## Welcome sign given to boys at Sierra Blanca

Since August 10th Fort Stanton has had much activity due to the arrival of the Camp Sierra Blanca staff and boys from the New Mexico Boy's School at Springer. Only boys who merit the honor for the vocational training section of the boy's school are sent here to the camp. These boys are in the age range from 16 to 18 and mostly from the southern section of New Mexico. Their training will be one-half forestry and the other half as apprentices in carpentry, motor mechanics, painting, plumbing and masonry. The boys worked at Moriarty first getting the buildings ready to move to Ft. Stanton. The buildings are the former Air Force Radar Site given gratis by the Federal Government to the state of New Mexico, to be used in the state. When the buildings are completed there will be 2 dormitories, staff housing, school building, dining room and kitchen combined, administration building, maintenance and the housing for the camp director. Each dorm will house 25 boys and each will have a recreation room. The camp is located about a mile above the Fort Stanton community.

At present there are 17 boys with the camp director, construction foreman, camp clerk and four supervisors. When fully staffed there will be 50 boys and 12 of the staff personnel.

On their own time the boys have been picking apples to buy a TV set for their recreation room.

Lincoln County has extended a "welcome hand" to the staff and boys of the camp. Among these is Supt. "Bud" Darling, Principal Jack Mayfield of the Capitán school system, who have given passes to the boys for all home games of the Capitán Tigers.

Mr. John "Jack" Schuster is camp director. He taught in the University of New Mexico before resigning to accept the directorship at Fort Stanton. Prior to that he served in the armed forces overseas. He recently joined the Capitán Lions club. With Mr. Schuster is Nancy his wife and four children: Kathy 7, Joe 6, David 5, and Monica 4. Mr. "Zeke" Trujillo, wife and 5 year old son are the other married couple. Gilbert Chavez is the camp clerk with Robert Duran, John Valdez, Henry Vigil and Julio Trujillo comprising the supervisors for the boys.

## Montoya shoots for Spanish vote

**SANTA FE** — Joe Montoya, conducting one of the most vigorous and closely organized campaigns New Mexico has ever experienced, has a goal of 70 per cent of the vote in the nine counties of dominant Spanish American population.

The goal is obviously over-optimistic, and doubly so unless trouble spots for the U. S. Senate candidate are corrected in Rio Arriba, San Miguel, Mora and Santa Fe.

However, the area will cast about 70,000 votes and if Montoya could get 60 per cent of them it would give him a fat pad of 14,000 to offset in other areas.

### DENNIS CHAVEZ GOT TWO THIRDS

The nine-county block which also includes Sandoval, Socorro, Valencia, Taos and Guadalupe set a record for one-sided voting in 1958 when it gave the late Sen. Dennis Chavez 66 per cent of the vote against Republican Forrest Atchley.

The same counties in 1952 gave Senator Chavez only 55 per cent of the vote when he was running against Gen. Pat Hurlley.

If Montoya should drop to as low as 55 per cent of the area vote he would be in a hard way to win the state election.

### MUST CORRECT TROUBLE SPOTS

The Montoya trouble in four of the Spanish-American counties is not such as would lose the counties for him but which

could seriously reduce his winning margin.

In Rio Arriba and San Miguel it is due to deep splits in the Democratic groups. In Mora it is simply a situation of more Republicans than Democrats, and in Santa Fe it is resentment against Montoya for his suspected part in defeating Fabian Chavez of Santa Fe for nomination for the U. S. Senate.

### MUCH DEPENDS ON JOHNSON

Montoya and Sen. Ed Mechem are going into the final lap of the campaign with most all observers in agreement that the outcome will be determined on how well Lyndon Johnson runs in the state.

If Johnson should win the state big, like 25,000, it would probably assure Montoya's election.

### REFERENDUM CHANGED AGAIN

The referendum of the primary convention law has been juggled again and now it appears that the saps will be allowed to vote "for repeal" and "against repeal" of the 1963 law.

On voting machines it will be the last item to the right on the top line.

State Secretary Alberta Miller and Atty. Gen. Earl Hartley decided to put the for and against repeal notations on the voting machines after it was noted that their original plan didn't mention repeal.

### ALBUQUERQUE VOTE RISKY FOR WALKER

Backers of Demo Johnny Walker for Congress are apprehensive about the Albuquerque vote in his race with Dr. Jack Redman of Albuquerque.

They are confident Walker will lead Redman in the area outside Albuquerque but are fearful that he will lose the city.

Fablan Chavez beat Walker by 4,000 in the all-Democrat primary in Albuquerque, and Redman two years ago beat Joe Montoya by 4,000 in Albuquerque.

It adds up to a dangerous situation for Walker unless he comes in to the city with a heavy lead from the rest of the state.

The dean of the N. M. State School of Agriculture said Tuesday there would be some action taken against County Agent Al Woodburn of Chavez County who presumably made deals to have his calves sold falsely by a 4-H boy.

What apparently happened in the agent had a Chavez County youth sell two calves belonging to the agent's son. In talking with Al Stubbs, Roswell Daily Record managing editor, Wednesday morning Stubbs said the two boys had made a deal in the Spring to show animals together. The sale was made at the N. M. State Fair with the youth claiming the calves as his own. The proceeds did not go to the youth-making the sale but instead to the county agent to pay on a \$10,000 bank note.

Stubbs said that agent Woodburn was going to refund the money through the State Fair.



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



## A marvelous day in Ruidoso

We had a marvelous day Saturday, up early smelling the crisp fall air, good breakfast and clear for nourishment, then a leisurely drive up through the mountains with brother Bill Payton for chauffeur to Ruidoso to help judge the Aspenade parade. That town of Ruidoso has done a lot of wonderful things for itself and is a positive credit to development of southeast New Mexico. One could go on at great length about the many fine projects wrought by those energetic people — with only one blotch on their record . . . they don't expend their energy much beyond the narrow limits of their own town.

There are a number of business places giving service over much of Lincoln County, and quite a few people up there who do good work beyond the city limits but such people do not add up to a majority by any means.

Ruidoso is not yet ready, by their example, to take over leadership of Lincoln County. The Ruidoso News says, "Give Bob the job" in an editorial asking Democrats to hang together and elect Bob Pearson as our County Representative. The Lincoln County News wants to remind its readers that W. G. "Bill" Shreengost has been, and will continue to be as fine a representative working for the good of all the county, as this county could ask. He has devoted more than a normal a-

mount of time to this job. We are positive he would work for the best interests of Ruidoso as well as the rest of the county.

We do not feel that the people backing Bob Pearson have the interest of all of Lincoln County at heart. Ruidoso as a town has not taken much interest in county affairs in little ways that count big.

It was certainly their privilege to vote against a new courthouse for Lincoln County when one was sorely needed — and they did, largely because the structure would not be located in their own backyard, hardly giving consideration to the needs of the rest of the county for a place to store records and transact county business.

This beautiful mountain town, a mecca for all of west Texas and much of eastern New Mexico, has not reached maturity as a leader in Lincoln County. Until they do and are ready to

back up the county in its work towards a better life for more people — they do not rate one of the top political jobs in the county.

Bob Pearson, with the help of his lovely wife, possibly could do a good job for the county, if he were not pushed and pulled by forces at home which do not include the rest of the county in their thinking.

Carrizozo, Corona, Capitan, Hondo . . . we feel sure these towns are willing to work with Ruidoso and the day may come when the border town decides its best future is in development of all the county including the Jicarillas, the Gallinas country,

the Mal Pais area, the Capitans, the Hondo Valley.

"Until that day gets here — we say to both Republicans and Democrats, 'Vote for Bill Shreengost'." Minority whip though he be, your interests will be better served by this man of experience. By County Agent Ralph Dunlap  
Dean Boyd has some bulls on test at the Bull Testing Station

operated by New Mexico State University near Tucuman. The bull calves will be measured for growth rate, feed efficiency and conformation.

In the fair rush I neglected to mention that Scott Shafer had the champion Dorset ewe at the New Mexico State Fair at Albuquerque.

Plan now to sell any livestock if you do not have enough grass to carry them until Spring. You will be money ahead as the price of hay will cost more than any increase in price. Records show that the livestock owner is better off to sell early than to hold as the cost of the extra feed will more than offset any price increase.

Over 11,000 households have been surveyed by USDA's Statistical Reporting Service to find out how much food the nation has stored in the family freezer and pantry.

In the household study homemakers were asked to estimate how long their food supplies would last, not if they served normal meals, but if they fed the family only enough to get by on.

One-third said they could stretch food on hand about a week or less. Another third said between one and two weeks. The rest felt they could hold out longer than two weeks. Local 4-H'er named state win-
