## Brisco and Knoblock busy during snow storm

Driving conditions were very hazardous Friday afternoon and Saturday due to heavy snowfall and freezing temperatures. Several accidents were blamed on icy road conditions.

Dennis E. Johnson, 18, of Tasc, was issued a citation for failure to use due care, by Powder Knoblock, on December 19, when his 1958 Chevrolet turned over due to ice on the road two miles north of Three Rivers on U S 54 about 10:00 a.m. Johnson was not hurt.

Mrs. B. J. McChung and her companion Mrs. I. L. Johnson both of Albuquerque were treated in the local hospital, Saturday after they received slight injuries in a one-car accident 3.85 miles west of Carrizozo on U S 380.

Mrs. McChung, driver of a 1960 Chevrolet stated to investigating officer, Coy Brisco, that she was heading south on 380, when a car came up from behind and ran her off the road.

The Chevrolet traveled 151 ft. after leaving the Highway, coming to rest upright, in the Mal Pais, after hitting a rock.

About \$200.00 damage was done to the vehicle.

Investigating officer Powder Knoblock, stated that Father James Vance of Santa Rita Church in Carrizozo escaped injuries Saturday evening, due to the fact that he was using his seat belts, when his 1963 Rambler ran underneath the back of

a stalled truck on U S 380, 12 miles east of here.

Driver of the truck, J. W. Stanfield of Fredonia, Ariz said his truck was stalled on the icy road, when Father Vance's car hit the rear of the truck. Stanfield was cited for not having license plates and Father Vance received a citation for failure to use due care.

It is the wish of officers Knoblock and Brisco for everyone to have a safe Christmas and in

## Arrow Gas makes \$100M fixup

In a modernization program that will cost the company around \$100,000, the Arrow Gas Co. is installing new gas tanks in Carrizozo who were formerly hooked up to the old city line.

The question was whether to rebuild the line or abandon it and install tanks. The company chose to install new tanks and meters with the cost being about the same either way.

Steve Risor, local manager, said the work started the first of last week and should be completed within 60 days. All lines, clear up into the buildings will be pressure tested with the expectation that there will be no leaks anywhere at the time the job is done.

Found an E. B. Jordan and as those are my initials dropped him a note to Alamogordo.

There was also a Mrs. Mae Jordan in Carrizozo. As my wife had lost a turquoise pendant in or about the White Oaks cemetery she stopped in the Lincoln County News office. She was told there that Mae Jordan lived just down the street.

I called there and we had a short but interesting conversation. Her husband was Charles and his father was Charles and they came from Illinois to Texas. She said that her daughter, Mrs. MacVeigh had seen a book that was a history of the Jordan's. This excited my curiosity further, as I have such a book. The Jordan Memorial printed in about 1890. I am not recorded there but my brothers are.

I called on Mrs. MacVeigh and she took me next door to the office of Ellis J. French and that J is for Jordan. He has the book about the Jordans.

His mother's name was Isabella S., daughter of Jeddediah Jordan who is in the book. So Mr. French and I are cousins. This is a very personal experience but an example of the wonders that can be found if we have our eyes open, and listen.

## Highway Dept. workers honored

Maintenance patrol crew No. 243, of Hondo, was honored for establishing the best annual crew safety record. Frank Gomez is the forman.

An employee is rendered ineligible by a single reportable incident, no matter how minor, of injury, occupational illness or equipment collision.

## This year the Post Office Department will deliver 72 billion pieces of mail

The United States Post Office Department has become one of the largest business establishments in the world, conducting the greatest system of communications ever known to mankind.

Its annual payroll is \$385 billion. 300,000 employees serve a Nation of 192 million people, working out of 44,500 stations and branches.

This year, the Post Office Department will collect and deliver 72 billion pieces of mail. By 1970, volume is expected to reach 82 billion pieces.

The department adds an additional one and one-half million city, 100,000 rural, and 75,000 business addresses to its delivery system annually.

Forty-four million families and 4.1 million businesses receive mail over 103,000 city routes and 9.5 million families are served over 31,000 rural routes.

On the average, every American citizen gets at least one piece of mail every day.

Seventy-five percent of total mail originates today with business. The department owns 45,726 motor vehicles. In addition, it pays \$110 million to private vehicles full time and mans them mail. It hires 9,000 motor vehicles full time and mans them with Department employees. Another 63,000 vehicles and drivers are hired under contract for rural and star (contract) route delivery.

SANTA FE — Had Rifle Holder fired a Redstone missile at the statehouse it would have raised no more commotion than the report sent in by the Alamogordo publisher's Public School Study Commission.

Holder and his committee of eleven called for eliminating 46 school superintendents and closing 16 high schools in action that would extend into 24 to 32 counties, and this along with higher priced schools.

Past efforts to combine the West Las Vegas High School with the East Las Vegas High School set off such an uproar that the statehouse and the legislature could hardly operate until the consolidation foolishness was dropped. Now there are 46 consolidations in the air.

**DORMITORIES, TEXT BOOKS**  
The Public School Study Commission proposed extensive changes in distributing state school money, a subject which alone disrupted the last legislature, introduced new ideas for bringing the poorer schools nearer the rich ones, had recommendations on school buses and books, and at one point suggested public school dormitories.

While the report called for drastic economies in such as wiping out school superintendents, its overall effect would be a considerable increase in the cost of public school operation.

**MOST ALL ADMIRE DEPTH OF WORK**  
Friends and critics alike were impressed by the depth and extent of the work and some of the more enthusiastic think it is the most significant public school study ever made in the state.

One impressive aspect is that it was done by a public body with almost no money.

The commission is only a year and a half old, an impressive consideration in itself, and it didn't have its first dollar until a few months ago after the 1964 legislature appropriated \$2,000 to pay the mileage and per diem expenses of the members.

With no money the commission had no staff, naturally, and had to scrounge help from public agencies.

The commission includes several respected educators but mostly the members are from the lay public.

## A BAD HOUR WITH INEZ

The group had a bad hour when Chairman Holder refused to welcome Legislative Fiscal Analyst Inez Gill to an Albuquerque meeting, saying that he preferred her absence.

There was a lot of public indignation about the Gill incident and more when Holder had Gov. Jack Campbell remove State Sen. Albert Greer from the commission, Greer being the leader of the opposition minority in the group.

But the commission outlived those troubles and is now receiving much praise for its work.

## GOVERNOR CAMPBELL SUPPORTS REPORT

Gov. Jack Campbell in an address to an educational group on Dec. 14 made three statements of approval of the commission report and there are reliable indications that it will also be endorsed by the New Mexico Educational Assn. even if the jobs of 46 superintendents are in peril.

With serious backing from Campbell and the NMEA the subject could be bigger and rougher than reappointment or anything else in the legislature that meets next month.

## CAN'T DO IT WE OWE THEM

It is not realistic to think that the legislature would buy the whole proposal.

Efforts of the board of education to consolidate a few schools in 1963 led to legislative backfire that has blocked all school consolidation except those proposed by the schools themselves.

Some backers of the program think they can get it a little at a time and the commission itself realized that the proposition would be hard to sell. The report said:

"The commission should like to make it clear early in this report that we are talking terms of an ideal educational situation rather than always from the practical possible side of the question."

## John Clegg's car flips on icy road

John Clegg from the University of New Mexico in Albuquerque arrived in Carrizozo Friday evening to spend the Christmas holidays with Mr. and Mrs. J. T. Clegg. Enroute home John was caught in a snow storm, hit an icy spot on the road, causing his car to turn over, about eight miles south of Corona. John escaped injury and attributes this to the fact that he had his seat belt fastened. The car was completely demolished.

A citation for failure to use due care was issued.

## Exchange student tells of homeland

(I asked Rafath All to write in his own words of India and give me a minute comparison of America, here is what he gave me and in his own words; how typical, they always know about our country but little do we know about theirs!)

I was asked by Dixie, to write an article on India and what I feel about America and its people. So I am giving my humble contribution to whomever it may concern.

To start with, both my country and America have the same form of government and both are trying their utmost to bring peace and tranquility in this world of ours. Apart from this, these countries don't have much likeness, in other phases since America is more advanced in all aspects than India.

India has progressed such a lot during the last fifteen years that the economists get shocked when they compare with what it was before independence. It would have been still better off if there was not any problem of population (450 million) for the government.

We have started manufacturing our own cars in Calcutta, aeroplanes in Bangalore and locomotives in Madras. We have four steel plants, whose output is in millions of tons yearly. We are exporting to many countries in the west. The commodities and goods being produced are not sufficient for the people because of the increase in population every year, so we still import a large number of goods from America, England and Germany.

India is full of natural sources but there are not any means or technical hands to tap them. So the government of India is sending every year a number of engineers and students to this country and Germany, for specialization and higher studies to study the methods and means to step up the production. At the same time some American institutions, like Ford Foundation, are helping a lot to make India a self-sufficient and a developed country in the far-east where it is faced by the menace of the communists every minute.

India, being a sub-continent with people of different castes, creeds and religions, has different cultures and customs prevailing at the same time but still there are certain things which are common to all of us. The Moslems have their own customs and cultures and the Hindus have their own. The Moslems and the Hindus are utterly different from each other because they were in contact with each other since centuries, some of the customs have become common to both these races. The way the Moslems dress, their way of living differs from the Hindus but under the dominance of the British Empire for one hundred-fifty years we have adopted some of their customs. In a way I like it but at the same time on the other hand I don't because a nation as big as India should try to preserve its own peculiarities, mind its own customs.

The festivals of the Hindus are colorful and some of them are celebrated throughout the country since they are evenly distributed. India being a large country some festivals are celebrated with real gusto and glee while they are not in the north.

I cannot say much about America because on the very first I reached this place (Las Cruces) I landed in the hospital. I think I am in a better position to write about the hospitals rather than about America. But what I have seen while coming through New York, Dallas and El Paso, I think this piece of land fascinates me.

Since I have come across a lot of Americans while coming and also in Fort Stanton hospital, I think I am in a position to say some things about them. They are hospitable, sociable, and they treat the foreigners as if they were from America itself. Some of my American friends, wanted to know about India and its people, but I am sorry to

say that they don't know much about India as the Indians do about America. I think this might be due to that they are too busy with their work and concerned about their own country that they don't bother to know about other countries. I have found out, by being in this hospital, that the people of America take great interest in politics and sports irrespective of their ages, which is I think, a sign of greatness, and a well advanced culture. In America there is dignity of labor and everyone is treated in the same

way regardless of what he is earning. I feel ashamed to admit that we, in India, don't have this. I hope the Indians, including myself, should take a lesson about this from Americans.

Now, about the girls I don't think there is much difference between the girls of India and America, as a matter of fact I think the girls are just alike whether they are from England, France or Russia. In my opinion, I think the Americans are more fashionable and dress in a different manner than from

the Indians. I have come to know a girl in this hospital and from her attitude toward me, I can say this much, that the American girls are nice to talk to, sociable, beautiful and are of younger nature.

To the end all, I have to say that this country fascinates me and I am sure that I will have a good time during my four years stay as a student in New Mexico State University. I am definite, that when I will go back to my country I will carry some cherishable memories with me.

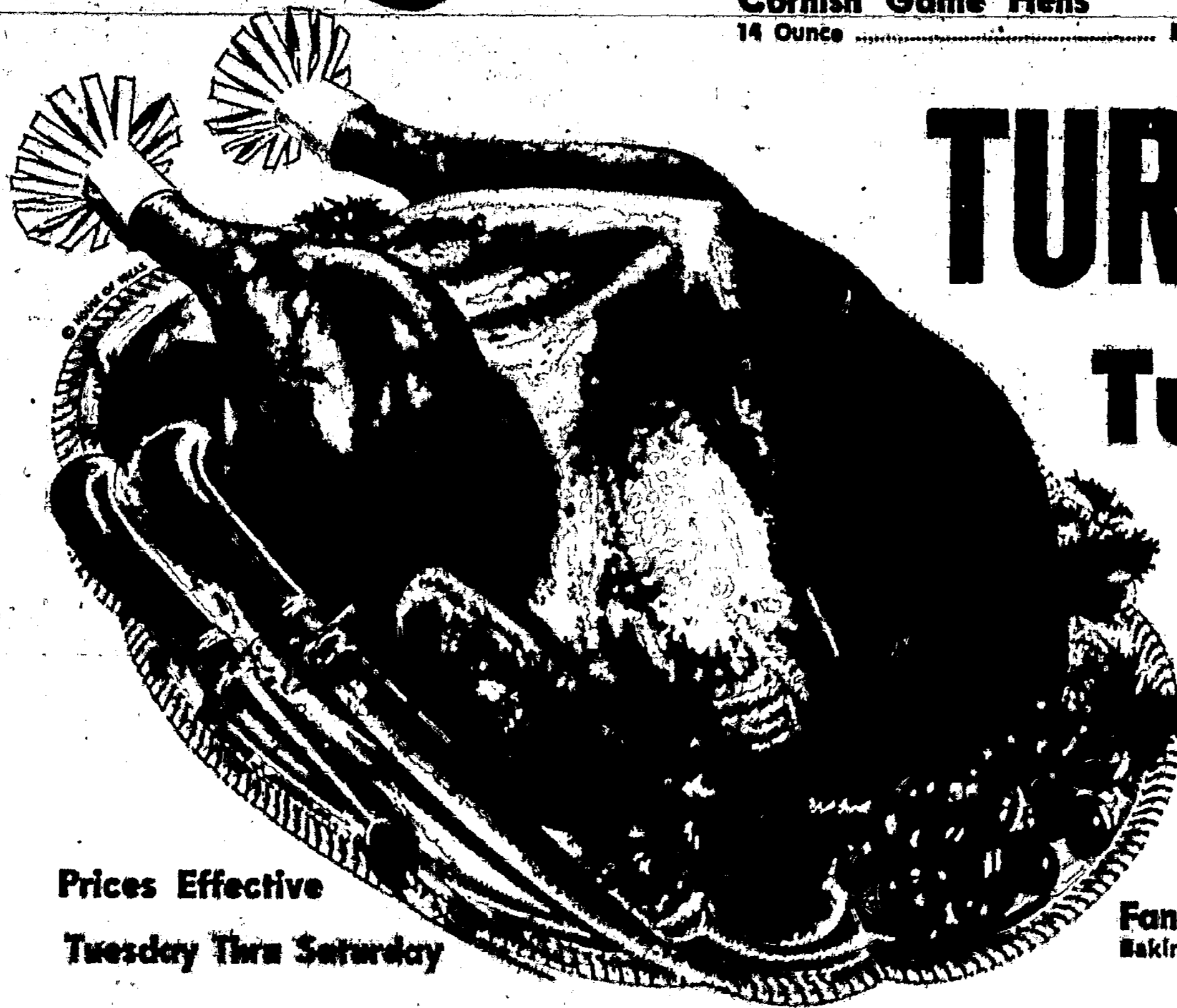

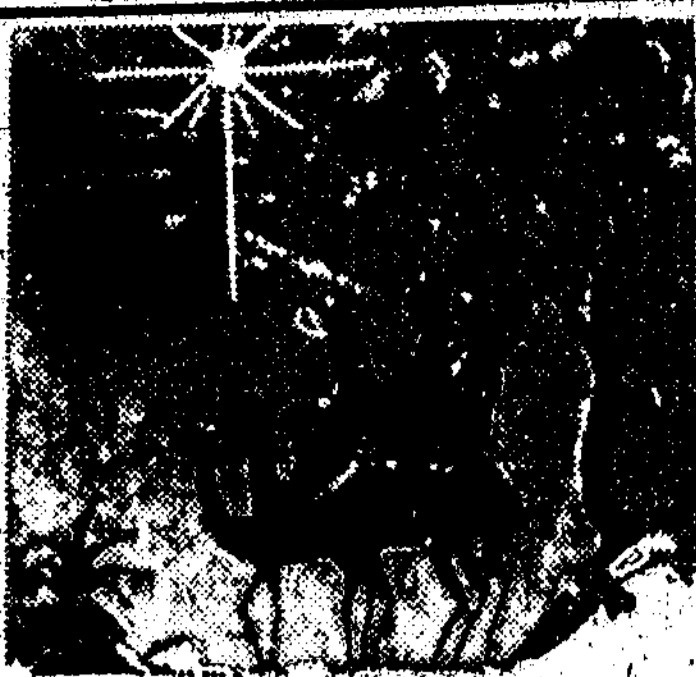

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# Are you ready for winter driving?

Winter driving conditions do not cause accidents, but drivers who fail to adjust to these conditions cause them. An understanding of the causes of wintertime traffic accidents is your strongest protection against them. The following rules will tell you how to cope with the hazards of winter driving:

1. Be sure that your car is in good mechanical condition, that your tires are good and are properly inflated. Snow tires provide added traction. Check your windshield wipers, defroster and heater - be sure they are working properly.

2. Before starting out, clear off all snow and ice from your windshield, and all other windows of your car. Be sure your headlights, turn signals, and tail lights are clear of snow. Long hours of darkness, cloudy and misty weather, sleet and snow, and frosted windshields all make it difficult to see. YOU MUST SEE DANGER IN ORDER TO AVOID IT.

3. Adjust your seat so that your right foot rests comfortably on the accelerator pedal. If you are too far back, your foot rests only on the lower part of the pedal, making smooth starting more difficult. When the road is slippery, be gentle with the accelerator. Increase engine speed only enough to handle the load. Too much gas will spin the wheels and then even the most skillful driver will lose control. With standard transmission avoid letting the clutch pedal out with a "thump". Cars with automatic transmissions start smoothly on ice when they are driven gently.

4. To find out how slippery the road is, try your brakes while driving slowly and away from traffic.

5. Be alert: Snow banks often hide danger, watch out for stalled vehicles, hidden driveways, intersections and pedestrians. Watch out for icy patches, slow down when in doubt. It is up to you to winterize your driving technique in order to avoid accidents.

6. Follow at a safe distance, never too close, drive well in back of the car ahead of you so you will have plenty of room to stop. Remember the distance required to stop on snow or ice is from three to twelve times greater than the distance required to stop on dry pavement. If you start to skid, to recover control of your car - turn the front wheels in the DIRECTION OF THE SKID. STAY OFF THE BRAKES!

7. The only safe way to stop on slippery roads is by pumping the brakes rapidly but gently. This prevents locking or skidding of the wheels. So be cautious, be safe and help prevent accidents.

## Mr. Zip moves long distance parcels fast

Mr. ZIP has a new assignment—to accelerate delivery of long distance parcel post by 24 hours or more.

Postmaster General John A. Gronouski has announced plans to distribute outgoing parcel post by ZIP Code in the Nation's largest post offices. These offices account for more than 50 percent of the total volume.

The program, he said, not only speeds deliveries but reduces damage to parcels because of fewer handlings in transit.

"I have made a commitment to President Johnson to revitalize our sagging parcel post service," Mr. Gronouski said.

"I envisage a virtual revolution in the handling of parcels."

"The success of the program," Mr. Gronouski said, "hinges on public use of ZIP Code numbers in addressing packages, as well as the cooperation of firms that mail parcel post in large volume."

Explaining how the program operates, Mr. Gronouski pointed out that ZIP Coded parcel post bypasses larger cities where there is a heavy mail volume in post offices and is routed directly to the sectional center nearest its destination.

### Faster-Safer Deliveries

Delivery thus is accelerated by as much as 24 hours, especially for packages which travel 300 miles or more. And since fewer handlings are involved, the possibility of damage is reduced.

By way of illustration, Mr. Gronouski said a parcel mailed from Los Angeles to Alexandria, Virginia, without ZIP Code must be halted enroute at Cincinnati for further sorting. From there it is sent to the Washington, D. C., sectional center and then forwarded to Alexandria.

But if the package is ZIP Coded it will bypass Cincinnati and move directly to Alexandria through the Washington sectional center, usually by local delivery star routes, saving as much as a day in transit.

ZIP Code is built around the concept of 568 of these sectional centers throughout the country. Mr. Gronouski explained:

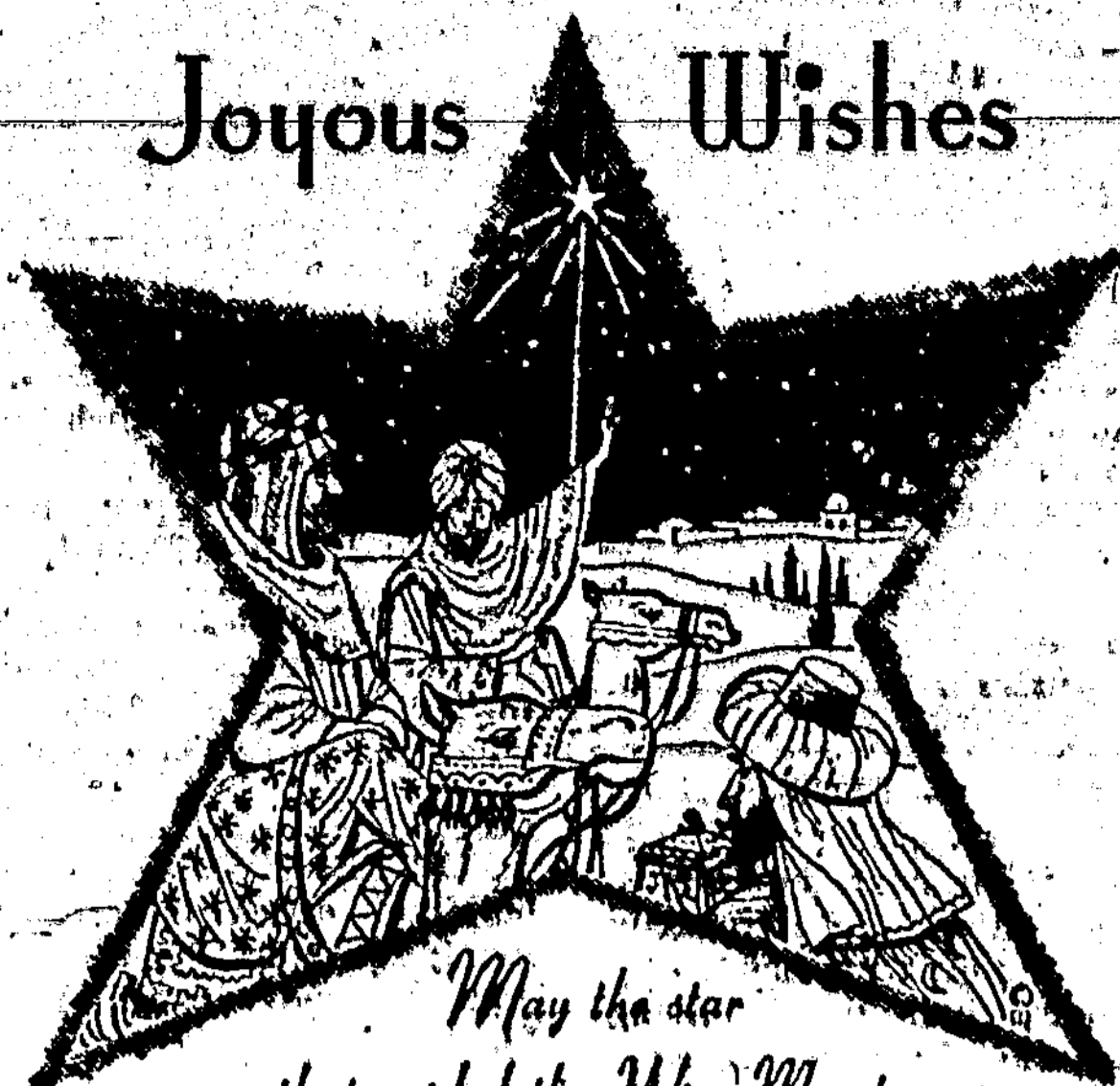

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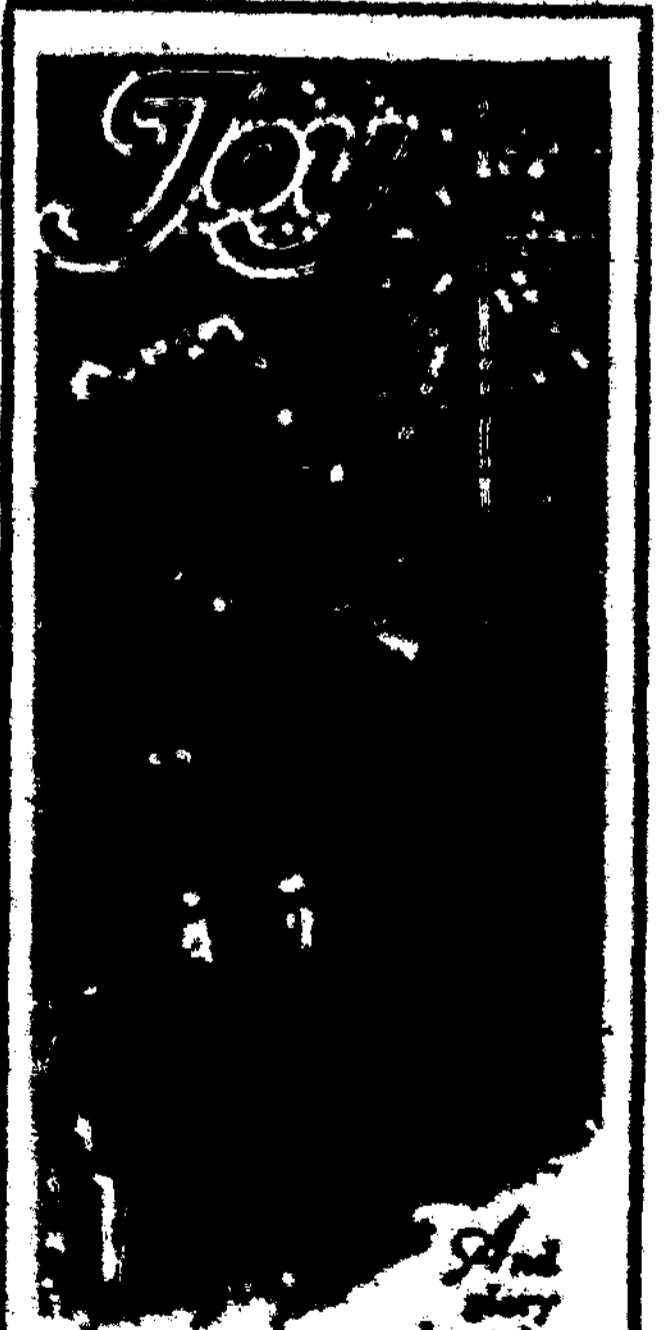

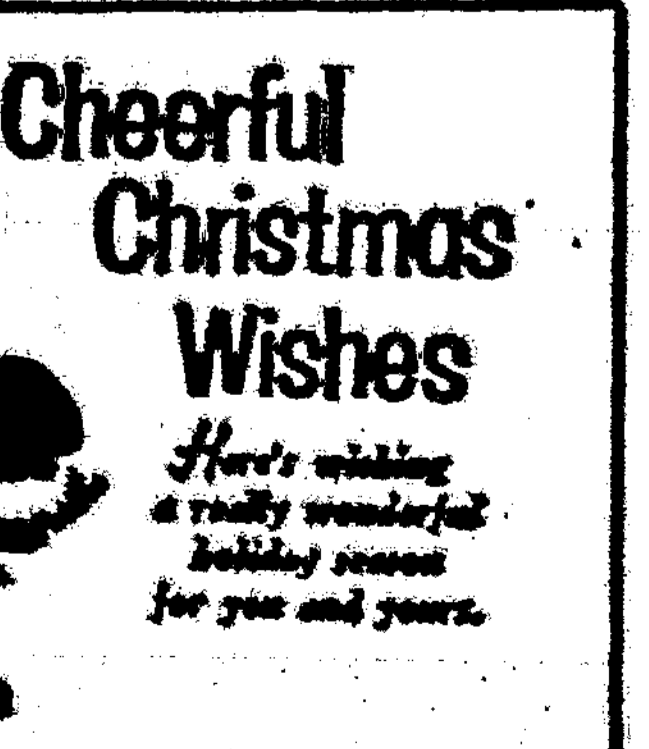
