

## Texas suspect tells of slaying in Ruidoso area

**BIG SPRINGS, TEX.** — Howard County officers said Saturday that under questioning a 27-year-old man told them he killed three women in a city park in the southwest part of Chicago March 4, 1960, and not in a state park.

A check with Chicago police showed no such triple slaying occurred in the city on that date.

Earlier Saturday, the man, John M. Peters, being held here on a burglary charge, was quoted by Sheriff Miller Harris as saying he had beaten three women to death in a state park near Chicago.

Harris said Peters, in oral statements, also told him he had killed a woman in east Texas and a man in New Mexico.

The sheriff said Peters told him he had beaten a woman to death at Marshall, Tex., in 1955. Officers said her body was found where Peters said he had buried it.

Harris also quoted Peters as saying he shot to death a man and dumped the body in a canyon between Capitan and Ruidoso. He said the man told him he covered the body with rocks and leaves.

Gavilan Canyon near Ruidoso was searched by Lincoln County sheriff's officers Saturday, but failed to find the body Peters said he buried there.

Under Sheriff Clyde Atwood returned Saturday night from Big Springs, where he went to obtain more specific information on the location of the body.

At this writing the search for the alleged body continues.

### Central N. M. Electric Cooperative will refund \$50,000 to members

On December 1, 1964 the Central New Mexico Cooperative will refund approximately \$50,000.00 to its consumers. This refund is for revenue in excess of operating cost for the years 1956 and 1957. Over \$,000 checks are to be mailed and vary in amounts from under \$1.00 to over \$100.00.

Refunds, as provided in Cooperative By-laws, amended August 5, 1964, payment for electricity in excess of bare cost of providing service represent member investment, and when financial conditions of the business warrant it, the Board of Trustees may authorize refunds.

Although the Cooperative is low in density, slightly over one consumer per mile, which is low compared to many, our rural

rate was reduced almost 50% in April 1962. On the old rural rate the first 100 kwh was costing our consumers \$10.75. Under the present rate the first 100 kwh only cost \$5.65.

Although not every consumer will receive a refund check, as many now receiving service were not connected in 1956 and 1957, we trust the approximately \$50,000.00 will tend to strengthen the economy of the area served by the Cooperative.

### New jail most modern in the State

The new courthouse under construction since late summer will be completed some time in February. The rock laying on the outside and the roof are completely finished. There is some outside work yet to be done to the driveway, which connects the new courthouse with the annex to the old courthouse and the jail.

The jail, the sheriff hopes, will be ready for occupancy about the middle of December. County prisoners are now being housed in the Ruidoso jail, which gets a little crowded at times. Electrical wiring and quite a bit of finishing work is all that is left to do inside the jail, which is up to date in every respect, and will be one of the most modern in the state.

All the steel bars, cell doors and most of the furnishings have

been installed. The kitchen located within the jail building is the only room which still needs a lot of work.

The new jail will hold about 45 prisoners, where the old one housed between 20 and 20, and got a night crowded at times over the years. Some of the new features are: two padded cells (psycho ward); a special section for drunks; separate detention cells and facilities for female prisoners, which the old jail did not have. (Female prisoners had to be taken to the Otero County Jail in Alamogordo for safe keeping).

Another new feature is a reception desk at the entrance and a waiting room for visitors of the prisoners. This room is accessible from the cell block and is divided by a half wall with big glass windows. The prisoners can see and talk to

the visitors, but can not come in personal contact with them.

All doors on the main cell block are electrically controlled and can be opened individually by pushing a button, or in case of power failure, by turning a hand crank, thus the prisoners from all cells can be turned out into the designated dining area, all at the same time and the jailer will not have to enter the cell block. Dining trays will be handed out thru a small opening in the steel bars, enclosing the cells and eating area.

Located within the jail building will be the sheriff's office, the jailer's office and an office for the radio operator.

Now is the time for anyone who has never seen the inside of a jail to take a look. It will be completed soon and then the chances will be very slim for anyone without law breakers.

You may say to yourself, "Well I am only one person. I won't make or break a program," but it does make a difference because a Band program, to be effective, needs the active participation of every person.


So the next time you think you are only one person and that your efforts are not needed, remember my typewriter and say to yourself: "I am a key person in our Band Program and I am needed very much."

Cut apples and orange in chunks, put through food chopper with cranberries, using coarse blade. Dissolve sugar and raspberry gelatin in boiling water; chill until slightly thickened; stir in fruit. 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

**COUNTY AGENT RALPH DUNLAP REPORTS**

**4-H members going to Chicago**

Ralph Dunlap, Lincoln County Agent, will accompany New Mexico's 28 trip-winning 4-H members leaving November 27 for an activity packed week of National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago.

Many of the activities planned for the 28 N. M. 4-H delegates and those from the other 49 states and Puerto Rico will spotlight "Citizenship in Action," the theme of this year's event which runs from November 29 to December 3.

About 1,500 4-H Club members are expected to attend this annual event, along with many local leaders, Extension workers, representatives of business, industry and the press. Most of the 4-H delegates are state champions in 4-H projects or activities and the Congress trip is a "once-in-a-lifetime" experience for them.

The program includes six days of activities from 8:00 a.m. to

10:00 p.m. Special breakfasts, luncheons and banquets have been planned throughout the week for the 4-H'ers, and top entertainers will be featured on these programs. At these sessions, the boys and girls will have a chance to meet representatives of the businesses and organizations which sponsor the trips to Congress.

January 3, 1965, is the last date applications for payment, supported by the required sales documents, are to be filed with the ASCS county office.

Wool growers, particularly those who market their lambs in the Fall, need to keep adequate records of their sales so that they will be able to make proper applications for payment under the wool incentive program.

The sales record for lambs sold should include the name of the buyer, his signature, and the number and liveweight of lambs sold, plus the description "unshorn." Lamb payments are made only on lambs that have never been shorn, to discourage unusual shearing of lambs before selling.

Current marketings of wool and lambs through December 31, 1964, will qualify for incentive payments under the wool program for the 1964 marketing year, beginning with 1964, the marketing year is the calendar year.

Treat cattle for lice now. Lice populations are reduced during the heat of summer, but start to reproduce rapidly in the fall and winter as hair thickens and reach a peak of population in the spring on untreated cattle.

Lice pierce the skin and suck blood causing severe irritation. As the animal skin becomes raw, nervousness and loss of blood cause lower weight gains.

Insecticides used as sprays that will give good control of lice on beef cattle are Malathion, Corral, Korian, and Methoxychlor.

"A page for independent thought"

## Hind sight frequently best view

The several influences that work for and against orderly development of an area, or town — are more than anyone thinks, when you add them all up. Headlines in the daily press read, "95 more bases on way out". You can be sure that most of the 95 towns close to these bases will be taking a long look at their economy.

A further effect, one that has already happened to Carrizozo, will be that large numbers of frame-shacks will go on the market, bought up for cheap, temporary housing that has a way of becoming permanent. Permanent and orderly development suffers both going and coming.

Take a look at the new Lincoln County courthouse. We are proud of this structure and greatly admire its general appearance. It's a wonderful addition to Carrizozo, thanks to 5 or 6 men who live many miles from the county seat town. The new school building comes under the same heading. Again a fine building has been added to the Carrizozo scene by people who are a part of the community but not residents of the town.

The way Carrizozo ordinances read, most anyone can move a trailer house into town and set it down anywhere. We believe it entirely possible that a smelter or mining mill could locate on any of the vacant lots around town.

These are but a few of the influences that work on development of a town — there are more.

If the state ever makes up its mind to do something about Highway 54, make it four-lane, make it one-way traffic, or bypass the town completely . . . when the shooting is all done, odds favor the state doing what it thinks best.

There was the time, as reported to us more than once that Carrizozo could have obtained a major military installation but the local people in power went against such a question. We've heard it direct

from several natives that the county (including each town individually) simply did not have \$25,000 to buy the Bonito Lake property. How does hindsight view these two instances? Were these moves good or bad for the town? Maybe the first installation refusal was smart — the latter refusal was a tragedy of stupidity.

The railroad has been a major influence on Carrizozo for most of its natural life and hardly a person making major decisions for the railroad even lives in the state.

A roundhouse was closed out and a street died. Number of trains running was cut down, hotel business dwindled and another street is dying. A row of trailers along the tracks supply cheap housing for some trainmen.

To close out this article we'll give one more sample, the same one that has hit (and devastated) thousands of small towns. We're in the age of two-car families, smooth roads and mass communication. A person reads an advertisement this morning, drives 100 miles to buy, all of which has made the small-town merchant (the backbone of anybody's small town) hustle read, most anyone can move a trailer house into town and set it down anywhere. We believe it entirely possible that a smelter or mining mill could locate on any of the vacant lots around town.

We're sure many outside influences — in town — can be good. The court house and new school are good samples. The only solution for coping with other influences that are not so good is positive, practical long-range planning. Towns originated because of need for business places, still true today. Planning needs to consider the welfare of people working in and out of town as well as people in business in town.

The kind of planning we're speaking of needs to be solid enough to lap over several town administrations put in office by people with different ideas.

A town's foresight can be sharpened by knowledge gained from hindsight.



# Future of Fort Stanton discussed

The Board of Directors of Ft. Stanton Tuberculosis Hospital met in regular session November 14. Bob Walker, manager of the Chamber of Commerce at Ruidoso was present, said he was grateful for the opportunity to come, that if the C of C can work closer with the hospital let us know. Gerald Dean, Mayor of Captain, was another visitor at the meeting. Mayor Dean said he regretted some of the rumors which were not true, that patients on leave were welcome in all business places in Captain.

Chairman Gene Mann got the meeting underway promptly at 1:00 p.m. Minutes of previous meeting were approved. Mann suggested the Board go to Item 5 on the agenda because Ben Mason from the Department of Finance was present, to discuss the budget. Mann gave a short rundown of hospital activities for Mr. Mason. The Board has assumed responsibility of TB control for the entire state, has taken over case finding through case treatment. There are 24 clinics being held in the state now, there will be more in time. Ft. Stanton medical staff saw 69 individuals at the recent clinic in Parkview. Stanton has assumed handling of the Mobile Ray unit, expects support in the way of publicity and clerical help from the TB Assoc. The Hospital is still working on plans to construct a security wing (Hill-Burton funds were not sufficient to meet all needs and the Fort Stanton request was at the bottom of the list, no money allotted to Stanton this year.)

Mr. Mason said he was happy to be back, was not here to hold a budget hearing, Supt. Bryan has kept us well informed. Mason said he was interested in the general philosophy of the hospital board in two areas — clinics, and funding. The whole point in question was fair enough. Fort Stanton has taken over two functions formerly handled by the Dept. of Health and TB Assoc. both hospital and department receive state money, both have asked for slightly increased budgets. The question was: who is paying for what, is there any overlap in services being performed by the hospital and the department.

Supt. George Bryan explained that when Federal funds for TB in the state were cut out a year ago, the hospital offered its facilities and aid. The Department of Health was willing for the hospital to take over handling both clinics and the Mobil X-Ray. The Department of Health has no financial responsibility in these areas now.

Dr. Louis Levin said, "It goes further," Fort Stanton has always provided drugs, and has provided doctors for clinics. The Health Dept. does the rest. The \$12,000 in Federal funds and an equal amount of state matching money will be restored next year for use by the Health Department. This department will continue to do skin testing in schools, making the best use of local physicians. Mann added, "Our concern is the entire state-wide TB program.

The Mobile TB Unit is an added expense to the hospital budget, the Health Department had curtailed clinics and was not using the X-Ray unit very much. The TB Hospital has activated these programs.

Mason said he thought needs were not being met in out-patient clinics and expects the cost to go up, but was interested in what the result would be on the 1964 budget. Would the hospital show a big increase in patients, and what would the clinic and X-Ray cost be?

Supt. Bryan said the 174-180 patients per day in the past is a good pattern. He could see the daily census going up to 180-200, followed by the decline to the present patient load. Right now Carlsbad is following up on 500 patient contacts.

Mason concluded, a well prepared and comprehensive plan based on need is the key to successful operation. Your operations here have saved the state several hundred thousand dollars.

Actual cost of clinic and X-Ray unit will be defined in coming months, at the same time the hospital is keeping within the bounds of its present budget.

Chairman Mann welcomed Rep. W. G. Shreveport, who arrived after the meeting got underway. There was discussion about the law which states only TB patients may enter Ft. Stanton, other pulmonary diseases barred. The hospital has 225 beds average of 172 patients. The Hospital Board and staff are investigating to see if the law could, or should be changed to allow admittance of patients with pulmonary disease other than TB, with the possibility of making better use of

the facilities.

Plans for the open house to be held Sunday were discussed. Supt. Bryan told the Board that they were ready to close out the Moriarty site, only the well and pump left, the Highway Department Dist. 5 wants the well. Rollers from Moriarty went to Carrie Tingley Hospital, probable saving to the state (over new rollers) of \$50,000.

Ben Mason and George Bryan will go to Washington, D. C., in December. Federal funds for a number of agencies in the state, including Fort Stanton, are being increased, but getting access to them is the real problem.

On November 9 there was a meeting in Santa Fe of representatives from hospitals and correctional institutes of the state. Subject discussed was an "Act" to form a hospital facilities division, custodial division. The same will meet December 11 to explore state-agency coordination.

Road behind the hospital has been raised six inches and oiled, will be blacktopped in the spring. The state is now working on road to the Boys Camp, will be oiled immediately and blacktopped later.

The Fort Stanton crew that has worked to clear out property at Moriarty will move to Hagerman where they will remove fencing and other equipment. Any items not requested by state agencies will be stored at Fort Stanton.

Personnel records of the hospital will be put on data processing in Santa Fe. Records at the hospital are not being updated for this purpose.

On October 27 there were 27 public health nurses visiting the hospital. "How to do it" was the aim of the visitation. No districts are doing things alike, and clinic problems were worked out.

There were chest clinics October 22-23 at Grants and Gallup, the 26th at Las Cruces, November 5 at Alamogordo, the 6th at Las Vegas, press conference in Albuquerque the 10th on the 12th chest clinic at Parkview. The Mobile X-Ray left Sunday going to Jal, Eunice, Hobbs, Lovington and Tatum.

Present at the meeting were Chairman Gene Mann, Lena Mae Pfeiffer, Dr. Louis Levin, Eleanor Jones and Paul Payton, board members. Supt. George Bryan, Dr. H. C. Jernigan, head of the medical staff, and Pat Salas, secretary.

The next board meeting will be January 9, probably held in Albuquerque.

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
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
