Womans Club goes to bat for industrial development

One of the largest turnouts of people interested in progress for Carrizozo attended the town council meeting Tuesday night. The spark behind the turnout was the Carrizozo Womans Club which has been working diligently on their project "Industry for Carrizozo."

The first speaker for the club was Eleanor Payton who told the group of the club project, that an up-to-date industrial survey had been completed after much help from a number of people. Johnson Stearns spoke in favor of the Woman's Club project.

Ruth Armstrong, president of the club, was the next speaker. She stated that it was the desire of the Womans Club that the council assist in getting an industrial corporation formed. Mrs. Armstrong said that no club or civic organization could act in such a matter and that people seeking to locate industry here would want to do business with a corporate body, such as the town or an industrial corporation.

Glen Ellison, speaking for the school, said it sounds real good, could increase enrollment at school. Fred English said the C of C discussed industrial development and always ran into the same stumbling block — money. Getting industry to relocate or locate here is very competitive. The town is the only group having any money, and should set up an Economic Development Commission and give it authority enough to do some good.

Mrs. Armstrong stated that municipal money is ours to be spent for the benefit of our community. Mayor Petty asked, what money is available in our budget. English answered, we'd have to get busy and dig some up.

At this point Mayor Petty told the group, "If you haven't already got the idea that I am pessimistic and opposed to this action, it isn't because I haven't tried to get that point across."

Talking about 10 minutes, the mayor suggested that other groups in town such as the C of C, Rotary, or Lions take over the formation of the development corporation.

Mrs. Armstrong asked, what do others think, the Womans Club does not think it should form a corporation.

Buster Smoot commented, I'd like to see the town cooperate in forming an industrial corporation. Let the club select commission members, we should try to help.

Welcolm Armstrong said that a corporation could not be sponsored by such as a club.

Ray Wells said the Chamber of Commerce carries weight, if we set this up the C of C name should be used.

Buster Smoot got in another word — the Womans Club has been the "driver" in this town

as long as I've lived here.

Veda Lou Stephenson said such a corporation would necessitate a secretary, making contacts, looking into leads, day in and day out.

Eleanor Payton asked, why can't it be done, The Womans Club wants a corporation formed.

Mayor Petty stated, I will appoint an Industrial Development Commission and they can form a corporation if they want to.

Jackie Spencer got in a few words, "you've been asked to appoint one — go ahead."

Mrs. Armstrong asked the mayor to set specific date for names to be submitted.

J. T. Clegg told of several good things that have happened as a result of the new school building and equipment, the school is losing a little on average daily attendance money but gaining recognition and money because of quality education at the Zozo school. Mr. Clegg said the new building forms were made at Lovington, and said he was very optimistic about the immediate future of this area.

As a result of this discussion April 19 was set as the date for the next meeting with the town council. A 12-member commission will be appointed. The school, council, Rotary and Lions Clubs, C of C and Womans Club will each submit names of one member, the council will nominate the other six members. Motion made by Ruth Armstrong and seconded by Bernice Laabs that this action be taken.

Carrizozo gets new radio tower

A 70-foot radio tower was installed on the roof of the Sheriff's office last week and is providing better reception and longer range (Ruidoso, Roswell, Socorro and Alamogordo), to the sheriff and his crew.

The money to purchase this new tower came entirely from contributions, Sheriff Leandro Vega, Jr., disclosed this week. Cost of the tower was in the vicinity of \$335 (wholesale) and was bought by Till Thompson who operates a mobile radio service in Ruidoso. Mr. Thompson supervised the installation, and with the help of the sheriff and his crew and some help from the local State Police, the job was completed in a very short time and without cost.

Six records set in Grizzly Relays Saturday

Most of the records in the books on the Carrizozo Grizzly Relays date from 1962 but the year 1965 saw six new figures go in the book and one record tie.

Relay Gay, April 3, was a good breed of weather for Spring in New Mexico. Rather moderate wind and not too cold with 100 or more athletes from eight towns here for the event.

Teddy Graham, a senior from T or C who scored 24 points, was the outstanding athlete on the field. Graham set three records, 50.6 one-eighths in the shot put over the old record of 46.7; 175.4 in the javelin over 174.75, and 142 in the discus over 141.1. He also took third place in the pole vault. Graham expects to attend the University of New Mexico next year.

Eloy Sanchez of Estancia was outstanding, winning the two-mile run, almost lapping the field as he did the eight laps in 11:08.2. Ray Baca of Carrizozo came up from deep fourth place to score second in this race.

Ben Martin of Estancia tied the record in the high jump at 5'11. John Ramirez of T or C set the 120 yard high hurdles in 15.3 to log a second off the old record and in the 120 yard low hurdles in 20.8 (qualifying time).

BLM Constructs

Recreation Area

By June 1, families in southern New Mexico will be able to enjoy outings at a new recreation area, five miles east of Three Rivers. Major attractions at the site are hundreds of ancient Indian petroglyphs, or rock carvings.

J. W. Young, Las Cruces District Manager of the Bureau of Land Management announced today (April 2) that contractors are at work. He says they will construct three covered picnic units, sanitary facilities, protective fencing and parking areas. Total cost is approximately \$15,000.00.

"We have received good co-operation from Rancher Thomas F. Ryan, III, who holds the federal grazing allotment surrounding the site," says Mr. Young. "Our purpose is to provide a needed recreation area and to preserve and protect the petroglyphs," he added.

Welcome N. M. E. A.

Howdy teachers . . . glad you're here!
Of the three ways a young person can go: to success, mediocrity or oblivion — you have about as much to do as any group of individuals in providing help and guidance along the way.
In so many ways the work you do provides needed push, that even on the bad days all of us have, you ought to be able to say to yourself, "This task is worthwhile."
And when you are making your task worthwhile we know that most of the people in your

communities will say (though not often enough), "We're glad you are here."
Carrizozo is exceptionally proud to have you visit our town, see our new school plant, view our new parks just now greening up, maybe take a quick tour of the new courthouse to be dedicated May 8, and fully enjoy riding on paved streets as you journey around town.
We're proud of our town, we're proud of our teachers and the progress being made in our school system.
Hope you come back often.

How'd we ever make it?

Reading about a high school youth at Santa Rosa being arrested for throwing eggs at public buildings and moving vehicles sure makes us wonder how a generation or three ahead of him kept out of trouble.
Gee, our thoughts head down memory lane in a hurry. There was the gang that had themselves a special hideout in a barn only a quarter mile from a favorite swimming pond. They would undress in the barn and run naked to the pond down a path bordering a country road.
One time the whim caught this gang to bombard a passing car with milkweed pods, and so they did. Of course the motorists, probably driving 20 MPH were unhappy and reported the matter to some dads in town — but no action like arresting the kids was taken. Could be the dads talked them out of it.
One Halloween a certain carload of boys and girls drove into town from raiding a watermelon patch, loaded for trouble. The main street was full of Halloweeners of all ages. What the carload of kids did was to break the melons and pelt the crowd with the slurry pieces, then hurry out of town before the marshall caught them.
Setting of dynamite on the Fourth of July was a common stunt, with more than one member of that generation being called "short fingers" as the result. But it was nothing big, just a big bang to go along with the 5-6-7-8 inch fire crackers popping all over the place.
In those days the high school laddies could have a bloody gang fight without interruption or being called hoodlums. They did on numerous occasions. It

would happen up near the water tower when the freshmen and soph classes came up to decorate the tower with their class colors. The juniors and seniors would be waiting for them, with scissors, for hair cutting and old clothes for the fracas. It would start friendly enough but then some of the big tough boys and a few tough town boys would resent having their hair cut and the juniors and seniors would have their hands full.
Taking apart a farm wagon and reassembling it on top of the filling station was a pretty good chore, one that had to be done about dawn when the local law was lured off to another section of town. But this was not the biggest deal that ever happened. Probably the one that required the most planning was to tie a hay rack on back of a car, load a jon on the rack, then check with the lookout down town in front of the main hotel. At just the right moment the rack came down the street, up beside the high curb at the hotel, the jon was set on the sidewalk, while Col. Burnett, the hotel manager, yelled bloody murder. It took only seconds and the pranksters were out of town. Of course all the names went to school the next morning and it would take a half-day to put things back to right.
Things are not like that any more. Some people would quickly say — "It's just as well," but the many good things that happened to those generations seemed to carry them through to manhood with the term juvenile delinquency never being used.
These are good days, today . . . but they are different in so many ways.

Probably an editor should be concerned that the entire town has plenty of water for a Saturday night bath and teeth brushing on other days, but right now we want to satisfy our curiosity. Can an eight-foot tree be lifted out of the ground, transplanted, and made to take root again and grow?

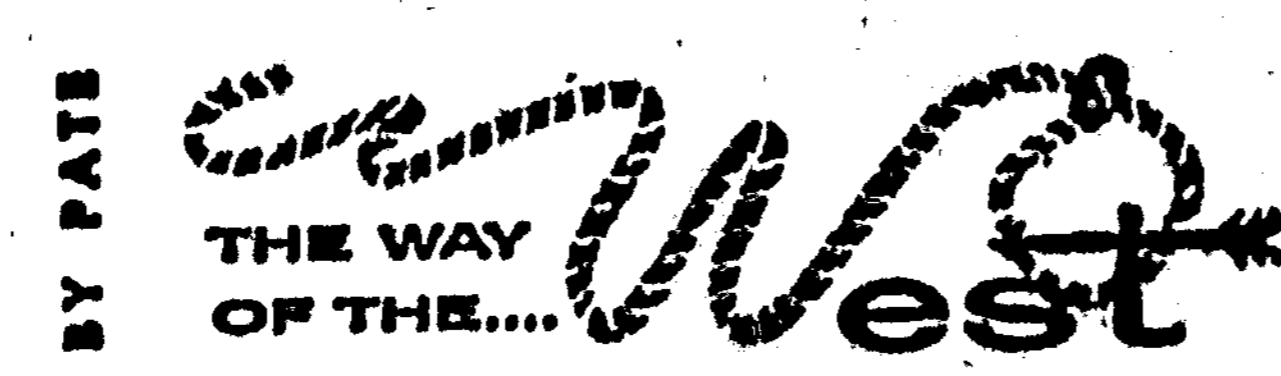
