## Fire puts ZoZo cafe out of business

The Sanitation Department inspector who recently checked the Four Winds Restaurant and Lounge and pronounced it "exceptionally clean" would have had to revise his report Wednesday morning after a kitchen fire did a barbecue job.

Mike Lueras had closed the bar and stopped by the Texaco station for gas when he heard the fire alarm. A tourist had seen the vent on the roof belching smoke and flames and sounded the alarm at 1:30. The kitchen crew had finished their cleanup about 11 o'clock and gone home.

When Chief King Ortiz and his fire crew arrived with the two trucks it looked like the whole inside of the large building was afire. The firemen entered through the rear door to the kitchen and discovered that the blaze was centered under the large hood that covered the stoves. The exhaust system probably saved the building by drafting the flames up through the vent.

The intense heat, however, broke the fire through into the attic and the firemen had to cut a hole in the roof to extinguish the blaze. "It took us about

five minutes to knock the fire out in the kitchen," said Chief Ortiz, "then about an hour and a half to make sure we had the attic situation completely under control."

The big fan in the vent caught fire and burned itself loose from its moorings, missing Ortiz by inches when it came crashing down. An electric clock some 20 feet from the stove literally melted and ran down the wall.

The fire crew did a neat job in controlling the blaze with minimum damage from the dry powder in the kitchen and fog

spray in the attic. But the real villain was smoke and damage here ran high. The kitchen was black, and the club room, dining room and bar were smudged with the filmy soot as were all dishes, linen supplies and open foods.

Owner Frank Phillips had insurance coverage and was awaiting arrival of an adjuster Wednesday morning so he could start the cleanup job. "We hope to be completely redecorated, restocked and the smoke odor dispelled within a few days. If all goes well we will be open for business Sunday," he said.

A coroner's inquest held by Justice of the Peace K. E. Huey Wednesday ruled that Antonio C. Otero, age 39, died of a self-inflicted gunshot wound in his home in Capitan Tuesday.

The body was discovered early Wednesday morning by a member of the family.

He was a life-long resident of Lincoln County and a veteran, having entered the service in 1943 and was discharged from a hospital in 1957.

## Entire state pays for Taos county road work

**SANTA FE** — Each of the state's five highway districts will contribute \$100,000 of secondary road money to a 4.5 mile construction project in Taos county to let contract this month.

The road is part of the so-called U. S. 64 northern route that should be completed around 1970 if future state administrations continue the program.

The letting this month will be for construction of 4.5 miles west from Tres Piedres, the first job in a 44 mile mountainous crossing to Tierra Amarilla.

### THREE DISTRICTS IN NEXT PROJECT

The next construction in the program is scheduled to be let to contract this fall for about five miles east from Tierra Amarilla in Rio Arriba county at the other end of the 44 mile crossing.

It will be paid for by \$165,000 of secondary road money from each of the three northern highway districts.

The contributing counties are San Juan, McKinley, Valencia, Sandoval, Bernalillo, Colfax, Union, Mora, Harding, San Miguel, Quay, Guadalupe, Santa Fe, Torrance, Taos and Rita Arriba.

### HIGHWAY CLIMBS TO 10,500 FEET

Completion of the final link in the new northern route from Raton to Farmington is several years in the future, perhaps 1970 if succeeding state administrations continue the program.

The construction schedule which has been set up through 1967 leaves an unconstructed section in the middle of the Tres Piedres-Tierra Amarillo crossing of some 15 or 20 miles. The distance isn't known precisely because the exact length of the scheduled construction jobs is not known.

C. H. Muchmore, locations engineer for the highway department, estimated the missing link at 17 miles or more.

### 19 MILE STRETCH NOT IN PROGRAM

The U. S. Forest Service has two five-mile construction jobs scheduled on the crossing for the period between July 1965 and July 1967, and the state has programmed five miles more in the 1966-67 period.

This will leave something like 19 miles to be constructed after 1967 with secondary road money.

## Thirsty drivers much the safest as long as they don't drink

Here are some facts which can explode some of the myths and misconceptions about alcohol.

The drinking and driving problem is one of the major factors contributing to motor vehicle accidents in the United States.

This factor is born out by many studies of fatal accidents, in a number of states.

The drinking driver is too often misleadingly referred to as the "drunken driver," the term is misleading because a driver does not have to be obviously drunk to be under the influence of alcohol. There are drinkers who have mastered the technique of being able to walk straight, talk intelligently and give every appearance of sobriety while they are in intoxicated condition. These people are not called "drunken drivers" because they do not exhibit the staggering gait, the slurred and unintelligent speech, etc.

Nevertheless, these are the people who cause most of the trouble. The social drinker, not the drunk, is the biggest problem on our streets and highways. Remember the social drinkers vastly outnumber the actual drunks.

Although the social drinker shows little or no sign of being under the influence, his driving ability is definitely impaired because everyone loses some clearness of mind and self-control when small amounts of alcohol are taken.

Most people have the misguided idea that a few drinks will not affect their driving abilities. This is a mistake. Drinkers themselves are never the best ones to judge their own ability after a few drinks. The scientific fact is that a driver and his ability to react quickly in emergencies are seriously impaired after only a few drinks.

Some people have the mistaken notion that a drink gives a lift or stimulates the driver, thus making him a better driver. Alcohol depresses the central nervous system and removes inhibition and social restraints. Contrary to popular belief coffee or other stimulants will not overcome the effect of alcohol, only time and body process will accomplish this end.

When alcohol enters the stomach in the form of a beverage, it is absorbed through the walls of the stomach and the small intestine into the blood stream. The blood carries the alcohol to all parts of the body which contain water, including the brain.

In the brain, alcohol first depresses the area of higher function, balance, coordination and sensory perception are the next faculties to be impaired.

The most important factors contributing to alcoholic influence are the amount of alcohol absorbed into the blood and the amount of time allowed for the elimination of this alcohol. The human body works to change alcohol into food and/or to pass it out of the body, but it can only do so at a relatively slow rate.

It is easy, therefore, for a person to accumulate a quantity of alcohol and require several hours to eliminate all of it.

The liver is the organ of the body which breaks down the alcohol into usable food.

Alcohol is also eliminated through the lungs and kidney.

The more alcohol there is in the blood, the longer you must wait until you can drive safely. Figure one hour for each bottle of beer or each ounce of whiskey.

A good driver is able to judge speed and distance, follow traffic patterns, make adjustments as traffic flow changes and quickly react to hazards and emergencies. After taking a few drinks, a good driver is no longer able to do these things. He becomes a bad driver, a hazard to himself and to others on the road.



## Time out for work

Here is a subject that has room for a raft of clichés, such as: "It takes a busy man to get the job done." I can't find time for my family because I'm too busy," etc. Time is of the essence, especially in a small town where the burden of running a business is square on a man's shoulder (stocking the shelves, sweeping the floor, writing the checks) and where much of the civic work is done by the same small handful of people. Time is of the essence.

Hear a talk on "Use of time" once and this speaker told of the many minutes spent each week by many desk people searching for pencils. This fellow had attached a pencil to a chain where he could always reach for it and it wouldn't be carried off. We went home and installed a large cup full of pencils on our desk to whip that problem.

Sure hate to hear a lot of people say, "They don't have time," for some worth while items. They are generally the people that have a lot of time, but the item confronting them simply is not important enough to take much of their time. Under this same heading we put organizations that do not function — no use wasting time on them. But there are a lot of

projects worth time, besides earning bread and butter, and we try to find time for those.

Putting a newspaper in the mail each week means handling thousands of small pieces of type, spacing materials, setting lines of reading matter a letter at a time, and cleaning up the wreckage when the job is done. If you're going to have any time at all for projects and fun, other than the newspaper, one must make good use of his time when at the job.

Can't worry too much about a lot of jobs, got to go ahead and do them while we've got time, got to make a lot of decisions on the same basis. Knew a preacher that worked that way — he couldn't get people to move, so he did a lot of jobs himself and, of course, got some criticism . . . but he got the job done.

We need people around Carrizozo who have time for getting the job done, such as making a living and making a town. A checkup of the way we use our time — at work in the C of C, (jr. or sr.) in church work, at school, and carrying out a lot of civic projects could well be one good answer to providing more time for your family, and to make a better town for them to live in.

Fern Prather, only woman in the contest, was a mighty fine fiddle player, only out of practice and nervous so she had to start a time or two and needed a lot of warming up. She knew one of John Sims' favorite tunes, "Devil's Dream" and it's a booger to play. John could do it in the summertime when he was in good practice, like we've never heard another fiddler do.

Pete Grisak likes to play duets with himself on the fiddle and that take a delicate touch and lots of practice. He was good, makes his own fiddles and just needs to be playing a dance every Saturday night to be as good as there is around. Clarence Stevenson knew the old-time fiddle tunes and was a fine fiddler but he was out of practice to.

Where there's music there's fun — and there was a good time in Cloudercroft Saturday.

## A Conservative

We heard a good thought on the meaning of a word that is much in the news today — conservative. As applied to politics, the meaning of this word has shifted from colonial days, and the meaning today has almost become obscure to the point it means all sorts of different things to different people.

The great source of strength for the United States is the wealth of natural resources we have, and the way they are used. Without these sources of

power our government could not flourish and our people live so well in a two-car world.

A conservative is a person who wants to conserve our basic resources. Instead of sending billions of dollars, in money and materials to foreign countries, we'd better teach people in those countries to make good use of their own natural resources — is the thinking of a conservative.

Two good reasons here. People in foreign lands, with lower living standards than ours, frequently make poor use of material wealth just handed to them. At the same time wealth of the United States is being spread with poor results.

A conservative need not be opposed to change. On the other hand a conservative believes we have the finest form of government yet devised by the human race . . . let's keep it strong by conserving what we have.

## Booky plans to convert 12 acres of irrigated cropland to pasture

Participation in the Great Plains Conservation Program is steadily increasing in Lincoln County. One of the most recent contract signers in the Upper Hondo Soil and Water Conservation District is Mr. Booky, whose farm is located approximately one half mile east of Hondo.

Mr. Booky plans to convert approximately 12 acres of irrigated cropland to permanent pasture. The pasture will contain a mixture of alfalfa, tall fescue, and orchard grass. The farm contains a small amount of native range which will be used in conjunction with the permanent pasture. The native range will be deferred during the growing season and used as winter pasture.

Planned conservation work, in addition to the conversion of cropland to irrigated pasture, includes: land leveling, underground irrigation pipeline, fence construction to protect seeding and cross fencing to set up rotation grazing system, proper pasture use, and proper use on native range. The object of the Great Plains Conservation Program is to assist farmers and ranchers in developing and carrying out, on a voluntary basis, a plan of operations that will bring a-

bout greater stability through grazing and cropping systems and the application of enduring soil and water conservation practices. To carry out this program, Public Law 1021, 84th Congress, provides for assurance of continuing cost-share assistance to ranchers and farmers who present a satisfactory plan for their entire unit including a time schedule for establishing conservation practices.

**Walter Hubbard receives patent**

Application was filed January 17, 1958, by Walter A. Hubbard of Carrizozo for a patent on a method and apparatus for producing electrical power and distilling water by geothermal energy. The patent was issued July 1, 1964.

This invention relates to apparatus and means for converting the kinetic energy of a mass of liquid, such as sea-water or non-potable water, falling down a passage into subterranean basins, or chambers, into hydro-electric energy, with the subsequent removal of such water from those depths by low-pressure or vacuum distillation, through the geothermal heating thereof, so that the saturated water-vapors may rise rapidly to higher elevations for condensation, with heat-exchange to pre-heat cold, raw intake-water.

**AIMED AT HELPING DEPRESSED NORTH**

The northern construction is knocking the rest of the state out of several million road money and is being pushed by the governor in the hope that it will relieve the economically distressed north.

The highway department has estimated that the completed road will carry 500 cars a day, a figure that was worked up to justify federal participation in the construction between Tres Piedres and Tierra Amarilla.

**ELECTION NEARS, PAYROLL GROWS**

Election-year employment of highway workers climbed to 2,645 during July.

It's the biggest highway payroll on record and compares with 2,369 in July last year.

A record high figure that stood for several years was 2,578 on the roads payroll in November, 1960, when Gov. John Burroughs was running for re-election. It was first topped in June of this year when the number went 2,583.

**POLITICAL LAWYERS STAY ON PAYROLL**

First Asst. Atty. Gen. Boston Witt is staying on the state payroll at \$950 a month while running for attorney general, and Atty. Gen. Earl Hartley is continuing to draw his \$1,000 a month state pay while serving as Democratic campaign manager.

The state personnel law bans candidates and holders of political positions such as campaign manager from the state payroll but both Witt and Hartley are exempt from the law.

Shepherd Hays, Demo candidate for land commissioner, resigned as chief of the field department in the land office, when he became a candidate in March.


