Weather doesn't stop Lincoln County schools

An icy snow is falling in Carrizozo as this is being written Wednesday morning, and temperatures have been low for a few days, quite a severe change from the mild spring-type weather Lincoln County had been enjoying.

At Capitan and Corona, schools where the elevation is about 1,000 feet higher than Carrizozo, no days have been lost due to the weather though some activity periods have been cut short after lunch.

Supt. Duane Darling at Capitan said they cut out all recesses (youngsters can't play outside anyway), shortened the noon hour and completed a day of school Tuesday at 2:30. There is only an inch of snow on the ground at Capitan but in the ski area they had received a lot of snow, six inches Sunday, six more Monday, and five more inches of snow last night, making a total of 17. The base depth was reported at four to five feet at the top of the ski run, chains required to get up there. Temperature at Alto was zero this morning. Capitan school has not missed a day so far, 56 days of school left.

Carrizozo schools have not missed any days due to weather but school was not held February 18 and 19 due to extensive sickness. Judgment of when to start for home with a bus load of youngsters is pretty much the decision of the bus drivers. If they think conditions are getting bad and the busses should leave early their opinions are

needed. Supt. J. T. Clegg was out of town Wednesday, and Prin. Glen Ellison was home sick in bed leaving Mrs. Ellison taking care of details in the superintendent's office.

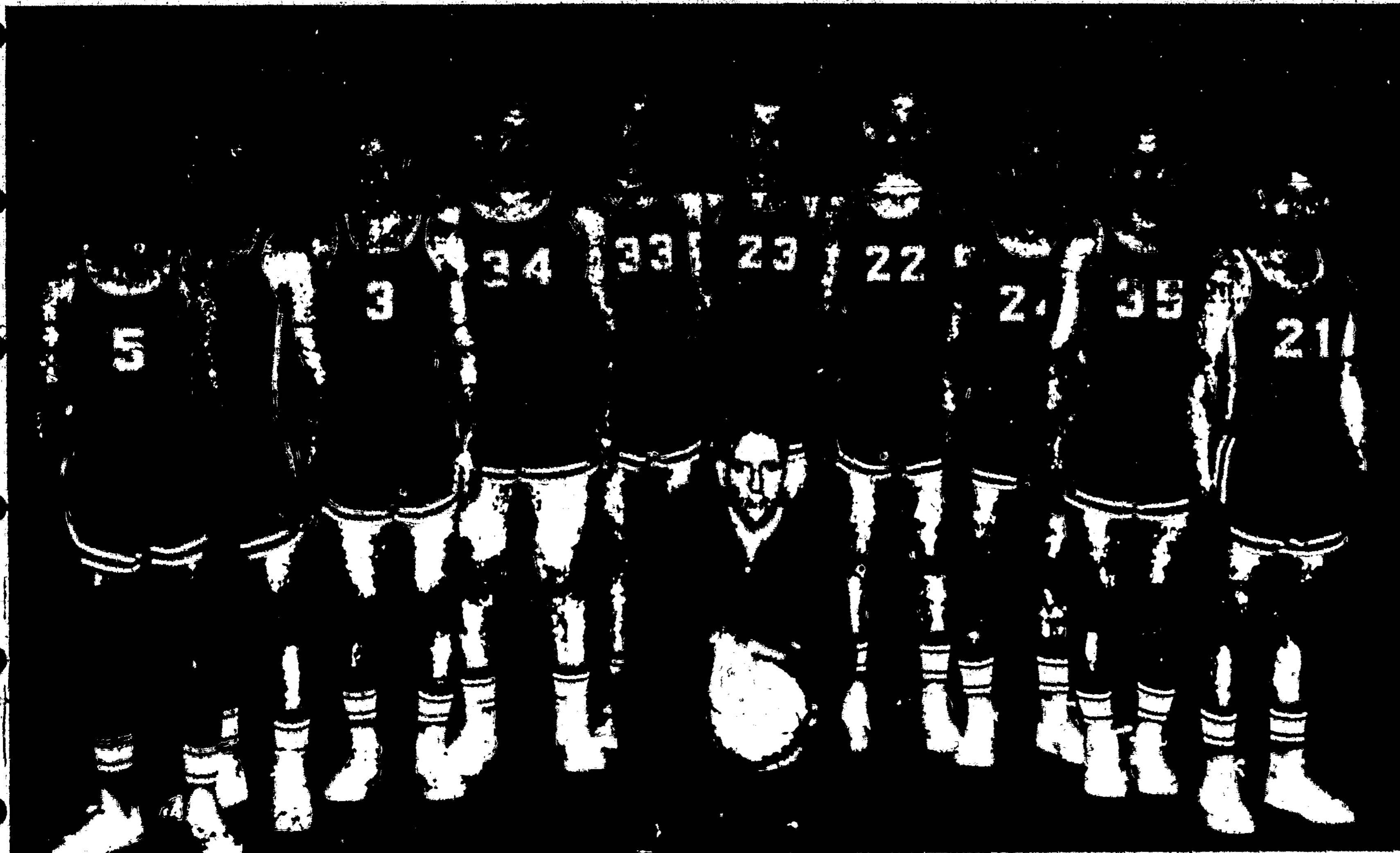
Supt. Bob Buchanan at Corona said they turned out school at 1:30 p.m. Tuesday, and probably try to get out by 2:00 p.m. Wednesday, but they have not missed any school at Corona due to the weather. Supt. Buchanan estimated there was eight inches of snow on the ground.

Eleven Corona seniors are expected to join groups from Carrizozo and Capitan making the trip to Ruidoso Thursday (today), weather permitting, for senior day when the 1965 classes get a chance to talk to college counselors.

Marvin Burton homesteaded here in 1909 . . . died February 27

Marvin Burton, born June 8, 1889 in Paragould, Ark., a pioneer resident of Carrizozo, passed away Feb. 27 in the Veterans Hospital in Big Springs, Texas, after a short illness.

Mr. Burton came to Carrizozo in 1909 and homesteaded about five miles north of town. He worked for Southern Pacific and in 1918 joined the navy and served until 1921. After his discharge he returned to Southern Pacific and retired in 1922. He ran a coal and fuel yard in Carrizozo for several years and later went into the hardware business.

He was a member of Trinity Methodist Church here since 1910 and served as Worshipful Master of the Carrizozo AF&AM Lodge in 1919.

Mr. Burton is survived by one niece, Mrs. Margaret Sullivan of Memphis, Tenn.; and one nephew, Jerry Biggs also of

Memphis. Both visited him about two weeks ago at the hospital.

Funeral services will be held Thursday, at 2:30 p.m. at Trinity Methodist church with the Rev. C. E. Burch of Mountainair and the Rev. James Wells of Carrizozo officiating.

Graveside services will be conducted by the Carrizozo Masonic Lodge No. 41, with interment in Evergreen cemetery.

Lasater guides Co-op through growth period

(Ed. Note — This article is reprinted from the New Mexico Electric News February issue. It tells about a man with a lot of bosses, who makes a full time job of serving them all well.)

The guiding hand in the administration of an electric cooperative is no small job. Jay D. Lasater, Manager of the Otero County Electric Cooperative in Cloudcroft can attest to this. Mr. Lasater came from the Mojave Electric Cooperative in Kingman, Arizona, thirteen years ago to assume the duties of Manager in Cloudcroft. These duties are varied and many. The ten-member Board of Trustees set the policy for the cooperative and then it is up to Mr. Lasater to carry out their wishes.

The Otero County Electric Cooperative was put into operation in 1941, with 218 members served by 76 miles of line. In 1951, Mr. Lasater took over the reins, under the direction of the Board of Trustees, and has seen cooperative grow to serve 4,331 members with 1,593 miles of line. During these years the rugged terrain of the mountains had to be tamed, lines maintained in spite of the winter snow, and service to the members improved. To obtain these objectives Mr. Lasater has climbed poles to assist in restoring an outage, tramped the mountains inspecting his lines and ridden with the survey crews to map out extensions of service. The term "area coverage" as defined in the Rural Electrification Act is becoming a reality in the three counties served by the cooperative.

As with all electric cooperatives the type of members it serves varies. Because of the terrain of the country in the service area their lines go to summer cabins high in the mountains, atop the ski lift at Cloudcroft and to the ranches

in the valleys. The Burgett Floral Company, which is served by the cooperative, is the largest wholesale florist in the southwest.

Better service and low cost electricity are the aims of the Otero County Electric Cooperative. Rate studies are made periodically to determine the feasibility of lowering rates, or the alternative of returning capital credits to the members. Recently such a study was conducted and it was the decision of the Board of Trustees to reduce the rates rather than return capital credits at this time. Beginning with the 15th day of January the rate per kilowatt hour was reduced from four to six percent of the previous rate. This reduction in rates will effect a savings of approximately \$25,000 per year for the members of the cooperative.

The Manager and the members of the Board of Trustees of the cooperative are constantly seeking ways to aid their consumers. More reliable service and better living are two ways in which they serve. At the present time the cooperative has purchased quite a number of 40-gallon, quick-recovery electric hot water heaters which the consumers may purchase at cost, \$64.00, plus tax. In addition to cost-price, the cooperative will contribute \$15.00 toward the cost of a new installation of one of the hot water heaters.

Mr. Lasater works on the theory that the members of the cooperative are entitled to the best. After all, they own it! From the headquarters of the cooperative in Cloudcroft to the branch office in Carrizozo, he makes it a point to get to personally know as many of his "bosses" as possible. The standards of the performance for the cooperative are as high as the altitude of its headquarters, 9,000 feet.

Grand plan for public defender is being scuttled for modest program

SANTA FE — A grand plan for a statewide public defender system headed by a chief defender in Santa Fe is being scuttled in favor of a modest program without a state chief and without some \$300,000 a year that was in the original proposal.

The original, worked up by a committee of lawyers, called for a \$17,500 state defender at the head of a statewide legal staff that would operate with \$375,000 a year.

It would have put the \$12,000-a-year attorney general in the shade.

Half DA Pay Rate

The watered-down proposal will call for a defender in each judicial district to operate as an arm of the court and to be paid from court funds at about one half the rate of district attorneys.

The bill would set up a sum of about \$75,000 to be dished out by the Board of Finance to meet the cost of the program.

Increase For Curry DA

Rep. David Norvell of Curry has a bill in to raise the pay of Morris Stagner, new district attorney for Curry and Quay.

Presently, district attorneys are paid \$10,200 a year in districts with 50,000 or more population and \$8,000 in smaller districts.

The Curry - Roosevelt district has 48,800 count and Norvell's bill would change the

population breaking line from 50,000 to 47,000. The Curry-Roosevelt district would be the only one affected.

Special For Scoggin

There is another special measure put in by Sen. Ike Smalley "by request" which does not mention District Judge William Scoggin of Las Cruces but would extend to him special retirement privilege.

The measure would provide retirement benefits for a judge at any age who lost his place by election defeat after serving 18 years on the bench. It also would provide retirement benefits for the surviving spouse of a judge who died at any age after 18 years on the bench.

'By Request' Bills

The "by request" notation seen on bills introduced in the legislature is velled notice that the sponsor does not particularly care for what the bill proposes but is throwing it in for consideration at the request of some constituent he couldn't turn down.

The most conspicuous "by request" measure of the present session is the one calling for the big salary increases for all the state elective officials. It is probably the only "by request" measure that ever had four signers — Sens. Bill Wheatley, Sterling Black, Tibo Chavez and Buddy Wamel.

It would up the pay of the treasurer and secretary of state to \$15,000, auditor \$16,500, at-

torney general \$17,000, land commissioner \$17,500, governor \$20,000.

Gov. Jack Campbell, who is utilizing Republicans all over his Democratic administration is carrying on with a Republican board of regents for the El Rito state school.

The recent appointment of Demo Charles Lopez of Santa Fe and reappointment of Republican Louis Salazar of Santa Fe left the board with three Republicans and two Democrats.

One of the items before the board is the one-year contract of Supt. Lito Martinez which expires July 1. He gets \$12,000 and a residence.

Legislators who visited El Rito last weekend largely were critical of the troubled little institution which never has found its place in the state school system.

Close Vote Nodds Trouble

The one-vote margin by which the New Mexico legislature approved a resolution for a federal constitutional amendment that would modify the supreme court rules on apportionment of state legislatures does not bode well for the success of the amendment movement.

The approval of 34 states is required to get the question before Congress and the approval of 38 states is required for the eventual ratification of such an amendment.

New Mexico has been counted among the states in hot resistance to the Supreme Court rules but did not appear very in the house vote last week.

If there is that kind of sentiment in other "hot" states, the 34 endorsements of the amendment may never come through.

The key to maintaining the delicate, fresh-orange flavor of the frozen concentrate orange is holding the storage temperature at 0°F. Research shows that when citrus concentrate is exposed to temperatures of 15° to 20°F — even for short periods — the juice, when reconstituted, tends to "separate" into layers of water and pulp, and storage life drops.

Should I select the teflon-coated cookware or the regular? This is a question homemakers are asking themselves. They also want to know if the teflon-coated cookware really performs well and if it is worth the money.

"Teflon" is the name given cookware (frypans, saucepans and ovenware) which is coated with a special heat-resistant plastic coating. Similar coatings on imports use a different name.

Miss Reba Smith, home management specialist with the NMSU Cooperative Extension Service, said teflon cookware has two distinct advantages — it permits the cooking of foods with or without shortening and easy cleanability. You just wash with hot water and detergent suds.

But there are some disadvantages. The coating is easily scratched with spoons, knives, forks, or turners. The coating may discolor with use but this does not affect performance. And teflon is quite expensive. It is approximately twice as expensive as a comparable quality of regular cookware.

Wash teflon-coated utensils thoroughly with a sudsy cloth in hot water, Miss Smith said. If not thoroughly washed, a residue may accumulate and cause food to stick. Dark stains may appear after use but will not affect the performance of the pan.

One manufacturer has suggested this formula for removal of stains and any food residue: one cup water, two tablespoons baking soda, one-half cup liquid household bleach. Boil five

washed in the dishwasher but the uncoated metal may become dull or dark from the water and detergent action.

Never scour the coated surface with any type abrasive such as steel wool, metal scouring pads or cleaners because they will remove the easy-clean finish, cautioned Miss Smith. Teflon-coated utensils may be

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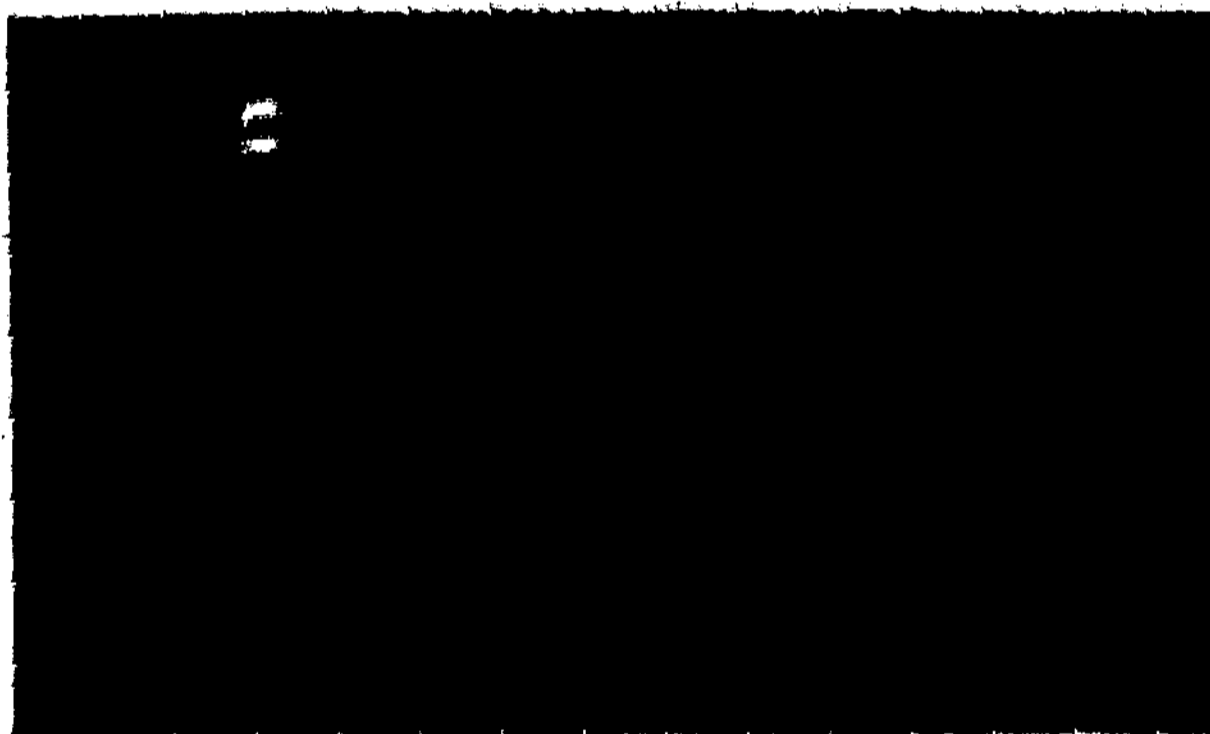

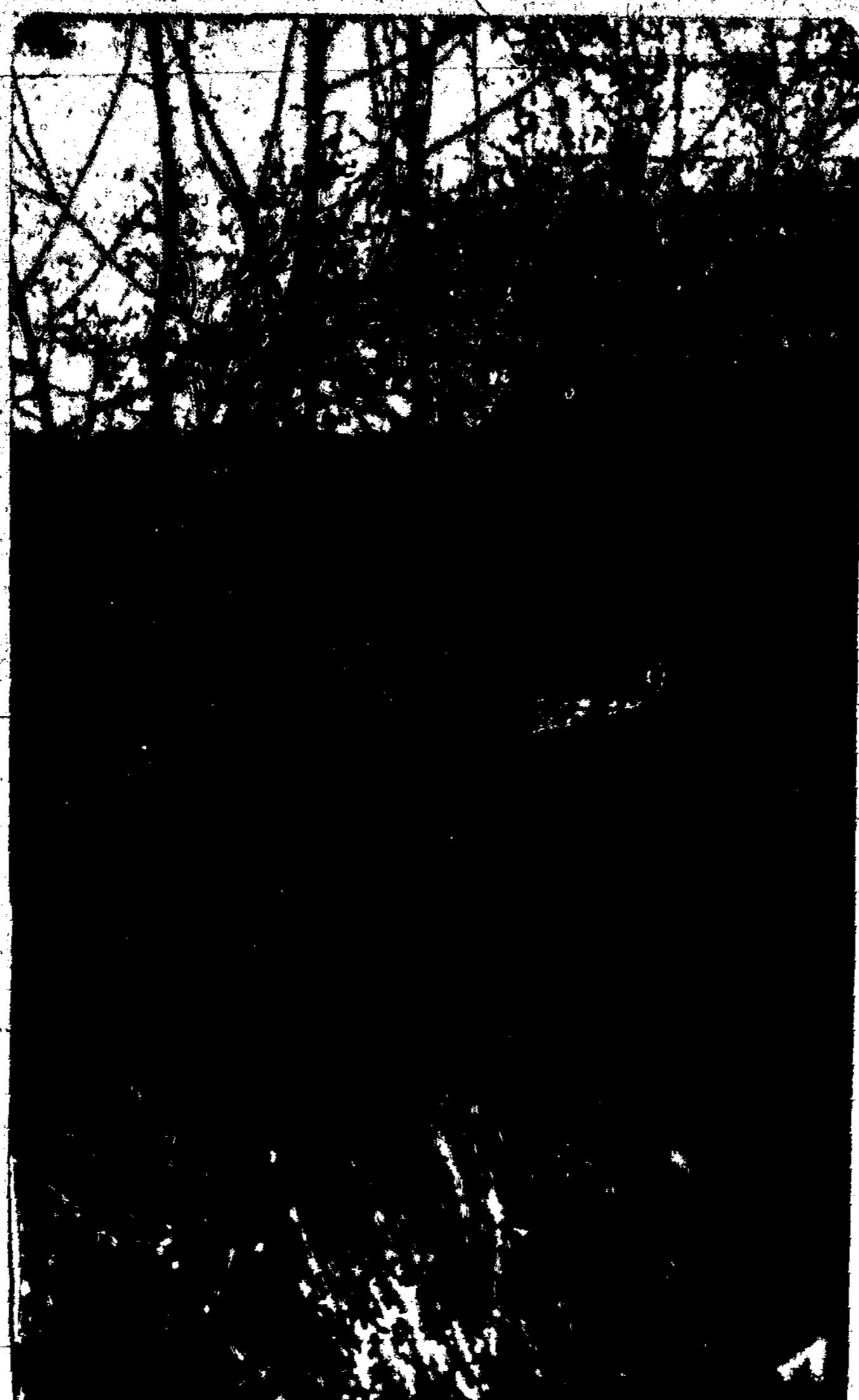

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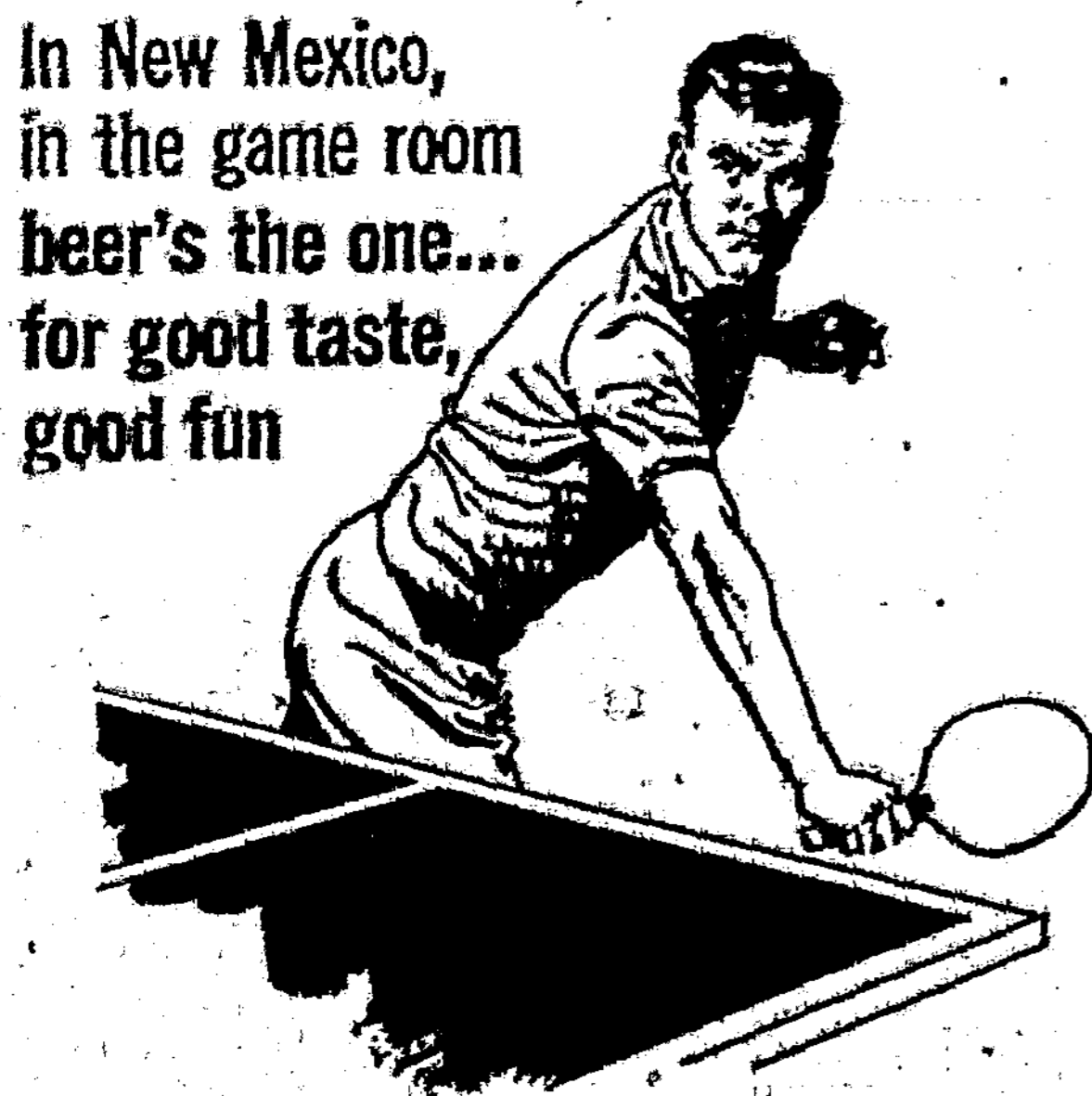

"A page for independent thought"

"B" grades in dancing

The only man we have known who never learned what to do with his feet on the dance floor was a long, drawnout hunk of Kansas youth named Wallace Olds. Other people would enjoy jumping up and down, to the side, a kick and a shuffle as something quite fun with a partner, but not Olds. Fact is, he didn't even intermission very well.

The other partner in the News during Olds' time was a guy who made "B" grades in dancing in college, this on a transcript not overly flush with "B" and "A" grades, including none for intermission.

Most any athlete should make good grades in dancing, but apparently not all scholars can make good grades in physical education. This situation is bothering the parents of brainy youngsters because they do

straight "A" work all the way, then miss the "A" honor roll because in PE they fall flat on their face.

Once knew a good singer and guitar player who couldn't add two and two, or make a complete sentence using simple words like cat, sand, and box.

The question in the minds of parents is this — should their youngsters be penalized because they are long on brains and short on brawn. We'd say "No"; do not penalize them, but don't exclude them from physical education either. They should at least learn to intermission.

The fault in American education, if there be fault in such a noble institution, has its foundation in the premise that all students be cast in the same mold. This is especially bad for those wearing a size "8" hat and "14" shoe — the mold won't fit.

Can there be rural renewal

Every time we write about the workings of Fort Stanton TB Hospital, or read about the current consolidation of veterans hospitals — we wind up thinking the same thoughts. Is it necessary that all medical facilities of the nation be centralized, mostly around medical schools?

Right now veterans people are building new hospitals and phasing out the old ones, in spite of a strong fight Ft. Bayard appears on the way out. There has been talk, and it will probably happen some day, that tuberculosis patients will be moved from Fort Stanton to Albuquerque.

If school consolidation went the full route of the recommended plan, a lot of ranchers would have to move their families to town for their youngsters to attend school. Is this necessary?

Here at home a trip to the dentist kills a day. Shoe repair, watch repair, and many other services mean a trip out of town. If your livestock or pet gets sick, it's a call out of town. Is it necessary that all such services be centered only in the metropolitan areas?

We know a whole flock of the answers, the whys and wherefores, which we'll save because — we do not know the one important answer. What gets rural people (that's us) in

a frame of mind to do something about their situation? We have no answer.

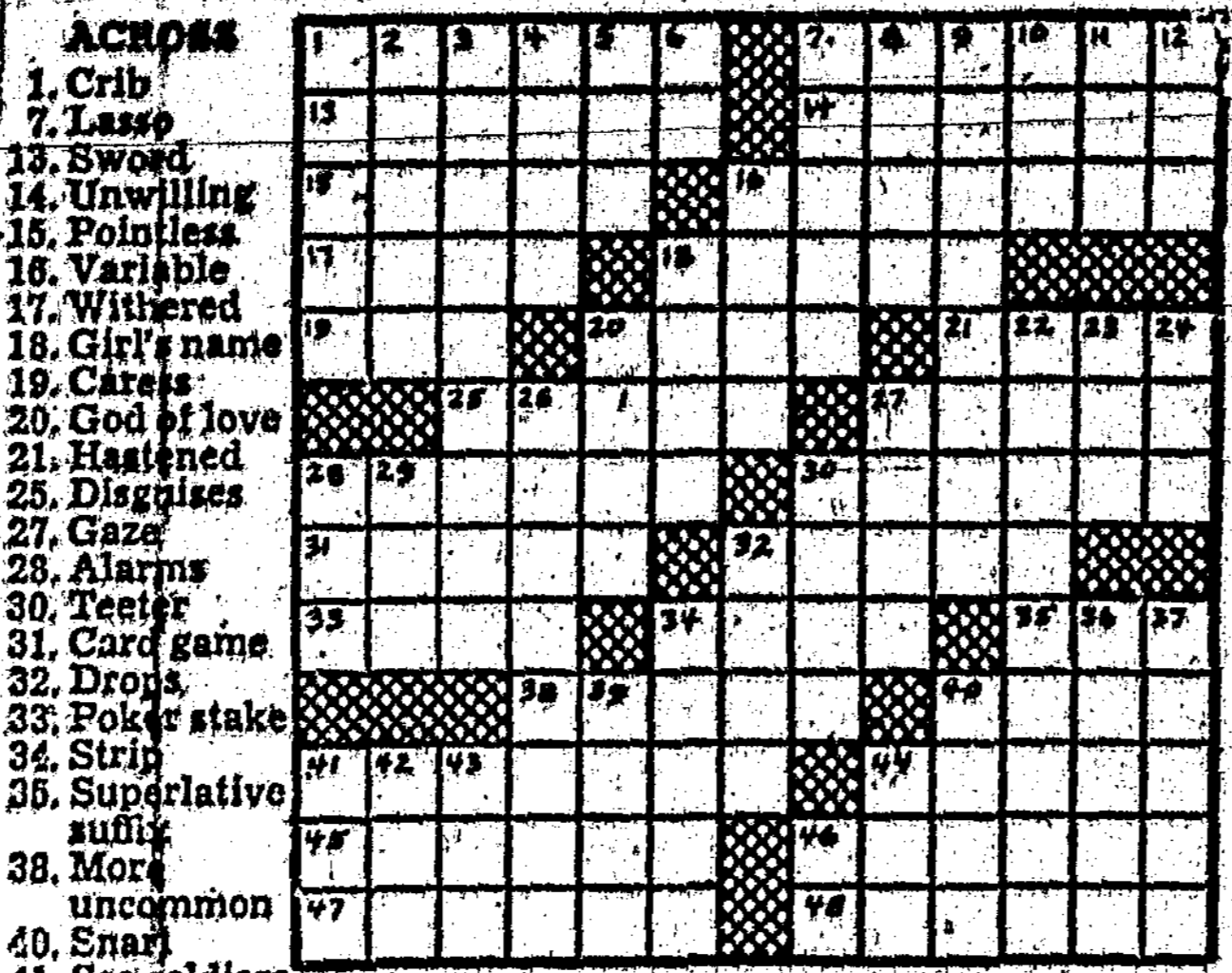
Right now Carrizozo and Lincoln County are in the same predicament as when Bonito Lake was sold down the road. We have opportunities on all sides, with no gathering of minds for action or even ears to hear opportunity knock.

A recent article in the News told about the village blacksmith departing forever, soon to be followed by the village (that's us again). What this article did not say was that local people, by a large vote, signified their desire that such be the case, that no money be spent, no works be started, no progress made — and their desires are being carried out to the plinched penny.

Can there be a rural renewal? We may see government action designed to help the rural community (like us) but if people at home will not help themselves — there is absolutely nothing government can do that will help. Several programs in the Department of Agriculture have, for years, been directed at rural renewal — nothing much has happened. If the only work done locally is to secure government money, again our rural community will be the loser in the long run.

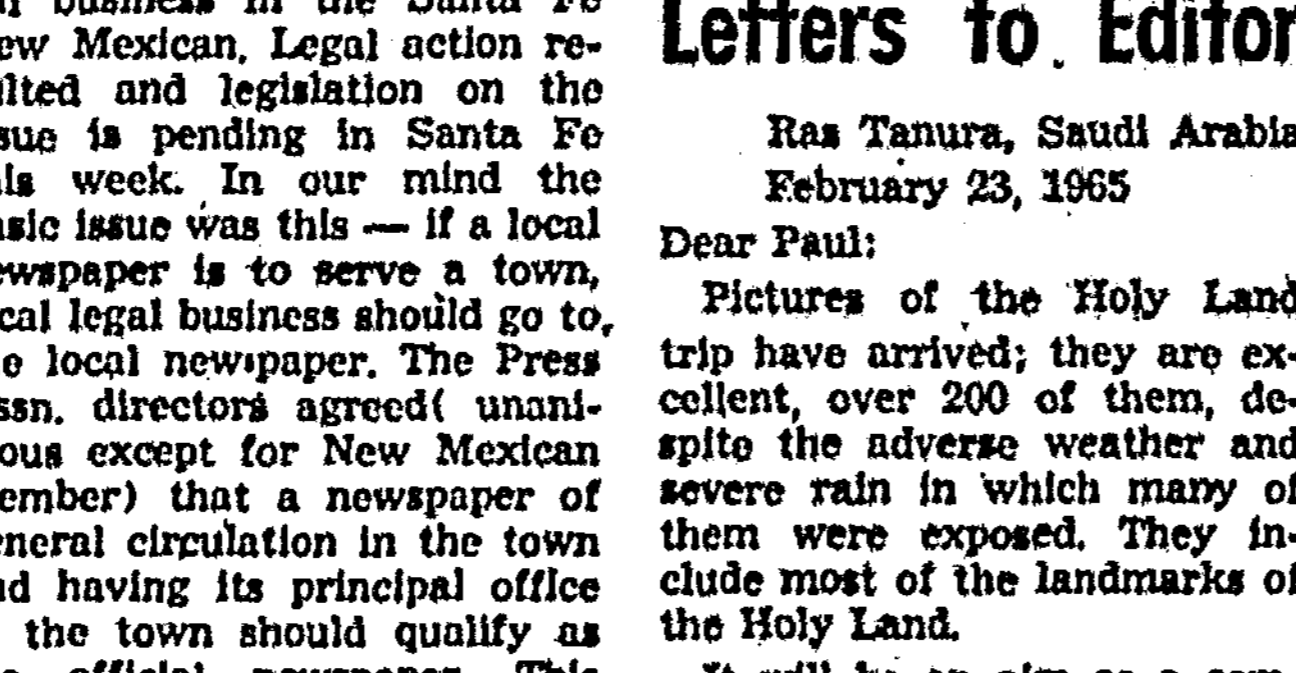

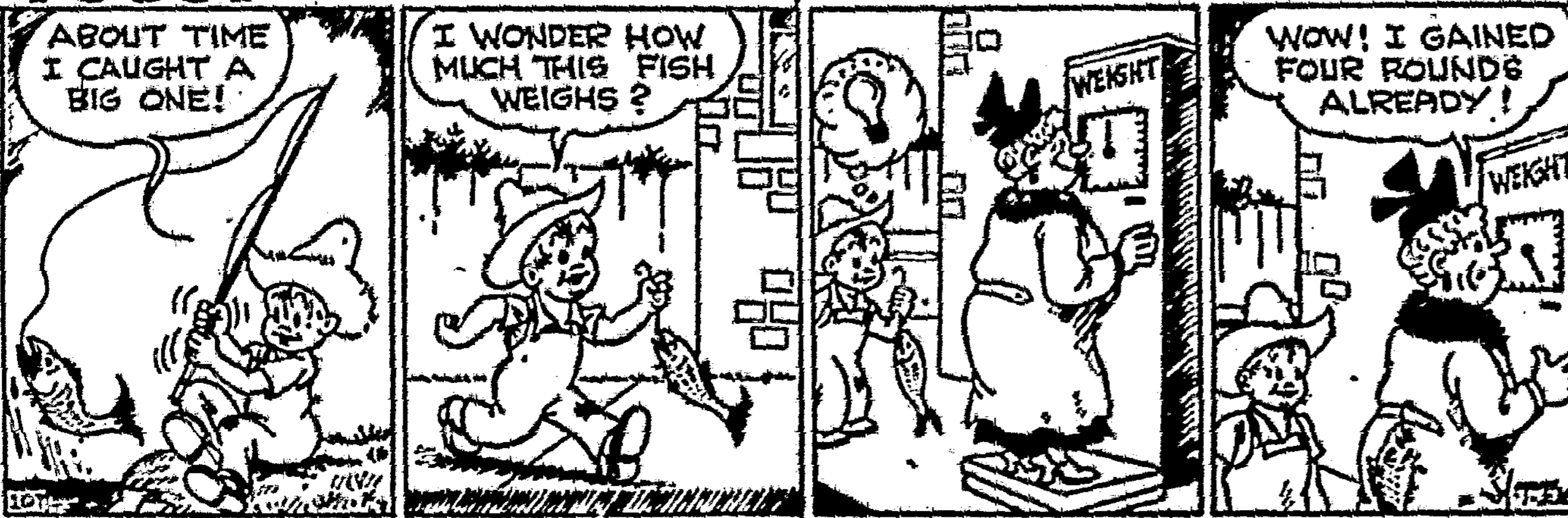
