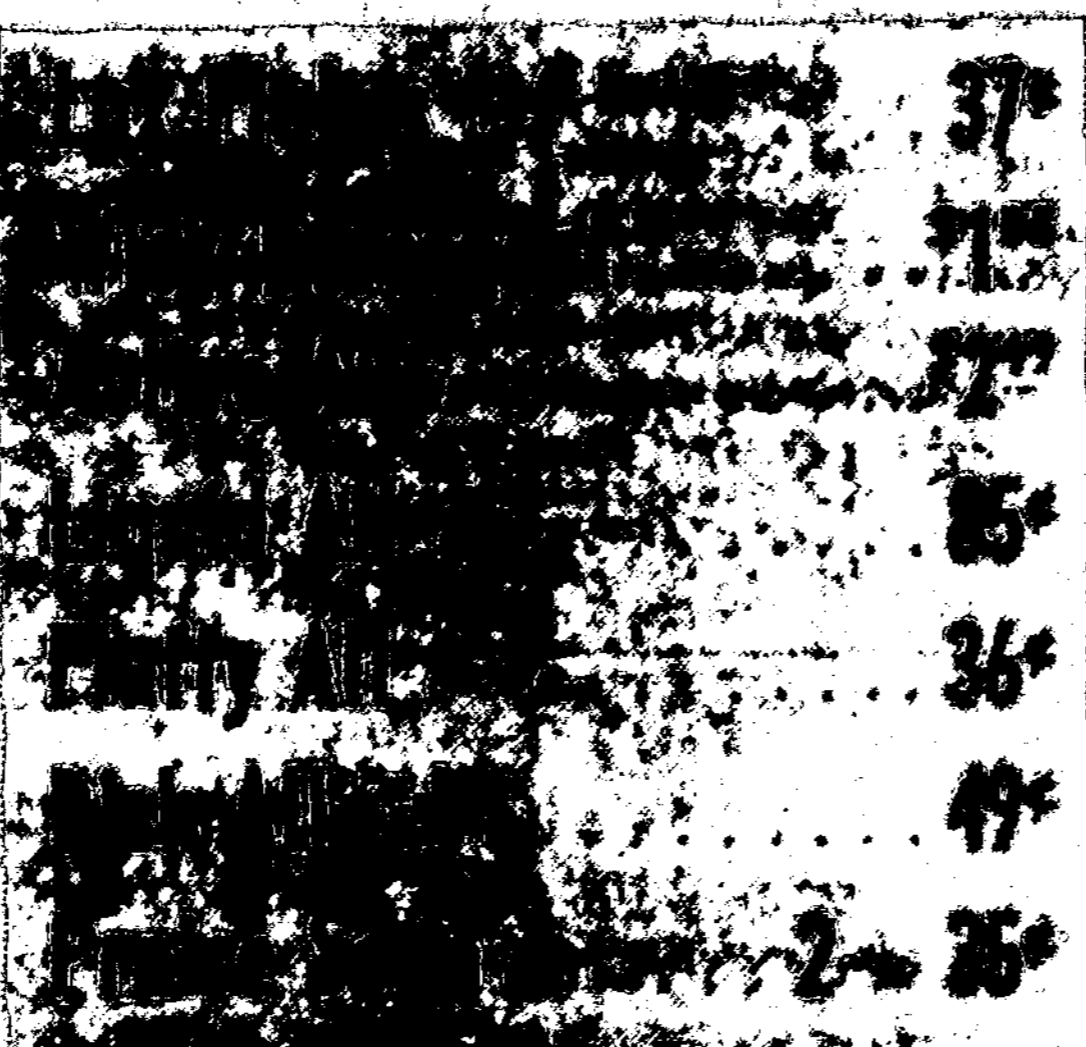

Carrie Tingley Crippled Children's Hospital seeks aid through Foundation

Mr. Ed L. Harbaugh, President of the Carrie Tingley Hospital Foundation Incorporated, announced today that the Foundation has just completed distribution of informational brochures regarding the Foundation to all attorneys, banks, and accountants in the state.

The purpose of the brochure, Mr. Harbaugh stated, was to provide basic information on the Foundation to these groups which frequently contact persons wishing to aid crippled children's work through bequests or annual contributions. Mr. Harbaugh stated that the information distributed also included descriptions of the proper forms of legacy for inclusion in Wills.

The purpose of the Carrie Tingley Hospital Foundation is to create, maintain and administer a fund for the benefit of Carrie Tingley Hospital for Crippled Children, a state institution located at Truth or Consequences, New Mexico. Mr. Harbaugh stated, Funds received by the Foundation may be used for such purposes as improving or extending the hospital buildings, providing special diagnostic or treatment equipment, promoting medical education and research, or otherwise promoting the general growth, welfare and maintenance of the hospital in order to provide the best possible medical care for crippled children in New Mexico. Mr. Harbaugh noted that the Foundation can only receive gifts and bequests made specially to it. Contributions, if made to the Carrie Tingley Hospital, instead of the Foundation, must be deposited with the hospital operating funds and are thus not subject to the long-term advantages of the Foundation funds.

The Foundation was created in September, 1963 and includes a seven-man board of trustees. Five of these trustees include the five members of the hospital board of directors and two additional members are chosen by the hospital board, Harbaugh stated.

Labor influence no help to education

This is the year when teachers acting under the auspices of an organization affiliated with the AFL-CIO, in New Mexico are seeking to unionize the profession. The main weapon of such a federation, seeking betterment of education and of teachers, would be the strike.

There are two basic reasons why we think teachers unions are not workable or useful in seeking the main goal — better education.

First, after all, the flim-flam is eliminated from the argument a union will strike for only one reason — more money, and right now education is taking as much out of state and local budgets as current conditions can stand. Second, a strike might be aimed directly at

a school board, but not so indirectly a teacher strike would be aimed at all the school patrons in the district. It does not seem desirable that school patrons should have to struggle with organized labor forces.

Better pay for better teachers is certainly one of the factors of a better education for our children. But, labor unions have shown little sign of doing a better job for more money. Good teachers have use, for money, same as other people, but good teachers are doing outstanding work because they believe in their work, not for the sake of money.

Labor union influence in the teaching profession will do more harm than good, much more harm to teacher, student, and parent.

How about our undergrads

What's good for the University of New Mexico ought to be good for the undergraduate whether he goes to college, back to the ranch, or stays at home to work.

Harold L. Enarson, Academic Vice President, the University of New Mexico, writes "The man or woman who experiences daily association with good architecture, sculpture, landscaping and consciously ordered environmental design must inevitably carry these associations into later life.

Carrizozo does not offer a big lot of sculpture and only a modest amount of landscaping but if ordered environmental design is important as Enarson says, the least the home town can do for its undergraduate is to eliminate the junk from his surroundings.

How about a 5-day plan, and a 5-week plan, and a 5-month plan, and a 5-year plan of work for the only county seat in the most famous county in New Mexico?

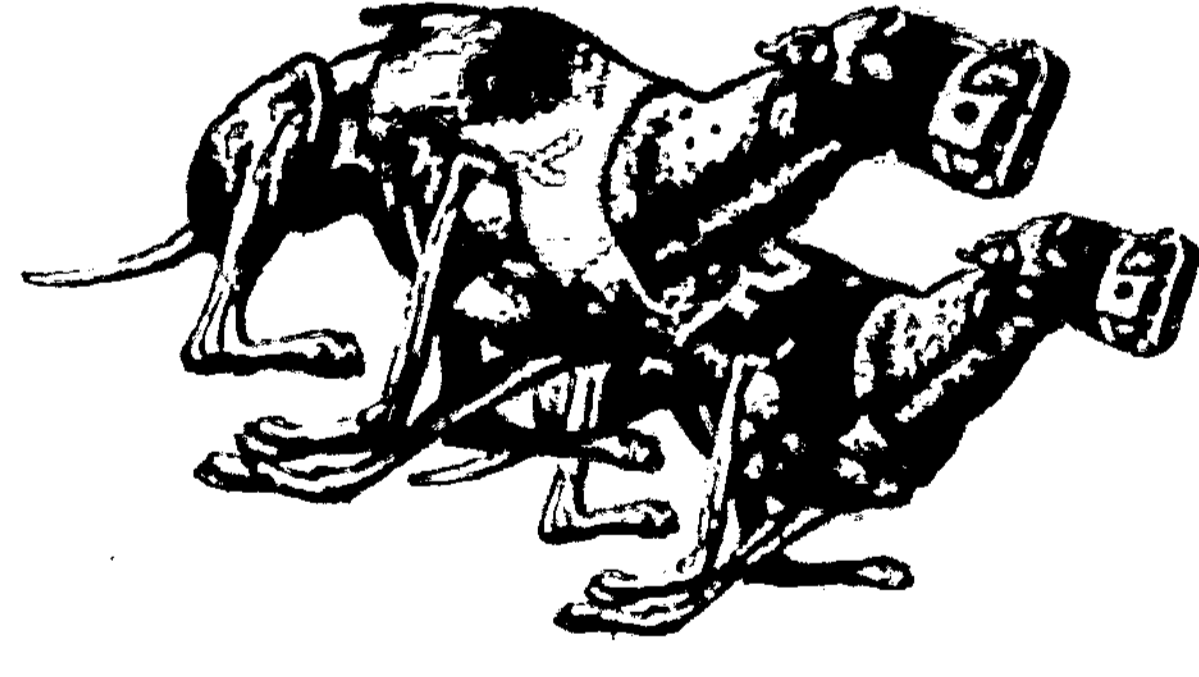

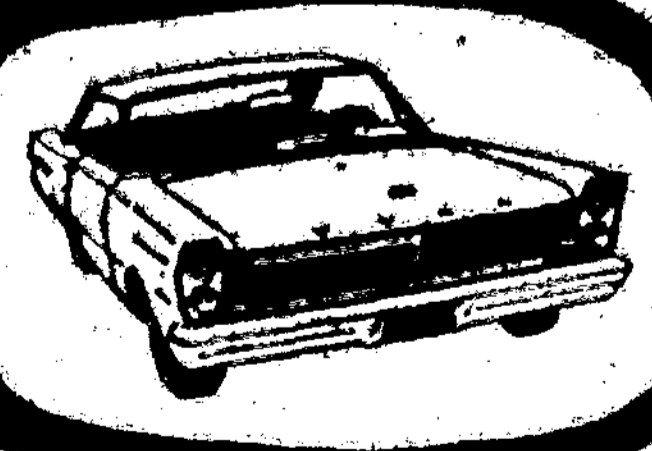

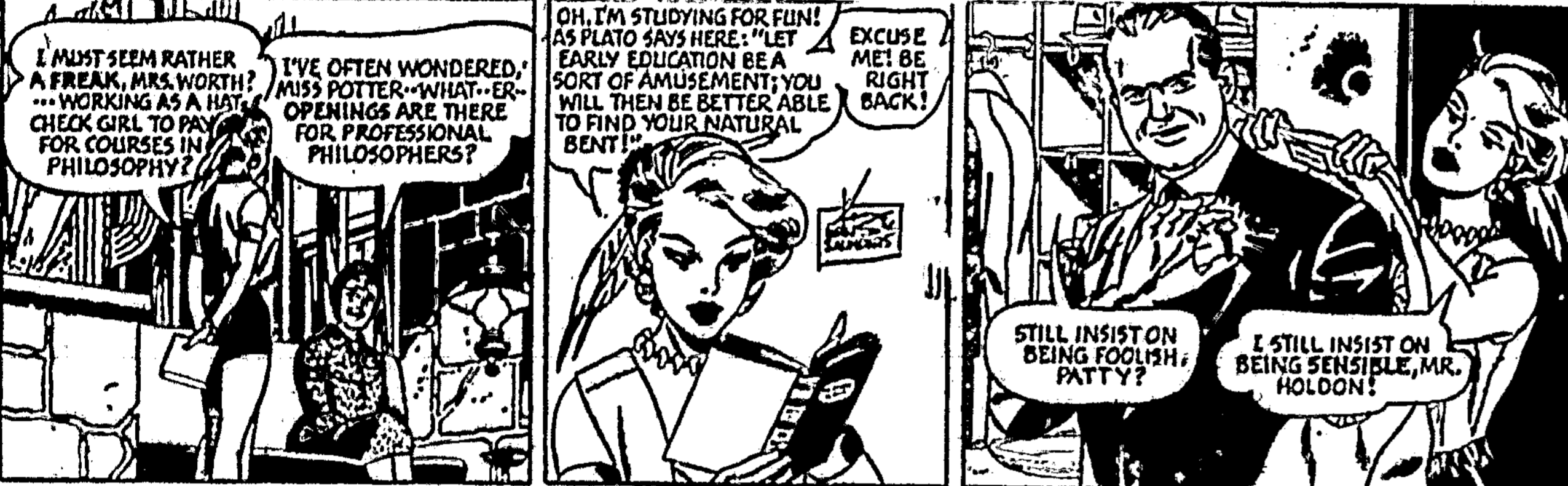
