Combined choir will sing at Easter sunrise service in First Baptist Church

There will be a community sunrise service at the First Baptist Church at 6:30 Easter Sunday morning. Leading the worship service will be Rev. Conrad Nugent of Trinity Methodist Church, Rev. James Wells pastor of the Assembly of God Church, and Rev. Milford Misener of the First Baptist Church. A combined choir will sing two special numbers, "He lives" and "Were you there."

On Saturday evening at 8 o'clock, the Easter Vigil service will take place by candle light at the church in Lincoln. The ceremonies will open with the kindling of a new fire from flint, symbolic of Christ rising from the rocky tomb to give light, cheer and warmth in the darkness of the world. Weather permitting, this will take place in the church yard, with informal hymn-singing. The Paschal Candle will be lighted from the new fire, and a joyful chant heralds the coming of the day of Resurrection; the candle of the people take their light from the Paschal Candle, which symbolize Christ. Next the men of the church will read four Old Testament passages foreshadowing the Resurrection of Christ. These will be followed by a litany, which leads up to the Gospel story of the discovery of the empty tomb, and the joyful meeting with the Risen Saviour in Easter Communion.

On Easter Sunday morning, the sunrise service conducted by the Ruidoso Ministerial Alliance will take place at 5:30 in the Church of the Holy Mount. There will also be a plain celebration of the Holy Communion at 7:00 a.m. St. Anne's Church at Glencoe will have its festival Easter Communion service at 9:00 a.m.

Young girl found after long search

The six-year-old daughter of Capt. and Mrs. John Bynum, Lisa, was the subject of an 11-hour search in the Bonito area Sunday. Lisa and her brothers were racing, the brothers ran off from her and Lisa wandered off the wrong direction when she headed back. Capt. Bynum and family live at Walker AFB. State Policeman Darrel Austin notified that was the first notification that the girl was missing. Austin contacted the State Police office in Carrizozo who notified Sheriff Leandro Vega, Jr. and his staff. The N. M. Mounted Patrol Troop 5, luckily was meeting in Carrizozo Sunday afternoon and they responded in less than an hour order an organized search was set up with around 200 people

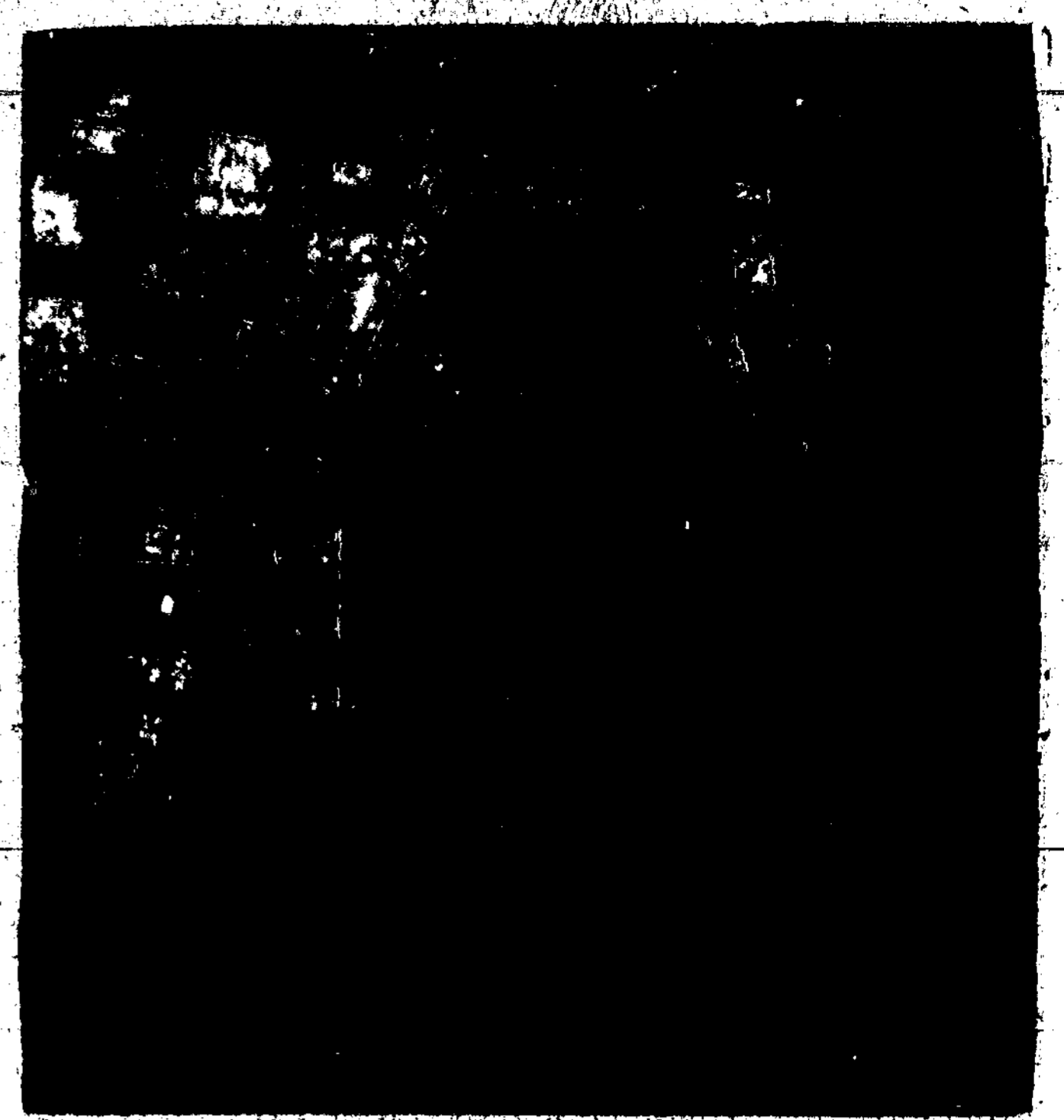
involved in the search. Holloman, White Sands, and Walker AFB were contacted about 5:00 p.m. and responded immediately. The Volunteer Fire Departments of Volant, Bonito and Capitan were there. A Rescue Team, headed by D. Jones of Roswell including 30 men came in with mobile walkie talkie radios. People from around Ruidoso, Alto, Angus and Bonito were on the job with food, coffee, making hot water available and helping every way in the search. In the afternoon airplanes were used but they were handicapped by the high wind. As darkness came on some reorganization of the search took place. Headquarters were set up at Mom Jean with Sheriff

Leandro Vega, Jr. and Col. Jim Snow helping guide the various parties. The Gateway Drug store in Ruidoso was very helpful by bringing all the flashlights they had and putting them in use in the search. Sgt. Veryl Cunningham and Chief Master Sgt. Veloz Wells, members of a search party headed by Marshal Ray Province of Capitan, were going up a mountain trail about five miles from the picnic area. One of the group happened to flash his light on Lisa who was asleep under a bush about 20 feet off the trail. One of the men shook her to awaken her and said "Lisa, I'm here to take you to your mother." She grabbed him around the neck and wouldn't let go until she got to mother.

Third Station of Via Dolorosa

A route and a time for deep thought

By the time we stepped into the early morning Jerusalem street, from an observation of the Ecco Homo, Station Two, Via Dolorosa, the traffic on the busy thoroughfare had increased to a bustling mixture of honking American-made cars and donkeys loaded with empty milk containers. Pedestrians also mixed with this peculiar traffic. The donkeys were being poked along down the street by traditional Moslem-clad dairymen, on the return trip to the countryside dairies. Practically all milk is delivered to the Jerusalem consumer by donkey transportation. Mixed with this strange traffic were many fresh vegetable

peddlers, with their produce lashed high on donkeys, all feverishly headed for the produce market just ahead, on the Way of the Cross. I looked forward to a busy intersection, which was King Solomon Street, Stephen's Gate and Jericho Road lay just behind. I was traveling the Way of the Cross, the same course over which Jesus passed with the cross, after he had been condemned to crucifixion by Pilate at the Ecco Homo grounds. This was a route and a time for deep thought. "It is reported only by St. John that Christ bore his own cross before that task was pressed upon Simon, the Cyrenian." However, most religious historians believe that He did attempt to travel the course to Golgotha with the cross, but was physically unable to do so. From this conclusion the Third Station of Via Dolorosa, the Way of the Cross, has been set aside as the location where it is thought Christ fell under the weight. Today the Armenian Catholic sanatory covers the site; and the facade, as shown in the photograph, faces the narrow street and daily busy traffic.

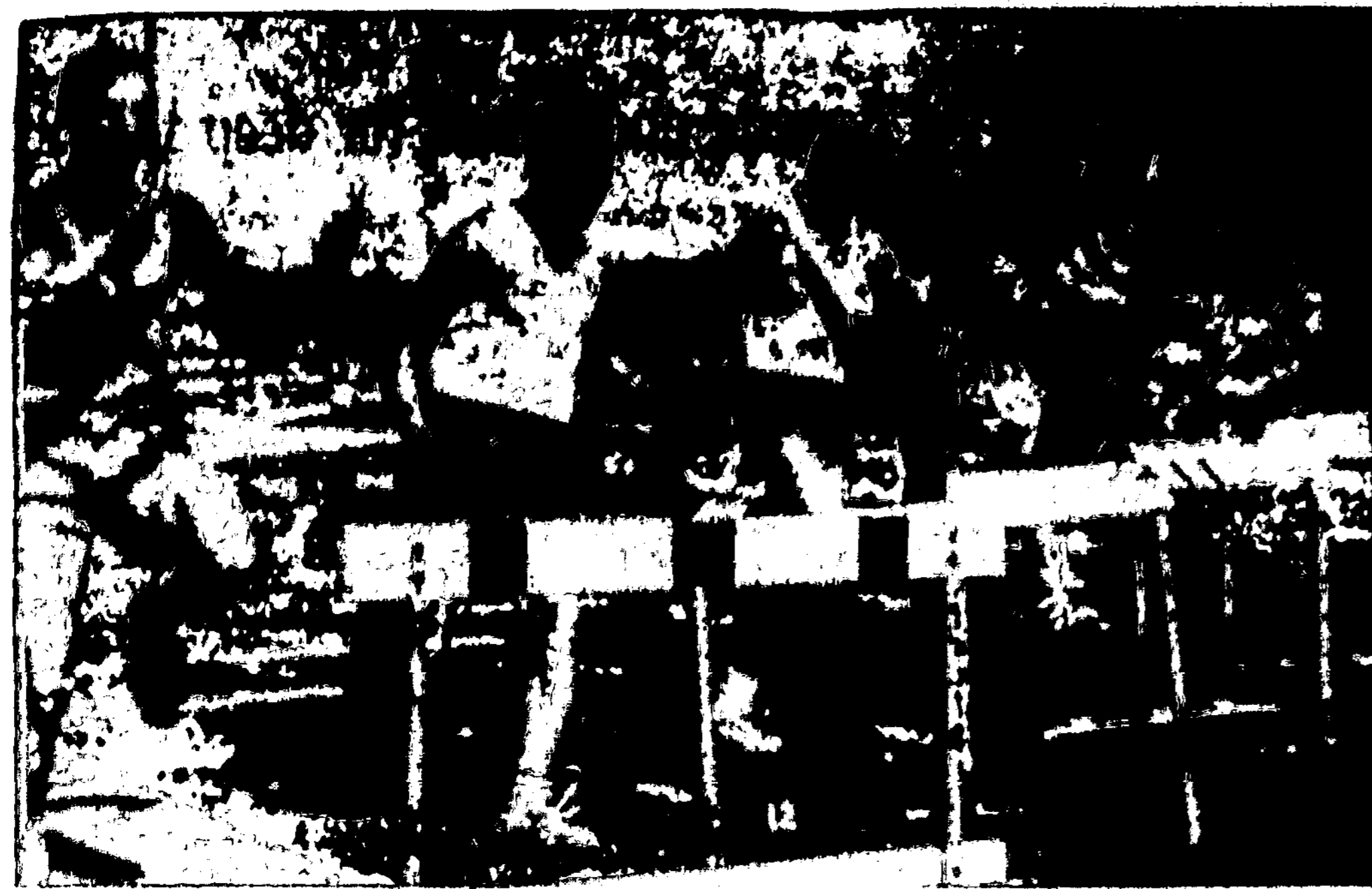
Criminal Cases

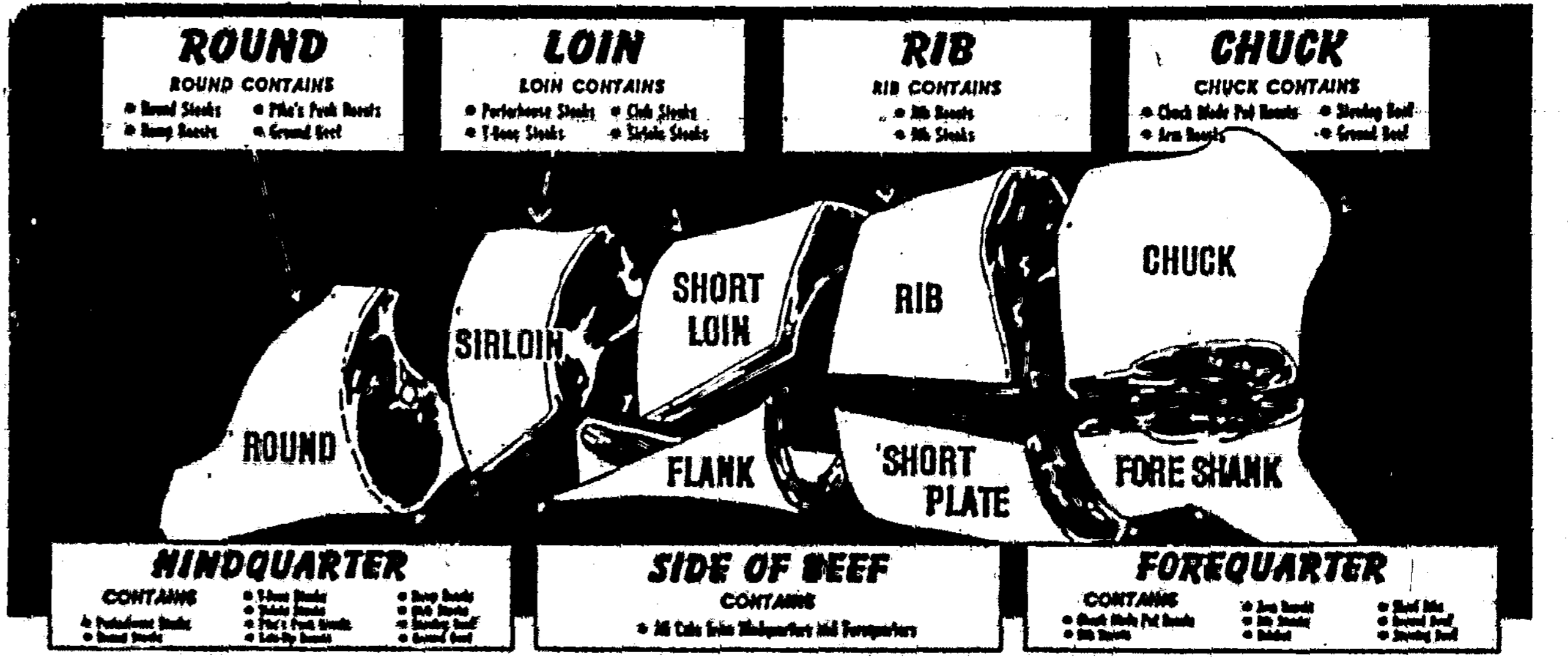

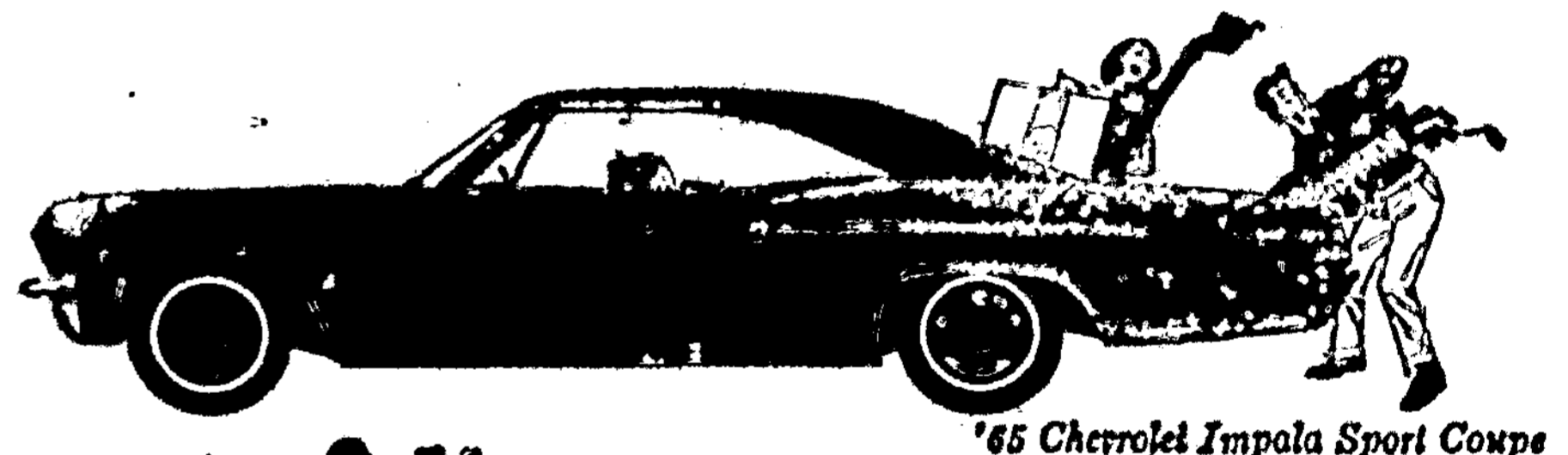

We should read past first chapter

Around the News ad department we figure to know, the first chapter of the book real well (which says, in short, sell something for gosh sake), and beyond that we're not too sure about advertising.

The State Department of Development is having its problems with advertising New Mexico as a state, or whole, or something.

Indians and rock piles or delapidated adobes have been the gist of nation-wide ads inserted by the Development people recently. Now they are taking a second look with good reason.

Are we in a desert country where Indian raiders may top the next hill any moment? Is the best we have for the tourist a stack of age-old rocks? Is metropolitan Albuquerque with its congested conditions our biggest draw? Is Nogal Lake with its trash and poor fishing the best we can offer campers?

Back east where potential travelers talk to a person who has been there (New Mexico) they get a first-hand report seen through the eyes of this one person — it's bound to vary.

Through advertising the state can spread the word of truth about our state: the blue of our hills at twilight, the almost untouched spaces in the backwoods of Lincoln County, a state where towns are 50 to 100 miles apart, a state that is going all out to make visitors welcome, in the rough-or-in-top tourist accommodations.

History is being made in New Mexico today, fully as important (though more peaceful) as in the shoot-em-up days. We sure need to advertise the vitality of our state, along with our climate, natural beauty, and good roads to almost every important point.

Let them find out about our history when they get here. That's our advertising lesson for this windy day of April.

Where to get new glasses, piona, teeth, etc.

Do you think it true that the most money is made where no competition exists? Certainly it is true that a lot of us merchants dream of a situation where we are the only guy who has gizmos for sale and make a killing selling them. It is equally true that some of us are scared to have more business places of a hustling type come to town for fear we might lose what little business we now have.

Let us talk about the Lincoln County News for a short space, because we can talk freely about our own business. Recently a daily newspaper told us they wanted to put a full time correspondent in Lincoln County . . . we told them that was fine and our county ought to profit from the extra publicity. More than once we have advised merchants to advertise out-of-town because they did area as much as local business.

At the News we know that we get only a small part of the local advertising dollars spent, and that other types of advertising get more from local merchants than we do. We rather welcome such competition, and frequently are reminded that we are not selling hard enough. If another newspaper, or more likely, a radio station wanted to set up in Carrizozo they probably wouldn't hurt our business a lot — they would keep local advertising money at home which is now going out of town,

way out of town in many instances.

True, we can sit here and work to keep our town small in an effort to keep out competition but when present owners quit business or pass on to their reward, what happens — in many instances that is one less business for Carrizozo and the net result of such action is that our town offers only bread-and-butter type service so people have to go out of town for a great many things . . . as they are now doing.

Equally true, one can make a living in the small town (like Carrizozo) without much aggressive merchandising, like keeping a full stock, well displayed and advertised over a wide area . . . but following this course a merchant is getting only a minimum business, employing only one or two helpers, or none, and not stirring many dollars around the community nor making an attempt to hold local trade.

Competition keeps one alert and as we pass, one by one, the fifty mark we don't care so much whether or not we are alert. Competition is present now, reaching in on us every waking hour but we are blind to the many broadside solicitations sent through the mail, the regular solicitations by daily newspaper, television and radio.

You should know we favor competition — it's either that or die as a town, and right now we're losing families.

FARM NEWS

Wool sold last week in Roswell ranged in price from 31 to 56 cents per pound. The lighter shrinking clips from around Piacacho were sold generally between 50 and 55 cents per pound. It was reported that the lower priced wool averaged 17 pounds per eye — at this weight the lower priced wool brought more per head than the 56 cent per pound wool.

Kathy Bancroft and Barbara Knoblock from the Happy Homemakers and Lois Dunlap from the Ancho Junior Ranchers presented Doctors Turner and Spencer with a sheepskin to use in the Lincoln County Municipal Hospital. This is one of the community service projects carried out by the 4-H clubs. The Happy Homemakers each month provide magazines and reading material for the hospital patients. The Happy Homemakers with the help of Mrs. Marion Spencer gave a bookcase for children's books to the hospital.

In the Clovis area over 3000 choice 625-900 pound steers were contracted for May-June delivery at 21.00-22.00, heifers at 19.00-20.00.

Fall lamb contracts in Montana are being made for October delivery at 20.50 to 21.00 per cwt.

um Chloride mixes well with sprayers, oil seed meals, or other supplements.

Money invested in quality planting seed is good insurance, no crop can be better than the seed and variety planted. The use of high-quality seed of adapted varieties is basic to successful farming. It is poor business to plant seed of low or unknown quality, and seed that is not adapted to the area.

R. C. Barham reported the Horse Clinic held last week at NMSU was the best one held. It contained good information on feeding, shoeing and managing.

Clover mites were invading some homes in the Ruidoso area last week. These mites do not harm the people in the house but are a nuisance and can damage house plants as well as the lawn.

Outside the clover mites can be controlled with Kelthane, especially around the base of the wall of the house. Inside the house, use Malathion or you can use a vacuum cleaner to clean them off the floor and furniture.

The Lincoln County wool judging contest will be held Friday, April 16, starting at 3:00 p.m. at Roswell Wool & Mohair in Roswell. At this time the junior and senior wool judging teams will be chosen to represent Lincoln County at the state contest May 8.

The Lincoln County Dress Revue will be held April 24 in Capitan starting at 9:00 a.m.

With the increased emphasis on preventing pesticide residue in food and feed crops, it is more important than ever that the producer keep accurate records when applying a chemical.

Accurate records serve many purposes. Besides allowing the operator to make sound management decisions and helping him be a better manager, they will also protect him if the question of pesticides residue occur.

A record of all pesticide applications should be kept by the operator indicating such things as the pesticides used, amounts used, rates of application, when and how applied. Environmental conditions such as weather and soil conditions when pesticides are applied, general weather conditions, labels from pesticide containers

and the date of sprayer or application equipment was calibrated can be of untold value in diagnosing problems.

Simple accurate records may keep a producer from being involved in a law-suit or otherwise save him a considerable sum of money.

Rose plants about one foot tall with tiny flowers, leaves and thorns, have many uses in home floriculture.

They're good for edging beds of large roses, or perennial borders, Rock garden culture suits them and they make worthwhile house plants. Children enjoy growing these small plants.

Miniature rose culture is similar to that of other roses, they are equally as winter hardy outdoors as other roses. Indoors, they demand 4 to 6 hours of full sun daily. The plants survive with less sun, but don't blossom.

Plants may be purchased when dormant or in bloom. Dormant plants are best. Purchased in late winter, they can be set in 3-inch pots until roots become established. Later, they can be transferred to 4-inch pots or, planted outdoors.

There are many named varieties. Flower colors range through white, yellow, orange, pink, crimson and red. Some have a single row of petals in their flowers, some two or more.

It was even more than Gov. Jack Campbell could stand and he vetoed the thing. POLYGRAPHERS, PSYCHOLOGISTS Governor Jack Campbell is quite a board man. In 1963 he approved a law for licensing and regulating polygraphers with a board that had to be limited to three because there were hardly enough in the polygraphy business for the usual board of five. If you are among the 95 per cent who don't know what polygraphy is you should be enlightened by knowing it is lie testing. The same year Campbell also approved a new licensing board for photographers and another for psychologists. STATE BOARDS ARE SELFISH New Mexico has 27 licensing regulatory boards all of them set up ostensibly to protect the public health and welfare but many of them operating to serve their own groups at public expense. There have been raw cases of boards keeping qualified people out of trades and professions, of maintaining price structures and keeping down competition within their lines. 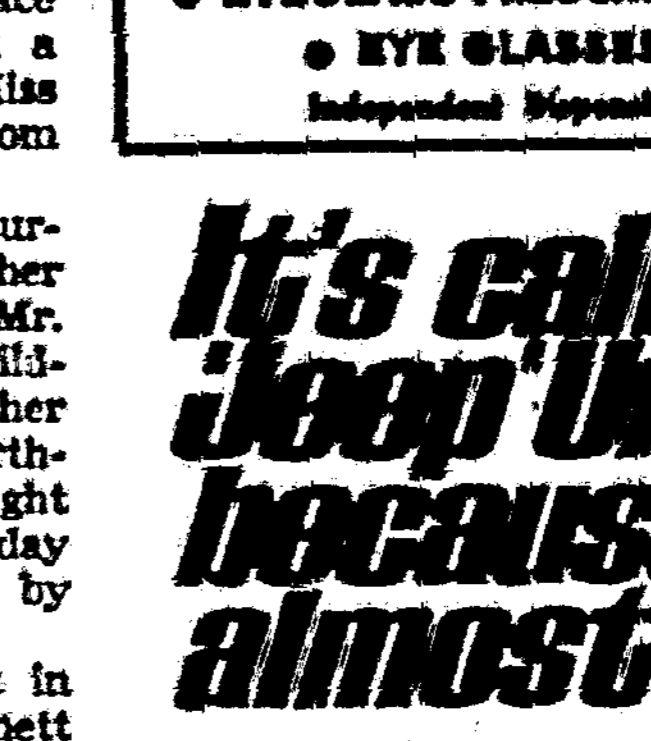
