Plans completed for courthouse dedication

Lincoln County was created by an act of the Territorial Legislature in 1869 and at that time contained over 27,000 square miles and was the largest county in the United States. Its area was greater than that of Connecticut, Delaware, Massachusetts, Rhode Island and Vermont combined.

Soon after its organization the county seat was established at Lincoln, then known as Bonito Plaza. There the seat of government remained through the struggle for power in Territorial Lincoln County, climaxed in 1878 by five months of violence and bloodshed, known -as the Lincoln County War.

In 1909 the county seat was changed to Carrizozo where a new courthouse had just been completed and where all courts have since been held. This old

courthouse is still standing but not for long.

A new Lincoln County Courthouse in Carrizozo is nearing completion and will be dedicated with appropriate ceremonies on Satuurday, May 8. Demolition of the old courthouse will start shortly after the dedication date.

With a great deal of help from people all over the county and much detailed planning by County Commissioners Max Oliver (chairman), Joe McKnight and Bob Shafer an all-day program has been set up for an estimated crowd of 5,000 peo-

Conducted tours of the new courthouse facilities will start at 10:00 a.m. with Lincoln County 4-H Club members as guides under the supervision of County Agent Ralph Dunlap. During the morning former county commissioners Charles A. Jones, Kenneth Nosker, and Roman Nunez — the men who saw the new courthouse through its initial stages -- will hold office in the commissioner's room in the new building, Judge W. T. Scoggin will host visitors in the new court room at the same time.

At 11:00 a.m. four Lincoln County bands from Capitan, Carrizozo, Corona and Ruidoso will present concerts in the courthouse patio, Band directors are Bartley McDonough, host director Arnold Boyce, Miss Sherrill Perkins and Leroy Gooch.

The bands will play as a group for the flag raising ceremony at 12:00 noon

The flag raising will be conducted by Ruidoso American Legion Post 79 with Lincoln County Boy Scouts as color guards.

Immediately following the flag raising, Max Oliver, chairman of the board of county commissioners, will introduce other members of the commission. Joe McKnight and Bob Shafer, and Judge George Zimmerman who will act as master of ceremonies for the dedication program.

Invocation will be given by A. T. Bert Pfingsten, All Living ex-county commissioners will be recognized. Former governor Tom Bollack will make a short talk. State Senator Joe Skeen will perform the dedication ceremony.

A luscious beef barbeque will

be prepared, starting Friday night, by the Lidne Clubs of Capitan, Ruidoso and Carrizozo. This feast will be free for all who attend, serving will start following the dedication ceremony. The menu will consist of beef, potato salad, beans, bread and coffee.

At 2:30 p.m. the Hondo Flee sta Dancers, under the direction of Mrs. Fermin Montes, will present entertainment in front of the new courthouse, At 3:00 p.m. the Ruidoso Square Dencers will take over to entertain the crowd.

At 4:00 tours of the courthouse will start again for late arrivals who want to see the new Lincoln County facilities.

Visiting dignitaries will be greeted by Central Committee chairmen of both political parties. Transportation service to and from airports in Carrizozo and Ruidoso has been arranged for the dedication affair, Lincoln County Mounted Patrol will supervise traffic and parking during the day, Carrizozo Womans Club will serve refreshments on the courthouse grounds. Carrizozo and Ruidoso Rotary Clubs will assist with serving the lunch at noon,

The Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce has been the local organization doing much of the planning and working with the county commissioners in setting up the program. Commissioners Max Oliver told C of C President Fred English that he had never seen so much enthusiasm or such fine cooperation county-wide as on this accasion.

The Armex is almost completed and should be ready for occupancy very shortly.

Most of the furniture for the new courthouse has arrived and is being installed.

By this time I am completely baked like a boiled lobster, what a sun burn. As I lead the "Older Folks" up a long, long flight of steps from the lake to the upper ramparts level, the kids are calling out, "left, right, left, right", to encourage the elders to complete the climb, and of course ribbing me for all the drill I have been calling out to them this past week, Of course it was all in fun and everyone got a big laugh at Mr. Boyce's expense. (Truly, I did not know if I would make it or not.)

Mr. Ellison gathered his brood and we were off to supper. We pulled into a large truck stop and tried to get waited on. Luckily Jeffrey Mackey in some way became a waltress or we would still be there, and she promoted and served our group.

Next, to the evening show at 7:30 p.m. We had our tickets and we all entered the High School Gym where Ralph Edwards M. Cied the evening enterialnment, Peggie Knoblock war picked to pull the lucky number for the door prize. He was widely known as a result of active participation in. the civic, business and political affairs of the community county and state.







SANTA FE - Sen. Buddy Wamel of Hidalgo and Rep. Tony Lucero of Albuquerque got a crummy deal last January when the state's biggest newspaper published on its front page that they had not filed income tax returns fro some past

years. The report on the missing returns of the two legislators was made under a new rule that permits the U.S. Internal Revenue Service to answer if persons have or have not filed income tax returns.

The paper asked for a check on all the legislators and only Wamel and Lucero were cited as not paying,

Both claimed that they had filed returns for the years named but didn't sound very convincing in the face of the reports from the big agency andthe big paper.

Three months after the first publication the tax returns for both men were found and it was recorded under a small headline far back in the paper that had announced the erroneous report on its front page.

NOW SENATOR CAN GO HOME

Sen. Cirillo Maestas who represents Mora county in the legislature and has been teaching school in San Miguel and Colfax counties for years will get to go home next summer as Mora superintendent.

The homecoming was made possible when the Democrats finally got control of the school board and fired Superintendent Manuel Alconx and hired the senator.

IN LOW INCOME

Sierra, with the county seat. of (ugh) Truth or Consequences, has a greater portion of low income families than any other county according to a report made last week by Sen. Clint Anderson on the distribution of money from the new federal aid to education law.

In 1950 and 52 he was elected governor, 1954 he lost a run for the U.S. Senate, 1958 elected governor again, 1958 defeated for governor, 1960 governor again, 1962 defeated for governor and 1964 defeated in a run for the Senate. He won five, lost five.

The way things look it may be another generation before the party produces another winner, although there are possibilities in 1966.

Democrats don't have a popular candidate for governor, so far anyway, and there is an old pattern in which the party that wing the presidency most always loses ground in the first off-year election.

Forest Fee goes in Tuesday, June 1

Russel E. Rea, supervisor of Lincoln National Forest, has announced fee schedule for visits to developed camp and picnic grounds on the Lincoln National Forest. Charges will be made starting June 1, 1965.


Fees are of three types, Users

of national-forest recreation areas have the option of purchasing either a \$7 annual sticker, which will admit any private non-commercial motor vehicle and its occupants to any federal recreation area in the United States including the developed camp and picnic grounds on the Lincoln National Forest, This 57 sticker is to be applied to the bumper of the car and admits the car and its occupants to the recreation areas. In lieu of this \$7 sticker, for short-term visits, users may purchase a fifty cent ticket which admits one person to a developed camp or picnic ground for one day, or for stays of longer duration he may purchase a ticket for \$2.50, which will admit one person to a developed camp or picnic ground for a period of one week. Obviously those persons who visit federal recreation areas frequently will be money ahead to purchase the \$7 amount sticker. When a person purchases the \$7 annual sticker he will also receive an informational brochure from the Bureau of Outdoor Recreation, a Forest Service Camp & Picnic booklet and a Forest Service Information Sheet.

Supervisor Rea said further that the Lincoln National Forest will not begin charging for the use of their recreation areas until June 1, 1965; however. the stickers will be available about April 5. These stickers can be purchased at the Forest Supervisor's office in Alamogordo or at the District Ranger's offices located in Capitan, Ruidoso, Clouderoft, Mayhill, Sacramento, and Carlsbad. Rea urges everyone to purchase his stickers as soon as possible.

Another schedule of fees has been set up for use by large groups such as a school or church group planning a picnic for 100 people or so. Rather than paying the individual price of fifty cents per person, the group leader may buy a group ticket for \$10.00 up to 100 persons, \$20.00 up to 200 persons, \$30.00 up to 300 persons, and 40.00 for groups of over 300 people.

Rea said that the following developed camp and picnic grounds on the Lincoln National Forest will probably be subject to the admission fees beginning June 1. Nogal Lake, Pines, Karr Canyon, Cedar Creek, Monjeau, Decrhead, Sleepygrass, James Canyon, Skyline, Oak Grove and Sitting Bull Falls,
