible today because the main street buildings are getting in sad shape. No one wants to use them, so they fall apart.

The county seat town of this same county, the one we beat at football two years running, now is quite a town with an extra active community and industrial development group. They have secured land, made trips, and got some payoff in the way of payroll. About the only thing they have to offer, more than other moderate sized towns of the area, is a hearty welcome and reasonable help.

There is another situation in Kansas, not so prevalent in New

Mexico. Many small manufacturing industries were started locally and thrived. We pass through Hesston frequently where farm machinery is made. Head in their local newspaper where the machinery company employed two men to organize for nation and world-wide sales. A new large building was going up on the site of this plant.

After thinking on, and around, the subject of development (any kind you care to name) we kept coming back to this reasonable conclusion — that Carrizozo is not ready for industrial development, hence we'd best explore the natural resources of our area . . . and probably we are not ready to do that — because it would take considerable effort, some optimism, some money, and a lot of desire.

We can wait for lightning to strike in the way of some big development by outside forces . . . while our unoccupied buildings tumble down, . . . or we could do what makes the difference between a winner and a loser — put out the effort that separates a going town from a clutch of houses.

A fifth for Salina

It was a saddening experience to spend a Thanksgiving vacation so close to the wake. We were in Ellsworth, only 35 miles from where they were burying Salina, Kansas, and we could hardly eat the turkey, stuffing, yams, followed by pumpkin pie with whipped cream . . . for thinking of the poor people that door.

Fact of the matter is, that when it came time for a spot of cheer after the dinner we took it "seat" and then followed with two black coffee beans to keep the teeth from spotting the beautiful Irish man. We were about the sure, or shakin as you may prefer.

All of this deep tragedy occurred in a year when the Jayhawk state went fairly strong for a Democratic president, too.

Salina is losing its Air Force Base. Those happy soldiers and carefree pilots will not be cashing their government checks, estimated roughly as 25% of

Salina's business, and spreading that long green stuff around town very much longer in 1965.

McNamara said "close the gates, that bird is scolding. We'll send some of the planes to Roswell, scatter the rest of the force around the country, and save millions to help the poor people who need help real bad."

Naturally the high official brass of Salina is not taking this lying down. They have overcome the rigor mortis caused by the initial news release and are now arming to the teeth for a trip to Washington, D. C. We wish them a pleasant trip, of course.

That does not mean we hope they get their base back, it simply means that we wish them a pleasant trip and the least that could be done would be for the Roswell Chamber of Commerce to send a few agents may drown their sorrows when they get the final "N-o-o."

Our pain would be much deeper if we had not seen the

the green wheat of north central Kansas, observed the many pump jacks pulling up oil from deep in the earth, and observed the fat cattle foraging on the grass, generally a lot longer this year than in Lincoln County.

Law increases vet pension rates

President Johnson has signed into law an Act of Congress, which liberalizes the current pension system.

For those under the current system (PL 86-211) the new law will increase all pension rates effective January 1, 1965. This cost of living increase will add approximately 7 percent to most pension payments and provide pension of \$100 per month to veterans with the lowest income, and even higher rates to those most severely disabled. You need not write or apply for this increase because it will automatically be included in the check you will receive about Feb. 1, 1965.

The law also provides a new rate of pension if your disability is so severe that it confines you to your home. You must apply to the VA if you feel you are qualified for this benefit.

Those still under the protected pension system (the system in effect before July 1, 1960), must elect pension under the current system to qualify for the increase. It will not be necessary for you to write or phone the VA now. Instead, we will send you an election card with full information about the

BLM, NMSU announce

Stanton project plan

University Park, N. M. — A cooperative work plan for the Fort Stanton Research Project in 1965 was announced today by the Bureau of Land Management of the U. S. Department of the Interior and the Agricultural Experiment Station of New Mexico State University.

According to joint announcement by Dr. Marvin L. Wilson, associate director of NMSU's Experiment Station, and W. J. Anderson, acting state director for the BLM, the Bureau will supply funds and personnel to assist the station in determining the best practices for livestock grazing and wildlife management in that area of the state.

The New Mexico Game and Fish Department will also contribute funds for research in the project. The Soil Conservation Service will assist in soil surveys and range condition

classifications.

In 1965, the Agricultural Experiment Station of NMSU will carry out the following objectives on the Fort Stanton range:

- (1) Sample soils and vegetation on protected and grazed ranges for comparison.
- (2) Establish stations at various distances and directions from water so that grazing patterns may be studied.
- (3) Compare past history of ranch camps and returns on nearby ranches with those on Fort Stanton.
- (4) Study the effects of wildlife on undesirable plants as well as on desirable plants.

The BLM will construct five miles of woven-wire fence, restore three earthen reservoirs to usable condition, construct one-cattle guard, and provide some of the plastic pipes needed for distribution of livestock in one pasture.

Personnel of the NMSU Experiment Station, the BLM, and the State Game and Fish Department will be stationed at the Fort Stanton project. Results of research will be published by the NMSU Agricultural Experiment Station.

Some explanations made of permit to graze on National Forest land

Occasionally we are asked to explain the details of the National Forest "grazing lease" and what must be done to acquire one.

First it should be clarified that permits to graze livestock on the National Forest are not leases at all. The term "lease" implies the exclusive use of the land involved and on the National Forests, this is certainly not the case. Multiple-use management provides for the best combinations of uses for any particular area.

Grazing is, in effect, the harvest of the forage crop by privately-owned livestock grazed under paid permit. Permits holding a grazing preference must comply with certain requirements such as the ownership of sufficient deeded land as a base of operations and maintenance of necessary range improvements, i. e. fences, water, etc.

The rancher cannot "sell" his National Forest grazing permit but he may sell his private land and permitted livestock - his basis for holding that permit - and waive his grazing preference back to the Forest Service saying that it be released to the buyer of the private holdings.

The grazing permit through which livestock harvest grass can be roughly compared to the permit issued to a timber operator to harvest trees. In both cases, the private individual or company is buying a particular forest product but must not interfere with any others.

The timber operator is following a definite plan and cutting only those trees that have been marked for removal by qualified forest officers. The grazing permittee likewise follows a range management plan prepared in most cases through mutual agreement between himself and the District Ranger.

The timber operator must build certain roads and must clean up the sale area following the cutting as part of his responsibility in the timber sale agreement. The grazing permittee is likewise responsible for construction and maintenance of range improvements as mentioned to facilitate his livestock operation.

Proper utilization is required of the timber operator in cutting each tree near the ground level to avoid waste. Similarly, grazing permittees must distribute their livestock into all useable portions of the allotment assigned to him so that certain areas are not abused while others remain ungrazed.

Both the grazing permittee and the timber operator must provide for soil stabilization to protect watershed values. The grazing permittee by leaving some grass at the end of the season to protect the soil, and the timber operator by revegetating disturbed areas such as log landings and skid trails.

Both pay fees for the forest product which they use and in each case these fees are based on the market value of the product. But if they should use more than they are permitted and pay for (which occasionally happens), this constitutes a trespass in each case. The timber operator who cuts more trees than he is permitted is in effect stealing timber from the Government just as the grazing permittee who grazes more live-


