# Democrats advised to ignore liquor problem

SANTA FE — Democratic leaders here are passing the word to lay off the liquor issue in writing the party platform at the state convention this weekend.

The issue which embroiled the 1963 legislature most of its 60-day run was handled by the Republicans last month with a promise to "study" the question.

### ONLY TWO COUNTIES SEEKING REPEAL

A resolution before the Albuquerque Democratic convention calling for repeal of the liquor price-fixing law looked like a major threat to the hoop business until it was defeated by the old guard element in the party.

The loss in Albuquerque left only Los Alamos and San Juan calling for a change of the state liquor code which maintains prices among the highest in the nation and supports a monopoly for those who sell the stuff.

### CLINT TALKING RETIREMENT AGAIN

Sen. Clint Anderson is talking about retirement again, but this time a little more seriously than usual.

Clint is pushing heavily and has a long list of health troubles.

He says if he quits it will be at the end of his term in 1966 which would be just right for Gov. Jack Campbell who will also be at end of his term that year—providing he's elected this year.

### RETIRE EARLY NAME SUCCESSOR

Anderson, if he's going to retire would have more influence in choosing his successor by stepping out before the end of his term so that the successor could be appointed.

That would require cooperation of Governor Campbell which might be difficult to arrange unless the successor were Campbell himself.

### ALSO RETIRE FROM THE HELM

Clint's retirement from the Senate would also mean his retirement from the controlling post of the state Democratic party which he has handled with complete authority since (Continued on back page)

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# Frank and Helena Coe Room to be dedicated in Lincoln Town July 19

The dedication of a new exhibit at the Old Lincoln County Courthouse, Lincoln, New Mexico, will take place on Sunday, July 19th, with the opening of the Frank and Helena Coe Room. Theme of the exhibit is "A Frontier Parlor." All of the furnishings of the room had been used in the Frank Coe Ranch home at Glencoe.

Included among the items comprising the exhibit are an antique Lyon and Healy pump organ, antique library table chairs, and a hand made side board, which had originally been made for cavalry officer's quarters at nearby Ft. Stanton, during the time it served as a military garrison. It was purchased by the Coes at a sale of furnishings held by the Cavalry quartermaster in 1838.

Another item on display is Frank Coe's cap and ball single barrel shot gun, which saw service during the Lincoln County War, when Frank rode with Billy the Kid, his friend and companion. Frank and Helena Tully Coe settled at Glencoe, in the Ruidoso Valley, in 1882, following their marriage at Farmington, in 1881. They raised a family of seven children. In sparsely settled Lincoln County the family early learned to make its own entertainment, with music the important ingredient. Each of the children learned to play a musical instrument. Besides the organ on exhibit, the Coe home boasted a piano, a violin, and a zither, all of which were used frequently to provide music for square dancing at pioneer get-togethers.

# Nogal camp meeting starts today

In searching for some background facts on the Ranchmen's Camp Meeting, I came across this most informative article published in the Times magazine some 13 years ago.

Joe Evans deserves most of the credit for he was responsible for establishing the Ranchmen's Camp Meetings, not only in New Mexico, but also in Texas and other Southwestern states.

Joe Evans got his religion in an American frontier home, where a Bible and a rifle were the two indispensable items of furniture. His rancher father and his mother, were devout Baptists and his father fought his share of Indians. In 1880 when Joe was just a little fellow his parents helped found a series of outdoor camp meetings, which are still held in Texas and many other states.

Years later, when Joe Evans expanded his holdings westward he noticed that New Mexico had the same religious problems as West Texas (the range coun-

try was too sparsely settled to support regular churches), and that there were no camp meetings to fill the void. In 1939 he took the problem to Rev. Everett King, then secretary of the Northern Presbyterian National Mission Board, Baptist Evans worked out his plans with King and two Presbyterian missionaries from New Mexico, the Rev. Ralph Hall and the Rev. Roger Sherman.

The task of finding a site for the camp meeting in this area was left up to these four men, who by 1941 had decided on Nogal Mesa. After talking to nearby ranchers, who enthusiastically accepted the idea, letters were sent to several ranchers, in a radius of a hundred miles, setting the date and inviting them and their neighbors to camp and pray together.

For the first camp meeting on Nogal Mesa 125 were present. A violent rain storm, which came up soon after the services started, almost swept the meeting away, but the ranchers

liked the camp meeting idea. Joe Evans and his Presbyterian friends decided to hold a meeting every year at Nogal Mesa, and to spread to other states. Since then they have set up similar meetings in Arizona, Colorado, Wyoming and the Dakotas.

All meetings are rigorously non-denominational and all preaching ministers are introduced simply as "Brother". Says co-founder Hall, "Our purpose is not to glorify one particular individual, or any denomination, but to glorify God and Jesus Christ."


Attendance at the Nogal Mesa Camp Meeting reached one thousand in 1961, and each year the number increases. A tabernacle has been built since that first rain drenched meeting 23 years ago and the three meals a day are now being prepared under a roof.

The road to Nogal Mesa has been greatly improved and is well marked for the benefit of the many out-of-state visitors.

Terrace floors being ground now, concrete slabs will be placed on roof in week or two, and other work going well.

# Interesting trip around the world

Moscow, Russia  
June 28, 1964

Dear Mr. Payton,

Our trip around the world will soon be over. We have had a good time everywhere, from Roswell we flew to Los Angeles then to Honolulu, Japan, Hong-Kong, Bangkok and Chiang Mai, Thailand, then to India, New Delhi, and Agro, where we visited Parliament, Nehru's place of cremation, where a large memorial park will be built, also saw the Tajmahal in Agra. Flew to Nepal from India. Nepal has only been open for nine years, the U. S. has built a road from India, through the mountains over rough country. The people are very poor, and the country very backward. We saw farmers plowing by hand, making terraces on mountain sides for rice.

We visited the Peace Corps in Nepal. There are about 75 U. S. young people teaching in villages, some must walk several days to arrive at their village. We met several, and they all gave good reports of the work being done, very valuable to all concerned, community organization, health-cleanliness, English, and many more. Peace Corps activities are being taught by U. S.

We met at least 15 Peace Corps workers on this trip. They all said they enjoyed their work and thought the program very worthwhile.

Their salaries are low, and living conditions poor, but we hear no complaints. Our Peace Corps workers are real missionaries for Democracy.

From Kat Mondu, Capital of Nepal, we flew to the Holy Land but our time was too short, only 3 days in Beirut, we did go to Damascus where we visited the Temples and the house of Annanias, and trod the grounds of many Bible characters. From Beirut we flew to Istanbul, Turkey for two days, then to Austria and to Moscow on Austrian Air Lines.

We have been in Russia 7 days traveling De Luxe here, which means \$25 per day for hotel, guide, car and chauffeur. All foreigners are required to report to an Intourist officer on the first floor of the hotel.

There we register, give up our passport until we get ready to leave the country. We buy our theatre tickets and our plane tickets to Leningrad. We flew Russia Jet, 500 miles in 55 minutes time, lovely trip.

We stayed two days in Leningrad, called the Venice of the north, built on the gulf of Finland and delta of the Niva river. We visited the summer palace of Peter the Great, Palace and Gardens are a copy of Versailles. There are 133 fountains playing now and three cascades, much statuary immense grounds. We visited the Hermitage Museum in Leningrad. There are 23 miles of rooms to walk, if one visited every room, some of finest collections of art, paintings, sculpture, porcelains, etc. one of the largest art museums in the world, all original paintings of old masters. Leningrad is an intellectual center with a big University and 48 other colleges. Every fourth person attends college.

The theatre is very important in Russia, tickets are reasonable and everybody enjoys the concerts, ballet, opera, ice skating shows. American Holiday on Ice is here now. Performances are held in a sport auditorium which seats 17,000 people, we do go to some kind of theatre every night. Puppet shows, Circuses, which were marvelous. Today, Sunday, we will see the Ballet, Swan Lake, in a lovely new theatre, which is very similar to our Radio City Music Hall, it seats 6000, air conditioned, plush seats, etc.

Tonight we will hear the opera Rigoletto, held in the Bolston Theatre. Moscow has 6 1/2 million people, the Lenin Library here has 20 million books and cooperates with every country in the world. The Moscow University one of many, has 32,000 student, 16,000 day students, 8,000 night students, and 8,000 correspondents. It is chiefly a University of Science.

The people of the city are clean people, are wearing summer clothes, women, cotton dresses with sweaters. We find clothes and food are expensive in the big Gumm Department store, crowded with buyers, our guide said the people have

more money than goods. Russia is the only country we have visited where the U. S. dollar is worth only 90cents. There is not much for the tourists to buy here. The ladies wear their hair short with permanents, people look very much like Americans.

Everybody has been friendly and kind to us we hope more Americans will visit Russia. They will find the people are alike all over the world.

No place like home, and we will be glad to get back into the Ruidoso Valley and Coe Ranch and my sister, Mrs. Inez Wilcox in Roswell.



Too busy for trouble

Been reading and thinking about recreation economics in south-central New Mexico ever since we received a copy of Bulletin 488 on this subject put out by N. M. State University.

The sum-up paragraph reads: "At maximum values, a total of \$10.9 million would have been spent by the local campers, picnickers, and fishermen. An additional \$5.3 million would have been spent by the non-local recreationists in these groups."

Two other findings of interest: race-track visitors are fewer by far but they spend more per person, automobile expense is the biggest dollar cost to the recreationists by far.

The Forest Service estimates that by the year 2000 (only 36 year off) the number of recreationists visiting the area will be four or five times greater than now, barring development of other highly competitive area.

Tourists in the flat lands

There simply are not enough jobs in town for all the youngsters when school is out. The fact that many parents don't have jobs for their youngsters and you've got many, many hours of idle time for young people between school sessions.

Lots of schemes can be skumped during the dog days.

Testing one's skill with a bee-bee gun is an age old practice. Know a gang of boys who found it fun to pick milkweed pods and throw them at passing motorists, this between dips in a cow pasture pool without even the bottom part on.

Facilities are just not right for riding on the West Texas plains or in the Mal Pais country, nor can you frost your shanks in those parts at night like in the high country of Lincoln County. Added reasons for not worrying too much about competitive developments are the millions of tall pine trees, the shady canyons, quite a few springs if you know how to find them, and the best rock hunting in the world.

Consider that now one can hardly get his bait in the water at the two popular fishing spots in Lincoln County. Consider that the road improvements for the near future will let recreationists into more sections of the country easier.

A swimming pool is fine for keeping youngsters occupied in the summer but it's not enough. Need a games program too, baseball for all ages, something for the girls, art classes, leather work classes, enough to run the youngsters ragged until they are ready to go to bed at night instead of prowling around town.

Money is not the problem. Interest in juvenile welfare seems lacking. Leadership in this direction is totally lacking.

Guess we need more young fathers — the opportunity for a dandy piece of public work, summer after summer, is with us right now.

Kit intrigued with fasting . . . the Fourth Pillar of the Moslem faith

Dhahran, Saudi Arabia — The failure to remember names is so predominate with me that it has become frightening. It causes me lots of worry, and in this piece, considerable embarrassment. I find, however, that I am not alone in this plight.

I have reference in particular to the name of a certain gentleman who so interestingly acquainted me with the fourth pillar of Islam — fasting. Even though I have forgotten the name, I'll never forget the man. He was middle-aged, diplomatic in dress and appearance, with a great front already pushing out, of ruddy complexion, Jewish decent, possessed with all the enchanting tones of a traveler, whom I met in the reading room of Steinske Hall, an American guest hotel in Dhahran, Saudi Arabia.

The acquaintance was formed when I first landed in the Kingdom, as full of curiosity as an impregnated springtime bud, about an oldest and a least known land in the world, and welcomed any tale of the land. I found this man not only a colorful story teller, but factual.

The nice man was a world-wide traveler, a representative of heavy industrial equipment distribution. The Middle East was one of the lands he traveled. And it might be said here that thirty years ago he, or any other person of such a field wouldn't have had a damnable bit of business on the Arabian

Peninsula. As no one except a camel trader, a camel caravan operator, and a few sea merchants who approached the west coast of the Persian Gulf and east coast of the Red Sea, made an entry. The land until then was dark to the Europeans and the Americans, and only occasionally a daring explorer ventured within.

This distinguished appearing man had come to Dhahran to pay condolences to the 42 passengers and 7 crew members who perished in the plane crash in the Persian Gulf, April 18. The time was a holiday in the Kingdom, New Year. Fasting had been in observation, and the pilgrimage to Mecca was nearing an end.

He explained to me something of the Islam belief, as he had come acquainted with it during his travels in the land. He also told of the Saudis' progress from Medieval practices, in less than 30 years, to that of industrialism. I listened to his offerings attentively, and was fascinated at the exotic elaboration he rendered.

As has been expressed before, the Moslem religion is based upon five pillars of faith. This is the fourth pillar of fasting. It occurs during the month of Ramadan, which is parts of March and April, according to our calendar. It is observed as the month of the Moslem new year during which the Koran was first revealed to Mohammad, and the battle of Badr was won.

approximately 355 days are more sacred than the others, observation indicates. For it was on one of those days, and no one seems to know just which one, that the Night of Power is observed. This night is proclaimed as the anniversary of the night on which the Prophet Mohammad received his first revelation from God. Ramadan is a lunar month, and has its beginning when at least one reliable individual sights the new moon, and his testimony is confirmed by the appearance of the next new moon. The first three days of Shawwal, the succeeding month, are holidays for celebrating the Feast of the Breaking of the Fast, one of the greatest of the two festivals of the Moslem year.

THE LONG AND SHORT OF IT IS . . . I, full of curiosity as a gourd is guts, touched feet to Arabian desert sands right in the "tail-end" of the fasting period, and the pilgrimage to Mecca, I shall never forget the Jewish gentleman who so interestingly related the significance of these phases of the Islam to me, in Dhahran's Steinske Hall, located on a desert floor that 30 years ago was virtually unchanged in modes and customs which Mohammad left at his death, in the 7th century.

Today, the oil on which the Peninsula is surely floating, has created a burning fire, far more severe than the sun-scorched deserts of the land. The oil-fields, the resulting refineries, power-producing plants, petrochemical plants, modern agricultural enterprises, which are so common to American industrialists and people, are rapidly removing the Saudis from their plight of Medieval customs and practices.

This conversion had its beginning 30-odd years ago. Imagine it; the people of which so little was known forsaking the desert nomadic life with camel herds, a few straggling goats, and picking up the control of fascinating industry. The Arabs are handling the situation in a manner, too, that will most certainly create a wonder. Very few commentators are granted the opportunity that I have to witness this gigantic transformation.

by President Johnson on January 5, 1964. The President directed the Secretary of Defense and the Director of Selective Service to begin the early examination of 18-year-old registrants after a presidential task force study determined that large numbers of young men being found disqualified for military service were interested in obtaining educational, vocational, and medical rehabilitation.

In announcing the plan to examine 18-year-olds, the President pointed out that early examination will "enable those who are qualified for military service to plan intelligently their future careers in this respect. It will enable those found unqualified to get to work promptly on the education, training, or health service which can be of benefit to them."

The President also noted that "early examination will NOT mean early induction. There will be no change in the present practice of calling older registrants for actual induction into the Armed Forces before younger ones are called."

At the present time, men are being reached for induction between 21 1/2 and 22, as a national average. In New Mexico the average age of involuntary induction is also 21 1/2 to 22 years of age, Colonel Gray said.

Clarence Griffin on NMSU honor roll

UNIVERSITY PARK, N. M. — Clarence Griffin of Carrizozo has been named to the spring semester honor roll of the College of Agriculture and Home Economics at New Mexico State University.

To be named to the honor roll, a student must maintain a grade point of 3.3 (B plus) or better while enrolled in 12 or more hours of credit courses.

Griffin is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Griffin of Carrizozo. He is a sophomore student in general agriculture.

The dividing points, he told, are before the eye, and distinguish between the black and the white one. When a failure to determine the color occurs, the period of fasting is observed.

The follower of Islam is granted no forgiveness for failure to observe this fourth pillar, unless he is dangerously ill, or on a journey. It must be remembered, especially in this instance, that reference to a journey in Saudi Arabia is something more than an American journey, both in time and in rigors. A journey in this desert, sun-burned land can't be rightfully defined with a more accurate description than as a coarseness with death.

From all accounts, fasting was not a widespread practice in pagan Arabia before the time of Mohammed; and it is entirely probable that he learned of the benefits of fasting from Christians or the Jews, or perhaps both.

The fasting period is observed for every day of the month, and its explained purpose is to lead man to a deeper and richer perception of God and the obligations of human creatures in the service of their Maker.

The last ten days of the Ramadan, the time of which varies in relation to our calendar, from year to year by a few days, as the Muslim year is
