Manuel V. Chavez, Lincoln

Co. probation officer and deputy district clerk, died of a heart attack at 7:50 p.m. Tuesday. He had gone to Corona on business, gotten sick, a doctor from Vaughn was called to his motel and spent two or three hours with him prior to his death. Mr. Chavez had previously been seriously ill with heart trouble.

"Mannie", as he was called by many people in Lincoln County, was born in Carrizozo on October 10, 1911. He went through school in Carrizozo and played on the first Grizzly football team organized here.

His interest in sports was life long. Manny chased the Grizzly teams all over the state in years following his graduation. For a number of years both Manny and his brother, Zeke, played semi-pro baseball when Carrizozo had a team.

Following graduation with the Class of 1932 Manny worked at Harry Miller's Place (where the Niko is now) as a bartender until 1941.

He worked as Civil Service employe in Roswell and Alamogordo until 1945 when he went into the service for his country.

In more recent years Manny was Justice of the Peace, 1951-52 and has been Probation officer since early 1953. His work in this capacity has been of great value to Lincoln County. Only last year Mr. Chavez was cited by the U. S. Army for help in recruiting, even taking boys to Albuquerque when they did not have transportation.

He was never known to speak mean to a youngster, always trying to help them and keep them from going to the Springer Boys Home if possible.

There are many times a year when the Lincoln Co. sheriff's office gets real busy and during these times Manny was of utmost help, tending to the office or helping with roadblock, whatever was needed most.

"One does not know just how much good work a person is doing until he is gone" ... said Sheriff Glen Bradley.

Survivors include the wife, Rosa; four children, Eddie in Service but now home; Cecelia of Dallas, Texas; Gene and Lorena of the home.

Two brothers, Ruben of Carrizozo and Zeke of Roswell; one sister, Mrs. Bertha LaFave of Carrizozo; and Mrs. Maggie Chavez the mother, Joe Chavez, stepson, of Carrizozo, and Mrs. Felipa Grice, stepdaughter, of Carson City, Colorado; and nine grandchildren.

Hampton-Holland Funeral Home is in charge of arrangements which will be made by Sheriff Glen Bradley. Setting of date for funeral service is pending the arrival of relatives.

PROBLEM IS LOCATION

Airport equipment available

The Carrizozo Town Council met Tuesday night short two members and several matters were tabled pending a full meeting.

Clerk Edward Penfield read a letter from the Albuquerque District Office of the Federal Aviation Agency stating that equipment at the Corona landing field will be available for transfer in the near future.

The equipment includes the following:

One 51' beacon tower, 36" clear and green beacon, wind cone, 22,260' (4.2 miles) Class C fence, 10x14' frame building with hardwood floor, van body, 5,000' of runway lights (includes 4 green threshold lights and about 20 clear runway lights, plus underground cable), 30 metal boundary or landing strip markers, 3 observation lighted poles 15' tall.

To obtain this equipment the Town would have to agree to clear the site to the satisfaction of the landowner, use for public airport purposes for at least one year. The equipment would have to be picked up within 60 days after the Town's receipt of authorized transfer. The equipment will have to be put back into use within 60 days of actual acquisition.

There would be no "strings" other than those already mentioned. The original cost of the equipment was \$17,160, and its replacement value now would be considerably higher.

Airport space now in use at Carrizozo is not large enough to

meet FAA specifications, nor can the present field be enlarged because of highways on two sides. The biggest problem confronting the Town of Carrizozo in making use of the equipment is the acquisition of a suitable site.

Bill was allowed. Frank McBride met with the Council to talk over a youth recreation building. Mr. McBride suggested use of the light plant building. A youth center, according to McBride, would be self-supporting in every way. The youngsters would pay their own bills. Management of the Alamogordo recreation center was cited where they charge each member \$1.00 a month.

Wayne Withers stated that the light plant building was not in good shape. The roof leaks, two large motors still in the building, foundations for others would have to be knocked out, the building refloored. Probably would be cheaper to build new than try to repair this building. At present Otero County Electric has a storage lease on the building.

The Town received a recorded warranty deed from C. W. Jones conveying Lots 12 and 13, Block 35 (old recreation building) to the town. The deed stipulated that the property would have to be used for park, that the town would have to retain possession for 10 years, after which the property could be sold.

The Trustees, by unanimous vote, rejected the offer and instructed clerk Penfield to im-

mediately deed the property back to Jones.

Town Marshall Choncho Morales has been running check on "out" street lights, 24 out on January 6. This will be corrected. The Co-op Electric has finished new line construction, will take down Christmas lights Wednesday (yesterday) and replace street lights this week.

Ballard and Bates Construction Co. submitted application for building permit to build new school, cost \$254,000. Both school and town being divisions of State government, no fee will be charged. However, Ballard and Bates will be required to pay for contractor's license, about \$254.00.

Three occupation licenses received, tabled pending arrival of more of the same. Quotation of \$80.73 for 560 gallon gasoline tank received, no action.

Utility Manager Withers reported that town wells went down 30 gallons per minute during the summer; one from 310 to 280 and the other from 300 to 270. He would like to rest the wells and use Bonito water during February, March, April and May. Cost about the same, all agreeable with Council.

Council approved purchase of rotating red light for new Town pickup which is used to stop traffic on numerous occasions.

Attending the meeting were Councilmen Arrell Posey, Leandro Vega, Tennis Smoot, Clerk Edward Penfield and Wayne Withers, Steve Rizer and Frank McBride as visitors.

Repubs suffer sinking spell

SANTA FE — Every two years, just before campaign time, New Mexico Republicans appear to be dead and gone and then regularly recover to make a pretty good scramble in the minority role.

This time they seem deader and gone than usual but might recover.

TUCKER SELECTION WAS NOT POPULAR

The party leaders' selection of Merle Tucker of Gallup as a substitute for Tom Black for governor was a dud.

There were immediate protests from two big elements in the party, but more serious than the political squawking was the common question of: "Who's Merle Tucker?"

Complaints were from northern county chairmen and the conservative element in the party that is for Bobby Jordan for governor, and for Barry Goldwater for president. The two groups make up a big portion of the party.

CANDIDATES LACK IDEAL BACKGROUND

Republicans may still have another for governor in their convention at the end of next month, but the two candidates so far are not up to the usual offering by the party. Neither has the background in public life expected of gubernatorial candidates.

Republicans in all their traditional losing in New Mexico have most always come up with the best man in the party for governor.

When Ed Mechem first ran for governor in 1950 he had been in the state legislature, had received serious support for governor in prior years and was the nephew of former Gov. Merritt Mechem and son of Judge Edwin Mechem.

OTHERS EXPERIENCED IN PUBLIC AFFAIRS

Alvin Stockton, the party's man for governor in 1954, was speaker of the state house of representatives, Manuel Lujan, 1948, was a long-time mayor of Santa Fe, Ed Safford, 1946, was a former state auditor and party state chairman, Carroll Gunderson, 1944, was a legislator and Grants mayor.

Tucker and Jordan have held statehouse jobs but have never been elected to anything. (Continued on page four)

Ruidoso rejects municipal gas

Ruidoso — The voters of Ruidoso voted almost to one against measure Monday which would have given trustees the power to issue \$775,000 in revenue bonds for a municipal natural gas system.

The vote was 304 against and 105 in favor. Ruidoso's population is 2700.

Capitan residents voted eight-to-one in favor of establishing a municipal system there, but the Monday vote at Ruidoso may nullify the plan.

Kubilee is America's new milk producing champion

Price-Black Kubilee, a two year Guernsey heifer owned by the Price-Black Farms, Arrey, N. M., is America's new record holder for milk production. In a

365-day test conducted by the Extension Service of NMSU, the Price-Black Guernsey produced 20,524.8 pounds of milk and 797.36 pounds of butterfat on a twice daily milking schedule (an average of 28.5 quarts per day).

The test was confirmed by A. Wendell Fuhrman, representative of the American Guernsey Cattle Club, who told newsmen the production figure could be considered a world's record for a two-year-old Guernsey cow. Testing started Dec. 23, 1962 and ended Dec. 27, 1963.

According to Robert E. Price and Paul Black, owners of Price-Black Farms, the record is unusual since Kubilee was given no special treatment during the testing period. Milking was done by four different milkers using milking machines in the normal commercial operation of the farm. Freshened when she was 25 months old, Kubilee was in a corral with 33 other cows during the entire time.

Kubilee's dam, Meadow Lodge C. Kubilee, was purchased by Price-Black Farms, Inc. at the New Mexico State Guernsey sale in 1957. The dam has a record of 11,393 pounds of milk and 534 pounds of butterfat on AR 305 days, twice daily milking at six years of age. Sire of Kubilee is Elmwood Farms Chips Prince, bred in Hall, N. Y. and presently owned by the American Breeder Service.

The Price-Black Farm produces Golden Guernsey and Gurn-Z-Gold Milk sold by Price Creameries, Inc.



DEMOS TO HEAR 1952 CANDIDATE
Democrats have gone back to 1952 for the keynote of their state convention Feb. 22, Everett Grantham who stood as the Democratic candidate for governor that year.
Grantham and Lake Frazier of Roswell ran almost a dead heat in the party primary and went into a contest that finally had to be called off in the late summer if the party was to

have a candidate for governor in the fall campaign.

It went to Grantham 42,658 to 42,050 for Frazier.

Grantham went on to lose to Ed Mechem in the November show-down 111,000 to 129,000.

GRANTS CANDIDATE APPEARS STRONGER

The capital has heard a recent flurry of talk about George Dannenbaum, former mayor of Grants, as a serious contender for Demo land commissioner against Shepherder Hays, Gerry Cornelius and State Sen. Pete Shurbet of Harding.

Dannenbaum was down-rated in early estimates by observers who recalled his difficulties with his county chairman, the influential Filo Sedillo, but that changed when it was indicated that Sedillo may back him.

Hays, chief field officer for the land office, is a decided favorite for the nomination. Cornelius has a major asset in prospective Albuquerque support. He is a Bernalillo-county-commissioner.

DEMO CHAIRMAN READY TO QUIT

The land commission race almost fouled State Demo Chairman John Miles. His boy Wade of Tucumcari told far and wide that he was going to run for the nomination.

Miles was ready to quit as chairman if his son became a candidate, but the trouble disappeared when Wade made it known that he wouldn't run.

FREE RIDES FOR EIGHT

The Democratic state convention next month stands to give uncontested nominations for eight or nine of the 13 places on the state ticket.

Six weeks in front of the Santa Fe convention it was indicated that the convention would approve no opposition for Joe Montoya for the Senate, none for U. S. Rep. Tom Morris, Gov. Jack Campbell, Lt. Gov. Mack Easley, State Secretary Alberta Miller, Treasurer Joe Premio Court Justice Cleve Comp Grant, Auditor Alex Armijo, Supreme Court Justice Cleve Compton and possibly Corporation Commissioner Columbus Ferguson who was appointed to the office last summer.

CLOSER CONTROL THAN EVER BEFORE

It suggests that the May Democratic primary will be held to nominate one congressman, a corporation commissioner for the G. Y. Falls place, attorney general and land commissioner.

This year's convention promises to be more closely controlled than the last one in 1954 which allowed six contested races, all for minor offices, as compared with the four indicated this time.

Plus an automatic press.

THE EXAMPLE OF EZRA

"For Ezra had prepared his heart to seek the law of the Lord, and to do it, and to teach in Israel statutes and judgments." (Ezra 7:10).

Evidently, Ezra was a captive from birth—born in a land where his parents had been carried into captivity. He, like Joseph and Daniel had gained considerable favor and power with the captor king. Through living in a strange land, under adverse circumstances, still his parents had taught and instilled within him love and respect for God. Kingly favors and powerful prestige did not turn his heart from God.



ASSESSOR'S NOTICE TO PROPERTY OWNERS IN LINCOLN COUNTY

It is again time to remind property owners to render their taxes for 1964. Many have already attended to this when they were in Carrizozo to pay their taxes — which saves time and worry in remembering dates when the Assessor will be in their locality. A 5% penalty is charged after March 1st, 1964. Also veterans do not receive their exemptions if they fail to bring their Eligibility Certificates when rendering property taxes and sign for the Exemption on the Tax Schedule — and have their Certificates signed.

Fair rendering of property by every property owner would make our taxes lower — and make us proud we are taking a part in helping to run our County Government and schools.

We should render our house hold furniture even though we do not own a house but have our own furniture — value furniture according to the price — if you do not have new furniture value it at 1/3 of the cost. A new house and new furniture should be rendered a little different; a new home at 1/3 the cost and furniture at 1/10 of the house cost. Grazing lands are to be valued at \$1.42 or \$1.75 an acre according to location. Irrigated lands should be put on the tax roll at \$44.00 an acre. Lots should be valued at \$100.00 and up. Machinery, equipment, fences, pipe lines, (plastic & other) wind mills, pumps and livestock should be put on our Tax Rolls. — Livestock should be rendered at 95% of the herd, this includes elk, race horses, pigs, saddle horses, cows, bulls, goats and sheep.

It is real important to check your Tax Schedule, and your properties to see what you are being taxed on and know if your charges have been made. This is especially important for Ruidoso residents. — We don't want to pay in 1964 for property you sold in 1963 — at the same time new owners want this in their names so tax problems won't cause trouble.
