Graduates at the University of New Mexico's 72nd commencement included three from Lincoln County.



About Islam religious beliefs

Abqaiq, Saudi Arabia — Harry B. Ellis spent three years in the Middle East, as correspondent for the Christian Science Monitor.

Later in the 1950s he said this of Arabia: "As far back as history records, Arabia has been one of the least hospitable lands on earth (however, with the gigantic oil development, this barrier seems to be breaking) — a vast peninsula of scorched deserts and waterless limestone steppes, intruded at places in the north and west by black volcanic peaks rising like hump-backed whales above sands. Across the windswept and sun-blasted wilderness, tent-dwelling Bedouins have wandered throughout the ages, clustered in fiercely isolated tribal groups, living in uneasy and often hostile relationship to one another. A Bedouin is a desert nomad where men led more settled lives."

A Bedouin is a desert nomad who raises camels, and a few goats. He lives largely on camel's milk and goat flesh. A camel can go for days without water, and requires practically none when grazing upon desert bushes — the most isolated deserts are covered with many herds of them. No other national, except the American seems to have intruded.

Under such conditions we wonder what draws the American away from his comfortable home in a fine land, and into the horrible desert land of Saudi Arabia.

A desert trip will tell the story. OIL! OIL! The biggest reserve in the world.

Arameo (Arabian American Oil Co) has discovered in a single field, believed to exceed by far the total known reserves of the United States.

And what is so pleasant to the money-minded, there is no allowable at the wellhead! The well is "shut-in" only when there is no market! Think of this, in the 1950s it cost 16 cents to produce a barrel of oil in Arabia, compared to \$1.60 in the U.S.

You can't parallel that for the production of the long green in any land's language!

But in retrieving such gold reserves, the American encounters many hardships and strangeness of most every texture. There's strangeness everywhere strange people and strange customs, and even a strange religion. And the word strange is not strange enough for the description.

The religion is the Islam, over 350 million strong in the Middle East, and adjacent countries. It is based solely on the A-

rabian Bible, the Koran. It serves the Arab as the Holy Bible does the Christian. Arabs live by the Koran, every hour and every day of the year. The laws of the land are based almost altogether upon it.

The Koran tell Moslems what names they may and may not give themselves, musical instruments they may not play, and deals also with such matters as clothing, sports, sexual intercourse, and the suckling of children.

A Koran injunction — proof of adultery in a woman requires four witnesses. And should the accuser fail to prove the alleged guilt, he is severely punished with several lashes. Whipping is a common form of punishment.

Islam can be defined as a religion of submission to the will of God; and man is viewed as an instrument for carrying out that will, which is supreme in the governance of all earthly affairs. And one who submits himself unreservedly to God's will and obeys the precepts He has laid down for mankind is a Moslem, a follower of Islam.

Moslems believe their religious elements came from a long line of Prophets, including Abraham, Moses, and Jesus. And that final revelation was handed to Muhammad, early in the 7th century. The teachings were then embodied in the Koran.

One noticeable law of the land, one that is a constant reminder of the visitor in the Kingdom, decrees that the hand that steals must be severed. But then it's told that there is an exception! It is perfectly legal for a Moslem to steal from an "infidel"! An infidel is anyone who is not a Moslem.

During my tour, I haven't seen any one-handed individuals yet; neither have I seen theft.

Five pillars of faith are kept by the Moslem. The first, the "profession of faith," an euphonious utterance, "There is no god but God," to which is added "Muhammad is the messenger of God." The formula in its entirety is inscribed on the Kingdom's flag.

The second pillar is "prayer", for which the people offer the most exacting adherence. Moslems pray five times a day: before dawn, midday, late in the afternoon, at sunset, and evening. Always faced to the House of God in Mecca, located on the east coast of the Red Sea.

Just where the nomads' dromedaries were, could be a good question. Suspect would offer that the beasts, too, had taken cover. Destination of the nomads, also, was puzzling, for the terrain in every direction had the aspect of being entirely im-

passable. The tender-hearted would ponder if the poor creatures could survive.

But they are a hearty lot, and do survive. We have been informed that these dark-skinned individuals, distinguished by peculiar moustaches and goatees, long robes and tight-bound turbans, have occupied the vicious desert for countless centuries and form one of the oldest inhabited areas in the world.

No one except the occupational American, and a few flanking aliens, with lots of guts, a craving for money, and a never-satisfied taste for roughness and test of ability, would have attempted a passage into such a land, especially handicapped with tons upon tons of heavy industrial equipment, which is sometimes, at the best, very adverse to move.

The cruel land with all its outward hazards and dangers, contrastly caused thoughts of a paradise and an oasis in the land of Jordan, which is not too far distant, and Moses' elaboration on the Garden of Eden, where Adam and Eve commenced to populate the earth after they had pulled such a fantastic and lasting caper.

Some contrast. How such a land could have been adjacent to that Moses described of the Garden of Eden, really spells curiosity.

Back on the Persian Gulf, with the hard-driving Americans; and their lust for black gold. In one of the richest oil reserves in the entire world, which Biblical Noah unknowingly discovered prior to the flood. Scientists have offered that the old flood patriarch "pitched" his ark, in preparedness for the waters, from oil of the Middle East reserves and that the burning bush was nothing more than a natural gas fissure accidentally ignited. Perhaps the World induced geologists to explore the Middle East!

In time, I reached Abqaiq, where I was to be headquartered for a while.

THE LONG AND SHORT OF IT IS . . . There is much in this strange land to write about, if the writer will only dig it out of the shifting sands. Ivory-tower research will not suffice; and it is quite discernible that the average American has not been availed with a modernistic picture of an every-day life along the Persian Gulf. I hope to touch, at least, a few of the high points.



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

"A page for independent thought"

Little help for small business (& small towns)

In years past we have swallowed much of the bushwah, along with many of our comrades, that our government might / or could / do something for small business. There's no truth at all in this dream — in fact our government (though maybe not desiring such) is geared more and more to the benefit of larger business.

In 1962 there were about four and three-quarter million companies in the United States and the vast majority were small by any definition.

The Census Bureau regularly surveys concentration for individual industries. The 1958 survey disclosed that four (or fewer) manufacturers account for more than half of their industry's sales. The trend to bigness is continuing. From 1950 through 1961, the 500 biggest industrial firms picked up 3404 other companies, an average of seven apiece.

Anti-trust laws are intended to somewhat control and ferment a competitive market. Over the years the rule has been to let a going concern go.

We are living in a wonderful age where the goose that lays the golden egg, then turns around and eats the egg over easy. The large corporations who buy up smaller concerns as their means of expansion, also have much the greatest influ-

ences on most all branches of government, especially taxes and contracts. Much talk of tax reduction during both the Eisenhower and Kennedy administration. Some reductions were made. Corporations gained around 1.3 billion in 1962 and figure to gain 2.5 billion by end of 1964. A sack of peanuts was handed to the low income groups.

Unemployment figures continue steady, the experts figuring that over three million new jobs need be created each year just to keep even. If each small business could employ just one extra person, unemployment would be wiped out . . . but this is not in the cards either. Rather, a trend in the opposite direction is active.

This active down trend in small business has a depressing affect on the home ground of the small business place — the small town. Year after year the number of high school graduates who can find satisfactory work at home, get fewer.

All of this writing is not intended to say that nothing can be done. The one-to-ten man business (or larger) can still flourish and prosper but they're largely doing so on their own initiative. The dream of government help for either the small business or town is a myth that never came true.

Cheers for Farm Bureau

We have only one complaint to make about the Farm and Livestock Bureau and its actions in New Mexico — the meetings are too long. Other than that this particular organization comes the nearest to generating ideas and thinking at the local level, and conveying these ideas up through the state to national level where they become policy, of any organization we know.

To name a few that fall in this respect: The American Legion has had a bad record of national policies unacceptable to a great many local Legion Posts. The National Council of Churches projects policies that fall to represent the majority of church laymen, even the national Chamber of Commerce organization follows policies rather harmful than helpful to the thousands of small areas of civic unity they are expected to help.

In general terms the Farm Bureau favors a free market, farm organizations such as the Farmers Union, National Grange, and others, favor government price supports. The Farm Bureau won one round when wheat controls were defeated, and lost a round when Congress passed a new wheat-cotton bill.

The Farm and Livestock Bureau has its work cut out . . . that of keeping its member strength growing. Its organization strength, we think, has been based on local representation much more than local service it may perform.

Our hope is that the Farm Bureau will put its best organization men out on the battle lines, where members are being signed up — because this organization is one of the few with a broad outlook whose main goal will benefit people in all lines of business as well as those in agriculture.

Several state agencies also will aid the boys school staff in preliminary steps prior to construction of the 50-boy camp. The legislature appropriated \$30,000 for fiscal 1964-65 to build the camp.

Boys School Supt. Glenn Walker said it is hoped to activate the camp fully next April. A crew of 10 youth and two counselors will begin preparatory work June 15 at the state-controlled former radar site at Moriarty to move buildings to the camp location. Foundations at the forestry camp for the development are to be ready August 15.

Fort Stanton Tuberculosis Hospital personnel will handle site preparation. Water and sewer lines will be laid from the camp to connect with Ft. Stanton Hospital facilities.

SOUTHERN CALIF. (EHTNC) — Marine Corporal William R. Rodgers, son of Mrs. Naomi J. Rodgers of Carrizozo participated in an extensive sea assault exercise called "Operation Pine Tree" off the coast of southern California May 20-28 while serving at the Marine Corps Base, Twentynine Palms, Calif.

James Bonnell becomes the 20th participant in Great Plains program

James Bonnell, who ranches north of Capitan, became the 22nd Great Plains Conservation Program contract holder in the Upper Hondo Soil and water Conservation District recently. The ranch, a cow-calf operation is located approximately four miles north and two miles east of Capitan.

Planned conservation work consists of brush control, range seeding, range deferred grazing and range proper use. Bonnell expects to complete the contract in a three year period; however, good range management is planned year after year.

The objective of the Great Plains Conservation Program is to assist ranchers and farmers in developing and carrying out, on a voluntary basis, a plan of operations that will bring greater stability through grazing and cropping systems and the application of enduring soil and water conservation practice. To carry out this program, Public Law 1021, 84th Congress, provides for assurance of continuing cost-share assistance to ranchers and farmers who present a satisfactory plan for their entire unit including a time schedule for establishing conservation practices.

Any landowner in Lincoln County desiring further information regarding the Great Plains Program or assistance in preparing a conservation plan for his ranch or farm is invited to visit the Soil Conservation office in Capitan.

Winnie Roberson of Las Cruces, a pal of Ellen, was going through a trunk of things that belonged to her aunt, Mrs. Julian (Gustaf) Taylor, deceased. The registration book was found among these things and given to Ellen by Winnie Roberson.

Under the "A's" are J. Archuleta and T. C. Alexander, Claude Branum, James Bragg, H. C. Bond and others listed in the B's. Four members of the Current family, Juan Chavez, in the C listing.

Allen Hightower in the H section, D. L. Jackson (deceased) in the J's, William Kelt and J. M. B. Knight in the K's, Robert Leslie, senior and junior are listed, James Morris, four members of the Torres family, and Christian Yeager is the last

name in the book. The board of Registration included Charles D. Meyer, Bautista Talles and A. H. Hudspeth. The qualified voters numbered from one to 135.

The original owners of the Homestead South mine were Edward L. Queen, Ellen's father, Allen Lane and Dave Jackson.





ANOTHER CHAIRMAN ON STATE PAYROLL
