Saudi Arabia is a land of wonders

Udhailiyah, Saudi Arabia — No, this is not a snapshot of ocean waves. Rather, it is the doings of the typical Saudi Arabia shamal (sandstorm) and a sand dune, one that has weathered many a storm since even a morsel of water.

In the course of three months, I saw this formation spring into existence, to become the size that is viewed in this photograph, and then fade away, to nothing except the barren sandstone bedrock on which it was formed.

And this is not a land of tall Texas tales, either! I didn't bring that trait over in my grip. In fact the country is so strange that I commenced to wonder sometimes if a person should not feel abashed at being present in such a land. But then it's something to write about.

About 50 kilometers south of Hofuf is located an American oil field outpost encampment, where a handful of Americans try to live while working with the Arabians as they develop the gigantic oil reserves of the desert subfloor. I quartered here for a period of a little over 5 months.

Each morning I traveled in special desert equipment over the rugged trail another 50, or so, kilometers to a job site in the Uthmaniyah sector, still farther south. It was over this same barren trail—little improved since the date, that the Brit ish explorer, Philby, in 1922, launched the first successful scientific expedition into the Rub al-Khali. He spent his third night out from Hofuf, in the area about where I have spent the past few months, with the bedouins, the camel, the sheep, and the goat nomadic herders, human beings of whom so little is known.

But then the photograph. I watched this pile of sand come into a being. It began during a shamal, and as the days passed and the shamals raged, it grew

THE LONG AND SHORT OF IT IS . . . I have learned that such unusual phenomena in Saudi Arabia are not unusual, as the sand dunes of the Rub al-Khali move at least seventy feet each year!

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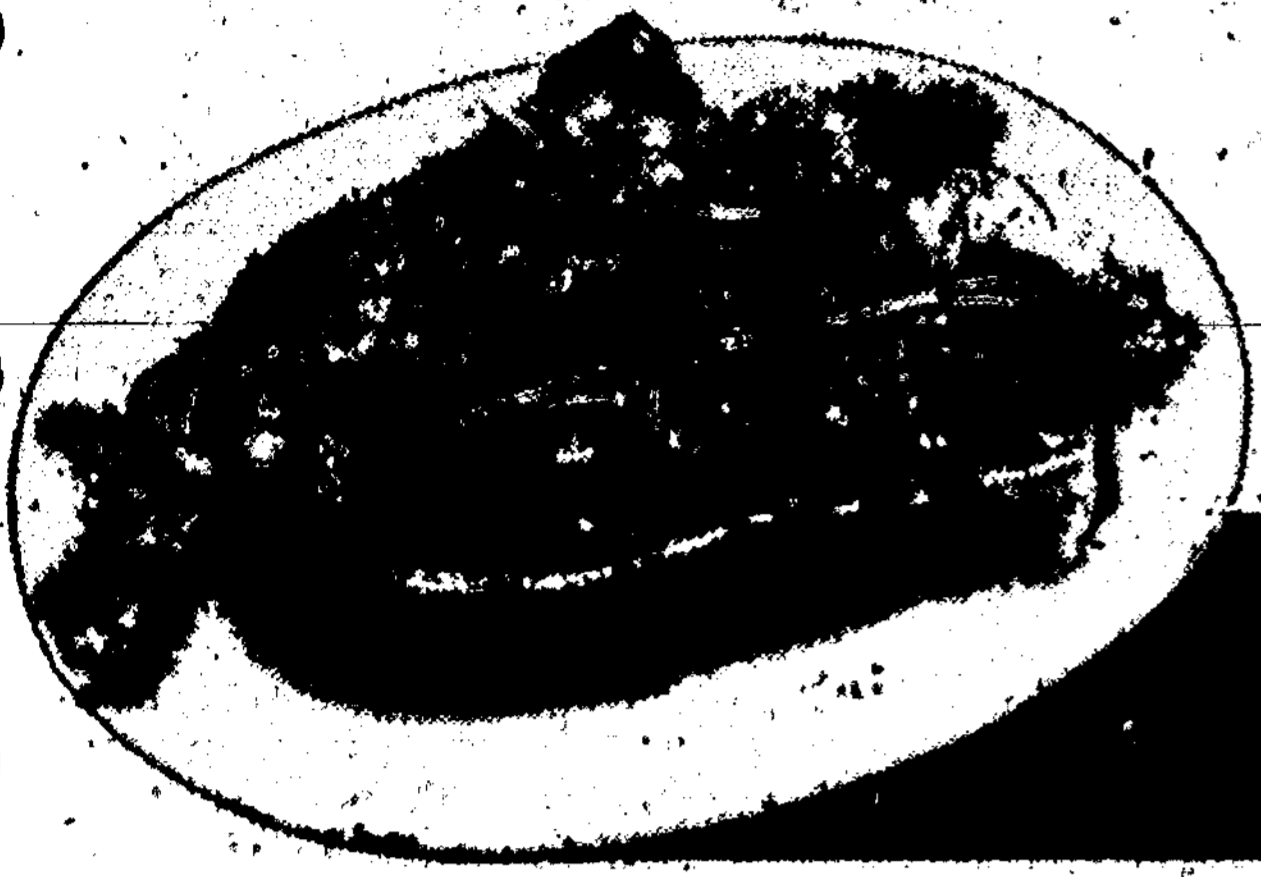

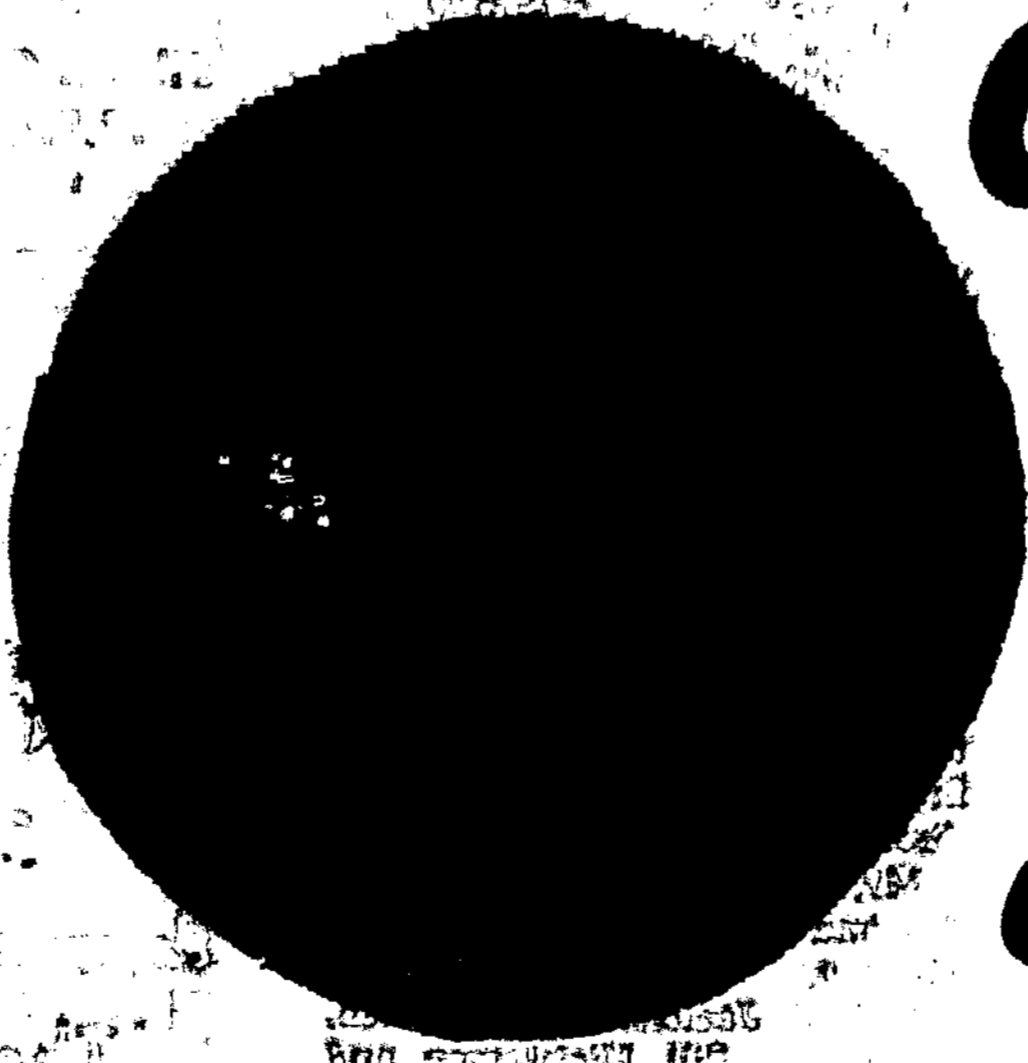

Hagerman hits 30 in second period

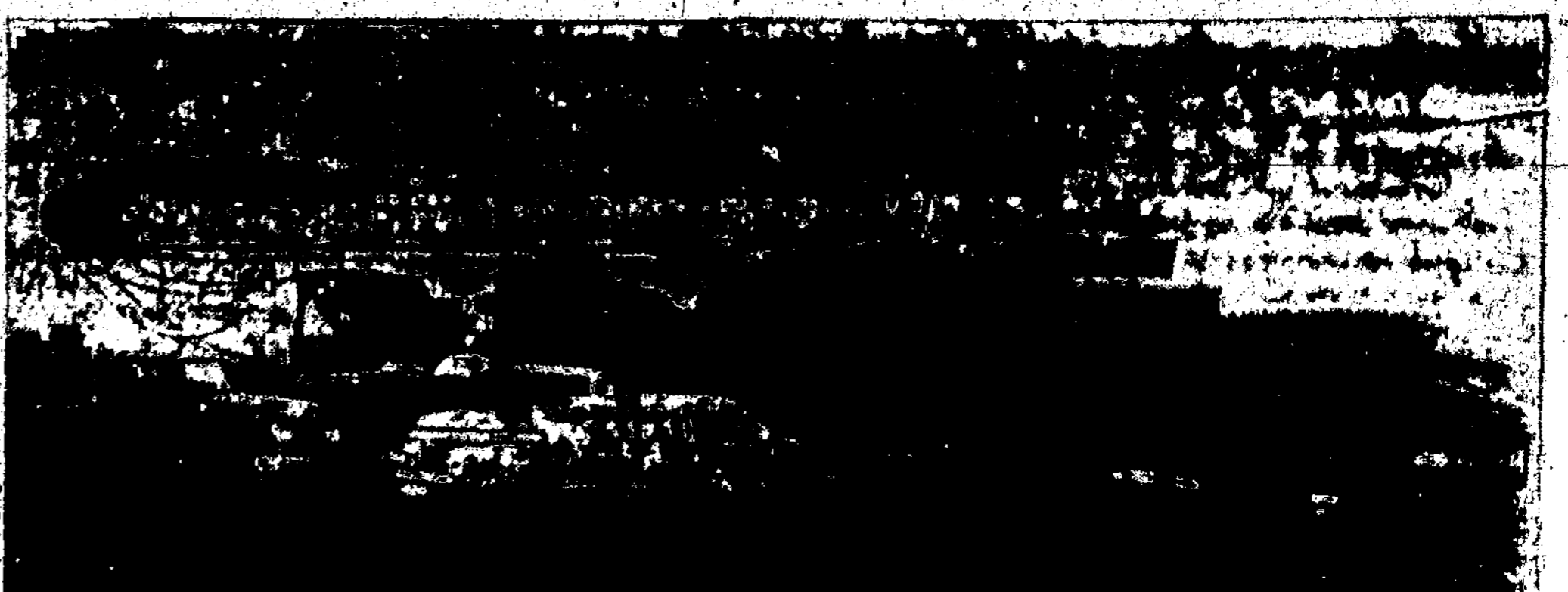
CAPITAN — Hagerman scored 30 points during a hot second period to down Capitan, 80-51 Saturday night in a game played on the loser's court.
