

What with many details of finishing a new court house and getting ready for its dedication, business of starting a new year, such as equalization, road work in all parts of the county, lots of people with business they feel is important . . Lincoln County Commissioners Max Oll. ver. Joe McKnight and Bob Shafer have been fully occupied since taking office in January. They have met many times with architects and contractors about the courthouse, every day day in the week, some weeks.

At their regular meeting Tuesday the day was full. Holt Lovelace of Corona and Gerald Dean of Capitan were appointed as school budget commissioners to meet with county school boards when they have budget hearings.

Minutes of previous meeting were read and approved.

First visitors heard were Jim Hine, village clerk, and Don Hart, public utility director of the Village of Ruidoso, with several pieces of business. They thanked the commissioners for securing a county sanitarian (actually the old board did this) and saked that this arrangement be continued. The state pays half, Village of Ruldoso and county each a quarter of the cost and the sanitarian serves the entire county. The commissioners agreed to go ahead, The Village of Ruldoso wants help with Paradise Canyon Road, two pieces of culvert needed and the use of one piece of county equipment. Both of these items will be supplied when needed and available.

Mrs. W. G. Shrecengost and Mrs. A. N. Spencer were present to talk over plans for the courthouse dedication, date has been set as May 8. Planning for this occasion will be non-partisan, all county organizations, political civic and otherwise. will be invited to John in the celebration Gev. Jack Campbell will be invited as well as other government officials,

If it can be worked out, representatives of all areas of the officinal Lincoln County at one time the largest county in the United States encompassing most of southeast New Mexico. will be asked to participate in the program.

Other program features are expected to include a free burbeque, old fiddlers contest, band music. Honde high school dancers. Members of the board of commissioners will be contacting people and organizations asking them to join in the dedlcation program.

Congressional district bill headed for file x

DISTRICT MEASURE IMPERILS WALKER

SANTA FE - The congressional districting bill passed by the house of representatives this week is dangerous to U.S. Rep. Johnny Walker and will probably be killed in the senate.

The measure divides the state into two districts for the election of congressmen with Walker's district consisting of Santa Fe, his home county, Bernalillo, San Juan, Rio Arriba, Taos, Colfax, Union, Sandoyal, Los Alamos, Mora and San Miguel

Walker lost the 11 countles by a count of 20,600 to 29,800 to Fabian Chavez of Santa Fe when they squared off in the Democratic primary last year.

WOULD TRY AGAIN IF BILL PASSES

Chavez would almost certainly take on Walker again if the district bill should become law.

Chavez, former Demo leoder of the senate, still has some friends in the chamber but not likely enough to get the districting bill approved.

U. S. Rep. Tom Morris of Quay county is a resident of the second proposed district -Quay, Socorro, Valencia, Mc-Kinley, Torrance, DeBaca, Curry, Roosevelt, Lincoln, Chavez, Grant, Slerra, Lea, Otero, Dona Ann, Luna, Hidalgo, Catron, Harding and Guadalupe.

DAVID CARGO LEADS FIGHT

Only New Mexico and Hawaii elect two U. B. representatives at large and a dozen proposals to establish congressional districts here have been defeated in the past 25 years, most of them hardly receiving serious attention

This week's house action was doubly surprising in that the bill was sponsored by Republican David Cargo of Albuquerque and opposed by the Democratic leaders of the house, It passed 42 to 29.

Top level Demos were also against the bill. Sen. Clint Anderson said recently that districting should wait until after the 1970 cangus when New Mass. ico may get a third representative.

LEGISLAYORS AFTER EASSETT'S ABENCY

The Legislative Finance Committee which operated the year around is beeding a drive to abolish the resoline tax division of the Bureau of Revenue which operates with a staff of 40 headed by Charlie Bassett, an old timey Democratic Polltician and a pretty good hand on gasoline tax meters. Bassett who recently colebra-

ted his 50th wedding anniversary was a Torrance county Demcratic chairman back in the 1930s and is the father of former Secretary of State Beatrice Roach Gottlieb, He has been working for the state for most all the past 25, years.

CAMPERLY BACKS AGENCY SHIFT

The movement for the abolishment of the gasoline tax division, which has the backing of Goy. Jack Campbell, would put the field work with the state weights and measures division which operates out of New Mexico State University in Las Cruces, and would place the tax collection with the Oil and Gas Accounting Commission in Santa Fe.

Many Democrats in the leg-Mature are reluctant to vota Bessett out of a Job.

LEGIELATURE IN A HURRY

Rep. Ysldro Romero of Guadalupe has gained much respect and popularity since he shook off his association with the liquor lobby . . Demo Reps. Mike Frietz and Bobby, Mayfield of Dona Ana are often on opposite sides of the rollcall. Frietz was on the other side when Mayfield led a successful fight against a committee report that would have killed a . bill to give local governing bodles the right to veto over the transfer of liquor license locations . . Only Rep. Allen Thompson of Harding among the 18 house Republicans, voted against the congressional districting bill State Auditor Alex Armijo has agreedfully with the legislature's proposal to abolish his office by cutting the pay to a dollar a year after his term is completed at the end of 1968. As the bill is drawn Armilo would be eligible for the

SANTA TE - State Address asked for \$6,500 a year more pay and are settling for \$1,500 which will probably be the pattern for state elective officials who have bills in taking for raises of around \$5,000 a year.

Included among those standing in line for more money are Atty, Gen. Boston Witt and Land Commissioner Sheepherder Hays who just took office in January and knew what the pay was when they entered the races last year.

The law prohibits reducing the pay of an elective official during the term for which he was elected but there is no bar to increasing the salary.

The purpose of the Carrie Tingley Hospital Foundation is to create, maintain and administer a fund for the benefit of Carrie Tingley Hospital for Crippled Children, a state institution located at Truth or Consequences, New Mexico, Mr. Harbaugh stated. Funds received by the Foundation may be used for such purposes as improving or extending the hospital buildings, providing special diagnostic or - treatment equipment, promoting medical education and research, or otherwise promoting the general growth, welfare and maintenance of the hospital in order to provide the best possible medical care for crippled children in New Mexico. Mr. Harbaugh noted that the Foundation can only receive gifts and bequests made specially to it, Contributions, if made to the Carrie Tingley Hospital, instead of the Foundation, must be deposited with the hospital operating funds and are thus not subject to the long-term advantages of the Foundation funds.

The Foundation was created in September, 1963 and includes a seven-man board of trustees. Five of these trustees include the five members of the hospital board of directors and two additional members are chosen by the hospital board, Harbaugh stated.



Labor influence no help to education

This is the year when teachers acting under the auspices of an organization affiliated with the AFL-CIO, in New Mexico are seeking to unionize the profession. The main weapon of such a federation, seeking betterment of education and of teachers, would be the strike.

There are two basic reasons why we think teachers unions are not workable or useful in seeking the main goal — better education.

First, after all, the flim-flam is eliminated from the argument a union will strike for only one reason . . . more money, and right now education is taking as much out of state and local budgets as current conditions can stand. Second, a strike might be aimed directly at

a school board, but not so inindirectly a teacher strike would be aimed at all the school patrons in the district. It does not seem desirable that school patrons should have to struggle with organized labor forces.

Better pay for better teachers is certainly one of the factors of a better education for our children. But, labor unions have shown little sign of doing a better job for more money. Good teachers have use, for money, same as other people, but good teachers are doing outstanding work because they believe in their work, not for the sake of

Labor union influence in the teaching profession will do more harm than good, much more harm to teacher, student, and

What's good for the University of New Mexico ought to be good for the undergraduate whether he goes to college, back to the ranch, or stays at home to work
