She resigned the following year but at the beginning of World War II, when her help was needed, she returned as an operator in 1942. In 1958, she was appointed chief operator, the position from which she will retire.

Parade kicks off three-day rodeo in Joe Sargent Memorial Arena

There's bound to be a lot of activity in and around Carrizozo this weekend with two days of rodeo, jackpot calf roping and team roping, two big dances, and a parade to start things off, all sponsored by the Lincoln County Rodeo Assoc.

The parade will form about 4:30 p.m. at the rear of the telephone building and move down U. S. 54 at 5:00 p.m. Friday, May 29. Entries are welcome in the parade, horse, car, wagon, or what-have-you.

The first go-round of rodeo events will be under lights at the Joe Sargent Memorial Arena starting at 8:00 p.m. Friday. Saddle bronc, bareback, doggin, calf roping, bull riding, and barrel racing events will be run off. All entry fees are jack-potted.

There will be clowns and novelty acts during both the rodeo days. No one need go thirsty because the Carrizozo Junior Chamber of Commerce will be serving refreshments at the rodeo grounds all three days.

Six rodeo events will be run off on Saturday starting at 2:00 p.m. A special "All-around Trophy" will be presented to the high-point cowboy by Gene Hensley of Ruidoso Downs.

On Sunday, May 31, there will be jackpot calf roping and team roping starting at 2:00 p.m. in the arena. This roping will be one of the hottest in the area, with most of the best ropers on hand to contest for the jackpot money.

Rodeo headquarters are at the Yucca Grill. Rodeo entries close at 5:00 p.m. on Friday. All entries should be mailed to the Lincoln County Rodeo Association, Carrizozo, New Mexico. Stock is furnished by Ernest Peralta of Socorro.

The K-Hey Riders will play for dancing in the Nike Hall on both Friday and Saturday nights.

Billy Wrye has luck in car wreck

A two-car collision, caused by a herd of cattle put a Carrizozo youth and a Socorro man in the hospital, after an early morning smashup Saturday.

According to investigating officer Powder Knoblock of the State Police, William Wrye 19, was traveling west in a 1963 Chevrolet and Buford Richardson of Socorro was headed east in a 1963 Cadillac, when the two cars came upon some cows in the road, 20 and nine tenth miles west of Carrizozo on U. S. 380. Wrye applied his brakes

to avoid hitting the cows. Richardson attempted to stop also, but skidded across the center line hitting the Wrye car head on.

Wrye received lacerations of the shoulder, a possible fracture of the ankle and the loss of several teeth. Richardson suffered a concussion and a possible left knee injury. Both were admitted to the local hospital following the accident. Richardson was later transferred to Albuquerque.

Both vehicles are a total loss and charges are still pending.

State highway work close to \$5,000,000

STATE ROAD JOBS NEAR A MILLION

SANTA FE — The highway has eight projects underway with 100 per cent state money that have a total contract and engineering cost of \$4,775,000.

It is by far the biggest load of all state money work ever handled by the department.

The money is enough to equal the state's share of \$50 million of Interstate system construction for which the federal government puts up more than ninety per cent.

It is enough for the state's matching share of \$14 million of federal aid primary or secondary roads for which the federal government puts in about two thirds.

COULD HAVE BEEN WITH FEDERAL AID

Most all of the jobs for which the state is paying 100 per cent of the cost could have been handled in the federal aid system with some changes in design and patience to wait for the money.

The highway department has borrowed \$4.5 million to meet the cost of the state roads but the spending has already exceeded that amount by nearly \$300,000.

BRIDGES AT TAOS BIGGEST ITEM

Biggest items in the all state money list are the Rio Grande Gorge bridge near Taos and approach roads on each side which are under total adjusted contract of \$3,437,587. Two per cent engineering cost brings the total to \$3,781,245.

There are four recreational roads under contract in Grant county at a cost of \$682,943 which with 10 per cent engineering cost brings them to \$750,777.

AZTEC PROJECT IS CHALLENGED

The eighth project is the surfacing of 18 miles of road between Aztec and Navajo Dam on which the low bid last week was \$290,054 which with 10 per cent engineering cost would bring the total cost to \$319,059.

Republican Commissioners Wayne Collins and Frank Tatch are protesting the Aztec job as never having been authorized by the highway commission.

PROGRAM SET UP FOR ELECTION

All the 100 per cent state money jobs were undertaken on political decisions rather than the engineering and traffic data commonly used to determine the feasibility of road construction.

With the whole kaboodle hitting just in front of the state election they could be political beyond mere political decisions.

CHACON IS SAFE CONTEST DROPPED

Mat Chacon who's 38-vote demo nomination for Rio Arriba senator was threatening to involve Senate-running Joe Montoya in the clear and faces no contest as at first threatened.

State Sen. Albert Amador who was defeated by Chacon was represented by lawyer Walter Keigle in the vote canvass. Keigle is a partner of Fred Standley, one of Montoya's campaign officers, which led local observers to speculation as to the possibility of Montoya's men trying to throw out Chacon. It was while this speculation was being reported that it was disclosed that there would be no contest.

Five-man crew laying new telephone cable

A five-man construction crew started last Wednesday to lay cables to the new telephone office. Ray Gabehart, local manager for Mountain States Telephone, announced today.

This is part of the quarter million dollar project to give Carrizozo a complete dial telephone system beginning June 21, 1964. All telephone lines serving this area lead to a central switching point. At present, this is the switchboard where calls are handled manually by operators. With the location of

the new central office, Gabehart said, it is necessary to place new cable to the automatic dial switching equipment.

Another crew of linemen is busy relocating telephone lines in other parts of town. This is to improve the general distribution system and to provide additional telephone service.

While this work on cable and wire is going on another group of technicians continue to replace old telephones with new dial sets. Gabehart expects this phase of the project to be completed about the end of May.

Aubrey Komurke 24, convicted child molester who escaped from an El Paso hospital Monday waived extradition to Texas Tuesday in Otero County District Court.

Doris Jean Martin 23, Komurke's girl friend also waived extradition on a charge of being an accessory to flight.

The couple was arrested in the lounge of the Four Winds restaurant Tuesday by deputy sheriff Leonardo Vega, who was assisted by Powder Knoblock of the State Police. The local sheriff's office had been notified earlier, by the El Paso sheriff's department, that Komurke had been making phone

calls to his mother in El Paso from a pay phone in Carrizozo.

The 1957 Ford stolen in El Paso from Art Walsh was parked in front of the restaurant at the time the couple was arrested. They were immediately transported to Alamogordo where the extradition papers were signed before Judge Geo. L. Zimmerman. They were later transferred to El Paso.

Komurke made his getaway from Thomas General Hospital about 11:00 a.m. Monday, while in the custody of two deputies. He was to undergo medical treatment for a leg injury received in an automobile accident late last year.

Start thinning the peaches now. For the best peach size they should be thinned so that the peaches are from 4 to 6 inches apart on each branch.

Lamb marking is in progress in the south part of the County and the mark-up to date is averaging around 89% or slightly less than last year.

If you want worm free apples on that home tree you must spray to control the worm or codling moth larvae. Around the home you must use a safe chemical so I would use lead arsenate unless you are having troubles with other insects or mites. DO NOT USE DDT alone as it favors the mites build up and will cause you to need to spray more. You can also use Diazinon or Sevin.

"A page for independent thought"

Feedlot beef is speculative!

In good times all the small farmers in the nation want to get in the cattle business. They can buy a small jag (all put together makes a tall total) feed on their wheat pasture, milo stubble, or from their grain bin and make a nice profit from the increased weight at the auction ring.

When the beef market is taking a down-turn, following a period of stocking up and the necessity of getting loose from some critters suddenly turned expensive, the small operators, the "ins and outs" are the first to yell "hurt."

Beef speculation in feedlots particularly is a risky business without the hedging potential that grain operators use. A man with \$100,000 worth of cattle can make himself a nice pile of jack when the market is right; or he can lose half his investment when a surplus occurs.

Imported beef has been adding to the surplus, semi-drought conditions in the grass country has sent cattle to market and

maybe more to follow. The import picture is clear. Australia and South American countries have a much lower land rent scale, hence they can get their beef to market cheaper than can U. S. ranchers, in fact a lot cheaper.

Chain store buying has been accused of depressing the market. Packer buyers have set the auction prices for years, why they should be accused now of setting prices, anymore than 10 or 20 years ago is questionable. Meat retailers, both chain and independent, have been moving a lot of beef, making the "Eat more beef" campaign a thing of reality. Beef "specials" can be seen in most daily newspapers, and the Lincoln County News, with the result that people are eating more beef. Special beef sales are no different than specials on any commodity, generally the results should favor the cattleman. The small job-lot operator, the "ins and outs" are speculators and have to look out for themselves.

More welfare . . . any way you cut it

The United States will be afflicted with a new war — on poverty this time with a \$682.5 million budget. This war will accomplish no more than any war fought with guns, but should be a lot more popular because the headlines have such a beautiful look in print.

While our politicians (including especially those from New Mexico) are pushing for this bill — taxpayers should keep in mind the following:

The original bill contained

something old, and something new, something borrowed from ideas which were proposed back in the 1930s. Apparently its provisions would create a sprawling agency that would extend into several already existing departments and bureaus.

Meanwhile, it should be noted that the Federal government has been doing a lot about the problems of the under-privileged and needy. For Federal expenditures for welfare have risen 43% in the past five years. Raymond Mofey

Much excitement in trip to Arabia

The Persian Gulf passage from Houston to the Middle East commenced at noon with an atmosphere of a full-pledged determination to reach a far-away goal. The trip was chock-full of excitement, more than road here will allow to tell; and traveling Americans encountered over the several thousand mile journey never allowed a dull moment.

The monster-like PAA jet rose high into the sky, and nosed to the north. Thirty-five minutes were spent in Dallas, known as the assassination spot of President Kennedy; and a town where city cops lounge with prisoners, and allow them to be gunned to death while in custody.

Again in the air: Time enough for a tasty meal, then Chicago. That windy city claimed two hours, which was a hustle and bustle as passengers made last-minute preparations to depart the American soil, on a non-stop flight over Canada, the Atlantic Ocean, to London.

Promptly at five o'clock the jet lifted to a 33,000-foot-elevation, and headed for England. All night long it soared as well over 100 happy and jovial passengers entrusted their lives to the efficiency of the crew and equipment as passage was made

over the cold Atlantic waters. At exactly 7:45 the next morning, London time, the jet set down on the rain-drenched strips of the London International Airport.

Before landing, early morning sun rays permitted a glimpse through occasional broken clouds of beautiful Ireland, and the rustic, brown-appearing land of Wales, with its two and one half million population.

No view is quite equal to that of an aerial; not even that of the imagination. I pray that my camera did a good job, and that I meet with success in recovering it from the Arab customs where a controversy exists as to its possession.

In London, passengers transfer by motorized carriages left-sour impressions and thoughts that horses should still be the motivating power, as we were confusingly and promiscuously escorted about over the wet strips, as the Englishmen argued about our destination, and flights.

Shortly, however, just exactly how, I'll never know, we fortunately were hauled out to the edge of the field for a two-hour milk-route passage, London to Rome.

Once out of London, lovely Italy came into view, 34,000 ft. below. Startling, and such height failed to obscure the beautiful land. Sights underneath the roaring jet caused eyes to bulge and journalists to grasp pencils and paper. Cameras pointed anglewise from the cabin windows, as shutter-pushers flew into action. A wish for land travel was instantly felt. At the moment, however, passengers were content to settle for the gorgeous aerial view, which certainly allows the person to realize his insignificance.

Beautiful Switzerland, Venice, Florence, and all the spectacular terrain of the Italy "boot", and the enchanting blue waters of the Mediterranean. An aerial view must certainly be branded as a thief by a close observer.

Time passed in a moment, too quick. Historic, patriarchal old Rome appeared. Ancient, certainly, having recently been decided to have been founded in the 13th century B. C. And no one can pronounce the name Rome as deep and mellow and enchanting as can the Roman. This is a busy world. TWA

didn't waste a moment in assembling its 100 passengers into a gorgeous jet, flight 800, and pulled out for the fantastic Cairo, Egypt. It was in this scene, I met the jovial Iowan, Mr. Allen and his wonderful wife. For a brief time we had a wonderful conversation; and it is to be remembered that such conversations can certainly add spice to a journey.

Frequent stops were made on the flight to Cairo, to pick up American tourists. These people were traveling by planned excursions, from one attraction to the other. In the flight cabins, interesting topics prevailed. Most travelers were Americans, naturally no strangers were present. I was the New Mexico and Albuquerque representative. Many, many favorable expressions were heard for the Land of Enchantment. Even the kindly old lady from Arizona expressed her love for the state.

From Rome to Cairo. Beautiful Naples, far below; Sicily and the blood-stained Salerno; the ancient historic Aegean Sea; the romantic, heart-rendering Isle of Capri, of the sentimental love song, popular years ago, all designated by the airlines public relations. Mt. Vesuvius, near Naples, where the plane seemed to stop long enough for passengers to make a hasty observation; the Isle of Corica reflected Napoleon Bonaparte. Then lovely Athens, Greece. Regretfully, the sun was sinking low, but seemed to linger to allow a glimpse of the historic land far below.

At Athens another American group boarded, bound for Cairo, the land of the pyramids and the camel country. My presence conveniently became a part of their midst. They related exciting stories harvested from the Grecian soil. They told of their tours of the aged ruins; how they rode asses over the ancient paths of a long-ago people, and soaked bare, tired feet in the azure Mediterranean. Then there was Crete, and Cairo.

An exciting hour and a half was spent in the ancient pyramid land. It was interesting, viewed in the fading light. Would the long-ago Egyptians had the opportunity of an aerial view.

It was in Cairo that the dark-skinned people commenced to be encountered. They were dressed in long-sweeping white robes, reaching to the path, and

tightly bound headscarfs, which is a decided Moslem apparel. The interesting Middle East atmosphere prevailed. It was very understandable that a land of strange customs and camel caravans had been entered, that there still existed certain modes of life akin to olden days.

Many passengers quit the flight at Cairo, as the plane was approaching the end of its run, and entered Saudi Arabia, a land that presently grants no visas. Bombay, India, was the flight's stop.

Departing Cairo the huge TWA gracefully pulled into the starlit sky, and streaked across 1100 miles of the world's most vicious desert, headed east, toward the Persian Gulf. On this flight passengers, more than ever realized the camel was the predominate beast of burden, as the dark-skinned, long-robed, people, crawled aboard with brand-new camel saddles, purchased in Cairo.

Two hours later, 26 hours out of Houston, 160 degrees turned back on the earth's circumference, with something like 18 hours actual flight time logged, the plane came to earth in Dhahran, Saudi Arabia. The airport is only a short distance from the recent plane crash in the Persian Gulf. It claimed the lives of all aboard, near 30 Americans, caused by a driving, blinding sand storm, for which the land is well known.

A sigh of relief was breathed when solid soil came under the feet, and approach was made to the magnificent Mosque-designed air terminal, located in the edge of the vast desert sands.

A decided Saudi Arabia atmosphere was found. All airport personnel wore the strange native dress. They also represented King Ibn Saud, and let it be known right away they sought the king's taxes.

But what people in the whole wide world could have been more friendly, more hospitable, than these strange-appearing, dark-skinned individuals whom we have heard so much about, who 40 years ago still adhered to medieval practices; and a people desired to study and spent many hours in dreams of a visit to the ancient land to know more of their little-known and intriguing customs.

THE LONG AND SHORT OF IT IS . . . Immediately I saw many interesting weeks ahead, once I had regained possession of my precious camera.



The pilgrimage is not just a regional event, cars in the mile long caravan bear license tags from many states.

The tour is scheduled for Sunday June 7th and Dr. D. D. Stonecypher of Nebraska City, Nebraska writes "How wonderful it is for Alamogordo to promote this opportunity for Rhodes fans to get together." Dr. Stonecypher states that he and his family will be joined in Alamogordo June 6th by his son Dr. D. D. Stonecypher, Jr. and his family from La Mesa, Calif. to make the tour to the grave. Rhodes son, Alan Rhodes and wife Betty of Appalachian, New York, write that they will be here for the pilgrimage.

Rhodes, long acclaimed as the writer of the world's best western stories, grew up in Otero County and at the age of 21

homesteaded in the San Andreas mountains and became widely known in later years for his Saturday Evening Post stories and his Southwestern books. At his death in 1934, at his own request, his body was returned from California for burial on his old ranch in the canyon which bears his name, and which formed the setting for many of his stories.

NDEA programs throughout the country are authorized by Public Law 85-864, the National Defense Education Act of 1958.


