At one-month point before convention

5 of 13 offices have competition

SANTA FE — At the one month point before the Democratic pre-primary convention there was competition for five of the 13 places for which the convention will nominate candidates.

Free rides were in prospect for Joe Montoya for the U. S. Senate, for renomination of U. S. Rep. Tom Morris, Gov. Jack Campbell, Lt. Gov. Mack Esley, State Secretary Alberta Miller, Treasurer Joe Grant, and probably Supreme Court Justice Cleve Compton and Corporation Commissioner Columbus Ferguson.

JACK CAMPBELL HOOKS FREE RIDE

The repeal of the direct primary and return to the old convention system was intended to give U. S. Rep. Joe Montoya the Senate nomination without being tested in a primary election but it is also sheltering other officers from opposition, Governor Campbell for instance. In all the time of the primary no Democrat ever got the nomination for governor, or renomination, without winning it over opposition in a primary election.

Montoya would certainly have had serious opposition for the first Senate opening since 1948 had the primary been retained.

EVEN CLINT HAD TO RUN

Even the magnificent Clinton Anderson, fresh out of President Truman's cabinet as secretary of agriculture, couldn't get the party nomination for the Senate in 1948 until he had defeated John J. Dempsey in the primary election.

The law repealing the direct primary and setting up state nominating conventions is the same as was in effect here in 1952 and 1954.

The people got a crack at it in the election of 1950 and voted 54,000 to 14,000 to throw it out but because of a technicality it remained on the books. By 1955 even the legislature couldn't stomach it any longer and provided for a return to the direct primary.

LEGISLATORS FIGURE VOTERS ARE STUPID

Legislators defending themselves for repealing the primary last year commonly explain that they did it to keep stupid candidates out of the primary, and those with similar names to prominent public figures.

They imply that the stupid voters are unable to discern the real candidates and the fakes.

The voters aren't that dumb. In 1962 Joe E. Montoya, an Albuquerque salesman, filed against U. S. Rep. Joe M. Montoya.

The real Montoya got 75,000 and salesman Montoya got 20,000.

FULL OF ERRORS AND ABSURDITIES

The sloppy convention law passed by the 1963 legislature is so cluttered with errors and stupidities that the party chiefs might have trouble conducting the conventions next month.

Section 3-11-26 says that it is "absolutely proscribed and prohibited" for any delegate to cast more than one vote, or for any to vote by proxy in any manner.

And then it goes on to say that if the full number of delegates from any county are not present at the convention that those who are present may cast the full vote of the county.

NO MONEY LIMIT ON HOUSE RACES

Section 3-11-30 sets limitations on campaign spending for candidates for all national and state offices, district offices and state senator, but specifically excludes candidates for the state house of representatives from any limit on how much they may spend.

DANGEROUS BONER ON NOMINATIONS

Section 3-11-12 has the word "all" where the word "or" was apparently intended in such a place that a nit-picking lawyer might be able to confuse the whole nominating system.

Indicative of the carelessness of the authors of the law are five misspellings of the words "biennial" and "biennially."

The law repeals the direct primary and in Section 3-11-18 specifies that the ballots for the modified primary shall be inscribed: "Official Direct Primary-Election Ballot."

THE TUESDAYS AND SUNDAYS

And as everybody has heard by now there are those two references to Tuesday, "be it a Sunday or Holiday."

They occur in Sections 3-11-7 and 3-11-16. (The legislature didn't even get the section number right for 3-11-16. It appears in the law as Section 11-3-16 but was corrected by the compilers in the official statutes.)

DRAWN IN HURRY FOR EMERGENCY

The lawyers who drew the convention bill in the attorney general's office had to slap the thing out in a hurry when word came down that the direct primary absolutely had to be repealed.

The legislators had refused a convention bill which State Sen. Ed Mead said had been sent to him by Sen. Clint Anderson. A new bill was drawn to meet most of the objections raised against the Anderson-Mead bill and was muscled through with a narrow margin in each house.

February Third is Last Day

Monday, February 3, is the last day any voter may change his or her party affiliation before the primary election. Changes are made at the county clerk's office.

Work began this week on restoration of the historic first courthouse of Old Lincoln County, situated in the town of Lincoln, N. M. The new restoration is the 9th restoration project undertaken by the Old Lincoln County Memorial Commission in its program of preserving buildings which were important in New Mexico's frontier history. The historic building served as courthouse from 1869, when Old Lincoln County received its patent, until 1890, when the County purchased the famous Murphy Store in Lincoln, and transformed it into a courthouse. This second courthouse, now known as the Old Lincoln County Courthouse, is a state monument and a historic museum.

The first courthouse, long an architectural landmark in the town, also served as schoolhouse in the settlement. In 1866, it was purchased by the Archdiocese of Santa Fe to use as a parish house for San Juan parish. When the church was changed to the status of a mission, the parish house, or convento, as it is now known, was abandoned. The State of New Mexico purchased the property in 1962 for the purpose of restoring it.

Plans for the restoration were executed by Frank M. Staudhardt of Roswell. Work will involve the gradual straightening of a bulging adobe wall. When this has been accomplished, workmen can then proceed with making the building weather-tight.

Funds for the restoration were appropriated by the 1963 N. M. Legislature. They have been supplemented by a gift from the lawyers of Old Lincoln County. (The area now comprises present day Lincoln County, Chaves County, Lea, Mills, Curry, Roosevelt, De Baca, and Otero Counties.) Work is being directed by John Boyles, Commission curator.

Outstanding sheep and wool raisers given recognition at convention

Outstanding 4-H junior sheep and wool raisers were given recognition at the New Mexico Sheep and Wool Growers Assn. convention in Albuquerque Saturday.

Miss Moon started in 1959 with a flock of 47 Southdown and Rambouillet and now has a flock of 78 head.

Miss Archer started in 1958 with two head and now has 32. She expects to earn enough from her sheep project to pay for a college education.

The Cooper boys have a flock of 32 head which was started in 1958. They had the grand champion fleece at the New Mexico Wool Show in 1961, and the junior champion fleece in 1962.

McKnight is half owner with his brother, Jim, of a 500-head flock. He started his flock in

1958 with six ewes and now owns 250 head. In 1963, he marketed 147 lambs and sheared 2625 pounds of wool from his flock.

Those honored in the 4-H division were Carolyn Moon of McAllister, Judy Archer of Portales, and brothers John, Joe and Jud Cooper of Tinnie in Lincoln County.


Peter Hurd, Vincent Price to judge art show

LINCOLN COUNTY SHEEP CONTROLS STAY IN FORCE

The sheep quarantine covering northern Lincoln County probably will remain in effect until spring, a spokesman for the New Mexico Cattle Sanitary Board said.

The quarantine was invoked because of discovery of scabies, a skin condition caused by tiny mite. In several sheep of the area, Discovery of the affected animals was made two months ago, and the quarantine immediately invoked. No new cases of scabies have been found since then.

All animals of the affected flocks have been dipped in a solution to kill the mites, the board spokesman said. Regulations also call for dipping of animals of neighboring flocks. But the ranchers are postponing this, on the grounds, the weather is now too cold to dip the animals. This, the board spokesman said, probably will mean the quarantine cannot be lifted until spring.

Quarantine regulations require all sheep moved from the quarantine area to be dipped before leaving the area. Included in the quarantine area is the northern two-thirds of Lincoln County and an adjoining small part of Socorro County.

BOURBON CHICKEN — Recipe for two chickens (average fryers) 1 tsp. salt, 2 tsp. sodium glutamate (accent), 2 tsp. sweet paprika, 1 tsp. garlic salt, Mix in shaker and season pieces of chickens. Results Start Coming

The Town of Carrizozo could, and should start spending a little money and much time on a program of industrial development. At the outset of such a program all the interested people in town, those likely to serve on the town council, be active in the Chamber of Commerce, take part in woman's club activities, church, school should fully realize such program is not based on a short-term gain. Chances are good that the town can profit from such a venture, but it might take years for the profits to show.

In talking with the former head of the New Mexico Department of Development he said the towns that started and stayed with it have begun to show some results, the rest (the sudden starters and stoppers) none.

The economic growth and welfare of Lincoln County and its several small towns is much dependent on the activity of people in these same communities. Lincoln has had some years of short grass, there will be more. The mining industry has had its flurries, by-pass may take its toll some day.

The important item to remember is that Lincoln County has enjoyed a small but steady growth, in valuation, in population, over the last decade.

By the end of 1964 Carrizozo will be enjoying the benefits of a new court house, a new school, paving only a year old, new park — but suppose a company got serious about starting a small industry here . . . where could its people live. To be quite honest about the matter there is not one house in town that could be offered a family making \$5-\$10 thousand, or more a year. Under present circumstances any area of town is subject to having a house trailer set down next door, or possibly a small business with its attendant clutter start up in a neighboring lot.

We think that when the book on Carrizozo is made up it will show many advantages present right now that would appeal to industry — but the book will also show some serious shortages. Here is where Carrizozo, and Lincoln County, people need to take a close look. In the long run, what is done about the shortages will depend on people of the several communities.

A kindred note, and indeed rare script, was recently received by Co-Editor Mrs. Paul W. Payton of the Lincoln County News. It came from an Ellsworth, Kansas, resident, and was forwarded to this columnist.

The note came from Miss Anna O'Donnell, 415 Washington Street of that town; not far west of Salina where this columnist a few months back, about 2 o'clock in the morning, encountered a stampeding herd of cattle, foot-loose and fancy-free, ever reminding of what the old trail-driving days must have been.

Miss Anna O'Donnell is the 101-year-young aunt of Mrs. Payton. And she takes great pride with her writing and attention to her mail. The reader will understand right away that little calculation is required to know that Miss O'Donnell challenged the world with her entry during the heat of the Great Civil War, as it spread over the Nation.

The Miss O'Donnell note expressed concern and interest about the recent LONG AND SHORT column in the News on the subject of Coronado, "The Southwest's Greatest Treasure Hunter!" In it she wrote "I was interested in what Kit Carson wrote about Coronado. If you think he would like the enclosed, please mail it to him." She referred to a note she had enclosed with her regular correspondence with her New Mexico niece.

Now isn't such a note just about the most wonderful thing in the world, such an expression and such concern coming from a century-old spinster and with such clarity.

AND YOU CAN JUST IMAGINE HOW IT TICKLED THE HEART OF THIS OLD COLUMNIST. And I'll be a note that I'll always cherish.

It came at a time when I was reading the autobiography of Paul W. Kearney, an old free lance writer that spent more than 35 years combating the rugged field. And I had just finished reading a few of his statements about the pleasure he had derived from his work during the long, hard years. Topping the articles which he had been able to deposit in the bank, he told how he had in a series of pieces been able to help an aged public servant an old fireman who had given the better part of his years to protect the property of his fellow citizens. And Kearney had been instrumental in gaining a long-fought-for pension for the brave old man.

And Paul Kearney said, "You can't put remuneration like that in the bank. But you can put it in your heart. And that's the real reward even a free lance can't squander!"

That's also some of the riches gleaned by the newspaper people as they struggle along over the treacherous paths of their fields, sowing worthy seeds and rendering a few kind deeds along the trail.

The note Miss O'Donnell had included in the Payton letter was forwarded. And you should have seen the excellent handwriting with which this kind-hearted gentlewoman had composed the note.

For an understanding of its clarity, as well as its text, I quote below, in quotation marks:

"Mr. Paul Jones, Lyons, Kansas, wrote a book, 'Coronado in Kansas,' telling of his search for the seven Cities of Cibola, said to be built of gold.

"The Indian tribes were prosperous, but their gold was corn.

"Around Lyons have been found many Indian relics. Mr. Jones had a wonderful collection found around Lyons.

"Between Salina and Lindbergh is a hill called Coronado Heights. Now a favorite picnic

place. A winding road goes around and around. There are picnic tables and a Shelter House on top and a wonderful view of the country."



They apply this rule while explaining the universe and creation. They also use it in the subversion of a country or government. If the Communists tell the people of a country that the United States is an imperialist country and if they repeat this claim over and over, the majority of the people will believe them. The power of suggestion is great. The Communists will go to any length to prove their point and further their victory, they do not play by the rules.

Right now the main objective of the Communist party is to degrade the United States and its activities as a country. In too many cases they have been successful. For example, in some country demonstrations against the American "Yankee" may be Communist agitated at first, but they gradually become sincere on the part of the people. Confusion in a country is a definite advantage of the Communists. Our enemies use many tactics to achieve their goal, and unless we are alert, they will all be successful.

The Communists are now using their psychological warfare for their biggest whopper; that whenever Communism is in power, the people are happy, healthy and prosperous, and that just the opposite is true in the United States and other democratic countries.
