El Rito school viewed as hub for job training

FATEFUL DAY FOR EL RITO

SANTA FE — The board of the Northern New Mexico School at El Rito is slated to choose a new president this weekend, a decision that could make or break the step-child institution forever.

There is no sense in continuing the state institution in its role as a local junior-senior high school, with boarding facilities, for the local area with a \$300,000-a-year state appropriation.

Gov. Jack Campbell has named the proposed job-training program at El Rito as a major factor in his plan to improve conditions in northern New Mexico which would seem to reduce the probability of the board putting in a political type president, or an unqualified local favorite as has been anticipated by many.

STATE JOBS CHIEF LACKS TRAINING

Campbell has made job training a major part of his program and got \$300,000 from the legislature to launch the work. El Rito has been viewed as the hub of the program.

The state board of education got the program underway by employing the Portales school superintendent, Mike Hunt who is not a vocational training authority, as the state director of vocational education at \$13,000 a year.

Hunt's experience in the field, as noted in state board files, was handling a high school class in agricultural vocational work back in the 1920s.

LOCAL APPLICANTS LACK BACK GROUND

A dozen out-of-state applicants have backgrounds in vocational educations but none of the local applicants for the \$12,000 job at El Rito.

Appearance causing business loss

Many Lincoln County businesses that depend on tourist trade are losing money by not making their facilities more attractive.

Motorists passing gasoline stations, restaurants, and motels for the first time often pass up those that are unsightly, poorly landscaped, or that have inadequate parking areas. Restaurants will often plant shrubs around the foundation of their building, but neglect entirely the borders of their property. Unsightly adjoining property can be screened by a fence, hedge, or a row of tall evergreens if space is available.

And there may even be room for flowering trees to give an attractive display of color. Garbage and trash cans can also be screened by plant material or a fence.

During hot weather, motorists are more apt to stop at businesses with some shade. The importance of having a few trees for shade, or to provide

a background for the main building is often overlooked. Plant material around buildings should be maintained properly to keep it healthy. Sick or insect-riddled plants are not a good advertisement. Many firms make the mistake of not properly maintaining their plantings, after investing a considerable sum for shrubs and plants. One solution to this problem is to hire a firm that does landscaping maintenance. Money spent in developing and maintaining grounds of businesses is a good investment and will help attract more business.

Spotted alfalfa aphid numerous

Check your alfalfa for spotted alfalfa aphid. This pest is becoming numerous in other areas. Don't spray unless they are hurting the alfalfa too much. Often lady bugs and other beneficial insects will keep the infestation under control. When mowing leave the borders or other strips so the beneficial insects will have some shelter.

Apricots, peaches have full crop

The fruit prospects looked excellent as of Tuesday. There has been no freeze damage although the wind the past few days will hurt some of the fruit. Around Tinnie the apricots, peaches and other fruit have a full crop.



SAUCEDO PARTICIPATES IN OPERATION BACKPACK

While in the Seventh Fleet, Saucedo participated in a number of fleet operations including "Operation Backpack", a joint Seventh Fleet-Republic of China sea assault training exercise designed to test the assault landing capabilities of the units.

Don't take chances with R D

On May 1, for the second successive year, an all-out counter-offensive will be launched on a nationwide front against one of mankind's major disease treats, R D — Respiratory Disease — is a group of ailments that includes such grave chronic conditions as asthma, chronic bronchitis, emphysema, and tuberculosis — all potentially fatal.

Respiratory Diseases vary in form but have at least one important feature in common. Their presence is usually signalled, by shortness of breath or a chronic cough. These identifying signs make it possible to raise a general flag of warning. And such warning is all the more needed because some of the more serious forms of R D, such as emphysema, are hard to detect in their early stages.

Last year, in America's first nationwide alert against the symptoms of R D, the National Tuberculosis Association and affiliate state and local groups, including those in New Mexico used all communications media to spread the slogan: "If you have chronic cough or shortness of breath, you may have a Respiratory Disease. Don't take chances. See your doctor." Vast numbers of Americans got the message; many heeded the advice to seek medical attention for their chronic cough or shortness of breath.

This May and June the Christmas Seal Associations, with the impetus thus gained, will take the field again and seek to make the message stick. Stanton directors tend to business

Eugene Mann, of Portales, chairman of the Ft. Stanton TB Hospital board of directors, and Mrs. Lena Mae Pfeiffer of Tatum, Lawrence Goodell of Roswell, and Dr. Louis Levin of Albuquerque, members, met at the hospital for the April meeting on the 3rd.

The agenda included a lot of business of importance to the hospital and Lincoln County. Ben Mason, chief of the budget division, bureau of finances, was present. Mr. Mason said he was pleased with the agenda and was particularly interested in one item — setting up the boys camp and according to Mr. Mason this project would get underway immediately.

The boys camp will be administered by Springer officials and using their budget. The boys will do quite a little of the work.

The facility will be located at the west end of the 1300 acre tract of the Fort, approximately two and one quarter miles from the hospital. Water and fire protection can be worked out. Temporary quarters for eight to ten boys will be the first item. Eventually a dormitory for 50 boys will be built.

The Springer and Ft. Stanton boards of directors will hold a joint meeting soon. Dr. Mann and Supt. George Bryan were empowered to act as an executive committee to work out the details of the boys camp.

Dr. Mann told the board that work was being done on a tabulation of policies of the TB Hospital, records of these are now being kept in Santa Fe. They will be available soon and on file at Fort Stanton so the staff and directors will have access to minutes of past meetings and policies in force.

A resolution was passed 'n appreciation of the work of Mrs.

Alicia Romero of Santa Fe who has served on the board of directors for two and one half years and could not attend the meeting due to circumstances beyond her control.

Ben Mason, state finance officer, had just recently completed a 3900 mile trip visiting public institutions in several states, as a basis for comparing state agency cooperation with that in New Mexico. Mr. Mason is enthusiastic about the potential of Fort Stanton as a hospital unit and particularly for a boys camp.

Several suggestions were discussed about construction of a control ward, one where patients could not walk out. One possibility is to add a second story to the existing hospital structure. Separate quarters for men and women are needed, eight to ten beds total. Such a ward would help control TB in the state, and make for better cooperation with law enforcement agencies. The services of a consultant will be secured to work out details for the control ward.

The decision about whether or not Ft. Stanton will continue to be a tuberculosis hospital should be made the latter part of this month. A Committee visited Ft. Stanton and were to report to the government in one month, the answer may be forthcoming after the state medical meeting, held last week. The suggestion was made to admit pulmonary patients other than those with TB. This was turned down by the medical society but the thinking was at this meeting that such action might be admissible now. The law states that a hospital for tuberculosis. Only the words, and other pulmonary diseases, need be added.

Dr. Crawford Jernigan, medical director, said it would be preferable for Ft. Stanton to be the center for TB control, except for the case register kept in Santa Fe. The Ft. Stanton staff does and will continue to conduct clinics throughout the state.

Dr. Louis Levin answered questions from News editor about reasons for moving TB patient from Ft. Stanton. The trend is to have such patients in hospitals where surgery is available. Thinking is now that tuberculosis patients do not need to be isolated. Discussion in Denver last May on transfer of TB bacilli and doctors are not sure a mask is needed for protection. The "Old guard" in Socorro were not in favor of the TB hospital at Ft. Stanton from the first. There has been talk of scattering TB patients but Arizona is going the other direction, one 173 bed hospital and closing county hospitals. Considerable saving in centralizing their case load. Dr. W. F. Rosenblatt said that case study, use of new drugs can better be carried out with a large number of patients.

Supt. George Bryan said the hospital was functioning within 1 to 1 1/2 per cent of the budget. Patient cost per day is \$15.30. Bryan said he had offered to warehouse materials from Moriarty where an institution is being dismantled. Many miles of pipe, loads of lumber, 33 fire plugs, etc. Other agencies could use these materials, savings up to \$150,000.

Use of Eagle Creek water discussed. The Fort averages 100,000 per day, and has that right based on 1907 patent for use of Eagle Creek water. Bryan will serve as a member on the Eagle Creek Water Users Assn.

Housing rates at Ft. Stanton were reviewed by Bryan and Goodell. The rates were set when the federal government operated the hospital. The final report will be made at the next meeting.

Doctors are scarce said Bryan. He had contacted doctor placement agencies in Chicago and New York, no suggestions at all received. Dr. Rosenblatt said he was in contact with a doctor in Alabama who said he might be interested in coming to Ft. Stanton. Doctor salaries at the Fort are not the highest in the country.

Bryan said that Ft. Stanton hospital was participating in an analysis conducted by the Arkansas State Sanatorium on hospital costs. Where operation costs are real low, the institution could be simply custodial, with little nurse care, where the costs are high the patient load could be low.

The next meeting will be May 8-9 starting at 3:00 p.m. at the hospital.

The daily average number of patients at Ft. Stanton is 172, 187 under treatment on April 3. This amounts to 77.4 % occupancy. The average patient stays in the hospital 161 days. In February 588 patients were receiving medication, 1523 patients on chemotherapy.

The Great Plains Conservation Program, administered by the Soil Conservation Service of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, is assisting land owners in Lincoln county wage the battle against an estimated 1,000,000 acres of Cholla infested rangeland. It is estimated that this infestation is increasing at a rate of one per cent or more per year. Ranchers entering into Great Plains Conservation Program contracts will receive technical and cost-sharing assistance in controlling the spread of Cholla cactus on the range. The amount of cost-sharing received is dependent upon the degree of infestation of cactus on a given pasture or group of pastures. The Lincoln County average cost for grubbing and stacking cactus in the 30-100 plants per acre category is \$2.50 per acre, 100-300 plants per acre is \$5.00 per acre and over 300 plants per acre is \$7.50 per acre. The Federal government cost-stares 60% of the average cost.

Las Cruces lawyers sign petition for Judge George Zimmerman

SANTA FE — Las Cruces Lawyer James Crouch has a petition calling for the Democratic nomination of District Judge George L. Zimmerman of Alamogordo which a few days ago had the signatures of 17 Las Cruces lawyers.

That was all but four of the Las Cruces lawyers who are not running for office or performing in some public capacity.

The petition appeared significant in consideration of Dist. Atty. Dan Sosa, a resident of Las Cruces, also being a candidate for the Zimmerman place.

Sosa has been running ever since Zimmerman fined him \$50 for contempt of court.

Stanley Splits Vote
The race is confused by Dick Stanley of Alamogordo also running with prospects of splitting the vote in favor of Sosa.

Zimmerman was appointed last year by Gov. Jack Campbell to clear up a sticky situation in which Judge Allan Walker of Alamogordo had fallen seriously behind and was induced to resign.

The district is composed oftero, Dona Ana and Lincoln counties with Judge William Roggin of Dona Ana the senior judge.

The judgeship is the No. 1 job in the Demo primary in the area. Dona Ana Demo Chairman Phil Neumeyer, an assistant district attorney, is running for DA and taking pains to tell that he is not teaming with his boss, Sosa.

Other Democrats are straining to keep one of the judgeships against the much bigger Dona Ana and mush choose between two candidates.

Zimmerman has won much respect since his appointment but he's a newcomer in politics of the area.

Parasite Agencies
There are four big parasite operations in the capitol that run on the money of other agencies.

The February legislature authorized continuation of the practice although a question was raised on the legality of inter-agency transfers of money.

Others Pay Bills
The capitol custodian operation is set up for \$305,000 to be

collected from the agencies. The program is relying on other agencies for all its money, \$214,940.

The board of education and finance must tap the educational institutes for its \$69,000. State Auditor Alex Armijo must get \$280,000 of his \$280,000 budget from other agencies.

Has Farm Out
The attorney general has assistant AGs all over the capitol on other's payrolls, which suggests that he isn't likely to go along on a challenge of the practice.

Doubts about the legality of the inter-agency transfers have been voiced by people in the department of finances and administration.

Withdrawal of State Rep. Albert Lebeck from the state senate race in McKinley has removed another majority legislative figure from the scene.

Lebeck was majority leader in the house a short time back, was a candidate for speaker and performed as an effective leader.

He and former Sen. Guido Zecca were cutting each other in a fight to unseat Demo. Sen. George Amaya when Lebeck quit. Amaya, who operates outside the McKinley Demo organization, got the party nomination in 1960 on a three-way split with Frank McCarthy 1,150 votes, John Bass 1,307 and 1,669 for himself.

Brasher, Chacon Retiring
Also departing the house are leaders Rep. Jerry Brasher of Albuquerque who performed with extraordinary influence through sessions since 1953, and Rep. Mat Chacon of Rio Arriba, a leader of the Spanish-American group in the house since his first election in 1952.

Chacon is backing the powerful Rio Arriba Demo organization in an effort to replace Sen. Albert Amador.

Perry, Hints Heard
Since publication of an article in this space last week about a pay cut from \$650 to \$450 for Earl Perry of Roswell who sometimes serves as a political aide for Gov. Jack Campbell, there have been several hints from Roswell and the capitol that the governor is making up the difference from his own funds.

Mrs. Lee Caudill knocked down by first shock of Alaskan earthquake

Mr. and Mrs. Lee Caudill, former residents of Deming, live in Palmer, Alaska about 40 miles from Anchorage. The following letter written March 28; the day after the earthquake hit that area, was received by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Caudill of 620 South 8th. It was written by Mrs. Caudill.

Dear Folks:

A hasty line this morning to let you know we survived the earth quake without damage to anything except our nerves.

I understand it was such a severe one the meters used to register quakes, couldn't handle it, so it must have been as bad as I thought it was at the time.

Lee was at work and I had been running the vacuum and had just shut it off to move it into the bathroom, when I hear the unmistakable rumble of the quake and it hit almost at once. I headed for the outside, grabbing my jacket as I ran. I made about two steps out, when I was knocked down. I tried to get up so I could get further from the house, but I could only get to my knees before I was shaken down again.

The house, the woodshed and trees were rocking so I didn't see how anything would be left standing. And worse than that was the horrible roar and grinding that came from Pioneer Peak. It was half covered with clouds so I couldn't see what was happening, but it sounded as though the whole mountain was falling.

Later I heard there were several slides and along with this noise was another sound like a terrible wind storm blowing through the valley.

When it finally stopped shaking and I could get to my feet, I could see the poor horses running circles and scared to death, with a couple of them where they didn't belong. I walked a few steps, waiting for the house to stop shaking and my knees to stop shaking and then I heard the ground cracking right where I was standing. It has been a long time since I've run that fast. I was in moccasins and I don't recall even noticing that my feet were cold.

I stood in open place out near the edge of the shop and waited until the tremors had pretty well subsided, then headed back for the house. Couldn't see any crack through the snow, so I guess it wasn't a very big one. The house was still creaking and moaning so I just opened the door, looked in to see what was left standing, put on some overshoes that were on the porch and went on to check the horses. Phantom had flattened a wire gate and received some scratches, and Prince had jumped a fence. Moonshine, who was in the open, was nowhere to be seen and I was a little worried about him, but he's OK this morning.

Anyway Henry and Berta drove up while I was checking on the horses and we came in to look things over. Lee called (I hadn't even thought about trying to use the phone, figuring it was knocked out along with the electricity) and said he was OK, but the school house was in shambles. Sure was lucky the kids had gone home before it hit.

Berta called her folks and they told her they had a terrible mess at their place, so we drove in to see about them. Almost all of their dishes were broken, their big heavy stove had all out in the middle of the floor. I just couldn't understand how we got off so light here, when so many people like Sharps, got hit so hard.

I didn't have a broken dish, and the worst thing that happened was the door came open on the cabinet in the bathroom and several bottles fell out breaking some and making quite a mess.

They haven't given out the number of people killed. I've tried to call Lucas to see if Elaine is OK but no answer. We are concerned about Keith and Norma but presume they were in the clinic when the quake struck and were probably able to get all their patients and themselves out.

As the stories come in, I'm sure we'll hear some fantastic things. I hope we never exper-

ience a thing like that again, but I am keeping my boots on today, and my jacket and scarf and gloves on a chair by the door.

Henry and Berta got outside and hung on to their pickup to stand up, but the only thing that was broken in their house was one glass. Not much damage at Lucille's either.

We have enough drinking water in the pressure tank to last two or three days if the electricity is off that long, and I've been melting snow for the dishes and wash water, so we'll make out. I hope it comes on soon because of the freezer.

The sun is shining brightly this morning and except for a couple of tremors and the fact that everybody feels as though a house had fallen on them, all is serene at the moment.

I wish that I had some batteries for Pat's radio so I could hear the news.

We hope you weren't upset over this, and don't worry about us. We rode that one out, and maybe we won't have another like it for 50 years.


